On the subject of schools, Juha says they are quite different in his homeland. While considered a senior in this country, he will have two more years of high school when he returns to Finland and will not graduate until almost 21 years of age.

His studies in Finland have centered around the study of four languages, German, Swedish, English and Finnish, as well as geometry, algebra and general mathematics.

He is aiming toward an engineering career, probably in the automotive or related mechanical field.

Juha finds the climate in this part of Michigan not unlike his native Helsinki, even though the latter is in the same latitude as middle Canada.

His father is a director on the Finnish state railway. He has a married brother and two sisters, one of whom is married and the other is a high school student.

"I have not been too surprised with what I have found in America. I have had talks with other students who participated in the program and learned quite a bit about this country through reading and watching television," commented the visitor.

Ground Broken for Improvements at Tawas Hospital

"This is not just a little addition, but practically a new hospital," commented the Rev. Fr. Raymond Pilarski, hospital chaplain and pastor of Immaculate Heart of Mary Church, during ground breaking ceremonies Friday afternoon at Tawas Hospital.

The remark was accurate for the ceremony marked the start of a 1.2-million-dollar expansion of the hospital.

Included in this project will be

expansion of the hospital's bed capacity from 44 to 58. A new wing for patients will be constructed to the north and the kitchen, heating plant, operating and emergency rooms, as well as standby power generating plant, will be modernized.

The project is being financed by a federal grant, plus \$2,300 in local funds.

About 200 persons were on hand to watch Richard Harris, president of the hospital association, and Sister Elaine, sister supervisor, participate in the "Golden Space" ceremony. Assisting them was State Rep. George A. Prescott of Tawas City.

Following the ground breaking, in which two shovels punted gold and silver were used, guests inspected present facilities and enjoyed refreshments in the hospital cafeteria.

Besides the hospital chaplain, remarks were heard during the program from the Rev. Alfred Saulsbury, pastor of Christ Episcopal Church, East Tawas; Rabbi Joseph Kratzenstein of Temple Israel, Bay City.

Invocation was given by the Rev. William L. Stone, pastor of the United Methodist Church of Oscoda, and the benediction was by the Rev. Fr. John Rushman, pastor of St. Joseph Catholic Church, East Tawas.

M. Jerry Norwood, hospital administrator, was master of ceremonies and introduced members of the hospital board of directors and guests.

Announcement was made that Gregory Construction Company, Bay City, has been awarded the general contract for construction at the hospital. The mechanical contract went to Werner, Incorporated, Cheboygan; electrical contract to Southeastern Electric; Bay City; kitchen equipment contract to Kirckman Brothers, Bay City.

The above were low bidders at a bid opening held August 5.

Registrations are being taken until Friday, October 9, for Tawas Area Schools' community school program. Applicants may call the high school, 362-2381, between 1:00 to 4:00 p. m. or between 7:00 to 10:00 p. m., or they may register by mail.

Classes are open to any person regardless of age, residence, previous schooling or experience.

Classes are to begin the week of October 21. The classes will meet one night a week for a total of eight weeks unless indicated otherwise by the instructor. Recreational classes will meet for a longer period of time.

There must be a minimum of eight persons enrolled in a class in order to underwrite operational costs. If there is not sufficient enrollment, the class will not be offered. If a class has limited enrollment, it will be filled on a first come, first serve basis.

Fees are payable the first night of the class. No refunds will be made after a class has met for the second time. Persons who are 60 years of age or older may enroll in any class for one-half the class fee.

Judge Grants Mistrial Due to Illness

Due to family illness of one member of a district court jury, a mistrial was granted by Judge J. Richard Ernst in a case brought by the Michigan Department of Natural Resources vs. Duane Seaman, Oscoda commercial fisherman.

Judge Ernst rescheduled the trial for Friday, October 30, 9:30 a. m.

Seaman was charged May 21 with making use of a commercial fish tug and nets for the purpose of taking and catching fish in Lake Huron without first having applied for and been issued a commercial fishing license.

A trial by jury was commenced Friday before Judge Ernst and was to have resumed Monday.

During the trial, attorneys for the Oscoda fisherman claimed that he had applied for and had been issued a commercial fishing license and had paid the necessary state fees.

The violation allegedly resulted when the defendant refused to sign the license, the defendant claiming that his signature would put him out of business as he would not be able to fish at a profit.

