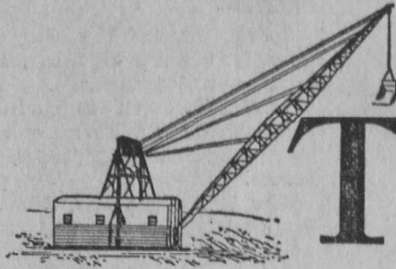

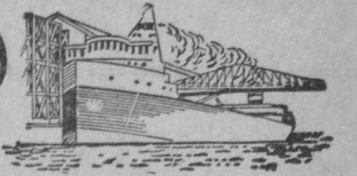

TC Residents Reminded

Ordinance Controls Snowmobile Operation

Under terms of an ordinance adopted January 4 of this year by the Tawas City Council, operation of snowmobiles is prohibited on US-23 and on M-55 from US-23 west to Fifth Avenue.

In addition, operation of snowmobiles is prohibited in any cemetery or in any established public park or recreation area unless specifically designated by the council, or on private property without the consent of the property owner.

The ordinance provides that snowmobile operation is prohibited between the hours of 10:00 p. m. and 6:00 a. m. and operation is prohibited within one block of any hospital. Snowmobile operation is prohibited on any sidewalk within the city limits.

An operator of a snowmobile is required to have on his or her person a valid motor vehicle operator's license if traveling on public property.

The ordinance provides that any person operating a snowmobile shall come to a complete stop at all intersections, travel as close to the right edge of the plowed area of the street as practical, obey all traffic signals or signs, yield the right-of-way to all vehicular traffic and pedestrians and travel in single file when two or more snowmobiles are together.

Any person operating a snowmobile on a city street or any other place open to the general public in a willful or wanton disregard for the safety of persons or property is guilty of reckless operation.

The ordinance provides that operators of snowmobiles are to stop when given a visual or audible signal by a police officer.

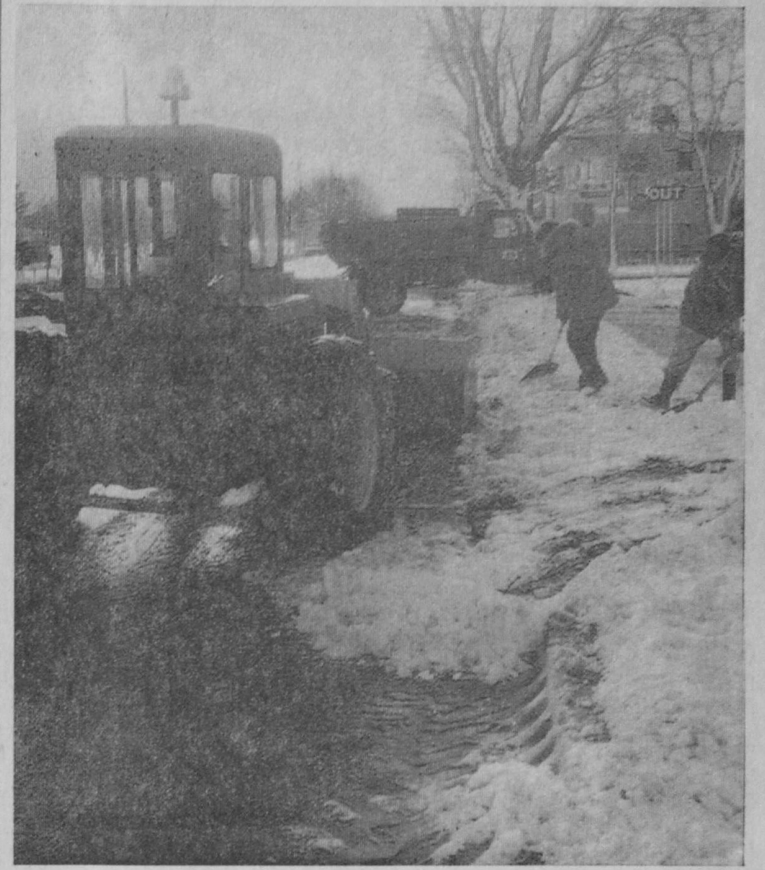
Any person violating provisions of the ordinance is guilty of a misdemeanor and, upon conviction, is subject to a fine of not more than \$100, or by imprisonment in the county jail not to exceed 90 days. A snowmobile may be confiscated

and held for a period not to exceed 30 days, with owner to pay cost of transportation, towing and storage.

Any snowmobile operated in the city is presumed to be operating with the consent of the owner and the owner may be held jointly and severally liable with the operator for damages arising out of the negligent or improper operation thereof.

The owner may be held jointly and severally liable to a property owner for three times the amount of damages to trees, shrubs, landscaping or personal property on private property where the snowmobile is operating without the consent of the property owner.

