Arts-Crafts Festival Set This Week-End

More than 100 registrations have been received by the Tawas Chamber of Commerce from artists and craftsmen of Michigan and bordering states for the annual Tawas Bay Arts and Crafts Festival to be held this week-end, August 1-2. All signs indicate this should be another large and interesting show, bringing many visitors to the area.

For the past 10 years, this show—first of its kind in North-eastern Michigan—has been held in the Iosco County Building and Tawas City Park under sponsorship of Tawas Bay Artists and chamber of commerce.

Exhibitors pay a registration fee to the chamber of commerce and have a choice of space in the county building or park. Each artist is responsible for his own exhibit and all articles are for sale by their creator.

Exhibits include oils, water color and acrylic paintings, sculpture in metal and wood, jewelry, pottery, metalwork, lapidary and portrait painting. To date, the number of painters about equals other entries.

Door prizes are to be awarded Saturday night, 8 o'clock, during a drawing. Andrew J. Oberla will have charge. Prizes to exhibitors will be awarded Sunday afternoon, 4 o'clock, by Gerald Reiter, president of the chamber of commerce. Both events will be held at the band stand. In the case of rain, the event will be moved to the county building.

Since March, committees have been meeting to make plans for this show. Innovations this year include an information center in the band stand and all prizes being awarded by popular vote, instead of by judges, as in former years. All prizes will be cash or honorable mention.

This organization took an active part in construction of the football field, helped to finance purchase of bleachers, purchased a whirlpool and secured donations for building a new backstop and dugouts at the baseball field. It also sponsored an athletic banquet several years.

New Rash of Burglaries Hits Area

Investigation continues this week on a series of burglaries Friday that reportedly netted a minimum of \$2,000 in cash and merchandise in the Tawas area.

Three taverns and three other business places were burglarized. About \$650 in cash was taken from the Tre-Mac Inn on US-23 south of Tawas City. Cash amounting to \$458 was taken at the Ta-Wa-C Inn off M-55 and \$70 in cash was taken at the Alibi Inn. The above thefts are under investigation by Iosco Sheriff's Department.

Part of the loot taken from Tawas Hardware was recovered at Sand Lake, according to George Westcott, Tawas City police chief, who is investigating the breaking and entering. A large quantity of guns and other items were stolen.

Westcott is also investigating entry at the pet hospital of Dr. E. B. Cavell at 112 Wheeler Street. State Police are investigating entry of Zubek Motor Sales on M-55. A large quantity of cigarettes and candy was taken.

Earlier last week, \$300 in cash and a quantity of merchandise was taken from Strauer's Market on M-55. East Tawas Police are investigating theft of \$1,000 from Twin Service Laundry and Dry Cleaning.

New Charter Would Aid Operation of City

Interested in a modern, progressive form of city government to guide the present and future destiny of Tawas City?

This will be the question asked Tawas City voters on Tuesday, August 4, with a special proposal presented in conjunction with the primary election.

Through unanimous action of the city council and city planning commission, Tawas City voters are being asked to approve the initial step toward general revision of the city's charter, along with selection of a nine-man charter commission.

This question has been under consideration here for the past decade, but this is the first time it has ever been placed on a ballot for voter consideration.

Tawas City is one of several communities in the state still operating under Fourth Class city government. The list of Fourth Class cities diminishes each year as this form of government has long been on the way out. At the last count, there were less than 10 cities using this type of government.

One of the principal reasons for the contemplated revision is that Fourth Class cities are usually ig-

nored by the state legislature when new laws are adopted concerning local government.

The modern home rule form of government simplifies procedures for city operation. A number of different city charters have already been studied by the city's planning commission.

The proposed commission probably would consider adoption of some form of city manager, which legally cannot be done today because of the restrictive nature of the Fourth Class City Act.

Also mentioned in the past was combining duties of the city clerk

and treasurer, as well as appointment of the city assessor rather than electing three supervisors, which have become meaningless offices since the supreme court decision which demanded redistricting and election of county commissioners on a one-man, one-vote basis.

