State Chamber Officials Impressed With Symposium

A high school-business symposium conducted here December 9 by the Michigan State Chamber of Commerce, in cooperation with Tawas Chamber of Commerce, was called the "best executed and most successful symposium we have had" by Leland K. Bassett, communications manager for the state chamber.

Bassett said the attention, participation and questions by students were outstanding. Some 117 students were in attendance, along with 11 businessmen and four faculty members.

The goal of these programs is to exchange ideas and thoughts through interaction and communication. "There was a very high level of interaction and communication throughout the day—one of the best in the state," said Bassett.

"I have participated in many of these symposiums throughout the state and I sensed from the very beginning that this was going to be one of the most enjoyable—it was," said Bassett.

Representatives of the state organization believe that the one-day programs generate more awareness of a local chamber of commerce and better understanding of business than any other single program element.

In the evaluation report, it was found that only one student found the symposium unprofitable while the remainder felt that the time was well spent. All recommended that the program be continued for next year's senior class.

Some of the comments heard from students included: "High schools must teach economics," "big business is interested in ecology," "business is not all bad, but it has a long way to improve, as well as everyone else, to make this a good world in which to live," "we all have a part to play in the United States if we want this country to succeed," "most people talk about things, but if you want to get something done, you have to get your hands dirty."

Other comments from students concerning what they learned during the symposium included: "That business definitely has a very promising future for anyone who wants to get out and get it," "that profit is not always so great," "that each person must be willing to work out on his own and try to better his

area to cause betterment in other areas," "that somebody cares about the rural areas of this country and not just the big cities of America."

Some of the questions asked the panel included: Influence of industry on local, state and federal governments; possible advantages of government control of business; improvement of profits if products are improved; opportunities for youth in business; the role of capitalism in the world today; opportunities for students in cooperative business; opportunities for young people in the job market.

Fire Chief Says Barn Blazes Set

Three barns at the old Rood Ranch, located one-quarter mile west of Lorenz Road, Tawas Township, were destroyed by fire Christmas Eve. Tawas City Volunteer Fire Department was called to the scene, but the blaze was out of control by the time equipment and men reached the scene.

Fire Chief James Lansky said that the buildings had not been used in years and there was no electrical service. He said that tire tracks leading to the property, along with other evidence, indicated that the buildings had been used for a drinking party.

The fire was discovered by neighbors, who noticed flames above the treeline.

Lansky said that the Rood residence had been destroyed in a similar blaze about three years ago.

Sentenced on Heroin Charge

Rudolph W. Staib, 20, Saginaw, charged with possession of heroin, was sentenced to 18 months to 10 years in Southern Michigan Prison, Jackson, by Circuit Judge Allan C. Miller.

Staib was transported December 21 to Jackson by the Iosco County Sheriff's Department.

He was one of 11 young persons arrested in a drug raid last June at the Gordon Creek campground of Huron National Forest.

Staib had been released on bond June 2 after pleading guilty to a reduced charge of possession of heroin. Originally, he had been charged with the sale of heroin.

Valuation Increase Varied According to Sales Study

While Iosco County had an over-all increase on its true cash value base for 1971 of 3.47 percent or \$7,677,990, percentages of increase varied in the 14 different governmental units, reports Henry Oates, tax equalization director.

Increases to the true cash value base were adopted two weeks ago by the Iosco County Board of Commissioners. Theoretically, one-half of the true cash value is the state equalized valuation for taxing purposes.

Increases were based on a sales study conducted by the tax equalization department office.

Residential property of the county had an average increase of 3.88 percent according to figures for the following units: Alabaster, \$267,040, an increase of 4.32 percent; AuSable, \$117,600, a 98 percent increase; Baldwin, \$578,980, an increase of 4.35 percent; Grant, \$124,420, an increase of 1.47 percent; Oscoda, \$1,485,610, an increase of 3.96 percent; Plainfield, \$1,296,100, an increase of 5.36 percent; Tawas, \$212,460, an increase of 5.66 percent; Wilber, \$73,020, an increase of 2.94 percent;

Snow Plow Operators, State's Winter Heroes, Gird for Battle

A small army of men and machines is combat ready to do battle once again with Old Man Winter. One of their commanding officers proudly refers to them as "Michigan's real winter heroes."

