

# March 15 Set for School Discussion

Public discussion on renovation and addition to the Tawas City Elementary Unit for utilization as a middle school will be held at a special meeting of Tawas Area Board of Education Monday, March 15.

In recent months, the board of education has discussed various plans for a middle school concept to handle grades six through eight.

Included in the discussion was leasing of portable classrooms and renovation of two rooms in the present elementary building as opposed to permanent construction.

Cost of the various construction proposals are to be discussed at the March 15 meeting.

Supt. Reynold Mick said the board of education was interested in learning the desires of the community as a whole in regard to the middle school proposal and is hoping for a good representation from all areas of the school district at this informational meeting.

In other business Monday night, the board authorized investment of \$15,000 which is available for the school's debt service. Interest is to be drawn on this money until it is needed for payment of bonds and principal on July 1.

Robert H. Crawford, director of federal activities for the school, gave a report on his activities. The board directed Crawford to determine the number of students in need of remedial reading or mathematics in grades one through six.

During 1970-71, the school's remedial reading program was moved to the elementary level and is now in operation in Tawas City. This was brought about through discussions between teachers, administrators and parents, who believed that a concentrated effort to improve reading and mathematics skills should be placed at the elementary level before problems become too deeply rooted. It was stated that such problems were much more difficult to remedy when a student reaches the junior high level.

Crawford stated that the whole concept of federal aid to education and the role of the federal projects coordinator has changed since its beginning with passage of the elementary and secondary education act of 1965. "Each year," said Crawford, "the legislature and the United States Office of Education has made more and stiffer requirements for obtaining funds. As a result, more time must be spent on the job because of the large volume of paper work involved."

Next meeting of the board of education is March 8. The regular meeting on the fourth Monday of the month was moved up one week during February because of a conflict with other meetings.

## City Council Endorses DNR Fishing Plan

With a final hearing on Saginaw Bay sport and commercial fishing set for February 20, Tawas City Council Monday night reaffirmed its support of the Michigan Department of Natural Resources' zone management plan.

Stated the council: "By unanimous resolution of the city council, we wish to reaffirm our vigorous support for the zone management plan of the DNR for Saginaw Bay; and, also, we ask for the elimination of gill nets in these waters."

The above resolution is to be sent to the Pigeon Conservation Club, which is hosting the February 20 hearing starting at 2:00 p. m. Neil A. Libka, former Tawas City resident, is secretary of the club.

The council was one of three local organizations which went on record nearly a year ago endorsing recommendations of DNR biologists, who had urged strict control of gill net fishing on Saginaw Bay.

Prior to adoption of a similar resolution in October, the city council heard a DNR biologist say that in order to bring back perch in Lake Huron waters, it would be necessary to further restrict the commercial catch in Saginaw Bay.

The DNR fish biologist stated at that time that Saginaw Bay's spawning grounds actually controlled the perch population of Lake Huron and that further controls were necessary in order that perch make a comeback.

## City Park Grant Goes to Legislature

The Michigan Department of Natural Resources has recommended that Tawas City's city park development be funded by the state legislature under the recreational bond fund program.

Raymond D. Schofield, grants in aid supervisor, said in a letter February 9 that he had recommended that the legislature make \$6,932 available to help finance the project.

If approved by the legislature, the state will reimburse the city, when recreational bond funds are available, for an 80 percent share of the project's cost, up to a maximum of \$6,932.

"As soon as the legislature approves the projects on the list we submitted to them on January 29, you will be notified and can then negotiate a project agreement," Schofield said in a letter to the city.

The above project is for purchase of playground equipment for the newly-acquired expansion areas at the west end of the park. Members of the park board are considering the purchase of the large concrete animals manufactured by Gordon Clute.

## Release Supply of Corn for Deer Herd

Michigan Department of Natural Resources has released a supply of surplus corn to the Iosco area for use as deer feed.

Arrangements have been made with the Iosco Sheriff's Department to distribute applications at the county jail.

Many calls have been received during past weeks at the Mio headquarters of the DNR concerning feed for the deer herd.

Heavy snow conditions and cold weather has caused considerable concern that the wintering deer herd might have severe starvation losses unless there is additional supplemental feeding.

