## TC Council Eyes River Ordinance

On recommendation of the city planning commission, Tawas City Council is gathering information relative to adoption of an ordinance which would control construction of dockage and seawalls along the Tawas River.

A measure long needed for the protection of river banks and recreational boat traffic, such an ordinance had been discussed by the planning commission during the past year.

Action came to a head two weeks ago with receipt of a building application from a new marina which requested permission to construct boat wells in the river, with docks extending at an angle 13 feet into the river. Permission is required from the city before application may be made with the Michigan Department of Natural Resources for a permit.

At a special meeting April 30, the planning commission recommended that the council make an immediate study of the river from the mouth to the Mathews Street bridge and establish a dock line from the thread of the stream.

An additional recommendation was that all river walls built should be of two-inch treated hardwood or better and supported with tie backs in the bank with cable or steel rod, to be approved during construction and on completion by the building inspector. A building permit would be required before start of a project.

In order to cause no delay for the new marina owned by Robert Pawloski and Bernard Molski, located at the former Cowan Sales east of the US-23 bridge, the council gave permission to the Tawas City Sports Center and Marina to park boats parallel to the existing river wall behind that building. Construction of docks into the river would not be allowed.

The city superintendent has requested information from the DNR concerning present laws controlling construction of docks. The Michigan Municipal League has been requested to furnish information.

### Registration Set at Hale School

Pre-school registration date for Hale Area Schools has been set for Monday, May 11, 9:00 a. m. The registration will be held during the morning only in the elementary building.

Children who have reached the age of five years or will have reached that age before December 1 are eligible for registration.

Parents must bring both birth certificate and immunization records of the children with them to the registration.

With the registration, there will be a vision test.

tion from other cities which have adopted similar ordinances.

The proposed marina is located directly opposite the city's boat launching ramp, which was constructed two years ago. This ramp was originally dug into the river bank about 1948 during construction of the Saginaw-Midland Water System. Huge concrete pipes were treated there and then floated down the river to be towed to the water system's intake site.

While the river appears to be wide at this point, it was pointed out that the city's ramp area does not extend beyond the original river bank line.

The council believes that construction could best be controlled by establishing the thread or center of the actual river bed and controlling construction of docks within a prescribed distance from that point. This would permit a uniform boat traffic zone from the mouth to Mathews Street bridge.

### Wholesalers Visit Area

Twenty-five members of the Greater Saginaw Chamber of Commerce's wholesale department stopped in the Tawas Tuesday on their annual junket throughout Northeastern Michigan. Each year, members visit customers in the region. The group stayed at Alpena Tuesday night, then is to continue the trip Wednesday to Cheboygan, Grayling and Gaylord.

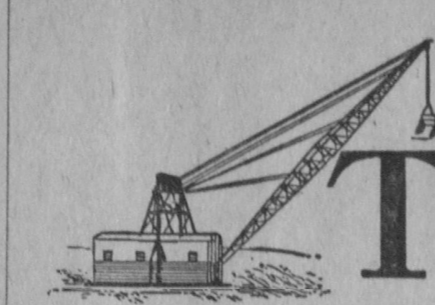
## Pledge All Out Effort for Aid Bill

State Reps. George A. Prescott, Tawas City, and J. Robert Traxler, Bay City, pledged all out efforts among their colleagues May 1 to garner 11 more votes for S. B. 10-84. This bill provides the financing for S. B. 1062, the school aid bill now in the senate.

"We lost in a trial test yesterday," Prescott reported, "by a 45 to 52 vote but the battle isn't over yet by any means."

Prescott said that 20 Republicans and 25 Democrats voted for the bill which would shift school financing from property taxes to the state income tax route by choice of the residents of any school district.

"Here is an example," Prescott said, "of where 57 house members on March 5 voted for the school aid bill providing some 1 billion, 200 million dollars for our dis-

## AuGres River Survey Given Committee OK

Board of directors of the Michigan Soil Conservation Service last week gave its approval to conduct a study of the AuGres watershed to determine means of controlling flooding conditions.

This action followed a public hearing held last month at Whittemore-Prescott Area School which was attended by property owners of Arenac, Iosco and Ogemaw Counties involved in the watershed district.

Action by the state board means that it will provide technical assistance for a preliminary study at no cost to the local district.

