A.L. DeFilippi, Hotel Owner, Died Monday

Anthony L. DeFilippi, 60, former Tawas City businessman, died Monday, June 22, at University Hospital, Ann Arbor, following a brief illness.

DeFilippi and his wife, Irene, had owned and operated the Barnes Hotel in Tawas City for 15 years. They purchased the business from Kenneth Barnes of Clare on May 1, 1955, and operated the hotel until August 2, 1968, when the business was sold to Edward C. Lier of Saginaw.

Anthony Leonard DeFilippi was born April 13, 1910, at Trapani, Italy. He came to Ann Arbor in 1913. He had operated businesses at Ann Arbor and Pinckney before coming to Tawas City and had been in business at Winter Park, Orlando, Florida, for the past year.

He was married to the former Irene Simmons on October 12, 1940, at Ann Arbor.

He was a member of St. Marguerite Catholic Church, Orlando, Florida, and a member of its Holy Name Society.

While a resident of Tawas City, he was vice president of the Table Top Association, was active in the Silver Valley Winter Sports Committee, Tawas Chamber of Commerce and was a member of the Elks Lodge, Alpena.

He is survived by his wife; three sisters, Mrs. Rosaria LaRosa of Pinckney, Mrs. Joseph Vigo and Mrs. Dorothy Pinsonneault, both of Ypsilanti; two brothers, Joseph A. of Ypsilanti and Frank T. of Ann Arbor.

Funeral services are to be held at 11:00 a. m. Thursday, June 25, at St. Thomas Catholic Church, Ann Arbor. Burial is to be in the church cemetery. A Rosary is to be recited Wednesday evening, 8 o'clock, at Muehlig Chapel, 403 South Fourth Avenue, Ann Arbor.

new school buses over a period of five years.

Approved by a four to three roll call vote, the district would borrow \$25,000 by direct loan from Peoples State Bank. A Lien on the buses would be retained by the bank and interest on the unpaid balance would be seven percent. About 60 percent of the interest would be reimbursed by the state.

Delivery on the buses is expected in about two weeks. The board directed that the administration contact the firm providing the bus chassis in an effort to delay delivery until later in the summer in order to eliminate the need for borrowing money.

The board authorized a transfer of \$12,000 from the general fund for site work and to aid in building a new track. This money is to be repaid to the general fund from athletic receipts. The transfer was necessary in order for the Municipal Finance Commission to consider revenue bonds on the remaining \$20,000 cost of the project.

Three board members, Leonard Sarki, Mrs. Helen Payea and Robert Elliott, are to attend a summer orientation workshop for board members on July 29-30 at Central Michigan University.

A five-year purchase plan to replace typewriters in the commercial department was approved by the board. Ten machines would be purchased initially and condition of machines would be reviewed annually for replacement purposes.

This plan replaces a lease plan which had been considered by the board. This would have provided 34 new typewriters, including maintenance and repair, over a five-year period at a cost of \$4,944.60.

Steven Sventko, commercial instructor, said that seven typing classes a day puts approximately 1,200 hours a year on each machine. He said that present machines owned by the school have received hard usage and require considerable repair.

Two Hurt in Accidents

Two personal injury accidents were investigated by state police last week.

Summer Youth Program

First Encampment Held at Wurtsmith

The first five-day summer encampment for young men at Wurtsmith Air Force Base was termed an "outstanding success" by the Rev. G. John MacDonald, director of the program. The 24 young men, ages 14 through 17, who attended the camp said they "wish it could have lasted longer."

The encampment began at 2:00 p. m. June 15, when the campers arrived at the main gate to the base. After meeting with the 379th Bomb Wing commander, Col. John W. Burkhardt, the boys were assigned rooms in base dormitories.

The rigorous schedule of activities began that evening with a game of water polo at the Oscoda Area High School indoor swimming pool.

Throughout the next four days, the pace never slackened. Athletic activities included "slo-pitch" softball, water safety instruction, archery, basketball and horseback riding.

Tours of base facilities included visits to the air traffic control tower, jet engine shop, missile maintenance shop, equipment fabrication shop, sentry dog kennels, fire station and alert facility.

