

# Seventeenth Annual Tawas River Canoe Race Has New Adult Amateur Division

Seventeenth annual Tawas River canoe race will be held Sunday, June 14. Between 15 and 20 two-man canoe teams are expected to enter this race, which was originated as part of Tawas City's centennial observance in 1954.

High water along the entire race course is expected to provide good paddling conditions, as has been the case for the past two years.

Jack Jacques, race chairman, announces that registration is to

be held at the Tawas Chamber of Commerce office until noon on Sunday. Late entries may register at Grove's Landing on Tawas Lake.

Approved by the Michigan Canoe Racing Association, entry fee for each two-man team in the senior division is \$4, of which \$1 goes back to MCRA.

There will be three divisions of racers this year, senior division, adult amateur and junior division. Cash prizes in the senior division

are \$75 for first place, \$25 for second place and \$15 for third. Trophies are to be awarded to the first 10 places in the senior division. Trophies are to be awarded to winners in the new adult amateur division.

The junior division, for racers up to 15 years of age, will award trophies to winners of the first three places.

Rules and regulations for the race are available at the chamber

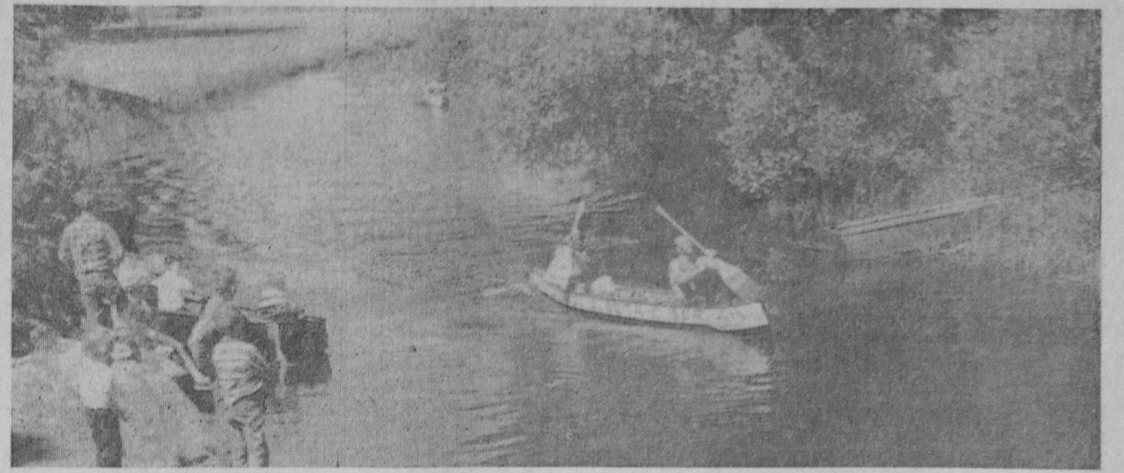
of commerce office. Race officials urge local paddlers to enter the races, both junior and senior divisions.

The junior race starts at 1:45 p. m. at Grove's Landing, Tawas Lake. The course for juniors is the same as the senior division, with the exception that the race stops at the Tawas River mouth.

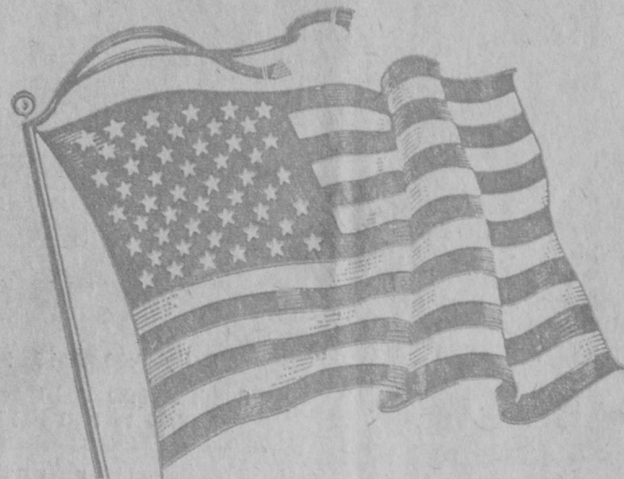
Starting at 2:00 p. m., the race course for the senior division is approximately seven miles in

length. It starts on Grove's landing and proceeds northerly to Cliff's Landing. There, canoeists round a buoy and proceed back down the lake to the Tawas River, paddling to the river mouth and into Tawas Bay. Finish line is at the Tawas City Park dock.

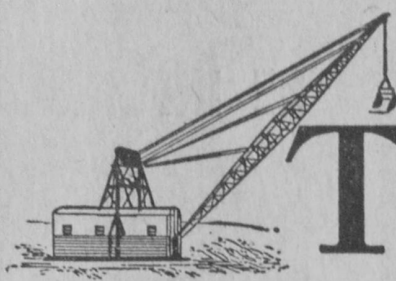
Jacques will be assisted in race arrangements by Bernard Race and Hugo Wajahn. A committee from Tawas City Businessmen's Association will assist in the program.

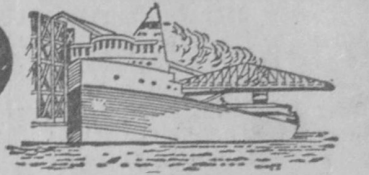

Voters Approve Operational Millage, but . . .

