

Bridge Ownership Question is 'Can of Worms'

A span over the Tawas River may be called the "East Tawas bridge," but who owns it? The City of East Tawas disclaims any title, as does the Isco County Road Commission.

This was the word Monday night at the city council meeting following a report by City Supt. Paul Ropert, who said a "can of worms" had been dumped into his lap by the county road commission.

While the bridge apparently is still sound structurally, the narrow span was built in 1920 by the state to handle traffic of Model T Fords and horses and wagons over the then new M-10 highway.

The span will have to be replaced in the future to handle modern vehicular traffic. Cost of a new structure would be great and neither the city nor the county is interested in assuming such an expenditure.

Since receipt of a letter from the road commission which stated that the city limit extended to a point beyond the west bank of the Tawas River, Ropert has been studying city records dating back nearly 60 years in an effort to determine ownership of the bridge.

When East Tawas was incorporated under Act 346 of 1895, the city limit actually extended to a point near Miner's Grove. Digging through old records, Ropert found

that the city had collected taxes in that area as late as 1916.

In 1917, however, records disclosed that an election was held changing the boundary and returning that portion of the city to Baldwin Township. Only two votes were cast in the area affected in the affirmative. City voters also approved the change.

Further study of records by Ropert indicated that Baldwin Township residents in 1919 were not particularly happy over the boundary change—they did not want the property back. No reasons for this was listed in the minutes, but the vote was not challenged.

No further reference was found in records, the matter was forgotten and city fathers in recent years have assumed that the city limit stopped at the east bank of the Tawas River, despite the fact that a city limit sign was located on the west bank. Ropert said the sign was erected a number of years ago with permission of the road commission. The sign has now been removed.

The city boundary again came up for discussion when the road commission searched its files and found a 1951 letter from the state highway department which returned old M-10 (or US-23) to the county and that portion lying with-


in its boundary to the City of East Tawas. According to the letter, the city limit extends to a point near the present day intersection of Nunn and Monument Roads, which would put the bridge in East Tawas.

Who owns the East Tawas bridge? The state gave it back to local government in 1951, but it is not on the county's list of "owned" bridges and, according to the city's viewpoint, the city limit stops at the east river bank.

Further study is to be made at the county register of deeds office to determine East Tawas' west boundary. It may even require court action, was one comment.



Resume Salary Talk With City's Refuse Collector

Mayor John St. James Monday night directed Tawas City Council's buildings and grounds committee to meet with James Quarters, contractor for city garbage and trash removal, to develop a fair pay scale for this service.

Quarters told the council that he had come to the meeting with the intention of giving a two-week notice that he was discontinuing his service as contractor.

Two weeks ago, the city authorized an extra day of pickup effective June 1 at an additional daily cost of \$35. Quarters said that he could not hire two men and operate his truck at this rate because of the steadily increasing amount to be picked up.

The contractor told councilmen

that his volume today was about the same as at the peak summer season. At its last meeting, the council directed that everything placed in garbage cans or plastic bags be picked up by the contractor.

Quarters pointed out that many residents were not complying with the council directive of May 18 which stated that the maximum weight load for contents of a garbage can was 50 pounds and the maximum weight for contents of disposal plastic bags was 25 pounds.

Quarters said that many of the containers weighed more than 100 pounds. The council directed that cans or plastic bags over the maximum loaded weight should not be picked up by the contractor. The contractor said he would continue his service to June 15, or until such time as an adjustment is made. A meeting has been scheduled with the committee on Monday, June 8.

The council approved transfer of the taxi cab franchise from Vivian H. Duff to Mr. and Mrs. Frederick Cain, who have been operating the business for a number of years.

A letter from the state highway department stated that the current eight-year construction program which expires in 1977 does not include any provision for installing a tube in ditches along US-23 southwest from the Tawas River bridge. City Supt. Reginald Bulbitz stated that the city's request did not concern long range planning by the state, but actually was a maintenance measure to eliminate stagnant water in state ditches. The council is to communicate further with the state on this matter.

A second letter from the highway department stated that a survey conducted last November indicated that a stop light at the intersection of US-23 and Mathews Street was not being recommended because of the present low accident rate at the intersection. The communication stated that removal of all or more existing parking on US-23 would accomplish more than a light.

The council expressed displeasure over the fact that the survey was conducted in November and that it was the council's desire to break the flow of traffic only during peak periods in the summer months to allow entry of vehicles on US-23 from side streets. Mayor St. James and the city superintendent are to make further contact with the state regarding this matter.

The council authorized a permit to be issued to the Tawas Chamber of Commerce which is to sponsor a circus July 8 at the grounds of Tawas City Elementary Unit. Permission to use the property had been granted by the board of education.

Junk Car Removal Sought by Council

Cooperation by a number of garages and service stations in removing unsightly junked automobiles from public view was noted Monday night by the Tawas City Council.