Michigan motorists have come to expect "bare pavement" driving in all areas of the state, regardless of the severity of winter storms, State Highway Director Henrik E. Stafseth noted.

"Good winter maintenance is an expensive but necessary operation," Stafseth said. "Michigan's health, welfare and economy depend on a 'bare pavement' program no matter how tough the winters are."

The snow and ice removal program on the 9,251-mile state highway system last winter cost 13.4 million dollars, an all time high. Rising labor and material costs accounted for part of the increase, but snowfall through most of Northern Michigan was heavier than usual and record setting in some areas.

Accumulated snowfall ranged from less than 30 inches in the southeastern counties to more than 260 inches (more than 21 feet) in Keweenaw County in the Western Upper Peninsula.

The Department of State Highways maintains state highways in only 21 of Michigan's 83 counties and contracts with county road com-

missions to do state highway work in the other 62 counties.

Iosco County is one of those counties with which the state contracts with the county road commission for snow removal. In addition, snow removal on US-23 and M-55 in Tawas City and East Tawas is handled under contract by departments of public works of the two communities.

An average winter storm that blankets the entire state will bring out 750 snow plows and operators to clear state highways. At the same time, many more plows and operators are busy on more than 100,000 miles of county roads and municipal streets.

"Winter maintenance actually is a year around program," Paul J. Marek, state engineer of highway maintenance, said.

"Trucks, plows, blades, salters, sanders and all other equipment needed when a winter storm hits, are repaired and prepared during the non-winter months."

Marek said the highway department also is involved in a statewide program of constructing enclosed sheds in which to store salt. Salt sheds have an asphalt floor with a wood frame enclosure to prevent salt from seeping into the ground or nearby streams.

Marek noted that the state legislature approved a supplemental ap-

propriation of \$977,000 last September to spur construction of salt sheds in those counties whose road commissions contract to do the work on state highways.

Salt is the main ammunition used for fighting ice on state highways. Marek estimated that approximately 370,000 tons of salt will be used on the state highway system this winter.

Joseph F. Oravec, state engineer of highway maintenance operations, noted that occasionally a state highway will be closed because of impassable snow conditions. "It is not the depth of the snow that stops our crews, but the lack of visibility due to windblown snow."

He said that visibility—or lack of it—is the biggest handicap to Michigan's snow removal operations.

Bold Thief Takes Snowmobile From Front Yard

Iosco Sheriff's Department officers are investigating the theft of a snowmobile Christmas Eve at the home of Alice Sageman of Londo Lake.

Mrs. Sageman told officers that the snowmobile was parked about 15 feet from her door. She heard the machine start up, but by the time she ran out the door the machine had disappeared on Riley Road.

Hurt Thursday on Snowmobile

Herman F. Gumtrow, 56, Dearborn, was treated at Tawas Hospital Thursday night for injuries received when his snowmobile was involved in an accident on private property in Plainfield Township. Michigan State Police officers said his machine struck a hump in the ground and he was thrown off the vehicle.

Perchville Buttons Now on Sale

Perchville buttons with "magic numbers" are now on sale at business establishments in the Tawas area, according to a report from C. A. "Bill" Arlington, button chairman for the Tawas Chamber of Commerce.

Arlington states that the Perchville Festival is a community event and its success depends on button sales. The festival is to be held in February.

Chest Crushed by Car Hale Mother Died in Freak Accident

A 26-year-old Hale resident was killed Christmas Eve when her parked car dropped into gear, knocked her to the ground and ran over her.

