

## Two Improvement Projects Studied

Two improvement projects in Tawas City were discussed Monday night by the city council. Included was an addition to the city hall and repair of the river bank along Ninth Avenue near the US-23 bridge.

The buildings and grounds committee is to study the possibility of constructing an addition to the east side of the city hall for library and office purposes.

The committee is to study the general condition of the city hall with a view toward replacement of doors on quarters for the fire department as well as remodel the main entrance.

Ald. Cecil Cable said he had witnessed many improvement projects by the city during the past six or eight years—including park expansion and an industrial development park—but felt that something must be done to correct erosion of the river bank along Ninth Avenue.

Cable felt that condition of the seawall which protects Ninth Avenue was in a deplorable condition and if improved would be an asset to the city. It was pointed out that high water and wake from small craft probably added to damaging the seawall.

The city is to investigate the possibility of state funds to assist with this river improvement project. About 600 feet of seawall is involved from the US-23 bridge to the city's boat launching site.

## TA School Master Contract Ready for Signatures

Agreement on a master teaching contract for the 1971-72 school year has been reached between Tawas Area Education Association and Tawas Area Board of Education. Terms of the new contract are to be announced as soon as the agreement is officially signed.

The board of education approved the contract on April 12 and teachers accepted the contract in its final form at a meeting held last Wednesday.

## Residents Asked to Cooperate in TC Cleanup Days

Cleanup days in Tawas City are set for Wednesday, Thursday and Friday, April 28, 29 and 30.

Tawas City Department of Public Works crews will be picking up "anything and everything" placed in containers along curbs in the city.

City councilmen are hopeful that residents will take this opportunity to clean up yards to improve appearances of the community.

# Iosco's Valuation at \$109,432,389; Increase of \$7,925,754 in Past Year

Iosco County's valuation was equalized at \$109,432,389 last week by the Iosco County Board of Commissioners. This represents an increase of \$7,925,754 over last year's total for real and personal property in this county.

The final equalized figure represented totals as brought in by all tax assessing officers of the county with but one exception. Upon recommendation of Henry Oates, tax equalization director, a factor was added to the assessment total of Grant Township, the only unit of the county which did not assess at or above 49 percent of true cash value.

Oates had recommended a one percent factor for Grant, but this was cut in half by the county commission and achieved the desired result. State tax commission guidelines allow the county equalized valuation to be identical to assessed values, providing the ratio be not less than 49 percent.

According to Oates' report, the \$7,925,754 increase included \$6,183,470 in new construction. (A three-year report on new construction is included in another story appearing elsewhere in this newspaper.)

Largest increase in the county came in Oscoda Township with a total increase of slightly more than \$3,000,000. This township has a real estate valuation of \$27,945,900 and personal property valuation of \$3,064,139 for a total of \$31,010,039. This compares to a total valuation of \$28,038,353 last year.

Valuations of other units were as follows: Alabaster: Real, \$4,902,600; personal, \$1,499,800; total, \$6,402,400, as compared to \$6,027,200 last year.

Ausable: Real, \$8,547,500; personal, \$1,010,300; total, \$9,557,800 as compared to \$8,766,900 last year.

Baldwin: Real, \$8,535,600; personal, \$769,500; total, \$9,305,100, as compared to \$8,761,600 last year.

Burleigh: Real, \$1,804,000; personal, \$1,167,000; total, \$2,971,000, as compared to \$2,839,800 last year.

Grant: Real, \$5,924,900; personal, \$971,500; total, \$6,896,400, as compared to \$6,415,400 last year.

Plainfield: Real, \$14,854,600; personal, \$1,065,400; total, \$15,920,000, as compared to \$14,541,100 last year.

Reno: Real, \$1,582,600; personal, \$249,000; total, \$1,831,600, as compared to \$1,781,000 last year.

Sherman: Real, \$1,976,300; personal, \$1,265,900; total, \$3,242,200, as compared to \$3,128,200 last year.

Tawas: Real, \$3,169,200; personal, \$453,500; total, \$3,622,700, as compared to \$3,368,700 last year.

