Juggle State Tax Returns to Benefit High Census Units

The federal census of 1970 has proven most costly for four townships and three cities of Isosco County which showed population decreases in the past 10 years.

According to a report from the Isosco County treasurer Friday, these seven units received over payments on Michigan sales tax and income tax returns totaling \$10,675.18 during the past year. While the monies probably will not be repaid in a lump sum, it will be withheld from future sales tax and income tax returns.

On the other hand, those townships which showed a population increase are waiting for additional funds. The principal beneficiary is this new found money is Oscoda Township, which is to receive an additional \$106,428.65.

Money placed in escrow for distribution at this time includes \$81,995.76 in sales tax and \$41,172.26 in income tax for a total of \$123,168.02. All of this was brought about by basing sales and income tax returns on a per capita formula using the 1960 census. When preliminary census figures were announced, County Treas. Edward Nelkie noted the various population changes and withheld payment on fourth quarter sales and income tax returns.

The major change in county population was caused by counting 6,932 persons at Wurtsmith Air Force Base to give Oscoda Township a census of 11,758, or a 179.8 percent increase. Of interest is the fact that a Michigan sales tax is not charged at the base commissary and the salary of military personnel is not subject to a state income tax.

Isosco County government benefits from the population increase. The county received \$67,409.19 as its share of the income tax return and is to receive an additional \$9,906.01.

Units which were over paid include: Alabaster, which had a 23.2 percent drop in population and was over paid \$1,742.10; Baldwin, 12.2 percent drop in population and over paid \$1,908.44; Burleigh, 9.8 percent drop in population and over paid \$1,157.54; Reno, 7.8 percent drop in population and over paid \$494.32; East Tawas, 3.7 percent drop in population and over paid \$2,340.68; Tawas City, eight percent drop in population and over paid \$2,835.62.

The City of Whittemore, which had an identical population in each census, owes \$196.48. This was caused by an over payment in intangible tax. Every unit but Oscoda Township was over paid in this category. Total intangible tax distributed to the 14 units amounted to \$20,631.25.

Units to receive additional money include: AuSable, 13.1 percent population increase, \$2,399.43; Grant, 34.9 percent population increase, \$2,056.47; Plainfield, 43.6 percent population increase, \$8,245.34; Sherman, 4.7 percent population increase, \$99.99; Tawas, 29.3 percent population increase, \$4,240.65; Wilber, 13.2 percent population increase, \$466.16.

Few ET Voters Show, but Cost Remains High

Monday's spring election at East Tawas was quiet—only 100 voters showed up at the polls—but it was expensive.

City Clerk Fred Lomas estimated Tuesday that it cost the city about \$6 for each ballot cast in the election. This is due to the fact that, regardless of the number of voters, election costs remain constant.

Lomas pointed out that 18 people were required to man the six voting precincts. Cost of the workers will total about \$375. Add a cost of \$150 for ballots and election supplies, along with \$35 for meals and an unspecified cost for two registrations, and the total cost amounted to around \$600.

Reason for the low interest of voters was that there were no contests in the election. Re-elected were Mayor James Campbell with 95 votes, Clerk Lomas with 100 votes and Mrs. Grace Pelton, treasurer, 100 votes.

One new face on the city council will be George Staudacher, who replaced Richard Moss as First Ward alderman. Moss chose not to be a candidate this year. Staudacher received 34 votes.

Other councilmen re-elected were Earl McElheron, Second Ward, 35 votes, and Charles Schreck, Third Ward, 17 votes.

Ballinger Stands Mute to Federal Check Indictment

A former Isosco County deputy sheriff, who started out from scratch in the treasure hunting supply business five years ago and built his Association to a point where, today, it is known internationally, stood mute in Bay City Federal Court Friday on charges of defrauding a Western Isosco bank of \$753,922.94.

Gene C. Ballinger, 36, Oscoda, was released under \$25,000 bond after waiving his right before Federal Judge Stephen J. Roth to presentation of his case to a federal grand jury. No trial date was set.