A DNR spokesman said that persons making applications should compute the corn need by allowing a daily ration of one pound of corn per day for each deer for 40 days. This would mean that a person feeding 100 deer would require 75 bushels of corn for the 40 days.

## Bloodmobile in February 22 Visit

The American Red Cross bloodmobile will be at the East Tawas Community Building Monday, February 22, from 1:00 to 7:00 p. m. It will move to the Oscoda Township Hall Tuesday, February 23, and will be open from 12 o'clock noon until 6:00 p. m.

All eligible persons are urged to donate to this worthy cause. An individual between the ages of 18 and 21 must have a signed permission slip from parent or guardian in order that he be allowed to donate. Persons over the age of 65 are ineligible.

## Taylor Men Face Iosco B&E Charge

Gerald D. Woods, 21, and Timothy C. Apel, 23, both of Taylor, are charged with breaking and entering two cabins in Wilber Township. Released on \$500 bond, they are to be arraigned February 22 in district court.

The two men turned themselves in at the East Tawas Post, Michigan State Police, following investigation by the Taylor Police Department.

Iosco Sheriff's Department said the two men became suspects following discovery of the break-ins. Their license number was noted by a private party who had given chase.

The men took officers to an area between M-55 and Miner's Grove where they allegedly disposed of loot along the roadside.

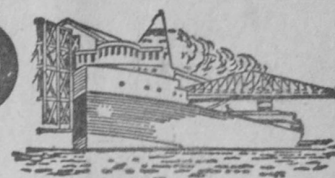
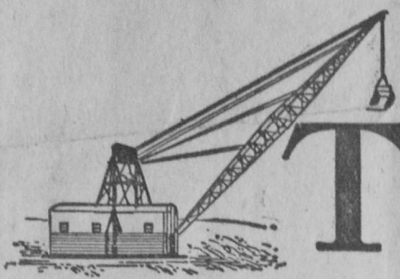

## Week-End Program Starts Friday Night

A northeast wind over the week-end took out much of the ice in Tawas Bay, but apparently not enough to curtail activities during the sixth annual Perchville USA program scheduled February 19-21.

Such a break-up usually is the signal for good catches of perch on Tawas Bay, but fishing has not improved in recent days. Chamber of commerce officials are hoping that a little sunlight on the open water of Tawas Bay will improve fishing conditions for the festival this week-end.

Organized snowmobile activities, ice fishing, skydiving, demolition derby, motorcycle races on the ice, polar bear swim, day and night fireworks, an amateur hour for all ages, helicopter rides and many more events feature this year's festival.

The program starts at 6:30 p. m. Friday, February 19, with a stag fish fry at Lixey's Restaurant, East Tawas. Chuck "Muddy" Waters of Channel Five, Bay City, is again to be crowned Perchville king.

At the same time, a get-together for women is to be held at Tawas Golf and Country Club starting at 6:30 p. m. A teen dance is scheduled at 8:00 p. m. at the East Tawas Community Building.

Activities Saturday start with a 10:00 a. m. flag raising at the Michigan Waterways Commission Dock. A snowmobile parade, starting at Mathews Street in Tawas City and ending at the East Tawas dock, is scheduled for 10:30 a. m., followed by daytime fireworks at 11:00 a. m. Jim Vallender and his aero circus is

to be featured in a skydiving exhibition at 12 o'clock noon.

Afternoon festivities start with an amateur hour, 12:30 o'clock, in a heated shell on the dock. Sponsored by the East Tawas Lions Club, more than \$200 in prizes will be offered to participants.

Motorcycle races on the ice, sponsored by Dirt, Incorporated, and the chamber of commerce, start at 12:30 p. m., followed by skydiving at 2:00 p. m. There will be a scuba diving exhibition under the ice at 2:30 p. m. Richard Brooks of East Tawas, 19-70 polar bear king, will be featured at 3:00 p. m. A polar bear swimming pond is to be cut in the ice near the dock. Brooks extends an invitation to other potential polar bears to join him for a swim.

Skydiving will complete the afternoon's program at 4 o'clock.

A Perchville banquet and queen coronation will be held starting at 6:30 p. m. at the Holland Hotel. Reigning over this year's festival will be Barbara Hintz, 17, a senior at Tawas Area High School. She was selected last week from a field of 15 candidates at the high school.

Two finalists from the amateur

hour will perform for selection of a winner.

