

# Grade Student Crushed by Bus

An 11-year-old elementary student was crushed to death under the right rear wheels of a school bus Tuesday morning in an unloading zone at Tawas Area High School.

Victim of the 8:35 o'clock tragedy was Trina A. Hendricks, who attended the sixth grade at Tawas City Elementary Unit. She was dead on arrival at Tawas Hospital.

The little girl was the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. William Hendricks, 180 West River Road, Grant Township.

The bus driver, Arthur R. Markham, 63, East Tawas, told investigating state police officers that he had just entered the unloading zone in front of the high school and the bus was traveling about five miles per hour.

Students were on the sidewalk waiting to enter the bus, which would then transfer them to the elementary unit. Police are still investigating the accident to determine how the little girl fell under wheels of the bus. The driver was not held.

Funeral services are to be conducted Friday, February 27, 11:00 a. m. from Hemlock Road Baptist Church. The Rev. Walter Buck will officiate. Burial will be in Flint Memorial Cemetery.

The Hendricks family had returned to the Tawas area on January 5 from Onaway, where Mr. Hendricks was employed in the construction business. The family had resided here prior to moving to Onaway.

Besides her parents, the little girl is survived by two brothers, William and Brian, and one sister, Darlene, all of whom attend Tawas Area School.

# TA School Starts Study of Finances

Although school financing has become a year around job, administrators and the board of education of Tawas Area School will soon begin the annual task of preparing an operational budget to be submitted next April to the Iosco Allocation Board.

A report on finances at Monday night's board meeting indicated that the school's financial picture for 1969-70 was holding close to its budget.

Looking ahead to next year, however, it appears as though the financial picture may deteriorate because of inflationary effect of supplies of at least five percent, expected increment to teachers on the existing salary schedule and

possible salary increases.

In addition, the school may lose \$20,000 received in federal aid for students whose parents work for the federal government, as well as possible loss under the National Defense Education Act if this is not funded by congress.

At this time, state aid for next year is completely indefinite.

The board of education must soon make a decision on the rehiring of probationary teachers, looking to its future finances, as well as adopting a program of maintenance, repair and capital outlay for the coming year.

Possible items under consideration include resurfacing of the auditorium floor, blacktopping part of the school grounds, normal maintenance of painting and refinishing some classrooms at the high school.

Supt. Reynold Mick reported that he expects delinquent taxes next year will amount to approximately \$57,000, about \$15,000 more than the current year.

The school's budget for 1969-70 indicates total revenues of \$1,084,270.60. Of this amount, \$650,893.49 has been received to date and \$598,602 has been expended.

# Gov. Milliken Signs SC Tax Exemption

"Governor Milliken has now signed the bill expanding coverage for senior citizens under the Homestead Tax Exemption," states State Rep. George A. Prescott, Tawas City. "And again, I want to urge persons in this area to check immediately with local assessing officials to see if they are covered under the new provisions."

"The deadline for applications is March 3," Prescott added, "so it is essential to clarify your status as rapidly as possible."

"I expect that many more senior citizens will now qualify for the \$2,500 homestead exemption. The legislature has completely eliminated the property value ceiling and has raised the income limitation from \$5,000 to \$8,000. Senior citizens can qualify for the exemption if their income is \$6,000 or less, regardless of how high inflation has pushed the value of their property."

"But it is most important to determine your status quickly, and apply by March 3 if you qualify."

Persons desiring to apply for the senior citizen homestead tax exemption should contact the assessing officer of each taxing unit. A birth certificate, property deed, mortgage (if any) and a social security card is required to fill out the application and should be presented to the assessing officer in order to complete the necessary forms.

# Easter Seal Appeal Letters Mailed at Hale

Hale Health Council, Chapter No. 31, has mailed appeal letters with Easter Seals enclosed to homes located in Iosco County. Money received from the sale of seals is used to provide rehabilitation, equipment and aids to children and adults, who are in need of such services.

The council's loan closet is located in the Plainfield Township Fire Hall at Hale. Articles including wheel chairs, crutches, walkers, canes and some small items for home nursing are available. The council provides case work through the county nurse and school superintendents.

All services, paid for by Easter Seal money, must be provided by fully qualified professional personnel.

The Easter Seal drive is the council's only fund raising project. Any donation would be appreciated by the council, which thanks Iosco residents for past cooperation.

# DNR Representatives Meet With County Board Conservation Topics Feature Roundtable

A roundtable discussion on conservation matters, ranging from land fill operations on inland lakes to control of coho fishing on the Tawas River, was held by representatives of the Michigan Department of Natural Resources as part of the February meeting of the Iosco County Board of Commissioners.

