

Computer Center Set for East Tawas

Formation of the National Electronic Transmission Service to provide general data processing service using microwave relay transmission, the first such system in the nation, was announced Monday by Gordon E. Collins, general manager of the new East Tawas firm.

Maintaining headquarters on the third floor of the Holland House, East Tawas, NETS will initially offer full service on-line bank processing service in a four-state area, including Michigan, Illinois, Wisconsin and Minnesota.

The new firm has arrived at agreements with American Microwave and Communications, Incorporated, of Iron Mountain, to carry a microwave signal in the four-

state area, as well as across the nation when desired.

Through this means, NETS will connect computers located at its central processing locations to on-line transmission devices located at its customer's sites.

The firm plans to use NCR Century 200 computers at its initial locations to service the four states with additional central processing locations to be used in its plan for nationwide expansion.

Processing of demand deposit items, savings, installment loans, mortgage loans and general ledger accounts for financial institutions will be accomplished instantaneously through use of the NETS system. This financial service will be the firm's initial offering with

service to other types of business currently being studied for feasibility.

Other types of endeavors currently contemplated by NETS are commercial CATV, which will include educational, instructional, cultural and shopping television channels interconnected with the digital computers where feasibility is indicated.

Articles for the incorporation of NETS were approved by the State of Michigan on February 5. Officers of the firm include Richard L. Harwood, chairman; Bruce G. Freil, president; Michael N. Freil, secretary-treasurer.

Collins, general manager, is formerly of Fort Wayne, Indiana, where he was director of engineer-

ing for the International Telephone and Telegraph, Fort Wayne division. In that position, he was responsible for major computer applications.

Collins, who served as school principal at Whittemore before entering the United States Navy in 1942, is married to the former Mildred Harwood of East Tawas. He attended Central Michigan University and studied engineering at Massachusetts Institute of Technology, Princeton and Purdue. He and his wife are parents of two grown sons.

Collins said Monday that "this is the most exciting thing I have ever been involved in." The service is a new concept in shar-

ing time on computers.

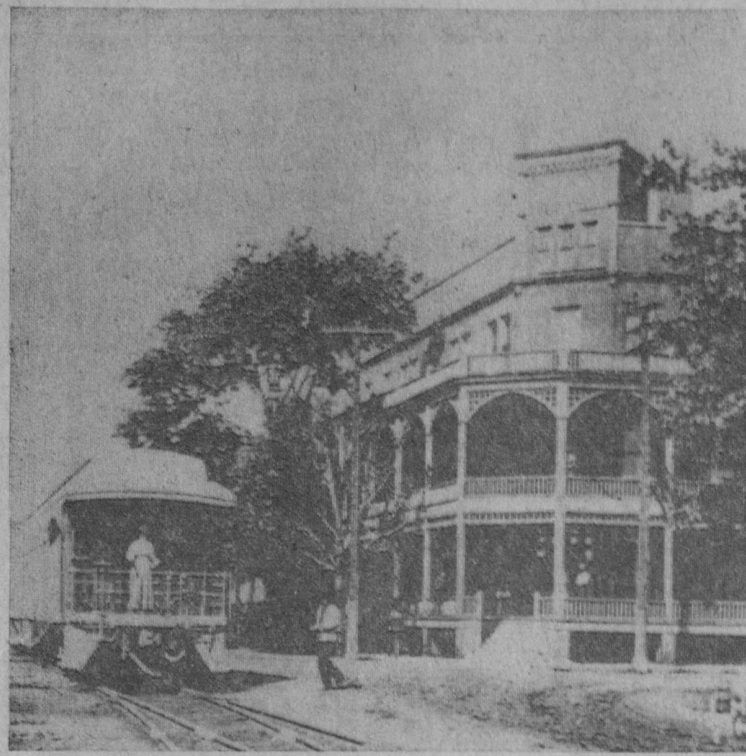
Idea for this new service originated with Harwood, who drew together experts in various fields involved. It is felt that it is a very workable program using methods with new and revolutionary techniques.

Collins expects that NETS will be fully operational within 12 months and expects that 25 persons will be involved in the operation. He said Monday that he expects that the firm will train local persons to be computer technicians.

It is expected that when operational, the firm will have leased equipment amounting to 2½ million dollars.