Fireworks and a snowmobile safari sponsored by the Iosco Snowdrifters will complete the evening.

Throughout the day, events such as tug of war, ice spudding, hole-in-one contest, helicopter rides, sleigh rides and children's activities will be featured on the ice.

Sunday's program will include family snowmobile races at 12 o'clock noon with registration at the dock.

Bob Carter, the flying cowboy, will present his aerobatic air show starting at 1:00 p. m. There will be a polar bear swim at 2:00 p. m. and demolition derby at 3:00 p. m.

There will be a grand prize drawing at 4:00 p. m. for a chalet ice shanty.

## May Seek Professional Help

### Planning Group to Study Federal Aid for Projects

Investigation into procedures for making application for federal funds to assist with municipal water and sewer expansion has been turned over to the Tawas City Planning Commission for study and recommendation.

During discussion at Monday night's meeting of the city council, Delano Myles, a member of the planning commission, told the council that the city was probably "missing the boat" by not taking advantage of available federal funds.

Myles stressed the need for professional help in making such applications and the planning commission is to investigate the possibility of hiring a consultant.

The city is currently studying the possible financing of a proposed \$180,000 water system improvement project as well as a \$175,000 addition to waste treatment facilities.

In other matters, Myles, who serves on the park board, said that the Michigan Department of Natural Resources had recommended to the legislature that \$6,932 in recreational bond funds be made available to the city for park development.

Myles said that Tawas City's project was included in a package presented by the DNR. If one project is approved, all would be approved.

The park board member said that another phase of the state program would soon commence and that \$369,624 would be available after July 1. The park board is to start work on additional expansion plans for possible consideration in this new program.

Minutes of the East Tawas-Tawas City joint water board meeting of February 9 indicated that Gordon Huck had been re-elected chairman and that Howard Hatton had been retained as secretary for the new year.

A lengthy discussion was held on construction of a new water line

from the filtration plant at East Tawas to the city limit of Tawas City. Because of the need for an adequate volume of water, plans being considered by Tawas City call for construction of a 12-inch main to hook up with East Tawas.

Attorneys for the two cities are to study a water contract between the two communities to determine responsibility for constructing a new water main from the filtration plant to hook up with Tawas City's proposed new main at the city limit.

Another meeting of the joint water board is to be held as soon as opinions are received from the attorneys. Besides the two above named officers, members of the board are Paul Ropert and Joseph Hennigar of East Tawas, James Dillon and Carl Schaar of Tawas City.

Cecil Cable, Third Ward alderman, was appointed to act on the board of review in place of the mayor and mayor pro-tem, who are unable to attend meetings scheduled for March 2, 3 and 4.

## Supervisor Asks Clarification of State's Trailer Park Fee

Clarification of state law in regard to local fees charged for mobile homes in a state licensed mobile home park is to be sought from the county prosecuting attorney by the Tawas City Council.

At Monday night's regular meeting, Ben Brewer, First Ward supervisor, told councilmen that he was of the opinion that the number of trailers being assessed a monthly fee in the Tawas River Trailer Park was too low.

According to Brewer, a \$3 monthly fee is to be charged against each trailer under state law in lieu of paying a real estate tax. Those trailers

which have wheels removed can be assessed as real estate, he stated. Brewer said the law needed clarification as well as determination by the council as to who would be responsible for making a periodic inspection.

Brewer said that his recent inspection indicated that there were 125 trailers in the park, of which 30 or 40 were in storage and not subject to any fee. He said that a large portion of the remaining trailers had water and sewer available, were occupied at various times and could be subject to a monthly fee.

The First Ward supervisor said he counted 11 lighted trailers when he

made his recent inspection and that fees were being paid on seven trailers.

Because of the fact that \$2 of the total fee charged by the city goes to the school and the remaining \$1 is split between the city and the county, the council believed that the county prosecuting attorney should be asked for clarification.

Members of the council said that this question had arisen in the past and a ruling had been that only occupied trailers were subject to the monthly fee. Members were of the opinion that the matter should be again clarified.

## Set Hearing on Vacating Alley

A public hearing on vacation of an alley and changes in the zoning ordinance is to be held Monday, April 19, according to action taken at Monday night's meeting of the East Tawas Council.

