Airman Judd Completes Basic

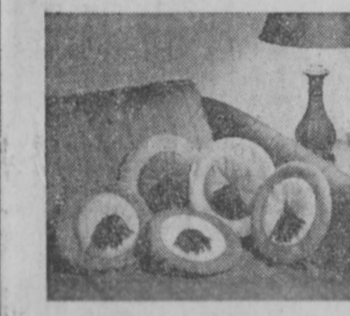

New Social Security Benefits to be Received Automatically

Social security beneficiaries need not apply for the 15 percent benefit increase just signed into law by President Nixon.

"Every one of the 25 million men, women and children now on the benefit rolls will automatically receive the increase," Robert M.

Ball, commissioner of social security, said today. "The first regular check in the new amount," Commissioner Ball said, "will arrive April 3, the usual day for delivery of benefit checks covering payments for the month of March." A separate check in the amount of the benefit increase for the months of January and February will reach the beneficiaries later in April, probably during the week of April 20.

John J. Carr, district manager for the Bay City office of the Social Security Administration, said the increase will mean over \$327,000 a month to the 25,000 beneficiaries in the seven-county area served by the Bay City office. (This means a total increase of over \$44,000 per month to the more than 3,311 social security beneficiaries in Iosco County, alone.)

Refiguring the benefit amounts of the 25 million persons in the United States now on the benefit rolls is a tremendous task and it must be done without disrupting the regular payment cycle.

The average retirement benefit of \$100 a month will rise to \$116 per month; a couple 65 or older receiving the average couple's benefit of \$170 will have their benefit increased to \$196; the average benefit for a family made up of a disabled worker, wife and one or more children will go up from \$237 to \$273; a widow and two children's average will rise from \$254 to \$292.

A special meeting of Tawas Area Board of Education is to be held for the purpose of further discussion on acquiring the fairgrounds property in the stalemated school site controversy.

Sheriff Ivan O'Farrell reports that 411 persons were confined in the jail during 1954, a decrease of 44 from 1953.

More than 1,200 interested visitors inspected the new \$6,800 bookmobile which was recently put in operation in the Iosco-Arenac Regional Library project.

January 11, 1935—A price of \$3,000 was placed on the Iosco County fairgrounds with buildings.

little attempt made to enforce this law.

The Boyne City, Gaylord and Alpena Railroad was sold for \$100,000 and assumption of bonded indebtedness, amounting to about \$800,000. The line will be operated between Boyne City and Boyne Falls. An unused portion of the railroad leading to Alpena will be abandoned.
