
Glennie Man Killed in Crash of Snowmobile

A 24-year-old Glennie man, Percy Ross, was instantly killed early Sunday morning when his snowmobile slammed into a car parked on M-65, one mile south of Glennie.

Investigating Alcona County Sheriff's Department officers said Ross was driving his machine on the shoulder of the road when the accident occurred. He was pronounced dead at the scene by Coroner Richard Gillies of Lincoln.

Officers said Ross was accompanied by a companion, Darryl A. DaFoe, 19, Glennie, riding a second snowmobile, when the accident oc-

DaFoe told officers he saw the parked car in the light from his machine and leaped into a snowbank. His snowmobile hit the car, but he was uninjured.

Census Helps County and Townships

Iosco County's population had an increase of 8,400 persons during the past 10 years, according to the United States Census Bureau report released Monday. The final tabulations

had a few surprises. Final figures on last year's nose count revealed that the official population of Iosco is now 24,905 persons, as compared to 16,505 in 1960.

A comparison of totals for the two 10-year counts can be misleading as the population of Wurtsmith Air Force Base was not counted in the 1960 census. However, the count 10 years ago was taken prior to major expansion of the Strategic Air Command at Wurtsmith. The base had a 1970 population of 6,932.

Seven of Iosco's 11 townships showed increases ranging from 4.7 percent to 179.8 percent, four townships showed losses as did Tawas City and East Tawas.

As expected, the major gain came in Oscoda Township, where the count jumped from 4,202 to 11,758 in 1970. This total included the air base

What may come as a surprise to some is that Plainfield Township jumped from 1,418 persons in 1960 to 2,036 in 1970, a gain of 43.6 percent. Officials of Hale Area Schools are not surprised in the least, as enrollment counts in that district have increased drastically during the past five years and predict that the increase in students will continue at about five percent per year.

Reason for this increase, it has been stated by school officials who have been on top of enrollment projections, has been that Iosco's inland lake areas have been rapidly filling with year around residents. Jobs in the area have not increased materially, but more heads of households are commuting to work in metropolitan areas while their families have the opportunity to live in an outdoor recreational-oriented com-

This fact probably holds true, too, for Grant Township, where the population jumped from 450 to 1960 to 607 in 1970, a gain of 34.9 percent.

Tawas Township, with many new homes built along M-55 and Plank Road during the past decade, had a population increase of 29.8 percent, 1,104 to 1,433 in 1970.

Alabaster, from 390 to 280, a loss of 28.2 percent; AuSable Township, from 1,659 to 1,876, gain of 13.1 percent; Baldwin, from 880 to 773, loss of 12.2 percent; Burleigh, from 631 to 569, loss of 9.8 percent; Reno, from 319 to 294, loss of 7.8 percent; Sherman, from 403 to 422, gain of 4.7 percent; Wilber, from 317 to 359, gain of 13.2 percent.

While population losses in Tawas City and East Tawas are not as high as anticipated earlier, the decreases will be felt by both communities due to the loss of income from the state.

East Tawas' population dropped from 2,462 to 2,372 in 1970, a loss of 3.7 percent, while Tawas City dropped from 1,810 to 1,666, a loss of

eight percent. The City of Whittemore remained constant during the past 10 years with identical population totals of 460.

Officials of both East Tawas and Tawas City believed that the 1970 count was in error and conducted their own surveys in early November. As a result, Tawas City picked up 2.2 percentage points from the initial count and East Tawas gained almost two percentage points.

The final population count is important to all local units of government because returns on state collected taxes are based on population. This includes sales tax, intangibles tax, personal income tax, motor vehicle fund, major street fund.



Tawas City Man Hurts Legs on Snowmobile

Kenneth E. Rapp, 45, Tawas City, was treated at Tawas Hospital Sunday for lacerated legs following a snowmobile accident on private property in Baldwin Township.

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
