Funeral services were con-ducted Monday at Forshee Chapel, Prescott, for Mrs. Edith M. Prescott, 53, who died at Tawas Hospital Thursday following a crash on Townline Road. Burial was in Evergreen Cemetery, Hale.

Mrs. Prescott, a secretary in the Iosco County Health Department office, Tawas City, was a passenger in a car driven by Mrs. Barbara Gillings, 23, a registered nurse employed by the health department.

According to Michigan State Police from East Tawas, who investigated the crash, Mrs. Gillings' small foreign-made car was headed east on Townline Road.

The car collided at the Lorenz Road intersection with a loaded dump truck operated by Martin B. Lathrop, 26, Tawas City, and owned by James Quarters.

Both women were thrown out of the car, Mrs. Prescott had severe head injuries, while Mrs. Gillings was seriously hurt with head injuries and a broken arm. She was taken to Tawas Hospital, then transferred to Mercy Hospital, Bay ity. Lathrop had minor injuries.