## Hale School Bonding Proposal Loses

The gap is narrowing slightly, but Hale Area School voters again turned down a bonding proposition to build a new junior and senior high school.

At the same time, voters approved a nine-mill package for school operation for one year and named two trustees from a field of six candidates.

Monday's annual school election saw a little more than 800 voters go to the polls. This total was slightly less than the turnout a year ago.

The proposition to sell 1.6 million dollars worth of bonds to build a new building lost by a vote of 428 to 348. The proposal picked

up two votes over the June 9, 1969, proposal of 1.45 million dollars, which was turned down, 433-351.

For the past two years, school officials have sought approval of the bonding program as a means to meet the school district's increasing growth of students on a permanent basis, as well as to replace part of the present building of frame construction.

Essentially, the proposal was the same as submitted to voters a year ago, only some modification was made to classrooms in order to take advantage of new developments in the school layout.

One of the major factors entering the school picture in this district, however, is the ever increas-

ing cost of construction caused by the current inflation. Last year, the proposal was for 1.45 million dollars and Monday's proposal was for 1.6 million dollars. If and when the proposal is offered again, the total cost would most likely reflect another increase due to the inflationary spiral in building costs.

Hale Area School voters apparently recognized the need for additional funds to meet demands created by a 15 percent increase in students during the past year and

a steady increase in the cost of goods and services needed for daily school operation.

Voters approved a nine-mill operational package, 425-383, for one year. This will replace the three-mill levy which was approved in 1969 and expired this year.

The millage will provide badly needed additional classroom space through purchase of portable classrooms, as well as hiring additional teachers, adjust the salaries of all school employees and make much needed improvements in curricu-

lum and instructional programs in the school.

Prior to the election, Supt. Paul Southerland commented that he thought it was a shame to spend two mills of tax money on temporary quarters when this money could be utilized to build a school and community center to serve the entire district.

Regardless of the outcome of Monday's election, the portable classrooms would have been needed as it would have required about two years to build a new building.

A hot contest for the naming of two trustees to the board of education saw Thomas Clark being re-elected and Leland Dane named to fill the vacancy of Gilbert Follette, who retired.

Dane was top vote getter with 332 ballots cast in his favor, while Clark received 269 votes to barely nudge out Mrs. Jean Ruthruff, who had 264 votes.

Votes received by other candidates included Al Baker, 223; Mrs. Lila Clement, 167; James Hartwick, 159.

## OK Revenue Bonds for Building Track

Issuance of \$20,000 in athletic field revenue bonds for the purpose of constructing a track at the school's athletic field was authorized Monday night by Tawas Area Board of Education.

This action had been discussed at the board's two previous meetings and formal action came with receipt of resolutions prepared by the school's attorney.

Following discussion with the attorney, school officials learned that the entire cost of \$32,000 could not be placed on the revenue bond proposal. It was stated Monday night that if gate receipts from basketball games were guaranteed as part of the revenue bond proposal, charges would have to be made for all activities in the gymnasium.

As a result, the project will be financed by using \$12,000 from the general fund, which is to be reimbursed from basketball gate receipts, along with all gate receipts from the athletic field, including football, track and baseball.

It is expected that the revenue bonds would be retired in eight or nine years. Total gate receipts last year amounted to \$4,200.

Bill McIntosh, athletic director and assistant principal, said that work on constructing the all-weather track would start as soon as financial arrangements are completed. If started by July, the track

would be finished by fall. A 40 to 50-day curing period is required for the track surface.

Bleachers which would provide an additional 1,000 seats at the football field have been ordered. Work was commenced Monday by a crew from the City of Tawas City toward building a base upon which to place the bleachers.

## New Postmaster for South Branch

The Interagency Board of Civil Service Examiners for Michigan has announced an open competitive examination for postmaster at South Branch. The position has a starting salary of \$7,550 a year. Applications will be accepted until July 7.

## Millage Proposals Lost at Oscoda A.

In one of the hottest school elections in history, Oscoda Area School voters turned down two millage propositions at the annual school election held Monday. At the same time, two trustees were named to the board of education from a field of six candidates.

A proposal to raise 4.50 mills for school operation for five years was turned down by a more than three to one vote, 1,334 to 407. The second proposition, calling for a levy of one mill for bus purchase, was defeated 966-782.

Richard Wheeler with 1,087 votes and William Brandt with 759 were named to the trustee posts.

Running a close third with 746 votes was Harry Curley. Other votes received by candidates include Mrs. Jayne Peterson, 250; David Seigle, 154; William Underwood, 28.

Between 1,750 and 1,800 persons voted in the election. There were 29 spoiled ballots for candidates, one spoiled ballot on the first proposition and two spoiled ballots on the second proposal.

## Only 125 TA Voters Show Up at Polls

With no contests or special proposals, Tawas Area School District had an extremely light turnout of voters in Monday's annual school election.

Only 125 voters showed up at the district's three polling places, a far cry from the 2,324 persons who voted in the February 1969 millage election. With five candidates for the board of education in the 1969 annual election, there was a voter turnout of 583.

Named to his second term as trustee on the board of education was Robert W. Elliott, who received 115 votes. The remaining 10 votes were scattered among five write-in names and there were two spoiled ballots.

