Prescott Says He's Ashamed of State School Aid Delay

State Rep. George A. Prescott told members of Tawas Area Board of Education Monday night that he was "ashamed" over inaction of the state legislature in still not having adopted a state aid bill for schools.

Appearing before the board of education to explain the several bills being debated at Lansing, Prescott emphasized that a school bill had not been adopted as yet and their was little assurance that one would be adopted before the end of August.

"We have put you people in a terrible bind by not having a state aid bill yet, especially when one considers that you were required to adopt a budget in April," stated the representative.

Prescott said that the name of the game being played at Lansing is politics and declared that it was shameful that the legislature could pass a giant welfare bill, then recess for two weeks before considering a bill to educate children. He also pointed out that the one billion, 500-million-dollar welfare bill was five million dollars less than the amount budgeted for schools. He believed that other states were sending indigents to Michigan because this state's welfare benefits were so high.

Prescott said that a state aid bill had not been debated on the floor of the house as yet and some of the materials which he presented to the board of education had not been made public as yet. "I am not on the education committee of the house, but I have 12 schools in my district and am most definitely interested in school financing," he said.

Robert Elliott, president of the board of education, said that the "situation is now getting hairy" because of this school district's upcoming millage vote on August 19. Unless voters approve the millage proposal, the school term would be shortened drastically.

Elliott said that a number of persons had told him they were in favor of renewing the 4½ mills of operational taxes which expired this year, but they were opposed to the three additional mills being requested in the upcoming election, believing that the board of education should hold the line on spending.

"I have had to ask these people, 'how can we hold the line on spending when you give salary increases to your employees?' How can a school district tighten its belt when inflation cuts into its budget?" said Elliott.

The board president said that people throughout the state were being confused by information from Lan-

sing concerning the various state aid bills being proposed, as well as the possibility of future financing through a state income tax. One bill being discussed for this year, but not adopted, would increase the state aid to schools.

"Our backs are to the wall and we cannot be pushed any further. We must still raise our millage locally to balance our budget," stated Elliott.

It was pointed out that at this date, no state aid bill has been passed so one can say exactly what money will be received from the state. The 1971-72 budget has been based on last year's state aid bill and regardless of any possible increase or windfall in the new bill, the board has pledged to the electorate that only enough local millage would be levied to meet this budget.

"Let's say we are going to get more state aid—if we only need 6½ mills to meet our budget adopted in April, that is all we will levy," assured Elliott.

The board of education is to conduct a campaign to get out the vote for the coming election. Plans are to be discussed at a special meeting at the administration office next Monday night.

The last day for obtaining absentee ballots for this election is Saturday, August 14, 2:00 p. m. The administration office at the East Tawas Elementary Unit will be open that day to make absentee ballots available.

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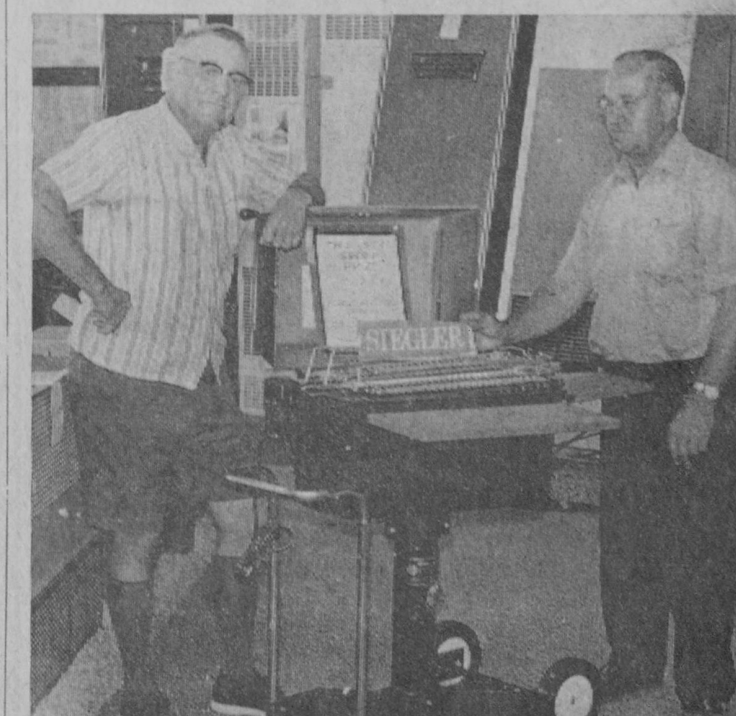

Editorial

Schools Need You

Two Iosco schools face critical operational millage elections next week. Hale Area School is asking voter approval of nine mills on Monday, August 16, and Tawas Area Schools is to present a 7 1/2-mill operational proposal to voters on Thursday, August 19.

