Barry McGuire to Huddle With Vice President Agnew

In response to a personal request by Vice President Agnew, representatives of the Michigan Association of

Counties will meet with him at Indianapolis, Indiana, on February 5, to discuss revenue sharing as proposed by President Nixon.

John H. Brewer, association president, Kent County, and A. Barry McGuire, executive director, were invited by the vice president in a telegram in which he noted "The president's proposal for revenue sharing will have historic implications for the counties of this nation."

McGuire, a native of Tawas City, said that after returning from the meeting he will make every effort to meet with all of Michigan's counties to explain the proposal, its ramifications and how local government should work to obtain its passage.

In addition, McGuire said that he and other representatives of county government in Michigan will attend the public hearings on the proposal that Wilbur Mills, chairman of the house ways and means committee, has indicated he will hold.

"Revenue sharing, while not a panacea, is a must for hard pressed units of local government in order that they meet the demands for services asked by their citizens. Contrary to some critics, revenue sharing will not cause an increase in taxes, but rather will allow those units of local government which have demonstrated their efficiency and ef-

fectiveness in grass roots administration of needed programs to perform them without the additional costs of federal bureaucracy," said McGuire.

"We expect that Michigan's counties will work in an all out effort to obtain revenue sharing and we hope that the Michigan congressional delegation will respond by offering support," concluded McGuire.

Seek Surplus Corn as Feed for Deer Herd

Area sportsmen, farmers and land owners are urging the Michigan Department of Natural Resources to release supplies of federal surplus corn for feeding the wintering deer herd.

Winter is just past the half way mark, as far as the deer herd is concerned, and scarcity of feed will soon be felt.

Extremely low temperatures and deep snow in the wooded areas are contributing to the generally weak condition of the herd.

Council Calls Meeting With Water Board

Table Water Plan for More Discussion

Action on a proposed \$118,000 addition to Tawas City's water storage and distribution system was tabled Monday night by the city council until a joint meeting is held with the water board on April 5.

Members of the council were of the opinion that discussion should be held with the water board and city engineer to clear up a number of questions concerning the proposal.

At its monthly meeting January 25, the water board recommended adoption of an engineering survey calling for construction of a 500,000 gallon underground water storage tank, along with a pumping station and additions to the water distribution system.

Developed by Spicer Engineering of Saginaw, the proposal is designed to correct the water shortage problem during peak periods of usage during summer months.

Since 1957, Tawas City has purchased water under contract from East Tawas' filtration plant. Because of the difference in water tank overflow elevations between the two cities and lack of adequate water main capacity in both distribution systems, it is necessary to pump the water supply to Tawas City.

At the present time, the water system serves 528 residential and 127 commercial users. Because of the inability to obtain more than 275 gal-

lons of water per minute through the six-inch East Tawas supply main when the water demand exceeds the supply available, it is necessary to supplement Tawas City's supply with well water.

As a means of correcting this situation, the plan developed by Spicer and recommended by the water board calls for construction of a 500,000-gallon underground storage tank and pumping station behind the Tawas City baseball diamond. The new storage facility would provide more than a day's water supply to Tawas City.

Tawas City presently uses an average of 237,670 gallons of water per day, with the maximum day use of 356,000 gallons per day during the summer months.

In addition to the storage tank and pumping station, the plan would include improvements to the present water supply connection with East Tawas and additions to the water distribution system.

The program recommended by the survey calls for future construction of a 12-inch gravity connection to East Tawas in 1979-80 and provides an additional 200,000-gallon elevated storage tank at the city garage by 1990.

At Monday night's meeting, members of the council questioned if the underground storage was only a stop-

gap measure to correct the temporary water shortage during the summer months. Councilmen wondered if the underground storage would fill a purpose once a 12-inch main is constructed in East Tawas and connected with Tawas City's proposed future 12-inch supply main. Spicer is engineer for both cities

and members of the council are interested in learning what progress has been made on engineering for a 12-inch supply main from East Tawas' filtration plant to the proposed connection in Tawas City. This question is to be asked later this month at a meeting of the joint water board.

