## Population Drop Could Cost \$4,458

Both Tawas City and East Tawas stand to lose a sizeable amount of operating revenue during the next fiscal year due to decreases in population as prepared in the 1970 federal census.

Tawas City's loss will be the most severe. According to the preliminary report from the United States Department of Commerce, the city had a 10.2 percent drop in population, from 1,810 in 1960 to 1,625 in 1970.

East Tawas had a 5.4 percent drop in population, from 2,462 in 1960 to 2,330 in 1970.

Both cities have believed the federal count was in error and, in Tawas City's instance, a special survey was conducted following the official census which picked up an additional 70 persons who were not counted. The 1,625 preliminary figure above does not include the 70 additional names and no word has been received as yet if the city's count has been accepted.

In any case, the city stands to lose money next year. Using Tawas City's preliminary figure, the loss would be \$4,458.65. The loss to

East Tawas would be \$3,150.77.

The per capita loss, based on figures prepared by the Michigan Municipal League, would be \$23.69. This represents returns on state collected taxes as follows: Sales tax, \$11.58; intangibles tax, \$1.08; personal income tax, \$3.71; motor vehicle fund, \$1.83; major street fund, \$5.49.

East Tawas Council Monday night began investigating the cost of conducting a new census.

Members of the Tawas City Council said Monday night that a loss in revenue would have to be

anticipated when it comes time to develop a new budget for 1971.

While the two cities fared poorly in the federal census, Iosco County, as a whole, had a 46.4 percent increase in population during the past seven years, from 16,505 to 24,161 in 1970. The Michigan Municipal League's report only listed the breakdown for incorporated cities. It is expected that the final federal census report will list the population by townships.

As of April 1, the population of Michigan was 8,778,187, according

to the preliminary count. This figure represents an increase of 954,993, or 2.2 percent, from the 7,823,194 inhabitants enumerated in the 1960 census.

All Northeastern Michigan cities showed a loss from the 1960 census. The preliminary census listed the following: Standish, 1,161 in 1970, as compared to 1,214 in 1960, a drop of 4.4 percent; West Branch, 1,869 in 1970, as compared to 2,025 in 1960, a drop of 7.7 percent; Alpena, 13,661 in 1970, as compared to 14,682 in 1960, a drop of seven percent.

## Council Denies Building Permit

East Tawas Council again denied a building application Monday night from Truman Barbier for construction of a vehicle and marine sales building on Tawas Bay east of the state police post.

The denial, as was the case in the past, was denied due to a conflict of zoning. The property is zoned as resort A.

This action was recommended by the city's planning and zoning board, which had denied a request to rezone the property from resort A to commercial A to allow the construction.

It is expected that the building application will be taken to the city's zoning board of appeals for action.

## Tawas Area Band Boosters Met Monday

A representative from the uniform company attended the meeting of the Tawas Area Band Boosters Monday evening, November 16. He explained the construction of the uniform and different possibilities using slight alterations.

Several small fund-raising committees were formed, the proceeds of which will go into the band uniform fund. The purpose of these committees will be to place donation canisters in places of business, to put on a weekly bake sale every Saturday until Christmas, to place a uniform on display in various store windows throughout the campaign and to organize a group to work on publicity and contacts. The uniform is currently being displayed at Sis's Dress Shop.

After the Tawas Area Board of Education meeting Monday, December 14, the band boosters will know the amount necessary to purchase uniforms and will stage an actual campaign drive.

## Oscoda School Open House Set Nov. 24

Oscoda Area School will hold its annual open house event Tuesday, November 24, 7:30 to 10:00 p. m., at the high school. The faculty and administration will serve as hosts.

The open house will be a completely informal one with no planned program. Teachers and administrators will be in their rooms and offices where residents of the district will have an opportunity to visit with them and discuss progress of the children.

Exhibits of students' work will be on display.

Coffee is to be served from 9:30 to 10:00 p. m. in the commons area.

Donald J. Wagner, principal, states that all parents and interested citizens are encouraged to attend.

## Tawas C. Council Tables Action on Cable Rate Hike

A request for a rate increase to cable subscribers and substitution of channels by General Television of Michigan was tabled Monday night by the Tawas City Council.

Acting under its formal agreement of 1963 with communities served in Iosco, the firm has requested permission to raise its monthly service charge from \$4.50 to \$5. In addition, it proposes a substitution in channels from WKNX-Channel 25 to WKBD-Channel 50. The firm is authorized to carry only five channels and any change would require the substitution.

If approved, about three months would be required to make the change in channels.

A representative of the cable company said that a survey in the Oscoda area indicated that about 92 percent of its patrons there favored a switch from Channel 25 to Channel 50.

Members of the Tawas City Council were of the opinion that the firm should conduct a survey in the Tawas to determine wishes of patrons here. The Tawas and part of Tawas Township are served by equipment located west of Tawas City while the Oscoda area is served by separate equipment. Regardless of the result of the survey in the Tawas, the cable company spokesman said that the Oscoda area would soon be receiving Channel 50.

