

Public Hearing April 2 on Drainage District

In view of the public hearing of the tricity AuGres water shed basin to be held at Whittemore-Prescott Area High School Thursday, April 2, 8:00 p. m., Harmon Williams, chairman of the three-county steering committee, and Al Bishop of the Michigan Soil Conservation Service point out some of the steps and procedures to be

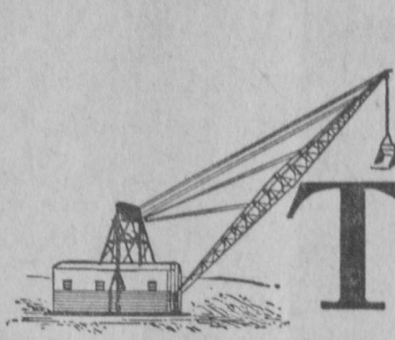
considered under the small water shed act. "This law (PL 566) can act as a vehicle whereby local people with a flooding problem can cooperate with state and federal agencies, with the support and understanding of a majority of land owners and citizens in the tricity water shed area," said Williams.

He points out that such a project could fulfill many purposes, including flood prevention, agricultural water management, drainage and irrigation, proper land use, municipal and industrial water supply (present and future), recreation, fish and wildlife development.

Three points upon which such a project must be based are outlined by Williams as follows: 1. Local initiative and responsibility through the soil conservation districts and other sponsors; 2. State review and approval of the local proposals and opportunity of state financial and other assistance; 3. Federal technical cost-sharing and credit assistance.

"The second point has been covered in part by the state and will be further discussed at the hearing Thursday, April 2, at Whittemore-Prescott Area School," said Williams.

The third point will start with technical assistance from the soil conservation service in a preliminary study, if the public hearing is favorable, at no cost to the local people. "If this study proves favorable, it will be necessary for local people to form an intercounty drainage district to implement the development of a work plan, hold the necessary hearings, manage the contracts and maintain the project." Hear Engineering Report

Airport Expansion Tabled by County

Action on proposed expansion of the Iosco County Airport has been tabled for the present by the Iosco County Board of Commissioners. A detailed engineering report was presented at the March meeting of the commissioners. This included construction of a new north-south runway as well as lengthening and widening of the present east-west runway.

In order to secure state and federal funds to assist with this project, application would have to be made by April 1 to have funds by July 1, 1971. Local funds are not presently available, but commissioners indicated that an expenditure would be included in the new county budget for this purpose.

It was the recommendation of the county's engineering firm that a master plan be developed for the airport. Cost of this would be \$10,000, which would be credited to the county's account in matching state and federal funds.

Phases of this development would include a master plan, development of detailed construction plans and supervision of construction by the engineering firm. It was the recommendation of the engineer that a new north-south runway be considered. Cost of this 2,400-foot by 75-foot runway would be about \$180,000. The county's share would be about \$45,000.

Extension of the east-west runway would be in the neighborhood of \$280,000. The engineer stated that a need for the east-west runway expansion had not been indicated as yet, although the north-south runway was needed as a safety factor.

In other business, commissioners learned that the department of commerce would be unable to provide financial assistance to this county during the current fiscal year for comprehensive planning under the 701 program. The department's budget has been reduced by 40 percent, which is inadequate to meet all needs in this state.

A letter was read from Pros. Atty. Kenneth Myles stating that it was his opinion that John St. James could hold his appointive position as a member of the Iosco Welfare Board. It was stated at the last meeting that St. James is an elected official of Tawas City and holding the appointive office would be a conflict of interest. Myles stated that there had never been an attorney general's opinion in the matter and recommended that no action be taken by commissioners.

Representatives of the Michigan Deer Hunters Association, Incorporated, appeared before the commission and requested that an advisory ballot be placed before Iosco voters concerning the any-deer season of the Michigan Department of Natural Resources. County Clerk Keith Pappas advised that he had contacted state election officials concerning this matter and learned that tax money could not be used for this purpose unless petitions were filed at the state level. He said, however, that a public opinion poll could be conducted during an election, but cost of printing or counting ballots could not be borne by the county.

Henry Gage, civil defense director, announced that an instructional meeting was to be held March 25 for department head and commissioners, while county employees were to receive civil defense instruction on March 26. School officials are to attend a similar instructional meeting on April 9.

Approvals of the planning commission were approved as follows: Ira Scofield, Hale; Ralph Western, East Tawas; William Smith, East Tawas.

The commission adopted a resolution seeking legislation to change the maximum number of registered voters in a precinct from 400 to 600. Effective after the April city elections, voting precincts using paper ballots may not contain more than 400 voters. This will mean added expense to townships and cities as additional election boards will be required.

