

## Charles Nash. Storm Hero. Died at 85

Charles Nash Sr. of East Tawas, a former member of the United States Coast Guard, died Monday evening, February 1. He suffered a heart attack during a family gathering in honor of his 85th birthday.

Funeral services are to be held Thursday, February 4, 2:00 p. m., at Moffatt Funeral Home, East Tawas, with the Rev. William Graf officiating. Burial will be in Memory Garden Cemetery, Tawas City.

Mr. Nash was born February 2, 1886, at Port Austin. He was married to the former Mabel Lloyd in 1902.

She passed away in 1942. Mr. Nash joined the coast guard in 1909, then known as the United States Life Saving Service, and re-

mained in that service until 1925.

Nash was stationed at the Pointe Aux Barques life saving station on the tip of Michigan's Thumb during the storm of 1913, called one of the most savage ever recorded on the inland waters of the United States and Canada. He was a member of a nine-man crew which received medals from the United States government for rescuing the crews of two

sinking lake carriers.
The Nashes resided on Mathews Street in Tawas City for a number of years and he operated an engine repair service. He was a retired employee of the City of East Tawas.

Mr. Nash was the last of 11 children and leaves only nieces and nephews.
