

City Revokes 1965 Fire Zone Permits

Due to a conflict with the state pollution act, all burning permits issued under Tawas City's fire zone ordinance of 1965 have been invalidated and revoked by the city council.

This action was taken Monday night following a report from the ordinance and licensing committee and a meeting with Raymond Jurczyk of the Michigan Department of Public Health.

Minutes of the ordinance committee indicated that a letter of complaint had been received in regard to an alleged fire hazard caused by the burning of paper and trash in an incinerator located in the fire zone.

A letter from the health department, read at the June 29 meeting of the ordinance committee, stated that use of an open burning incinerator serving multiple dwellings,

commercial or industrial establishments which does not have approved pollution control devices is in direct violation of Act 348 of 1965.

Tawas City adopted its fire zone ordinance, which controls open burning along US-23 from the river bridge to the east city limit, in 1965. Reginald Bublitz, superintendent of public works, reported that 30 permits had been issued since that time for open burning in city-approved incinerators in the fire zone. No permits had been issued in the past three years and original permits had no time limit.

The city's ordinance, however, did not take into consideration provisions of the antipollution aspect of the state law, which became enforceable in August of 1967.

Councilmen said that this conflict between state law and city ordinance had never been brought to the attention of the city before this complaint was received and immediate action was deemed necessary to comply with the state law.

The state act has no control over open burning in residential zones, although wording of the act discourages such burning. However, residential burning permits in the city's fire zone have been revoked, along with commercial and industrial permits issued since 1965.

\$145,000 Grant Approved for AuSable Park

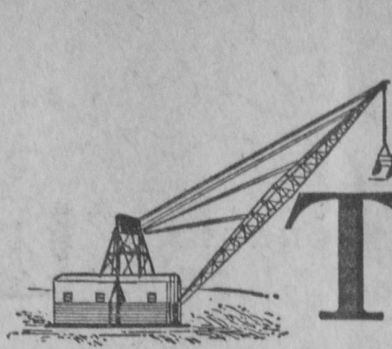
Approval of a \$145,000 grant from the Michigan Waterways Commission for expansion of facilities at the AuSable Park was announced Monday by Marvin Davenport, chairman of the county parks and recreation commission.

This project has been in the planning for two years by the parks and recreation commission. The 16-acre parcel was purchased about three years ago. It is located on the south side of the AuSable River near its entrance into Lake Huron.

Plans include development of boat ramps and a parking area.



JAMES HARDY, 42, Luzerne, an active promoter of the Northern Michigan Riding and Hiking Trail, was killed Monday afternoon when his single engine plane crashed in dense forest near Mikado. Flying alone, he had been under contract to the United States Forest Service for four years as a fire spotter, largely in Isco, Alcona and Oscoda Counties. A dude ranch owner, Hardy brought the first group of horsemen over the riding and hiking trail and was a member of the Tawas team which set the first coast-to-coast snowmobile record over the trail.

Contract Approved Monday

Second Plant for TC Industrial Park

Work to Start Within Month

A new manufacturing plant, the second to be located at Tawas City's industrial park in less than a year, is expected to be completed before winter.

This was the word Monday night as the Tawas City Council gave its unanimous approval of transferring two acres of city property to Mr. and Mrs. Louis (Bud) Zanner of AuGres.

The agreement accepted by the Zanners and the city calls for payment of \$1,400 to the city for the property transfer as well as \$2,000 to cover the cost of water and sewer installation.

Interviewed Monday by the Herald, Zanner said he expects to start work within a month on constructing a 40 by 80-foot concrete block and steel building to house his plant for fabricating structural steel and miscellaneous iron.

"We hope to have the building completed before snow falls—or even sooner," said Zanner.

Zanner is president of a firm which designs, details and fabricates structural steel for commercial and industrial use. With offices presently at Saginaw, the firm presently has three different locations for this fabrication. All locations will now be combined into the one plant here.

In addition, the firm is manufacturing representative for steel joists and steel decking, as well as hollow metal doors and frames.

Zanner said his firm expects from 15 to 20 persons in its operation, which will be seasonal because of the normal peak periods in the building trades.

The firm currently has contracts for furnishing steel to a new nursing home at Rose City, along with other work. The firm provided miscellaneous work for Isco Medical Care Facility and Hemlock High School, to name two contracts during past years.

Location of the plant in Tawas City has been in the talking stage since April 15, according to Mayor John St. James, who heads the city's industrial development commission. Final arrangements were completed Monday afternoon and St. James delivered the contract to the council for action Monday night.