Charter commissioners named at the August 4 election would serve without compensation. Principal duty of this new group would be to develop a city charter to present to voters for approval.

Candidates filing nominating petitions for the election include

Hugo J. Keiser, Jerry Cotter; Lawrence DeBeau, Carl Babcock Sr., George W. Myles, Arnold Hoshbach, James Dillon, John Hoshbach, Neil Thornton and John Brugger.

Mayor John St. James gave his complete endorsement to approval of the charter revision question.

"There are many benefits to be received by this community through modernizing our city government," said St. James. "A number of candidates are experienced in city government and the planning commission and are willing to spend their time in developing a workable form of government un-

der which this city can operate. We definitely need this revision," he stated.

He emphasized that a "yes" vote does not necessarily mean a complete change of local government, as voters would have the last word on future consideration of a new charter.

"In other words, to be successful, the proposed new charter would have to meet approval of the majority of voters," stated the mayor.

Candidates for the charter commission are running on a non-partisan basis.

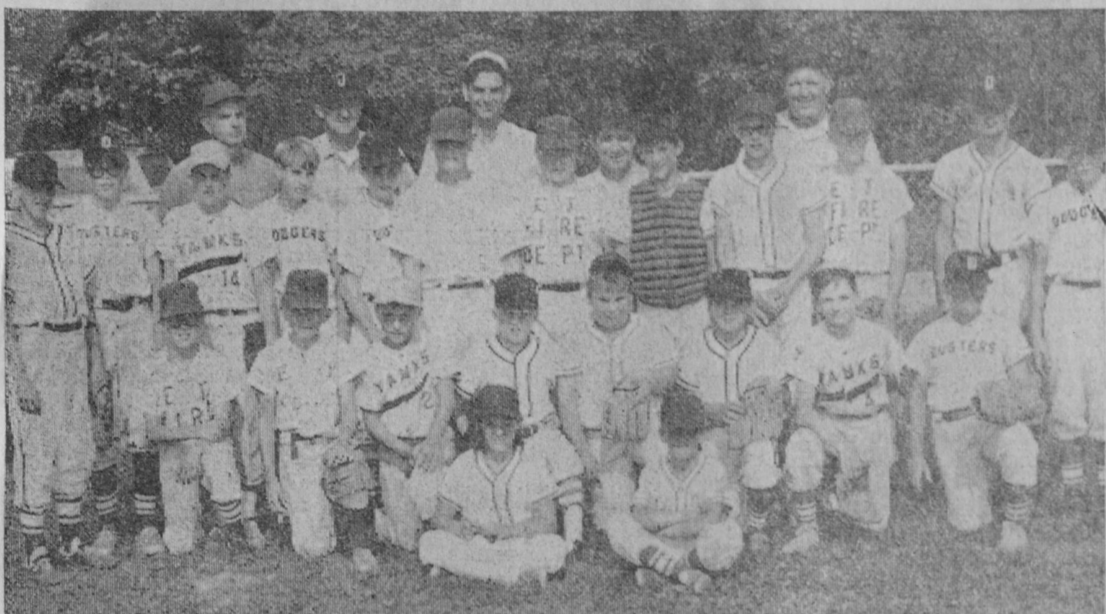

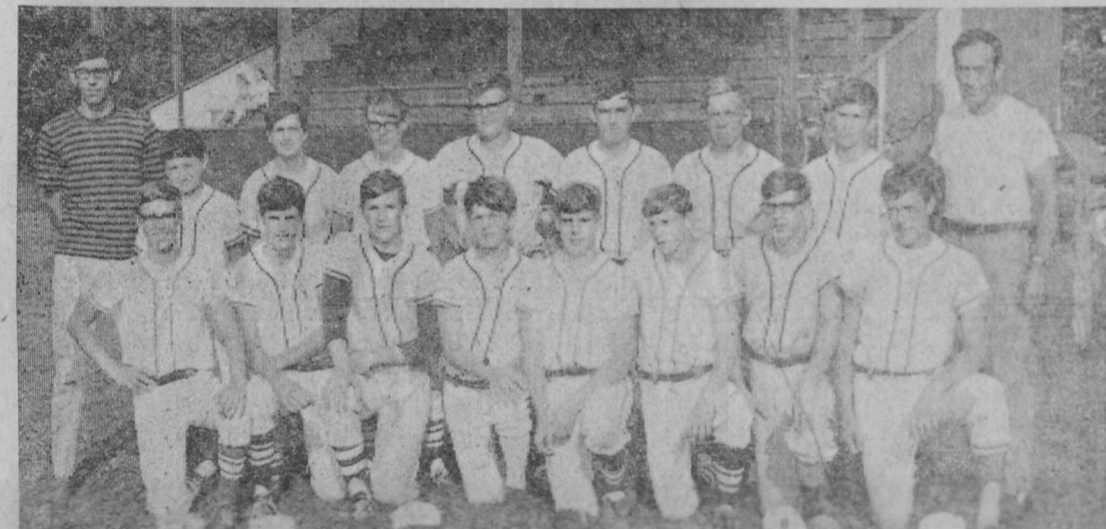

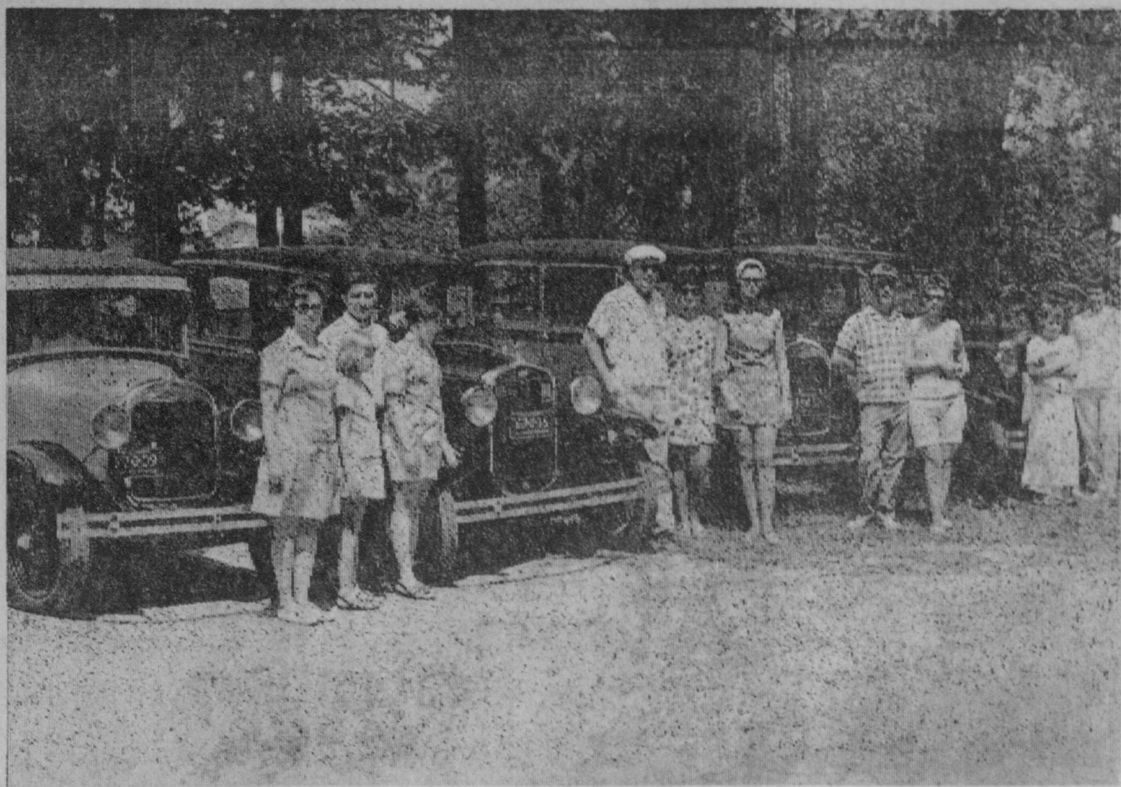

School Boundary Change Studied

A boundary change between Whittemore-Prescott Area School District and Tawas Area School District, as suggested by the Isoco Intermediate School District, has been tabled for study until the next regular meeting of Tawas Area Board of Education.

