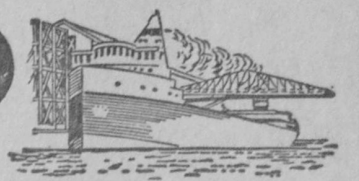

Two Persons Hurt on Motorbikes. State police from East Tawas investigated two personal injury accidents over the week-end involving motorbikes. On Saturday morning, Roser F. Pisa, 25, Detroit, was treated for injuries at Tawas Hospital after being injured on private property in AuSable Township. Police said that Pisa's machine struck a hole in the ground which was hidden by weeds. Rowland L. Johnson, 36, Bay City, injured his left knee and ankle Sunday morning when he lost control of his machine on Sand Lake Road. He was treated at Tawas Hospital.

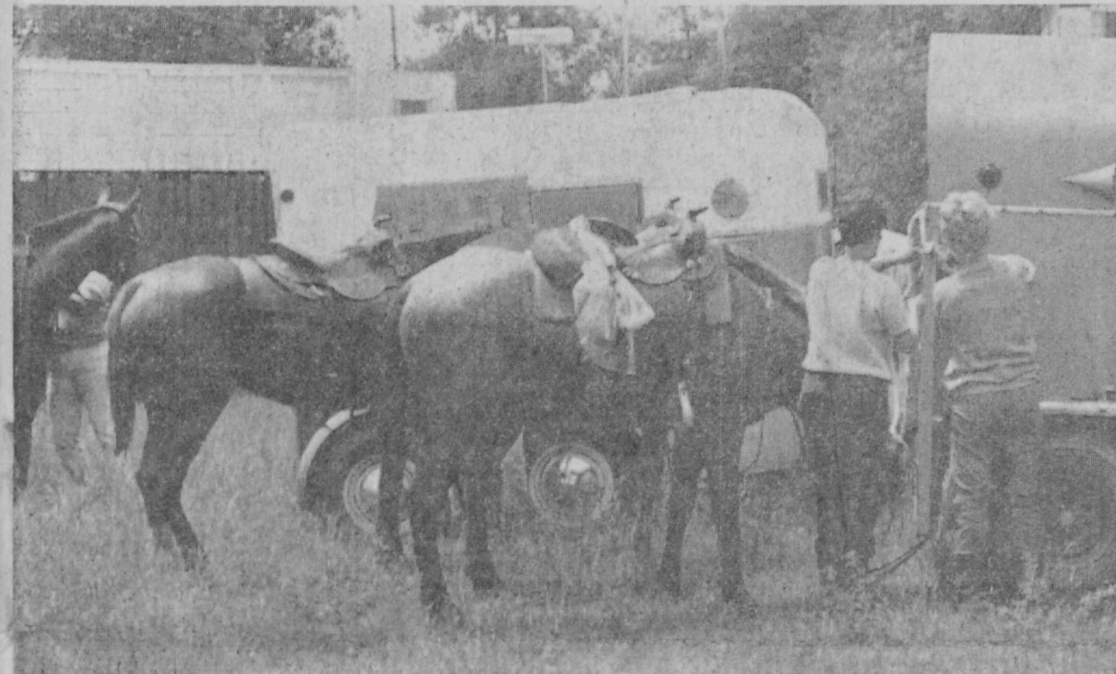
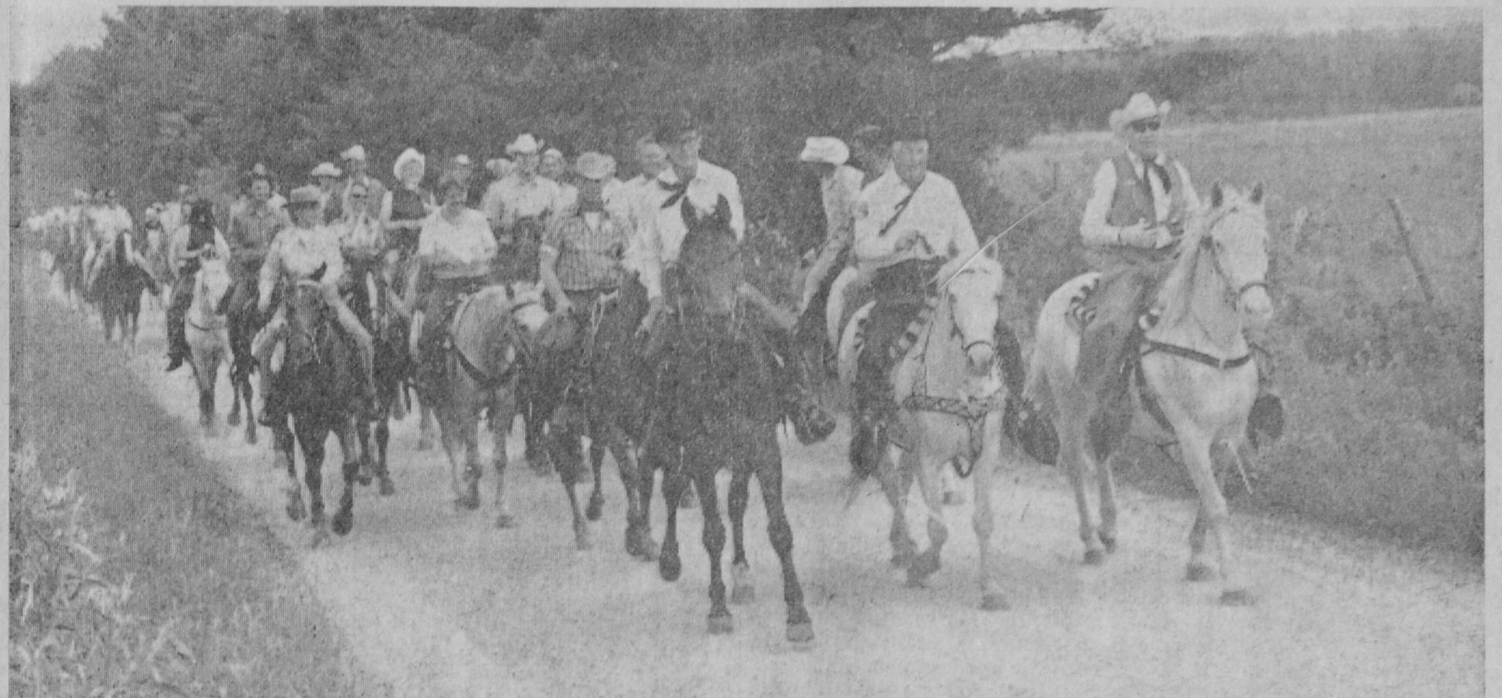
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57 Riders and Horses

