Matthews Named Chief of Hale PO

Richard Matthews, 44, is the new officer in charge of the Hale post office, succeeding Robert Pember. Notification of the appointment effective March 13 was received last Thursday.

Matthews started with the postal service at Hale in 1950, serving first as a substitute carrier and be-

came a clerk in 1959 under Postmaster David Bernard.

Originally from Hastings, he attended school in that community and served two years in the United States Army. He came to the Hale area in 1946.

He and his wife, Georgia, are the parents of two children and they have five grandchildren.

Public Hearing Set on Drainage Dist.

Harmon Williams, chairman of the steering committee on the Tri-County Drainage District of the Au Gres River basin, announces that a public hearing for preliminary investigation is to be held Thursday, April 2, at the Whittemore-Prescott Area High School, 8:00 p. m.

This will be held to evaluate the local interest and support for the project for the governor. The Michigan Soil Conservation Committee will then decide on behalf of the governor to approve or disapprove the project.

The local representative of the state soil conservation committee is Harry Krueger, Iosco County farmer.

Steps taken to date to promote a PL 566 small watershed project have been identifying of the problem after two bad floods in the summer of 1969 and a long history of floods. The Arenac Soil Conservation District initiated an application for a PL 566 project. This was subsequently signed by the Arenac Board of Commissioners, Arenac Drain Office, Iosco SCD, Iosco Drain Commissioner John Mielock, the Ogemaw SCD and the Ogemaw Drain Office.

On October 18, 1969, application was received in the field by the watershed review committee of the state conservation committee. On February 24, an information meeting was held at the Whittemore school, after which the steering committee, passing unanimously upon the motion made by James Sturtevant, and seconded by Leo Bergeron of the Ogemaw Drain Commission, that a letter be sent to the state soil conservation committee, asking for a public hearing.

Col. Hudson to Command 40th Air Div.

Col. Eugene L. Hudson has been named as the new commander of the 40th Air Division at Wurtsmith Air Force Base, according to an announcement Tuesday by Cong. Elford A. Cedarberg.

A brigadier general selectee, Hudson is to report to Wurtsmith not later than April 20. He currently commands the 42nd Bomb Wing, Strategic Air Command, at Loring Air Force Base, Maine.

Tax Collection Report Today for Co. Commissioners

A report on the 1969 tax collection in this county is to be made today (Wednesday) at the March session of the Iosco County Board of Commissioners.

County Treas. Edward Nelkie reports that he completed settlement Friday with treasurers of the various townships and cities in the county.

In reviewing tax collections with Osoda Township treasurer, Mrs. Florence Krefelt, it was found that the total tax levy for that unit in 1969 was \$648,937.46. When Mrs. Krefelt was elected to that position in 1956, the total levy was \$201,318.45.

Thirteen years ago, Osoda Township had 2,000 property descriptions, as compared to 5,200 in 1969. Much of this expansion has come during the past two years with development of the new Lakewood Shores Subdivision, five miles north of Osoda.

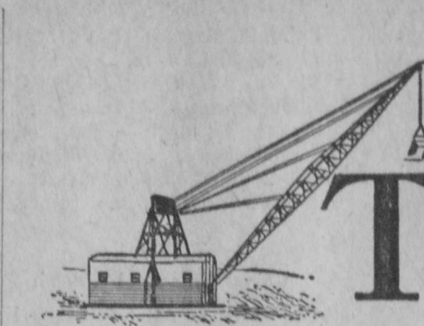
There will be election of officers for a one-year term and seven new directors will be elected to serve a three-year term.

DNR Budget May be Cut

Tawas River Salmon Weir Uncertain

Operation of a salmon-trapping weir on the Tawas River this fall may hinge on 1970 finances of the Michigan Department of Natural Resources.

In a meeting Monday night with the Tawas City Council, John MacGregor, regional fish supervisor, told councilmen that the state legislature had directed the DNR to come up with program cuts in order to reduce the department's budget. Should the program be cut by five percent, it could mean that District Biologist Gary Schnieke would not have the manpower to operate a weir here to remove surplus salmon.

A formal resolution from the council Monday night requested that the DNR operate a weir at the same location utilized last year, as well as closing the river to all fishing from the lake to the weir from September 1 to November 1.

