to Appeal Discuss Split Days at TA School Court Ruling

Attorneys for Mrs. Gwendolyn I. Starling have filed an application for leave to appeal a decision by Circuit Court Judge Allan C. Mil

The plaintiff's attorney claims that the trail judge abused his discretion in ordering a remittitur of \$20,000, or in the alternative granting a new trail to the defendant.

In his opinion last month, Judge Miller said that the jury award of \$31,000 "was so exhorbitant as to shock the judicial conscience under the circumstances." In the opinion of the court, the reasonable range of damages would be from \$1,500 to \$10,000.

Judge Miller ruled that the plaintiff could tender a remittitur within 20 days, meaning that the judgment would be \$11,000 instead of the jury award. If not acceptable, he granted a motion by attorneys for the railroad for a new trial or mistrial.



Cover tightly with mold lid or aluminum foil. Set mold in pan of hot water. Water should come halfway up sides of mold; replenish water, if necessary, during steaming. Cover pan and steam pudding in continuously boiling water, about two hours. Remove mold from water; let stand five minutes before removing pudding. Serve hot with Brandy Whip-ped Cream Sauce. Brandy Whipped Cream Sauce: Beat one egg until light and fluffy. Gently fold in first mixture. Cover and chill until ready to serve. Stir before spooning on pudding. Makes two cups sauce.

THE GIRL WITH THE GOLDEN NEEDLE

Who is she-a maharanee, a Himalayan princess, the daughter of a desert potentate? Maybe, she is from as faraway as the moon, dressed in that gorgeously glowing sari silk dress. Step out of your everyday self and everyday sewing into a dress worthy of festive occasions. Consider the loveliness of a sheer fabric made up in a softly feminine style (McCall's 2164).

A fairy godmother who can conjure up a party dress with the wave of a magic needle is rather scarce these days. However, Coats & Clark suggests that modern dressmaking techniques are even better than magic. A sheer dress should only look etherial.


Sheer Fabrication

A sheer fabric is delicate, so handle it gently. Markings are transferred from the pattern to the fabric with tailor's tacks. Pins will slip out and chalk or tracing paper will show on the right side. Basting is best done by hand. Put $1\frac{1}{2}$ wide strips of tissue paper under your seamline as you stitch, to prevent the fabric from catching in the feed dog. The tissue can be torn away easily afterwards. Do your hand-sewing with a size 9 or 10 needle. For machine-sewing, set the stitch at 16 per inch and use the finest needle. Press with a dry iron because sheers tend to pucker under a steam iron.

Inside Out Perfection

Finishing is ultra important on a sheer garment because the inside shows through on the outside. For a truly fine seam, who knows better than the French. Make a French seam by placing wrong sides together and stitching a scant 1/2" from the raw edge. Trim allowance 1/6"; press to one side. Turn the work with right sides together, fold and press on the stitched line. Stitch again along the regular seamline. This will be 1/6" from the fold, enclosing the raw edges. Darts are neatly done by stitching a second line 1/8" from the firs'; and trimming close to this line.

If you are inserting a zipper, do the outside stitching by hand. Hem allowances in sheer fabrics are either very narrow or very deep. For a circular skirt, use a rolled hem. On a skirt which is cut







A sleeve is a set-in, is a raglan, is a kimono. The one with the now look is the "set-in," meaning that it is cut in a separate piece and seamed into the armhole of the garment body. The setting in must be perfectly done. According to Coats & Clark, three basic conditions make it so. First, corresponding points on the sleeve and armhole must be matched exactly. Second, ease in the sleeve cap must be uniformly distributed. Third, stitching around the armhole must be done evenly, with the correct seam allowance maintained.

The Perfect Set-In

Before seaming the sleeve underarm, ease-stitch (10 to the inch) between notches on the seamline of the sleeve cap. To control fullness, make another line of stitching within the seam allowance, 1/8" from the first. Leave your thread ends long. Stitch the underarm seam, press it open, and finish the bottom of the sleeve.

