Father and Daughter Die in Tragic Home Fire

Funeral services for a 48-year-old father and his three-year-old daughter, victims of a tragic fire early Saturday morning, were conducted Tuesday morning, March 10, at St. Joseph's Catholic Church, East Tawas. Burial was in the church cemetery.

Harry L. Colton and his daughter, Theresa, died at Tawas Hospital before 6:00 a. m. Saturday as the result of a fire which damaged the Colton home at 911 Smith Street, East Tawas.

Mrs. Colton, a young son, a daughter, granddaughter and a niece all escaped from the house after the son woke the family shortly after 4:00 a. m. to tell them his room was on fire.

The father went upstairs to the bedroom to bring Theresa from the room. Mr. Colton was found by firemen upstairs with the little girl in his arms.

East Tawas Fire Department answered Mrs. Colton's call and brought the blaze under control in a short time. One bedroom was damaged by fire and the remainder of the home sustained water damage.

Chief Donald Docking of the East Tawas Police Department said it was believed the fire was caused by a faulty electric heater.

The Coltons had been residents of East Tawas since 1968, when Mr. Colton was named to manage the Sears mail order store on Newman Street.

Colton was born January 31, 1922, at Grand Rapids. He was a veteran of World War II.


Theresa Colton was born May 2, 1966, at Grand Rapids.

Tawas Area Band Receives 'T' Award

Tawas Area School Senior Band received four ones, the highest possible rating, at Saturday's District IX Band and Orchestra Festival at Clare. This marks the 10th consecutive year that the Tawas band has received this top award.

The band, entering class A competition, became the first A band north of Mt. Pleasant to ever achieve this honor.

The band played "Killian" for its march, "First Suite in Eb," the class A required number and "Russian Christmas Music," as its free choice selection.

An "I" or one rating makes the band eligible to participate in the state festival which will be held April 25 at Flint.

Clare High School was host for 17 bands and over 1,000 student musicians from Whittemore-Prescott Area, Hillman, AuGres-Sims, Arenac Eastern, Hale Area, At-

lanta, Pinconning, Roscommon, Clare, Oscoda, Gladwin, Houghton Lake, Ferwell, Beaverton, Standish-Sterling and Tawas.

Adjudicators for the festival were Mac Carr, River Rouge High School; Donald Proko, Fulton High School; Ronald Smith, Cheboygan High School, and Rodney Cumberworth, Traverse City Public Schools.

"Our entering class A competition was strictly a one-year effort," states Director Gene S. Salamon. "I felt this year's band was capable of performing more difficult music and doing it correctly."

"While we had our problems, which must be corrected before performance at state, the band did live up to my expectations. The fact that we are the first band in Northern Michigan to ever receive an 'I' in class A brings added honor to our school and community."

School Seeks Ways to Better Bus Safety

A move to improve safety measures in bus loading zones at Tawas Area Schools was adopted Monday night by the board of education.

Two weeks ago, a perfect safety record came to an end with the tragic death of an elementary student, after the school had transported 13 million students and had over a million accident-free miles with its buses since reorganization of the district in 1952.

Authorization was given to hire part-time bus guards at the elementary units and the high school. Faculty members are to be utilized until guards can be hired.

Edgar Jenkins, the school's director of transportation, told board members that he had contacted a pupil transportation safety specialist at Lansing and learned that all school systems are faced with the same problem.

Jenkins said that basically there is no answer to the problem. "Edward M. McCarvey, the transportation specialist, told me that if this school district comes up with an answer to safety problems in bus loading zones, the state would like to know of it," said Jenkins.

McCarvey stated that fences, posts and chains in loading zones are most dangerous. The school had

been studying the possibility of such installation.

Since the accident two weeks ago which took the life of an elementary pupil, when she fell under the wheels of a slow-moving bus while transferring at the high school, Tawas Area has adopted a policy of holding all students in school buildings until such time as buses are in position and ready to be loaded.

Members of the faculty have assisted administrators in supervising bus loading zones.

Supt. Reynold Mick said that excellent cooperation had been shown by students and faculty members in this safety measure.

In his communication to the board, the Lansing transportation specialist said that having children wait indoors was fine during winter weather, "but what happens when the weather is warmer?" School officials said they would be open to suggestions from anyone in the community which would improve safety measures in loading zones. In the meantime, the school is to start taking application for guards, who would work about two hours each day supervising loading and unloading of students.

Set Special Session to Discuss Budget

Initial study of a proposed operational budget for the 1970-71 school year was undertaken Monday night by Tawas Area Board of Education. A special meeting of the board is to be held next Monday night, with scheduled adoption March 23 of the tentative budget to be presented to the county allocation board.

With contract negotiations not yet started for the 1970-71 school year, school financing is a guessing game at this point. The tentative budget presented Monday night by the administration had four different alternatives in total expenditures, ranging from total expenditures of \$1,001,835 with no base increase in salaries to \$1,163,826 which would represent a salary base of \$7,500, or a 10.51 percent over-all increase.

Supt. Reynold Mick told board members that advancing costs in operation had forced a five percent increase in most line items on the new budget.

Last year, the school adopted a budget of \$1,075,684. The previous year's actual expenditure was \$944,922.06.

At the present time, school finances for 1970-71 are still in the dark as no state aid bill has been adopted by the legislature. Revenues for Tawas Area Schools during 1969-70 amounted to \$1,083,490.09. This included \$420,028 in state aid and a local tax levy of \$371,888. Using the same state aid bill as adopted last year, this school district would collect approximately \$13,000 less money.

Bills now being considered in the legislature would probably benefit this school district with its provisions for extra money to those schools levying more than 10 mills locally. On the other side of the financial picture, schools may

lose federal money for federally-connected students. Tawas Area School received \$20,000 from this fund during 1969-70.