Attorneys for the defendant claim that state authorities committed an illegal search and seizure when impounding fish and nets on Seaman's fish tug.

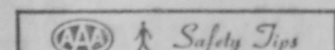

Rebounding Panthers Crush Tawas Braves, 20-6, at Central

Standish-Sterling's Panthers rebounded from a season opener loss to defeat the Tawas Area Braves, 20-6, Friday in the first night of Northern B Conference competition.

Friday night's win by the Panthers evened the record over the past six years for these two traditional NBC rival schools. In games since 1965, each school has won three games. The Braves were victorious in 1969, 1967 and 1966, while the Panthers rang up victories in 1968, 1965 and now in 1970.

Despite three touchdowns scored against them, the Braves still looked as sharp on defense against the Panthers as they were in the opening win against Harrison. A long punt return for a Panther touchdown, plus key pass interference and roughing the kicker calls against the Braves were turning points in the game.

Excluding the 82-yard punt return, Tawas held Standish-Sterling to 91 yards rushing and 26 yards by passing. The Panthers were able to pick up five yards or more on only seven plays and the Tawas defense held the winners to no gain or losses on 20 plays.

On the other hand, Tawas had 155 yards offensively, 94 by rushing and 61 by passing. The big difference, however, was the defensive play of Tim Dunc, 200-pound Panther guard, whose blitzing tactics made a shambles of Tawas'

offense. The Braves were caught in the backfield seven times for a loss of 99 yards and this could be attributed to the fine play of the Panther senior.

"We were not outbit, but we hurt ourselves with a lot of mistakes. Penalties hurt, but we can't overlook the fact that after losing badly in the opener, Standish-Sterling changed its offense and was really up for this one," commented Tawas Head Coach Ted Guthard. "Everyone, including the coaches, was probably a little overconfident after our opening win and we will just have to learn by our mistakes in this one."

After the two teams battled to a scoreless tie in the first quarter, Standish-Sterling was first to light up the scoreboard and the Panthers did it in a big way. Cas Juruk, junior quarterback, took a Tawas punt, brushed off several tacklers and returned the ball 82 yards for the touchdown. Gary Stanley, leading Panther ground gainer, scored the two-point conversion.

Juruk scored the Panthers' second touchdown on a quarterback sneak of two yards. This touchdown capped a 45-yard drive which was set up when Tawas intercepted a Panther pass and was called for interference. The conversion try failed.

The third touchdown came with 11 minutes remaining in the fourth quarter. After stopping the

Standish-Sterling offense cold, a 15-yard penalty was assessed against Tawas Area for roughing the kicker. Two plays later, Stanley went 24 yards for a touchdown. The try for conversion failed.

After spending most of the game with their backs to their own goal, the Braves started to roll at the middle of the fourth quarter. Quarterback Tom Kasichke connected on passes of 11 and 24 yards to End Chuck Petersen. A pass interference call gave the Braves an added 15 yards. Fullback Dave Moe then took over on the ground and in runs of nine and five yards scored Tawas Area's lone touchdown of the night. The try for conversion failed.

Moe was Tawas Area's leading ground gainer of the night with 67 yards in 13 plays.

Kasichke again played an outstanding game from the quarterback slot, in spite of being clobbered about five times by the blitzing tactics of Dunc. He was singled out by Coach Guthard to receive two complimentary tickets to Saturday's Michigan State University football game at East Lansing.