Several councilmen expressed the opinion that it might be well to hire a second engineering firm to check the feasibility of such a program.

Financing the proposed first step in the water system improvement project would be through the sale of revenue bonds at an estimated \$180,000. Receiving a federal grant to aid fi-

ancing is dependent upon meeting qualifications established by Farmers Home Administration and the availability of government funds.

If no federal aid is received, the program would be financed through a 54 percent increase in water rates. If the city should receive a 50 percent federal grant, there would be a 12 percent increase in water rates.

Isco Receives \$11,600 Grant for New Sewer Needs Survey

Another step toward formulation of a county-wide master plan was taken last week with receipt of an \$11,600 federal grant for a water and sewer survey of this county.

Presenting the check to W. C. Roach, chairman of the county planning commission, was Albert LaPorte of Standish, who heads up the Farmers Home Administration for Michigan.

Roach said that Environetic Research, Chicago, Illinois, had been contracted to prepare this study, expected to be completed in three to four months.

The county planning chairman said that Isco had saved about \$3,500 by having the Chicago firm prepare the survey. This was the same organization which recently prepared a solid waste disposal survey for this county and financed locally by a \$2,600 allocation from the county board of commissioners.

Roach said that the new survey would serve water and sewer needs of this county for the next 40 years. The county is expected to have its comprehensive plan completed within the next three to four years.

Renew Lease on Park Concession

A five-year option to renew a lease on the concession building at the Tawas City Park was approved January 25 by the city park board and preparation of a new lease with Roy Soncrant has been authorized.

The five-year option calls for payment of \$1,500 annually for leasing the concession building.

'Finds' Trap

Deputy Sheriff Robert Felske was dispatched one day last week to investigate a complaint that two men were "suspiciously" digging into a snow bank along Wilson Creek Road southwest of Whittemore. Felske did not find the men, but he learned what they had been doing—trapping fox. During his investigation, Felske accidentally stepped into a trap.

Federal Lamprey Control

Council Urges Reinstatement of Program

A resolution adopted Monday night by the Tawas City Council urged Michigan's representatives in congress to support reinstatement of the lamprey control program on the Great Lakes.

The council had received information that the federal government has reduced its allocation for lamprey control. City councilmen believed that such control was important to the rehabilitation of Lake Huron and the remainder of the Great Lakes.

In other business Monday night, the council authorized Mayor John St. James to attend a Michigan legislative session at Lansing on February 24-25.

Delano Myles, park board chairman, announced that he would make a progress report at the council's next meeting on the status of this city's application for a state grant to improve the city park.

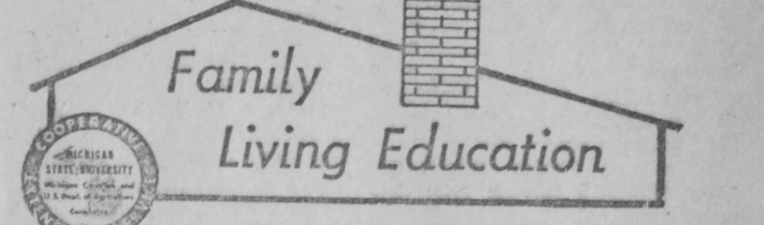

"Learn In" Clothes To Sew

Remember when the mark of being really grown up was being able to get dressed all by yourself? One of the major pattern companies remembers and introduces playclothes for toddlers that make learning fun. Concepts like left and right, up and down, and telling time can be part of a special dress and jumpsuit. Specially designed patterns and fabrics make it easy for the preschooler to connect words and drawings. Special fabric finishes mean easy care.

Bright appliques on the clothes teach how to button, tie bows and lace. Little ones can also learn to recognize signs, shapes and colors, like stop and go, red and green. The shape of each button-on design is embroidered on the garment. Your toddler can practice matching squares, circles and triangles and buttoning them in place.

The patterns are time-saving and easy to sew. There are no collars, sleeves or darts. All waistbands are elasticized. These same features make it easy for your youngster to dress himself.

