## Bid on New Track Slated for Opening

Construction of modern, all-weather track facilities at Tawas Area School seemed to be closer

to realization at Monday night's meeting of the board of education. Bill McIntosh, assistant principal and athletic director, announced that one bid had been received for constructing the track, including pits and runways.

Final action on the bid is to be taken at the next meeting of the board of education.

McIntosh explained a proposal which would finance this construction at no cost to the general fund. Revenue bonds would be issued and repaid through receipts from athletic events.

The board of education expressed the desire to hear from the district concerning such a program. At present, the school has no track facilities.

In addition, possible reorganization of the school's athletic booster club was discussed. A number of years ago, this group helped to raise money for construction of the athletic field, bleachers, a whirlpool and other projects.

Bids were opened from three firms on refinishing the floor in the auditorium as well as for providing a section of bleachers for the athletic field. Bids on refinishing included George M. Becker, \$1,925; Commercial Floors, \$2,700; and Bernard Scott, \$1,827.56.

Safeway Steel Products entered a bid of \$6,490 to provide the bleachers. This section would seat 1,000 persons and would be located on the home side of the athletic field. Present bleachers would be placed on the visiting side.

The board's grounds and property committee is to review bids and bring in a recommendation at the next meeting.

## Mrs. Scofield Dead; First Fair President

Mrs. Thurman G. Scofield, first president of the Isco County Agricultural Society which has sponsored county fairs at Hale since 1944, passed away Monday, May 11, at Tolfree Hospital, West Branch.

Addie Waite was born April 15, 1888, at Azalia. She was married to Mr. Scofield at Tawas City on May 3, 1907.

She was a member of Hale Chapter, Order of Eastern Star, and the last charter member of the Hale Methodist Church. She had taken an active part in the county fair for 25 years and helped to organize the Hale Health Council.

She is survived by her husband; four daughters, Ruth Brumfield of Birmingham, Ida Cox of Hale, Faith Rosser of Columbus, Ohio, and Hope Scherer of Cleveland, Ohio; two sons, Wendall Scofield and Ira Scofield of Hale; 19 grandchildren.

Funeral services are to be conducted Thursday, May 14, at the United Methodist Church, Hale, 1:00 p. m. The Rev. Arthur Parkin will officiate and burial will be in Evergreen Cemetery, Hale.

# Highway Crashes Claim Lives of Two

## Brake Failure Said Cause of Accident

Faulty brakes on a fire department tanker has been blamed by East Tawas police as the cause of an accident May 6 which claimed the life of a volunteer fireman and injured a second volunteer.

Killed in the crash was Thomas Dillon, 35-year-old installer and repairman for Michigan Bell Telephone Company, who was driver of the vehicle. The second volunteer injured was Kenneth Wojahn, 29, owner-operator of a dry cleaning establishment on Newman Street.

Dillon was dead on arrival at Tawas Hospital after the tank truck which he was driving ran off the end of Newman Street and overturned, about one-half mile north of the fire hall. Dillon's chest was crushed in the crash.

Wojahn was riding on the back of the truck and jumped off just as the vehicle entered the intersection, plowed through a ditch and flipped over. Wojahn received face, leg and arm injuries when he struck the pavement.

Investigation of the crash was conducted by Michigan State Police from East Tawas. Brake system of the truck was dismantled late last week and a faulty mechanism was discovered.

Fire fighting equipment had been dispatched to the Tawas Lake area in answer to a grass fire call. Shortly after trucks left the fire hall, a second call was received stating that the fire was under control and to cancel the run.

East Tawas Police Chief Donald Docking was contacted in an effort to notify firemen that the run had been canceled. Docking was approaching the truck from the rear just as the northbound vehicle went off Newman Street at the Tawas Lake Road intersection. The truck stopped against a tree and Dillon was pinned under the wrecked cab.

Funeral services for the deceased were held Saturday, May 9, from St. Joseph Catholic Church, East Tawas. The Rev. Fr. Arthur C. Mulka officiated and burial was in Veterans Cemetery, East Tawas.

A lifetime resident of East Tawas, he was born November 22, 1934. A graduate of East Tawas High School, where he was active in athletics, he served in the United States Army from October 1955 to August 1957.