Old Holland Gets New Role in Life

It may have escaped the reader's notice a few weeks ago, but an era has ended. The era of the Holland Hotel as a famous Northeastern Michigan hostelry is no longer, but the 78-year-old building has a new lease on life as the Holland House and an even newer usefulness in the electronic age.

Announcement is made this week of two important changes at

the Holland. Ronald Garlock of Lansing has purchased the ground floor business from Ard Richardson, consisting of the cocktail lounge, dining and dancing areas.

The hotel business is no more as the third floor has been leased to National Electronic Transmission Service, which may expand to the second floor with its computer operation described elsewhere in this newspaper.

Mrs. Paula Anderson, Holland manager, said that future plans for the business call for converting an apartment at the west end of the building into plush private dining rooms, along with a piano bar in the cocktail lounge.

"In addition to our regular business, we will be catering to business luncheons, dinners, service club functions, as well as promoting convention dinners," said Mrs. Anderson.

A resident of Lansing before moving to East Tawas, Mrs. Anderson has had 12 years experience in managing country clubs and hotels in Iowa and Michigan. She holds a degree in education from Iowa State Teachers College, as well as studying restaurant management at the University of Iowa.

Busy as her schedule keeps her, Mrs. Anderson's primary personal interest centers around her three sons, one living in Muskegon, one attending Ferris State College and one living in California.

She plans to open her own boutique shop on the ground level of the building in the spring.

The Holland was constructed at the tail end of the lumbering era by Temple Emery of East Tawas and Nelson Holland of Saginaw. In the fall of 1891, the two men formed the Holland and Emery Lumber Company and constructed a new mill, dry kiln, salt block and employed about 250 men in the operation at East Tawas. The firm's new general office building and store was located directly across Newman Street from the Holland.

While the Holland and Emery lumbering business operated only until 1895, when the flow of white pine timber was cut off from Georgian Bay by Canadian embargo, the large hotel built by the firm continued to flourish as it catered to the tourist and resort business promoted by the Detroit and Mackinac Railway.

The Holland, built originally at a cost of \$35,000, was one of the finest hotels of any town of its size in the state. Over the years and a succession of owners, the hotel has undergone a number of renovations which saw removal of the three piazzas running along Bay Street and Newman Street, as well as the tower on the front of the building.

Principal renovation came in 1957-58, when Richardson completely remodeled the interior of the building.

More remodeling is in store for the old building and the once-glistening ballroom on the third floor, where young people of another era waltzed to the strains of Strauss, will hear the "strains" of computers in a new electronic age.

Family Theatre Has Improvements

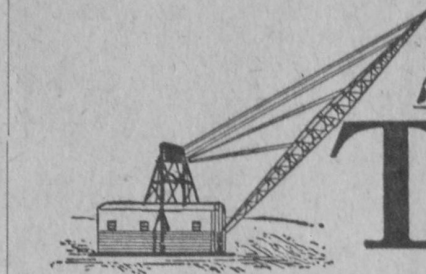
He is a former college teacher and faculty member at Michigan State University, Boston University and Harvard University.

Riegle married Nancy E. Brandt of Flint in 1957. They have two daughters and one son.

He was elected to the 90th congress November 8, 1966. He is a member of committee on appropriations, foreign operations and District of Columbia subcommittees.

Riegle is the youngest man ever appointed to the house appropriations committee and was a leader in the successful house drive to create a permanent ethics committee. He was selected by the Nation Magazine as one of the two "best congressmen for the year 1967."

He was named as one of the 10 outstanding young men of the nation in 1967 by the United States Junior Chamber of Commerce.

Perchville USA Opens 3-Day Program Friday

"Button up for Perchville" is the slogan this week as the annual Perchville USA festival gets set to open its three-day program Friday, Saturday and Sunday, February 20-22.

Spokesmen for the Tawas Chamber of Commerce, sponsor of the event, said that buttons being sold throughout the Tawas will help defray the cost of the program, as well as serving as a souvenir for visitors.

The program officially opens Friday evening with the annual stag fish fry to be held this year at the Buckhorn Inn. The program starts at 6:00 p. m. and Chuck Waters of WNEM-TV, Bay City, is to be crowned Perchville king.

The program will include previewing a water wonderland film

and tape festival entitled, "Treasures of the Inland Seas."

Saturday's events begin with a 10:00 a. m. flag raising ceremony at the Michigan Waterways Commission dock, followed at 11:00 a. m. by a program of ice races and children's games.