It is proposed that a five-foot alley in the Peter Geller Subdivision, Tawas Lake, be vacated. Five changes are to be considered in the zoning ordinance, dealing mainly with setback lines for dwellings.

Authorization was given to use city-owned property known as the old fairgrounds as the site for a 4-H Club horse show on June 26.

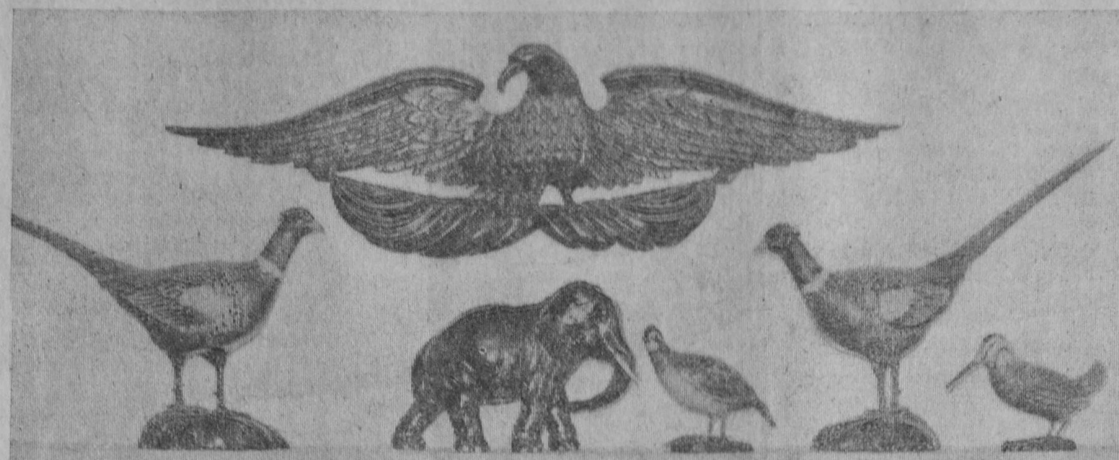
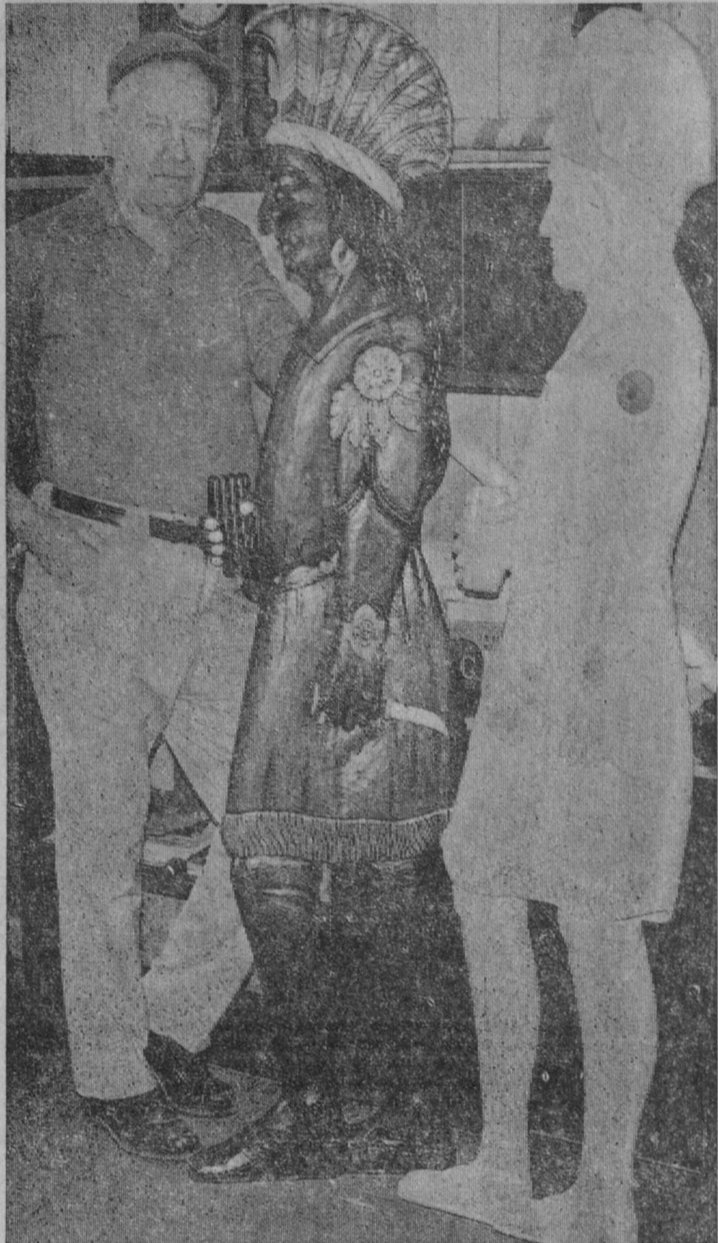
Mrs. Tift was born in Grant Township April 12, 1890.