If the study proves favorable, it will be necessary for property owners involved to form an inter-county drainage district to implement the development of a work plan, hold necessary hearings, manage contracts and maintain the project.

Administrative cost for contracts would be the responsibility of the local watershed district, as well as water, land easements and right-of-way acquisition. Money for site preservation could be borrowed for land easements and rights-of-way for recreation, fish and wildlife improvement. The federal government would participate on a 50-50 cost basis, more or less, with the local district.

Under flood prevention provisions of the act, construction would be borne 100 percent by the federal government as well as engineering costs. Agricultural water management construction could be financed through a 50-50 cost sharing by the federal and local governments.

The next step will be for SCS service technicians to meet with sponsors, members of the watershed steering committee and local

people to outline the project's scope.

Before construction can start, local sponsoring organizations of the United States Department of Agriculture must agree on the final plan. If adopted following hearings, contracts would be let and assessments spread.

Harry Krueger of Wilber Township, a member of the seven-man state soil conservation service board of directors, said this week that he was of the opinion that assessments should be based on value received by individual property owners.

"There should be a dollar's worth of benefit for each dollar such a project will cost," he stated.

Krueger said it would be well for Iosco County to retain an advisor acquainted with the watershed area to protect the interests of property owners of this county.

## City Drops Additions to Street Work

After study by the street committee, Tawas City Council Monday night directed that two additions to the 1970 street construction program be deleted.

At its last meeting, the council had authorized blacktopping of the city alley easement behind Keiser Drug Store and one block of Court Street between Beech and Maple. These two projects were to be added to the regular street construction program.

Howard Hatton, street committee chairman, along with Frank Ahonen and Clark Tanner, committee members, reported that Hugo Keiser had agreed to blacktop the alley at his own expense during work on his parking lot.

The committee inspected Court Street between Beech and Maple and found that the street was too narrow for hard surfacing. It was recommended that additional stone be placed on the street and treated with dustmaster when other streets are treated on May 15.

A motion by Alderman Martin Wellina to table this recommendation for two weeks died for lack of support. The council then adopted the street committee's report.

In other business, Robert Rollin appeared before the council and reported that he had conducted a survey and found that approximately 2,000 persons were opposed to the closing of the Tawas River to coho fishing. As a protection to river front property owners, the council has recommended to the Michigan Department of Natural Resources that the river be closed during the coho season and that a weir be installed to prevent coho from running into trout streams and Tawas Lake. Rollin agreed to conduct a survey of property owners along the river to determine their thinking.

At the request of Rollin, the city superintendent is to contact the state highway department to determine what steps could be taken to construct a covered drain along US-23 from the river bridge to the city limit. Rollin pointed out that highway department ditches are presently filled with stagnant water in that area.

Following a public hearing, the council rezoned a parcel of property on M-55 west of the Masonic Temple owned by Kenneth King from RA-1 residential to B-1 business. This action had been recommended by the planning commission at King's request.

A report from the joint water board of East Tawas and Tawas City stated that permission had been granted to Tawas City to extend a water main, to be called the Bay Drive extension, approximately 1,000 feet beyond the city limit into Alabaster Township.

## Dale Snyder Named New Iosco Deputy

Dale Snyder, 35, formerly with the Summit County Sheriff's Department at Akron, Ohio, is a new deputy sheriff employed by the Iosco Sheriff's Department.

Snyder attended a recent school conducted by the state for marine enforcement officers. He will serve as Iosco's marine enforcement officer until later this month when he takes over other duties with the sheriff's department.

The new officer, his wife, Beverly, and their five children are residing at Whittemore.

## Study Perch for Mercury Contamination

Biologists from the Michigan Department of Natural Resources' fishery station at Alpena began netting yellow perch in Saginaw and Tawas Bays Tuesday to check for possible contamination from mercury.

Industrial mercury discharges have resulted in the closing of fishing in Lake St. Clair and fish in Lake Huron are being checked as a precautionary measure.

Jerry Manz, the DNR's regional coordinator for Lakes Michigan and Huron, said that no mercury contamination was expected to be found in fish in this area.

Tawas Bay had been selected as a sampling station and nets were set Tuesday. At the same time, nets were set near the Charity Islands. The nets are to be lifted Wednesday morning and sample fish taken for analysis.