On recommendation of its school lunch committee, the board adopted a measure which would add five cents per meal to each high school student's share of the lunch program. Cost to elementary students for a weekly lunch ticket is to remain at \$1.75, while cost to secondary students would be increased to \$2.

Daily portions served to high school students would be increased, although it was stated that if food was wasted portions would be reduced accordingly.

Regardless of the increased charge for meals at the secondary level, cost of the hot lunch program will still have to be subsidized from the general fund.

The budget being considered provides for some repairs to the high school parking lot and for gymnasium floors. It will allow for purchase of paint and materials and for maintenance of buildings to a limited extent.

Assault Under Investigation

Assault of a 19-year-old Hale man, allegedly by two Plainfield Township men Sunday night, is under investigation by Iosco Sheriff's Department.

Hospitalized at West Branch is Thomas Kesler. Sheriff's officers said that Kesler was struck over the head with a flashlight after his snowmobile was stopped on Curtis Road. According to officers, the road had been blocked by a pickup truck.

East Tawas Woman Bound Over on Murder Warrant

Phyllis Isabelle Colegrove of East Tawas, also known as Phyllis Isabelle Perkins, waived examination when arraigned in district court Saturday morning and was bound over to Iosco Circuit Court on a charge of second degree murder. Bond was continued at \$20,000 and she is being held at the county jail.

According to a warrant issued by Kenneth Myles, Iosco County prosecuting attorney, the 59-year-old woman is charged with killing and murdering Thomas Perkins with a rifle.

Donald Docking, East Tawas police chief, said that Perkins' body was found at his home at 407 Tawas Street about 10:15 o'clock Wednesday night.

Police were notified of the shooting by other persons at the Perkins residence.

An autopsy report attributed Perkins' death to a gunshot wound. A .32 caliber rifle slug was recovered outside the building. It is believed the slug passed through the wall of the residence.

Funeral service for Perkins was held Saturday afternoon, March 7.

Manpower Change May Help WAFB, Reports Cederberg

Const. Elford A. Cederberg, Bay City, 10th Congressional District, announced Thursday that manpower adjustments resulting from the fiscal year 1971 budget reduction for Wurtsmith Air Force Base include an increase of 116 military personnel and a decrease of 40 civilian persons.

The net result of these manpower changes, said Cederberg, is an increase of 76 positions at the base near Oscoda.

Discuss Iosco's Park Plans

Thirty-five persons attended a meeting last Thursday night at the Federal Building, East Tawas, concerning future plans for Iosco recreational facilities.

The meeting was conducted by Wilbur C. Roach, chairman of the Iosco Planning Commission.

Myron Smith, Tawas District ranger, outlined plans for cycle and snowmobile trails in the Huron National Forest and told of future development of Lumbermen's Monument. This \$300,000 project is now competing with 105 other projects in national forests for funding.

It was reported that a comprehensive county plan must be completed by October 1971, in order for Iosco to become eligible for federal funds.

County Agent Marvin Davenport, chairman of the county park commission, explained Iosco's park system. He encouraged each community to meet with the commission to outline exactly what is wanted in parks.




The first two minutes of the second half saw Hale go ahead by 12, then by 18 and the game was all but over. The Cards never got closer than 12 points the rest of the way.


Fox was Tawas' top scorer with 12 points, followed by 10 points for Craig Wilkins. Tarras had 14 points for the winners.



Many Red Cross Services Provided

The American Red Cross works year around in this area. The blood bank program, although a very important function of the Red Cross, is but one of many different benefits to the community.

Another function of the Red Cross is the water safety and first aid program. In this kind of many lakes and much water, one might think this would be strictly a summer program. Not so, for there is an adult swimming program, started in September 1969, which has a complete swimming course from beginner through life saving.

This program is conducted at Oscoda Area High School swimming pool with Mrs. Leonard Hintz of East Tawas and Dondra Kirk of Wurtsmith as instructors. The class now has a total enrollment of 52 adults, more than double the enrollment last year.

An advanced Red Cross first aid training course is now being presented at Tawas Hospital with approximately 14 persons in the class. The only prerequisite for this course is for the participant to have taken the standard Red Cross first aid course, procedures of which were reviewed by film February 4.

Starting February 24, the advanced course is to concentrate on artificial respiration, cardiac massage, fractures, methods of how to stop bleeding and the transporting of seriously ill or injured patients from home to the hospital.

Primary reason for having the course at the hospital is to train not only those persons interested in advanced first aid, but those who are seeking ambulance attendant licenses. Instructors for this course are Frank Wilkusi and Roy Shedenhelm of East Tawas.

Entry blanks have been mailed to art instructors of schools throughout Michigan for distribution to students interested in competing in the contest.

In addition to a cash prize of \$50 for the first place winner, a trophy will be awarded to his or her school. The winning design will also be exhibited at fair conventions throughout the United States. Second and third place winners will receive cash awards of \$35 and \$25.

Dow Receives Grant to Develop New Algaecide

Dow Chemical Company has been awarded a research and development contract by the Federal Water Pollution Control Administration to develop a way to help maintain the balance of vegetative and fish life in lakes.

As a lake ages, it undergoes changes. Run-off from the watershed contributes nutrients which increase vegetation growing in lakes. Eventually, the vegetation growth can fill the lake.

The contract, valued at \$64,883, is for a period of one year. The objective is to initiate the research and development of a selective algaecide to control nuisance algae resulting from eutrophication of lakes.

Dow scientists hope to develop a chemical material which will safely control the growth of blue-green algae economically and which will have no undesirable impact on other life in the aquatic environment.

The chemical material, known as an algaecide, would have the following properties: Safety to non-target organisms, high degree of specificity, economical, safety to applicators, non-persistent.