Sky diving exhibitions are scheduled at 10:00 a. m., noon, 2:00 p. m. and 4:00 p. m., along with polar bear swimming activities and tug-of-war on the ice at 3:15 p. m. After reigning for many years as polar bear king, Harry McElyea of Flint is retiring and a new king is to be selected.

Rounding out the day of activities will be a fireworks display beginning at dusk and the annual Perchville banquet and queen's coronation at 6:00 p. m., to be held

at the Holland House. Adult and teen dances are also scheduled.

Snowmobile races sponsored by Isosco Snow Drifters will be held Sunday noon on Tawas Bay. Registrations will run from 9:00 a. m. to 11:30 a. m. More than 75 trophies will be presented during the day to the first three places in all race classes.

An ice spudding contest and demolition derby will be held Sunday afternoon. The demolition derby is to start at 3:00 p. m.

Saturday's sky diving demonstration will feature James Vallander and his daredevil team. The program will feature free fall demonstrations.

Helicopter and sleigh rides are to be provided at cost for everyone's enjoyment.

DPW Crew Completes Tough Water Main Job

A water main break under the Tawas River, which has provided a big headache for Reginald Bublitz, city superintendent, along with the crew of the Tawas City Department of Public Works, was finally repaired Friday afternoon.

Extremely cold weather, coupled with hazardous working conditions, added to the problem of unknown elements involved in restoring full water service to a portion of the city's southwestern sector.

A break in a six-inch water main running six feet under the river near the US-23 bridge was discovered on January 26, after water pressure dropped sharply and deep wells were placed into emergency operation.

Test holes were dug next to the

river bank, but the break was firmly established as being under the river. Bublitz and his crew had no previous experience in making such a hazardous repair and technical advice was furnished by the city engineer and various contractors.

Work was halted on this project when a second break occurred at the intersection of Beegh and Court Streets, which was caused by frost cracking the water main. This repair was completed, the crew turned to its regular work of snow removal of city streets and then again undertook the river project.

Below zero weather caused delays because of equipment damage, but an earthen dam was finally constructed in the river. Last

Wednesday, work began on digging into the river, but water began pouring into the hole and work had to be stopped until additional fill was secured to stop the leak.

Last Friday an air compressor hammer was used to break the frozen fill, which was replaced with fresh clay. An additional problem was caused by cold weather when a pump was frozen solid and had to be thawed. Work had been delayed the previous day when the boom on the city's backhoe cracked during the cold weather.

Digging down to the water main, which was almost 12 feet below the top of the river, steel sheeting was driven into the river bed to protect workmen.

No Surprises Monday in TC Primary

There were no upsets in Monday's primary election to name candidates for the annual spring election in Tawas City. A total of 195 persons cast ballots in the election with greatest interest in the First and Second Wards where there were three contests.

Greatest interest came in the First Ward, where Martin Wellna, incumbent, successfully defended his nomination on the Republican Ticket against Daniel Ulrich, former alderman. Wellna received 59 votes as compared to 44 for Ulrich. Benjamin Brewer was renominated as supervisor with 88 votes.

While two races featured the Second Ward ballot, only mild interest was shown. Frank Ahonen, incumbent Republican alderman, was renominated with 33 votes, as compared to 24 votes received by his opponent, Frank Roti. The Republican nomination for supervisor went to Arnold Kuerbitz, incumbent, who polled 32 votes while Horace Hilbert received 23.

In the Third Ward, Donald Watson, Republican incumbent, received 15 votes, while Clarence Eyrett, a write-in candidate and former supervisor, received six votes. Howard Hatton, incumbent Republican alderman, received 24 votes.

Renominated for other offices were John St. James, mayor; First Ward, 97; Second Ward, 49; Third Ward, 26. Jerry Cotter received one write-in vote for mayor in the First Ward.

Walter Nelson, clerk; First Ward, 86; Second Ward, 50; Third Ward, 26. Steven Ezo received one vote for clerk in the First Ward.

Mary Byrd, treasurer; First Ward, 93; Second Ward, 50; Third Ward, 27.

Post Office Expands Local Home Delivery

Announcement has been made of a major new postal service that will expand home deliveries to an additional four-million Americans—principally in small communities—for the first time.

