Businessmen Say

'Coho Fishing Not All Bad'

In a discussion following the Thursday noon luncheon, members of Tawas City Businessmen's Association found that "coho fishermen and coho fishing weren't all bad."

The discussion was brought about by complaints to the Tawas City Council last week that trespassing coho fishermen were damaging privately owned river-front property, as well as having little personal regard for property of others.

Disadvantages of coho fishing to this area, as brought out in the discussion, centered mainly on the destruction of private property and littering, while advantages included recreational value for both outstate fishermen and local townspeople.

Other advantages included an increase in real estate values, improved business conditions in the

'Park Pot' Boiling at October Session

Controversy between members of the Iosco Board of Commissioners and Iosco Park Board again erupted Monday as the commission opened the first day of its week-long October session.

Commissioners, who had made an inspection of Old Orchard Park, stated Monday that the park commission was now in the process of constructing a residence at Old Orchard Park as housing for the park manager.

Members question if such construction was warranted, inasmuch as the county does not furnish free housing for any other employee. Commissioners also questioned the advisability of construction should the leased park be vacated by the county.

This question became a controversial point of view some months ago when the park commission hired a park manager. The park commission hired a manager at a salary higher than any paid to elected or appointed county officers. The board of commissioners cut the salary from \$9,000 to \$8,000 but left in a provision which allowed for furnishing housing to the park manager.

Entire operation of the park commission, with particular emphasis on financing, is being discussed by the county commission and these talks are expected to be continued this week. Last Thursday, the county finance committee held a special meeting with the park commission to discuss its budget for the coming year. Present at the meeting was Edward Nelkie, county treasurer, who questioned a number of budgeted items. Nelkie said Tuesday that he had asked for a meeting with the finance committee during the week.

Principal business of the October session is final adoption of an operational budget for 1971, which had received tentative approval last April. A public hearing on the revised budget is to be held Thursday.

The tentative budget adopted by the commission last April was \$655,520, an increase of approximately \$53,000 over the current year expenditures. Of the total, \$487,090 would be financed by taxes.

In other matters handled Monday, a representative of the Northeast Michigan Mental Health Board explained activities of that organization which maintains an office in Tawas City. It provides complete out-patient services on referrals from schools, the county, physicians, health department and courts.

Annual tour of the county road system has been set for October 28.

The commission confirmed appointments to the Iosco Planning Commission. New members include Wilfred F. Holzheuer and Ralph Rohrbach. Reappointed were Warren Britt, H. W. Cowgill, Wilbur Roach and Robert Foster, who represents the commission.

The board authorized an expenditure of up to \$500 to purchase a gas-fired incinerator for burning trash at the county building.

Thursday afternoon, the commission agreed to absorb a bill for \$1,200, less \$381 deposited with the county treasurer from the drain fund, for three years of maintenance at VanEttan Lake dam. Approval was contingent upon acceptance of all future maintenance responsibilities by Oscoda Township. Last year, the board of commissioners directed that the county drain commissioner spread the maintenance cost on the original special assessment district which had expired. The tax was not levied and the maintenance bill was not paid.

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FIRE of undetermined origin Tuesday morning destroyed the home of William Bessey located on Lorenz Road west of Tawas City. A neighbor, Mrs. Carey Hilbert, spotted smoke coming from the burning building and turned in the alarm to the Tawas City Fire Department. Mr. Bessey, who has been ill, was at the home of his daughter at Oxford.—Tawas Herald Photo.

3 Personal Injury Crashes During Rain

Three personal injury accidents were reported in Iosco County during Friday afternoon's rain storm.

Most serious of the crashes was on M-65 in front of Kocher's Market, Hale, where three persons were injured and taken by ambulance to Tawas Hospital.

A car driven by Raymond S. Boldizar, 42, Glennie, headed north on M-65, struck two cars parked along the highway. Investigating officers said that Boldizar attempted to pass a car and lost control of his vehicle, which struck cars owned by Orsland H. Whitney, 42, Kawawlin, and Beverly Y. Fisher, 33, Davison.

Injured and treated at the hospital were Boldizar, Whitney and Cindy Whitney, age 15.

Four persons were injured on M-65 south of Webb Road, Samuel S. Panzica, 48, Hazel Park, told officers that a rear tire blew out on his vehicle and he lost control. Injured were John Panzica, 15; Vera Panzica, 46; Nick Gueli, 70; Anna Gueli, 70, all passengers in the Panzica car.

The third crash was on Townline Road west of Kobs Road. A car driven by Cynthia K. Blust, 17, Whittemore, skidded on the wet pavement and rolled over. The driver and a passenger, Peggy Edwards, 17 Whittemore, received minor injuries.

A crash early Sunday morning at Hale brought out the Plainfield Township Fire Department, Bruce R. Scofield, 21, Hale, lost control of his car as he turned off M-65 onto Esmond Road. His car skidded into a power pole in front of the old fire barn. The power pole was knocked down and the fire alarm was activated. The driver received minor injuries.