Riding-Hiking Trail Sets New Record

One of the largest contingents of horses and riders ever to cross the Northern Michigan Riding and Hiking Trail arrived Saturday afternoon at the Tawas City Park. Sponsored by the Michigan Trail Riders Association, riders and their mounts splashed into Tawas Bay in the traditional ceremony marking the end of the trail. Rex Garn, trail master, said about 80 horses and riders started June 14 on this trip from Empire. Seven riders and horses made the complete trip from Lake Michigan to Lake Huron, with others dropping out or joining the group along the way. The group numbered nearly 100 when it reached the Gordon Creek Campground in Huron National Forest west of the Tawas Friday night. An evening of dancing to old-time music around the campfire was enjoyed. The Michigan Trail Riders Association sponsors two trips each year over the trail. The next trip will be in October. This is the only trail in the entire country which completely crosses a state and one which a trail boss is not necessary. Participants camp and eat all meals along the trail. This particular trip drew participants from about five states, including one from Arkansas. John Rhodes of Westerville, Ohio, said he looked forward to this year's ride across Michigan and noted that his state did not have such a trail. Accompanying the group was Mrs. Jane McGuines of Leland, Illinois, who is the only person to have participated in all seven MTRA's rides across Michigan. The group included a number of seasoned riders as well as a large number of youngsters making their first trip, who were led by Garn, in counting cadence most of the way from Gordon Creek to Tawas City. Accompanying the group on the last leg of the journey from Gordon Creek Campground were members of the Iosco County Sheriff's Posse. Official greeter at the Tawas City Park was Clarence King, who represented the Tawas Chamber of Commerce and is a member of the sheriff's posse.

Make Vaccine Available for 1st Year Pupils

"Rubella vaccine will be available for school enterers in the District No. 2 Health Department's July and August immunization clinics," said Dr. William F. Jackson today, but he emphasized that this recently developed vaccine for preventing German measles is only for those children up to age 12 who will be entering a Michigan school for the first time this year. "Since rubella has been added to the list of diseases which all children entering Michigan schools are to be immunized against, we hope that the parents will bring these children to the July and August clinics so that their basic immunizations will be completed before school starts," said Doctor Jackson.