Precinct No. One at East Tawas counted 69 ballots, Precinct No. Two in Tawas City had 45 ballots and there were 11 ballots cast at Precinct No. Three at Tawas Township Hall.

## False Call for Help Results in Airman's Death

Leonard Budnick, 19, of Wurtsmith Air Force Base drowned Saturday in East Twin Lake near Lewiston while responding to a false distress signal from a swimmer.

Budnick was swimming at the lake with his sister and brother-in-law when a swimmer began yelling for help in deep water.

Budnick and his brother-in-law, Oman Wilson, dove in to help the swimmer, who swiftly swam to shore, joking there how the two men had been fooled.

Budnick drowned before he could return to shore. His body was recovered in about 12 feet of water.

## W-P Voters Re-Elect Two Trustees

Two veteran trustees were re-elected Monday in the annual school election at Whittemore-Prescott Area School.

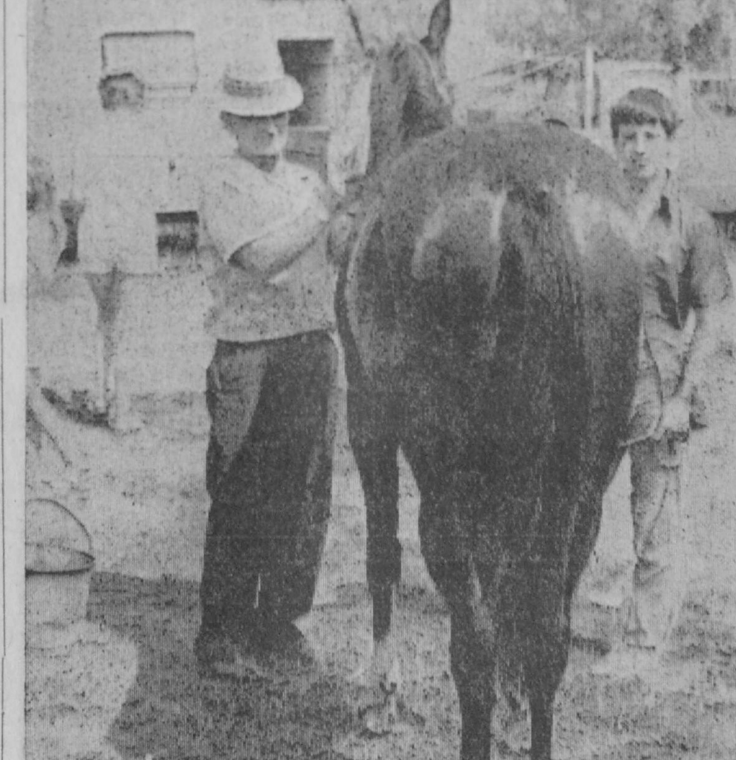
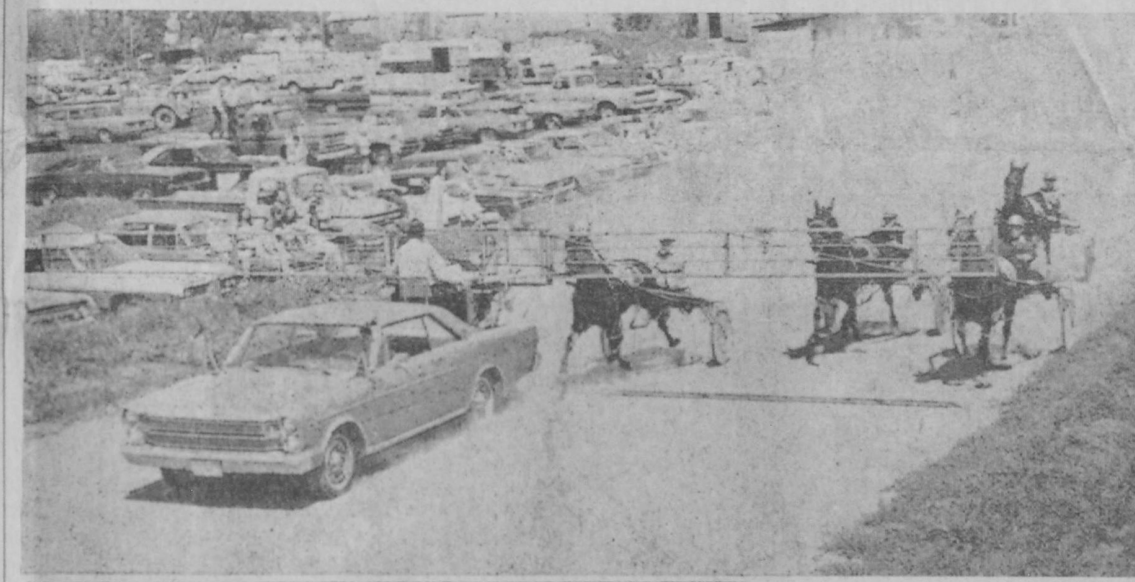
Named to the board of education were Emil Sztanyo, who was top vote getter with 242 votes, and Donald Schuster, 217 votes.

Votes of other candidates included James Belson, 66; George Portice, 53; Donald Thomas, 47; William Thompson, 95.

