## **Judge Grants Mistrial Due** to Illness

### Due to family illness of one member of a district court jury, a mistrial was granted by Judge J. Richard Ernst in a case brought by the Michigan Department of Natural Resources vs. Duane Seaman, Oscoda commercial fisherman.

Judge Ernst rescheduled the trial for Friday, October 30, 9:30 a. m.

Seaman was charged May 21 with making use of a commercial fish tug and nets for the purpose of taking and catching fish in Lake Huron without first having applied for and been issued a commercial fishing license.

A trial by jury was commenced Friday before Judge Ernst and was to have resumed Monday.

During the trial, attorneys for the Oscoda fisherman claimed that he had applied for and had been issued a commercial fishing license and had paid the necessary state fees.