The proposed change would straighten the boundary line between the two school districts. The proposal suggests transferring Sections 3 10 and 15 from Whittemore-Prescott Area School District to Tawas Area and transferring Sections 9, 16, 19, 21, 28, 29, 30 and 31 from Tawas Area to Whittemore-Prescott.

Meetings have been held regarding this question between superintendents of the two schools along with the intermediate district superintendent.

In other business conducted at Monday night's board of education meeting, members heard several possibilities concerning construction of seven new classrooms to handle future enrollment needs.

It was reported that the public school would gain an additional 26

students this fall through probable closing of Zion Lutheran School. The board of education is presently attempting to rent the two classrooms in Zion Lutheran School for public school purposes.

Salary of Edgar Jenkins as transportation supervisor was set at \$3,600 per year, plus his regular salary as a bus driver. The school is allowed a reimbursement by the state for a director of transportation.

Delay Wheat Referendum

Sec. of Agriculture Clifford M. Hardin has announced postponement of the national wheat referendum previously scheduled for July 27-31, according to Grant Bessey, chairman of the Isoco County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation (ASC) Committee. The action was authorized by congress.

The postponement permits the USDA to delay holding the referendum not later than October 15 or 30 days after congress adjourns, whichever date is earlier.

Accordingly, the United States Department of Agriculture's ASCS which administers the wheat, feed grain and similar programs, has instructed its state and county offices across the nation to withhold ballots and other referendum materials, Mr. Bessey said.