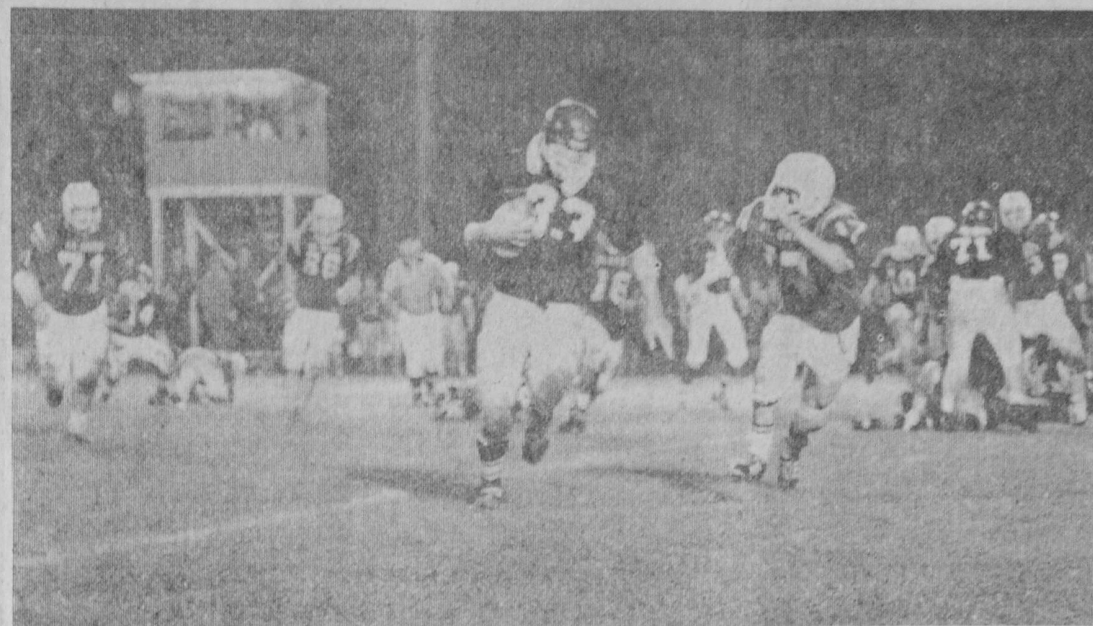
Action this week finds the Braves playing host to the Flying Gs of Gladwin, a team which was crushed by Osceola Friday night, but always tough and a contender in the NBC.

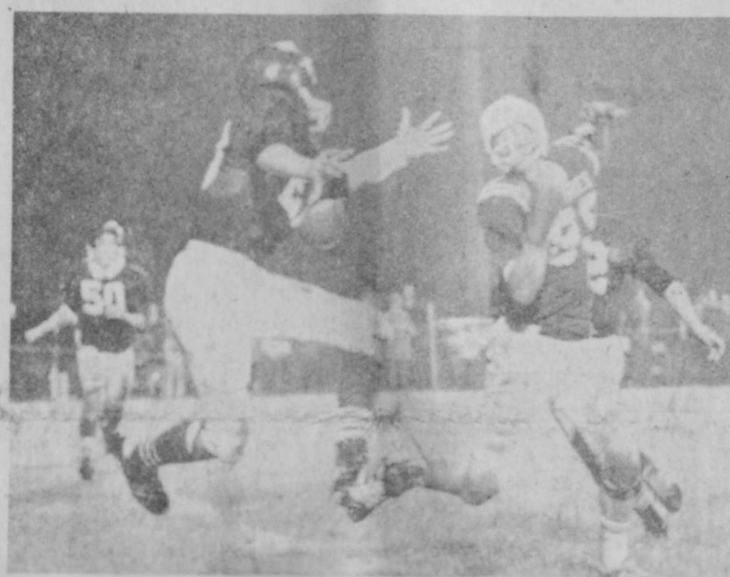

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Soil Analysts Have Important Role

When the army decides a road is to be built, an airfield constructed or a base camp set up, among the first at the site are the soil analysts. For a successful job depends on their professional judgment as to the desirability of a particular site location. The personnel are well qualified in their field, acquainted as they are with the testing of soils and construction materials for use in the design, control and evaluation of roads and airfields.

Mathematics, especially algebra, and a science—chemistry, biology or physics are particularly emphasized—are necessary for the successful completion of a course lasting seven weeks and three days. This follows eight weeks of basic training, mandatory of every enlistee. Instruction in soils analysis is given at the United States Army Engineer School at Ft. Bel-

voir, Virginia. In classes, students obtain a working knowledge of geology as it pertains to construction materials; a familiarization with soils used in military construction; and of field and laboratory testing of bitumen (an asphalt used as a cement and mortar) and concrete. They must also be acquainted with the make-up of the material in roads and airfields.

Sergeant Craig has more information on this field and any other of a number of fields open to young men and women in today's modern army. Interested individuals may visit him at the Federal Building, Bay City. His hours are from 8:00 a. m. to 5:00 p. m., Monday through Friday, and from 9:00 a. m. to 12:00 p. m. on Saturday. Each Wednesday, he is at the Selective Service Office, East Tawas, at 1:00 p. m.