The young men also viewed static displays of B-52, KC-135 and F-106 aircraft. In addition, there were periods of instruction and guidance given in hygiene, courtesy, safe driving, use of drugs, community responsibility and a number of other areas.

The total program is geared to help the boys develop physically, mentally, morally and spiritually, and to see the potential within themselves. The program is sponsored by Michigan Youth Services, Incorporated, a nonprofit organiza-

tion under the Department of Defense Domestic Action Program.

The summer camp was organized and planned by a committee of leading citizens composed of educators, lawyers, doctors, clergymen and other professional men. (See CAMP, page 4, sec. 1)

Roadmen Request Denied by County

A request for authorization to pay hospitalization and medical premiums of members of the Isosco Road Commission was denied Wednesday by the Isosco County Board of Commissioners.

A letter from the road commission had requested that authorization be given to use state funds to pay fringe benefits for the three road commission members.

Such a request had been made in previous years by the commission, but had been denied by the then county board of supervisors. County commissioners said that other committees and the county commission, itself, did not receive such benefits and did not think it advisable to establish such a precedent.

In other matters, the board authorized purchase of 1,500 plant books at a cost of \$3,764.

Action was deferred on appointment of representatives to the East Central Michigan Development District. It was stated that this county's representatives had been inactive and it was felt that the planning commission should handle these duties.

Charles Smith, Isosco's representative on the Northeast Mental Health Board, reported that the budget of that organization had been increased from \$250,856 to \$387,191 to finance a new program for drug addiction and for persons released from mental institutions. He reported he had opposed such an increase after funds had already been budgeted by participating counties for the next year.

Action was taken to renew a five-year leave on the county dog pound on Meadow Road.

A resolution adopted established a 5:00 p. m. deadline on the day preceding monthly sessions of the board for consideration of claims and bills.

The commission authorized hiring of two new administrative assistants for the parks and recreation commission. Floyd D. McDonald was hired as assistant parks manager at a salary of \$6,500 and Robert Allen was hired as parks foreman at a salary of \$6,000.

Authorization was given to purchase a boat, motor and trailer for the sheriff's department at a bid price of \$2,495 from Hale Hardware.

Pt. Lookout Gets Harbor Money

Cong. Elford A. Cederberg of Michigan's Tenth Congressional District and a member of the House Appropriation Committee, has reported a bill which would include funds for Point Lookout Harbor on the AuGres River.

The congressman indicated that "\$1,100,000 has been appropriated by the committee for the construction of the harbor which is located at the mouth of the AuGres River about three miles southwest of Point Lookout on the westerly shore of Lake Huron."

AuSable River Set for Treatment

Treatment of the AuSable River on Tuesday, June 30, for lamprey control is announced this week by the Michigan Department of Natural Resources.

The river is to be treated with poison for about 10 hours. It is expected that this treatment will result in killing fish in the stream, as well as larvae of the lamprey.

"This treatment will not kill all the fish from Foote Dam to the river mouth, but the number could be substantial," said George Robeson, conservation officer.



Fish killed by the suffocating action of the poison are edible and anyone so desiring will be allowed to keep up to the legal daily limit of those fish which are killed during the treatment.

Dye will be placed in the river this week to determine the water flow.

Congressman Cederberg also explained that "Point Lookout Harbor is a key unit in a chain of harbors of refuge on the Great Lakes for light draft vessels." The congressman continues, "that the construction of the harbor at the mouth of the AuGres River will provide an unbroken chain of such harbors between the Straits of Mackinac and Port Sanilac and provide a safe harbor of refuge for shallow draft vessels operating along this reach of the Lake Huron shore line and throughout the length of the Saginaw Bay."

The Michigan congressman stated, "that with the increase in water transportation on the Great Lakes, the safety factor of these harbors of refuge cannot be overstated."

Congressman Cederberg was pleased to see that this action was taken by the committee and noted that "the construction of this harbor will have great benefit for the Tenth Congressional District and the State of Michigan."

Three Races for Co. Commissioner

Three races for offices of county commissioners have been assured for the August 4 election. Deadline for filing nominating petitions was Tuesday, June 16.

