## City Councils Act Differently on Voting Law

For the first time in history, Tawas City and East Tawas will be holding elections on different days this year to select city officers.

This all came about through a new law adopted at the last state legislative session and signed into law by Governor Milliken.

The new law provides for odd-year biennial elections to elect city officials. Local governments had until January 21 to make a decision on the new election setup.

In Tawas City's case, the council gave its tentative approval to the odd-year election a week ago and, by not taking any action Monday night, automatically came under provisions of the odd-year election law.

East Tawas Council decided Monday night that it would not come under the new provisions this year. During discussion, councilmen indicated that the city probably would adopt the new system at some future date.

Both councils had good reasons

for their separate courses of action.

In East Tawas' case, there has been talk in recent months of revising the city's charter and indications are that there will be an election to name a charter commission at the April election.

Councilmen at East Tawas were of the opinion that the new charter commission should start its work as soon as possible and an April election to select members would be an ideal time to do so. In addition, the council felt that a charter commission would be in a better position to determine if four-year terms for councilmen and two-year terms for other elected city officials are desirable.

One of the factors which helped to convince officials of Tawas City to adopt the new law was that the state probably will utilize the odd-year election for constitutional questions and court questions. Councilmen felt that the city might as well be ready for such a move because spring and fall elections would double costs.

Economy is one of the principal reasons for changing to the odd-year election, although there have been other reasons mentioned. Election costs have soared recently due to a ruling by the state that each precinct must have its own election board in state elections. In Tawas City's case, it meant an election board for each ward.

Another reason for Tawas City's change at this time is that there probably will be greater voter participation in the August primary and November general elections. People are more accustomed to voting in the November election and those persons who leave Northeastern Michigan for warmer climates in the winter usually do not leave until after the November election.

At any rate, Tawas City's February primary election and April general election have been moved to August and November, while East Tawas will retain the traditional election days.

The change also means that Tawas City will be electing councilmen for four-year terms, while the mayor, clerk and treasurer will serve two-year terms. Council terms expiring next April are automatically extended to January 1, 1972, with successors elected in November 1971 for four-year terms. Council terms expiring in April 1972, would be extended to January 1, 1974, with successors elected in November 1973 for four-year terms.

## Economy Lag Feel First Step in Financial Pinch

Tawas City is beginning to feel a slight financial pinch from the loss of state revenues.

City Treas. Mary Byrd, in her quarterly budget report Monday night, said that indications are that the city would be short about \$1,000 on its budget for fiscal 1970-71.

This fact is not too alarming because, even with the shortage, the budget can still be balanced if there are no major unforeseen expenditures.

What is of concern to city officials, however, is the reason for the loss of revenue. There was a drop in sales tax returns to the city, which reflects the downward trend experienced by the state due to the national economic slump and the recent automotive strike.

The September sales tax payment received by the city was \$3,710, as compared to \$5,339 received a year ago.

In addition, the city expects to receive less return from state income taxes when new census figures are available in the spring. While most townships of Iosco County will benefit through increased population, Tawas City and every other city of Northeastern Michigan will receive less money from this source because of a drop in population.

In Tawas City's case, the most recent income tax check received was identical for the same period during the previous year. Mrs. Byrd said that although she was not positive on this point, the city may be required to make a rebate on past overpayment of state income tax returns.

Other revenues received by the city are at or above previous levels and the city is expected to end its financial year in good condition. An estimated \$20,000 is yet to be received.

## Program Continues on Abuse of Drugs

"We seem to be at the crossroads—we may have something moving for the education of youth, parents and teachers concerning drug abuse," stated Supt. Reynold Mick following a special meeting called Monday night by Tawas Area Board of Education.

About 50 persons attended the meeting held at the East Tawas Elementary Unit. Included were parents, students, teachers and board of education members. Members of various police agencies participated in discussion as interested citizens.

A second meeting is to be held Monday, February 1, 8:00 p. m., at the same location. A member of the medical profession is to speak on drug abuse.

Most of those attending Monday night's meeting participated in the informal round-table discussion. It was agreed that while drug usage by youths does exist in the area, the principal objective of future meetings should be concerned with curbing possible drug abuse.

Following the meeting, Mick said that education was necessary for parents as well as youth concerning drug usage problems. He believed that one of the first steps would be to have teachers gain knowledge concerning the problem in order that information might be given to students.

"I think the meeting has led to a better understanding between all those who attended and we are hoping for even greater participation at the next meeting by the various groups," said Mick.

