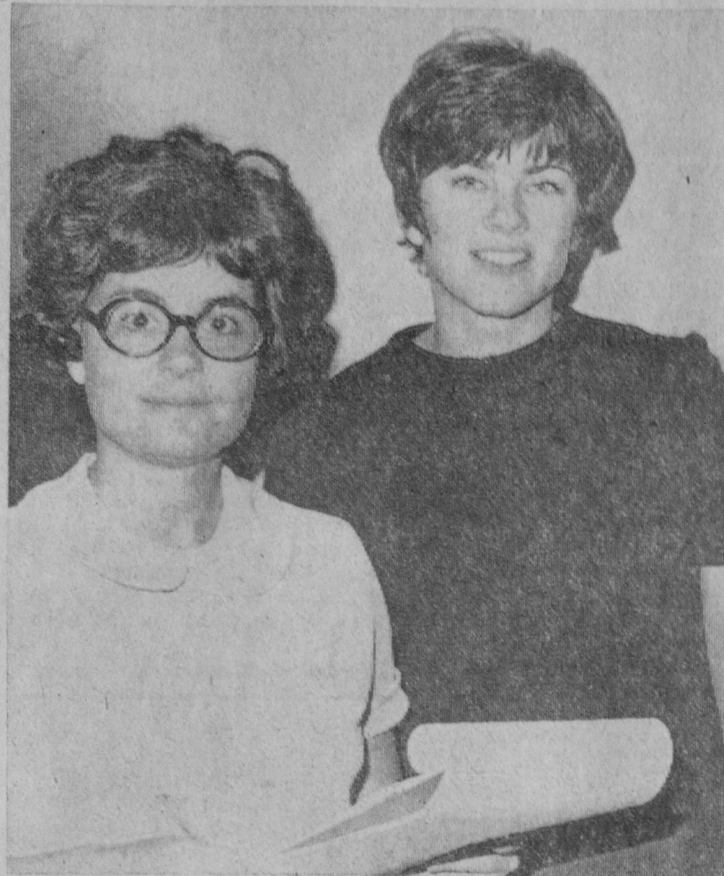

## Two New Speech Therapists Hired

Two new speech therapists have been hired this year by Iosco Intermediate School District.

Screening kindergarten children in the Tawas City Elementary Unit Monday morning were Miss Patti Burk and Mrs. Mary Godlewski.

Miss Burk began her duties last summer in the Headstart Program conducted at Tawas Area School. A resident of Farmington and a graduate of North Farmington High School, she received her bachelor of science degree as a speech therapist last June at Central Michigan University.

Mrs. Godlewski graduated in August from the College of Arts and Sciences, Geneseo, New York, with a master degree in speech pathology and audiology. She received her bachelor degree in 1969. She was formerly a resident of Central Square, New York. Her husband, Raymond, is a freight traffic specialist at Wurtsmith Air Force Base.

Iosco Intermediate School District now has three speech therapists on its staff, according to Ernest W. Jordan Jr., intermediate school district superintendent.

The third member is Robert Kennedy, who is assigned to Whittemore-Prescott Area School. Mrs. Godlewski works in the Hale Area

and Tawas Area School Districts while Miss Burk is assigned full time to Tawas Area School District.

The speech therapists are now screening kindergarten children as a means of determining those with speech impediments and language problems. Each therapist will have responsibility for about 75 children.

Working with groups of five to six children, each child will spend one hour a week in the speech improvement classes. Teachers attempt to make this instruction as interesting and as enjoyable as possible for the students.

Therapists also work with mentally retarded children, those with emotional problems and may provide assistance to adults, who have had speech loss through illness. In cooperation with classroom teachers, the therapists will conduct workshops for children with speech and hearing problems.

This service is provided at no cost to the local school district. The program is financed through state aid and special millage provided by a vote of the people in the intermediate district.

In addition to the three therapists, Robert Mattson is diagnostician in speech and audiology for the intermediate school district.