Most of the kindergarten through third grade youngsters in the district became "rubella heroes" when they lined up to receive the German measles injection at school last January and helped to abort the epidemic which had been predicted for Michigan. "We are very proud of these youngsters," Doctor Jackson said, "by providing this vaccine to all school enterers routinely, that disease which is so mild for youngsters but so dangerous to the unborn child, should soon cease to be a public health problem."

30 Pct. Increase in TA Budget if Board Meets TAEA Demands

An analysis of demands made by teachers of Tawas Area Schools would cost the taxpayers of the district about \$824,904, according to Thomas A. Basil, consultant for the board of education. "This figure is nearly 95 percent of the district's revenues for the year ending June 30, 1969, and nearly 80 percent of this year's budget," said Basil. The state average for school districts of this size is about 65 percent of the budget being spent on teachers' salaries. Basil said the demands for salaries alone would amount to about a 30 percent increase over last year's costs. The demands for extra duty pay is in the area of a 48 percent increase in costs over last year. "Their demands for health insurance exceed by nearly 35 percent the best health insurance program in the entire state," said Basil. "The teachers have demanded \$10,000 worth of term life insurance and none of the following districts pay any life insurance: Hale Area, AuGres Sims, Arenac Eastern, Whittemore-Prescott Area and Ogemaw Heights." Basil said the board of education must consider these demands from the standpoint of how much better will the quality of education be compared to how much more it will cost taxpayers. "Also, we cannot overlook the fact that our economy is in the midst of a recession," he stated. Michigan teachers are already the second highest paid teachers in the country—only California pays more. The Michigan Education Association has indicated that it would consider a seven percent increase for its units as "good." "Unless the teachers are willing to change their thinking in the area of wages, it is going to be very difficult to reach a settlement," said Basil.

Award Contracts on ET Fire Truck

At a special meeting Monday, the East Tawas Council approved a total bid of \$24,800 for a fire truck tanker chassis and auxiliary equipment. Bid to furnish the chassis for the 500-gallon capacity tanker went to William Look and Sons at a cost of \$7,300. Howe Fire Apparatus Company was low bidder on equipment at \$17,500.

DNR Lands Chief Says National Must Remove Dam

National Gypsum Company has been directed to remove its dam from the East Branch of the AuGres River south of National City Road before next spring's steelhead spawning run. George Taack, head of the Michigan Department of Natural Resources' submerged lands division, told National Gypsum executives that the state would "no longer tolerate the illegal boulder dam." The dam, at the company's National City plant, has been blocking fish runs and causing heavy siltation of the stream, in defiance of state law, according to the DNR. Action to have the dam removed was demanded more than a year ago by DNR Mio District law enforcement chief, Bernie Morgan, and fish biologist, Gary Schnieke. This spring, when hundreds of fishermen gathered below the dam to snag, spear, net and club steelhead trout, sportsmen joined the department field men in demanding enforcement of state laws. The East Branch experienced the best steelhead run in several decades. Spawning fish jammed up below the dam, causing conservation officers to work around the clock in efforts to stop the wholesale violating that developed on the congested fish. Violations were issued to 13 fishermen, but officers said this was only a small portion of the fishermen who were breaking state laws by snagging or netting fish. The dam has provided water for the National City plant for more than 30 years. By raising the water level with the dam, water is fed into the plant by gravity flow. Taack, who inspected the dam site two weeks ago with Thomas Doyle, fish division water specialist, claimed that the operation was constantly eroding silt into the stream. The DNR will allow National Gypsum Company to continue to draw the small amount of water it uses from the East Branch, but said it must find a way to do it without impounding the stream.