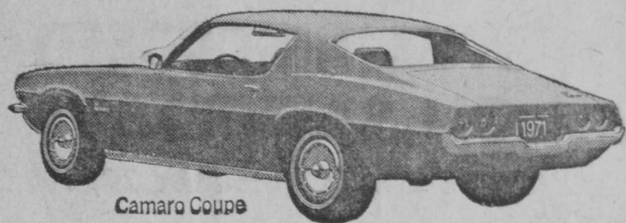

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ress. Do my tips count for social security?

Answer: Yes, if they amount to \$20 or more a month from one employer. If they do, you must give your employer a written report of your tips within 10 days after the end of that month. If you do not report the tips to your employer, you must report them and pay the social security contributions directly to the Internal Revenue Service.

Question: I know social security helps older people, but what about young workers like me? What is in it for us? I am 28 years old and see nothing ahead but contributions until I am 65.

Answer: Social security provides a great deal of valuable protection for you and other young workers long before you reach retirement age. You and your family are protected against loss of income resulting from disability or death. If you should die, your dependents may receive a lump-sum death payment and monthly cash benefits.

Question: I am a newlywed who plans to keep working until my husband completes his college. My employer tells me I should have my social security card changed since it still shows my maiden name. Is this necessary? I understand you only receive one number in your life anyway.

Answer: This is true, you keep the same social security number for life, however, your employer is right. For social security record keeping purposes, your name and number must be correct to assure proper credit for your earnings. The people at any social security office can quickly issue you a new card showing your new name.

Any elector who is unable to make personal application for registration because of physical disability or absence from the Township, City or Village in which his legal residence is located, may be registered prior to the close of registration before any election or primary election by securing from the Clerk of the Township, City or Village in which is located his legal residence, duplicate registration cards and executing in duplicate the registration affidavit before a notary public or other officer legally authorized to administer oaths and returning such registration cards to the Clerk of the Township, City or Village before the close of

office hours on the last day of registration prior to any election or primary election. The notary public or other officer administering the oath shall sign his name on the line for the signature of the registration officer and designate his title.

UNREGISTERED PERSONS NOT ENTITLED TO VOTE

SEC. 491. The inspectors of election at any election or primary election in this State, or in any District, County Township, City or Village thereof, shall not receive the vote of any person whose name is not registered in the registration book of the Township, Ward or Precinct in which he offers to vote (As provided under Act 116, P. A. 1954).

TRANSFER OF REGISTRATION, APPLICATION, TIME

SEC. 506. Any registered elector may upon change of residence within the Township, City or Village cause his registration to be transferred to his new address by sending to the Clerk a signed request, stating his present address, the date he moved thereto, and the address from which he was last registered, or by applying in person for a transfer. The Clerk shall strike through the last address, ward and precinct number and record the new address, ward and precinct number on the original and duplicate registration cards, and shall place the original registration card in proper precinct file. Such transfers shall not be made after the Fifth Friday next preceding any regular or special election or primary election, (unless such Fifth Friday shall fall on a legal holiday in which event registration transfers shall be accepted during the following day).

TRANSFER OF REGISTRATION ON ELECTION DAY

SEC. 507. Any registered elector who has removed from one election precinct of a Township, City or Village to another election precinct of the same Township, City or Village and has not recorded such removal with the local Clerk shall execute a transfer of registration request, listing the new residence address thereon over his signature, with the election board in the precinct in which he is registered at the next ensuing primary or election. The inspector of election in charge of the registration records shall compare the signature thereon with the signature upon the applicant's registration record and, if the signatures correspond, then the inspector shall certify such fact by affixing his initials upon said request. The applicant for transfer, after having signed an application to vote as provided in Section 523 of this act, shall then be permitted to vote in such precinct for that primary or election only. The application for transfer shall be filed with the Township, City or Village Clerk who shall transfer such voter's registration in accordance with the application. When the name of any street in a Township, City or Village has been changed, it shall be the duty of the Township, City or Village Clerk to make the change to show the proper name of street in the registration records, and it shall not be necessary for the elector to change his registration with respect thereto in order to be eligible to vote.