Other officers of the new Tawas City firm include Richard Kern, secretary-treasurer, and Ralph Ziegler, vice president, both of Carrollton.

Zanner has been in the structural steel business for 23 years, operating his own firm for the past five years. Prior to that, he had

been employed by Saginaw Steel and Iron, Jackson and Church, Harris and Fisher.

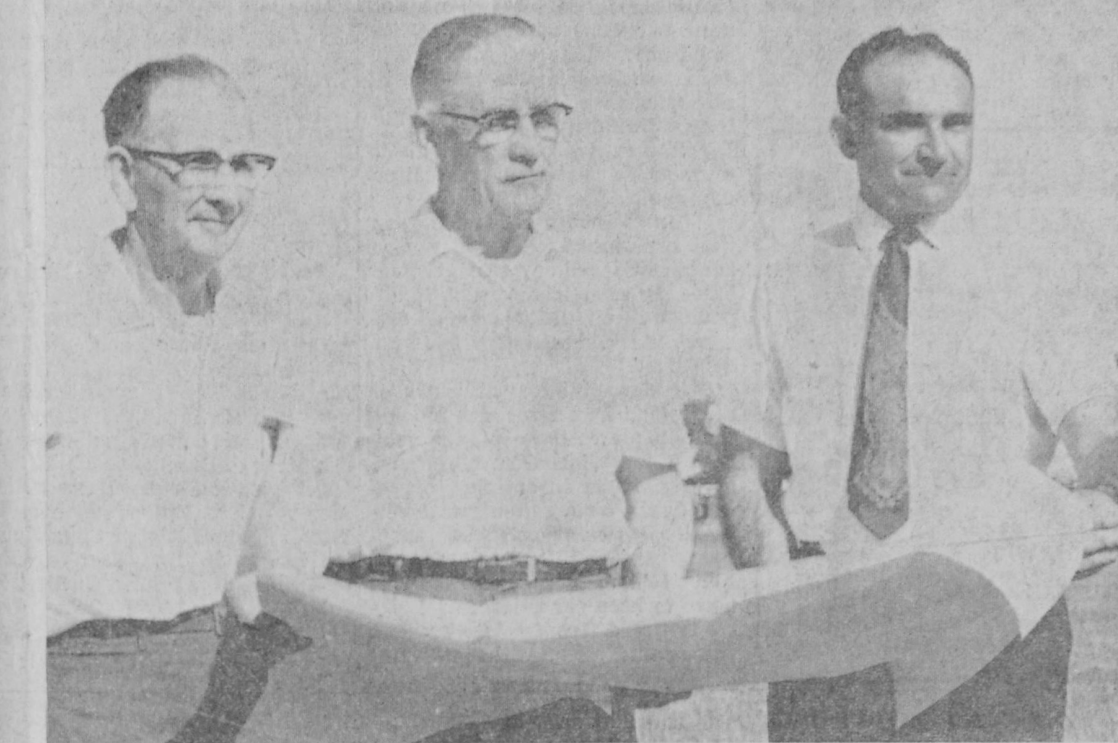
In addition to his busy life as an industrialist, Zanner is a commander in the United States Naval Reserve and commands the reserve

unit at Saginaw. He served 3½ years as a naval officer during World War II.

The new plant is to be located west of Maher Pattern and Manufacturing Company's plant at the industrial park. This firm was

located here through efforts of the city's industrial commission last October.

Money paid to the city for the property transfer is to be used for further development of additional industrial sites.

Committee reports were heard on early applications, as well as a report on junior guides assisted by Keyettes by Mrs. Herbert Blust, registrations by Mrs. Martin Fiedler, advertising and awards by Donald Darr, co-chairman. John Walton and Andrew Oberla reported on arrangements.

Gerald Reiter, president of the chamber of commerce, recommended that the chamber man an information center in the park band stand during the festival. He also recommended that drawing for door prizes be held at that location August 1 rather than at the county building.

Walton, who is art instructor at Tawas Area School, urged that all interested juniors be contacted to register and enter the show.

All local artists, either professional or amateur, are urged to register at the chamber of commerce office prior to the deadline on July 28.

Plans for holding several meetings prior to the festival were made by the executive committee.

Teachers Request MEA Help; Want Mediator

Thomas Pintkowski, president of Tawas Area Education Association, announced Tuesday that for the first time in contract negotiations here, Tawas Area School teachers have asked the Michigan Education Association for professional negotiation assistance at the bargaining table.