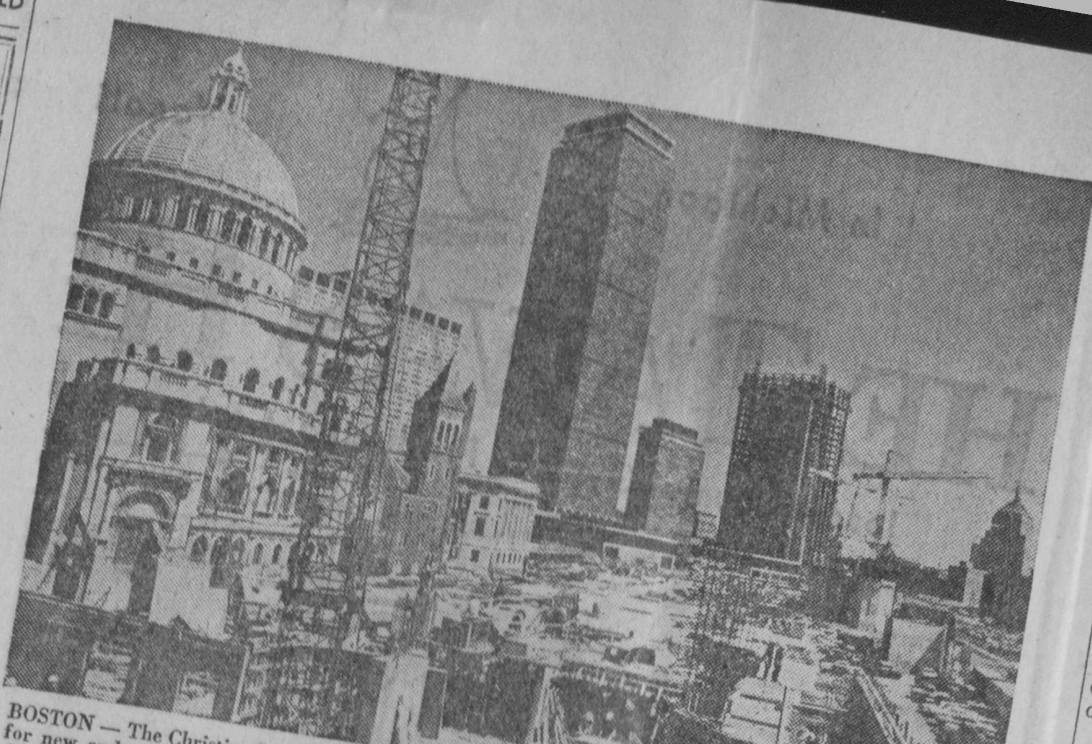

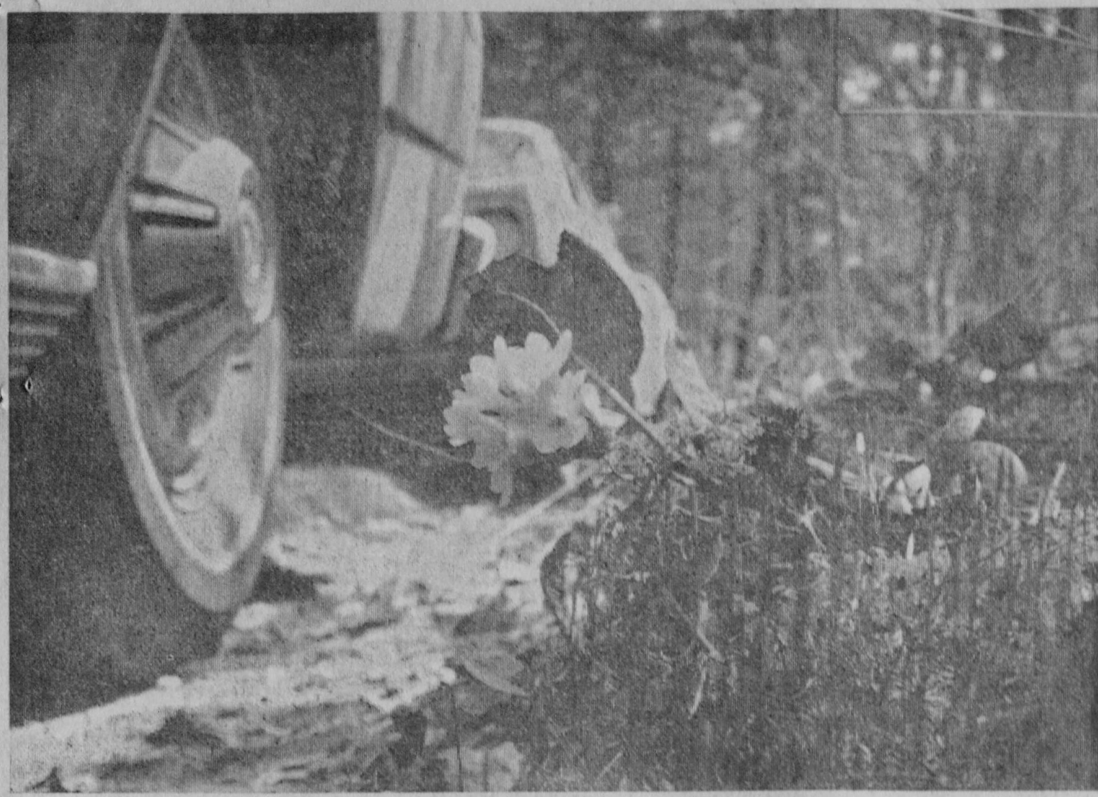

Senate Bill Would Preserve Natural Beauty of Local Roads

Each year, Michigan loses more of its natural roadides to the unnecessary widening, cutting, mowing and spraying of local back country roads.