The discussion with commissioners was conducted by Bernie Morgan, district law enforcement director for the DNR, with panelists including the district director of parks, district fish biologist and district fire warden.

William Kusey, former manager of Tawas Point State Park and now district park director, explained activities of his department.

While DNR policy on antlerless deer hunting was touched on briefly, much of the discussion centered around fishing on Lake Huron and two rivers—Tawas and AuSable—with particular emphasis on the coho program.

Gary Schneck, district fish biologist, stated that the DNR had decided to de-emphasize the coho program on Lake Huron this year and concentrate more on planting of rainbow and brown trout. He stated that coho would again be planted this year in the Tawas River and AuSable River and that all streams entering Lake Huron had been treated at least once for lamprey control.

Schneck stated that restrictions were being placed on commercial fishermen this year and he emphasized the fact that perch fishing was collapsing due, for the most part, to over fishing by commercial operators. The fish biologist told county commissioners that a survey had been completed concerning the Lake Huron perch population and was to be released to the public in the very near future.

In answer to a question posed by Clement Stephan, Tawas City commissioner, concerning location of a weir and prohibition of fishing on Tawas River this year, Schneck said he was in the area to learn the wishes of the community.

While an outdoor writer in the Detroit Free Press recently reported that the weir and coho fishing prohibition were to be discontinued here this year, Schneck said

that no decision had been made as yet by the DNR. "We plan to meet with local officials to learn their desires before taking any action," he stated.

Concern was expressed at last week's Tawas City Council meeting over the report recently in the Detroit newspaper. It was felt that the weir was necessary to remove surplus fish, in order to prevent them from running into Tawas Lake and various trout streams entering that lake. It was also felt that fishing should be prohibited during the coho run on the Tawas River to protect owners of private property.

Schneck said that the DNR plans to liberalize its policy legalizing "snagging" of coho this year

and he anticipates that more coho will enter Tawas River than last year.

Both the fish biologist and Morgan felt that a major problem would develop if fishing is opened on the Tawas River, due mainly to the lack of public property. Morgan felt that relaxation of the snagging rule could also prove to be a problem, although he commented that some people "just go crazy" when they see a fish weighing from eight to 20 pounds and "you just can't reason with some people."

"If I were a resident of the Tawas, I would want the river closed to fishing," said Morgan. Schneck said that about 5,000

coho escaped through the Tawas River weir early in the season last fall. This was caused by the design of the weir as well as vandalism. Many of the fish which came into the river are still alive and have invaded trout streams entering Tawas Lake.

The DNR representatives asked support from commissioners in controlling all land fill and water holding projects on inland lakes. Some areas, it was said, look more to the tax dollar received by development rather than to the long range harm which is done to natural resources by indiscriminate bottom land filling.

"One of the main problems with man," said Morgan, "is that we are misusing our natural resources."

# Perchville USA Enjoyed Record Crowd

## Warm Weather Greeted Program

Perchville USA for 1970 went down on record as one of the most successful weather wise, as well as for attendance. Nearly 10,000 persons enjoyed activities on the ice of Tawas Bay Saturday and Sunday.

Reigning over the annual festival was Perchville King Chuck Waters of WNEM-Television, Bay City, who received his crown at the annual stag fish fry Friday night, and Miss Debbie Teague of Alabaster, who was selected Saturday afternoon at Perchville and then received her crown at the annual coronation ball Saturday night.

While the perch failed to cooperate with fishermen, a number of giant sized fish were taken by ice anglers. Prize winners in the fishing contest were Kenneth Thibault, Tawas City, largest perch, two pounds, two ounces; Kenneth Frank, Tawas City, second prize, two pounds, 1 1/2 ounces; Roger Gordon, AuGres, third place, two pounds.

The largest pike was taken by Kenneth Blust of East Tawas. The fish weighed 11 pounds and was 34 1/2 inches in length.

Grand prize of the festival, a snowmobile, was won by Melvin Umphrey of Mikado.

A full week-end of ice activities planned by Chairman Edward Gordon and his committee was well received by those attending. Warm weather Sunday resulted in slow times for snowmobile racers, but added to the comfort of spectators, despite water on the ice. The program closed Sunday with a thrill-

ing demolition derby near the Michigan Waterways Commission Dock.

# Eight O'Clock Class Plan Gets OK From Tawas Area Board

A schedule utilizing nine 8:00 a. m. classes was adopted Monday night for the 1970-71 school term by Tawas Area Board of Education.

This plan was presented at the last meeting following discussion on several alternatives to relieve expected overcrowded classrooms next fall.