In other business Monday night, James Quarters, city sanitation contractor, appeared before the council and said that the agreement adopted between himself and the city earlier this year was not adequate and he asked for an adjustment in pay. A council committee is to study the matter.

Quarters said that considerably more work was now involved in the job due to the council's requirement to pick up everything that was bagged or in cans. He

## Iosco's Oldest Business Firm Has Change in Management

Announcement is made this week that Carl B. (Butch) Babcock Jr. has received the official designation as general manager of Iosco County Abstract Office, Tawas City, the oldest existing business institution in the county and owned by the same family for 83 years.

Making the announcement was Carl B. Babcock Sr., who is currently recuperating at Tawas Hospital following his recent illness.

"My son has served as general manager of the firm since January 1968, when I entered the hospital for surgery. The doctors now tell

me that I will have to take it easy for several months. When I return, I will be moving into the back office to assist with titles and involved abstracts," said the senior partner.

The new general manager has been associated in the business with his father since November 1960, after returning home from military service. He is a 1957 graduate of Tawas Area High School.

In recent weeks, work has been completed on an addition to the building for vault storage space and offices have been completely remodeled. The building was originally constructed in November 1938, about 100 feet south of the firm's original location.

The senior partner, who recently purchased a 46-foot cruiser, said he was looking forward to the boating season next year and would probably be spending much of his time in the North Channel at the upper end of Lake Huron. Boating has been a lifelong love of Babcock and he was recently presented a life membership in Tawas Bay Yacht Club, of which he was one of the founders.

In continuous operation since 1889, Iosco Abstract Office was established by Sibley G. Taylor, a pioneer Iosco County attorney. Purchased in 1887 by the late N. C. Hartingh, a court stenographer who came here from Bay City, it had been under his guidance until 1950, when he died.

The present senior partner of the firm started working in the office in 1927 when he was still in high school. "The abstract business was slow in those days. In order to make a living, grandfather served as circuit court commissioner, city attorney, as a practicing attorney and real estate developer, as well as operating his abstract office."

Today, the land which Mr. Hartingh sold as a real estate developer back in Iosco's early days is eagerly sought and sells for 10

## State Police Report on Snowmobiles

Snowmobiling activity in Michigan in the winter season of 1969-70 resulted in 1,190 accidents which claimed 19 lives and injured 1,181 other persons, according to information obtained and compiled by the state police traffic division.

Compared with available data the previous season, deaths were up by six or 50 percent while injuries and accidents showed a doubling of totals with increases respectively of 619 and 617.

The division's figures, which are obtained from both traffic and non-traffic reports of snowmobile accidents made to police or other agencies, showed 13 deaths and 562 injured in 573 accidents for 1968-69.

Michigan Department of State registrations of snowmobiles as of November 3 this year totaled 131,219. This was 57,932 more than 73,287 as of December 29, 1969. Unknown is the accurate number of snowmobiles operated on private property and not requiring registration.

Breakdown of types of accidents involving snowmobiles included overturning or running off the roadway 223; collisions with another motor vehicle 244, with pedestrian 19, with fixed or other objects 297, with animals four, with a train one, and miscellaneous 402.

The still-growing sport of snowmobiling lacks good base period data for comparison purposes. The Michigan legislature in 1968 passed the snowmobile registration law which became effective in 1969. Collection of accident data is affected as well by the growth period.

## Alva J. Meade, Oscoda Clerk, Died Nov. 13

Alva J. Meade, Oscoda Township clerk and superintendent of transportation for Oscoda Area Schools, died suddenly Friday, November 13, at his home.

Funeral services were held Monday at Hope Lutheran Church with burial in Pine Tree Cemetery.

Mr. Meade was born at Detroit February 23, 1921.

He had served as township clerk for six years, had been a trustee of the township, served on the township police and fire commission and the Iosco-Arenac Library Board. In addition, he had served as chairman of Iosco area boy scouts.

He is survived by his wife, Vivian; a son; a daughter; one granddaughter; one sister, and two brothers.

## Grant Township Auxiliary Plans Christmas Baskets

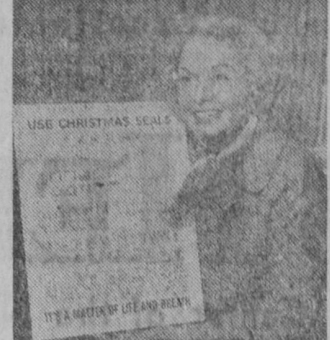
Plans for Christmas baskets for four needy families were made at the meeting of the Grant Township Women's Auxiliary Tuesday, November 10.