In addition, Robert Blood, chairman of TAEA's negotiating team, announced Monday's negotiating session between representatives of Tawas Area Board of Education and the teachers lasted one hour.

Blood further stated that no

progress was made on any issue. "At this time, the teachers association is requesting the assistance of the Michigan Labor Mediation Board," he stated.

Pintkowski stated that the board of education's press release last week, issued by Thomas Basel, consultant for the board, "appalled the teachers' negotiating team."

The TAEA's president emphasized that at no time have Tawas teachers asked for a 30 percent raise, as was stated in the board's press release.

Blood, mathematics teacher and

chairman of the negotiating team, worked with a Michigan Education Association consultant and determined that Basel's statement was in serious error.

"I only hope," Mr. Pintkowski added, "that these distortions will not jeopardize the confidence the community has in its teachers."

Investigate Fire in Motorboat

State police investigated the burning of an outboard motor boat Saturday night at Sand Lake. Owned by Edward Tobin, the boat apparently caught fire when children threw a sparkler in the boat and it ignited gasoline fumes.

Hike Sewer Rate to Aid Expansion

Minutes of the water and sewer board read at Monday night's Tawas City Council meeting indicated that city sewer rates would be increased 10 percent effective July 1.

In explanation, Reginald Bublitz, superintendent of public works, stated that the city had received a cost estimate of \$20,000 to construct a new force main from the Second Avenue pumping station to the waste water treatment plant.

This project is necessary because of the annual flooding of this station by excess water runoff.

Bublitz said that bonding costs on such a small project would be high and it was the thought of the water and sewer board that a rate increase spread over a number of years could finance the project at a saving of money.

The rate increase will raise an additional \$2,500 annually and this money would be placed in an improvement fund to be expended on this project from time to time. Work is expected to start next year.

Effective with the first billing,

the sewer rate will be 50 percent of the water bill, rather than 40 percent under the previous charge system. The first bills using the new rates will be mailed September 30.

In other business, the council authorized purchase of police professional liability insurance for the police chief and two part-time employees.

Application to improve the river bank along his property was given to Charles Boos, whose home is located on River Street. The approval was necessary to obtain a permit from the state.

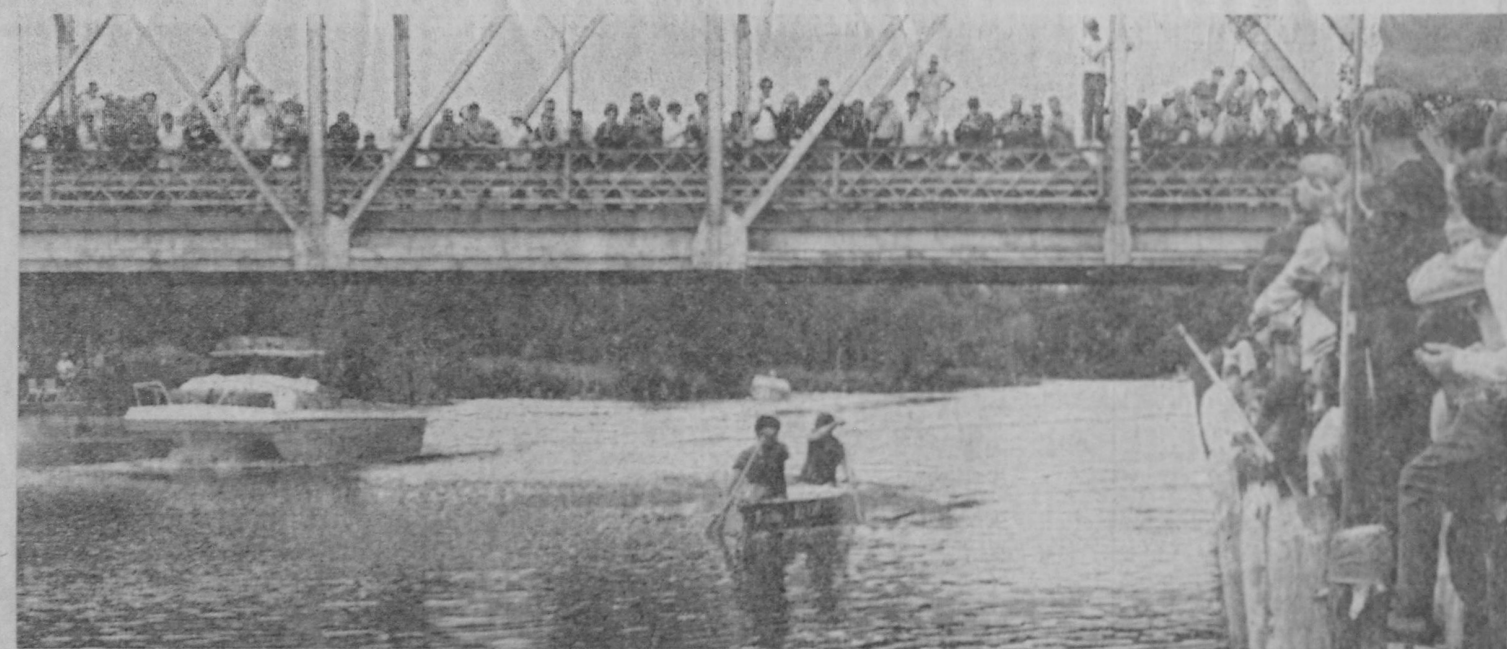
charge of the service on Saturday, July 18.