## 'Wake Speed' Limit Proposed for Tawas River

Probable adoption of a "no wake" speed limit on the Tawas River resulted from a public hearing held last Wednesday night at the city hall. Called by the Michigan Department of Natural Resources, the meeting was attended by about 15 interested citizens.

No opposition was heard to the proposed new water craft speed regulation which had been recommended to the DNR by the Tawas City Council.

The state is to prepare a new law relative to that portion of the river located in the city. One more hearing will be held before final adoption. The new regulations could be enforced by any local law enforcement agency.

Representatives of the Iosco Sportsmen's Club were present at the meeting to learn of the possible inclusion of that portion of the river in Baldwin Township in the proposed new regulations. A DNR spokesman said that a petition would have to be initiated by the township board before preliminary steps could be taken to hold a hearing.

## Airman Killed Saturday in US-23 Crash

A 32-year-old staff sergeant from Wurtsmith Air Force Base was killed Saturday night in a crash on US-23 north of Oscoda.

Thomas J. Birley was pronounced dead at Wurtsmith Air Force Base Hospital following the crash. He had been stationed at Wurtsmith since 1969 and was in the organizational maintenance squadron.

Investigating sheriff's department officers said they were investigating a two-car crash involving vehicles driven by Robert E. Bergen, 21, Oscoda, and Barry B. Cheshire, 22, Wurtsmith.

Birley, headed north on US-23, came along and swerved to the right side of the road to avoid colliding with one of the other cars on the highway.

Birley apparently lost control of his vehicle and traveled 360 feet before hitting a tree.

The sergeant's death was the first auto fatality in Iosco County during 1971. Last year, the county registered 13 fatalities.

## Fire Truck Replacement Under Study by Tawas City

Replacement of a fire truck will be considered at the next meeting of the Tawas City Council. Preliminary discussion on this matter has been held in recent months and was again brought before the council at its meeting Monday night.

Under a 1961 contract, Tawas City furnishes fire protection to Tawas and Alabaster Townships. Under this agreement, renewable every year, the fire department's budget is financed under a formula based on the number of fire calls and valuation of the three units.

Last year, Tawas City's share of the \$8,270 budget was \$3,867.88,

or 46.77 percent of the total. Tawas Township's share was \$2,626.55, or 31.76 percent and Alabaster paid \$1,775, or 21.47 percent.

Included in the budget is an item of \$2,020 for payment on a fire truck. Final payment on the 1961 fire truck was made last year.

Now under consideration is replacing the old tank truck, which was converted to this use in 1961. This truck is now more than 30 years old.

One plan discussed has been to retire this old unit and purchase a new one at an estimated cost of \$25,000. A unit purchased in 1949 by Tawas Township and turned

## Iosco Circuit Court Active

A stipulation and order of dismissal was entered January 12 in Iosco Circuit Court on a suit brought by Gwendolyn I. Starling vs. the Detroit and Mackinac Railway Company.

Judge Allan C. Miller dismissed the case with prejudice, but without cost to any party.

Preliminary had been held December 14 and the case had been set for trial on March 23. The case involved damages asked by Mrs. Starling concerning a fall at the railroad's general office in Tawas City on June 4, 1965.

In other court matters, attorneys for Marie V. Reed and Hale Tavern filed their answer concerning a lawsuit brought by Ann Noble Peola which asks \$30,000 damages against the defendants, individually and severally.

The plaintiff claims that the defendants sold intoxicating liquor to Steve Peola, thereby making him incompetent to drive and control an automobile. Peola drove off the highway, struck some trees, demolished his automobile and was injured on December 18, 1968.

Judge Miller appointed Douglas A. Pugh of Alpena as attorney to represent Alvin Jack Reed on his motion for a new trial.

Reed was convicted of manslaughter, having been charged with first degree murder, and sentenced September 3, 1969, to a term of 12 to 15 years in prison. The case involved a shooting at Whittemore.

Reed claims that certain evidence entered into the trial was obtained through illegal search and seizure and renders the conviction as invalid.

The trial was to have been held January 18, but has been delayed.

## Financial Aid to IDC Under Study by East Tawas

Possible financial assistance to the Tawas Area Industrial Development Corporation is again to be studied by the City of East Tawas.

At Monday night's council meeting, Mayor James Campbell said that notes signed by individuals for the IDC would be due in April, along with interest on a \$110,000 mortgage for construction of a building at the industrial park near the county airport.