Investigating sheriff's department officers said that Mrs. Carol Ann Bourland of Hale died of a crushed chest. There were no witnesses to the accident.

Officers said that Mrs. Bourland had driven to the residence of her sister, Mrs. Harold McKenzie, whose home is located east of Hale. She apparently left the engine running while she got out of the car to enter the house.

Mrs. McKenzie, her husband and Allie McKenzie heard a scream in the yard and went outside to investigate.

The McKenzies discovered the driverless vehicle backing up in a circle and Mrs. Bourland lying on the ground. Officers said that one of the McKenzies jumped into the moving car and stopped it, but not before the vehicle had backed over the victim's chest.

Iosco County Sheriff's Department officers said the accident remains under investigation.

3.2 Percent Rate Increase Granted

Consumers Power Company has received approval to increase its electric rates by \$10,599,400 annually. The 3.2 percent rate increase, which is less than half the 28.5 million dollars requested by Consumers Power, will be spread among the utility's 1.1 million electric customers in 61 Lower Peninsula counties.

The Michigan Commerce Department's Public Service Commission, which authorized the increase in rates, said Consumers Power's average residential customer will pay approximately 32 cents per month more for electricity under the new rates. Minimum bill customers will pay nine cents more per month.

Two of the commission's three members—Chairman Willis F. Ward of Detroit and Lenton G. Scouthour of Marshall—signed the order. William F. Rails of Detroit did not participate because he joined the commission in September after the rate case had been heard.

Ward said the commission believes the increase in rates for Consumers Power is consistent with the guidelines of the Federal Economic Stabilization Act and regulations of the Federal Price Commission which will review the commission order.

"We allowed only those increased costs to the company which have been shown to be of such a nature or magnitude that not to allow them would impair the ability of the com-

pany to render efficient public utility service," he said.

Ward said the commission authorized Consumers Power to earn the same rate of return on common equity that it allowed in the last rate increase it approved for the utility in September of 1969.

Mann Needs Snow For Trail Machine

Fire Chief James Mann of Hale is anxious to make use of new equipment designed to make a smoother ride on Iosco snowmobile trails.

Mann has been hired by a snowmobile manufacturer to operate specially designed equipment to cut humps out of snowmobile trails. The manufacturer has furnished the equipment free of charge to Michigan and the unit to be operated by Mann is the only one located in this county.

The Plainfield fire chief said that the unit consists of a set of bob-sleighs equipped with a cutting edge, rollers and chains.

"The unit is seven feet wide so there will be some limitations where trails are not wide enough," said Mann.

He said he expected to be busy all winter—depending on snow conditions. He was headed for the Seven Mile Hill area west of Oscoda Tuesday morning to check on trail widths.

Snow Needed to Prevent Freezing

A good ground cover of snow is needed to prevent possible freezing of water and sewer mains, according to a report Tuesday morning by Reginald Bublitz, Tawas City superintendent of public works.

"Unless we get some snow during the next month, homeowners will have serious problems with freezing mains," said Bublitz.

Bublitz said that there was now about 10 inches of frost in the roads, as compared to the frost-free condition which existed earlier this month.

"On December 2, the DPW crew found 13 inches of frost during construction of a water main. Five days later, there was no frost because of heavy rains during the interim period," said Bublitz.

Police Solve West County Burglaries

More than 30 burglaries and larcenies from cabins and business establishments in Western Iosco County have been cleared with the arrest of four juveniles.

According to Det. George Westcott of the Iosco Sheriff's Department, Iosco Probate Court has waived jurisdiction on two of the juveniles, who have been turned over to circuit court. Jurisdiction on the other two juveniles has not cleared probate court as yet.

Westcott said that the case involved about \$500 worth of merchandise stolen from cabins and business places in the Hale, Whittemore and Long Lake areas and date back to last spring.

Included were 71 cabin breakings and enterings, six larcenies and six commercial burglaries.