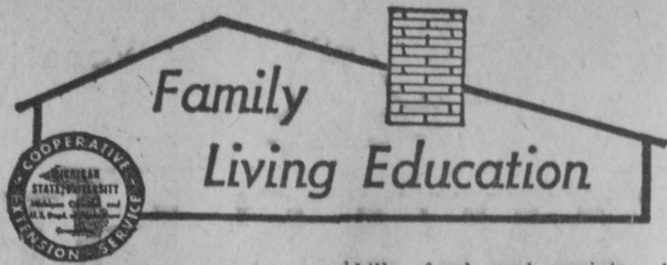

Summer Food Thoughts

If she is average, she will never reduce at any age as her daily needs are just 2,000 calories up to 35 years of age and drop to 1,850 at age 50. She could pick up a two-pound gain each week despite the fact that she walks about eight miles a day."

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On Pins and Needles

HINTS FOR TEENAGERS

...From your Sewing Editor



Dashing down a dune—stopping short at the edge of the sea—racing along where the waves lap, skipping foam. Wow! It's summer again. What could be more fun than making clothes to play in.

THERE'S MORE BOUNCE TO THE OUNCE in the briefest of comments (McCall's 2388) made of stretch knit terry. Stretch terry or any other stretchable fabric allows greater freedom of movement and snaps right back to its original shape. The virtues of stretchability are being added to a wide range of fabrics. You might find stretch in a delicate batiste or lace, in a sturdy denim or corduroy, even in a tweed or wool flannel.

Stretch-Ability

Working with any stretch fabric involves a little give and take. Which way does the stretch go? If the fabric stretches lengthwise, it is good for pants. Crosswise stretch is used for blouses, jackets, skirts and dresses. Two-way stretch for jumpuits, swimwear, and undergarments. Take your regular size in buying a pattern for stretch fabrics.

Before using stretch fabric, soak it in water and then let it dry. This relaxes the fabric from being rolled on a bolt and also removes any extra finishing solution. Be sure to lay out the pattern on the fabric so that the stretch runs in the right direction. Place the pins perpendicular to the stretch direction to avoid unnecessary stretching. Backing is never used with a stretch fabric, but a lining may be called for. Use a tricot or special stretch lining fabric cut in the same direction as the outer fabric.

You Need Pull

Putting the pieces together requires stitching and here's where the "give" comes into the picture. Stretch gently as you sew, holding the fabric front and back. When the seam is relaxed it will then have the same elasticity as the fabric. Use a cotton covered dacroon thread, a medium length stitch and keep the tension balanced. Before you do any final stitching, play with a sample swatch to be sure the seams will be puckering and ripple-free. Once you have finished your smooth-seamed, stretchable playsuit; make a printed cotton skirt to wraparound over it and a canvas tote to carry everything you need for a day at the beach. The tote bag pattern is free by sending a self-addressed, stamped envelope to this newspaper along with your request for leaflet PPE 1656.

