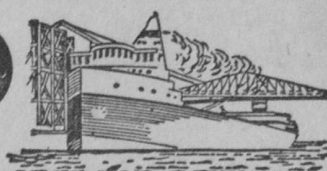

Tax Equalization Director Says:

## Iosco May Get Factor on Tax Rate

Iosco County faces the possibility of having a factor or "penalty" applied to its 1971 tax rolls by the state tax commission, according to information last week from Henry Oates, county tax equalization director.

At its November session, Iosco Board of Commissioners unanimously rejected Oates' recommendations for increases in the

true cash values for timber cut-over and residential categories.

Should the county's report not be accepted by the state, the state tax commission would conduct its own study. In all probability, a factor would be applied equally to all categories of property classifications and to all units of the county.

Oates said that percentages of

property valuations on his report vary in the 14 taxing units and no increases were recommended in the residential category for three units.

Following a sales study conducted by his department, Oates recommended increase on the true cash value of residential property in 11 of 14 units of the county totaling \$8,240,795, averaging out

to a 6.97 percent increase. In the timber cutover category, Oates recommended a 12½ percent increase on land value only representing \$774,229, or about a \$10 per acre increase on the true cash value.

By law, the county tax equalization department is charged with conducting a sales study each year to determine the true cash value

of property and that property tax assessments be made at 50 percent of the market value, which represents state equalized valuation.

Oates said Friday that he had presented his recommendation to township supervisors and city assessors on October 7 for their review. He is to ask for a meeting with the county commission's equalization committee before a

final report is submitted to the state tax commission on December 31.

The county commission's finance and equalization committee recommended Wednesday that no increase in previous property values be demanded during 1971 on any classification of property.

The resolution asked the equalization director to continue to record property sale transactions within the county and that valuations be reviewed every second year, based on these sales studies.

"It is the opinion of this committee that an accurate determination of land values cannot be made unless sales reflect at least 15 percent of the property in a classification," stated the resolution.

The committee also suggested that new construction during the two-year interim period be assessed at a rate comparable to those assessments made prior to the new assessments.

"This committee feels that the equalization department has done an outstanding job in preparing valuation reports since the professional appraisal was completed, but that annual revision of valuations cannot be made unless at least a 10 percent discrepancy is noted and that 15 percent of the properties within a classification form the basis for this discrepancy," stated the resolution.

Oates said that his recommendation was based on 90 sales in the timber cutover category and 1,039 sales in the residential category. He said his department had followed state department guide lines in preparing his recommendations.

Oates said the county could definitely be in trouble with the state tax commission should it review its valuations every two years, instead of annually.

Last year, Iosco adopted a 6.53 percent property valuation increase, of which 3.48 percent was in new construction. The state averaged a 9.85 percent increase. Adjoining counties of Alcona and Arenac had 13.35 and 8.34 percent increases, respectively.

Recommended increases by

Oates were as follows: Alabaster, \$47,600 in timber cutover and \$439,056 in residential for an eight percent increase; AuSable, \$56,488 in timber cutover and \$516,796 in residential for a 4.77 percent increase; Baldwin, \$100,470 in timber cutover and \$722,156 in residential, for a 5.79 percent increase.

Burleigh, \$45,890 in timber cutover and \$33,700 in residential, for a 6.50 percent increase; Grant, \$49,301 in timber cutover and \$660,372 in residential for an 8.78 percent increase; Oscoda, \$113,696 in timber cutover and \$2,343,698 in residential, for an increase of 7.65 percent; Plainfield, \$75,500 in timber cutover and \$2,010,021 in residential, a 9.36 percent increase; Reno, \$69,164 in timber cutover and none in residential; Sherman, \$36,329 in timber cutover and none in residential.

Tawas, \$50,900 in timber cutover and \$319,651 in residential for an increase of 9.70 percent; Wilber, \$128,891 in timber cutover and \$168,131 in residential for an increase of 7.32 percent; East Tawas, \$762,800 in residential for an increase of 6.30 percent; Tawas City, \$264,414 in residential for an increase of 3.95 percent.

