looks fresh, has firm needles and is no larger than needed. (2) Saw the trunk at an angle one inch or more above the original cut

to open the tree fibers. (3) If purchasing a tree some time before erecting it, stand it in a container of clear water in a cool

(4) The tree holder should be equipped with a water container which should be kept filled during the entire period the tree is inside the home. (5) Support the tree firmly and

keep it well away from sources of heat such as stoves, fireplaces, heat ducts and radiators. It should also be kept out of hallways and should not block any exits.

(6) Trees should be kept indoors for the shortest possible time and re-