Water Board Closed Year; Last Meeting for Cable

Tawas City Water Board held its final meeting of the year Monday night. The meeting also marked the last time that Mayor Cecil Cable was presiding officer. Cable retires from office effective January 3.

The board approved extension of a sewer main in Spring Street from

First Avenue to serve Lot 11 of Riverview Court. The 120-foot main would be constructed next spring when weather permits and the total cost would be paid by the property owner.

Authorization was given to purchase a 1964 1½-ton utility truck from Michigan Consolidated Gas Company. The equipment had been declared surplus by the utility firm. The truck is equipped with a compressor and winch as well as compartments for tools on the truck box.

Authorization was given to purchase a new submersible pump for the Luedtke pumping station on Second Street. The original pump was set in the bottom of a dry well and was connected to an electrical motor on the first elevation by a long shaft. The new pump and motor is to be constructed as a single unit.

Study Grant for City Park Dock

Possibility of securing a federal grant to aid in repairing the Tawas City Park dock is now being considered by city officials.

Mayor Cecil Cable and Reginald Bublitz, superintendent of public works, met last Wednesday with State Sen. Robert Richardson and James Collison, director of the East Central Michigan Economic Development District.

Indications are that the repair project could be eligible for a 50 percent grant.

The city council and park board had discussed the possibility of repairing the dock in recent years. Old wooden cribbing has deteriorated on much of the structure.

Capling graduated from high school in Harbor Beach, and earned both his bachelor of arts and master of social work degrees from Michigan State University.

Capling has worked for the Michigan Department of Social Services for eight years, most of that time as a counselor and a camp supervisor in the youth rehabilitation camp program for delinquent boys.

Capling and his wife, Martha, live at 2209 North Partridge Point Road, Alpena. Mrs. Capling teaches re-

medial education in Alpena Community Schools.

Capling is one of eight regional directors to be named by the office of youth services, which was recently established within the Michigan Department of Social Services, and he will be working closely with county social services offices.

According to Peter Forsythe, director of OYS, these regional directors are being appointed to allow greater citizen impact on programs and to keep neglected and delinquent youngsters close to their homes through such facilities as group homes and half-way houses.

In addition to new community-based services which are being established, the office of youth services is also responsible for state training schools, youth camps and adoption and foster care services.

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Older Citizens Benefited by Homestead Exemption

Tax relief will be a reality for many older citizens this year.

The Michigan Commission on Aging reminds all people 65 and older that under Michigan's revised Homestead Tax Exemption law they might now qualify for this exemption.

Applicants, who must file for this exemption each year at their local assessor's office, may apply from January 4 until sometime in March—a date set by each local assessor.

Persons who qualify are exempt from the taxes on the first \$2,500 of the valuation of their home. Last year, the average exemption was around \$130.

To qualify under the revised Homestead Tax Exemption law which was passed by the legislature, persons must have lived in Michigan for five of the past 10 years and in their home for at least six of the preceding 12 months. Total income from all sources cannot exceed \$6,000.

Assessors will require legal proof of age; (a drivers license cannot be used), proof of home ownership such as a deed, land contract or mortgage; the applicant's social security number, and a statement of income.

Tenant stockholders of cooperative housing units must bring a photostat of the tax bill, an ownership certificate and the contract that was signed.

Under the revised law, there are no restrictions placed on the value of the property. That is, no matter how much the applicant's homestead is worth, if he meets the other requirements he should be able to obtain this exemption.

This exemption is an outright grant from the State of Michigan to the local community. There are no lien provisions so no attempt will be made by the state or local government to collect from the heirs or otherwise attach the property.

January 27—Carlton Merschel of East Tawas was elected chairman of the Iosco County Board of Commissioners. . . . Hugo J. Keiser, Tawas City druggist, was elected to the board of directors of Peoples State Bank at a meeting of stockholders. . . . Iosco Sheriff's Department is investigating vandalism of a school bus at Hale Area School. . . . Will R. Coleman III, Tawas Area High School senior, has been awarded a trophy in recognition of winning a speech contest sponsored by Readers Digest and Boy Scouts of America. . . . Tawas Area Music Boosters has reached its goal in raising funds for new band uniforms.

