Competition Starts for Navy ROTC Training

The 25th annual national competition for the Naval Reserve Officers Training Corps (NROTC) College Scholarship Program has commenced.

The NROTC College Scholarship Program prepares a young man for a United States Navy or Marine Corps commission while he is studying at one of the many ci-

vilian colleges and universities where NROTC Units are established. All tuition, fees, uniforms and books are furnished by the navy. The student receives \$50 per month subsistence allowance for four years. During the summers between academic years, the student participates in interesting at-sea training periods as a midshipman. After successfully completing a baccalaureate level college course and all military requirements, he is commissioned in the regular navy or marine corps.

Applicants for this program will be considered based on scores obtained on either the scholastic aptitude test (SAT) of the college entrance examination board (CEEB), Princeton, New Jersey, or the American College Test (ACT) of the American College Testing Program, Iowa City, Iowa, in lieu of the navy college aptitude (NCAT) previously utilized.

Applicants for the 1971 NROTC College Scholarship Program must:

Apply for and take either test specified above at their own expense prior to December 31.

Arrange with the appropriate testing agency for the submission

of their scores to the NROTC College Scholarship Program.

Apply for the NROTC College Scholarship Program between April 1 and December 1 of this year in accordance with the 1971 bulletin of information.

Eligible high school students and graduates should submit their applications before December 1. Application forms are available from high school counselors, the nearest navy or marine corps recruiting station which is listed in the telephone directory, or from the Chief of Naval Personnel (Pers-86411), Department of the Navy, Washington, D. C. 20370.

County - Wide Police Force Being Studied

Possibility of a county-wide police department is to be studied by a special committee of the Iosco Board of Commissioners.

Receiving a \$145,000 state recreational grant for improvements at the AuSable River Park...

Permitting was given to the prosecuting attorney, probate judge and register of deeds to attend their respective state conventions.

75% of Payments Made to Farmers

About 75 percent of the 1970 farm program payments earned by producers in Iosco County have been made, according to Grant Bessey, chairman of the Iosco County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation (ASC) Committee.

"Thanks to the fine cooperation of participating farmers, we are well on the way to completing payments in the feed grain and wheat programs. The United States Department of Agriculture this year made a commitment to make farm payments earlier than ever before—and we are keeping that commitment," he said.

The ASC Committee chairman said that in previous years partial payments had been made in advance to feed grain participants. Budget restraints this year made it impossible to make any farm payments before July 1, the beginning of the government's fiscal year.

"As soon as the date arrived, however, farm program payments began. We expect to complete them within the next three weeks in Iosco County, which will be the earliest date we have ever completed farm program payments," Mr. Bessey added.

He commented that producers participating in the farm programs have earned payments by helping stabilize markets and by giving up the use of productive cropland that would otherwise have been put into cash crops or other income-producing uses. Instead, they maintain the land in conserving

uses which help prevent soil erosion and air and water pollution.

The farm programs in which they participate help achieve a balance between commodity supply and demand. They also help producers work together to curb excess production and strengthen markets.

Mr. Bessey said, "Success of the early-payment plan has hinged on close cooperation by farmers, and results have been gratifying. Virtually all Iosco County participants accurately certified their compliance with farm program requirements as soon as they could."

"Spot checks made by ASCS personnel on individual farms throughout the county have revealed a very low degree of error in reporting of planted and diverted acres and conserving-use acres by producers in the feed grain and wheat programs."

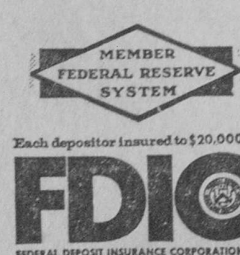

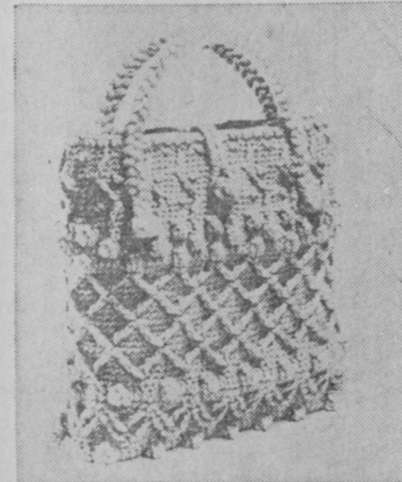

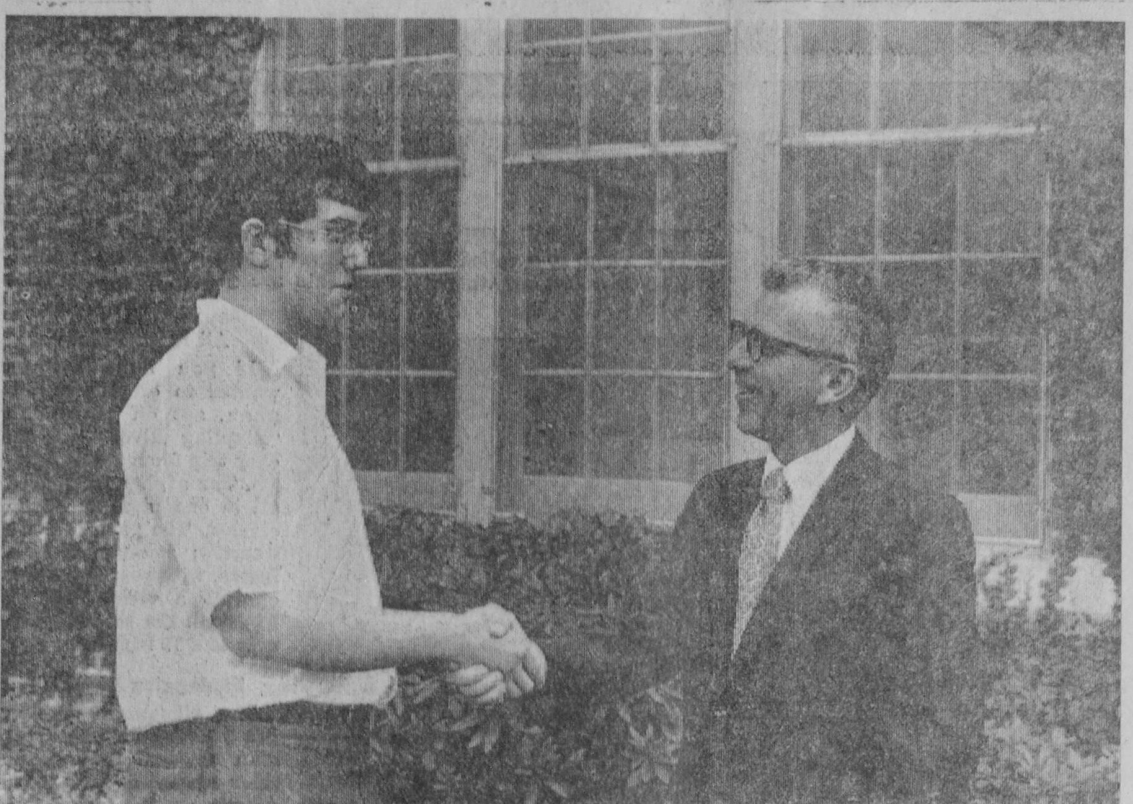