Bonds are to be repaid from proceeds of athletic events.

At Monday night's meeting of the board of education, it was reported that several local persons had expressed interest in entering a bid for the bonds.

Supt. Reynold Mick said that all prospective bidders were welcome. He suggested that anyone interested should first contact a broker in order that the proposition be submitted in the proper form.

Mayor John St. James of Tawas City announced Monday that he had received verbal notification from the Michigan Department of State Highways that a "stop-go" traffic signal is to be installed at the US-23-M-65 intersection in Tawas City. Official notification is expected shortly.

School to Borrow Against State Aid

Borrowing of \$110,000 on future state aid payments in order to meet the November payroll and operational expenses was authorized Monday night by Tawas Area Board of Education.

Supt. Reynold Mick told board of education members that the school has enough money to meet its November 13 payroll, but would not have adequate finances after that time until local taxes are received.

In other business conducted Monday night, the administration was directed to investigate a co-operative purchase plan with Bay, Arenac and Iosco schools. Program during the first year would probably include such expendable items as paper and pencils and the program may be expanded to include supplies for lunch programs.

Supt. Reynold Mick said that this plan had resulted in a saving of 25 to 40 percent for some school districts. The plan had been utilized by Iosco schools a number of years ago but was dropped.

Gene Gerber, community school director, presented a budget for the 1970-71 program. Total expenditure for the program would be \$26,772.54. Income includes \$14,153.54 in state aid, \$1,600 from the Mott Foundation, fees and tuition of \$3,000, a community school grant of \$6,500, adult basic education fees of \$292 and \$1,227 from the school's general fund.

Growth and development of the community school program indicates a total enrollment of 1,890 in 1969-70, as compared to 1,289 in 1968-69. There was no pre-school program the first year, but 29 pupils were included in last year's program. Youth enrichment amounted to 169 enrollees the first year, while this total jumped to 629 in 1969-70.

Other categories included teen programs, 415 in 1968-69 and 629 in 1969-70; 193 in adult recreation in 1968-69, 329 in 1969-70; 141 in adult enrichment in 1968-69, 220 the following year.

Track Bond Bids to be Opened Monday by Board

Tawas Area School will open bids on the sale of \$21,000 worth of revenue bonds at a special meeting of the board of education scheduled for Monday, October 19, 8:00 p. m.

The school received permission from the Municipal Finance Commission to sell the revenue bonds as a means for financing construction of the new track at the high school.

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School Board Adopts Policy On Free Lunches to Needy

In order to comply with a new federal law, Tawas Area Board of Education Monday night approved a new policy relative to free or reduced cost lunches to low income families.

To be eligible to participate, the parents or guardian of the child involved must make application to the school on the form prescribed by law. These forms

were mailed to families which participated last term and are available to other prospective applicants at the school office.

Information to be furnished includes the child's name, the household's monthly income from all sources (includes wages, public assistance payments, social security, etc.), number of persons in the family, number of children attending

school, if the family is participating in the food stamp or commodity distribution program, or if any special situation exists which makes the family expense greater than normal.

On a reduced price plan for meals served to children, the applicant is to specify the amount which he can afford to pay per meal for each child.

Children from families whose incomes are at or below those listed in the following scale are eligible to receive reduced prices or free lunches: Family of one with a nonfarm income of \$2,075; family of two, income of \$2,725; family of three, income of \$3,375; family of four, income of \$4,025; family of five, income of \$4,670; family of six, income of \$5,215; family of

seven, income of \$5,860; family of eight, income of \$6,505; family of nine, income of \$7,150; family of ten, income of \$7,795.

Fuelgas Moves to New Location

Fuelgas Company of the Tawas is moving from its old location in the West Tawas yard of the Detroit and Mackinac Railway Company to its new location 1 1/4 miles south of Tawas City on US-23, next to the National Gypsum Company terminal.

The old location, bounded on the south by Tawas River and on the east by Dead Creek, had served as the location of Fuelgas Company of the Tawas for 22 years.

Continuing as manager of the firm will be Edwin Habermehl, who opened the old plant in 1948 and opened the new modern store and bulk plant on Monday, October 12.

Habermehl and his crew will continue to serve needs of the local area for water heaters, ranges, furnaces, space heaters and bottle gas.

Residents are asked to stop by the new store this week to view the modern plant and the many sale specials. All attending are to register for prizes to be awarded Saturday, October 17, 6:00 p. m. Winners must be present to be eligible to take home a prize.

An ox roast is to be held at the

new location on Friday, October 16. "Stop by for a sandwich," states Habermehl.

Tanner actively participated in more than 25 aerial missions over hostile territory in support of operations against communist aggression. "During all of these flights, he displayed the highest order of air discipline and acted in accordance with the best traditions of the service," stated the citation.

seven, income of \$5,750; family of eight, income of \$6,300. For each additional family member, add income of \$485.