When you are sewing for your toddler, pay special attention to your machine's thread tension. Seams will

have to bear the strain of all that preschool running, jumping, stretching and giggling. If your machine has a stretch, this may be good for fabrics such as stretch denim, stretch terry and knits. Otherwise, use a fairly small stitch and polyester thread to strengthen seams.

Closures should be simple and in front, where the child can reach them. Snaps should be large enough to fit together easily. Buttons should be large and fit into the buttonhole without tugging. Zippers might match or vividly contrast. Consider invisible zipper closings; your toddler will be fascinated with a zipper that disappears. If your child has trouble grasping the zipper pull tab, attach a large decorative pull of ribbon, yarn or rickrack.

Special fabrics, called education prints, are now available with words and pictures designed to teach little ones. They feature simple designs in bright colors on a permanent-press fabric. Whether or not you choose this particular type of fabric, make sure that all the sewing notions are compatible with the fabric. For permanent press fabrics, this means being washable and colorfast. You might consider the new polyester trims.

One final note about toddlers' clothing. Are you aware of the pending legislation which will require all children's clothes, size 6X and under, to be treated with a flame-retardant finish? Fabrics sold by the yard that are particularly suitable for this young group will also be treated with a flame-retardant finish and will be labeled as such.

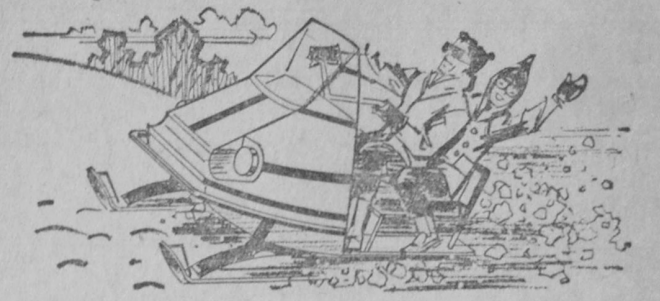

Snowmobiles Help State's Economy

The fast-growing sport of snowmobiling is expected to pump more than \$2-million dollars into the state's economy this year, according to the Michigan Department of Commerce.

"Snowmobiling is making a substantial contribution to the over-all economy of Michigan," said Richard E. Whitmer, the department director. "But more importantly, it is putting a new economic premium on the vast snow-covered reaches of the north, which have long been out of the economic mainstream."

The snowmobilers will spend an estimated \$6-million dollars for new machines this winter and an additional \$6-million dollars in related costs.

Those costs include 4.9-million dollars for equipment and clothing, 2.6-million dollars for repairs and maintenance, 4.8-million dollars for food and lodging, 6.8-million dollars for fuel and other supplies and 6.9-million dollars on the autos used to haul the machines.

These estimates are included in a survey conducted by the West Tourist Association and financed by the Upper Great Lakes Regional Commission, a federal-state agency devoted to spurring economic develop-

ment in 119 counties in Northern Michigan, Wisconsin and Minnesota.

According to the survey, snowmobiling is typically a family activity and about one-third of the owners have at least two vehicles.

Statistically, the average snowmobile owner is 42 years old and the father of two. More than likely, he is a craftsman, foreman, manager or proprietor of a business with an annual income of \$10,500.

He also likes to get away from it all. About one-half of the snowmobile operators said they intend to take at least one overnight trip on their machine. And some said they plan as many as six such trips.

The snowmobile in Michigan is used almost exclusively for recreational purposes, including racing. Only three percent of the owners reported using their machines for "required transportation."

At last count, there were more snowmobiles registered in Michigan than in any other state. The secretary of state's office registered nearly 150,000 snowmobiles in fiscal 1969-70 and collected more than \$274,000 in fees. In addition, the state has realized nearly four-million dollars in sales taxes on snowmobiles since 1965.

Bishop Reh Spoke to Diocese Via Recording

The Most Rev. Francis F. Reh, bishop of the Roman Catholic Diocese of Saginaw, spoke last week-end via recording in all churches under his jurisdiction. The tape was played at the Sunday Masses on January 30-31.