Both school districts have their backs to the wall in these two elections—similar proposals were de-

feated by voters of both districts in June and, without voter approval next week, both schools may operate for only part of a term and deprive children of a basic education.

There are no frills offered in the two schools, despite what some may think about band, art, vocational education and athletics. Since the state mandates 900 hours of instruction and 180 days of school, curtailment of any program would only result in the need for replacement to meet state requirements.

Gas-Weight Taxes Are Distributed

Iosco County benefited from a 4.7 percent increase in Michigan gas and weight taxes during the second quarter of 1971. According to Department of State Highways, net receipts of the motor vehicle highway fund amounted to \$91,275,495, an increase of \$4,129,009 over the same three months of 1970.

Iosco's share of the fund amounted to \$180,532, as compared to \$164,827 during the same period last year. East Tawas received \$10,342, or \$26 higher than last year; Tawas City received \$6,885, or \$158 less than the same period last year; Whittemore received \$1,901, or \$127 more than the same period last year.

All state gasoline and diesel fuel taxes and license plate fees go to the Motor Vehicle Fund. Money is distributed after deduction of collection costs, 1.5 percent of gasoline taxes to the State Waterways Commission and other fixed costs.

The Department of State Highways receives 46 percent of net proceeds, the 83 counties receive 34 percent and 529 cities and villages receive 20 percent.