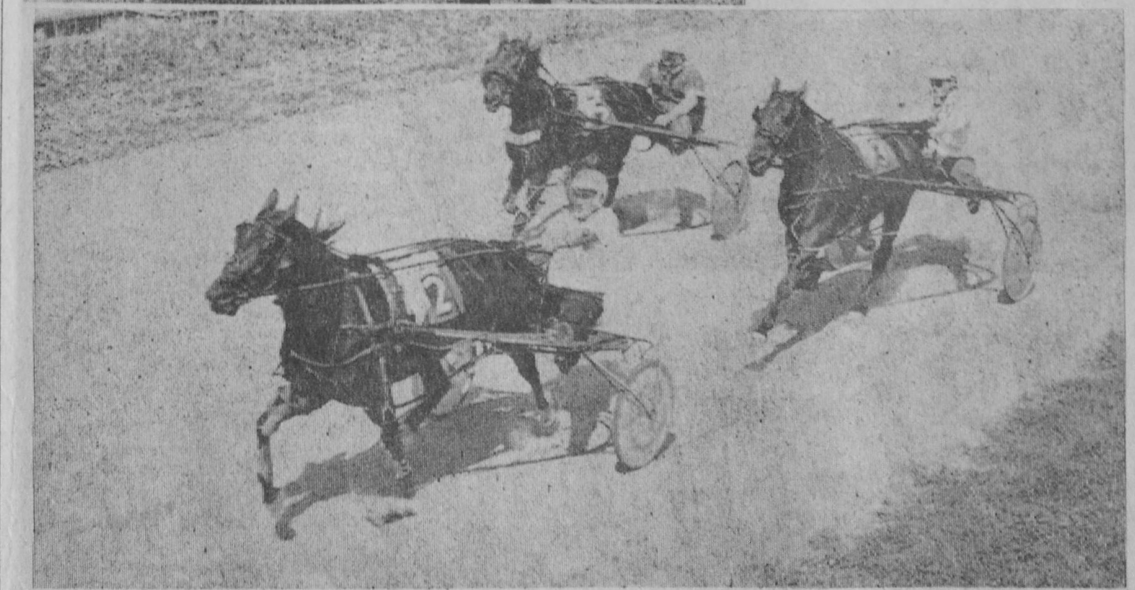
There were 400 ballots cast in the election, with two write-in candidates and five spoiled ballots.

## Nursing Class Appears Set for Next Fall

Seven girls have expressed interest in a cooperative nursing program being considered by Tawas Area School in cooperation with Tawas Hospital.

John Alexander, principal, told board of education members Monday night that there were still some problems in scheduling to be worked out but the program was ready to be inaugurated next fall as part of the school program.

Students would work four hours each morning in the training program, being paid the minimum wage by the hospital. They would then return to school in the afternoon for their regular study.

Now under consideration is the possibility of offering more than one credit for this instruction.

In other business conducted Monday night, the board authorized hiring Edwin Peterson as custodian at the East Tawas Elementary Unit during the summer months. He is custodian there during the school year.

Miss Clara Bolen, elementary supervisor, reported that 89 kindergarten students had registered June 1 for the fall term and eight pupils had been registered after that date.

Clarence Jordan topped Tawas City batters with three singles.

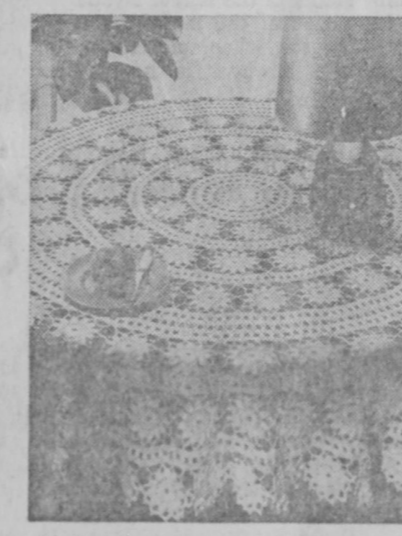

**'Ins' and 'Outs'  
of New Fire Rules**



Some old careless actions are "out" this year and new fire safety practices are "in" when it comes to burning debris and discarding cigarettes and all other smokeable items in forest and grassland areas of Michigan. Under new safeguards written into the state's forest fire law, it is now legally "out" to flick away lighted matches, cigarettes, ashes, etc., in these areas. This makes it "in" for all motorists traveling through rural parts of the state to use ashtrays to dispose of their "smokes". Under the same new restriction, outdoor users going afoot in forest and grassland areas are legally out of line if they pose the threat of touching off wild fires by disposing of lighted cigarettes and other burning materials. Another change designed to cut Michigan's wild fire losses rules out for residents of these areas the burning of debris in containers lacking proper covers, unless a burning permit has been obtained. Thus, for those rural landowners who do not get burning permits, the new "in" requirement is to set fire to their refuse in containers built of masonry or metal which have metal covers with openings no larger than three-quarters of an inch. People living in forest and grassland areas must obtain permits if they use containers which do not meet these new safety specifications, or burn debris in the open. All of the things described and shown here as "out" carry a possible fine of \$100 and/or a 90-day jail sentence. Free burning permits may be picked up at field offices of Department of Natural Resources fire officers and at local fire department stations.