Ballinger, whose name had been linked by rumor and later by newspaper accounts with the shortage at Farmers and Merchants State Bank of Hale, but who had not been formally charged until Friday, is accused by the United States Department of Justice of 26 counts of check kiting between January 1967 and March 1971.

Although bank officials still did not identify Ballinger by name, a spokesman for the Hale bank said Friday that when the shortage was discovered a month ago and the check kiting scheme collapsed, the bank immediately attached two accounts of the customer totaling a little more than \$100,000. Ballinger has mortgaged several parcels of his property on Monument Road to the bank, as well as permitting the bank to attach personal property.

Richard Parkinson, vice president and cashier, said Friday that the bank is continuing its investigation into the customer's business activity to determine the possibility of

further recovery of the shortage. He said the bank had not pressed charges and, until Friday, was unaware of the federal indictment. Parkinson said that further details of the shortage would not be made public until a meeting of stockholders during the week of April 12.

According to the information petition filed Friday in Bay City Federal Court, Ballinger is accused of "scheme and artifice to defraud Farmers and Merchants State Bank of Hale and the Peoples State Bank of East Tawas by means of false and fraudulent pretenses, representations and promises."

The court information stated that the check kiting scheme involved the use of nonsufficient fund checks between the two banks, payable to the AuSable Regional Credit Bureau of Tawas City, which Ballinger owns in association with his mother.

A continuing series of checks of approximately the same amounts were written, it is alleged, on accounts between the two banks.

In check kiting, one check is drawn on one bank, deposited at the other and a second check is then drawn on the second bank and deposited at the first.

Ballinger established his business of selling metal detectors and other treasure hunting gear in 1967 while still being associated with the AuSable Regional Credit Bureau, Incorporated, on a full time basis. His first location, being affiliated with a Nebraska firm as Exanimo Great Lakes, was in the old Oscoda Bank

DNR Plants Coho; 'Spear' Violators

Michigan Department of Natural Resources planted 100,000 coho smolts in the Tawas River Tuesday afternoon. The fish had been raised in a hatchery at Platte River. The planting was made at the First Street bridge in Tawas City.

DNR officers said Tuesday that they were continuing their patrol of the Tawas River and warned that spearing perch was illegal. Two youths were apprehended using spears Tuesday morning. About 40 perch were confiscated.

The officers said a fish trap was removed from the river near the foot of Wheeler Street. Use of such a trap is illegal.

East Tawas Loses Many Shade Trees

"It sure is bare," was the way Paul Ropert, superintendent of public works at East Tawas, described the appearance of the 200 block of East State Street on Tuesday.

The city crew, with assistance from a Consumers Power Company tree trimming crew, began the work of removing 28 diseased or dead elm trees. Five elms were removed from the 200 block and two were removed from the 400 block.

These huge trees, some of which were more than 100 years old, were victims of Dutch elm disease. A few dead maple trees are being removed, also.

Ropert said the city planned to plant 25 trees to replace those removed, but it will be many years before the new trees provide shade in this residential area.

Alarmed Over Federal Low Rent Housing

Residents to Enforce Restrictions

Speaking for a "majority of property owners" of North Park Acres Subdivision at Monday night's Tawas City Council meeting, First Ward Supervisor Ben Brewer declared that restrictions of the subdivision would be enforced—and, if necessary, by property owners themselves.

During recent weeks, property owners of the subdivision—developed about 15 years ago by the late Elmer J. Burrell as one of the finest family neighborhoods in the city—became alarmed when it was discovered that five homes under construction there were being financed through federal funds.

Present property owners in the subdivision maintain that these dwellings, designed to be sold as low income housing, are being constructed in violation of subdivision restrictions. The principal violation, they say, is in the dollar value of the homes.

Brewer told councilmen that rumors had apparently been confirmed that an additional 19 low income housing units were being planned for the subdivision. He said that property owners were not opposed to low income housing in the subdivision, but the five new dwellings built there represented one-quarter of the subdivision. He believed that it was

unfair of the federal government to build more houses there as it would be detrimental to present property values.