In recommending adoption of the proposal, Prin. John Alexander said that the additional 8 o'clock classes would give considerable flexibility in the use of classrooms, as well as more complete utilization of the teaching faculty.

Classes to be offered include art, typing, biology, United States Government, speech, United States

History, sophomore English, and physical education.

An early morning class is not new to the school district, as art, biology and typing are already being offered to students at 8:00 a. m.

One drawback to the program, said Alexander, would be larger study halls. In most cases, those students taking an 8:00 a. m. class would be allowed to return home one hour earlier than the normal school closing hour, thus gaining additional classroom space.

This program is being aimed at students residing in the Tawas, or those who may furnish their own transportation. Under consideration at present is use of one

bus to transport students from collection points at elementary units at Tawas City and East Tawas to the high school.

The board is now considering the possibility of using a portable classroom for special education. This would free one classroom, which could be utilized for business training.

Alexander again emphasized that he did not feel the early starting time would solve Tawas Area's overcrowding problem beyond next year, but he felt it was the best alternative. Under discussion recently was a split shift system used at Harrison, which did not generate much enthusiasm among parents.

Also discussed Monday night was a new rule proposed by the Michigan Department of Public Instruction which will call for 900 instruction hours per child during 1970-71. This would mean that every student, other than kindergarten, would be required to have five one-hour classes.

Tawas Area School offers five subjects to students, but some are taking four subjects. Such a requirement, if adopted by the state and it appears that it will become policy, would mean that additional classrooms would be needed.

Supt. Reynold Mick told board members that a full report would be made when the above becomes department policy.

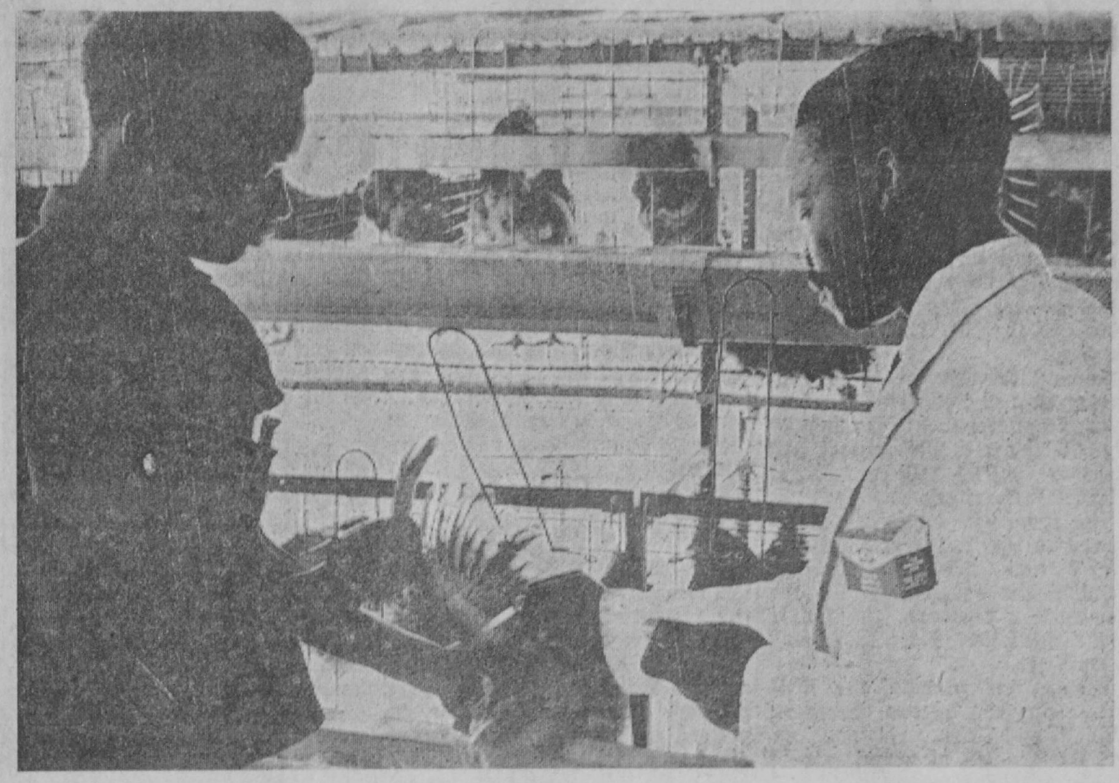

# Ottawa Equipment Co. Receives Bus Contract

Low bid of Ottawa Equipment Company for furnishing three Dodge bus chassis was accepted Monday night by Tawas Area Board of Education.