**Cycle Applicants  
Must Bring Car**

Michigan's estimated 400,000 motorcyclists, when qualifying for their motorcycle endorsements in

the course of obtaining their first driver licenses or at normal renewal time, must also make sure they furnish a car with a licensed driver when they go to take their road test.

The car and driver will be used by the local license examiner in following the applicant over a prescribed route during his motorcycle driving test.

In the case of the person applying for his first driver license, he must also make sure that the cycle he is going to test on is brought to the examination station. He may not ride it there.

In the case of the renewing driver, he may drive his cycle to the examination station providing it is before or on the day of normal renewal. If he is late, he must also see to it that the cycle is brought to the test area.

Under Michigan's new motorcycle laws which took effect June 1, persons who have proven experience in riding a cycle may have the driving test waived if they meet certain criteria.

According to Sec. of State James M. Hare, the road test may be waived if an applicant can certify that he or she has actually operated a motorcycle on the public streets and highways for at least 1,000 miles during the last 12 months prior to application.

However, certification may not get the applicant out of taking a road test. His driving record is checked. If found unsatisfactory, he will be required to take a road test.

The applicant's road test may be waived also if the person has qualified for a special motorcycle license or endorsement in another state and has a valid permit or license at the time of application.

Under the new law, it will be three years before all motorcycle operators are qualified.

Persons who renewed their licenses in late May will have until their licenses expire before they have to qualify for a cycle endorsement, explains Hare. This is either three years on a regular operator's license or one year in the case of persons with chauffeur licenses that they may legally operate a motorcycle in Michigan without the new endorsement.

Hare said the special cycle endorsement is the first step in Michigan toward classified licenses in which persons must qualify to handle the motor vehicle they drive.

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## Residential Cooperative Planned for Elderly People at East Tawas

American House, Incorporated, a profit motivated Michigan Corporation, has selected East Tawas for the site of a planned residential cooperative. Approximately 40

acres directly east of the northerly end of Wadsworth Street and bounded to the north by Airport Road and to the east by Schill Road, have been purchased for this purpose.

The American House concept is the result of 15 years of experience in housing and services related to elderly people—50 years of age and older. The concept realistically relates to the physical, economical and social characteristics of elderly persons, who are approaching retirement or who are already in retirement. Few communities have planned for the unusual residential needs of older persons.

Plans for this new development were presented to the East Tawas Planning Commission June 2. City officials are to study zoning and extension of sewer and water mains to serve the development. A second meeting is planned for June 16, with the planning commission to present its recommendations to the city council at a future meeting.

Seven fundamental aspects of living, unique to the older person's life style, will be offered in American House. These include dignity, independence, security, service, nutritional opportunities, social opportunities and the opportunity to remain a resident, even after the inevitable transition from a couple status to the single survivor.

Three years is planned for the full development of American House, which will then accommodate 190 ladies and gentlemen. Forty-five couples will live in two-bedroom homes, 44 couples or single individuals will live in one-bedroom homes and 50 individuals will live in the full service lodge. First occupancy of residents is projected for the spring of 1971. The project value, upon completion, is set at \$2,000,000.

The lodge will offer a multitude of services, including an optional food service for all persons who reside in the Baldwin Township area. A station wagon service for the American House residents for shopping, trips to the pier, fishing sites and church will be offered.

All structures in the planned residential complex will be all electric for convenience and ultimate safety. All roads within the complex will be privately maintained with limited access to assure maximum safety for walking

and activities. All interior and exterior maintenance of dwellings will be uniformly performed. Ground maintenance will also be the responsibility of the staff.

Forty-five non-professional persons will be trained and offered employment at American House. Twenty of these will be positions offered to high school sophomores, juniors and seniors.

Sponsors of American House, East Tawas, are Charles E. and Elizabeth A. Rosenberg of Baldwin Township and William Gibbs of Birmingham.

Financing of American House will be through private funds. The operational specifications will be established solely by the sponsors and members of the cooperative.

Classes will be provided by the Tawas Area Schools and will pick children up at the East Tawas Elementary Unit, then proceed to Tawas City Elementary Unit mornings and afternoon.

Adult swimming lessons will be offered also at Sand Lake on Tuesday and Thursday mornings at 10 o'clock. For further information and adult registration call Mrs. Michael Freel, 362-2903.

## Three Veteran Elementary Teachers Retire at TA School

Three elementary teachers with a total of 111 years of service to education retired at the close of the 1969-70 term last week at Tawas City Elementary Unit.

Retiring were Mrs. Austin A. McGuire, fifth grade social studies teacher; Mrs. Clyde Evril, third grade teacher; and Fred Hickman, building principal and sixth grade general science teacher.

The retirees were honored at the recent annual banquet of Tawas Area Schools' teaching faculty.

Mrs. McGuire and Mrs. Evril are natives of the district and spent most of their teaching careers here, while Hickman, who compiled an outstanding record as a coach in Thumb area schools, came to East Tawas High School 18 years ago and stayed with Tawas Area School after reorganization.

Born in Tawas City, Mrs. McGuire, the former Nan Kane, graduated from Tawas City High School, then attended Michigan Normal College at Ypsilanti. This was the start of a 34-year teaching career.

She taught school in Burleigh Township for six years prior to marriage to her late husband, then taught three more years at Alabaster, Sherman Township and Anschutz School in Tawas Township.