## wood carver

Practicing the "lost" art of wood carving as a hobby, a craft in which he spent 43 years as a professional, is Carl Owen, 65, Reno Township. A former resident of Grand Rapids, Owen and his wife retired three years ago to their home on M-65, just north of the M-55 intersection. Owen recalls that he started his four-year apprenticeship as a wood carver at a salary of 25 cents an hour. The shop in which he worked during the 1920s had as many as 35 carvers, but there are probably fewer than 20 professionals today in the entire state. The shop at the "furniture city" specialized in handcrafting panels, mouldings and symbols for churches, as well as architectural adornments and furniture. Today, Owen specializes in carving life-like birds, animals and religious figures as a hobby. Working in pine, mahogany, walnut and other woods, his home display is spectacular. One of the most interesting of his carvings is a cigar store Indian. Owen hopes to display some of his work next summer at the Tawas Bay Arts and Crafts Festival.—Tawas Herald Photos.

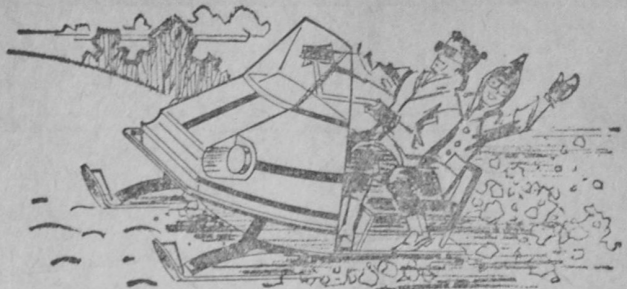

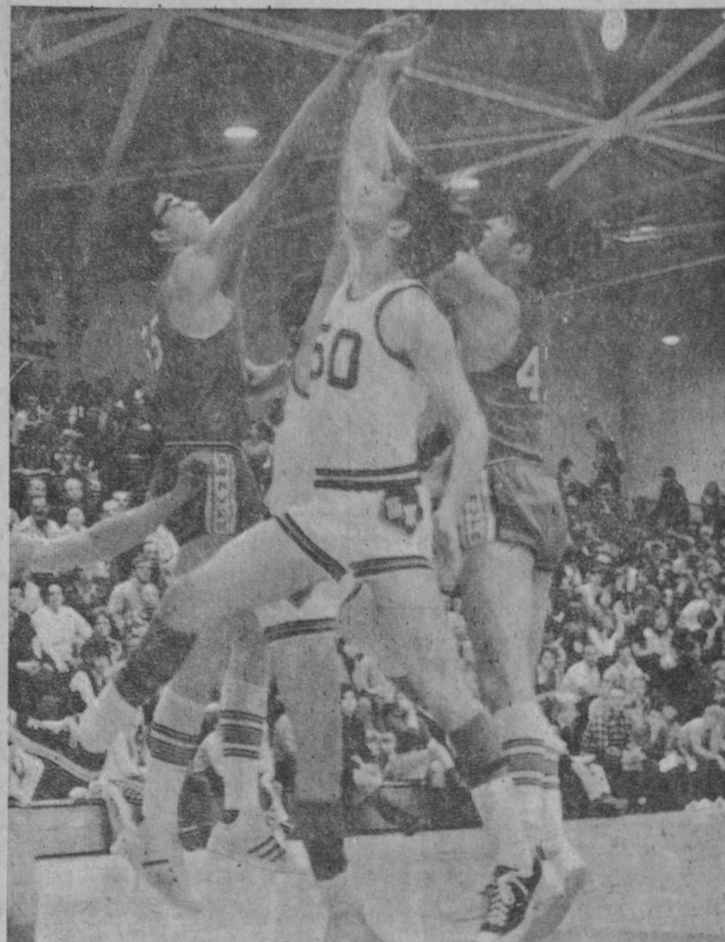

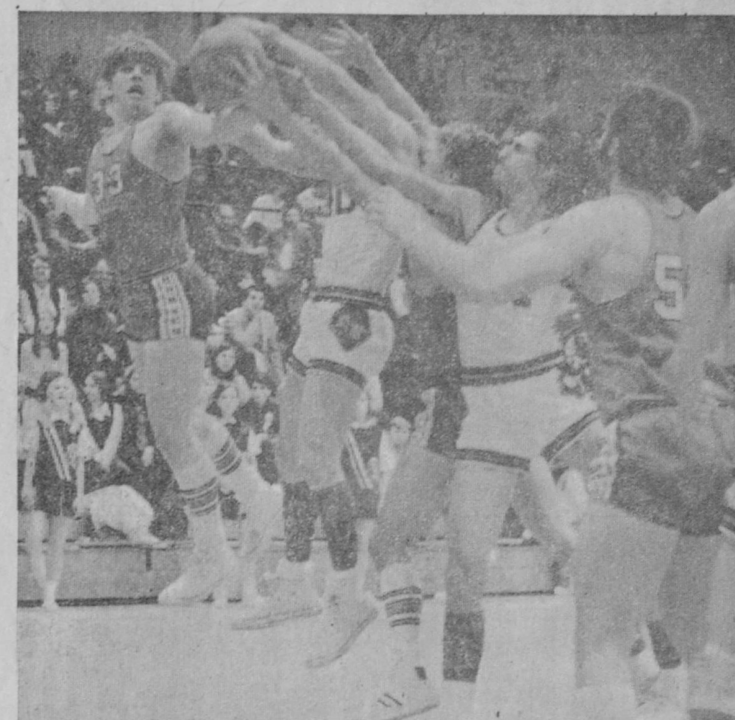

## Time Saving Tips for SS Applications

**Question:** Getting ready to retire?  
**Answer:** John J. Carr, social security manager in Bay City, has some tips that may help save time and trouble when applying for social security benefits.

A telephone call to the social security office is a good first step. The office can answer questions and tell how to apply and when to do it.