Campbell said that the IDC had expended an additional \$7,700 on the building and it would need operational money for the year. He said the IDC was now receiving \$1,450 monthly rent on the building and had received \$20,625 as a down payment on purchase of the building.

City officials are to contact townships of Alabaster, Tawas, Baldwin and Wilber to determine if they would again be agreeable to join East Tawas in furnishing operational money for the IDC.

In other business, the council reported that it was studying removal of the drying bed at the old disposal plant for parking purposes. Such a move had been requested by Leonard Calabrese, a nearby restaurant owner, who said that the property would provide valuable parking facilities along US-23.

Alderman R. E. McEltheron was appointed as the council's legislative contact with the Michigan Municipal League.

The council authorized an expenditure of \$850 for annual replacement of hose for the fire department.

## Iosco Commission to Pick Chairman

Reorganization of Iosco County Board of Commissioners is to be held today (Wednesday) during the regular January meeting.

A successor is to be named for the chairman's post which has been held for the past two years by Fred B. Lomas of East Tawas.

Four commissioners are reportedly interested in filling this position, which has a two-year limitation under board rules.

In addition to reorganization, the board will hear annual reports from the various departments of the county.

## DNR Biologist Reports on Tawas-Saginaw Bay Perch

The perch population in Saginaw and Tawas Bays has been so depressed by commercial over exploitation that it will either virtually disappear or stocks will decrease noticeably in the next few years.

That is the conclusion Michigan Department of Natural Resources fish biologists came to after studying the latest perch population survey findings from the bay. The material, compiled from last year's survey, confirms the trend that biologists have been watching for several years, according to regional Great Lakes biologist, Jerry Manz.

The survey annually compiles information on the number of perch in each age class, the rate

of growth and the commercial catch.

During 1970, Manz explains, commercial gill netters caught 60 percent fewer perch in Saginaw Bay for each foot of net set. The catch per unit effort (feet of net and time nets were in the water) dropped 20 percent for trap nets.

This means, Manz explains, that to harvest a profitable number of perch, fishermen had to increase the amount of nets they used.

However, he added, "Fishermen were willing to make every effort they could during 1970 because the price of uncleaned perch rose to 35 cents a pound, compared to a more normal price of 10 cents."

Another indication that the perch population has plunged to a historic low is the fact that they are growing nearly three times as fast as normal. The growth rate of any species of fish speeds up when the numbers are so low that there is little competition for food and space, Manz explained.

Though fishermen may consider this an advantage, Manz pointed out that accelerated, unnatural growth puts extreme stress on the perch, resulting in a short life.

Only one strong year class of perch, 1969, remains in Saginaw Bay, Manz said. If commercial fishermen over harvest the perch hatched in 1969 and there is not another good hatch this year, the last hope for a sports fishery may be wiped out.

Some of the principal provisions of this new ordinance include regulating operation on city streets, regulating hours of operation, licensing of drivers and special rules concerning traffic.

Rather than prohibit operation on city streets, the ordinance allows operation on all streets except US-23 and on M-55 from US-23 west to Fifth Avenue.

The operator, who must have a state driver's license, is required to come to a complete stop at all intersections, travel as close to the right edge of the plowed area of the street as practical, obey all traffic signals, yield the right-of-way to all vehicular traffic and pedestrians, travel in single file when two or more snowmobiles are together.

The ordinance also provides that a snowmobile may not be operated at a speed greater than is reasonable and proper having due regard for conditions then existing and in no event in excess of 10 miles per hour.

Snowmobiles operated within the city are presumed to be operated with the consent of the owner and such owner may be held liable for damages arising out of negligent or improper operation. Where the snowmobile is operated on private property without the consent of the property owner, the snowmobile owner may be held liable for three times the amount of damages to trees, shrubs, landscaping or personal property.

Snowmobiles may not be operated on sidewalks, in the cemetery or established public parks, within one block of any hospital or between the hours of 10:00 p. m. and 6:00 a. m.

The complete ordinance was printed in the January 6 issue of this newspaper and operators are urged to review provisions of the ordinance.

# ASC Chief Explains Fed. Farm Subsidies

The passage of the new farm bill has prompted many newspapers and magazines to again talk about the farm subsidy or give-away program. Grant Bessey, chairman of the Iosco Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee, says passage of the new farm bill brings up the question of what is a subsidy. A subsidy is a government grant to private enterprise, considered to be of benefit to the public.