The chairman explained that basic farm legislation requires a referendum for wheat marketing quotas. However, the Agricultural Act of 1965 suspended this referendum requirement from 1965 through the 1970 crop year. Unless new farm legislation, now pending is enacted by the congress, basic legislation will again go into effect, and a referendum will then be required in 1970 for the 1971 crop years.

Judging of 4-H Club exhibits will be held Wednesday evening, 7 o'clock. This does not include livestock.

Department heads for exhibits include George Erickson, livestock; Charles Preston, swine and sheep; Perry Shellenbarger, poultry; John Dooley, farm produce; Agnes Bodenborn, flowers and plants; Dorothy Mielock, home economics; Mrs. Gerald Ruckle, domestic arts; Mrs. Adell Brown, antiques; Fay Ewing, art, hobbies and handicraft; Elwood Ruckle, games and contests; Lyle Bielby, conservation; Adolph Siegrist and Val Samson, 4-H Club division.

The 4-H Club division, always an important part of the fair, has been greatly expanded this year. There will be judging in agronomy; arts, crafts, hobbies; conservation; electrical; home economics; garden, floriculture, landscaping; livestock and poultry.

An important addition to the fairgrounds this year is a new arena for 4-H Club and open livestock judging. The arena was constructed through cooperation of the Hale Lions Club.

The fair's big midway is scheduled to open its four-day run this afternoon (Wednesday).

Thursday's program opens at 9:00 a. m. with judging of all 4-H Club livestock except horses. This is to be followed by all open class livestock except horses.

Judging of 4-H Club horses starts Friday at 9:00 a. m., followed by open class horses.

The traditional "big day" at the fair is Saturday with games and contests for all ages starting at 10:00 a. m. The annual parade is to be held at 12:30 p. m. and participants are to line up at the fairgrounds.