At the same time, biologists are to take samples of perch in the bay to determine age groups. This is a continuation of the survey of the fish population being conducted in Saginaw Bay.

Perch are now making spawning runs in the Tawas River and other streams entering Lake Huron.

## Shore Erosion to be Subject of Meeting

An educational meeting concerning erosion of shoreline and high water of the Great Lakes is to be held Thursday, May 14, 1:30 to 3:30 p. m., at the Iosco County Building.

Requested by Fred Lomas, chairman of the Iosco Board of Commissioners, and arranged by Marvin Davenport, Iosco County extension director, the area recognizes the tremendous economic loss if the shoreline is not stabilized. Possible solutions are to be discussed at the meeting.

Starting at 1:30 p. m., the present situation is to be discussed and what are present laws effecting control on the Great Lakes. Any existing or proposed legislation that would help property owners along the Lake Huron shore would be discussed.

This presentation is to be made by John Hodge, district extension natural resources agent from Petoskey, along with the Iosco extension director.

From 2:30 to 3:00 p. m., topics to be discussed include what services are now available and what means can be used to reduce or stop damage of present erosion.

Loren L. Oshel, state soil conservation engineer with the USDA, will be the second speaker.

Davenport states this is a vitally important meeting of the area and urges a good attendance.

## YAP Plans West Iosco Road Cleanup

Saturday, May 9, Whittemore-Prescott area residents will have an opportunity to demonstrate a personal commitment to save the surroundings in the state-wide "Day in May" cleanup campaign. This event is sponsored by the Youth Against Pollution (YAP) organization and State Rep. David M. Serokin of Mt. Clemens, over-all director for the activities.

Local Chairman Cindy Erickson issued a reminder today that the cleanup effort for this area will be cleaning up alongside of main roads. Everyone will meet at the school and form groups. Buses will be furnished to take volunteers to starting points and they will work toward main areas. County dump trucks will be there to pick up the trash.

The class which has the most students participate will receive a prize of \$25; second, \$15, and third, \$10.

## ET Businessmen Concerned Over Increase in Area Crime

Concern over what was described as an increased crime rate in the area was expressed at Monday night's meeting of East Tawas Council.

Robert Johnson, spokesman for the group, pointed out that break-ins and enterings had increased at a substantial rate during recent months.

Donald Mooney told councilmen that shoplifting was also on the increase.

The council and businessmen discussed various means to combat the increased crime rate, including cooperation with police in the

Check-Mate program and installation of alarm systems. Businessmen were of the opinion that the police force should be expanded and it was reported that the city police department is presently attempting to secure an additional patrolman.

In other business, the council approved a tentative operational budget for 1970-71. A public hearing is to be held May 18, 8:00 p. m. The budget under consideration calls for an expenditure of \$192,334.77 with revenue of \$194,633.40.