# Michigan's World-Beater



This is no run-of-the-mill coho salmon being admired by Director Ralph A. MacMullan of the Department of Natural Resources (right). The big bruiser, reared on the hands of DNR Fisheries Chief Wayne H. Tody (left), is the largest coho on record to turn up anywhere in the world. The 33-pound, 3-ounce whopper barged into the DNR's harvest weir on the Little Manistee River early in October. It stretched the Department's tape measure to 42 inches for length and measured nearly 26 inches around the thickest part of its body. Until this monster showed up, the largest coho ever reported in the world was a 31-pounder landed 23 years ago in British Columbia. That fish still stands as the world's sport-catch record. Tody says this state's new heavyweight is a four-year-old coho which failed to reach spawning maturity within the normal three-year life cycle. As a result, it gained an extra year of growth in Lake Michigan's food-rich waters to reach its world-beating size. Tody and MacMullan are hoping that those waters will yield another beauty like this one to make some lucky Michigan fisherman the new world record holder for coho salmon. --Michigan Department of Natural Resources

## Familiar Plates Now on Sale

Are the 1971 white and maroon passenger car license plates which went on sale across Michigan Monday, November 16, familiar? They should be. Except for a different numbering and lettering system and the fact that they are reflectorized, 1971 plates look exactly like those issued in 1969.

But, purchasing 1971 plates will be much simpler than most years. Persons who bring the prepared application mailed to them by the secretary of state and show proof of insurance can complete the transaction for 1971 plates in a matter of minutes with no other paper work or documents involved.

Last year, all motorists had to show vehicle titles. Persons without a prepared application from Lansing must have a vehicle certificate of title and fill out necessary forms.

In addition to the cost of plates, motorists with proof of insurance are reminded that they must pay

\$1 into the state's uninsured motorist fund. Those without insurance must pay \$35 into the fund, plus cost of plates.

Although motorists can display 1970 plates through March 31, now is the best time to buy—before last-day lines and inclement weather.

When putting new plates on the car, motorists should be careful not to dent or scratch them since they must last three years. Tabs only will be issued in 1972 and 1973 which will be affixed to 1971 plates.

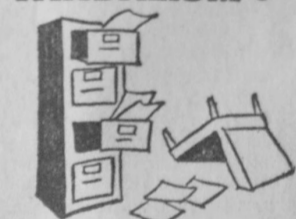

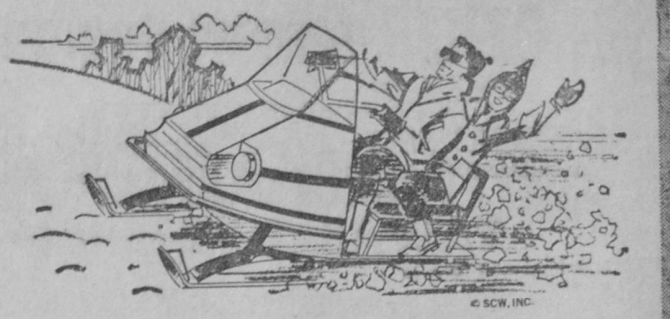

### Hamilton Picked for Competition

United States Air Force MSGT. Thomas A. Hamilton, son of Mr. and Mrs. Norman L. Hamilton of Oscoda, has been selected to participate in the Strategic Air Command's (SAC) elite combat competition at McCoy Air Force Base, Florida, November 15-20.

Sergeant Hamilton is a jet engine maintenance technician on the hand-picked team that will support the B-52 Stratofortress bomber crew from the 379th Bomb Wing at Wurtsmith Air Force Base. He was selected on the basis of his technical skill, proficiency and outstanding performance.

The "world series of bombing and navigation" will include competition among 55 SAC aircraft and crews, along with three Royal Air Force (Great Britain) teams. Each bomber team will fly two scored missions and will be judged

The crew with the highest point total in combined bombing and navigation will win the coveted Fairchild Trophy. The Saunders Trophy will go to the tanker team compiling the most points in navigation.

"Bombing targets" for the bombers will be located near Wheatley, Arkansas, and Arcadia, Louisiana, and accuracy of simulated bomb releases will be computed by mobile radar scoring units.

Sergeant Hamilton, who holds the United States Air Force Commendation Medal, is a 22-year veteran.

He is a 1948 graduate of Pontiac High School. His wife, Florence, is

the daughter of Mrs. Helen Meloney of New Jersey.

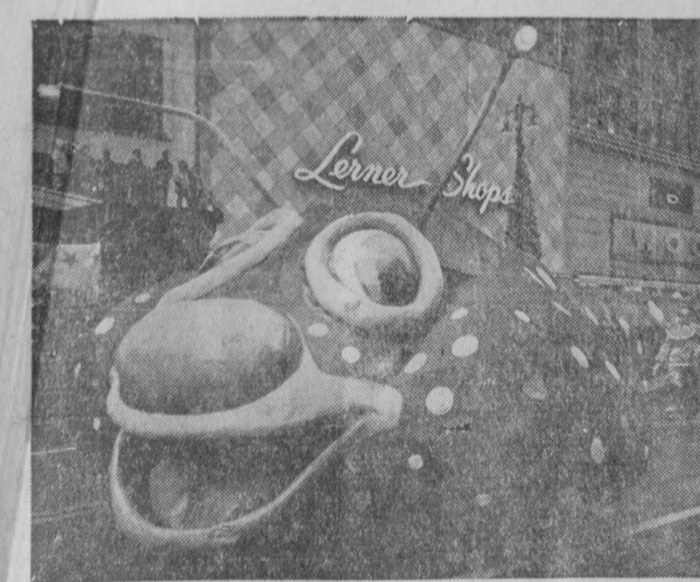