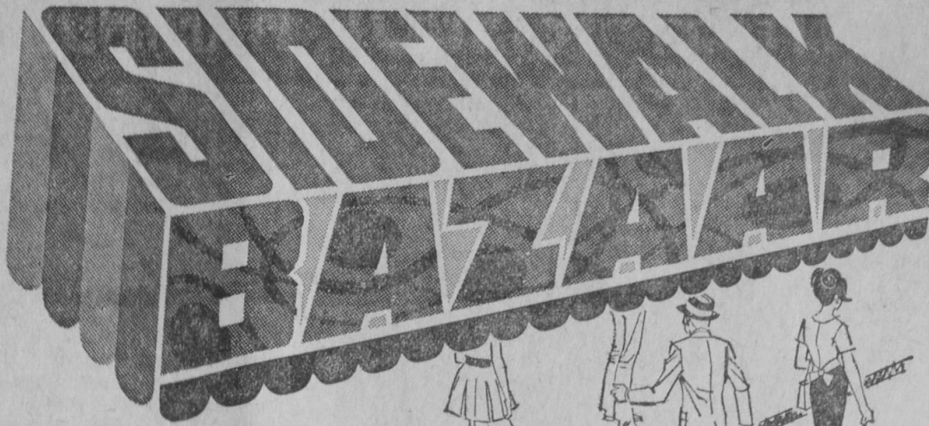

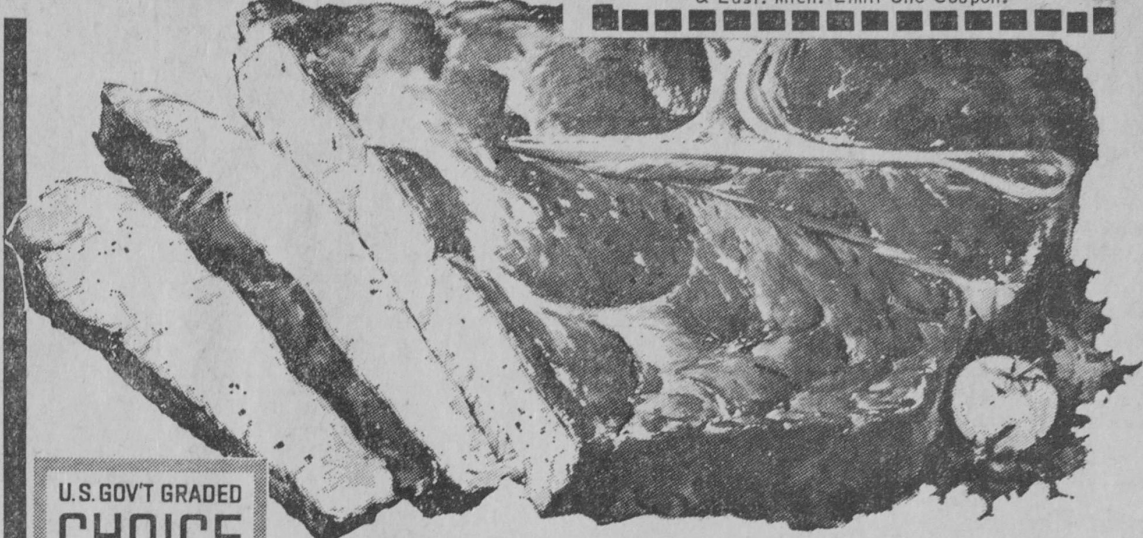

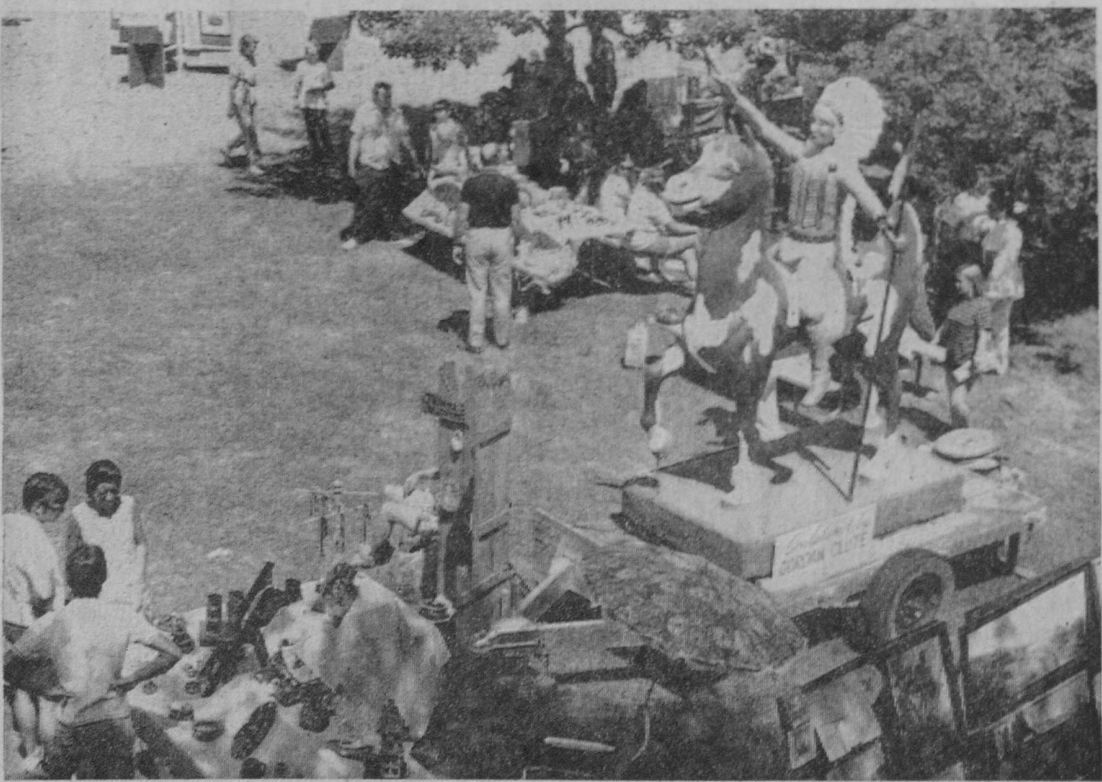

Mr. Hartman was born January 27, 1893, in Fulton County, Indiana.