Approval was given to receive bids for purchase of an air conditioning unit for the county micro-filming department, new carpeting for the living quarters of the jail and a new cook stove for the jail.

The commission adopted a resolution directing the prosecuting attorney to prepare a legal document which would lease the Osoda Township Park to the county. This would place operation under the county recreation committee and would provide funds for improvement.

The commission approved a \$400 appropriation to pay the contractor for maintenance on VanEtan Lake Dam. The commission then instructed the treasurer to collect \$300 now held by Osoda Township in its special assessment fund. The commission reiterated its previous stand that such maintenance should be borne by the special assessment district and instructed the drain commissioner to make a levy this year.

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New Budget Reflects Hike in Operation

An operational budget calling for an expenditure of \$1,131,619 during 1970-71 was adopted Monday night by Tawas Area Board of Education. This budget is to be submitted to the Iosco Allocation Board, which is to hold its initial meeting in April to distribute 15 mills of taxes between the county, townships and schools.

Tawas Area School's budget for the next term is \$55,935 higher than its budget submitted last year and \$186,697 higher than the actual expenditure in 1968-69.

A summary of the budget shows increases in 10 categories and a reduction in one category.

Elementary cost of \$345,038 is up \$18,827, while secondary instruction of \$480,690 is up \$26,280. These are the two major categories which include teacher salaries.

Others include community school, \$23,154, up \$1,445; administration, \$40,010, up \$3,010; health service, \$510, up \$10; transportation, \$84,962, up \$3,112; operation, \$91,515, up \$1,175; fixed charges, \$36,750, up \$6,300; community services, \$700, up \$76; capitol outlay, \$5,000, up \$1,000.

The one decrease is in maintenance, \$23,300, a decrease of \$5,300.

On the revenue side of the budget, the state aid formula is still unknown and may not be determined until after the allocation board meeting. The school district's valuation will be determined in April.

Using the same state aid formula as last year, Tawas Area School would receive approximately \$421,624. The local tax levy, based on nine mills received from the allocation board and 4.5 mills approved by voters, would bring in \$632,734. Although a higher valuation can be expected this year, the district is at the point where state aid decreases with an increase in valuation.

Other major revenues include \$40,000 for transportation aid, the same as last year; \$5,000 for driver training, the same as last year; \$10,000 for special education teacher, same as last year; \$4,400 for adult education director, same as last year.

It is expected that the school will not receive funds for federally impacted students or under the National Defense Education Act. This amounted to \$20,000 for the former two years ago and \$2,000 in NDEA funds.

First place winners received a dictionary and a certificate of merit went to second place winners. Awards were supplied by The Detroit Free Press.

School May Renew Student Publication

Investigation into publication of Tawas Area School's newspaper, "The Warhoop," which was discontinued two years ago during the school's austerity program, is to be made by administrators with possible reinstatement next fall.

This action, along with possible hiring of a journalism teacher, was authorized Monday night by the board of education.

Discussion on a school newspaper was brought about by the request of several students who desired to distribute a "student newspaper" at the school.

Attending Monday night's meeting were Robert Eppert, Blaise Klenow, Russell Besancon and Charles Conn.

Besancon told board members that the proposed newspaper would initiate free thought to the student and that any ideas on any subject would be published. Needless obscenity would be omitted he said, and teachers, as well as students, would be invited to contribute in any way.

Permission to distribute the newspaper at the school was refused because the newspaper would not be school-sponsored and that persons writing articles would not be answerable to anyone.

The students stated they had signatures of 160 persons interested in writing articles for their proposed newspaper. It was stated that an editor was not desired because articles would only represent his views and that everyone should be encouraged to write.

It was the opinion of board members that someone on the school faculty or administration would have to be responsible for editing and publishing of a newspaper. Administrators are to investigate reinstatement of a journalism program here next year.

Delinquent Tax Report by Treasurer

Out of a total tax levy of \$571,488.02 in 1969 for county purposes, \$62,352.17 was returned as delinquent, according to a report from County Treas. Edward Nelkie.

Tax collection in the various townships and cities amounted to \$509,136.45, with the following breakdown: County general fund, \$407,309.16; Iosco Medical Care Facility, \$21,215.72; Iosco Intermediate School District, \$16,969.51; Iosco Intermediate School special education, \$63,642.06.