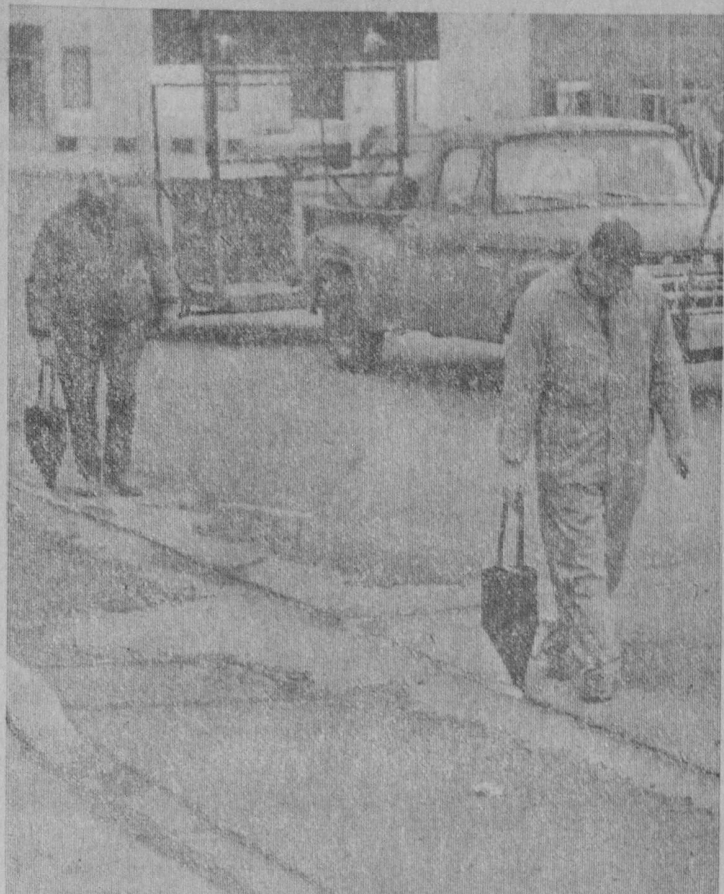

## Board Supports CP Nuclear Plant

Expressing confidence in scientific research that indicates "the conversion from fossil fuel to nuclear energy will contribute to improved environmental conditions for the region," Iosco Board of Commissioners went on record last Wednesday supporting the location and development of Consumers Power Company's nuclear facility near Midland.

Iosco commissioners requested

the Atomic Energy Commission to avoid any undue delay in the licensing of this project so that it may move on schedule and "preclude any detrimental effect upon the economy of Michigan."

The board's resolution noted that the Tawas City-East Tawas area had been designated a secondary growth center in an economic development plan prepared by East Central Michigan Economic Development District.

"The expansion and retention of existing industries and attraction of additional industries to this secondary growth center are the concern of the Iosco County Board of Commissioners.

"The construction of the Consumers Power nuclear plant near Midland will provide the necessary and competitive energy source essential for continued growth of these industries, as well as provide additional power to service future needs of this and other areas in Michigan," stated the resolution.

Last week, Consumers Power Company announced that it had stopped work on construction of this plant until such time as a license was received from the Atomic Energy Commission.

## 140 Attend First Meeting of HALE

More than 140 members of Hale Area League for Education attended the group's first meeting last week. The organization is a group of citizens actively supporting the bid for a new school in that community.

Richard Parkinson gave a brief explanation of facts concerning the election to be held Wednesday, December 9. Pr. Richard C. Dodge reviewed plans and ideas intended to be incorporated into the proposed new school.

The program was followed by a coffee break and tour of all school facilities with teachers as guides. Literature was distributed and a question and answer period was led by Peter M. Holley, elementary principal.

Committees then met to organize for carrying out the group's campaign plan, which is to be based upon personal and telephone contact, "coffee klatches" and further meetings to carry facts about the need for the new building to parents and citizens.

## OK Salary Hikes for District Court

A full round of salary increases for district court personnel was approved last Wednesday by the Iosco Board of Commissioners.

A salary of \$2,000 to be paid from the county general fund was approved for Dist. Judge J. Richard Ernst to supplement the \$18,000 salary he receives from the State of Michigan.

The board approved salary hikes of \$700 each for the district court magistrate and district court probation officer. A \$400 increase was approved for the district court reporter.

Effective January 1, salary of the magistrate is to be \$7,250 and the probation officer is to receive \$7,000.

In other business, the board authorized a hike in the cost of county dog licenses, from \$1 to \$3 for male dogs and \$3 to \$5 for female dogs. Because of the fact that 1971 tax statements have been prepared, the new dog license rate will not go into effect until 1972.

On recommendation of the county parks commission, Leo Potvin, contractor for construction of a bathroom at the Oscoda Beach project, has been ordered to cease operation. The architectural firm hired by the county said that the work being done by the contractor was unsatisfactory and recommended the contract be given to Huron Construction Company of Alpena, second low bidder for the project. It was stated that the project would be delayed because of the change, but it was expected that it would still be completed by April.