Register Now for Olympics

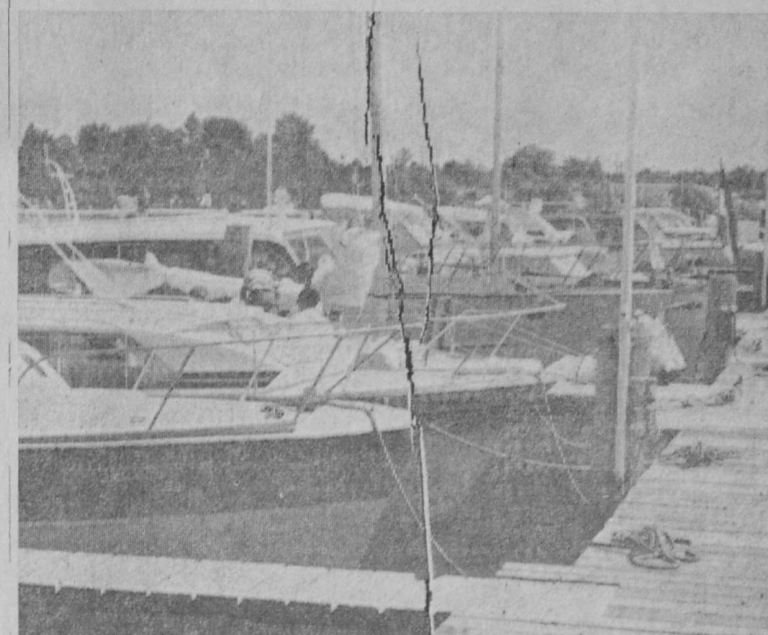

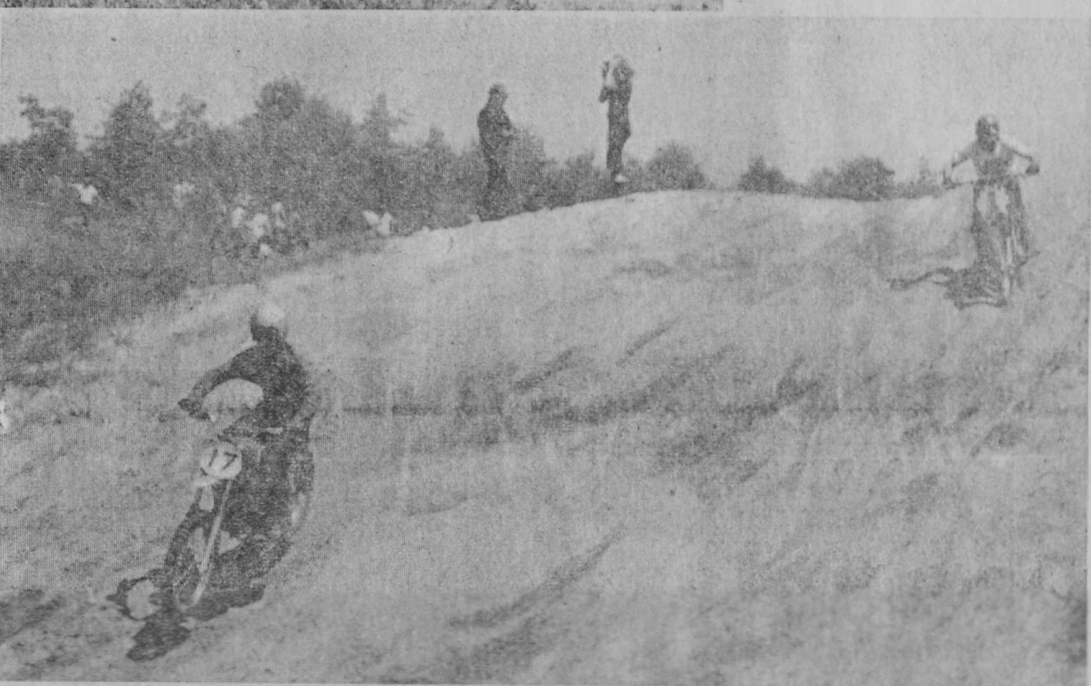
July meeting of Isoco Historical Society, which had been scheduled for Thursday, July 9, has been canceled.