Another big feature of the fair is the harness racing program

which is to be held Thursday, Friday and Saturday afternoons starting at 2:00 p. m. Post time Saturday is 2:30 p. m. The fair is a member of the Northern Michigan Fair and Racing Association.

Thursday and Friday racing events will have purses of \$3,000, with a \$4,000 purse on Saturday.

Thursday's program starts with a pace for winners of not more than \$10,000, followed by a trot in the \$2,000 category and pace for winners of not more than \$1,500.

Friday's program opens with a race for Michigan owned trotters, which have not won more than \$500, followed by a pace for winners of not more than \$3,000 and a trot for winners of not more than \$5,000.

Saturday's feature program opens with a pace for winners of \$20,000, followed by a pace for winners of not more than \$5,000. The finale is a pace for winners of not more than \$35,000.

There are two heats in every race and purses of \$1,000 for each race are divided among the five top winners on a 45-25-15-10-5 percent basis.

One of the most popular attractions at last year's fair was the exhibition of work by local artists, along with the always popular displays of antiques.

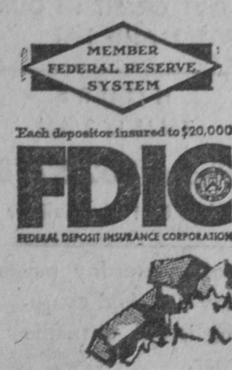

Okinawan Scout Leader at Camp

An international flavor has been given the Paul Bunyan Council Camp staff this summer in the participation of Shoji Irei from Okinawa. His assistance is made possible through the World Friendship Fund of the International Relationships Services, Boy Scouts of America.

Mr. Shoji is a native of Okinawa, spent two years at the University of Hawaii and is employed as a public information specialist in the NACTO Cultural Center, USCAR. He has had the International Woodbadge Scout Leader Training and has been a scoutmaster for three years. He is married and has four children.

At the Paul Bunyan Scout Reservation, he is teaching pioneering and other scoutcraft skills. He dines with a different troop each day, thus providing an opportunity for a cultural exchange. He participates in the camp fire programs, teaching the scouts some songs native to his island.

Mr. Shoji is one of seven scouts from the Orient who are serving on camp staffs in Central United States this summer. They had an orientation session for four days in Tokyo during mid-June, then flew to Oakland, California, where they boarded a bus for a cross-country trip to their respective summer hosts. For their return trip, they meet in New York August 21 and take a two-day tour of the area before embarking for home.

Mr. Shoji is available to meet with various groups and might be available for a trip with some family to some of Michigan's sights before he leaves here August 19.

While the Paul Bunyan Council is supported to a large extent by community fund sources, the expense of bringing Mr. Shoji here is borne 75 percent by the World Friendship Fund of the Boy Scouts of America and 25 percent by private local contributions for this project. Many Paul Bunyan Scout Units have made contributions to the World Friendship Fund over the past 10 years.

Any day now one of the most seasonal of all fruit offerings will be available again... the 30 pound tin of Michigan red tart cherries. These are again being packed in the ratio of 25 to five—25 pounds of pitted red cherries covered with five pounds of sugar and then frozen. Homemakers who buy this pack for repackaging and freezing at home should remember to stir the cherry and sugar mix well for proper distribution of the sugar. It is remarkably easy and low cost way to insure a year-round supply of cherries for pies, cobbles and other family dessert favorites.