Any snowmobile operated within the city is presumed to be operated with the consent of the owner, who is to be held responsible for any violations or any damage to property caused by the operation of a snowmobile while operated by a minor.

Mrs. Phelps Says 'The First 100 Years Are the Hardest'

Mrs. Clara Phelps, a lifelong resident of this county, will be 100 years old on December 7.

The former Clara Otis was born four miles from East Tawas in Baldwin Township in a cabin which had sides of vertical poles instead of horizontal logs.

Clara's father came to Iosco County from Jefferson County in upstate New York, in 1888, right after the Civil War, to homestead land.

In 1889, Clara's mother followed her husband to Michigan by taking the train from Clayton, New York, to Port Huron, completing the trip to East Tawas by passenger boat. The household furniture and belongings were packed in a wagon bed and carried four miles inland by four stout men.

The earliest event she remembers is her fourth birthday. Neighbors, who lived about four miles away, had the party and the Otis family drove an ox drawn sleigh to attend.

Clara started school at the age of 11 and had to walk two miles to get to her classes. There were no grades in the one-room school and the teacher worked with individuals or

small groups who were at various levels in their educational development.

There were many German people in this area and Clara was once given the task of teaching English to one of her German-speaking classmates. As a child, she remembers seeing deer, bear and one wildcat.

She had charge of the 1910 and 1920 United States Census in Wilber Township and was once postmistress of the Wilber post office. She also worked for a time at the old Iosco County Gazette, reading copy and setting type, and she served many years as the Wilber correspondent of The Tawas Herald.

Mrs. Phelps has four children living in the Tawas area. They are Mrs. Laura Sugden, Clarence Dorey, Francis and Henry Dorey (twins). Her sisters are Mrs. Ada Schneck of Hampton, Virginia, and Miss Edna Otis of East Tawas.

Sister Edna still runs her own antique shop, Ye Olde Antique Shop, 107 East State Street, East Tawas, and jokingly claims she keeps working to "keep out of jail and off welfare."

Miss Otis is the unofficial historian of Iosco County and has written a book on the history of the AuSable and Oscoda area.

Mrs. Phelps' grandchildren number 14 with 34 great grandchildren and one great, great grandchild.

Clara attributes her long life to "never burning the candle at both ends." She states she never stayed up all night, did not believe in dancing or playing cards. It seems her parents were of Methodist stock and frowned on such things as cards and dancing.

A hobby of making shag rugs keeps Clara busy and, as soon as she finishes her present one, she plans to start on a new one.

She worked long enough to receive a small social security check each month which helps pay for her care at the Iosco Medical Care Facility where she resides.

She jokingly adds, "You know, the first 100 years are the hardest."

Mrs. Phelps will be honored with an open house Tuesday, December 7, 3:00 to 6:00 p. m., at the Wilber United Methodist Church. A pot-luck lunch will be served.

It's That Time of Year Again for Annual Tax Statements

Mailing of annual tax statements to property owners of Iosco County started today (Wednesday), according to a report by Henry Oates, Iosco tax equalization director.

Preparation of tax statements started the first week of October at the county building and December 1 is the first day for collection by township and city treasurers.

Taxes range from a high of \$32.95 per \$1,000 of state equalized valuation for that portion of Grant Township included in Hale Area School

District, to a low of \$21.95 per \$1,000 SEV for that portion of Wilber Township in Oscoda School District.

Except for special voted township taxes or special voted operational and debt retirement taxes for school districts, the tax rate is the same for all units with but two exceptions. Tawas is the only township which does not assess a one-mill township tax and Whittemore - Prescott Area School District is governed by Ogemaw County's pegged 9 1/2 mills for school operation.

The 15 mills split by the Iosco Al-

location Board gave nine mills to schools, 4.89 mills to the county and .20 of a mill to the intermediate school district. The county levies .20 of a mill for debt retirement and .75 of a mill is a voted tax levied for the intermediate school district.

Special voted or debt retirement for the county's four school districts are as follows: Tawas Area, 7.30 for operation and one mill for debt retirement; Oscoda Area, three mills for operation and one mill for debt retirement; Hale Area, nine mills for operation and six mills for debt retirement; Whittemore-Prescott, five mills for operation and three mills for debt retirement.

Townships with special voted taxes include: AuSable—one mill for fire protection, 1.40 for police and 1.20 for street lights; Baldwin—one mill for fire protection; Grant—two mills for fire protection; Oscoda—one-half mill for debt retirement and 3 1/2 mills for lights; Plainfield—30 of a mill for fire protection and one mill for roads; Wilber—one mill for fire protection and one mill for roads.

The City of Whittemore levies eight mills for its operation on the December tax statement. City taxes for Tawas City and East Tawas are as-

essed on separate statements during the summer.