The subdivision spokesman presented a petition signed by property owners asking the council to make federal agencies aware of the subdivision restrictions and the present dilemma of property owners.

Ald. Howard Hatton, serving as mayor pro tem in the absence of Mayor John St. James, said that the council was sympathetic to the position of property owners, that letters would be written to federal agencies informing them of the subdivision restriction violations and personal

contact would be made with Cong. Elford A. Cederberg when he visits Isosco County next week.

Hatton pointed out, however, that an opinion from the city attorney has indicated that the city could not enforce subdivision restrictions. Such enforcement is apparently the responsibility of the subdivision developer or his agents.

If such housing meets the city's zoning or building codes, the city has no alternative but to issue a building permit.

Paul Sullivan, a resident of the subdivision, said that the original developer of the subdivision had protected interests of property owners

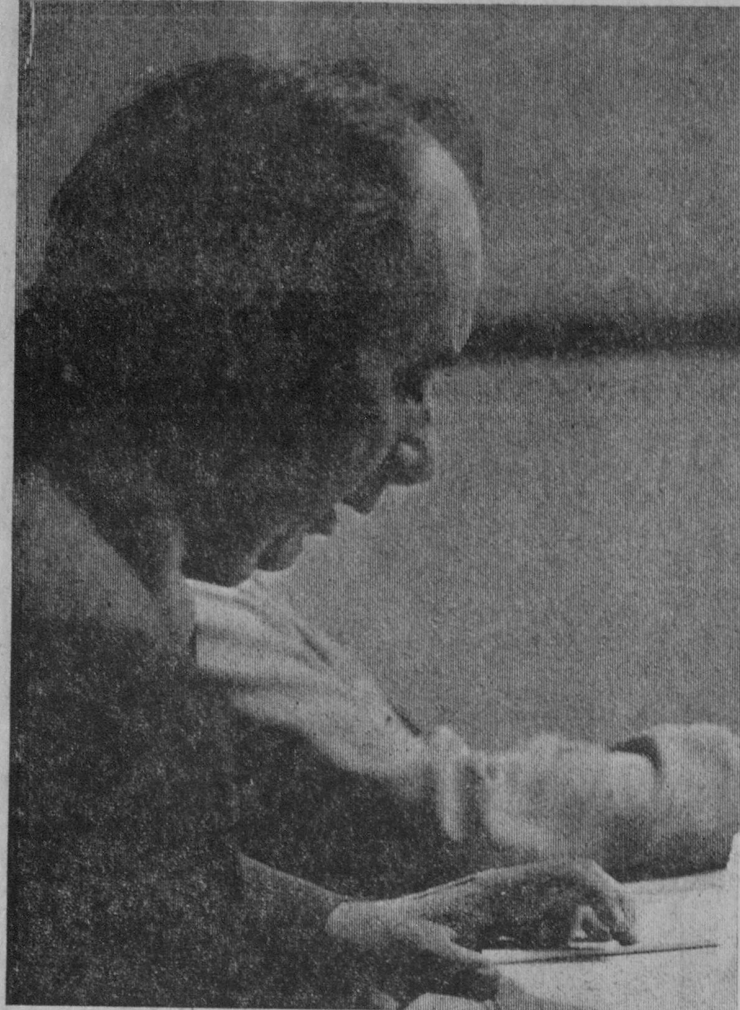
through enforcement of restrictions. He said that since Mr. Burrell was now deceased, the individual owners inherited these rights.

Sullivan said that it had been learned Monday that an additional four homes were to be constructed in the vicinity. He stressed that residents of the subdivision were not opposed to low rent housing, but opposed actions of the federal government in concentrating a large number of such houses in one area.

Brewer told councilmen that property owners had no knowledge of the type of housing which was being planned until construction was nearly completed.