Members of the county commission are to attend a meeting Tuesday, December 15, at the Arenac County Courthouse, Standish, concerning state highway department plans for the extension route of US-23 north.

Mayor John St. James of Tawas City appeared before the board and requested a \$6,000 allocation from the county to assist in completing steel piling at the Tawas City Park dock. No action was taken on the matter, but the consensus of commissioners was that the city park was not part of the county parks system, that other projects had priority at this time, but that it could be considered at some future date. The county's park planning consultant is to aid the city in conducting an investigation to determine if federal or state funds are available for such a project.

The county parks commission reported that one bid had been received for operating the concession at Old Orchard Park. A bid was submitted by Duane E. (Bud) Streeter of Oscoda, which called for the county to receive 11 percent of gross sales from the concession.

Arthur Dillon of East Tawas appeared before the board and requested a \$200 appropriation from the county to help maintain the veteran's cemetery at East Tawas. No action was taken, but the matter is to be discussed at the December session.

Marvin Davenport, who reported he was involved in a great number of activities, submitted his resignation as chairman of the county planning commission.

A new civilian defense emergency plan was submitted by Henry Gage, county civilian defense director. The last plan was adopted in 1962. The matter is to be acted upon at the next session.

Authorization was given to the

sheriff's department to advertise for bids on a new boat, motor and trailer for the water enforcement division.

Barber Mobil was low bidder on furnishing gasoline to the county. The bid submitted was 18.45 cents per gallon.

The district health department was given authorization to hold public hearings when requested by the public sanitarian in regard to violation of health ordinances.

Authorization was given to pay Thomas B. Brown, architect for AuSable River Park, a back bill of \$7,625. This payment had been withheld until establishment of a new special account to meet requirements of a federal grant received for this project.

Salary of the building custodian at the county building was increased by \$400.

The board approved installation of a new water line at Old Orchard Park. Contractor for the trenching work is Nelson Provoast, who is to receive \$450. Remainder of the work is to be completed by park personnel.

The board gave its approval for a new sewer plan for Oscoda Township. Next step would be approval of a contract and for the county department of public works to issue \$2,400,000 worth of bonds, less grant funds, based upon the full faith and credit of the county. The project would include trunk sanitary sewer lines and sanitary sewage disposal facilities. R. W. Petrie and Associates is engineer for the project. Kenower, MacArthur Company is financial consultant and Miller, Canfield, Paddock and Stone are the bonding attorneys.

An agreement signed by Jess W. Bolin and Nile C. Burger to vacate Old Orchard Park premises on or before December 1 was accepted by the board.

The planning commission reported that a contract had been signed for an engineering firm to study solid waste disposal in this county. Cost of the study would be \$2,000. Wilbur C. Roach, chairman, said that the planning commission is to send a delegation to St. Johns to study solid waste disposal in that area.

Henry Oates, tax equalization director, reported that 31 days of work were required for preparation of December tax statements. He said that two members of the department operated equipment 10 hours a day to complete the work. Oates said that equipment was down for 42 hours because of mechanical difficulties and suggested that the county investigate the leasing of more modern equipment for preparing tax statements.

## Hurt Saturday When Car Hit M-65 Culvert

Richard A. Keeling, 18, Garden City, received facial and back injuries Saturday morning when his car ran off M-65, one-half mile south of Galion Road, Reno Township.

Investigating sheriff's department officers said Keeling apparently fell asleep at the wheel, ran off the road and his car struck a concrete culvert. He was treated at Tawas Hospital and then transferred to a hospital at Garden City.

Mrs. Sara Brown Graves, former director of Iosco Bureau of Social Aid, passed away Wednesday, November 18, at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Joseph Kroc, at Saginaw.

Funeral services were conducted Saturday, November 21, at Hale United Methodist Church with the Rev. Don A. Morris and the Rev. John Kerr officiating. Interment was in Evergreen Cemetery and Hale Chapter No. 482, Order of Eastern Star, conducted a memorial service at the cemetery chapel.

She was born in Ontario, Canada, and came to Michigan with her parents when a child. She came to Hale about 60 years ago when her husband, the late R. D. Brown, became superintendent of the Hale School.

She became his assistant when he was named postmaster at Hale and held that position for 30 years. She became associated with the Iosco Bureau of Social Aid in 1939, where she continued until her retirement in 1953.