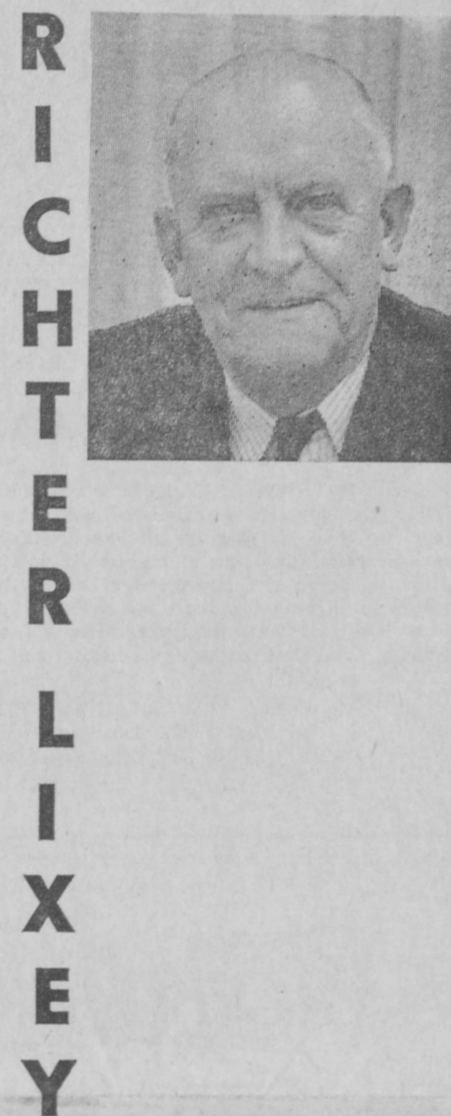

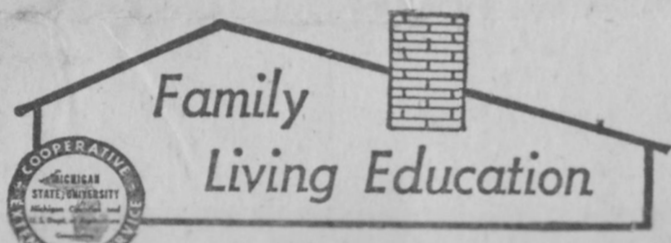

Food News

Summer food markets feature some of the year's best eating—but the supply and price relationships are so complicated that they create some of the year's most difficult shopping puzzles.

For example, supplies of frying chickens are large, but very few specials that really are "special" are being offered. This is because demand for these quick-cooking, tender young birds is so great during warm weather that shoppers will take them without special price inducements.

Pork supplies are at seasonal lows during July and August, but features on the meaty Boston butts are being widely advertised. Here, too, warm weather is the important influence. Boston butts generally require long, slow cooking to bring out the best flavor and texture, and few homemakers are willing to take on the task without some price incentive. Therefore, quick-cooking chops bring a premium price, but slow cooking cuts go at a bargain.

Over in the dairy department, eggs are taking up lots of space. Plenty of large size eggs are available, but the best values on a cost per pound basis seem to be the medium size eggs. In some markets, the spread is as great as 20 cents a

dozen between the large and medium sizes. Large size eggs can command such a premium price because they are much in demand for hard-cooked and deviled eggs—especially popular with outdoor loving families in summer. It is not that the smaller sizes cannot be so used but, it is not as easily done and the results are not so attractive either.

It is hard to get past the tempting displays of fresh fruit the markets have without giving in to temptation. If shoppers find that real bargains are few and far between, they can at least comfort themselves with the knowledge that quality has seldom been better. Peaches from the south and nectarines from California are showing the classic signs of quality—a creamy yellow background color especially in the stem cavity. Fruit that has been picked green so it can withstand a long trip to market will never ripen properly no matter how long it is held at room temperature at home. Fortunately, careful shoppers will find a good supply of properly harvested fruit that will ripen to sweet, juicy goodness in a day or two after purchase.

Blueberry supplies are increasing as Michigan berries replace the early imports from New Jersey. Evidence of the increase in mechanical harvesting may be found in the absence of twigs and stems.