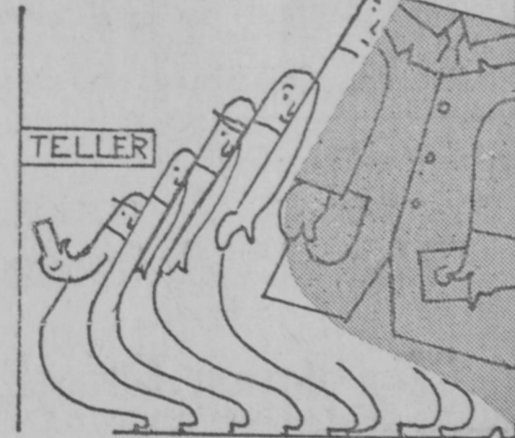

Michigan Bankard Joins BankAmericard System

Michigan Bankard, Michigan's largest bank card system, has officially joined the nationwide and worldwide BankAmericard system effective July 1, it was announced by Frank A. 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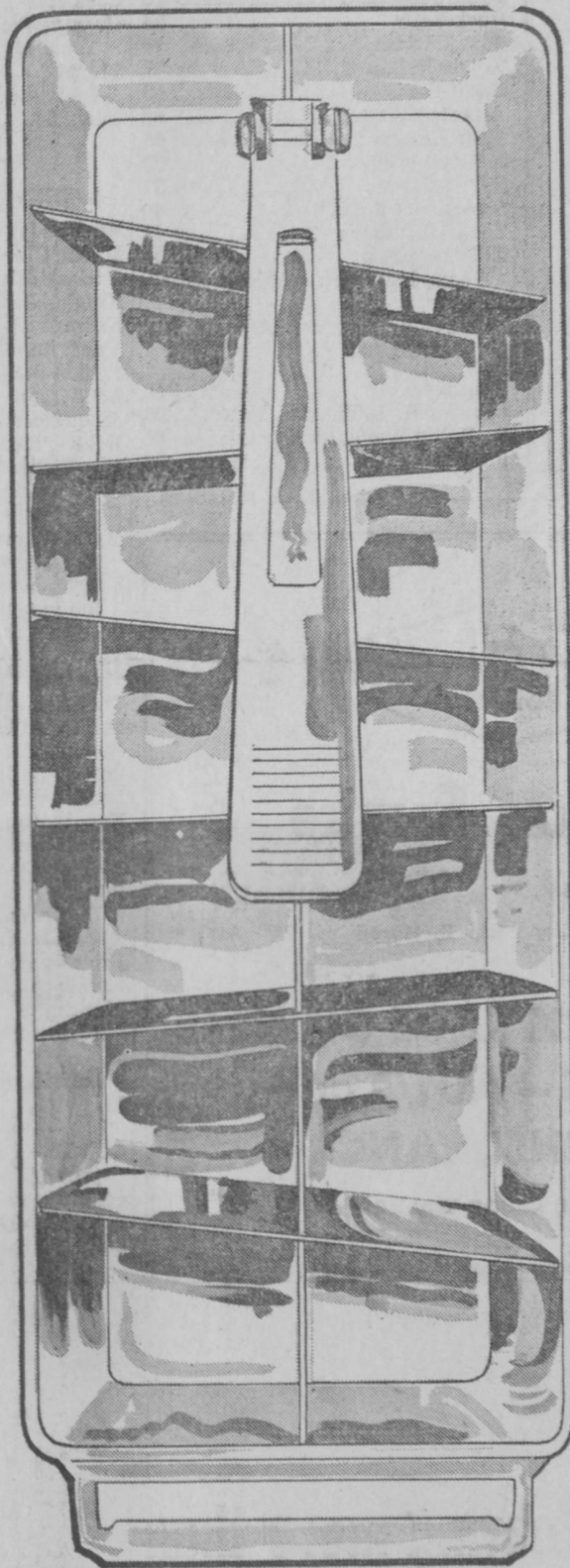

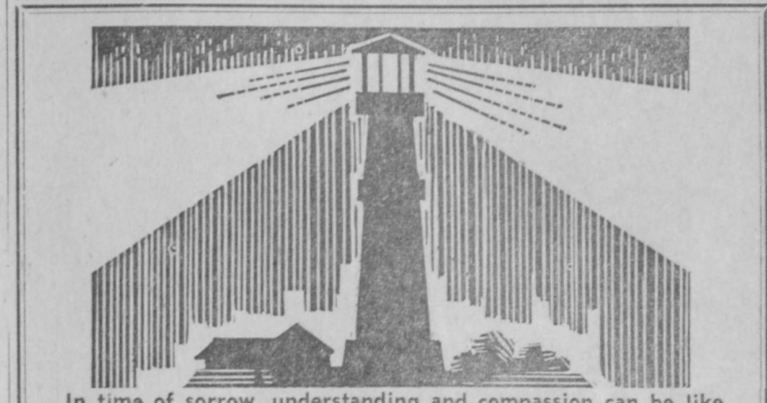
Cable is Member of Ferris Band