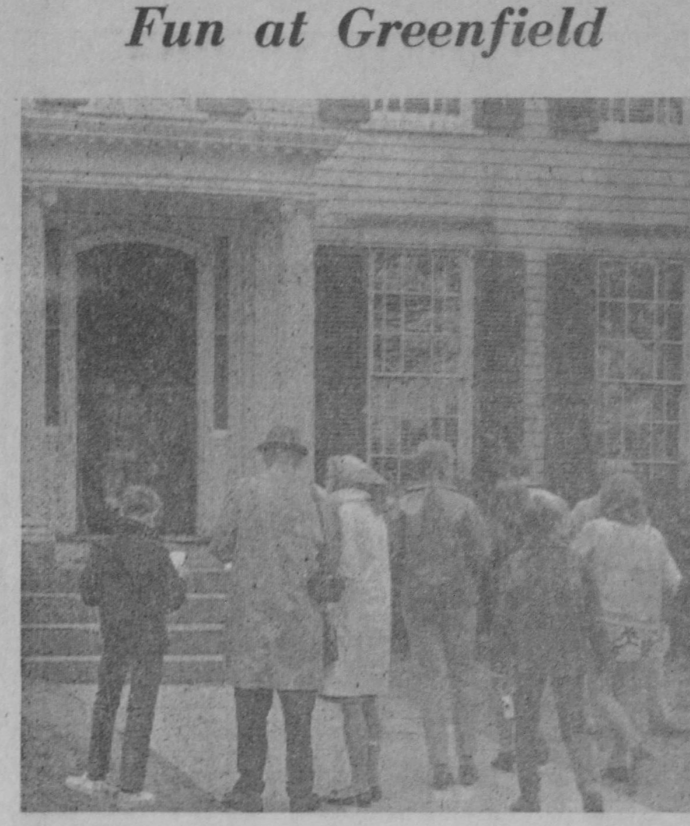

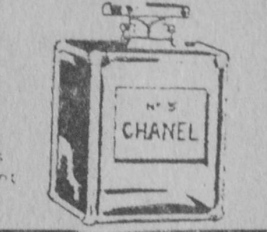

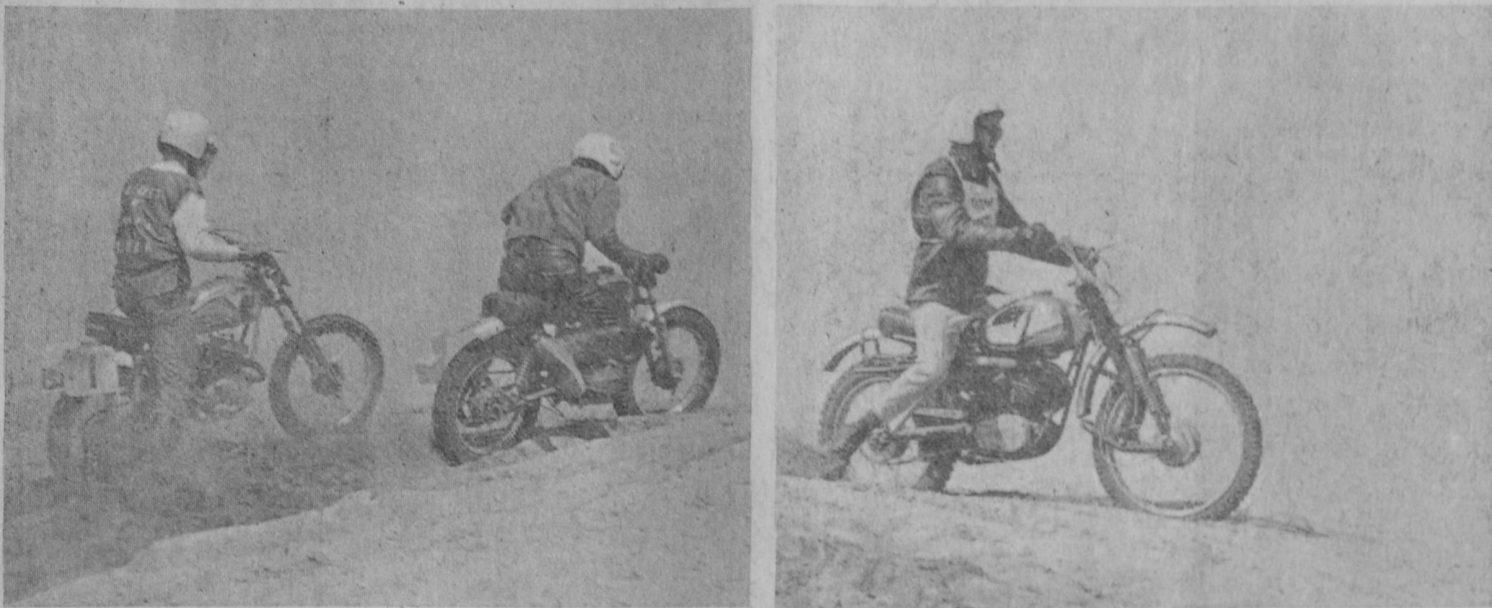

## OPEN LINE

Q How can the public be sure that nuclear power plants are safe?

A All nuclear plants must meet the rigorous standards of the U.S. Atomic Energy Commission. Before a construction permit is issued to an electric company, the AEC regulatory staff must approve the prospective site and the design of the plant.

Q Does the AEC staff act independently of other experts in the field?