## Board Adopts 1970 Contract

Formal adoption of a master contract for the 1970-71 school year with Tawas Area Education Association (TAEA) was completed Monday night by Tawas Area Board of Education.

Tentative approval of the contract had been given by the board of education and TAEA prior to Labor Day to insure opening of school at the regular starting time. Only the lack of time to legally call a special board of education meeting prevented formal acceptance at that time.

Terms of the new contract, disclosed officially for the first time Monday night, sets the starting salary of a teacher with a bachelor degree at \$7,425 and maximum salary over a 10-year period at \$10,915. The teachers had asked for a starting salary of \$7,800 and \$11,466 maximum.

For teachers with a master degree, the starting salary would be \$7,825 with a maximum of \$11,737 in 10 steps. The teachers had sought a minimum of \$8,200 and \$12,300 as the maximum.

Teachers are to receive \$10 per semester hour for hours earned toward a master degree and \$5 per hour for hours accepted by the board of education for work beyond the master degree.

In addition, teachers are to receive \$1 per day for nonused sick leave days. Teachers employed for extra hours during the day are to receive an amount equal to a substitute's pay, or \$5 per hour for extra work.

Teachers on noon hall duty and teachers assigned to noon outside duty are to receive \$5 per hour or \$2.50 per half hour.

The board of education is to provide, without cost to teachers, full family health insurance benefits. Effective October 1, maternity benefits under this program would be \$600, hospital daily indemnity would be increased to \$50 and multicare hospital benefit of \$60 per day.

Effective September 1, 1971, the board would provide up to \$38

per month for each teacher to be applied toward health insurance, the exact amount to be determined by employees' desire for full family, two person or single subscriber.

Under the contract, the health insurance carrier may be MESSA, Blue Cross-Blue Shield or Confederation Life of Canada at the option of the employee or others by mutual consent of the board and the association. This money cannot be used for life insurance purposes.

The extra duty schedule included in the contract would set the following rates to be paid to coaches.

Head varsity football, \$750; assistant varsity football, \$550; head junior varsity football, \$450; head ninth grade football, \$450; assistant ninth grade football, \$450; head varsity basketball, \$750; junior varsity basketball, \$550; ninth grade basketball, \$450; eighth grade basketball, \$450.

Varsity baseball, \$550; junior varsity baseball, \$450; head track, \$550; assistant track, \$450; cheerleading coach, \$250; assistant cheerleading coach, \$150; head golf, \$450; girl's basketball, \$450; head cross-country, \$450.

Other extra duty salaries include: Debate, \$250; forensics, \$175; department heads, \$225; lockers, \$225; special education, \$500.

A total of 76 teachers are numbered on the school faculty for the 1970-71 school term. The school administration is now analyzing new benefits and salary increases to determine the increased cost to the school budget.

## Iosco School Enrollment Up 227 Students

Enrollment increases have been noted in all four of Iosco County's school districts, according to reports Tuesday from school administrators.

Total enrollment of the four school districts as of Monday was 8,189, as compared to 7,962 on the fourth Friday count last year.

A report from Supt. Ray Kesler Tuesday morning indicated that Whittemore-Prescott Area School's enrollment is 1,156 students, a gain of 80 students over the fourth Friday count of last year. This includes 630 pupils in elementary grades, 490 students in grades seven through 12 and about 36 adult education students.

Hale Area School, according to Supt. Paul Southerland, has an increase of 30 students over last year's fourth Friday count. The enrollment count Monday was 651, as compared to 621 on the fourth Friday of last year. The new total includes 635 pupils in elementary grades and 286 students in grades seven through 12.

Tawas Area School's total enrollment as of Monday was 1,982, according to Supt. Reynold Mick. This was an increase of 61 over last year's fourth Friday count. As of Monday, grades kindergarten through six had 923 pupils and grades seven through 12 had 1,059 students.

Oscoda Area School's total enrollment Monday morning was 4,400, as compared to 4,344 students on the fourth Friday last year. Robert Hodges, assistant superintendent, said that the new enrollment figure was an estimate as Oscoda Area School did not open until Monday of this week because of a one-week delay in settling a new contract with teachers.