Total school tax levy for 1969 was \$1,322,752.27, of which \$143,145.53 was returned as delinquent. A breakdown according to school districts was as follows: Tawas Area School tax levy, \$577,198.90 with \$59,938.54 returned as delinquent; Osoda Area School tax levy, \$467,748.77, with \$53,848.23 returned as delinquent; Whittemore-Prescott Area School tax levy, \$292,611.93, with \$6,390.23 returned as delinquent; Hale Area School tax levy, \$185,192.67, with \$22,968.53 returned as delinquent.

The total township tax levy for 1969 was \$262,000.46, of which \$29,922.93 was returned as delinquent.

ects when completed," stated the steering committee chairman.

In such a project that may have flood benefits, agricultural water management, fish and wildlife, municipal and industrial water supply, administrative cost for contracts would be a local responsibility, as well as water, land easements and right-of-way, according to Bishop.

However, money for site preservation could be borrowed to be repaid with interest, land easements and rights-of-way for recreation, fish and wildlife, with federal participation of 50 percent or less from the federal government and 50 percent or more from the local area.

Under the flood prevention provision of the act, construction would be borne 100 percent by the federal government as well as engineering costs. Agricultural water management construction would be financed through a 50-50 cost sharing by the federal and local governments.

Bishop further stated that recreation, fish and wildlife developments are financed 50 percent or less through federal funds and 50 percent or more for local construction. This is of much interest to park commissions and the Michigan Department of Natural Resources in developments of this type in the community and as this takes in minimum basic facilities. Engineering services are again a wholly federal input.

The use of area for municipal and industrial water supply is entirely a local expenditure, with advancement of funds, if necessary, but would have to be repaid. Under the present ACP program, extra money could be allocated to the area to speed up land treatment.

"After the project is approved by the Michigan Soil Conservation Committee acting for the governor, the work on planning will start," stated Bishop. "SCS service technicians will meet with sponsors, members of the steering committee and local people to outline the described protection and scope of the project. Periodically, the SCS will meet with the local people and discuss the project, indicating project construction. The local sponsoring organizations of the United States Department of Agriculture must mutually agree on the final work plan before construction can start."

In concluding, Chairman Williams said that if the study shows promise, local people will have to form a body to hold hearings, accept the proposal with sponsors, let contracts and spread assessments.

"This procedure, though lengthy and slow, lets the people know of the benefits and have a hand in each step towards completion of a project," he stated.

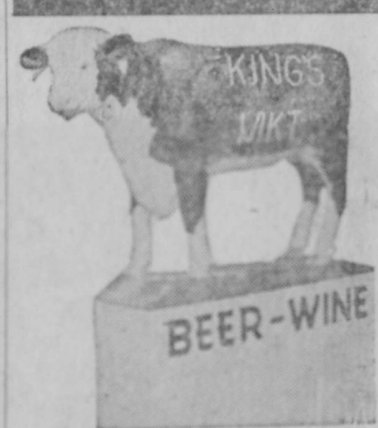

Hale Area School Seeks Millage Hike

Due to increases in enrollment causing the addition of three more teachers (including special education), renting and leasing rooms, rising operational costs and a decreasing percentage of support from state and federal sources, Hale Area School will ask for an increase in operational millage for the 1970-71 school year.

The exact amount has not been determined as yet to be placed on the ballot for the annual June election, according to Supt. Paul Southerland.

The estimated increase for next year at Hale Area School will be about 40 students. "Projected enrollment figures have always been low," stated the superintendent.

Even though the enrollment goes up and the school district's property valuation increases, the deductible millage clause in the state aid formula has caused less state support of the operational budget.