Included in the 38,398 Michigan families who will be made eligible for this service expansion under the order are patrons of post offices at Tawas City, Whittemore, Hale, National City and Long Lake.

Under the program, persons living more than a quarter mile, but less than one-half mile from 18,700 post offices that do not have city delivery are now eligible to receive the delivery at home. Previously, they have been compelled to go to the post office for their mail.

Since they live less than one-half a mile away from a post office, they have not been eligible to receive rural delivery service prior to Postmaster Gen. Winton M. Boumt's new order, explains Cong. Elford A. Cederberg of Michigan's 10th Congressional District.

And because they live near a post office that does not have city delivery, they have missed out there, too.

Cederberg said he had been advised that the postmaster general is issuing instruction in the postal bulletin Thursday making the service available to the 1.2 million families living in the eligible areas.

The only requirement to obtain the service is that it must be requested of the postmaster and a majority of those living in the area must desire the service.

The expansion will be achieved by such steps as extending shorter rural routes and adding delivery stops to some rural routes. In other instances, "star" or contract routes may be used to provide the service. In some locations, it may be necessary to establish new rural routes.

"Mr. Blount's order provides for one of the most significant advances in service in many years," the legislator commented. "I am particularly pleased that the order will benefit communities in my district."

Basil Goupil, incumbent mayor of Whittemore, was renominated on the Democratic Ticket in Monday's primary election. Goupil received 53 votes, as compared to 28 votes for Dennis Hoffman. All other city officers were unopposed.

Proceeds from the races will go toward helping to finance purchase of lights at the school athletic field, which were installed last fall.

Races on the one-half mile oval will include a powder puff derby and children's events. Trophies are to be awarded to winners. Registration is to be held from 10:00 a. m. to 12 o'clock noon at the Plainfield Township Hall. Races are to start at 1:00 p. m.

A spokesman for the sponsoring organizations said that the two previous races this winter were most successful and many compliments were received concerning the operation.