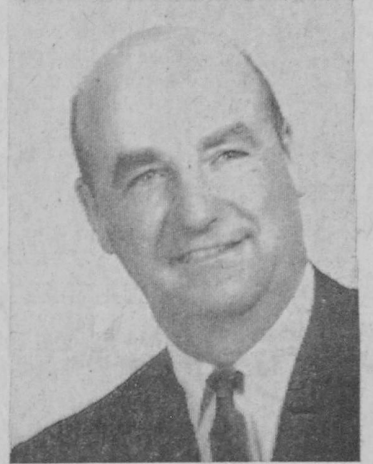

Believe it or not, your life today is more than likely influenced by the results of an eighteenth century card game when John Montagu, the fourth earl of Sandwich, England, became so involved he could not take time out for dinner. He ordered his meat brought to him between two slices of bread, so he could eat without interrupting his game. The great "sandwich" idea was born! Americans so liked the idea that they eat more than 226 million of them a day and the whole month of August is set aside to honor them.

The United States Department of Agriculture Consumer and Marketing Service's Plentiful Foods Program joins with the Wheat Flour Institute, the American Dairy Association and the National Livestock and Meat Board in promotion of August Sandwich Month.

Since the dawn of time, grain has dominated the existence of man. Wheat is presumed to have originated in the fertile basin of the Tigris and Euphrates Rivers in what is now Iraq. The first men to eat wheat, traveling hunters in search of meat, probably just chewed the kernels. When they found they could cultivate the wild grain, they were able to settle in one place and make other important discoveries, such as how to grind wheat into flour and bake flour into bread.

The earliest known bread was made by the Swiss Lake Dwellers, a stone-age people, who mixed flour and water into a dough which they baked on hot stones. It was flat, hard on the outside and soft on the inside.

In about 3000 B. C., the raised loaf was discovered. It is said that a baker in the Royal Egyptian household set aside some dough made of flour, sugar and water and forgot it. His dough soured and expanded. The frightened baker tried to cover his mistake by mixing the sour dough with a fresh batch. When the new dough was baked, it raised into a lighter bread than had ever before been produced. What the Egyptian baker did not know was that some wild yeast had crept into his dough and fermented with the sugar, making air bubbles which caused the bread to rise.

So leavened bread was born and wheat became even more important as a mainstay of man's diet. It was given high status in various civilizations and was linked with religion and superstition.

In ancient Egypt, bread was considered the symbol of truth. Persons took a sacred oath with their right hands touching the top of the loaf. Bread was also buried with the deceased person so that they could eat the bread during the trip to the "other world." Greek and Roman mythology provided goddesses of bread and grain, Demeter and Ceres.

Bread and government, to a great degree, also are related. Kings have been de-throned during bread riots because of the lack of food and wars have been fought over control of wheat-producing lands.

During the reign of Louis XVI of France, Marie Antoinette is supposed to have said "let them eat cake" when she was told the people of Paris were clamoring for bread. The "cake" the queen referred to was white bread, a royal household fare.

These are only a few of the ways in which the "staff of life" has influenced man's history and culture.



Boy Scout Council Has New Executive

Ellis Ivey, president of the new Lake Huron Area Council, Boy Scouts of America, announced today that the selections committee named R. Ralph Smith, Springfield, Illinois, as the first scout executive of the new 19-county council beginning September 1.