She "temporarily retired" and then returned to teaching at the Watts School when her son, Barry, was 11 years old. She taught at this school for 11 years, including three years after reorganization of Tawas Area School District. She then moved to the Alabaster School and came to the Tawas City Elementary Unit when it was completed in 1961.

Raising a family and teaching on a life certificate, Mrs. McGuire had to wait until 1956 to receive her bachelor of science degree at Eastern Michigan University. Her son received his degree from EMU during the same commencement exercise.

Retirement plans call for a trip to California after Christmas to visit her brother, Henry, then Mrs. McGuire plans to return to her home in Baldwin Township. She

expects to take an active part in social organizations and "do some of the things" which she missed while following an active teaching career.

She may even get around to pay a return visit to Ireland, the homeland of her ancestors. Four years ago, she accompanied a group which toured Europe and Ireland was one of the stops.

Mrs. Evril graduated from Tawas City High School in 1927, then attended Iosco County Normal. Her ambition as a young girl had been to enter the teaching field and she began her 37-year career in rural schools of the area, her first being the Watts School.

Mrs. Evril, the former Hattie Look, taught the third and fourth grades at the Tawas City School before reorganization and then continued as third grade teacher in Tawas Area School.

She received her life certificate from Michigan Normal College, then retired upon her marriage to the late Clyde Evril. When her husband entered military service during World War II, Mrs. Evril returned to teaching.

If she had it to do all over again, Mrs. Evril said she would still enjoy a teaching career. Following in her footsteps, her daughter, Mrs. Joseph (Ann) Serda of Farmington, taught school for four years until the current term, when she retired to raise a daughter.

Mrs. Evril expects to keep active during retirement. She enjoys her hobby of china painting, gardening and playing the organ.

Hickman, a 40-year veteran teacher, attended high school at Mancelona and Battle Creek, where he was a star athlete. He clerked in a store after graduation and was "recruited" by a couple of coaches from the then Central Michigan College. He went on to captain the football and track squads and graduated in 1930 with a bachelor of science degree.

He started his teaching career that fall at Clio, a school where he was to spend the next 14 years as head coach with a successful record. He coached football and basketball at Sandusky, where his football squads won two straight championships in the tough Thumb B League. He joined the navy during World War II and served as a lieutenant.

Upon release from active duty, Hickman returned to Clio where he served as coach for the next four years. He came to East Tawas in 1952 as basketball and baseball coach and taught biology.

He became an elementary teacher after reorganization of the school district and served two years as Tawas Area School's first football coach.

Hickman said he plans to enjoy some fishing during retirement. He and his wife, Frances, leave in

"Painting was my hobby until a

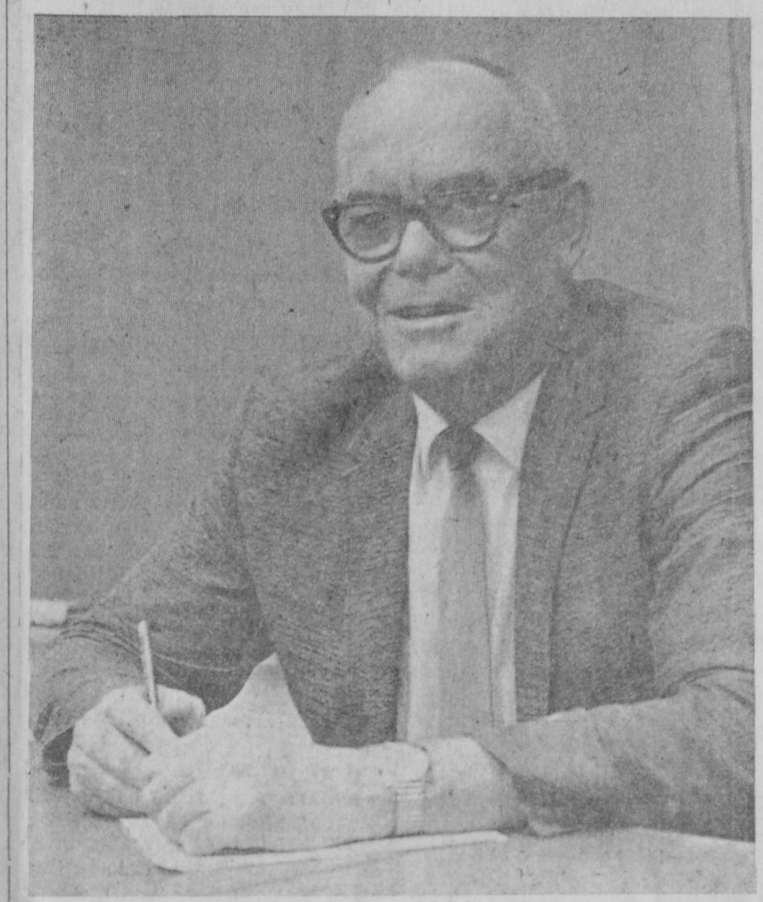
few years ago and I may even take up the brush again," said Hickman last Thursday afternoon as he was finishing records to close the school term and a long teaching career.