Ottawa's bid for the three Dodge chassis was \$12,319.65. Other bids included William Look and Sons, GMC, \$12,600; Ottawa Equipment Company, International, \$13,333.32; Inglis Ford Sales, Ford, \$12,549.

An analysis of expenses for the hot lunch program offered students indicated that the program was operating at a loss despite the fact that the average daily serving had jumped from 737.9 in 1968-69 to 943.3 servings per day in 1969-70.

The superintendent reported that the school had served 84,989 lunches in the past 90 days as compared to 65,680 during the same period in 1968-69. A comparison of costs indicated that the program had an income of \$43,055 and expenditures of \$48,953 in 1969-70, while 1968-69 saw an income of

\$36,489 and expenditures of \$36,183.

Because of the additional meals served, labor costs have dropped by about three cents per meal. Food costs and equipment replacement have offset this saving.

The program has been assisted greatly by receipt of federal surplus food. To qualify for this surplus, however, the school served 5,624 meals free or for reduced cost to children whose parents are in the low income category. The free lunch program is carefully administered and eligible parents are required to sign a formal request.

Trustees Leonard Sarki and Robert W. Elliott are to attend a meeting March 7 at Gaylord of boards of education and administrators of Northern Michigan.

Miss Clara Bolen, elementary supervisor, reported that third graders would be taking a primary mental ability test next week. This test is given every year to pupils in kindergarten and third grade.

Tests are administered and corrected by teachers. In the latter part of April, elementary students will be taking the Stanford achievement test.

Because of a number of disturbances at the high school, the administration has adopted a new policy of holding a seventh hour silent study hall after school closes in the afternoon. This is a disciplinary measure for students who create disturbances at school, as well as those who are tardy or skip school.

"The school is just too large to put up with any horsing around by students," said Principal Alexander.

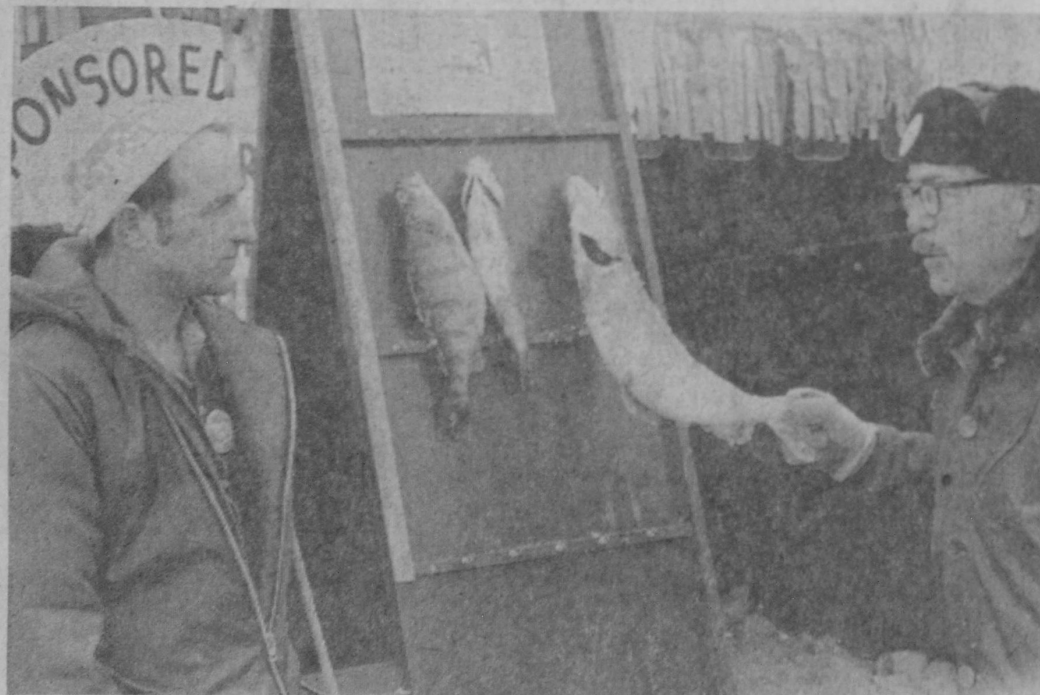

## LOOKING BACKWARD— Tawas City Retires Old Water Bonds

February 24, 1955—Tawas City is to retire its original issue of \$15,000 in general obligation bonds which helped finance construction of the water system during WPA days. Bonds were sold September 1, 1935.

**Would Guide Boys at WAFB Encampment**

Establishment of the Michigan Youth Services Encampment Program, which will bring to countless deserving young men the guidance they will need to become productive members of society, has been announced by Col. Colin C. Hamilton Jr., commander at Wurtsmith Air Force Base.