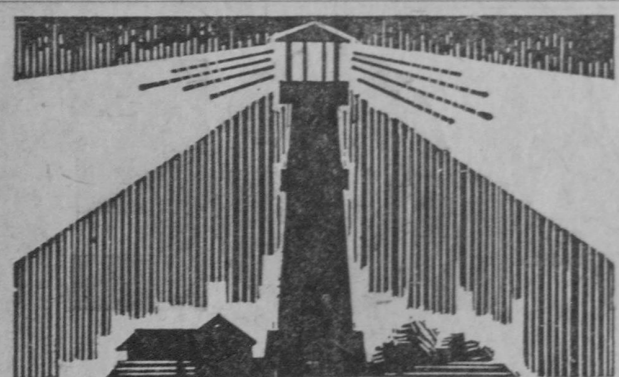

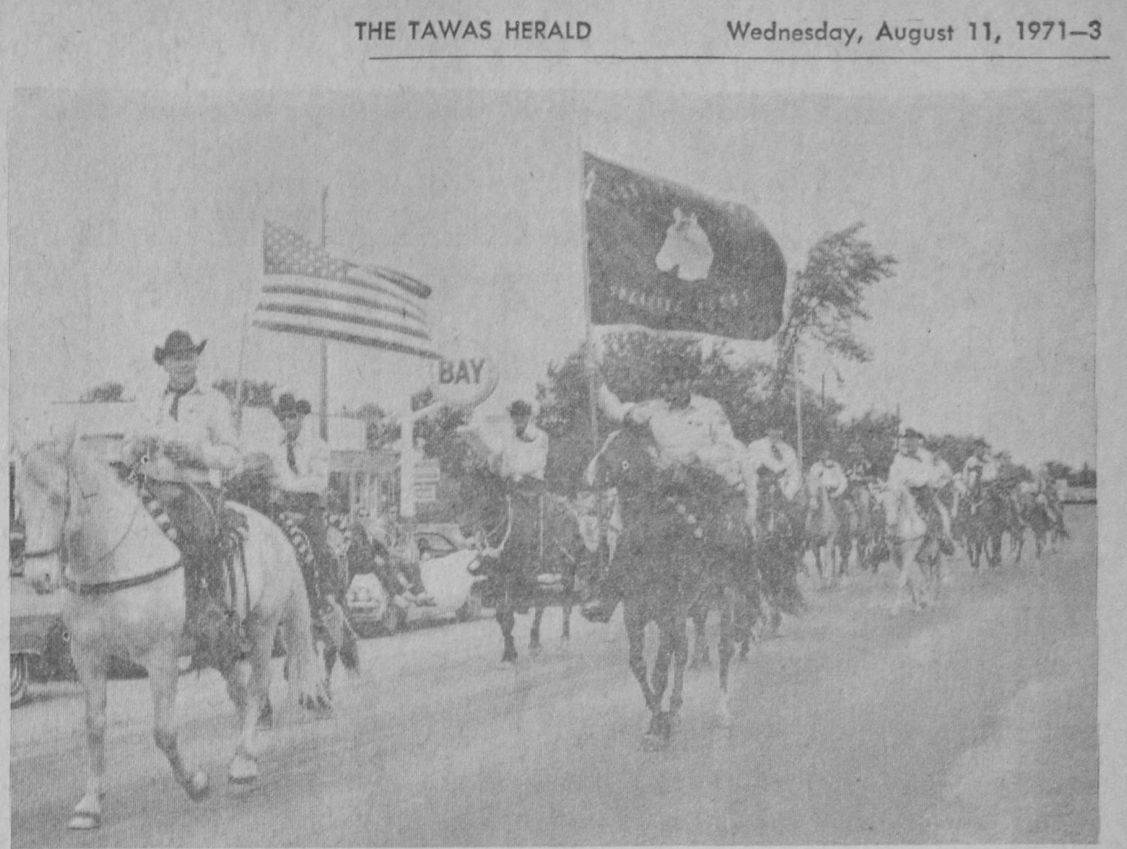

Don't Litter Is A Good Rule, Reminds Kroger Milk Cartons

side panels of the milk cartons through September suggest using them as freezer containers, mini trash cans or the base for a three-ring circus for the kiddies.

An added idea for gardeners is the use of the cartons as planters for seedlings.

Answer Questions on Social Security

Question: I am 66 and out of work right now. However, I may start working again within a year or two. Could I apply for monthly social security retirement benefits and, if I start back to work again, have my checks stopped?

Answer: Yes. You may start and stop your checks as often as necessary. And, depending on how much you earn when you do go back to work, you may be able to get checks for some months. Regardless of how

much you earn, you can get a check for any month you do not earn over \$140. Remember, too, that when you reach 72, you can get your check every month no matter how much you earn.

Question: I am 64 years old. I retired when I was 62 but did not sign up for social security retirement benefits because I wanted to wait until I was 65 and could receive a full benefit. I have now decided to go ahead and apply for the reduced benefit. Can I get my checks all the way back to the month I was 62?

Answer: No. An application for social security retirement benefits can be retroactive for no more than 12 months.

Question: I would like to take my young son to a social security office and get him a social security card. Does he have to be a certain age?

Answer: No. There is no minimum age for getting a social security card.