She took an active part in civic affairs in the Hale area and Iosco County. 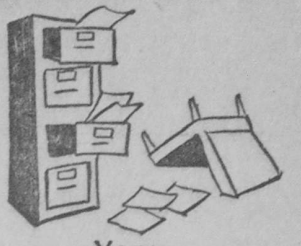

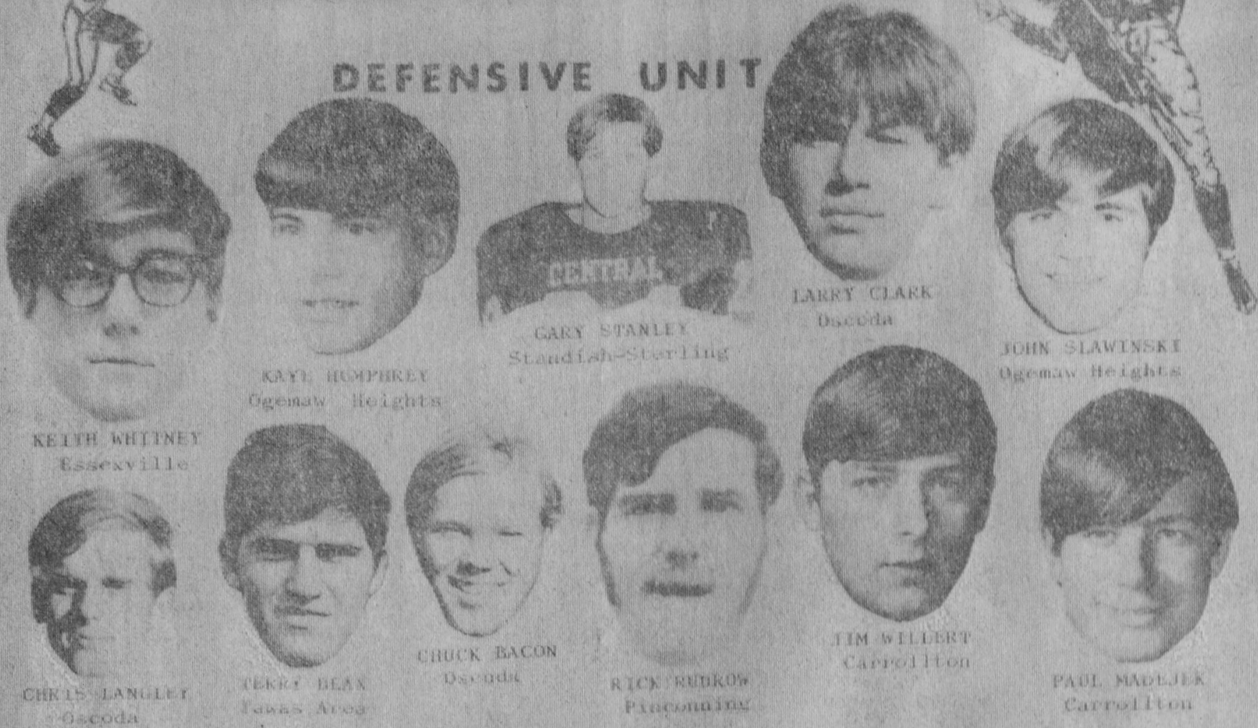

# Hale Area School Voters to Decide Future School Needs

Residents of Hale Area School District are being asked to look at present and future school needs as they go to the polls Wednesday, December 9, to vote on a 1.6 million dollar junior and senior high school.

Faced with a critical need for facilities caused by an expanding enrollment—total school enrollment there has jumped from 560 students in 1968 to 650 in 1970, with a projected enrollment of 800 by 1975—aware citizens and school officials are hoping for overwhelming support from district voters.

In addition to solving the problem of a five percent enrollment increase each year, it is pointed out that good education today requires more modern facilities than those presently available for children of Hale Area School District.

The proposed new school would be built on a 25-acre site, which the district owns, northeast of the present school. The new 17-room junior and senior high school building would include eight regular classrooms, two science laboratories, one home economics room; a library-materials center, a cafeteria-auditorium, arts and crafts room, music room and gymnasium.

Present needs of the school district are most apparent, with seven one-room portable units being leased by the district and the township hall being used as a classroom. After this school year, use of the township hall as a classroom will be discontinued because of state law.

The present junior and senior high school would be converted into an elementary school, to be used for special programs including gymnasium, music, science and other classes which are important to elementary grades.