## Charters Re-Elected Chairman Allocation Board Accepts Budgets; Start Annual Study of Millage Split

Iosco Allocation Board held the first of several meetings Monday for organization and acceptance of budgets in preparation for finalizing the allocation of tax millage for operation of schools, county and township governments.

As usual, combined budget requests from schools, townships and the county would require more taxes than permitted under the 15-mill limitation established by the Michigan Constitution.

Following hearings later this month and next, it will be the board's responsibility to divide millage in a way that, in its opinion, will best suit requirements with taxes available. Lacking the silk hat of a magician, the board will be unable to satisfy all requests.

At its organizational meeting Monday afternoon, Arden Charters of Whittemore was named chairman. Other appointive members include John Weible, Ronald Dahne and Ralph Western. Weible was appointed as a new member by Probate Judge William McCready under a new seven-member arrangement this year.

Statutory members of the board are William Weresley, chairman of the board of commissioners' finance

committee; Edward Nelkie, county treasurer; Ernest Jordan, Iosco Intermediate School superintendent.

Schools submitting budgets were as follows: Hale Area School—Present budget, \$523,428; new budget request, \$551,122, of which \$415,000 would be from local taxes. The district has a state equalized valuation of \$22,000,000. Hale Area School has nine voted mills for operation.

Tawas Area School—Present budget, \$1,228,741; new budget, \$1,306,999, of which \$765,885 would be in local taxes. The district has a state equalized valuation of \$44,619,307. The district's 4½ mills of special voted operational tax expired this year and a new millage vote is expected.

Oscoda Area School—Present budget, \$3,627,181; new budget, \$3,997,610, of which \$759,837 would be raised in local taxes. The district will end with an \$82,000 deficit in 1970-71 and a \$232,000 deficit is indicated for 1971-72. The district has a state equalized valuation of \$59,132,236.

Intermediate School District, Special education—Present budget, \$143,000; new budget request, \$170,350; Iosco Intermediate School District—Present budget, \$52,974; new budget, \$57,580. The intermediate school district has a state equalized valuation of \$128,142,761. The county's general fund budget appears in another story on this page.

Township budgets submitted showing a need for one mill are as follows: Ausable, \$52,532; Baldwin, \$49,965; Reno, \$9,452; Wilber, \$17,848; Grant, \$27,600; Alabaster, \$18,320; Plainfield, \$64,892; Sherman, \$21,004; Burleigh, \$21,555.

No millage need was indicated by Tawas Township, or Oscoda Township, with a budget of \$378,854.

## Iosco Board Adopts Budget of \$740,594; Hike of \$85,074

A preliminary budget of \$740,594 was adopted Thursday for 1971 operation by the Iosco County Board of Commissioners and is to be submitted to the allocation board this week.

The budget reflects an increase of \$85,074 over the budget submitted last April. Actual expenditures during the year amounted to \$648,158.20 and the general fund ended the year with a cash balance of \$15,323.

William Weresley, the board's finance chairman, said that the proposed budget would need a tax levy

of five mills from the county allocation board. Last year, the county received an allocation of 4.80 mills in the 15-mill split between county, schools and townships.

With a 7.81 percent increase in valuation this year, the five mills would raise \$547,014.54 in property taxes. With a 50.9 percent increase in population, income tax revenue to the county will reach \$75,000. Estimated fees from county departments is expected to total \$118,579.46.

Salaries of all elected officials, deputies and clerks were increased in the budget. Three elected officials received salary increases of \$250 annually, while two received \$1,000 increases. Salary increases of chief deputies ranged from \$399 to \$800, while increases to clerks ranged from \$133 to \$359.

The board of commissioners, noting that county departments exceeded budgets during 1969-70, directed that all departments adhere to 1971 budget figures unless authorized otherwise. The board stated that the practice of exceeding budgets was "unbusinesslike and throws the balance of county operation out of line."

Budgets of the various departments were as follows for 1971: Prosecuting attorney: Salary, \$11,000; assistant, \$8,500; legal secretary, \$5,778; department expense, \$2,800; special inventory, \$750. Total budget of \$28,828, up \$10,047.

Treasurer: Salary, \$10,000; chief deputy, \$5,700; clerk, \$3,950; extra help, \$1,500; department expense, \$5,000. Total budget of \$26,150, up \$2,559.