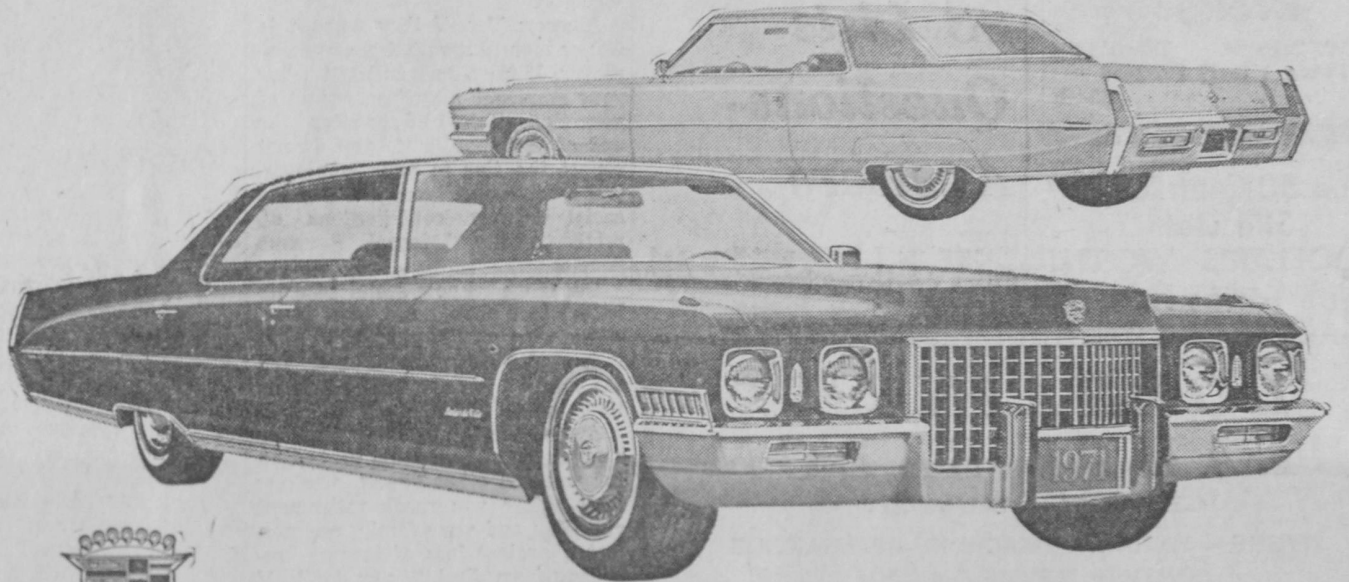

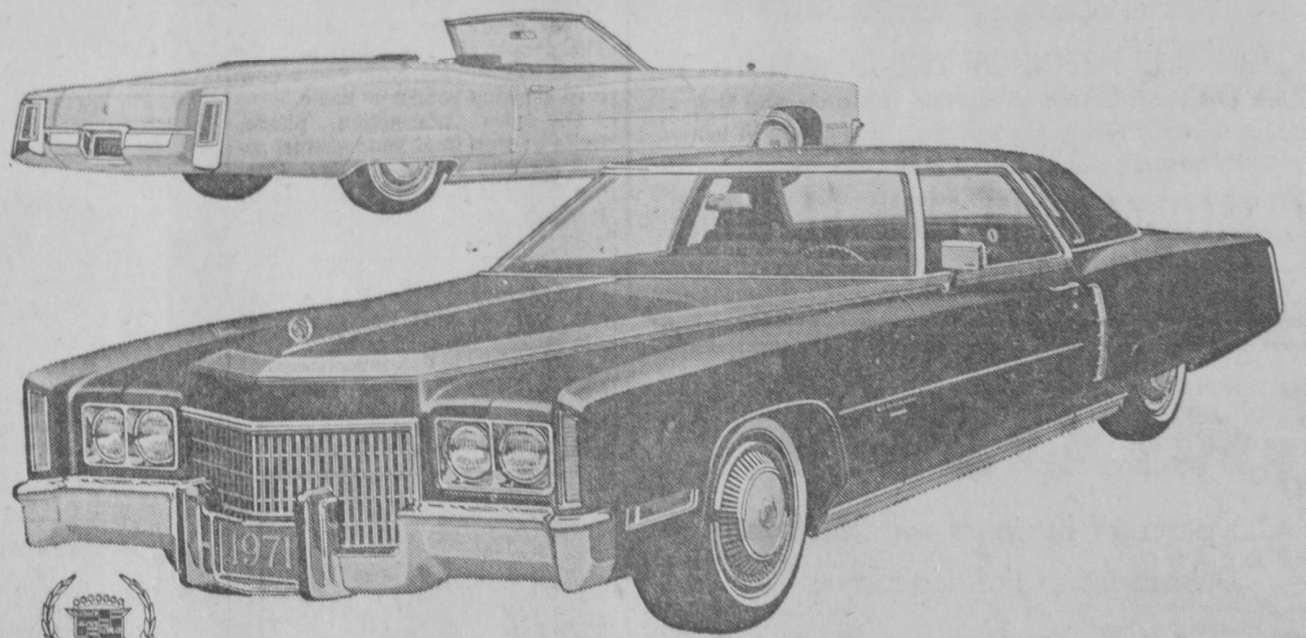

Family Living Education

Kitchen Cleaning Cues—Regular Care Means Longer Wear

There is really just one ironic aspect of modern kitchen equipment. It is so easy to keep clean that we often abuse it by taking it for granted! Too often spills and splashes are not cleaned off right away or they are tackled with damaging abrasives. The stains and scratches that result can be avoided if you know just a little bit more about those wonderfully easy to keep clean surfaces.

Porcelain enamel, which is actually a highly durable glass, fused on metal, is used for such varied equipment as range tops and sides, refrigerator linings, laundry equipment surfaces and sinks. Its surface is smooth yet porous, and acid-resistant but not acid proof. Translating this bit of "theory" into practice means that it is vital to wipe up any acidic spills such as vinegar, milk or fruit juice immediately. Such stains may cause permanent dull spots. Then, when the surface is cool, wash with sudsy water, using a cloth or sponge, followed by a rinse. If "eternal vigilance" fails, never turn to an abrasive, because this can damage the glazed finish. Instead, use a plastic or other non-abrasive "scrubber." Warm water and chlorine or perborate bleach diluted