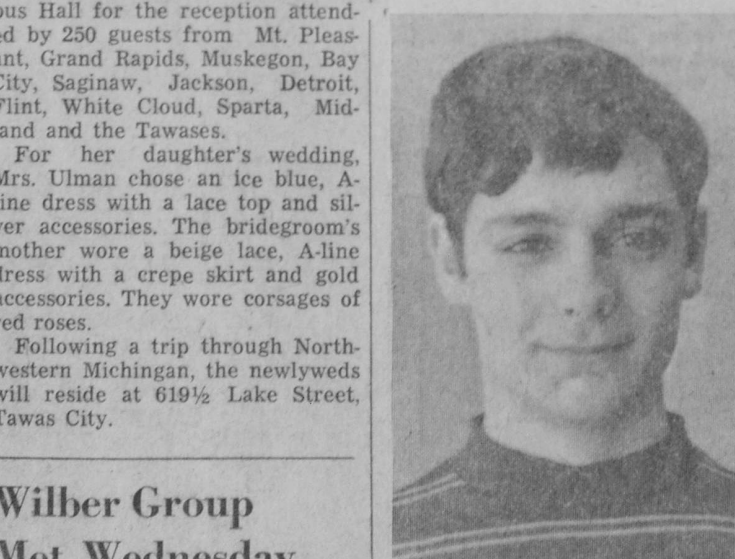

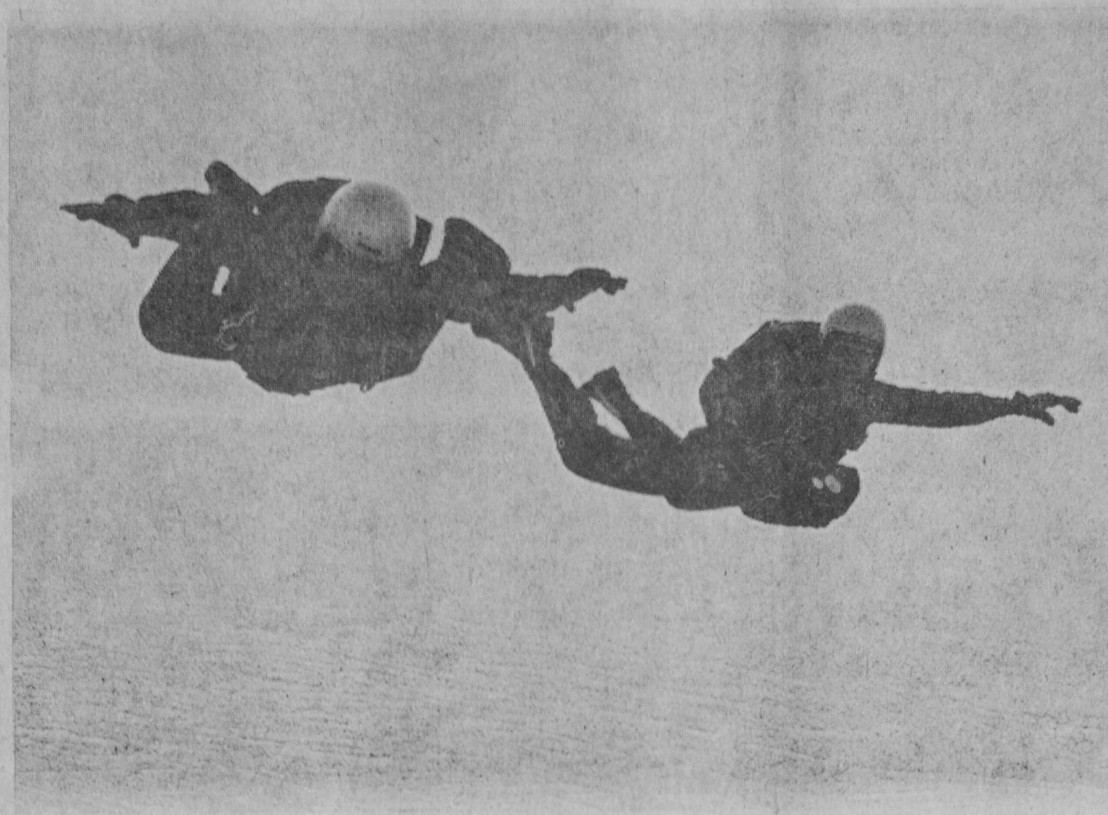

St. James was authorized to attend the February 25-26 meeting of the Michigan Municipal League at Lansing.

East Tawas Adopts

Housing Ordinance

A new ordinance governing housing was adopted Monday night by the East Tawas Council.

The new ordinance controls construction of all structures, as well as providing legal machinery for demolition of unfit buildings.

Members of the city's housing commission appeared before the council and explained its work toward obtaining federal assistance in constructing housing for senior citizens, as well as low income families.

John C. Elliott, commission chairman, said he was most enthused about the possibility of obtaining assistance in this project, particularly since including low income families in the program.

Representatives of the housing commission are to go to Chicago, Illinois, to present the application to the Office of Housing and Urban Development.

In other business, a letter from the lands division of the Michigan Department of Natural Resources stated that the city could apply to the state to acquire filled land along Tawas Bay at the former site of Anderson Coach Company, presently owned by the city. The coach company has made application for the property a number of years ago, but action was suspended when buildings were destroyed by fire.

Discussion on location of a coffee house for youngsters at East Tawas is to be discussed at a future meeting. Mayor James Campbell said that the community building was being considered, but he felt that some other location would be more suitable. Campbell believed that a smaller room and one

where decorations could remain intact would be more to the liking of youngsters.

Deloise Durant reported that he and Joseph Badalucco had recently attended a meeting and learned that approximately \$9,000 could be available from the state recreational bond issue for development of recreational facilities at East Tawas.

The council approved an appropriation of \$200 to the Tawas Chamber of Commerce for fireworks to be held July 4 and during the Michigan Tourist Festival.

Anderson Ends 41-Year Career With Iosco Road Commission

A lot of changes have taken place in the design of heavy construction equipment during the past 41 years. And one who knows is Edwin Anderson, 70, Baldwin Township.

Anderson recalled Friday on his retirement as an employee of the Iosco Road Commission that graders were once equipped with a wheel through the front window to raise plows, truck boxes were cranked by hand and equipment operators always kept a small bag of salt handy to remove frost from the windows during the winter.

Anderson, who started with the road commission in April 1929, recalled that there were less than a dozen men working on the roads in those days. Today, 40 persons are employed by this important county agency which maintains 882 miles of roads.

Members of the road commission when Anderson first started 41 years ago were Fred Holbeck, William Grant and Joseph Dimmick, all of whom are deceased.