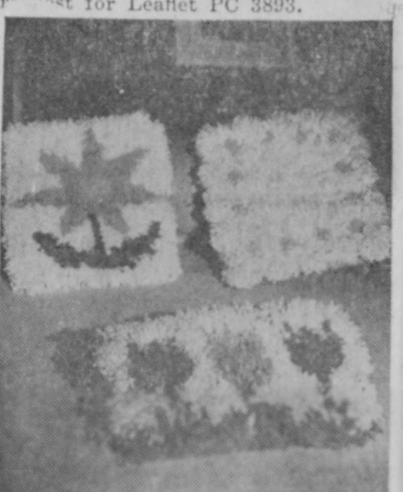

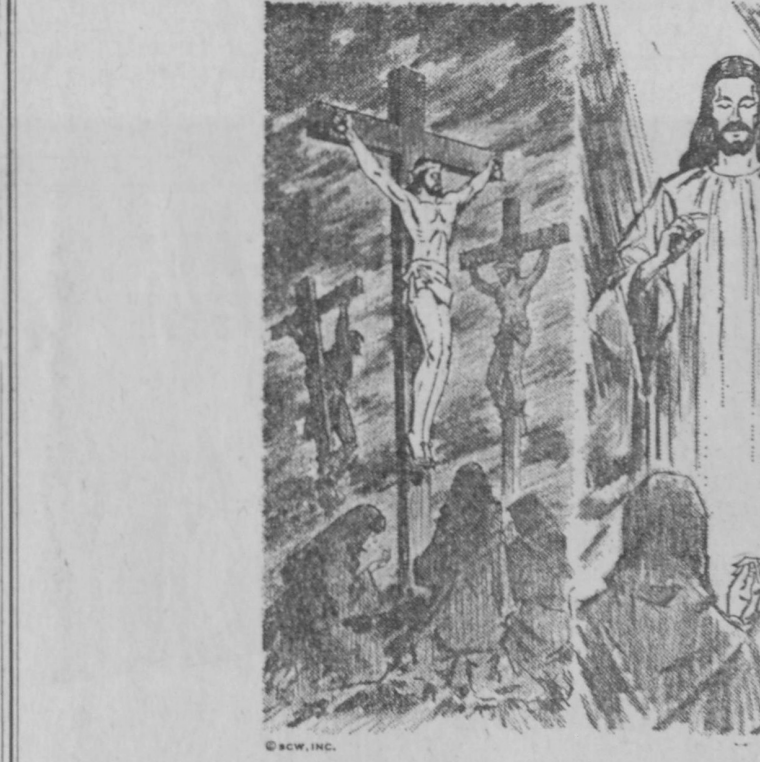

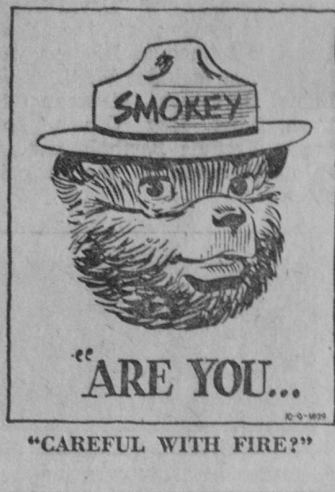

Learn More About Social Security

Question: I will be 65 in May and I received a letter from the Social Security Office to sign up for Medicare. I am still working and have private insurance so why should I sign up until I retire?

Answer: There are a number of reasons for signing up now.

(1) You have only from February 1 through August 31 in your original enrollment period. If you are to be covered under medical insurance in May you will have to sign up by April 30.

(2) You will find after signing up for Medicare, your private insurance premium reduction will more than offset the cost of medical insurance.

(3) You will have established your age so that when you retire, benefits can be started by merely advising social security when you retire.

(4) Many people find they are eligible for some cash benefits even though they continue working. These are only some of the reasons for signing up now.

Question: I retired in May 1969. I earned over \$2,000 up to May. Must I really make a report of my 1969 earnings when I have already told social security what my earnings were when I retired?

Answer: Yes, you still have to make an annual report by April 15 or take a chance of losing a month's benefits. Your statement when you retired may well have been only an estimate. We want to have an exact figure now. Furthermore, your original statement may not have included vacation pay or some other payment you did not think of when you gave us your earnings up to retirement. Your representative will be at the Josco County Building, Tawas City, on the second and fourth Thursday of each month from 9:45 a. m. to 3:00 p. m.

'Kite-Eating' Wires Can Be Dangerous to Charlie Browns

In the language of bird watchers, a kite is a predator, a pest that makes smaller birds fear for their lives. In the language of electric utilities, a kite is another kind of high-flying pest, equally as dangerous to small children as its namesake is to small fowl.

Consumers Power Company's Tawas area manager, Gordon Huck, has issued an alert to youngsters flying kites in the vicinity of electrical wires.

"Each spring," says Huck, "we experience a sharp increase in calls concerning youngsters flying kites near electric poles and wires."

Added to the normal concern

for safety this year is the problem of a new kite which has been advertised extensively on television. According to the advertisement, the kite can be manipulated while airborne so that it rests temporarily on high objects like electrical wire or transformers. Following industry protests, the advertisement was withdrawn, but it is feared that the image has been left with youngsters who viewed it.

The company is distributing kite flying safety rules to the schools in this area. Huck asks parents and teachers to pass on the rules to children before their kites get tangled in electric equipment.

The company's suggestions for

fail-safe flying:

1. Fly your kite away from streets and highways.

2. Fly your kite away from electric wires, telephone wires and television antennas.

3. Do not use a kite which is made with metal parts.

4. Use cloth or plastic string to fly your kite. Metal or wire strings are very dangerous.

5. Always fly your kite on days when there is no rain.

The safety rules, in poster form, are being distributed by Consumers Power to all schools in this area.