He married the former Sharon Ann Klee on August 22, 1959, at Flint.

Besides being a member of the volunteer fire department, he was an avid sailor and a member of the Tawas Bay Yacht Club, participated in the area softball league and had been very active as a coach and manager in the Knothole League baseball program for youngsters.

He is survived by his wife; four children, Thomas Jr., Jennifer, Amy and Stacey; his father, Arthur Dillon of East Tawas; four brothers, John Dillon of Detroit, Arthur Dillon Jr. of Bay City, Robert Dillon of Pontiac and Willard Dillon of Tawas City; five sisters, Mrs. Annette C. Svoke of Battle Creek, Mrs. Phillis Jean Coffin of Flint, Mrs. Rosemary Haglund of East Tawas, Mrs. Carol Wilkinson of Southfield and Mrs. Reta Johnson of East Tawas.

## Hiring Assistant Band Director OK'd by Board

Tawas Area Board of Education voted Monday night to hire an assistant band director for the next school term.

Approved by a four to three roll call vote, this action has been under discussion since last year. The board had previously given tentative approval to hiring an assistant director, if money was available.

School financing next year is still uncertain, but it was pointed out that the school's band program was too large for one person to handle. It was recommended that a teacher at the lower end of the salary schedule be hired.

During discussion, it was pointed out that the school had been unable to secure a vocal music instructor and board members felt a vocal music program should be included in the curriculum. At the request of students, journalism instruction is to be added next year and Prin. John Alexander reported that registrations are now being taken for this class. No instructor has been hired as yet.

In other business, the board authorized use of a school bus by the Isco Intermediate School District to transport children on a field trip to Deer Acres, Pineconning.

The board authorized use of the

East Tawas Elementary Unit multipurpose room for a benefit dance for the late Thomas Dillon.

Alexander reported that one meeting had been held with officials from Tawas Hospital concerning a cooperative training program. A number of problems are yet to be worked out and a report is to be made at the next meeting. Supt. Reynold Mick reported there would possibly be six vacancies in elementary grades and two vacancies in the high school next fall.

## OK Community School Budget

Adoption of a \$29,100 budget for next year's community school program was authorized Monday night by Tawas Area Board of Education. Budget for this program during the present school year is \$21,000.

This program has been self-supporting during the current school year. The program's grant from the Mott Foundation, which will be concluded in 1970-71, has been cut from \$3,400 to \$1,600. State aid during the current year is \$11,000 and this is expected to drop to \$8,000 next year.

A community school grant is expected to be \$7,000, as compared to \$4,400 last year. The program will start with a balance from the 1969-70 school year of \$1,500. Included in the income budget is \$8,800 from the school general fund. This has never been used in the past and Gene Gerber, director, indicated Monday night that general fund money might not be needed next term.

Fees and tuition of adults are estimated at \$1,500 during the 1970-71 school year. Fees from students will amount to \$700.

Expenditures under the new budget include: Administration salary, \$13,000; secretarial, \$600; printing and mailing, \$300; travel and conference, \$500; supplies and materials, \$2,000; student help, \$300; teacher salaries for adult education, \$6,000; teacher salaries for youth enrichment, \$2,500; summer program, \$3,500; special programs, \$500; miscellaneous, \$100.

## Health Office Secretary Dies; Driver Injured

Funeral services were conducted Monday at Forshee Chapel, Prescott, for Mrs. Edith M. Prescott, 53, who died at Tawas Hospital Thursday following a crash on Townline Road. Burial was in Evergreen Cemetery, Hale.

Mrs. Prescott, a secretary in the Isco County Health Department office, Tawas City, was a passenger in a car driven by Mrs. Barbara Gillings, 23, a registered nurse employed by the health department.

According to Michigan State Police from East Tawas, who investigated the crash, Mrs. Gillings' small foreign-made car was headed east on Townline Road.

The car collided at the Lorenz Road intersection with a loaded dump truck operated by Martin B. Lathrop, 26, Tawas City, and owned by James Quarters.

Both women were thrown out of the car. Mrs. Prescott had severe head injuries, while Mrs. Gillings was seriously hurt with head injuries and a broken arm. She was taken to Tawas Hospital, then transferred to Mercy Hospital, Bay City. Lathrop had minor injuries.