At the same time, the council expressed the desire that those businesses which have not complied with the recent order to do so at once in order to avoid prosecution under city ordinance.

The problem of junked autos collecting at garages and service stations was pointed out at the May 20 meeting of the city planning commission. A resolution from the commission urged the council to enforce its ordinance, which requires such businesses to screen junked autos from public view by a fence not less than eight feet high.

Members of the planning commission attended Monday night's meeting, as stated one member, Jerry Cotter, "to make sure the council understands" minutes of the May 20 commission meeting.

Other commissioners attending were Paul Chevis, James Dillon, David Wyatt and Delano Myles.

The opinion was expressed by several commission members that summons should be issued to those violating the ordinance.

During discussion, it was pointed out by Ald. Howard Hatton that one ordinance violation had been

removed through discussion with owners. Planning commission members, councilmen and neighbors met with the owner and immediate steps were taken to remove junked autos.

"I would like to see what people will do before I issue a ticket," stated Police Chief George Westcott, who has charge of ordinance enforcement. He told the council that all owners contacted had assured him they would do their best to correct the situation. One service station owner had not been contacted as yet.

It was also pointed out at the meeting that the problem of disposal of junked autos is a national emergency. One of the problems is that scrap dealers are prohibited from burning combustible materials in autos, along with the current low value on scrap metal.

Mayor John St. James said the council wished to have knowledge of all violations of the city ordinance, both commercial and residential. Ald. Martin Wellna commended the planning commission for its action and said that enforcement of this ordinance should not be a one-shot deal, but a continuing program.

"The city cannot single out any one violator, but must look at the entire community. Offenders can clean up their property, but not over night," said Wellna.

Bad Start for Season

One Man Drowns; 8 Crashes Mar Memorial Holiday

One person drowned and eight persons injury auto accidents were reported over the holiday week-end by Isco law enforcement agencies.

Harold George Long, 50, Millington, drowned Sunday morning in Sand Lake.

A witness, Joan Lichnovsky, 10, told investigating sheriff's department and state police officers that Long's boat was in the process of turning and he was thrown head first into the lake.

Long was dead on arrival at Tawas Hospital. Officers believed that the tragedy might have been averted had the victim been wearing one of two life jackets found in his boat.

The most serious auto accident occurred Sunday night on Indian Lake Road, 1/2 of a mile west of Sand Lake Road. Gary Bittner, 26, Madison Heights, and Wayne Felix, 24, Hazel Park, received serious leg injuries when the motorcycle which they were driving ran head on into a car driven by Larry Lee Lathrup of National City.

Officers said the motorcycle driven by Bittner was headed south on Indian Lake Road in the wrong lane. Lathrup swerved his car toward the ditch to avoid a collision.

Other accidents included a two-car crash Friday on M-65 in Oscoda Township. A car driven by Ronald H. Brinkman, 25, Birmingham, struck the rear of a car driven by Frank C. Scigliand, 65, Flint. Scigliand, Margaret Briley, 56, and Catherine Huot, 59, also of Flint, were taken by ambulance to Tawas Hospital.

Stanley F. Girard, 26, Oscoda, and Douglas Myers, 24, Wurtsmith, received minor injuries Saturday afternoon when Girard lost control of his vehicle after passing a car on US-23 in Oscoda Township. The car struck a culvert.

Charles E. Shirdo, 26, Saginaw, was injured Saturday night when his car struck a deer on Monument Road in Wilber Township. The deer crashed through the windshield and Shirdo's hand was cut.

Patricia L. Kusion, 19, and Joyce S. Hodges, 20, both of Pontiac, were treated at Tawas Hospital following a crash Saturday on US-23. Miss Kusion said she dozed off and her car ran off the road.

Joseph W. Lokinski, 72, East Tawas, received minor injuries Saturday evening when his car ran into a ditch on Plank Road. The driver told officers that he pulled onto

NETS Receives Delivery of First Computer Unit

Delivery of the first segment of NCR 200 computers to headquarters of the National Electronic Transmission Service at East Tawas last week proved to be a real traffic stopper.

The computer, coming from Hawthorne, California, along with special air conditioning equipment, was transported here in two large vans.

As the equipment was unloaded, a large crane was used to hoist the delicate electronic instruments to the third floor of the Holland House, which has been undergoing a vast remodeling job for the past three months.

Gordon E. Collins, general manager of NETS, said that the first computer will be in operation in late June or early July. This delivery represents about one-third of the eventual \$1,000,000 installation which is to be in operation by January 1.

"This early installation will allow us to train our people in the operation and get the bugs out of the equipment," said Collins.

The computer center is located in the former ballroom of the hotel. The room is undergoing complete remodeling to provide temperature controlled heating, air conditioning and dust control.

