

service station office two explosions rocked the building. Fire began to pour out of the basement around the hoist opening and Russell herded his four customers out of the building. He then ran across the street to the city hall and turned in the fire alarm.

Shortly before starting to work on the fire, Russell had called James Lansky for advice on making repairs. Lansky and his father. John, own the station and the former decided he would come to the station and give Russell some assistance.

When Lansky arrived, flames were pouring out of the service doors and office. Lansky, who serves as Tawas City fire chief. crossed the street and drove one truck to the scene. He was soon joined by other firemen.

Despite the heavy loss to his station due to fire damage, Lansky stated that he could only be thankful that everyone in the station had escaped injury and that no one was injured fighting the blaze. His father stated he heard the first explosion and thought it was a jet plane breaking the sound barrier. After the second explosion; he rushed out of his house

It is believed that the explosions were caused when a furnace in the basement was started by the heating system's thermostat, thus igniting the gasoline fumes.

All equipment in the building, as well as tires and other supplies, were either damaged or destroyed in the blaze. A car owned by Charles Bamberger was burned extensively and there was considerable damage to John Lansky's car which was parked in the south service stall. Also damaged or destroyed were two snowmobiles, a boat and tools in the basement.







Question: My wife is 62. Can she get social security benefits if I

do not retire? Answer: If she has enough social security credit of her own to qualify as a retired worker, she can collect whether you retire or not. But she cannot get benefits based on your work record unless you are retired.

Question: My wife collects social security as my dependent. She just started working and will make more than \$1,680 this year. How will this affect our checks?

Answer: Your check will stay the same, because your benefit is only affected if you work. But your wife's benefit will be reduced according to the amount she earns.