The present wood frame structure would not be removed immediately, since these rooms would be needed in order to eliminate the cost of portable classrooms. Construction of the new junior and senior high school building, along with utilization of the present structure, would enable the district to move all students into regular buildings, thus eliminating the added cost of portables.

Present facilities are not adequate in such special areas as science, instructional materials center, languages, commercial and home economics. The new building would make it possible for large and small group instruction and to take advantage of the new audio and television medias used in instruction.

**State Association of Counties Sets Dec. 1-2 Confab**

County commissioners and officials from most of Michigan's 83 counties will attend the 72nd annual meeting of the Michigan Association of Counties at the Olds Plaza Hotel, Lansing, December 1-2.

Top experts will conduct seminars and answer questions concerning many vital contemporary problems of county government. Among these will be John Montgomery, HEW assistant secretary; Harry A. DeMaso and Robert L. Richardson, state senators; George Montgomery and Donald Holbrook, state representatives. The seminars will be concerned with welfare, law enforcement, taxation, district courts, county administration and environmental problems.

At the environmental seminar, Ralph A. MacMullan, Department of Natural Resources director, and William A. Wickham, state chamber of commerce counsel, will present the state and business views on this area of concern by counties and what they can do about it.

Also to be discussed is a proposed new charter county statute to allow county government to meet present day problems more effectively and efficiently.

The expected 500 delegates will also elect new officers for 1971.

The projected enrollment of elementary students by 1974-75 shows a need for 18 teaching stations in grades kindergarten through six. This could be met by using the elementary building constructed in 1963 and 12 rooms in the main building.

The proposed new junior and senior high school building is designed to handle the projected enrollment of grades seven through 12 by 1975. Large enrollments in lower grades are causing a critical need for facilities for upper grades as each year progresses.

Hale Area School District comprises approximately 170 square miles, including all or parts of five townships in Iosco and Ogemaw Counties. The district's economy is based on tourism and development of lake properties for year around residents. State equalized valuation of the district has jumped from \$9,674,289 in 1966-1967 to \$20,338,877 in 1970-71.

As a verification of growth of the district, assets of Farmers and Merchants State Bank of Hale have doubled since 1964, with total bank footings today of \$10,392,944. There has been a 100 percent increase in telephones in the district over the past five years and total count of mail boxes at Hale post office has now reached 1,343, as compared to 994 in 1964. The mail box count was made the second week of September in order that only year around residents were counted.

In the fall of 1969, Hale Area Board of Education held meetings with other boards of education in the area to discuss overcrowded conditions at Hale Area. It was the consensus of the boards, which included Tawas Area and Whittemore-Prescott Area, that each school district should remain as is and each handle its own construction requirements.

It was the thinking of districts involved that by each providing its own facilities and utilizing them to the fullest, along with possible cooperation in special shared curriculum programs, the program would be more economical to all involved.

It was felt that use of present and new facilities would be more economical to operate and would reduce transportation problems, as well as providing a more sound educational program with more attention being given to the individual and his identity with his home district.

In addition to better serving the needs of school age children, it was felt the above plan would better serve all ages in the local community as a total community concept of education. At present, Hale Area School has held high school completion classes for three years with an average minimum enrollment of 30 adults and upwards of 200 persons participating in other enrichment and recreational programs.

If a possible reorganization did

take place, the proposed facility would still be needed for an adequate junior high school program.

To finance cost of the 1.6 million dollar bond issue, approximately 5 1/2 to seven mills of taxes would be required, dependent upon interest rates, district valuation and length of time to retire the debt. At the end of this year, Hale Area School will have retired all of its current bonded indebtedness.

Based on the above, annual cost on an average property valuation of \$10,000 would be about \$25 to \$35 per year. Length of time to retire the bond issue would vary from 15 to 29 years, depending upon interest rates and the bond market at the time bonds are sold.

All registered voters in Hale Area School District are eligible to vote on this proposal December 9. Under Michigan law, nonproperty and property owners can now vote in all school elections. Polling place will be located at the school gymnasium.

If approved, the proposed new school would be open in two years, or the fall of 1973. The new building is designed so that additional classrooms could be added as needed and, with this facility, the district would be able to meet standards for accreditation much more easily.