It was stated that prior to development of the federal housing, homes there were valued at a higher than average rate and that an economic factor had been applied on these homes for tax purposes because subdivision restrictions made property more desirable.

Brewer said that property owners were concerned about the possible loss in value of their property and intended "to do our best to enforce restrictions." He said that an attorney had been secured by property owners and that an injunction would be sought to stop further construction of such homes in violation of restrictions.

Engineer Says Water Storage Only Solution

Information received at Monday night's joint meeting of the Tawas City Council and water board brought out the fact that ground storage was necessary to supply water needs of this community.

Explaining details of a proposed three-phase plan for expansion of the city's water storage and distribution system, approved by the water board several months ago but tabled by the council until a number of questions were answered, was Otto Schiesswohl of Spicer Engineering, Saginaw, the city's consultant.

Schiesswohl reviewed the \$180,000 three-phase plan which calls for construction of a 500,000-gallon ground storage facility and improvements to the present water supply connection and additions to the water distribution system as the first phase; construction of a 12-inch gravity connection to East Tawas in 1979-80; construction of a 200,000-gallon elevated tank by 1990.

The council had questioned the need for constructing the ground storage system when future plans call for a larger connecting main with East Tawas and a future elevated tank.

Schiesswohl said that a number of factors were involved concerning the reasoning behind the need for a ground storage system. He pointed out that regardless of the fact that a larger main was being planned to connect this city with the East Tawas filtration plant, a larger storage facility is necessary to meet ultimate water demands of this city.

Because Tawas City is at a higher elevation and operates its system at a higher pressure than East Tawas, use of the present 50,000-gallon water tank at the city hall would be discontinued when a new 200,000-gallon elevated water tank is constructed in 1990. The proposed new 12-inch connecting main planned in 1979-80 would be gravity fed to Tawas City operating at East Tawas' pressure.

At present, Tawas City has an average daily water consumption of 237,670 gallons. This consumption reaches a maximum of 356,000

gallons during summer months and the city's water supply must be augmented by utilization of a deep well which was never disconnected when the city first began to purchase filtered water from East Tawas in 1958.

Schiesswohl said the East Tawas filtration plant could meet water needs of two communities for many years to come. He said that the maximum use of the plant is 16 hours a day during peak periods and this could be extended if both communities expand water storage facilities.

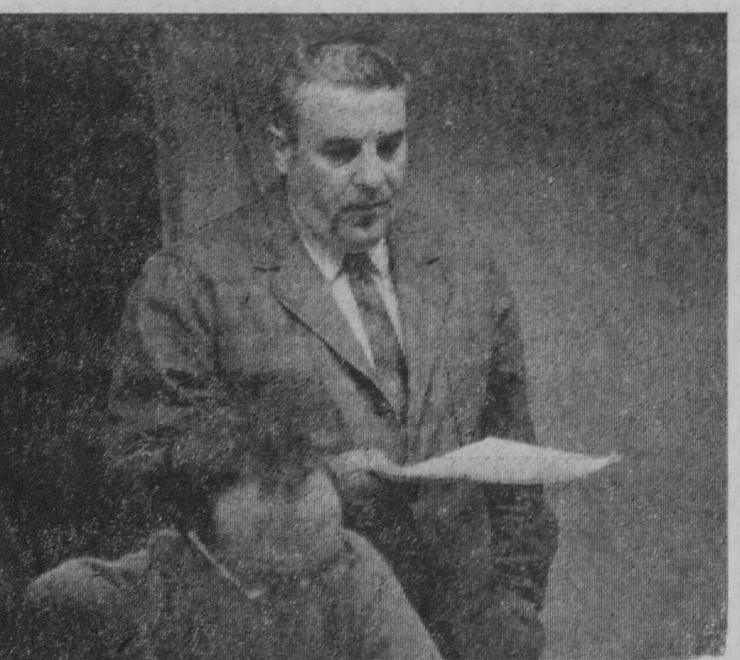
In addition to the proposed project for Tawas City, the Saginaw engineering firm is now planning additional water storage facilities at East Tawas.