February 3—Another step toward formulation of a county-wide master plan was taken last week with receipt of an \$11,600 federal grant for a water and sewer survey. . . . A resolution adopted by the Tawas City Council urged Michigan's representatives in congress to support reinstatement of the lampry control program on the Great Lakes. . . . Denied SS Benefits May be Appealed

Question: I recently applied for social security disability benefits, but my claim was denied. I do not agree with that decision. Is there something I can do about it?

Answer: Yes. Since you do not agree with the determination on your claim for social security disability benefits, you may file a request to have your claim reconsidered. You must file such a request within six months from the date of the letter notifying you that you were denied. Call or visit any social security office to file a reconsideration request.

Question: I am 68 and collect monthly social security retirement benefits. But I also work part time during the year. How often should I ask the social security office to refigure my benefits based on additional earnings to see if I am due an increase in my checks?

Answer: You do not have to request the social security office to refigure your social security benefits. This is done automatically each year.

Question: I am confined to a hospital. Since I cannot come to the social security office to apply for monthly disability benefits, what other arrangements can I make?

Answer: Call or write any social security office. It is quite likely that the necessary forms can be completed over the phone and mailed to you for your signature. Or, a representative from the office will visit you at the hospital and assist you in filling out the necessary forms.

Question: I just started working and paying into social security. Can you tell me how long a person must work under social security to be eligible for benefits at retirement age?

Answer: Anyone starting his or her working career now will be fully

Newcomers Held Christmas Party December 21

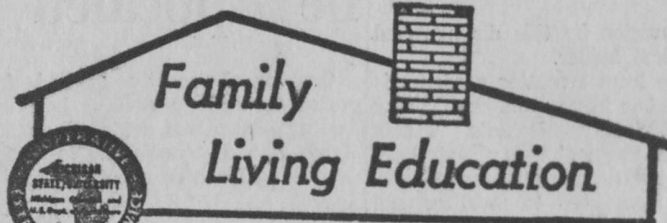

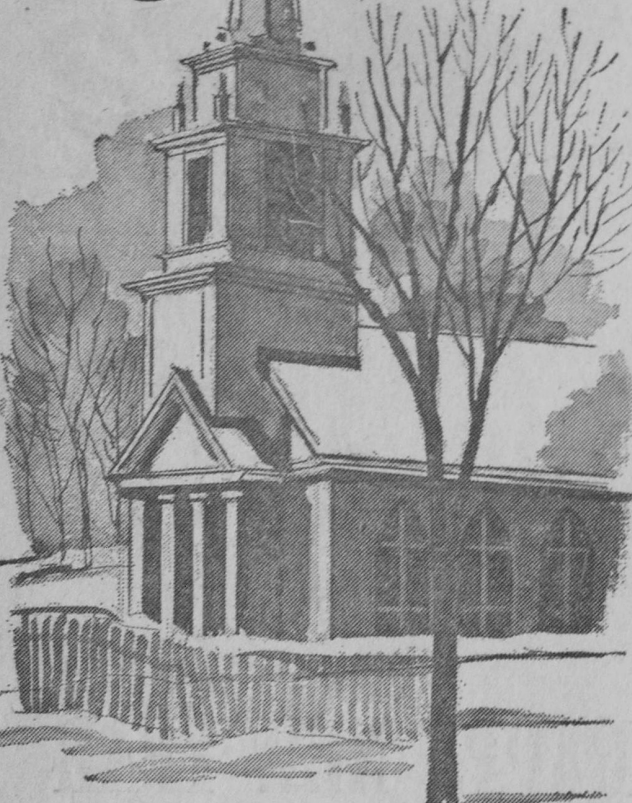