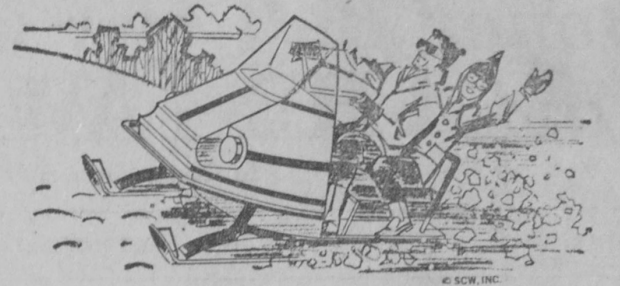

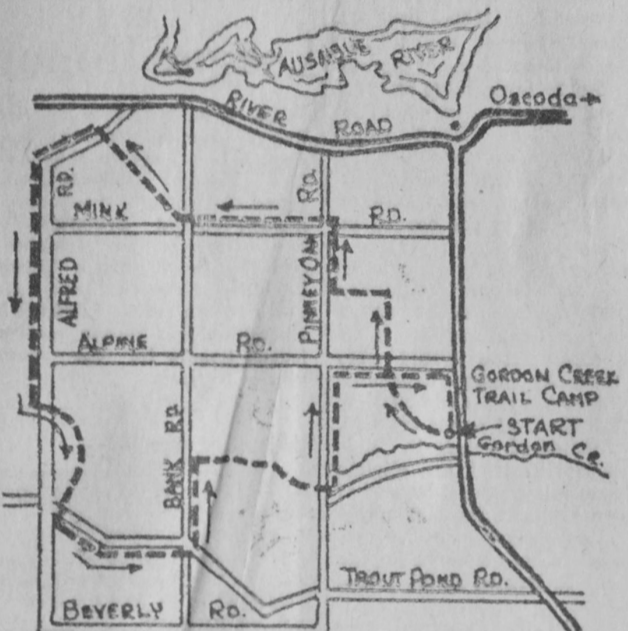

**Break Ground for New IHM Church in TC**

15 Years Ago—

Bublitz, superintendent of public works.

Tawas Chamber of Commerce reports that retail business here during August, as revealed by state sales tax figures, showed an increase of 22.5 percent over the same period in 1954. Not only was this sizeable gain accomplished, but further figures emphasize the fact that this area received more than its full share of the general increase in business.

The world's largest cannon, a 36-inch mortar known as "Little David," was developed as a secret weapon by the United States and ready for action when the war came to an end. It was capable of hurling a 3,650-pound projectile and considered far more dangerous than "Big Bertha" in World War I, used by the Germans

against Paris.

Iosco County is to sell its observation towers used during the war for spotting aircraft.

Iosco Board of Supervisors' roads and bridges committee has recommended the blacktopping of Ausable River Road from Oscoda to Lumbermen's Monument, stating that it is a fact well known that early construction of this improvement would be of mutual benefit to the county and North-eastern Michigan as a whole.

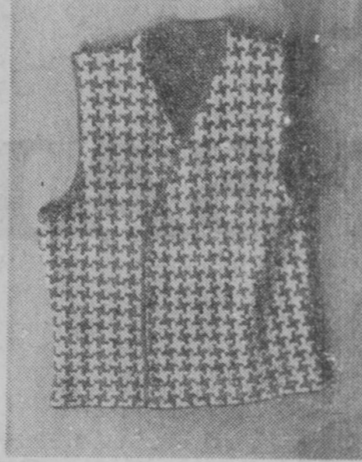

## Some handy information about new phone rates within Michigan.

They're simpler. With the chart below, for instance, you can figure out what it will cost to call any number in the state. Any number outside of your local calling area. Four things determine what you pay: How far you call within Michigan. How long you talk. Whether an operator calls the number or you dial it yourself. The time and day.

And the rates are more fair. Look at the chart again. Notice that you're now charged for "each" minute you use the phone. (Before, you'd pay for no less than 3 minutes. Whether you used them all or not.) Also notice that you're given discounts for dialing direct rather than using an operator. Both of these changes were made for one reason. People should only be asked to pay for what they use. Fair? Fair.

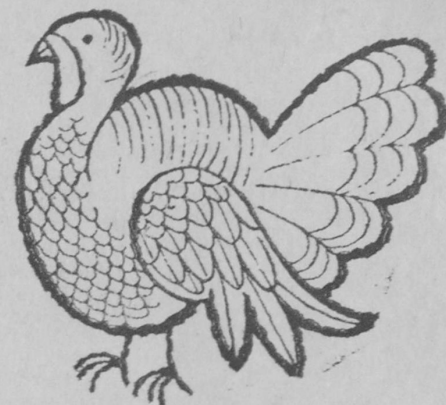