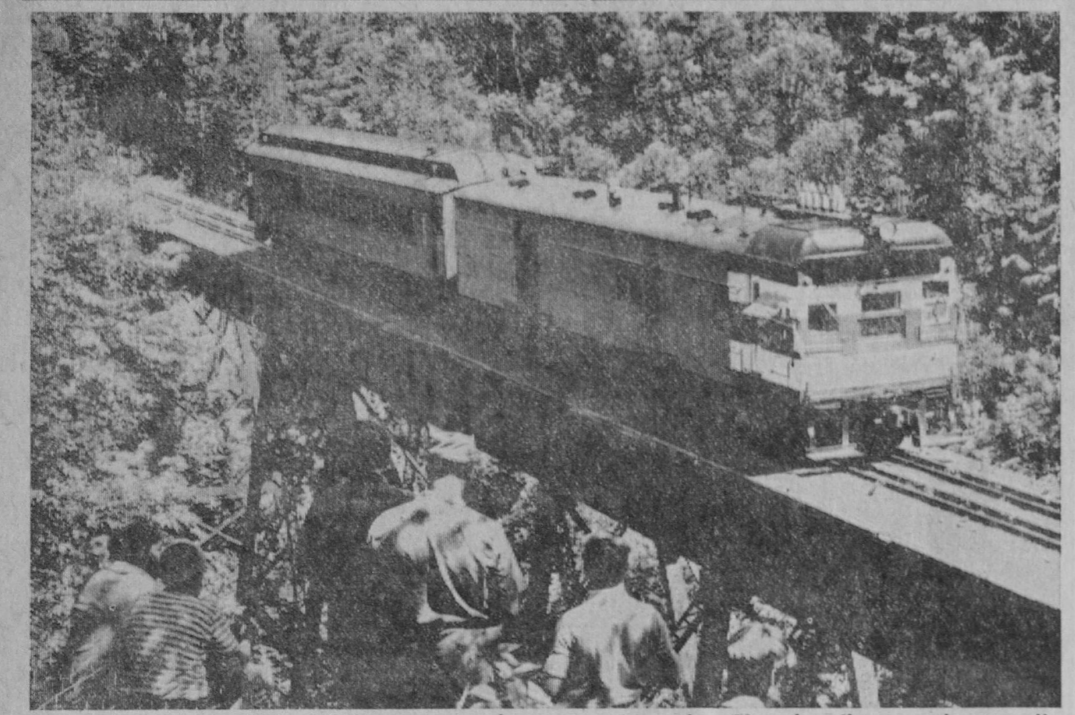

- 1 (6 oz.) pkg. semi-sweet chocolate morsels
- 2 cups marshmallow creme

Blend together flour, rolled oats, margarine, brown sugar, salt, soda and milk or cream until crumbly. Press into bottom of greased 13x9 inch pan. Sprinkle with semi-sweet chocolate morsels. Drop dollops of marshmallow creme as evenly as possible over morsels. Bake at 350 degrees for 25 minutes. Let set before cutting into bars.

"DOC ADAMS OF GUNSMOKE"

Milburn Stone, the frontier Doc Adams of the television program, "Gunsmoke", for 16 years, is doing fine these days. You may remember that he had a heart attack several years ago. The Dodge City Doc underwent open heart surgery last March after he was told that a second attack would render him useless.

After a recent checkup, he said, "I feel fine, better than I'm supposed to." He said "Doc Adams" would return to work soon which would put him in episodes that would be released this fall.

Milburn Stone lives in North Hollywood, California, with his wife Jane. They have been married 30 years.

It was not until I caught up with him at the National Cowboy Hall of Fame in Oklahoma City, where he was being honored, did I really have an opportunity to visit with this busy man. He has received more honors than one can shake a stick at, including honorary membership in the National Coroners Association and the Outstanding Service Award of the Kansas Medical Society, conferred on laymen only five times in the Society's 100-year history. He has also won an Emmy Award as the best supporting actor.

Probably no other television star is as much alike out of character as in character. The only difference between Milburn Stone and Doc Adams is the frontier period clothes he wears while on the program.

Doc was especially interested to talk about his associates on the long-playing western television program, in fact, happy to do so, but very reserved and modest when it came to his own part in the production.