His most vivid recollection of one of his toughest jobs was the winter of 1935. He described it as the most severe winter in local history and commission crews worked

night and day to keep roads open to traffic.

Two of the largest projects ever undertaken by the road commission during Anderson's day was construction of the South Branch Road, from Long Lake to South Branch, and the Tawas Beach Road. Both were filled with deep sink holes and required considerable grading.

Starting out as a "flunkie," in three months he worked up to operator of a caterpillar tractor, a job which he held for 15 years. Anderson's job for the past 26 years has been a crane operator.

Anderson, who plowed snow with a vengeance when he was

called on to do that job, said Friday he does not like winter weather. "I am not going to make up my mind about what to do in retirement until the snow leaves," he said.

He hinted he may do some fishing and a little gardening, but probably will stay right around home. "I have two fireplaces in my home and I can keep myself busy chopping wood," he said.

Anderson and his wife, Luella, are the parents of three sons, Edwin (Rictor), a teacher at Riverview; William, employed at the Internal Revenue Service office at Jackson, and Michael at home.

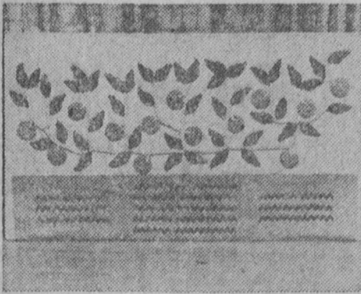

Q What is scientific forest management?

A In the early years of Michigan's industrial development, loggers overcut our native forests and left behind eroding riverbanks. Consumers Power helped to restore these lands through reforestation. 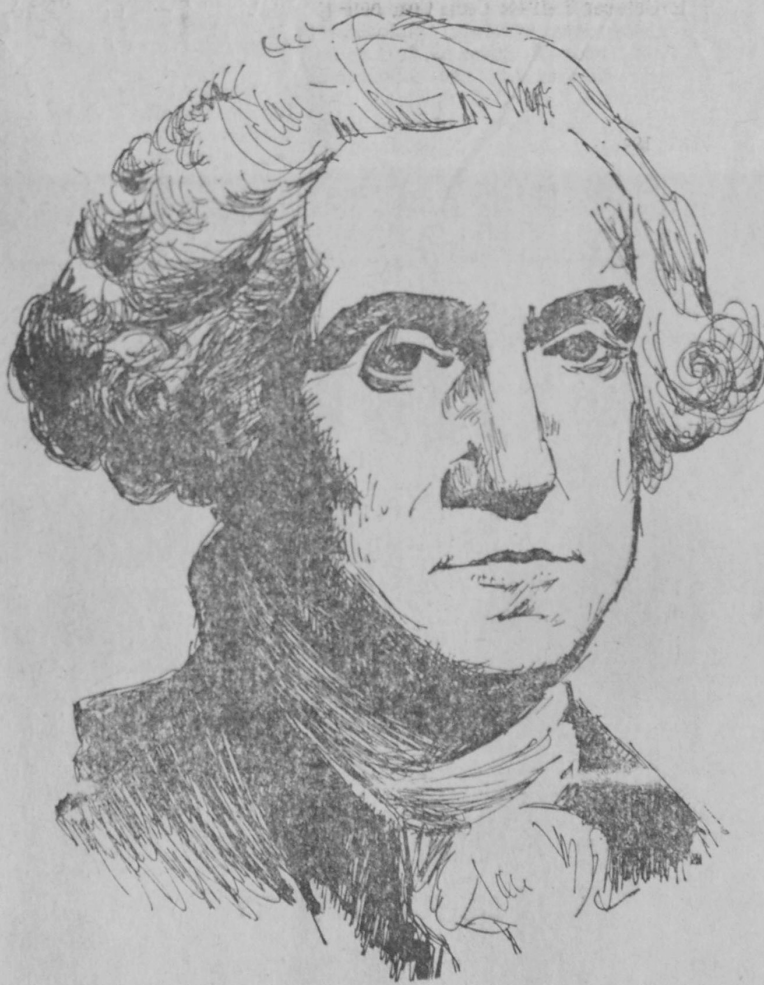

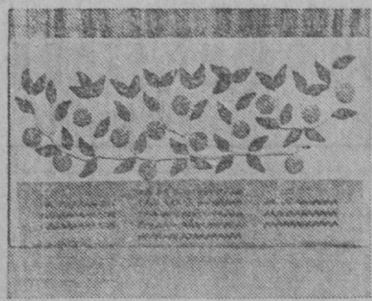

Tell Procedures for Selective Service

Men residing in Iosco County who are called to appear for examination through the local selective service board ordinarily spend the greater part of two days in the process. Exams are taken in Detroit to determine eligibility for the draft. Another name for this exam is preinduction physical examination.