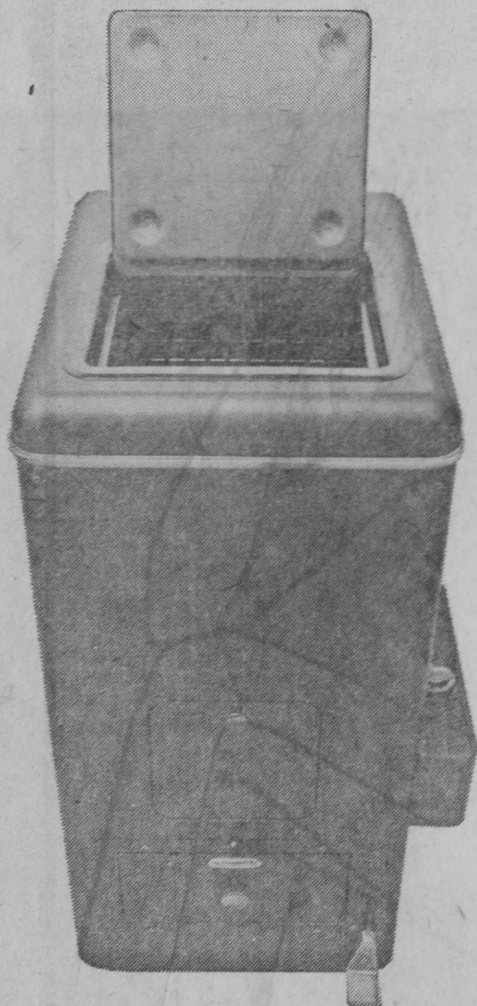

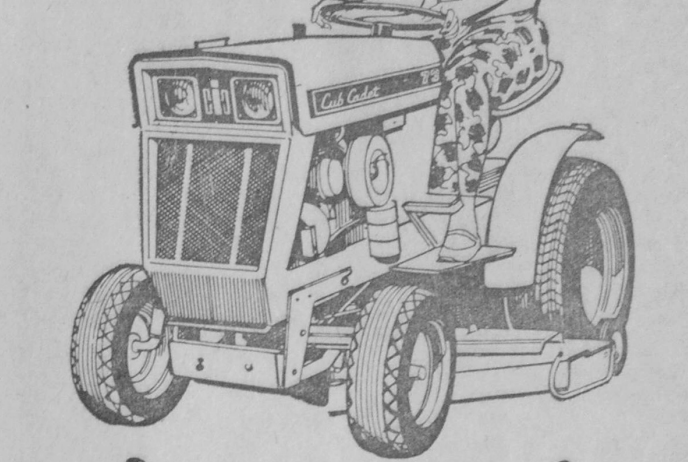


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# SS Overniter Arrives at TC Park Dock

Discussion groups and speakers will focus on the theme—"What the World Needs Now."

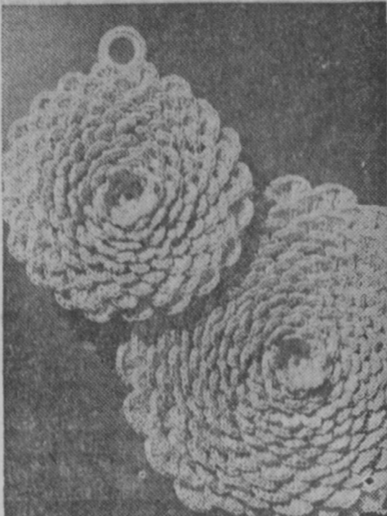
The varied program topics include the drug scene, morals of today's teens, dating to be different and environmental systems.

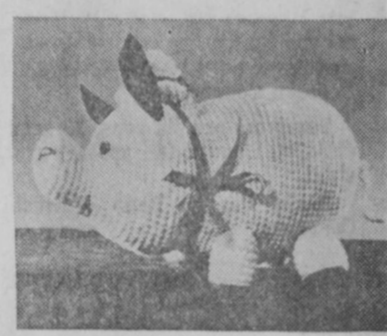

### FOOD NEWS

Now that the barbecue season is at hand—a forecast of meat prices might be in order.

Knowing the supply-price outlook for summer can help you zero in on the special values when they are offered and allow you to make extra good use of the freezer space you may have available.

It is going to take close attention to specials and features to realize savings on meat during the summer months. It is a reasonable principle of food marketing that as the demand for tender, quick-cooking cuts of meat increases prices will rise. And the tender, quick-cooking cuts are these that perform best over an outdoor fire.

Beef supplies are about four percent greater than they were a year ago, but prices are not expected to drop a corresponding amount. This is partly because of greater demand for beef and partly because competing meats are not showing price drops either. Pork prices traditionally rise in the summer, and the popularity of

chicken as a cook-out feature eliminates the need for special prices to move the supply.

This is not to say that there will be no meat specials and features ahead. It will mean, however, that more selective shopping may be in order. Ham prices vary less than other pork cuts, for example, so ham may prove to be an excellent grill choice. Turkey growers are anxious to promote their big birds as outdoor fare; so although there is no over-supply of turkeys, there will still very likely be plenty of specials.