Amanda Blake, who plays the part of Matt Dillon's girlfriend Kitty, never wanted to be anything but an actress. She wanted to live in a large ranch house with a swimming pool. Today she had made it all come true. Born Beverly Louis Neill in Buffalo, New York, she was in films when she was in her teens. Then she went to TV in the Red Skelton Show. She is forty two.

James Arness, known as Marshal Matt Dillon, was born in Minneapolis, Minnesota, on May 26, 1923. He interrupted his college education to serve in World War II. Back in Minnesota Jim became an announcer, then moved to the film capital. The following three years the wolf was snapping at his heels. The going was rough until he was able to land some work in films. The television production "Gunsmoke" brought him stardom. Jim Arness is devoted to his children; Craig, 23; Jenny Lee, 21; and Rolfe, 19. Many people are surprised when they first learn that Peter Graves on "Mission: Impossible" is his brother.

Ken Curtis, featured as "Festus" came into show business as a musician. While at Colorado College, he wrote musicals, then landed a staff job on television. Tommy Dorsey liked his voice and hired him. Ken toured next with the Shep Field's band as a vocalist. Later he got parts in western pictures and his big break came with "Gunsmoke" to replace Dennis Weaver, who left the show after playing the part of "Chester". Ken was born Curtis Gates in Larmar, Colorado, on July 12, 1916.

And the veteran of them all in the entertainment world is Milburn Stone. His background is rooted in the locale of "Gunsmoke". For he was born July 5, 1904, in Burton, Kansas, about 80 miles from the real Dodge City. When he was

two his father, a country storekeeper, moved the family to Fort Larned, 50 miles closer to Dodge. The man to become the best known television doctor as a youngster had such a splendid scholastic record in elementary and high school he earned a Congressional appointment to the United States Naval Academy, but he turned it down to join up with a touring repertory group. They would usually stay in a town a week, playing a different show each night. This was during the Opera House era. He toured the Middle West with the Helen B. Ross Stock Company. He performed with several little-theater groups, including the Allen-Names Players, the Harold English Players, the Wallace Bruce Company, and also with the leading tent shows whose booking itinerate reached from the Dakota prairies to the Rio Grande Valley in Texas.

In the 1930's, he was a partner in a vaudeville act, Stone and Strain, offering songs, dances and snappy patter. They appeared on stage circuits and radio networks. It was also in the 30's when he first appeared on Broadway and in a motion picture. The stage play was Sinclair Lewis's "The Jayhawker", and the movie was "Ladies Crave Excitement".

Steady work followed in Hollywood. Milburn Stone has been featured in more than 150 full-length pictures.

His hobbies included designing furniture, fishing and cruising on Lake Meade, Nevada, in his 41-foot boat, the "Jayhawker".

Doc Adams is a true gentleman under all occasions, both on and off the screen. According to Doc, it has been the off-camera close friendship among the cast that has been responsible for the success of the long-playing program.

"The public senses it and they respond. It's something actors just can't fake," explained the veteran actor. "Jim Arness is the most honest, least hypocritical man I've ever met. Sure he's quiet, he's a loner. That's his right. Sure he's lazy. On Jim, it looks good."

Comradeship on the "Gunsmoke" sets is not reserved for Messrs. Stone and Arness. According to Doc, Miss Kitty is the glue that holds the cast together.

"If ever a show had all the ingredients for trouble, it's ours. Here's one gal with three rough characters. And, let me tell you she's a master at pulling in the reins before any rough stuff or any rough talk can get out of hand."

Ken Curtis, too, gets credit from Doc for helping to preserve the happy backstage family atmosphere.

"Sure, we get into our ruckuses. But, somehow, when things get tense, it's always Miss Kitty who eases the tension by finding something humorous in the situation and breaking into that marvelous lumberman's laugh of hers."

But it was the gal known as Miss Kitty who gave all credit to Doc Adams for the family-like harmony during their past many years together. "Like any family we have our differences," Miss Kitty told me. "But we stick together when an outsider picks on one of us."

On one occasion Doc Adams had a verbal go-a-round with what he called a Johnny-come-lately sort of a fellow who in some way got on the production end of the show—for a short while. That is, until he riled up the veteran actor to a point he could no longer contain himself.