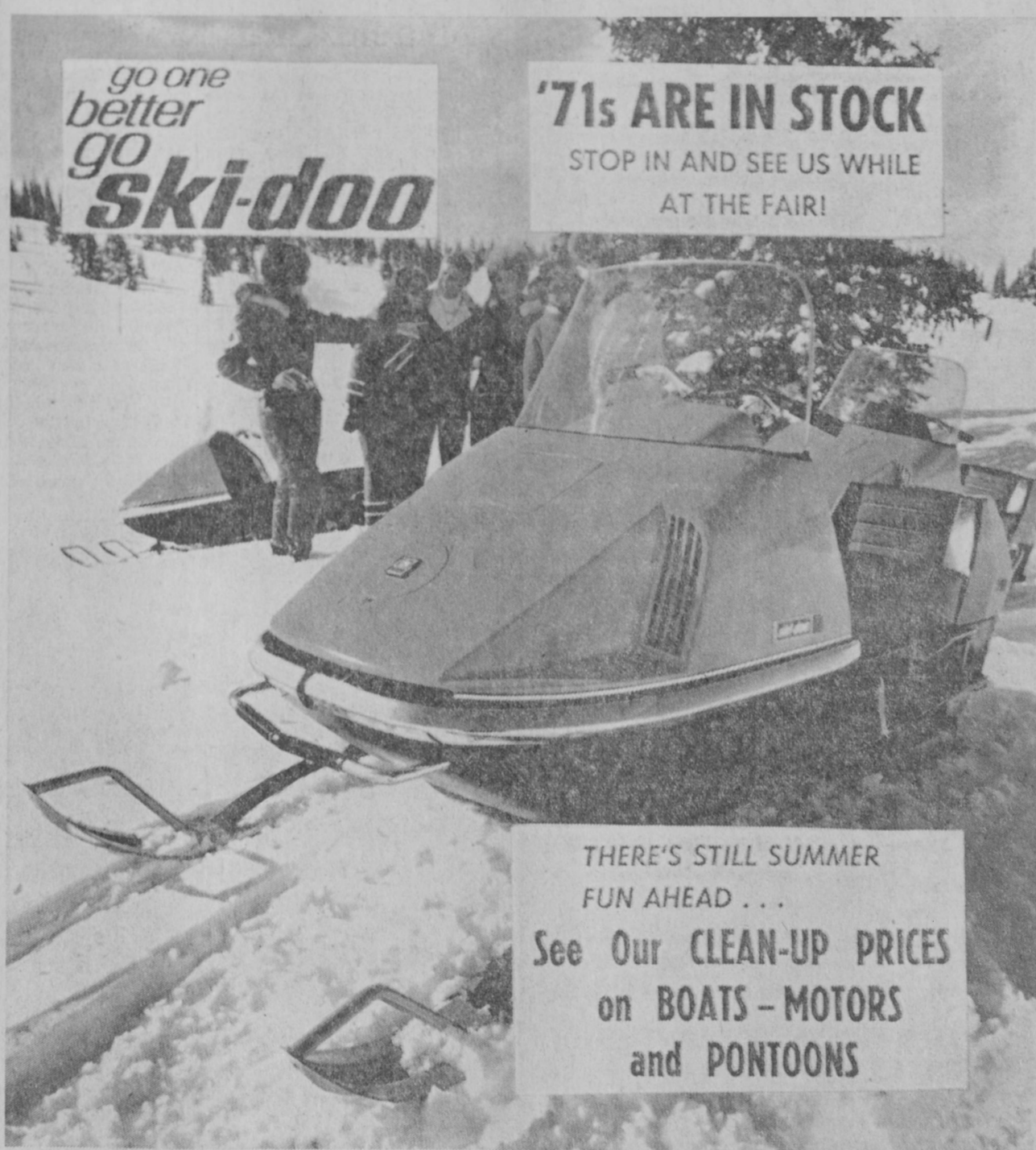

Wurtsmith AB Summer Youth Encampment Called Unique

The summer youth encampment program at Wurtsmith Air Force Base has been called unique because both the military base and the civilian community are work-

ing together to make it a success. In addition to tours of base facilities, boys participating in the program make use of community recreation facilities. These include

the Oscoda Area High School swimming pool, beaches on Lake Huron, facilities at Foote Dam and camp sites along the AuSable River. The boys also spent an afternoon at the Circle "B" Ranch northwest of Wurtsmith.

