Court Ruling **Could Boost** School Cost

Effect of a recent supreme court decision which makes it illegal to charge any type of fee in connection with a youngster's attendance at a public school could prove to be most costly to Tawas Area School.

Latest estimate of the added cost to this district in 1970-71 is \$9,000, according to Supt. Reynold Mick, who told the board of education Monday night that the cost probably would go higher once full implications are realized.

The school has never had any fee in connection with textbooks. but the new ruling could mean that the school would have to provide paper and pencils for classes as well as materials for shop class-

The ruling could even mean removal of charges for hot lunches. individual athletic equipment and band instruments, to name only three possible areas effected.

Full impact of the decision will not be known until directives are received from the Michigan Department of Education. An opinion is expected shortly from the attorney general's office.