While noting there were only a few trespassing complaints last season, councilmen feared that there would be a flood of complaints from private property owners this fall should the fishing ban be removed on the river during the salmon run.

MacGregor said he was most optimistic that the DNR would not have a five percent cut in its budget, although he stressed the possibility was of great concern to the department.

If it is not possible to operate a weir here this fall, MacGregor said he did not look for any serious problem. To the contrary, he expected to "see people having a lot of fun on the river."

In reviewing DNR plans for Lake Huron, MacGregor said that the AuSable River would be treated this spring for suppression of the sea lamprey. He said the basic objective for Lake Huron was to restore it for sport and commercial fishing.

A change in philosophy by Michigan in regard to planting Lake Huron has not met with the ap-

proval of Canadian authorities. Twenty-one years ago, Ontario and Michigan entered into an agreement to rehabilitate Lake Huron with splake—a cross between the lake trout and brook trout. A weir was developed by the Canadians, but this program was challenged two years ago by Michigan. State authorities were unsuccessful in removing Michigan from the splake program.

MacGregor said Lake Huron is now at a point where the sea lamprey is under control, but cannot plant lake trout in the lake because of its agreement with Canada.

Canada provided splake for stocking by the DNR and out of 50,000 planted, only 4,000 survived. A new batch of splake eggs furnished by Canada is now in the Jordan River hatchery and Michigan will again have a brood stock by 1972.

Because of Ontario's interest in splake, Michigan has run into a conflict with its fish planting program. In 1970, the state will plant 200,000 steelheads, 44,000 splake and upward of 100,000 domestic rainbow trout. Its salmon program in these waters will include 100,000 coho salmon planted this spring in the Tawas River. Last year, 200,000 salmon were planted here.

MacGregor said Canada had asked for a moratorium on planting of coho, but at the same time was gearing its commercial fishing industry to harvest even larger quantities of coho this year than last. As a result of this expanded operation by Canadian commercial fishermen, catches of coho in the Tawas River and other streams on Lake Huron is not expected to be much greater than in 1969.

MacGregor said an estimated 10,000 coho returned to the Tawas River last fall, but catches by fishermen were low in Tawas Bay. He admitted that the DNR had a number of problems here early in

the season. Because of an engineering mistake in the weir, coupled with vandalism, about 5,000 salmon escaped through the weir. He said that a nice sport fishery

developed in the upper part of Tawas River and only two complaints were received from private property owners concerning trespassing. It was MacGregor's opinion that

a weir was not really necessary this year, believing the fish would not congregate in the river—except in holes. He said that the state legislature had expressed its

displeasure over operation of weirs in the state. The state removed nearly 5,000 salmon from its weir here last fall, but MacGregor said he was in favor of a harvest by fishermen. Fish taken here were heavily scarred by sea lamprey and were not included in the DNR's give-away program, which saw about 5,000 Lake Michigan salmon distributed here on two separate days last November.

Ald. Howard Hutton said it was his personal opinion that allowing salmon to run into Tawas Lake would destroy trout fishing in Cold Creek and Silver Creek, as well as adding a pollutant to the water of Tawas Lake after the fish die. He said that the main problem was that visiting fishermen did not understand, or care, if they were trespassing on private property along the Tawas River and that owners wished to prevent crumbling of river banks and subsequent erosion.

MacGregor said that after a written communication from the council is received, he would do all in his power to insure operation of a salmon weir here next fall.

At the suggestion of the council, the DNR is to plant coho this spring after the smelt run. During the past two years, coho have been planted immediately prior to the smelt run. This forced closing the river to fishing, but was very difficult to control because of the influx of fishermen.

T. City Ends Year in Good Standing

Excellent finances by the City of Tawas during the past 12 months was indicated Monday by the year-end report of Mrs. Mary Byrd, city treasurer.

Total revenues of the city during the year ending March 10 amounted to \$155,668.59. Total expenditures during this period amounted to \$148,360.20, with no accounts payable at the end of the year. A year ago, the city had accounts payable of \$11,723.

A breakdown of disbursements included \$109,782.55 for the general fund and \$45,886.04 for the street fund.

Taxes collected during the past year amounted to \$60,980.85, with \$2,583.36 being delinquent. Mrs. Byrd said that delinquent taxes were slightly higher than anticipated, but slight increases in other revenue made up for this loss.