A letter sent now to support a bill currently in the Michigan Legislature may help to preserve a favorite road that still has charm and beauty.

The Michigan Nature Association, along with many garden clubs, beautification councils, historical societies and others interested in preserving the natural beauty of Michigan, is seeking additional support for Senate Bill No. 1472, designed to give citizens some control over the treatment given Michigan's undeveloped roads.

If it is enacted, 25 local property owners could petition to designate a local road or trail as a "natural beauty road." Once given such status, native vegetation and wildlife along the road would be protected from spraying, salting or mowing. The road's overhanging trees would be safe from cutting and road widening.

The bill passed the senate June 16 and has been referred to the house committee on roads and bridges. Letters to Rep. Michael Novak, chairman of the committee, urging the committee report on the bill favorably for vote by the house, are needed at this time.

The idea for the bill came from the Michigan Nature Association, which is active in preserving

natural areas in the state. The bill would apply to 62,000 miles of county local roads, but the goal of the association is the designation of only a small percentage of lesser traveled roads.

"Until now, concerned residents along country roads had few tools to block the destruction of habitat along their road," states Bertha Daubendiek of Saginaw, executive secretary of the association.

"This bill should give residents of all counties the means to preserve their own favorite back road scenery from many forms of pollution threatening it. This is one small thing we can do to maintain our ecological balance and keep it from getting any worse than it is."

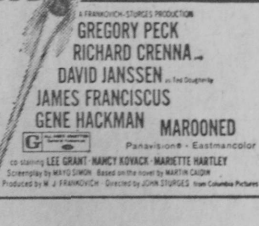

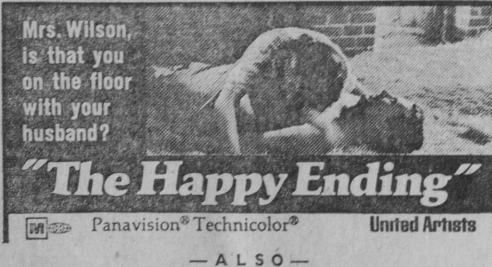

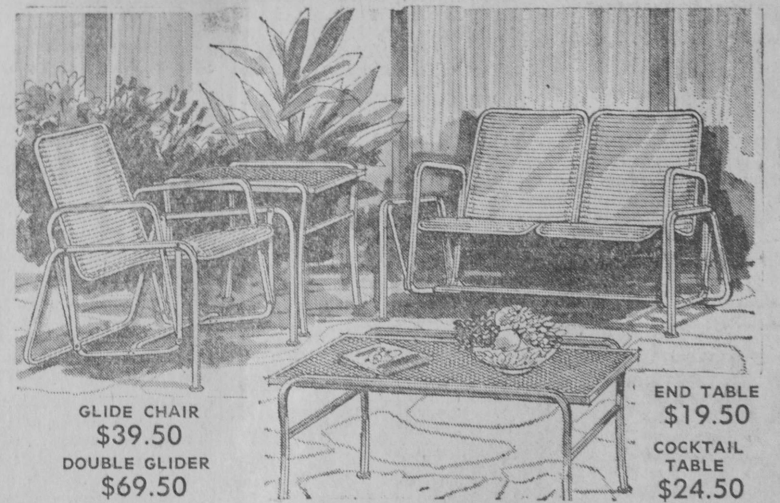

Oscoda Area Sets Millage Vote Aug. 11

The superintendent of Oscoda Area Schools announced June 23 that the board of education authorized holding a special millage election on August 11. This action was taken by the board at its special meeting held on Monday, June 22.

The exact amount to be asked for will be decided at a later date. The board, with the administrative staff, at the present time is making a thorough review of the proposed budget and studying all possible cuts that can be instituted for the 1970-71 school year. Additional study sessions by the board with the administrative staff are planned to continue this thorough review.

At the June 22 meeting, the superintendent announced that the present state aid act and one of the proposals under serious consideration by the state legislature would require school districts to levy 14 mills to qualify for full payment of state aid. The Oscoda schools at the present time levies 12 mills for operation and, therefore, under the present state formula and proposed formula, would receive one-seventh less state aid.