The subject of Bishop Reh's message to the Catholics of the 16-county area comprising the Diocese of Saginaw concerned norms for the first reception of the Sacraments of the Eucharist and Penance, which were published December 15.

The decree called for the formal program of preparation for the reception of the Eucharist to take place during the second grade of school and that the reception of the Sacrament of Penance be conducted in the fourth grade. The former practice of first confession preceding first communion is thus changed. Both programs include parental participation.

Bishop Reh introduced the decree by stating that the studies in the diocese made through the Catholic School Office, the Confraternity of Christian Doctrine, the Diocesan Liturgical Commission and the Priests' Senate were enriched by the teaching of theologians, the findings of psychologists and sociologists as well as by the programs of other dioceses.

"We will bring a better awareness of the ineffable gift of Christ in these Sacraments and a more fruitful use of them, not only to our children, but also to their parents and to the faithful in general," Bishop Reh said in referring to the new program guidelines.

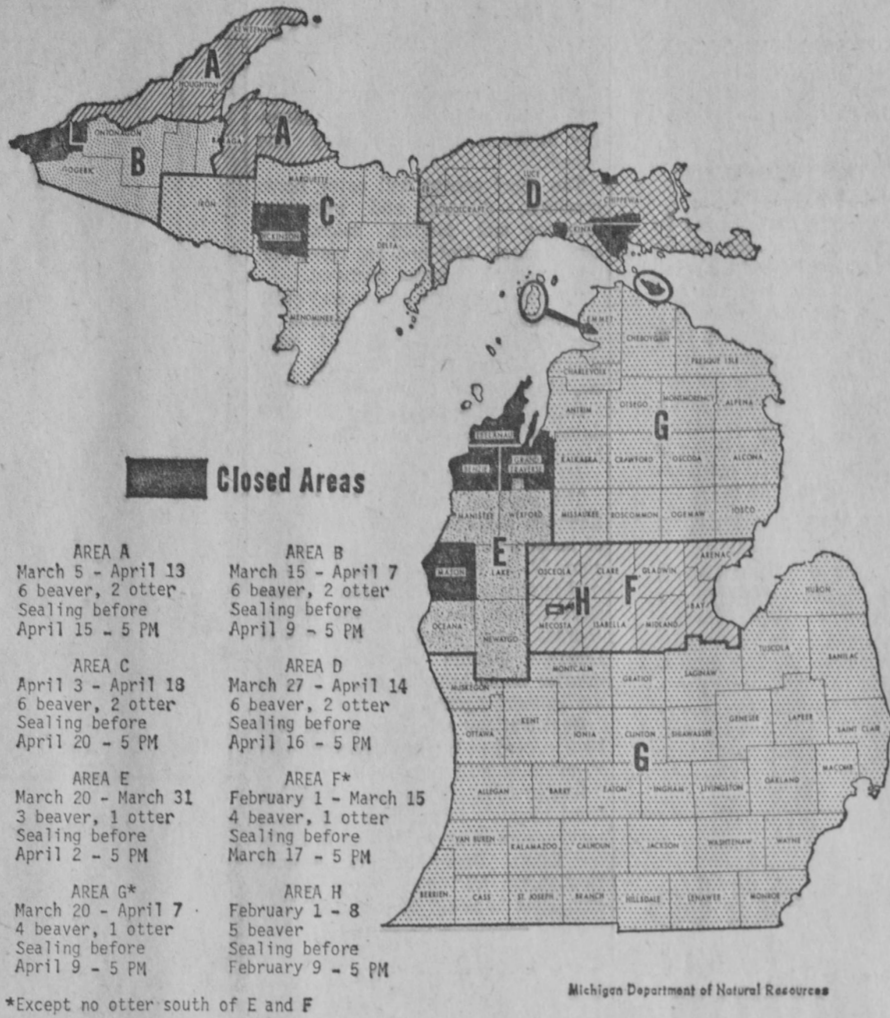

VA Answers Questions for Vets-Families

Question: Will VA deduct the premiums on my GI insurance from my monthly compensation check?

Answer: Yes, the insured may authorize the monthly deduction of premiums from compensation or pension payments. Such authorization may be made on VA Form 9-888, authorization for deduction from VA benefit payments.