Clerk: Salary, \$10,000; chief deputy, \$6,106; deputy \$5,665; district court department, \$4,280; district court, part time, \$4,004; department expense, \$6,500. Total budget, \$36,555, up \$3,503.

Register of deeds: Salary, \$10,000; chief deputy, \$6,106; clerk, \$4,135; microfilm clerk, \$4,647; department expense, \$5,863. Total budget, \$30,551, up \$1,997.

Sheriff Department: Salary, \$11,000; undersheriff, \$9,800; detective,

\$8,239; sergeant, \$8,025; 7½ deputies, \$57,224; deputies (Oscoda-Ausable), \$2,400; two turnkeys, \$6,420; matron, \$1,605; marine patrol, \$15,000; jail expense, \$15,600; department expense, \$34,396. Total budget, \$169,709, up \$42,000.

place runnerup, first place runner-up and winner. Only after removal from the bank and when seals are broken at the time of the awards presentation will names of the winners be known.

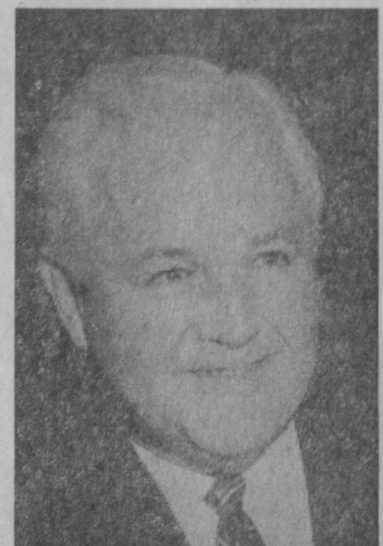
A plaque will be presented to each of the winners and each runnerup will receive a certificate of appreciation.

## Graham Enters Guilty Plea; Sentence Tebo

Action in Iosco Circuit Court last week saw Walter W. Graham entering a plea of guilty to unarmed robbery and Kenneth Tebo, Oscoda, was convicted by jury of malicious destruction.

Graham, who had been charged with armed robbery and kidnaping, following alleged abduction of an air force officer and his family, is to be sentenced April 23. His motion for a change of venue and to quash charges was withdrawn.

Tebo was sentenced to a term of three to four years in Southern Michigan Prison by Judge Allan C. Miller. He was convicted of malicious destruction while being held as a prisoner at the county jail.

## High Water Slows Search for Victim

Record high water in the Ausable River is hindering search for the body of a Twining man, who is missing and presumed drowned since Friday just below Foote Dam.

George Stamm, 66, was lost in the river when a small fishing boat overturned in the swift current below the dam Friday morning.

A companion, Albert Leighton, 82, also of Twining, swam safely to shore.

State police had to call a halt to the search over the week-end. Because of extreme runoff of melting snow in the Grayling area, the river continues at flood stage and current is so swift that state police skindivers are unable to swim in the river.

A state police spokesman said that he understood that gates on all hydroelectric dams along the river were open, an event which has not occurred in about 26 years.

The boat overturned when the anchor was thrown out to keep the craft from being carried away by the current after the propeller pin on an outboard motor was sheared. Leighton told police he last saw Stamm clinging to a life preserver and swimming for shore. The life preserver was later found downstream.