according to package instructions may help to remove stubborn stains. In addition to such "first aid" measures, porcelain enamel surfaces require regular washing, with plenty of warm soap or detergent suds and rinses to keep them hygienically clean.

Another popular surfacing material is colorful laminated plastic, which often features leaves, butterflies, etc., beneath the surface. These plastics make charming room dividers, counter and table tops, and wall paneling. These

are durable, resistant to stains and to heat, but only up to a point. So plate between laminates and a hot object, by never using abrasives to clean them and by not exposing

them to bleaching products. Instead, treat them to daily wipings with a well-lathered sponge or cloth to keep them spotless at all times.

Cast-iron gas range burners need to be removed occasionally for a thorough wash-up. Clean the hollow fuel tube with a bottle brush and use a pipe cleaner to "scrape" out the small holes. Then wash in hot soap or detergent suds, rinse, wipe off and place in a warm oven to dry completely. Remember that a clean kitchen is as important to your family's health as it is to your prestige as a homemaker.

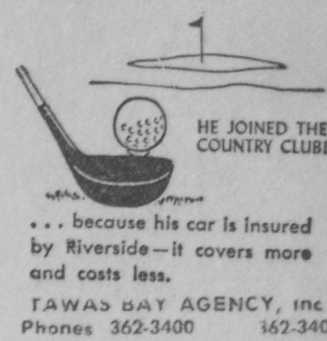

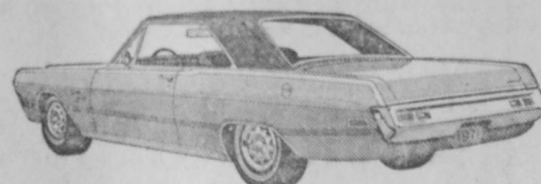

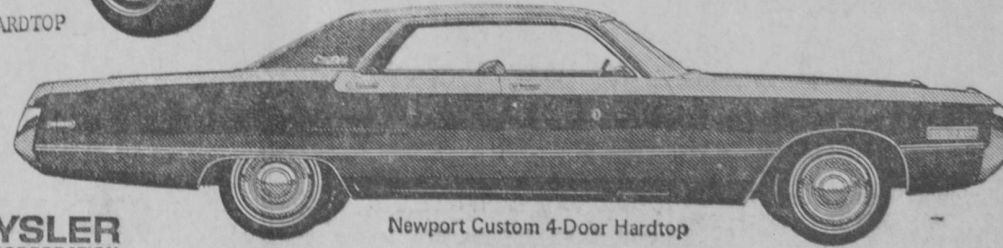