Turn your garment wrong side out and place the sleeve in the armhole, right sides together. Pin them, matching corresponding points: underarm seams, notches and shoulder seams to dot on sleeve cap. Put a pin ½" to each side of the shoulder seam. This important one inch at the top of the sleeve cap is grain-straight and has no ease. To fit the sleeve to the armhole, gently draw up the threads between the notches and these two pins. Evenly distribute the ease and secure the threads on the wrong sid

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



It has been brought to our attention that many snowmobile operators are disregarding legislation enacted by the State of Michigan. For this reason, we are publishing the following which is included in Act No. 74, 1968:

Sec. 12. No person shall operate a snowmobile upon the main traveled portion of any roadway, as defined in Section 55 of Act Nd. 300 of the Public Acts of 1949, being Section 257.55 of the Compiled Laws of 1948, or on a highway or street within 10 feet of such roadway with the following exceptions:

(a) Properly registered snowmobiles may cross public highways, evcept limited access highways and freeways as defined in Act No. 200 of the Public Acts of 1049 if such erassing can be made in safety and it does not interfere with the free movement of vehicular traffic approaching from any direction on such highway. The snowmobile operator shall yield the right of way to all vehicular traffic upon any highway.

(b) Snewmobiles may be operated on highways in the county road systems which are not maintained for winter wheel vehicular traffic by removal of snow.

(c) Snowmobiles may be operated on a street and highway dur-ing a period of emergency, when so declared by a police agency having inrisdiction when travel by conventional automotive equipment is not possible.

(d) Snowmobiles mov be operated on the highways within the restrictions set forth herein for the purpose of crossing bridges and culverts.

(e) Snowmobiles may be operated on county highways not having 10 or more feet of traversahle right of way outside the traveled portion of the roadway as far off the roadway as possible.

(f) Snowmobiles may be operated on a street or highway for a special snowmobile event of limited duration which is conducted to a prearranged schedule under permit from the governmental unit having jurisdiction.

(g) Whenever it is impractical to gain immediate access to an area adjacent to a public highway where a sno operated, the vehicle may be operated adjacent and parallel to the highway for the nurnose of gaining access to the area of operation. This subsection shall apply to the operation of a snowmohile from the point where the vehicle is unloaded from a motorized convevance to and from the area where the snowmohile is to be operated when londing and unloading cannot be effected in the immediate visinity of the area of ororation without causing a bazard to vehicular traffic approaching from either direction on the highway. Loading or unloading must be accomplished with due regard to safety at the nearest possible point to the area of operation.

Sec. 13. No snowmobile shall be operated in this state unless it has at least 1 headlight, 1 tailight and adequate brakes capable of producing deceleration at 14 feet per second on level ground at a speed of 20 miles an hour.

Sec. 14. Any city or village may pass an ordinance regulating the operation of snowmobiles if the ordinance meets substantially the minimum requirements of this act.

Sec. 15. No person shall operate a snowmobile:

(a) At a rate of speed greater than is reasonable and proper having due regard for conditions then existing.

(b) While under the influence of intoxicating liquor or narcotic drugs, barbital or any derivative of barbital.

(c) During the hours from 1/2 hour after sunset to 1/2 hour before sunrise without displaying a lighted headlight and a lighted taillight.

(d) In any nursery, planting area, or natural area of forest reproduction and when growing stock may be damaged.

(e) Unless it is equipped with a muffler in good working order and in constant operation to prevent excessive or unusual noise and annoying smoke.

(f) While transporting thereon a bow or a firearm unless same be securely encased.

Sec. 16. The operator of a snowmobile involved in an accident resulting in injuries to or death of any person, or property damage in an estimated amount of \$100.00 or more, or some person acting for him, or the owner of the snowmobile having knowledge of the accident, shall immediately by the quickest means of communication notify a state police officer or officers, or the sheriff's office of the county wherein the accident occurred, or to the office of the police department of the municipality wherein the accident occurred.





months of January and February will reach the beneficiaries later in April, probably during the week of April 20.

John J. Carr, district manager for the Bay City office of the Social Security Administration, said the increase will mean over \$327,-000 a month to the 26,000 beneficiaries in the seven-county area served by the Bay City office. (This means a total increase of over \$44,000 per month to the more than 3,311 social security beneficiaries in Iosco County, alone.)

Refiguring the benefit amounts of the 25 million persons in the United States now on the benefit rolls is a tremendous task and it must be done without disrupting the regular payment cycle.