When fully operational, NETS will offer full service on-line bank processing service in a four-state area. Through use of microwave signals, NETS will connect computers located at its central processing location here to on-line transmission devices located at its customer's sites.

Processing of demand deposit items, savings, installment loans, mortgage loans and general ledger accounts for financial institutions will be accomplished instantaneously through use of the NETS system.

This financial service will be the firm's initial offering with service to other types of business being studied for feasibility.

Officers of the firm include Richard L. Harwood, chairman; Bruce G. Freel, president; Michael N. Freel, secretary-treasurer.

Tax Division Remains Same as Last Year

Isco County Tax Allocation Board, holding its final hearing last week, adopted a tax division schedule identical to the current year's division.

In what has to be called the least controversial session in years, the board allocated nine mills to schools, 4.80 mills to county operation, one mill to townships and 2 of a mill to the intermediate school district.

As anticipated, the tax split of the 15-mill limitation did not meet budgets submitted by schools or the county due to the ever increasing costs of all governmental operation.

Two schools, Hale Area and Oscoda Area, will be holding special millage elections on June 8 in an effort to seek additional operating funds.

Council Hears Ins. Benefits Report on FD

A report on workmen's compensation insurance benefits paid for volunteer firemen killed or injured in the line of duty was presented to the Tawas City Council at its Monday night meeting.

Appearing before the council was Delano Myles of Myles Insurance Agency, insurance carrier for the city, who said he wished to dispel any apprehension or misinformation held by firemen or the city government.

Under the state workmen's compensation law, a fireman injured in the line of duty is paid as if drawing a full time salary at the top of the city's salary schedule. Myles said that an injured fireman would receive complete compensation during time of disability with no limitation on medical coverage.

While benefits change from year to year under state law, in case of death of a fireman his widow is paid \$75 per week for 500 weeks or 10 years. Benefits paid to a child continue until the child is self supporting.



Strength is Answer to Honor Fallen Heroes, States Judge Miller

The following is the text of Judge Allan C. Miller's address on Memorial Day at the Tawas City Cemetery:

"As we meet here year after year to honor those who gave their lives that this nation might endure, we have become accustomed to an annual lesson in geography.

"Memorial services for the fallen heroes began as a geography lesson of north vs. south—the Mason-Dixon Line. It was continued with ringing phrases and names of places, such as 'Remember the Alamo,' Argonne Forest, Alsace-Lorraine, Normandy Beach, Pearl Harbor, Guam.

"The lesson in geography has become increasingly difficult and the names of the places difficult to spell and pronounce—Korea, Hanoi, Saigon, Cam Rah Bay and Pnam Penh.

"Just as the geography lesson becomes more difficult, so, too, do the policy decisions. In retrospect, it does not seem that Woodrow Wilson or FDR had much choice, nor did they lack loyal support in World Wars I and II. But the Korean Conflict, to some extent, and the current Southeast Asian

crisis, to a large extent, involve muddled waters. Presidents Truman, Eisenhower, Kennedy, Johnson and Nixon seem to have been almost involuntarily drawn into the quick sand of partial wars of questionable objectives. But all of these have resulted in loss of life and fallen heroes. As Garfield said, 'Heroes asleep on the nation's heart—entombed in the nation's love.'

"As we stand here to honor these fallen heroes, the words of Abraham Lincoln come back again and again:

"We here must be rededicated to the great task that lies before us, that these dead shall not have died in vain, that this nation, under God, shall have a new birth of freedom . . ."

"How are we to rededicate ourselves and to what? "Should we dedicate ourselves to asking the president to withdraw all troops everywhere tomorrow and proclaim peace on earth, goodwill toward men? "But how can the president ignore such facts as that just this month Russia has installed 22 surface to air missiles (SAM-3s) on

the west bank of the Suez Canal! Military strategists call this the boldest coup of recent times. Not only have they installed 22, which by the way are manned exclusively by Soviets, but they have 23 more under construction, 17 more projected, for a total of 62 by September 1, 1970! This means 480 missiles, 15,000 Soviet personnel. It means that the Russians have taken over the show on the Suez!

"As much as we would all like peace, goodwill, law and order, we know that we cannot dispense with our police force in Tawas City, so what chance is there of dispensing with a peace force, or police force, as you like it, at the world level?

"Then to what can we rededicate ourselves? We can rededicate ourselves to rebuilding our moral strength at home and abroad.

"Our enemies have kindled the spark of dissent into near anarchy, they have nurtured a disparity in incomes and savings into near social revolt, they have aggravated racial sores into open wounds.

"While recognizing these imperfections in our system and while working to continue the great progress that we have made in all fields, we must rebuild our national pride and moral fibre.

"Success, hard work, pride in accomplishment, reward for achievement—these qualities must be restored to the high pedestals they deserve.