The council had adopted a budget of \$152,408 last April and expenditures did not exceed this, despite the fact that there were several unforeseen expenses during the year.

Balance in the city treasury at the end of the year amounted to \$21,280.17, with \$7,476.69 in the general fund and \$13,803.48 in the street fund. A transfer of \$7,500 was made to the street fund when the city's contractor was unable to perform 1969 street construction. This work is to be included in the 1970 program.

East Tawas Enforces Gas Heater Ordinance

East Tawas authorities have shut off natural gas service to a private residence because of non-compliance with the city's ordinance controlling installation of heating equipment.

A letter read at Monday night's meeting of the city council said that Michigan Consolidated Gas Company had asked the customer

to vent a gas heater which had been installed in the residence.

A serviceman for the gas company was allegedly refused entry into the dwelling to disconnect the heater. The letter stated that the property owner threatened court action if the gas company shut off service at the street. The gas company advised the

city last week that such installation without proper venting was dangerous to occupants of the residence and was in conflict with the city's ordinance.

The East Tawas Department of Public Works gave the owner until Friday, March 13, to comply with the ordinance.

It was reported Monday night that when no action was taken by the owner to vent the heater, City Supt. Paul Roper and Police Chief Donald Docking shut off the gas service at the street.

In other business Monday night, the council authorized the DPW to purchase metal dividers to be installed in the parking lot east of Newman Street between Bay Street and Westover.

Purchase of an inhalator by the fire department was authorized. Robert Marx, secretary of the department, was given authority to check prices and make the purchase after checking with the mayor.

Audit of the city park commission was approved by the council. Application to remove a building at 509 Evans, requested by Mrs. Ruth McClean, was approved.

TC to Survey Stop Signs on Street

Possible removal of one of two four-way stop intersections on Fifth Avenue is to be studied by the Tawas City Council's street committee.

In submitting a resolution for removal of stop signs on Fifth Avenue at Second Street, later withdrawn after discussion, Ald. Howard Hatton said he was of the opinion that Fifth Avenue was an important through street and that traffic on this street should not be forced to stop three times in four blocks. His idea was supported by Ald. John St. James, currently serving as mayor pro tem during the absence of Mayor Russell A. Rollin.

The four-way stop at this intersection, along with a stop sign on Fifth Avenue at its intersection with Mathews Street, has been in effect for many years. Following a fatal accident about three years ago at the intersection of Fifth Avenue and First Street, this intersection was made a four-way stop.

Police Chief George Westcott said he was not in favor of removing stop signs on Fifth Avenue at Second Street as he believed they served as a deterrent to accidents. He reported that he could not recall a single accident at the intersection and believed that the four-way stop was the reason.

It was Hatton's opinion that because of the three stops in four blocks, traffic utilized streets other than Fifth Avenue. Plans this year call for major improvement to the surface of Fifth Avenue.

In other business, the council's finance committee has scheduled a meeting to prepare a budget to be submitted to the council at its first meeting in April. A public hearing on the budget is to be held April 20.

Hugo Keiser of the Tawas City Businessmen's Association appeared before the council and re-

quested city participation in the purchase of Christmas decorations and street welcome banners. The city and businessmen had cooperated in a program of purchasing Christmas decorations in April 1966. Approval was given to budget \$400 as the city's share on a matching basis.

A report from the cemetery board stated that 28 graves had been purchased during the past year and that there were 18 burials. A new 20-grave plot was opened last year and a new section is to be developed in 1970.

Building applications approved during the past two weeks included: Mrs. Amelia Oates, 1010 First Street, new roof, \$461; John Hoshbach, 300 Third Avenue, remodel with second story addition, \$6,850.

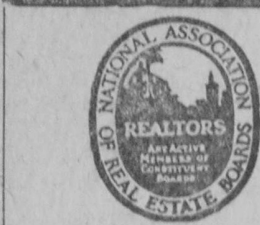

JAMES STURTEVANT, dairy farmer and Soil Conservation District director, feels that the study on a PL 566 project for the Tri-County Drainage District of the AuGres River basin should be carried out to the point where feasibility can be determined. He is a believer in recreation which comes from the word recreate - "to make new again." This is important for water, forests, grass and, also, for people, states Sturtevant.