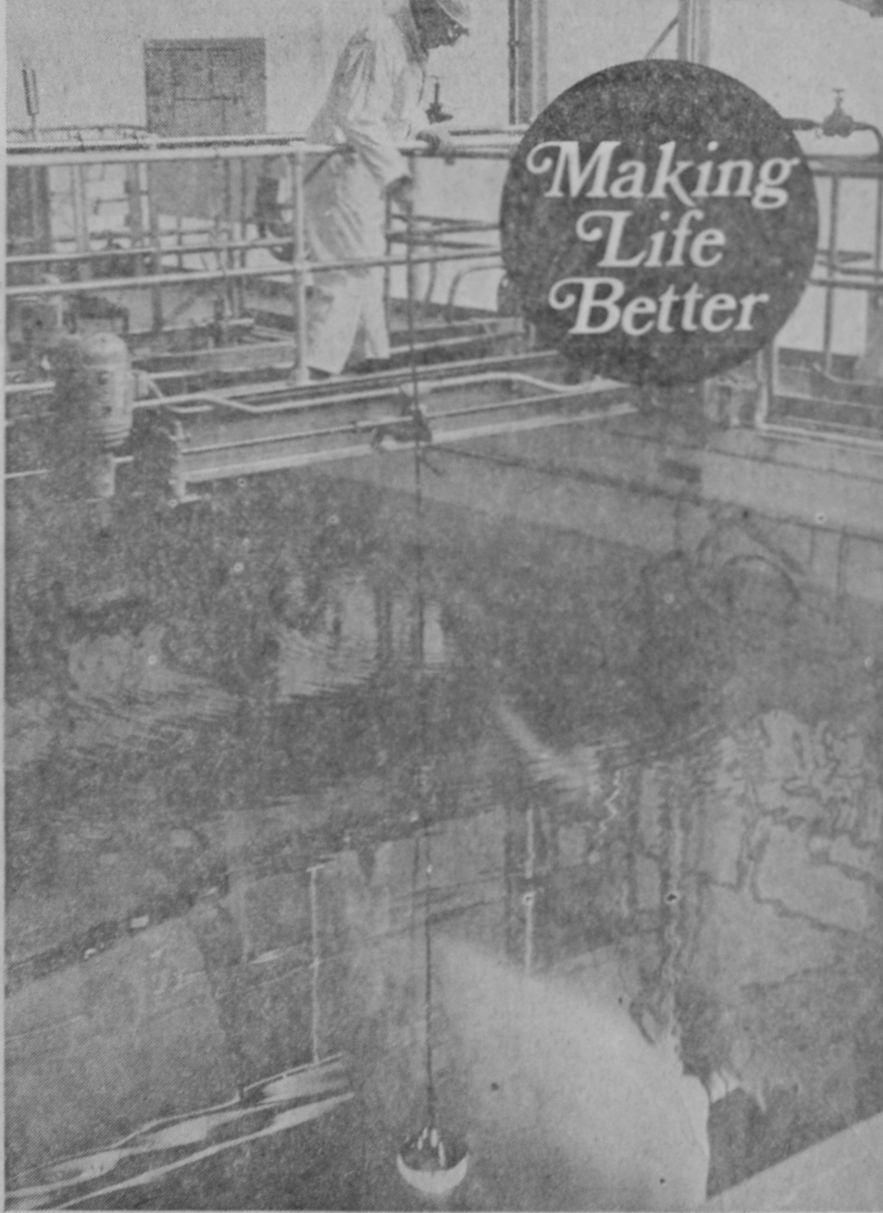
A No. Before issuing a construction permit, two more steps are taken. First, the Advisory Committee on Reactor Safeguards—a group of scientists independent of the AEC regulatory staff—must review and report on the location and plans. Then a public hearing is held, conducted by a three-man Atomic Safety and Licensing Board. The Board's decision is reviewed by the five commissioners of the AEC, whose chairman is Nobel Prize winner Dr. Glenn T. Seaborg. After construction of the plant, and before an operating license can be issued, the AEC staff and the ACRS must again review the plant design, and there may be a public hearing at this stage also.

Q Once a plant is in operation, how is the public assured that it will continue to conform to safety standards?

A During the life of a nuclear plant, the AEC regulatory staff conducts continuing reviews of the plant's operations.

Q Who checks on the AEC?

A There are five commissioners of the AEC. Each is appointed to a five-year term, subject to U.S. Senate confirmation. The chairman of the AEC reports directly to the President of the United States. In addition, the AEC is under the surveillance of the Joint Committee on Atomic Energy, a special committee of both houses of Congress. This committee keeps watch over the development, use and control of nuclear energy. It holds frequent public hearings on the regulatory process and radiation standards. Basically, AEC standards must conform to the policies set by the Federal Radiation Council, which relies on the findings and recommendations of the National Council on Radiation Protection and Measurements and the International Commission on Radiological Protection.