Robert Doan, head counselor, stated that one of the best features of the encampment is the ready availability of experts in every field. "The boys are enthusiastic about the program. Many of them would like to spend more time here," Doan said. "They enjoy being with the counselors because many of them are at the age when they need someone, not too much older than themselves, to look up to," he said.

The five-day encampment is packed with activities from 6:00 a. m. to 11:00 p. m. each day. It is a rough schedule for the counselors, Doan admitted, but, he added, "each group of boys will get the

same treatment. We do not want to cheat any of the boys just because they happened to sign up for the camp when we were a little tired.

"Our program is under continuous modification," said Doan. "We continually strive to weed out the less useful activities."

"The program is basically influenced by airmen. The boys see a lot of the airmen and they watch them closely, possibly because they can see themselves in the same type of environment a few years from now.

"The impressions they get from these airmen will be lasting ones," Doan said.

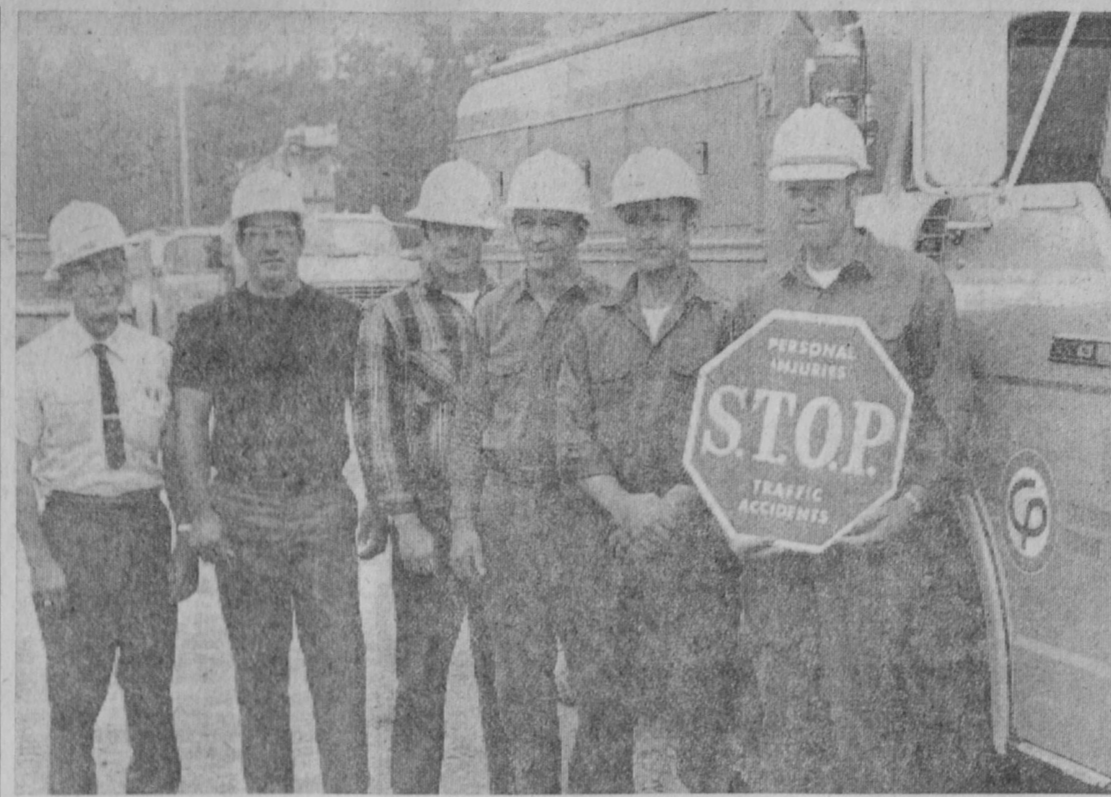