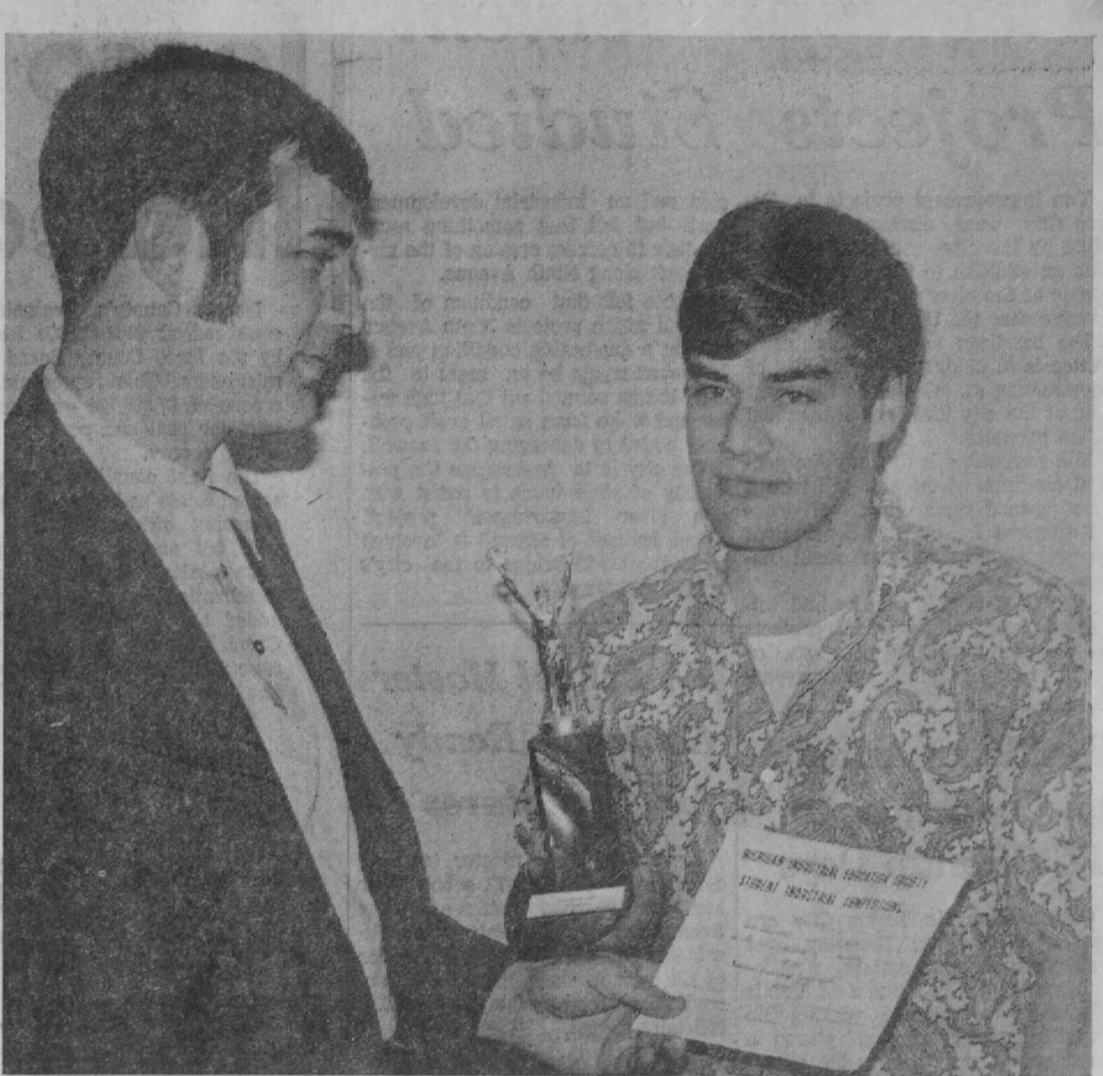

## Keep Them In The Picture



Pictured here is a reproduction of a painting which captures an early morning gathering of prairie chickens on a dancing ground in northern Lower Michigan. Conservationists may obtain free 10 by 14 inch prints of this painting in color, and keep this scene alive by contributing to a special fund which the Department of Natural Resources has established to save these endangered birds. The DNR's drive drew redoubled urgency last spring when its wildlife men were able to count no more than 35 prairie chickens in six scattered locations of Isosco, Missaukee, and Osceola counties. Of those locations, only a farmland area north of Marion in Osceola County holds the last hope for supporting a remnant population of these grassland boomers. DNR wildlife officials

are optimistic about saving the colony of birds there, and public donations have already allowed them to lease 320 acres as a core area to preserve the Marion habitat. Negotiations are now under way to buy another 176 acres there as part of the ultimate plan to gain control to 1,280 acres within the four-square-mile area where the Marion colony lives. The DNR's target for 1971 is half of that total, 640 acres, and it needs \$14,000-\$15,000 to buy 144 more acres and reach that goal. # \$6,183,470 Total Iosco County Had Another Big Year of Construction

Another excellent construction year was recorded in Iosco County during 1970, according to a report last week by Henry Oates, tax equalization director.