Chuck's "bundles" are composed of metal tubes containing uranium. **HINTS FOR TEENAGERS**

... From your Sewing Editor



THE RIPPLE OF PLEATS and the flutter of a cape keep you moving through spring. When you want to look "together" for important appointments, think in terms of something simply chic. The serene little princess (Simplicity 865), with its skirt fanning into front pleats and its own removable capelet, shows you the way. Pleats are fun to wear; they're comfortable, they move in a swinging way when you walk and they look smashing. But, would you make them yourself? Yes, of course, if you know what you're about and Coats and Clark's sewing experts do. Here is what they say.

**Fabric-Wise**

With pleats in view, some fabrics work better than others. Most synthetics and blends hold a neat pleat; and so do heavy silks and wools. Lightweight silk, cotton and rayon do not generally hold a crisp crease. Once you decide to pleat, pick your pattern by the hip measurements because pleats should hang straight from the hips.

**Baste, Baste, Baste**

Pleating is indicated on a pattern with two lines for each pleat, one is the outside fold line, the other is the line to which the fold is brought. You may well wonder how to mark all these lines, and it is really simple. You use a form of broken basting called simplified tailor's tacks. With a doubled thread length as long as the skirt, begin with a small stitch through the pattern and fabric together leaving a 1" end. Continue along the line making a small stitch every 3". Be sure to use two different colors of thread to indicate each type of fold line. After all of the lines are marked, snip the thread midway between stitches and gently remove the pattern.

Your skirt has to be hemmed before the pleats are pressed in. Where there is a seam at the underfold of a pleat, press it to one side and clip one seam allowance at the place where the hem allowance will be stitched to the skirt. Below the cut, press the seam open and trim the allowances.

Use diagonal basting stitches across the center of each pleat, through all layers, to hold in place for pressing. Pleats are steamed pressed on both sides, using a press cloth on the right side. Leave this basting in until the entire garment is finished.

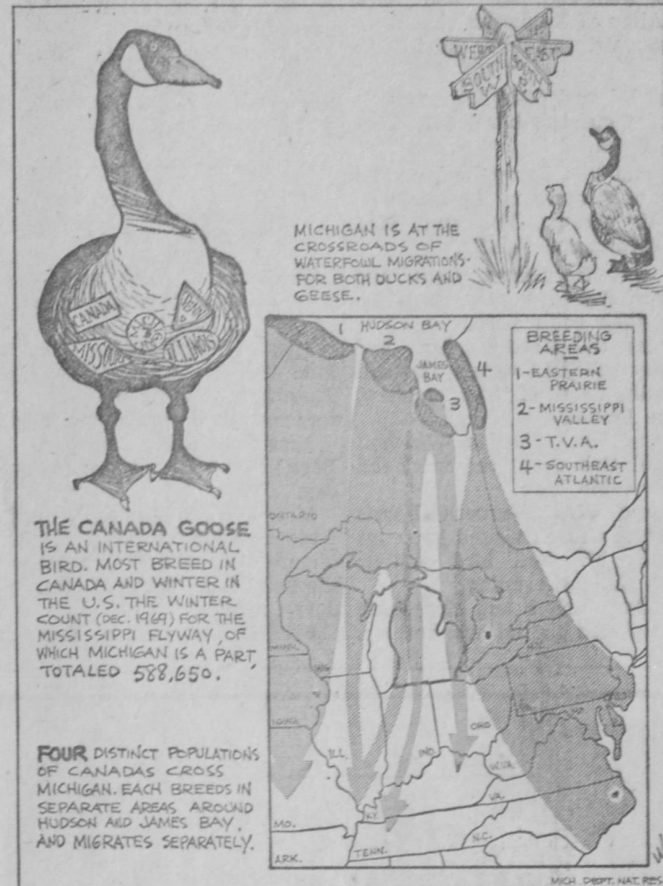

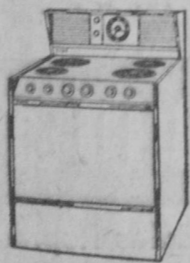