Lloyd S. Little, former member of the old county board of supervisors and its finance chairman for many years, has filed for county commissioner in District Eight. This district is presently represented on the commission by Walter Miller, a veteran of many years as Tawas Township clerk. The district comprises the Townships of Reno, Grant and Tawas.

Donald LeCureux filed petitions for District Four comprising AuSable Township. This district is presently represented by J. Berkeley Smith.

Steve Paslaski filed nominating petitions for District Two comprising the first precinct of Oscoda Township. The district is presently represented by Jack Allen.

All incumbent members of the nine-man commission have filed nominating petitions for the election on the Republican party. Filing for re-election besides the above named commissioners were William Wercley Jr., First District; Robert Foster, Third District; Fred B. Lomas, Fifth District; Carlton Merschel, Sixth District; Clement Stephan, Seventh District; Aubrey Belson, Ninth District.

Two Democratic candidates filed nominating petitions to assure opposition to two districts at the November general election. George Blust, a former member of the old county board of supervisors, will

oppose Belson for the Ninth District seat while Robert Pember will oppose Wercley for the District One post.

Home Health Care Service is Available

Anyone needing home health services in Isosco County may receive them from District No. 2 Health Department, according to Dr. William F. Jackson, department director. He said that skilled nursing care and other services for home bound patients are now being provided on an hourly basis.

The type of nursing care includes giving baths, changing surgical dressings, giving hypodermic injections, demonstrating prescribed exercises and teaching family members in the home nursing procedures.

A patient may be referred to the health department by his physician, family or friends, said Jackson. "The only stipulation for receiving home care is that the services be prescribed by the person's private physician."

To apply for the program, the person desiring the service should contact either his own doctor or a district health department nurse. When the physician orders the services, a health department nurse will make a home visit to carry out his plan.

"Although sometimes there is a fee charged to cover the expense of providing home care, no one will be denied the service because of inability to pay," Jackson stated. "In addition, people covered by Medicare or Medicaid will have a part or all of the fees paid for by the health insurance program."

Complaints Up Say State Police

Complaints handled by the Michigan State Police, East Tawas Post, during the first six months of 1970 are up approximately 28 percent over the same period during the preceding year.

As of Monday, the post had handled 810 complaints as compared to 600 on that day last year. Major increases are noted in burglaries and larcenies.

Elly Peterson Slated Speaker at GOP Rally

Mrs. Elly M. Peterson of Charlotte, Republican national committeewoman and assistant national chairman, will be principal speaker at a Republican rally June 30, 8:00 p. m., at the Isosco County Building.

Merton Killey, Isosco Republican Committee chairman, said Mrs. Peterson would talk on state and national policies. "We are most fortunate to obtain a speaker of her stature," said Killey.

Mrs. Peterson got an early start in politics, joining the Young Republican Club of Oak Park, Illinois, at the age of 21 years.

A successful organizer in Michigan Republican campaigns, she served for three years as aide to former state chairman, Lawrence B. Lindemer, before being appointed field service manager for the state in 1961.

Her specific contribution in organizing the women of Michigan is acknowledged to have been a vital factor in the election of George Romney as governor. Mrs. Peterson

was elected state vice chairman in 1961 and re-elected in 1963.

On September 27, 1963, she was appointed executive director of the women's division, Republican National Committee, and on January 1, 1964, was chosen by national committee chairman, William E. Miller, as the assistant chairman of the Republican National Committee.

In 1964, she became the Republican nominee for the United States Senate—the first woman of either party to be chosen in the State of Michigan. At the annual Republican state convention in 1965, she was unanimously acclaimed Republican State Central Committee chairman. She was re-elected state chairman in 1967.

In 1968, she was elected Michigan delegate - at-large to the Republican national convention at Miami, Florida, and was elected national committeewoman for Michigan for a four-year term. The Isosco County Republican



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
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75 Snug Harbors