"They need to rest and change, to become refreshed and new again." Because of this, he feels that this study would find out the potential for recreation, flood control and pollution abatement in the AuGres basin. "The farmers need relief from floods on the cropland and the river cleaned up from silting and organic waste," Sturtevant said.

Answer Questions on Social Security

Question: I am nearly 65 and considering retirement. I understand I must have a birth certificate but I found out my birth was not recorded. What can I do?

Answer: It is true that a birth record established shortly after your birth is the best record, but we will use other evidence. An infant baptismal record can be used if it was before age five the same as a birth certificate. You may be able to get a school record where you first attended school. We often use federal census records as the best evidence. You might well ask for a 1910 census record if you were born before 1910. Incidentally, this is a census year and though the 1970 census will not help in your case, it might well be the record of age for someone born now. The census records are used for many purposes. We in social security hope everyone will help by completing the census forms promptly.

Questions: I am still working but cannot decide whether to retire without knowing the amount of my benefit. Can I get this information from social security?

Answer: You certainly can. If you will call at the Social Security Office, 1009 North Madison, Bay City, or at the Isoco County Building, Tawas City, when our representative is there, you can start the procedure. If you want a complete up-to-date statement, a copy of your 1969 W-2 (withholding certificate) will be needed. A copy of the 1969 tax return will be needed for the self-employed. Please bring a record of your social security number with you. A social security representative will be at the Isoco County Building March 26 from 9:45 a. m. to 3:00 p. m.

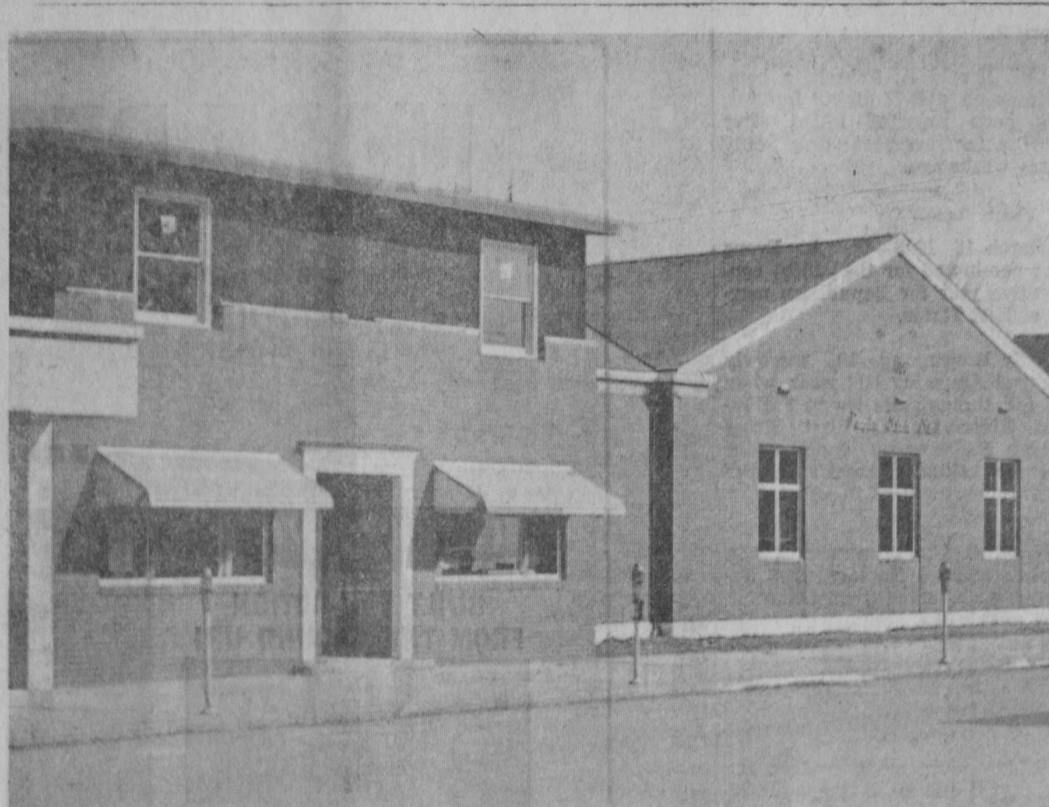