Mrs. Gillings told officers that the truck, headed north on Lorenz Road, did not stop for a stop sign at the Townline Road intersection. She told officers she attempted to turn her vehicle in the same direction as the truck but was unable to do so.

The crash remains under investigation by state police and the Isco County prosecuting attorney's office.

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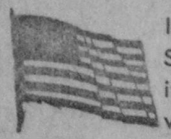

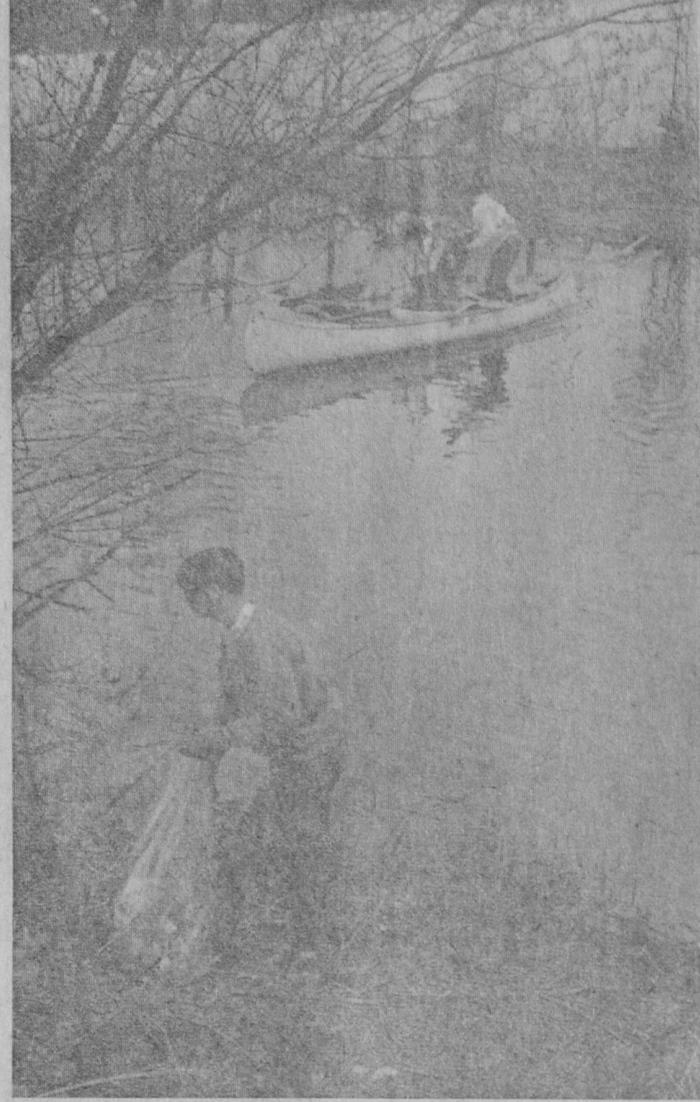

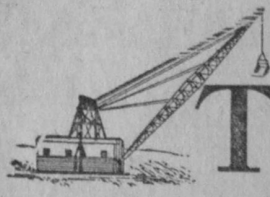

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## US-23 Included in State's Future Freeway Planning

The Michigan State Highway Commission on May 5 announced a three-year extension of its construction program and simultaneously proposed an accelerated freeway construction program to be partly financed by revenue bonds.

Freeway construction in the 1974-77 program includes US-23 from south of Standish north to Omer. The proposed accelerated program includes extension of the US-23 freeway as far north as Alpena.

The commission, citing a 52 percent increase in motor vehicle mileage in the last decade, said the total program would enable Michigan to meet its most pressing highway needs.

The extended program laid out the commission's construction plans for the three years ending June 30, 1977. It provides for some 200 projects, including extensions of 12 freeways. The estimated cost at today's prices is 519.4-million dollars.

The commission now is committed for the first time to an eight-year program. A previously announced five-year program, to cost about 1.24 billion dollars, will end June 30, 1974.

The accelerated freeway program provides for construction of 802 miles of freeway. Estimated cost of the freeway program at current prices is 1.08 billion dollars.