Even though prices remain fairly high on the most traditional grill cuts, variety at reasonable cost is available with some of the less popular or well-known choices. For example, chuck roasts are widely specialized in the summer because homemakers are not terribly interested in cuts that require long cooking. However, chuck roasts do not have to be prepared inside. If they are of JSDA Choice grade and if the more tender "blade" chuck roasts are selected, they will come off the grill as tender and tasty as some of the more costly beef cuts. You should choose blade chuck cuts from 1 1/2 to two inches thick and you may also want to take out a little extra tenderness insurance by employing a marinade mixture of oil and vinegar, tomato uice, lemon juice or a commercially prepared tenderizer. Then, raise the grill rack a few inches higher than you normally use it to slow and extend the cooking period.

Canned luncheon meats, beef cubes cut from the chuck or the round, chunks of bologna or hot dogs are excellent choices for kabobs. Fish is another inexpensive grill-top feature. Whole fish, filets, steak or sticks may all be handled successfully in foil or directly on the grill. Both the flavor and the price are right, and cooking time is brief.

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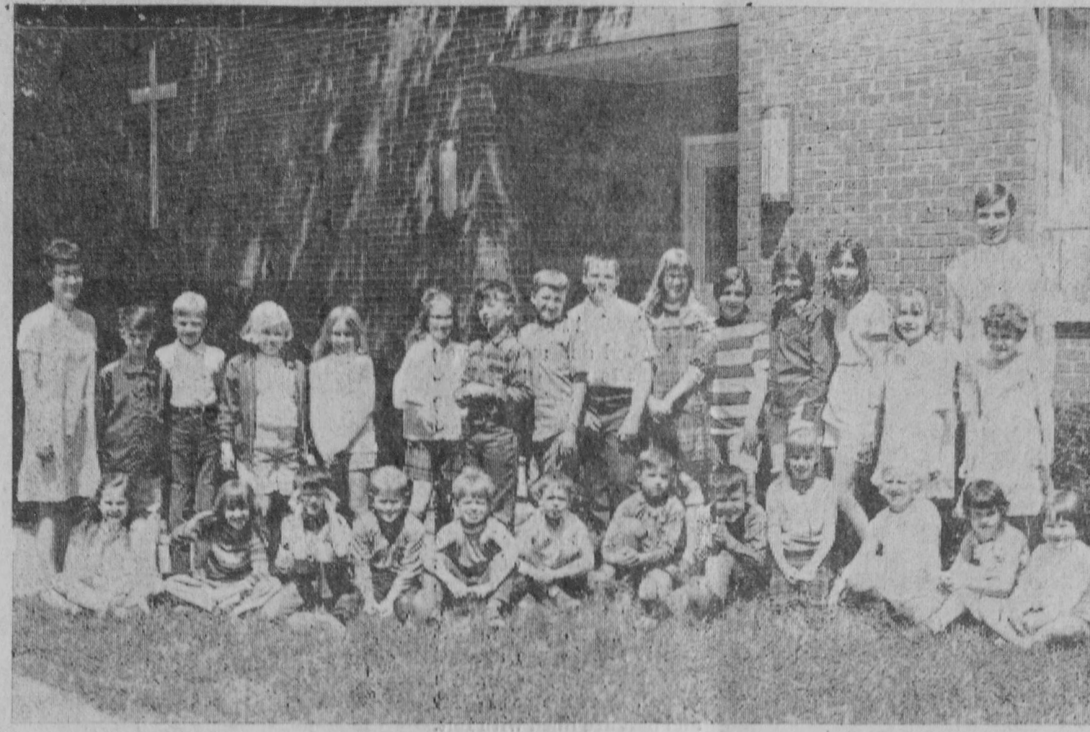

# National Forest Recreation Fee Now Being Charged

Effective Monday, May 25, a new national forest recreation fee system was put into operation. This will, according to George S. James, regional forester of the United States Forest Service, replace the golden eagle passport which had been the annual federal recreation area entrance permit since 1965, until the expiration of the program April 1. The golden eagle, which sold for \$7, allowed the purchaser access to any federal recreation area for a full year. The new national forest recreation permit also sells for \$7 and will be valid until December 31 at all recreation fee areas administered by the forest service.

For those who do not wish to purchase an annual permit, a daily permit is also available. Again, the purchaser and all occupants of his noncommercial vehicle may use the facilities on the recreation area for which it is purchased. The daily user fee ranges from \$1 to \$3 depending upon facilities and services available at each area.

All daily permits are valid for overnight use of campsites, until noon of the day following purchase. Children under age 16 and escorted educational tours are exempt from fees for use of camp and picnic sites, and swimming and boat launching areas.

The national forest recreation permit is not valid for use of facilities administered by the federal government through other agencies such as the National Park Service, Bureau of Land Management and the Bureau of Sport Fisheries and Wildlife. Permits issued by these agencies are not valid for use of facilities administered by the United States Forest Service.

Additional information on the new national forest recreation permit is available from the United States Forest Service Eastern Region Headquarters, 633 West Wisconsin Avenue, Milwaukee, Wisconsin 53203, any forest supervisor headquarters or district ranger station. Annual permits may also be purchased at these places and also at the designated recreation areas.

National forest campgrounds in Iosco County requiring a fee are the Lumbermen's Monument, \$1 daily fee; Rollways, \$1 daily fee, and Round Lake, \$2 daily fee. The fee will be required at these camp-

grounds effective Friday, June 12. Additional information is available from the district ranger's office.
