



Computer Use for TA Files Being Checked

Possible use of computerized accounting practices in Tawas Area Schools was discussed Monday night with a representative of National Cash Register Company and National Electronic Transmission Service at East Tawas.

Deane Ledsworth, who appeared before the board and outlined methods to use NETS computers for storage of information, agreed to furnish cost estimates on this proposal for the June 14 meeting of the board of education.

While use of computerized accounting practices probably would not result in a reduction of office staff, Ledsworth said that it would mean a saving in time as well as being a more efficient operation.

In addition, information fed into computers could be utilized for class scheduling and could be used for compiling grades and attendance, storing information on students and class request projections.

Such a system is currently in use



There are additional aspen stands which can also be treated. However, we do not want them to all be producing browse at the same time. Plans are to treat additional aspen stands in four to five years. To complete the rotation, a third treatment about four years after the second will be done. Then, after another four to five-year period, the areas cut this spring would be done again This will keep a continuing food supply available for the deer.

The three areas cut this spring are in long strips which provide more 'edge' for other game, especially grouse. The nearby stands of older aspen will provide good habitat for the new broods.

Not all winter deer range can be treated this easily to produce food near the softwood cover. Several of our large swamps have one edge in

pure alder which is not deer food. Others have hardwood edges with extremely steep banks on which the mechanical tree cutters cannot be used. Trees on such slopes have to be cut by hand.