Registrants are transported via bus from East Tawas to Detroit the afternoon of the day before the actual examination begins. They are provided lodging in a Detroit hotel and a bus transports them to the entrance and examining station early the next morning. Some buses are chartered and others used as the regular bus runs.

It is to the benefit of the registrant to endeavor to present himself in good shape for the written as well as the physical exam since this score can possibly qualify the registrant for training in a variety of vocational training programs offered by the armed forces, especially if enlisting.

The armed forces examining station informs the local board several days following the exam whether the young man passed this examination. The local board then issues the result by mailing a form, DD 62, to the registrant.

Men may enlist with physical conditions correctable within six weeks, such as overweight and hernia, provided they agree to treatment at government expense and interested persons may find the full details from the armed forces recruiters, who visit this area each week.

Most of the men serving in the nation's armed forces volunteered. Since not enough volunteered, however, local selective service boards are directed by national and state headquarters to provide additional man power.

Dear Editor:

Two major issues face our community today which may have lasting effects upon the quality of education here in the Tawas area. The first is the overcrowded conditions here in the schools; the second is the process of negotiations between the board of education and the Tawas Area Education Association.

Recently at a public meeting, the advantages and a few disadvantages of half day sessions for secondary students was discussed by the board and members of the community. The meeting was held because of the pressing problem of overcrowding in the schools. Other alternatives to the problem were mentioned but not discussed to any length. One point which should be stressed: Any program which is a stop-gap measure, is only postponing the inevitable, and the longer we wait, the more costly it will be to solve the problem. The only logical solution is to build a new middle school. This idea has the backing of the TAEA. By middle school, we mean a separate building for grades five through eight. There are social problems developing at the high school because of the presence of the junior high students. We believe they should be in a separate building.

The longer the community waits to build such a school, and it will have to eventually, the more costly a project will cost. Building costs are going up at the rate of eight percent to 12 percent a year. If we wait for five years before completing such a building, the cost could be 50 percent higher than at present. This is not an increase of tens of thousands of dollars, but rather of hundreds of thousands.

Overcrowded classrooms also shortchanges students. The greater the number of students in a class, the less time for individual attention by the instructor. Unless additional rooms are made available soon, the situation will be beyond stop-gap measures.

For these reasons, the association urges the board and the community to move toward immediate consideration of a middle school. In the long run, this proposal will save the community money, help the students and help relieve the problem. Until a new building could be built, we suggest renting temporary classrooms.

Concerning the second problem, that of negotiations, the association does not deny the fact the board has a right to hire anyone they see fit to negotiate for them, just as the association has that right. We have never felt it was necessary, however. Both the board and the association have legal aid available to them from their attorneys when they want to confer with them away from the negotiating table. Both sides do this. Neither side has ever brought outsiders to the negotiating session.

At a time when teachers have been told there is little or no money for text books or other educational aids, we question the reasonableness of hiring an outside negotiator for \$500 a month. When the association was negotiating for binding arbitration, the board stated it did not want outsiders coming in to decide on educational problems. What's the difference? We wonder how the board can justify an expenditure of a possible \$6,000 a year for a man who may work less than 50 hours for that year. Do the people of this community want an individual who has no interest in our schools or children, except what money it provides, to come in and take over a job the board has handled in the past? With non-economic issues in the contract closed for three years, is the remainder of the contract worth the expense? Is the board making a move to get out from under the problems some people believe they made for themselves during negotiations.

In other communities where a board of education has hired an outside negotiator, all they bought for their community was trouble. Almost all of those schools experienced a teacher strike. Pinconning, Oscoda and West Branch are good examples. Will our board be following in their footsteps?

The association would like it to be known that for the past two years, our teachers have re-

turned to school in the fall without a signed contract. In other communities, teachers without contracts have refused to start school. Your teachers support a full educational program for Tawas Area. We believe that as professionals in the business, our opinion on education problems should be made public.