Colonel Hamilton, who serves as chairman of the area's Domestic Action Program, said Wednesday that this new program is designed for the 15 through 18-year age group. Purpose of the program is to get the boy out of his environment, show him what other young men, not much older than himself, are doing and then motivate him to develop and strive to attain his goals.

These young men will be required to participate in a rigorous sports program, discussion groups led by ministers and counselors and a comprehensive tour of Wurtsmith Air Force Base to include on-the-job training in various aircraft, automotive and civil engineering maintenance shops.

Barracks and recreational facilities will be provided without cost and the boys will utilize Wurtsmith mess facilities for a most reasonable charge.

"We have already organized a pilot encampment to be conducted three full days starting February 26," states Colonel Hamilton. "Purpose of the pilot program is to test our policies, procedures, schedules and preparations for the full scale encampment program we will be involved in this spring."

"We intend to involve, as a minimum, 200 young men over a 10-week period. We fully intend to support an encampment year around. Several high school teacher-coaches have volunteered their services as camp directors and counselors for the pilot program."

Candidates will be screened and selected by several judges, high school principals and clergy throughout Northeastern Michigan. This committee is headed by Probate Judge William H. McCready of Tawas City. Judge McCready has been involved with youth problems for some time now in his capacity as probate judge and sincerely believes that the program will be most beneficial, not only to the participants, but to society as well.

This program is quickly gaining the wholehearted support of many responsible citizens in the State of Michigan.

The local Domestic Action Council was created last December as part of a national program organized by the secretary of defense, with presidential approval. The council realizes that an air base, such as Wurtsmith, is not only part of the national's strategic forces, but is also a community resource as well.

One of the major concerns of national leaders is the ever increasing domestic social problems created by poverty, drug abuse, racism, demonstrations, school dropouts and the like.

From the inception of the Domestic Action Council in Michigan, the civilian leadership and participation has been most enthusiastic. The local DAC numbers some 100 civilian members, derived from judges, lawyers, educators, clergy and other civilian leaders representing many civic organizations.

Considerable progress has already been made in several areas, including drug abuse, education, expansion of Wurtsmith educational programs to include the civilian populace, a chapel sponsored youth coffee house, programs for poverty areas (including clothing, furniture, food basket and toy collection-redistribution), senior citizen activities and other significant projects.

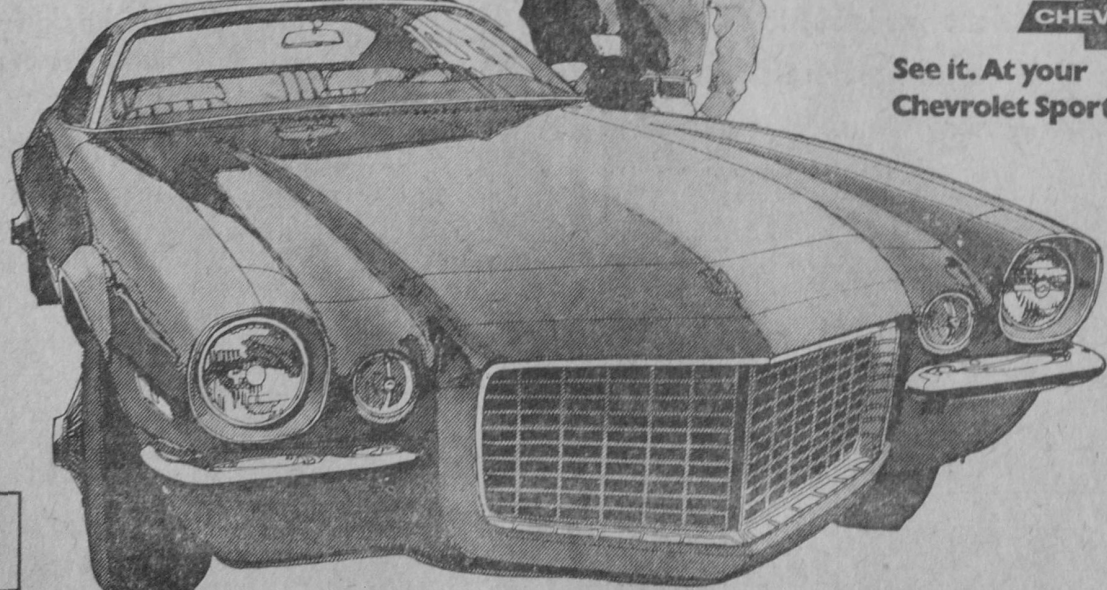