When applying, bring social security cards or records of a social security number, proof of age and last year's income tax withholding statement. (If self-employed, bring a copy of last year's income tax return and evidence of payment of the self-employment tax.)

If a wife is also applying for benefits, she should bring evidence of her age and her social security card or a record of her number if she has one.

The best evidence of age is a birth or baptismal certificate made within five years of birth. However, if these are not available, other documents may be used. Generally, the

older the document the better.

If children are under 18—or are between 18 and 22 and are full-time students—bring their birth certificates and records of their social security numbers.

It is generally a good idea to apply about three months before retirement. Individuals should not delay because they do not have any of the required documents or information. The people in the social security office will be glad to help get the necessary information.

Individuals who are housebound and unable to come to the office can make arrangements for taking applications by mail or, if necessary, someone can come to their home. Just let the social security office know.

"Remember," Mr. Carr concluded, "the people in the social security office are there to help you."

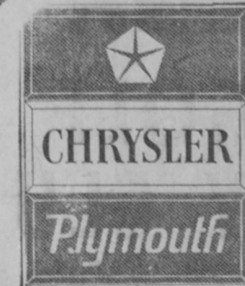

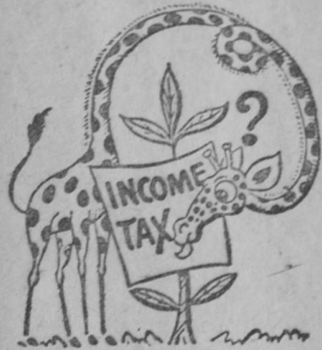

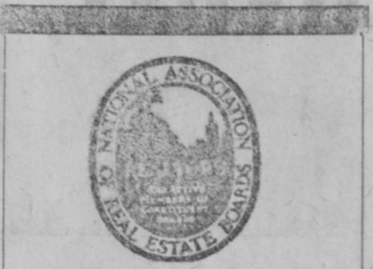