On this particular day Doc walked off the set when the young producer insisted on a scene that Doc thought had no place in a "Gunsmoke" show. The situation ended up in one crashing argument. Doc, as he walked off the set said he was leaving the show and his words have often been retold: "I am too old to scare and too rich to care!"

The rest of the "Gunsmoke" family sat quietly by, watching the confrontation. Not one said a word until the young producer turned to them, obviously assuming they were 100 per cent on his side, and with a smirk asked, "Just what can you do with a guy like that?"

There were a few moments of silence. It was Jim Arness, the shy and silent one, who came up with an answer.

"I'd listen to him if I were you," he drawled. "We always do, and it's never done us one bit of harm!"

Enjoy rock 'em, sock 'em action? Then a highlight of many county fairs and cattle shows around the nation—the calf scramble—is for you.

The bronzed, muscular farm boys who vie for the skittish 300-pound critters must be rugged, quick and cunning, with an appetite for combat and tolerance of lumps and bruises.

If not, they'll go home empty-handed.

That's because the show ring contains twice as many combatants as calves. Contestants are given a 5-foot rope with which to fashion a halter. Then the nervous animals are turned loose in a fenced-in arena.

Frightened by the commotion, the calves sprint wildly to evade pursuers. As hundreds of spectators cheer themselves hoarse, the farm youths race after the calves, bulldog them into the dust and, finally, halter the panting animal.

Then all that remains is to tug the balky calf across the finish line.

"It's about as easy as stopping a runaway freight train, then dragging it back to the station," one muddy calf wrestler quipped.

Arrangements vary, but often the winners can keep the calves until the next year's fair, when they're sold. The boys are given the proceeds, minus an amount used to buy calves for the next contest, such as this scramble at the Carroll County Fair in Milledgeville, Illinois.



To get 'em boys! A calf scrambler must be tougher than a football tackle and as fleet as a cornerback. The frightened calves bolt to all four corners of the arena.

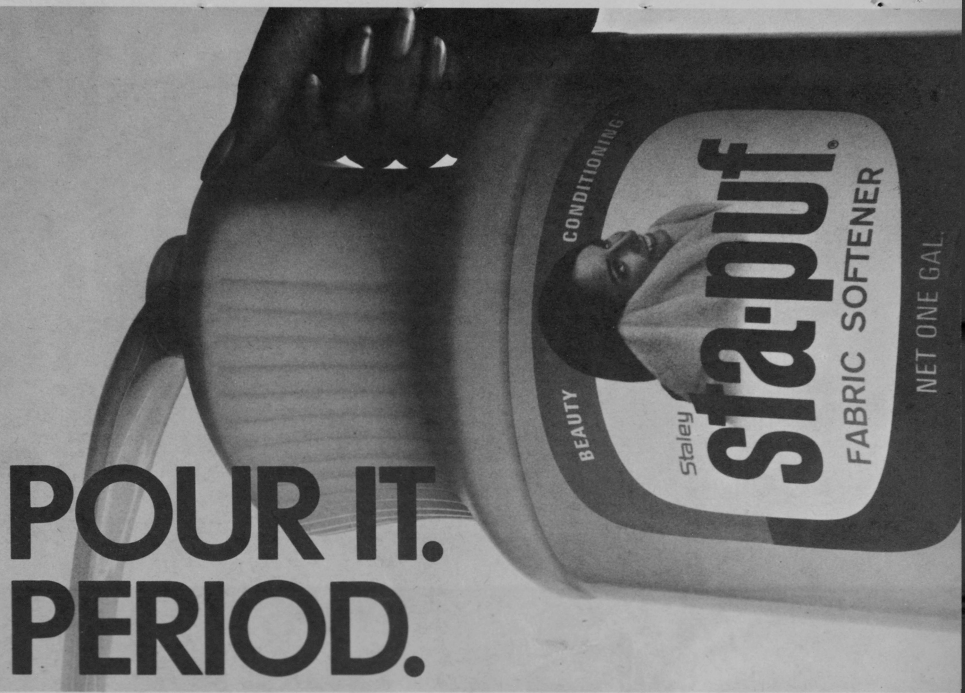