The fourth Friday count is used to determine state aid payments to schools.

## W-P Voters Okeh Three Tax Proposals

Whittemore - Prescott Area School voters showed their support of the school district by approving three different tax increase propositions Monday by nearly two to one margins.

The special election was called by the board of education to avert operating at a deficit during the current school year.

Three proposals approved were as follows:

1. Two additional mills for operational purposes for a period of one year was approved, 238-132.

2. One mill for one year to provide funds for hardsurfacing the drive and parking area at the high school was approved, 236-131.

3. An advisory ballot asking if the board should use its legal power under the state's five percent bonding clause to build a shop addition which was approved in a previous election, providing total millage levied for bond retirement purposes does not exceed three mills, was approved, 222-146.

The first proposition had the most immediate importance to the district. The new state aid bill calls for a minimum of 14 mills in local taxes to take advantage of the state formula. The district levies 12.5 mills at present and stood to lose \$28,000 in operational revenue. In addition, a change in the formula for distributing state Title III money means the district will lose \$34,000 in anticipated revenue this year, almost equivalent to two mills requested.

Supt. Ray Kesler was delighted over the outcome of Monday's special election. He said that plans were made at Monday night's meeting of the board of education for hardsurfacing the parking lot.

Kesler said that the school has plans prepared for the shop addition, which would include facilities for metal shop, mechanical drawing and an office.

# 65-55 Crash Saturday Claims Fourth Victim

The M-65-55 intersection in Western Iosco County claimed four more lives early Saturday morning.

Killed in a two-car crash were Patsy E. Smith, 35, and Ronald E. Smith, 16, both of Lincoln Park and passengers in one car, and Marjorie M. Norlock, 55, National City.

The crash claimed its fourth victim Monday when Edward Smith, 39, driver of the car from Lincoln Park, succumbed to his injuries at Mercy Hospital, Bay City. He had been transferred there after initial treatment at Tawas Hospital following the crash.

Fourth member of the Smith family injured in the crash, Sandra Smith, eight years old, is in critical condition at the Bay City hospital.

Investigating Iosco County Sheriff's Department officers said that the Smith vehicle was headed north on M-65. The pickup truck operated by Mrs. Norlock was headed west on M-55 and failed to stop for the intersection. The investigation report said that no skid marks were found on the highway prior to impact.

Eleven persons have died in auto accidents on this section of M-65 during the past year. Three per-

sons were killed at the State Road intersection in Iosco County last May. A few days later, four persons lost their lives in a crash at the Turner Road intersection in Arenac County.

Tawas Area Board of Education is to hold its meeting Monday, September 21, rather than on the fourth Monday. The board has reverted to a 7:30 p. m. starting time for the winter months effective at the next meeting.

## Senior Citizens Get Ticket Reduction at School Events

With expanded facilities for seating spectators at football events, Tawas Area Board of Education Monday night authorized a new reduced admission rate to be charged senior citizens attending school events.

The new rate to be charged senior citizens, 65 years of age and older, would be 50 cents. The regular admission charge is \$1.25 for adults and 75 cents for students.

In order to be eligible, the senior citizen would be required to apply to the school office for a special card that would admit the holder at the reduced rates.

In other business conducted at Monday night's meeting, the board of education and administration went on record as strongly opposing allocation of state aid funds on the basis of findings in the state's assessment of fourth and seventh grade students.

This testing program was conducted for the first time last year. While the program is a valuable aid for testing students as to achievement in the classroom, it also considers the socio-economic background of the student.

Supt. Reynold Mick told members Monday that he had learned at a meeting held at Traverse City that this socio-economic aspect would be used as a basis for distribution of state funds on an equal education basis.

Robert Elliott, board president, declared that distribution of state aid in this manner would be "rewarding mediocrity" and that many outside school districts would be hurt.