State Highway Director Henrik E. Stafseth said all the freeway projects could be placed under contract by 1980 if the legislature approves a 39-million-dollar-a-year tax increase needed to finance revenue bonds totaling 500-million dollars. The commission did not recommend a specific tax, but the new revenue would be raised from highway user taxes.

The new revenue would be kept in reserve until the first bonds were sold in 1974. The commission recommended that Michigan's cities, villages and counties also ask for a tax increase to take care of their most urgent road and street construction needs.

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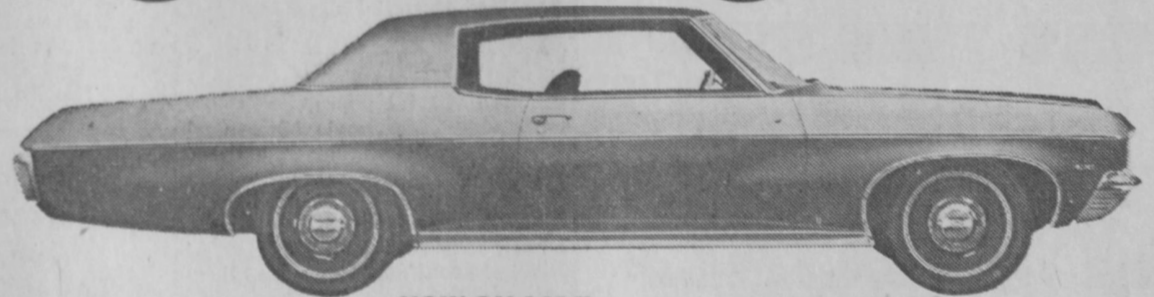

# Time to Think About the Basement Furnace

It's May and about the last thing anybody wants to think about is that furnace down in the basement. Yet that same furnace can be just as important in providing home comfort when the temperatures reach into the 90s as it was last winter when the thermometer hit zero.

You can make your furnace do double duty this summer simply by installing an add-on natural gas operated central air conditioning system which can be connected to almost any type of forced warm air furnace, according to David L. DeBoer, Tawas area manager for Michigan Consolidated Gas Company.

Mr. DeBoer points out that the big advantage of gas air conditioning is its economy, about half the cost of other methods. Beginning with a customer's meter reading in May, Michigan Consolidated reduces its rates about 38 percent for those who both heat and air condition their homes with gas. All the gas they use between their meter reading in May and October is billed at the lower rate, regardless of how it is used—whether for house heating on cool days, water heating, incineration, clothes drying or cooking.

Michigan Consolidated established this special rate seven years ago to increase the use of gas during the summer months when the company's gas supply is much greater than the demands of its customers. The same special rate also applies to commercial air conditioning and for operating internal combustion engines and turbines for generating electricity, operating air compressors, refrigeration compressors, water pumps and other uses.

"A considerable part of the cost of any home is its heating equipment," Mr. DeBoer pointed out. "Yet millions of people let their furnace lie dormant all summer when it could be helping to provide them with the same kind of comfort they have come to expect almost everywhere else, their office, restaurants, stores, theaters... even automobiles."

Mr. DeBoer said that heat waves swamp air conditioning equipment manufacturers and installers with orders and many people have to

wait weeks for their equipment to be installed. "I suggest that those interested in air conditioning should contact their contractor or Michigan Consolidated's air conditioning department right now in order to avoid any possible delays," he said.

The big advantage of the add-on air conditioners, Mr. DeBoer explained, is that they are placed outdoors where they produce chilled water which is piped to a cooling coil located in the top of the furnace. The furnace fan moves air over the coils and the cooled air is distributed throughout the home through the regular duct work. The weather proof cooling unit can be placed next to the house, or somewhere else, if desired.

This type of gas air conditioning is operated on the absorption principle and has few moving parts so there is very little that can wear out and maintenance costs are virtually nil, Mr. DeBoer said. Unlike other systems, the efficiency of a gas air conditioning system is not reduced to any degree "because a gas flame won't wear out."

Mr. DeBoer said that current models of gas add-on air conditioners are much more compact than previous units, ranging in size from three to 18 tons. The rule of thumb is one ton of air conditioning for every 500 square feet of floor space, but each home has its individual characteristics and

should be checked by an experienced air conditioning engineer, he said.