The school also takes into account unusual circumstances, including illness or death in the family, temporary disability, seasonal unemployment in determining eligibility.

In order to safeguard identity of participants, children receiving free or reduced price lunches will be treated in the same manner as full paying students.

Miss Clara Bolen, elementary principal, was named to head up the committee which will screen applicants for this special program.

It was reported that the cost per meal served in the lunch program last year averaged out to 52 cents, while the per meal income to the school was 47 cents.

The board of education went on record as opposing any requirement for the school district to furnish free lunches to children

whose parents are involved in a labor strike. A letter is to be sent to federal and state officials.



Braves Sloshed to 14-8 Win Over Ogemaw Heights

A highly determined bunch of Tawas Area Braves sloshed to their second straight NBC win Friday night, coming from behind to down Ogemaw Heights, 14-8. It was the second time in two weeks that the Braves won by one touchdown.

Displaying a good running attack despite a muddy field, Halfback Dave Moe racked up 124 yards of Tawas' 147 yards rushing for the game. The Braves tried only three passes in the rain, one of which went incomplete and one was intercepted. The third was completed for a two-point conversion.

Tawas' defense was again the key in this game, holding Ogemaw Heights to only 24 yards on the ground in the second half and six yards by passing. Ogemaw Heights had a bad break in the second quarter when Quarterback Steve Kimball dislocated his hip.

The Braves proved to be good "madders" with no fumbles charged against them. The Braves scored first in the game, with six minutes, 57 seconds remaining in the first quarter. After taking the opening kick-

off, Tawas had the ball for 11 plays and Quarterback Tom Kasischke scored a six-pointer on a one-yard sneak. The try for point after touchdown was no good. Ogemaw Heights roared right back and took the lead. Moving from its own 39 after the kickoff, the Falcons scored 11 plays later. The Braves had stopped the Falcon ground game and had Kimball trapped for a loss, but the OH quarterback managed to pitch to Virgil Neubecker, who ran for the touchdown. Kimball scored the two-point conversion on a roll out. Tawas' offense, which picked up 90 yards in the first half, began to execute plays smartly in the second half. The Braves controlled the ball for much of the third quarter and Moe picked up 30 yards in eight carries to score the winning touchdown. A fake kick and a pass from Kasischke to Mike Svtenko accounted for the two-point conversion.

Ogemaw Heights was able to penetrate beyond the 50-yard line only once in the second half and that was on the last play of the game when Tawas was in its "victory" defense to guard against the

long pass. Tawas had three good scoring opportunities late in the third quarter and in the fourth quarter but was unable to capitalize on them.

This win sets the stage for the traditional battle this Friday night between the Braves and the Oscoda Owls. Tawas Area will host Oscoda and it is expected that the school's new bleachers will be filled to capacity for the first time. The Owls are undefeated in three conference games while the Braves have a two and one record.



Family Living Education

By Bread Alone

While man (and the rest of the family) may not live by bread alone, bread certainly is a popular item in the weekly grocery supply. An accompaniment for meals, indispensable in sandwiches, an ingredient in dishes from soups to desserts, bread is the backbone of family meals.

The average family will eat its way through 260 loaves of bread this year . . . at a cost of around \$70. The "bread" is just that and does not include rolls, muffins, crackers and such which will cost an additional \$70 or so. But "bread" does include all the specialty breads such as raisin, cinnamon, rye, whole wheat and the many other types.

The average family likes thin sliced, soft textured white bread best. The specialties make up only

a small part of the total market. Bread really is a pretty good bargain although the price has increased in nine of the past 10 years . . . and the odds favor another price increase in the next 12 months. Most of the price increase has been due to cost increases for getting the bread mixed, baked and delivered. In fact, if the cost of the ingredients were eliminated, the price of a one-pound loaf of bread would decrease less than four cents.

The job of the labor force in the wheat-to-flour-to-bread industry is unique. Most food processing industries convert perishable products into less perishable forms. The baking industry does it the other way . . . a semiperishable product, wheat, is processed into a more perishable one, bread.

When you think about it, it seems reasonable that the largest part of the cost of your loaf of bread is added at the bakery. That is where bread happens. In the time it takes to move flour and other ingredients through the bakery to the grocery store, they are stored, mixed and baked into bread which is sliced, wrapped and delivered. Labor costs account for just over half of a baker's expenses.

If this suggests to a homemaker with money-saving on her mind that she might be better off baking bread at home, best advice would be "forget it." Cost comparisons between a loaf of homemade bread and one bought, already sliced, in the store, are in favor of the store-bought method if you value your time at more than 10 cents per hour. Volume purchase of ingredients and mass production efficiencies help hold commercially baked bread costs to a minimum. More substantial savings can be realized by making your own tea rings, sweet rolls and coffee cakes at home. Mark-up on these products when they are commercially prepared is higher than for bread. Creative satisfaction is high, too, for specialty baked goods.





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
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