The principal problem is the fact that the present 275-gallon per minute connection between the two cities, which utilizes a six-inch main which existed in 1958, is not capable of meeting peak demands in Tawas City. Schiesswohl said that East Tawas was not in a position at this time to construct a new 12-inch main and, even if it were, the larger main would not solve Tawas City's problem because of the lack of storage facilities.

He stressed that the proposed ground storage facility, to be located near the baseball diamond, would always be important to the city's water system, regardless of the fact that a 200,000-gallon elevated tank is proposed 20 years from now.

The full council was not present at the meeting and no official action was taken. One councilman expressed the opinion that, through the discussion, he had a better understanding of the project and was aware of the need for expanded water storage.

If adopted by the council, the project probably would be financed through a 25-year revenue bond issue. The city would seek a federal grant to aid in the construction. To finance the city's share would require a 54 percent increase in water rates.

An outstanding speaker, Doctor Wittwer has been assistant dean of agriculture and professor of horticulture at MSU since 1965.

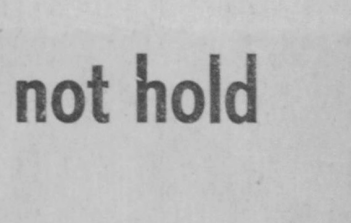
A native of Hurricane, Utah, he received his bachelor of science degree from Utah State College in 1939 and doctorate from the University of Missouri in 1943.

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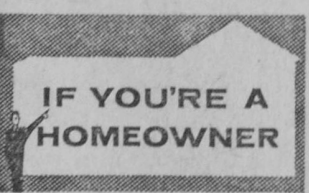

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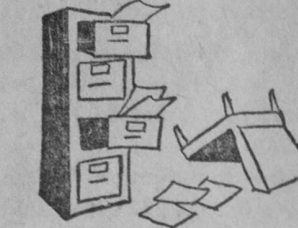
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When Is A Guarantee Not a Guarantee?

Are the tires on your car guaranteed? Probably yes and no. Chances are that your tires were made by one of the six major tire manufacturers. Their general practice is to make a "guarantee" that provides not for replacement when the product fails in normal use, as is usually the case, but for an allowance on a new tire. Is this really a guarantee?

Most of these manufacturers' "guarantees" provide for replacement if their examination shows that the tire failed during the first 20 percent of tread life. A defect in workmanship and material must be the cause. Tire failure due to road hazards, such as running over pot holes, is not covered.

The adjustment allowance ties the consumer to one brand, no matter how dissatisfied he might be with his tires. He must take a total loss if he decides to change brands after a defective tire. Even when the consumer does take advantage of adjustment allowance, its amount has no relationship to the original consumer cost. Instead, it is based on a manufacturer's predetermined price for adjustment.

The tire guarantee situation can hurt you from both the safety and economic angles. It is one area where organized consumer action may be necessary to effect changes.

Other parts of your automobile have guarantees and warranties, too. Most of these seem to be getting shorter and shorter in length. If this trend continues, the next new car you buy may be entirely your own responsibility from the moment

you drive it off the lot. You will be the one paying for costly repairs unless you keep the car in good condition.

The owner's manual is probably your best guide to automobile maintenance. Although it may seem cheaper to stretch the time between tune-ups and neglect some of those other services, you will gain in the long run by following the manufacturer's suggestions. Keeping the car in good condition increases gas mileage, tire wear and life of all parts. Mechanical failure caused by neglect is often a contributing cause in automobile accidents. Most people want to maintain their car in good condition, yet they do not take the necessary time and trouble until something happens that requires immediate repair. Do not wait for an accident before you act.

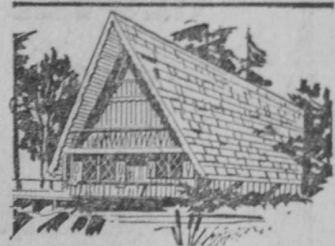