"Abroad we must aid only the most worthy—worthy in the sense of having sufficient popular support to stand alone; worthy in the sense of a geographical position capable of being defended.

"We will rebuild our strength by successes resulting from selection of attainable targets. The enemy understands strength and success. It is basic Lenin dogma to withdraw in the face of strength and try to destroy when weaknesses are found within.

"Strength is the answer. This is the road to honoring these dead, again in Lincoln's words:

"That these dead shall not have died in vain, that this nation, under God, shall have a new birth of freedom, and that the government of the people, by the people and for the people shall not perish from the earth."

"Let us close with the famous prayer of Peter Marshall, late chaplain of the United States Senate:

"Our Father, remove from us the sophistication of our age and the skepticism that has come, like frost, to blight our faith and make it weak. Bring us back to a faith that makes men great and strong, a faith that enables us to love and to live, the faith by which we are triumphant, the faith by which alone we can walk with Thee."

Cong. Elford A. Cederberg, 10th congressional district, announced Tuesday that the Social Security Administration is expanding its service in Tawas City and Iosco County effective July 2.

The Social Security Administration's present schedule of sending two representatives to the Iosco County Building on a biweekly schedule has occasionally resulted

in callers experiencing delays in receiving service.

The administration hopes to avoid these delays by having two representatives available at the county building every Thursday.

"I hope the residents of this area, who have matters concerning the Social Security Administration, will take advantage of this new service," said Congressman Cederberg.

Would Name Park Honoring Dillon

Tentative plans for a new city park to be named in honor of Thomas Dillon, East Tawas volunteer fireman who was killed last month, was presented at Monday night's East Tawas Council meeting.

Appearing before the council was Deloise (Dewey) Durant, a member of the city park commission.

The park is to be located on Wadsworth Street, bounded by Woodlawn and Smith Streets. It would include facilities for junior league baseball or softball. Dillon had been active in the community's summer recreational program as a manager and coach.

Durant said that the commission was applying for state recreational funds to aid in construction of the park.

In other business, the council authorized negotiating a new contract to provide fire protection for Baldwin Township. The old contract expired April 1, 1962.

A construction program by the city to coincide with work by the county road commission on Tawas Beach Road was announced by City Supt. Paul Ropert. The city is to construct 2,000 feet of bituminous surface to the city limit.

Ropert is to meet with the council's finance committee to study purchase of a bulldozer and trailer for use at the Tawas Area Sanitary Landfill.

Michigan Bell Telephone Company requested permission from the city to install an underground cable from its central headquarters at 309 Tawas Street to a point west of Tawas River. The council gave its permission, with the understanding that the east bank of the river is the city limit. A river

crossing would require permission from the state.

The council adopted an ordinance governing use of property maintained by the East Tawas Park and Recreation Board. The ordinance prohibits entry on such property between the hours of midnight and 6:00 p. m., except on designated camping areas.

Charles Schreck, ordinance committee chairman, announced that a snowmobile ordinance had been prepared and would be submitted at the June 15 meeting.

Bids are to be accepted at the next meeting for a fire truck chassis. This is to be followed by acceptance of bids on June 22 for purchase of a fire truck body and equipment.

One Candidate for TA Board of Education

Only one candidate is listed on the June 8 ballot to fill the trustee vacancy on Tawas Area Board of Education.

Filing petitions for the annual school election was Robert W. Elliott, who has served one term on the board of education.

There are no propositions listed on the ballot. Polls open at 7:00 a. m. and close at 8:00 p. m.

The Alabaster polling place has been eliminated and voters of that township are to cast ballots at the Tawas City Hall.

Other polling places are located at the city hall in East Tawas and Tawas Township Hall.







In addition, a proposal to sell 1.6 million dollars worth of bonds to build a new high school, to meet the increasing growth on a more permanent basis, will appear on the ballot.

Polls will be located in the school gymnasium and will be open from 7:00 a. m. to 8:00 p. m.

148 Students Get Diplomas Thursday Night at Tawas Area High School

One hundred thirty-one students began their commencement week march Sunday night during baccalaureate services at Tawas Area High School. The class of 1970 will mark its final graduation ceremony Thursday night, June 4, 8:00 p. m., with commencement exercises at the high school auditorium.

grove, moved to the position of chief administrator of the airplane school at Ford Motor Company, was promoted to director of psychological testing services for Ford.

He became director of community school service in the demonstration research program of the Michigan Department of Education in 1946, then became chief of higher education and assistant superintendent for general education.

He is a part-time lecturer at Michigan State University and the University of Texas, author of numerous professional articles in the field of education and chairman of numerous commissions and committees appointed by the State Board of Education.

He is a member of Phi Delta Kappa, honorary fraternity in education, and holder of several awards for distinguished educational leadership in Michigan, including the first of this kind awarded by the Michigan Council of Community College Administrators.