Total tax rates for the various units of Iosco County are as follows: Alabaster, 25.25; AuSable, 23.35; Baldwin, 25.25; Burleigh, 24.45; Grant, 32.95 for property in Hale Area School District and 26.25 for property in Tawas Area School District.

Oscoda, 23.95; Plainfield, 32.25; Reno, 30.95 for property in Hale Area School District and 24.45 for property in Whittemore-Prescott Area School District; Sherman, 24.45 for property in Whittemore-Prescott Area School District and 24.25 for property in Tawas Area School District; Tawas, 24.25; Wilber, 26.25 for property in Tawas Area School District and 21.95 for property in Oscoda Area School District.

East Tawas, 23.25; Tawas City, 23.25; Whittemore, 31.45. A property owner wishing to determine his individual tax may multiply the total tax rate against the state equalized valuation (approximately one-half of true cash value) of his property.

A rabies inoculation clinic will be held next week at three Iosco County locations for all dogs six months of age or over to be licensed for 1972.

Edward J. Nelkie, county treasurer, announced that local veterinarians were cooperating in this project. Certificates that dogs have been inoculated against rabies are required in order to purchase a license under provisions of a 1969 Michigan act.

Clinics are to be held as follows: Plainfield Township Fire Hall, Hale, Tuesday, December 7, 1:00 to 4:00 p. m.; Iosco Sheriff's Garage, Tawas City, Wednesday, December 8, 9:00 a. m. to 12 o'clock noon; Oscoda Township Fire Hall, Oscoda, Thursday, December 9, 1:00 to 4:00 p. m.

A fixed fee of \$4 is to be charged for rabies shots.

Nelkie said that the 1972 dog licenses may be purchased at the clinics. The current fees for 1972 are as follows: Male, \$3; female, \$5; unsexed, \$3; kennel fee, \$10.

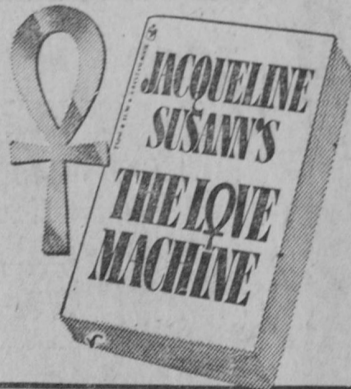

15 Years Ago—

Questions And Answers On Social Security

Question: I have hired a woman to stay with my mother as a companion while she is recuperating from an operation. Should I report her earnings and pay the social se-

curity contributions on the wages I pay her?

Answer: Yes, if you pay her cash wages of \$50 or more in a calendar quarter (three-month period of the year). For more information, get in touch with any social security office. Ask for the free leaflet, "Social Security and Your Household Employee."

Question: Since I will be 62 later this year, I plan to apply for reduced monthly social security benefits a couple of months before my birthday. I understand that I can earn up to \$1,680 a year without losing any benefits. From what date do I begin counting the \$1,680—from the date I apply for benefits or the date I become 62?

Answer: Neither. Start counting from the first of the year toward the \$1,680, even though you apply for benefits and become 62 later that year. However, regardless of your total earnings for the year, benefits are paid for any month in which you do not earn over \$140.

Question: I have a 20-year-old daughter who is studying to be a beautician. If I retire, can she get monthly benefits from social security on my earnings record?

Answer: If you receive monthly social security benefits, your daughter can also receive benefits until she reaches age 22 if she is a full-time student at a state-approved school and remains single.

Nursing Home Complaints May be Filed

The Bay City Social Security Office, along with social security offices in 850 communities throughout the country, has been appointed by Elliot L. Richardson, secretary of health, education and welfare, to serve as a local center to receive complaints about substandard conditions in nursing homes.

Persons who have information about instances of poor quality care, neglect, unsanitary or unsafe conditions in a nursing home may give that information to the nearest social security office in person or by letter or phone. If desired, the name of the person making the complaint and the name of the nursing home patient will be kept confidential.

The social security office will see that the complaint gets to the proper federal, state or local authority for investigation. The designation of the nation's social security offices as "nursing home listening posts" is preliminary to a plan announced by Secretary Richardson for the establishment of ombudsmen system in the states. The ombudsmen would take the complaints and suggestions about nursing home care and make sure they get to the right people. They would also find out what nursing home patients think—not only about the facilities where they live, but also about alternatives to nursing home care—ways in which older people may be enabled to stay in familiar surroundings instead of being institutionalized.

health and safety standards, they will be cut off from medicare funds. On the positive side, more than 4,000 medicare surveys in the past year have led to the correction of deficiencies and the upgrading of care—not just for medicare patients, but for all patients in the institutions.

Actions are also being taken to obtain state enforcement of medicare standards. Since the federal government pays only a portion of the cost of nursing home care under medicare, the federal government does not have direct authority.