Because of the anti-climatic nature of the formal surrender of the German wehrmacht on May 7, coupled with the premature announcement of the capitulations days before, some of the edge had been removed from the great event, with the result that the nation accepted the news with restraint. As Germany's fall was substantiated, people looked to the East, where the Japs still remain to be defeated.

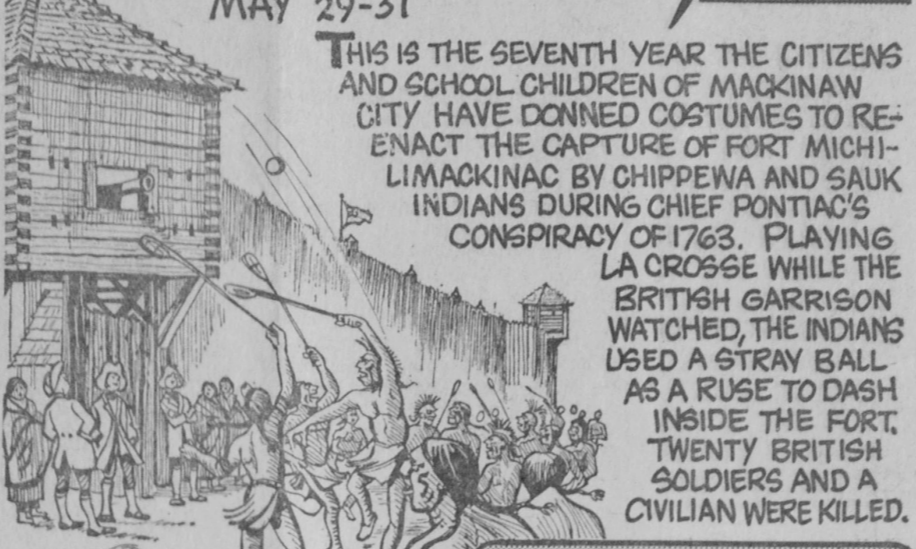

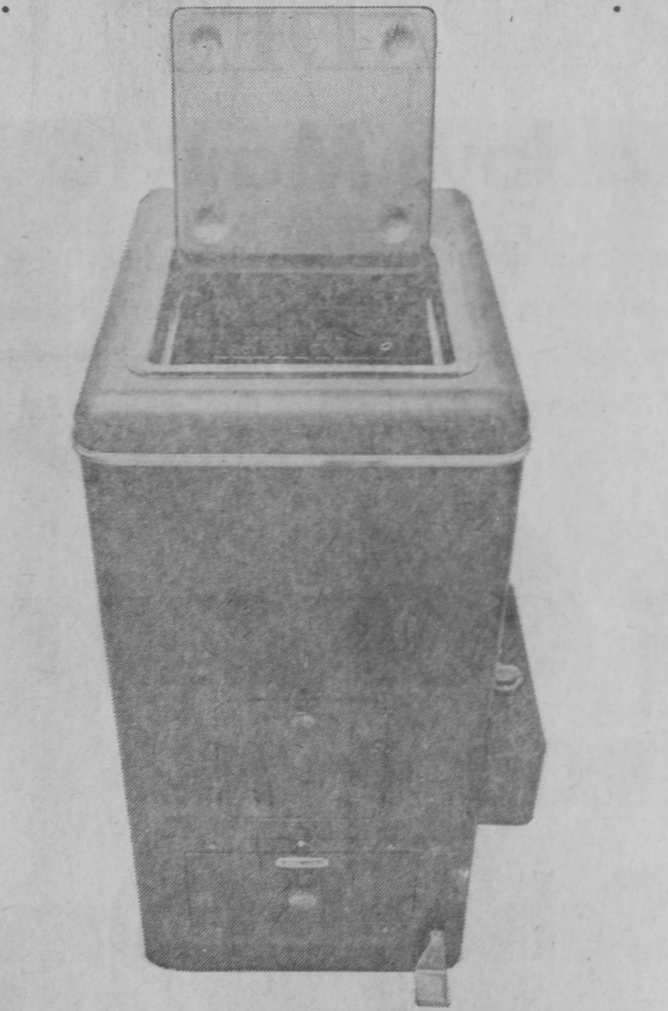