Question: Are widows of World War II veterans, who died on active duty or from service-connected disabilities, still eligible for GI home loans?

Answer: Yes. Unused, expired entitlement for widows of World War II veterans, as well as for veterans themselves, was revived by recent legislation.

Question: My husband has a total and permanent disability from a service-connected injury. Can my children be recipients of VA educational assistance?

Answer: It is likely that you and your children are eligible for assistance to wives and children of deceased or totally and permanently disabled veterans. Apply to the nearest VA office.

Question: I am eligible for training under the VA vocational rehabilitation program. Is it possible for me to take part-time training under the program?

Answer: Yes. This has been possible since July 26, 1968.

Treatment Could Prevent Active TB

"Persons who had tuberculosis and were treated before the drug, isoniazid, was used run the risk of developing active tuberculosis again, unless they take a course of preven-

tive treatment now," said J. Irvin Nichols, executive director of the Michigan Tuberculosis and Respiratory Disease Association, the state Christmas Seal agency.

Last year in Michigan, there were 2,006 new tuberculosis cases reported. Among these were many former tuberculosis patients. The return of an ex-tuberculosis patient to the hospital with active tuberculosis is a tragedy, for recurrence of the disease can be prevented. These former tuberculosis patients are in a "high-risk" category and, as such, are a number one priority for being placed on preventive drug treatment. "This treatment," he said, "consists of taking an inexpensive medication over a determined period of time."

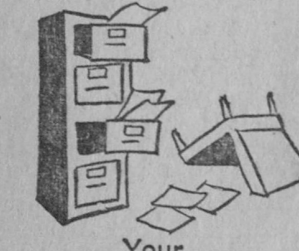
"Today in Michigan," Nichols continued, "over 20,000 persons are on a program of preventive treatment, and many thousands more should be on such a program."

In addition to the former tuberculosis patients, Nichols urged all persons who had a positive reaction to a tuberculosis skin test or those who have been in close contact with a positive reactor or a person with active tuberculosis to see their doctor or local health department about beginning a program of preventive medication.

Nichols said that the public must realize the importance of preventive treatment as the greatest tool in the fight against tuberculosis. If all persons in the high-risk categories would allow themselves to be treated with isoniazid, the chances of controlling and eliminating the spread of tuberculosis would be greatly increased.

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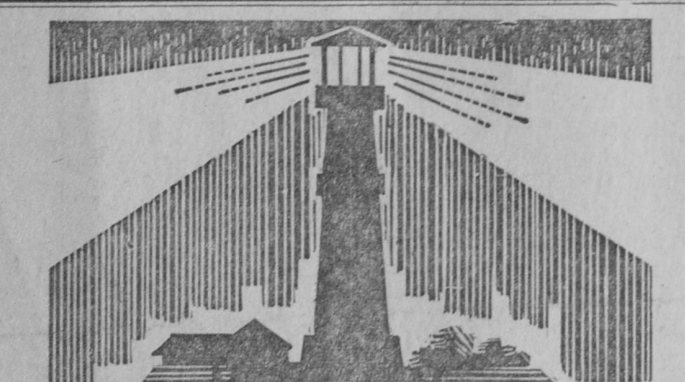

Seek Voter Approval of 6.5 Mills

West Branch-Rose City School District will ask voters Thursday, February 18, to approve a 6.5-mill tax levy for a period of three years in order to qualify the district for full state aid.

As of June 30 of this year, 10.9 mills which was assessed for the current school year expires, leaving the district with 9.5 mills which is permanently allocated by the county and 6.5 mills short of the state requirement.

The board of education has told voters that the 6.5 mills will not provide adequate financing for the school system.

OK Building Bonds for W-P Area School

Atty. Gen. Frank J. Kelley, chairman of the Municipal Finance Commission, announced January 26 that the commission approved \$100,000 of school building bonds for Whittemore-Prescott Area Schools. These bonds are unlimited tax bonds and run until 1977. The bonds are payable from general ad valorem taxes to be levied without limitation as to rate or amount."