According to Oates' report compiled from information supplied by assessing officers of the various units, new construction totaled \$6,183,470 during the year. This represented an increase of 7.54 percent over the previous year.

Oates' report indicated that the total of new construction was nearly double the figure of 1968. That year, new construction was \$3,350,000. The next year, 1969, the figure jumped to \$5,857,850.

Construction leader, percentage-wise, was Plainfield Township. This unit had total new construction of \$1,231,410, representing a 9.09 percent increase over the \$1,125,560 figure of 1969. Construction in that unit in 1968 amounted to \$656,000.

Oscoda Township was again leader in the total of new construction with \$1,657,680, representing a 6.56 percent increase over the \$1,571,280 figure in 1969. Oscoda Township had new construction of \$910,700 three years ago.

New construction in the remaining units was as follows:  
 Alabaster, \$337,010, 7.33 percent increase; AuSable, \$686,830, 8.85 percent increase; Baldwin, \$539,790, an increase of 6.62 percent.

Burleigh, \$89,760, representing an increase of 5.17 percent; Grant, \$367,660, an increase of 6.66 percent; Reno, \$52,780, an increase of 3.41 percent; Sherman, \$62,730, an in-

crease of 3.22 percent; Tawas, \$261,040, an increase of 8.87 percent; Wilber, \$176,400, an increase of 8.09 percent.

East Tawas, \$478,660, an increase of 6.10 percent; Tawas City, \$216,420, an increase of 4.11 percent; Whittemore, \$23,300, an increase of 3.48 percent.

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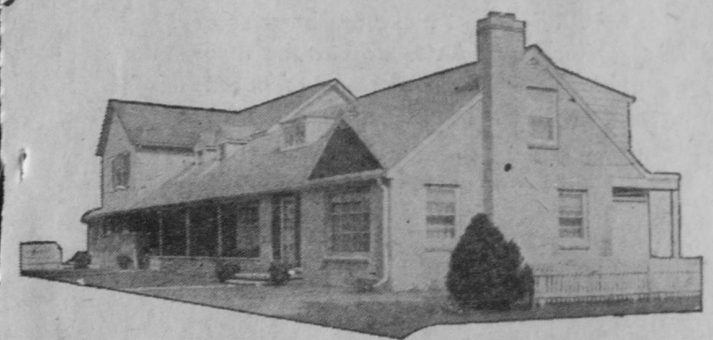

## Warning Issued on Meat Tenderizers

Dr. William Jackson, director of District Health Department No. 2, today re-emphasized an earlier warning to consumers and restaurant owners in this area to refrain from using a meat tenderizer labeled "Spice of Life" or "Country Tavern" because some jars and cans of the product contain pure sodium nitrite, a deadly poison at high levels in foods.

The product, distributed regionally in Virginia, New Jersey, New York, Ohio, Kansas, Michigan and Minnesota, is packaged in 1 1/4-pound jars and 2 1/2-ounce tins.

The jars are labeled "Spice of Life Meat Tenderizer" and sold primarily to restaurants and bars. The smaller containers, intended for retail marketing, are labeled "Country Tavern Meat Tenderizer."

Today's repeated warning follows the March 14 death of a Maryland resident who ate garlic-flavored toast at a Washington, D. C., restaurant on which some of the mislabeled product had been sprinkled. A "Spice of Life" jar taken from the restaurant and examined by FDA scientists and the District of Columbia Health Department was found to contain 100 percent of the potentially deadly chemical.

The mislabeling problem was first brought to the FDA's attention last November following a complaint by a Virginia restaurant owner that meat on which the "Spice of Life" product was placed turned green. After the Virginia Department of Agriculture and Commerce confirmed the presence of sodium nitrite in the containers, FDA issued a public warning November 19, 1970.

At that time, the Mutual Spice Company, Division of HyGrade Food Products, North Bergen, New Jersey, repacker of the product, initiated a voluntary recall from the retail level of the two meat tenderizer brands.