One district in Iosco County, Whittemore-Prescott Area, has already been affected. The school district has lost about \$30,000 in state aid due to its high achievement scoring among fourth and seventh graders.

The board authorized reinstatement of a book deposit for the 1970-71 school term in order to insure return of books by students at the end of the school year. The board authorized the administration to come up with a reasonable figure as a book deposit, at a family or individual rate, to be adopted at the next meeting.

The school superintendent reported that a supply of pencils, pens and paper had been secured in order to comply with the recent state supreme court ruling regarding furnishing of supplies. He said that by October, a guideline could be developed in regard to how much supplies the school would furnish each student.

Because of the supreme court ruling, the school would retain ownership of projects made by students with school furnished materials in shop or home economics classes. These items could be purchased by the student by paying for the cost of materials used.

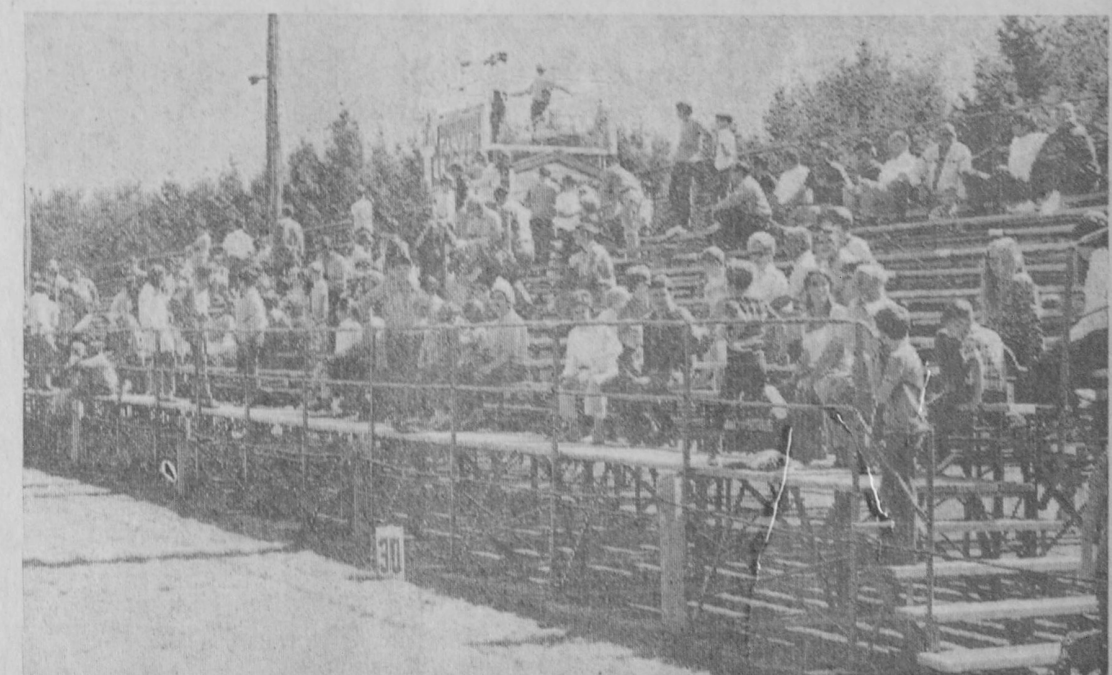
The board signed a contract for rental of two classrooms in the Zion Lutheran School, which did not open this year. The public school would pay a monthly rental of \$100 and would pay 50 percent of the fuel and lighting bill for the school portion of the building.

The administration has issued 83 permits to students who have need of a vehicle for transportation to or from school for various reasons. A number of "tickets" were issued to students who drove cars to school Monday without a permit.

Mrs. Tennant is the former Edna Nixon and is a former member of Whitemore Chapter.

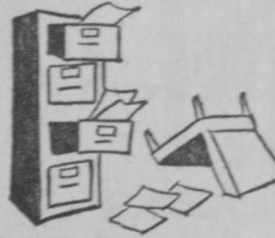
The degrees were conferred on proton candidates.