Any sailor who ventures onto Great Lakes waters will find that Michigan now has about 75 protected harbors or refuges with recreational boating facilities already constructed or under development. These harbors, typified by the one at Traverse City pictured above, literally dot this state's Great Lakes shoreline as shown on this map. They are spaced on a rough pattern of about one every 30 miles. This means that insofar as this system of refuge points has been developed, no coastwise boater will ever be more than 15 miles from the safety of a harbor. In many cases, the distance is much shorter. Thus, Michigan has a pattern of boater safety and convenience along its Great Lakes coast which is unparalleled in North America. Spearheading the program is and has been the Michigan Waterways Commission, now part of the Department of Natural Resources. It plays a lead role in pooling state, federal and local funds in an effort to expand the network of harbors in step with boater needs. The Commission provides the State's share of the program costs by channeling funds to local units of government which are derived from 1.5 percent of Michigan's total annual gasoline tax revenues. Drawing from this source, representing money paid by recreational boaters for their



purchases of marine fuel, the Commission this year is plowing \$4.2 million in state funds into harbor development projects. Boaters may see where their money has gone over past years by writing for free guidebooks listing these facilities. They should address their requests to: Harbors Guide, Waterways Division, Michigan Department of Natural Resources, Lansing, Michigan 48926.

Family Living Education

By MARY PETERS Home Economist

"Hard boiled" means tough, right? A hard-boiled individual is one to watch out for.

A hard-boiled egg is likewise, tough and one to avoid. Mention a hard-boiled egg to any home economist and watch her flinch. She would rather hear you call it "hard-cooked." And she hopes that is what you will do to it, too.

Eggs are an extremely good value at the grocery store these days and thrifty guardians of family food dollars will certainly want to include them often in meal plans.

The reason for the low price situation at the egg counter is simply a matter of poultry population explosion. The numbers of egg-type chickens hatched in the first three months of 1970 were 18 percent

above the same period a year ago. In addition, there were 15 percent more egg-type chicks in incubators on April 1 this year than last.

Retail egg prices are presently reflecting the large laying flocks and there is no reason to doubt that low prices will continue on into the fall months.

One of the most appropriate ways to include eggs in summertime menus is as hard-cooked (not hard-boiled) eggs. The following simple instructions will result in perfect hard-cooked eggs every time... tender white and moist yolk with no discoloration.

1. Cover eggs in a saucepan with lukewarm water, at least one inch above the top of the eggs.
2. Heat rapidly to boiling point.
3. Remove from heat. Cover tightly. Allow to stand 20 minutes.
4. Remove eggs immediately and cool under running cold water.
5. Crack, shell and peel under running water.

Once hard-cooked, eggs can be used in a delightful variety of ways. Cut in half and dusted with salt and pepper is the easiest and quickest approach. Deviled eggs are a bit more trouble but wonderfully tasty. Easy to garnish, too, with a slice of stuffed olive or a sliver of green pepper or red onion.

Another approach to hard-cooked egg variety involves letting them rest overnight in the liquid from a one-pound jar of pickled beets. When morning rolls around, the eggs have taken on a piquant pickled flavor plus the deep red of the beets.

Predicts Busy Season for Forest Parks

John von Bargen, forest supervisor, Huron-Manistee National Forests, expects an unusually busy season at the numerous forest service recreation areas stretching from Lake Michigan on the west to Lake Huron on the east.

"Actually, with the increased unemployment throughout the country, I anticipate there will be a substantial increase in the number of forest visitors over last year, when the Huron-Manistee National Forests played host to visitors who spent in excess of 1,657,000 visitor days in their forests," von Bargen remarked. "With even more free time on his hands than previously, the affluent and near affluent individual today is not going to remain at home. He is going to do some of the traveling he has thought about in the past, but hasn't had time to do until now. He wants to use this opportunity to have that camping experience, or that hiking experience, in an environment entirely different from that of his past."

Supervisor von Bargen also stated that recent environmental activities have made more people aware and curious about their surroundings. They want to see some of the things that they have been told regarding their environment. "We plan to take care of as many of these people as possible when they are away from home," he added. "We invite the public to visit their national forests whenever the opportunity arises."

This summer, the forest service will have a \$7 annual permit available for sale, which enables the holder to use designated national forest recreation areas throughout the country; an additional \$1 per day user fee is charged at some campgrounds with higher recreation values. No fees are charged at a number of primitive campgrounds.

For further information regarding specific recreation areas, write to the forest supervisor in Cadillac, or any one of the district rangers in Cadillac, Baldwin, Manistee, White Cloud, East Tawas, Mio or Harrisville.