He also stated that on the basis of the present state aid formula, this one-seventh less in state aid would amount to \$190,958.

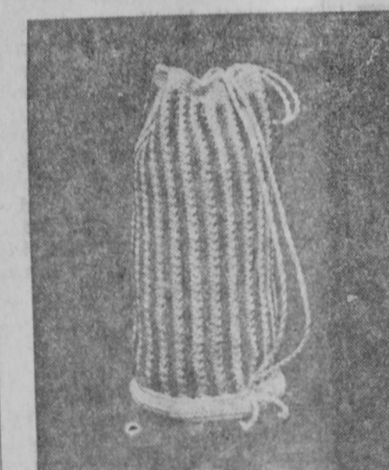

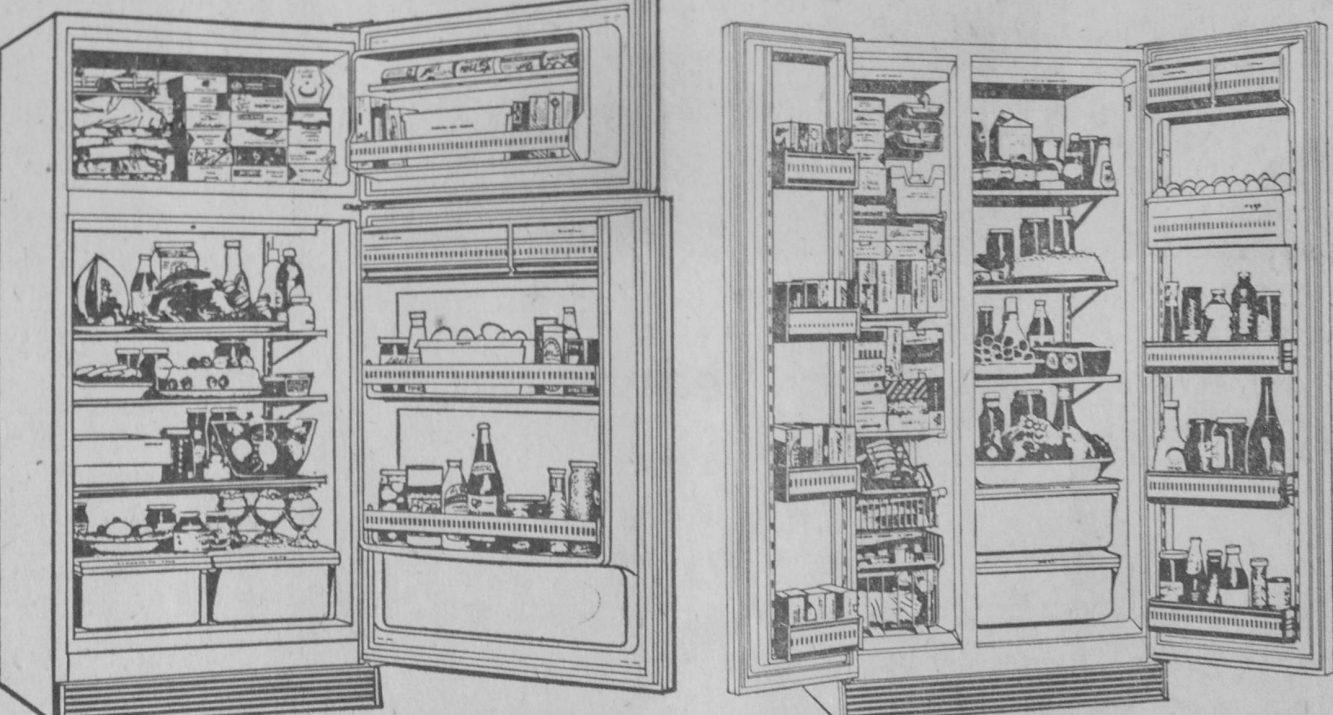

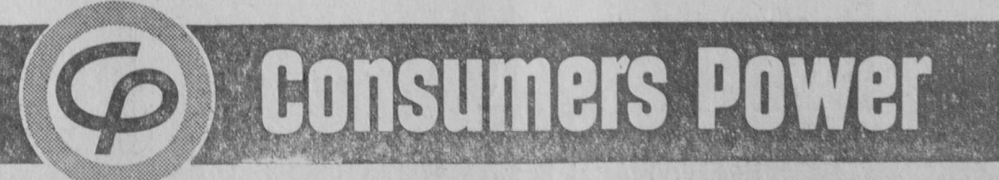