Recent newspaper publicity told, in bold headlines, that congress approved an eight-billion-dollar appropriation bill called a subsidy or a give-away program for American farmers. This statement upsets American agricultural leaders for two reasons, Bessey says. First, only 3.2 billion of this appropriation goes directly to farmers and secondly, this 3.2 billion as a subsidy is a grant to agriculture for the agricultural enterprise because it is considered in the best interests of the nation's economy and its taxpayers.

Historically, in a democratic system of government, Bessey says subsidies have been the bulwark of economy and cultural development. The first Congress of the United States, in 1789, did three things in its first order of business. It devised a system of administering oaths to swear in public officials, enacted tariff laws to protect and promote industries which are subsidies within themselves and voted a subsidy of 10 percent reduction in customs duties and a tonnage tax in favor of American shipping.

Then, from 1827 to 1836, the government granted six and one-third billion acres of public lands to private interests to encourage canal building and river improvements. From 1850 to 1871, the United States government granted 183 million acres of lands to railroads. In 1845, the first mail subsidy was paid.

Subsidies are used in wartime to guarantee benefits and induce production of needed materials for the safety of the nation.

Subsidies are used in the United States mail system to a very large extent. In fact, the lifeblood of most newspapers and magazines is the special subsidy they receive through the United States mail for distribution of printed materials. This again meets the definition of a true subsidy; one in which the

magazine or newspaper is given direct cash assistance and this, in turn, becomes a direct benefit to all taxpayers who share in the cheap dissemination of printed materials. Mail subsidies granted by the government are one of today's largest subsidies and always have been.

The subsidy to American farmers, administered through the ASCS, Bessey points out, benefits the people in two ways. The farm programs ensure

food supplies and stabilize food prices for the nation, thereby ensuring an adequate and an economical food budget to the American consumer. In the past, these two goals have been accomplished by the fact that the cost of food in relation to other commodities on the market is a smaller percent of disposable income than it ever has been in history. This percentage in the United States is 16.5 percent of the disposable dollar after taxes. In relation to other countries

in the world, England's cost of food is 25 percent; France, 20 percent; Germany, 35 percent; Russia, 50 percent; India, 70 percent. "No one can deny that rail, air, wartime protection or agricultural subsidies have not, and still do, continue to serve the democratic form of government better than any other type of government in the world," Bessey concluded.



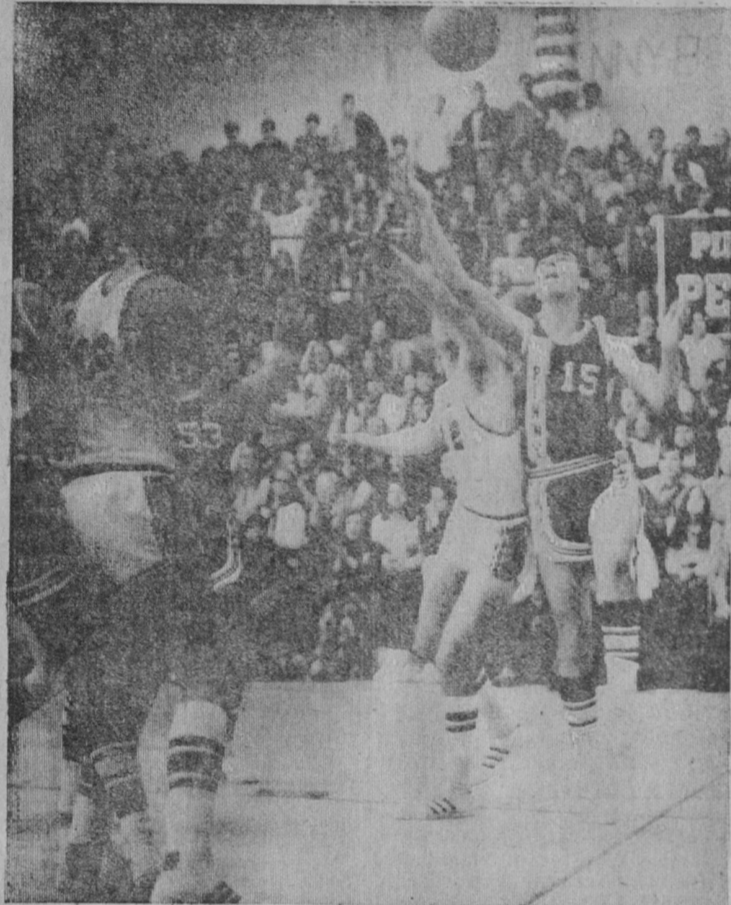

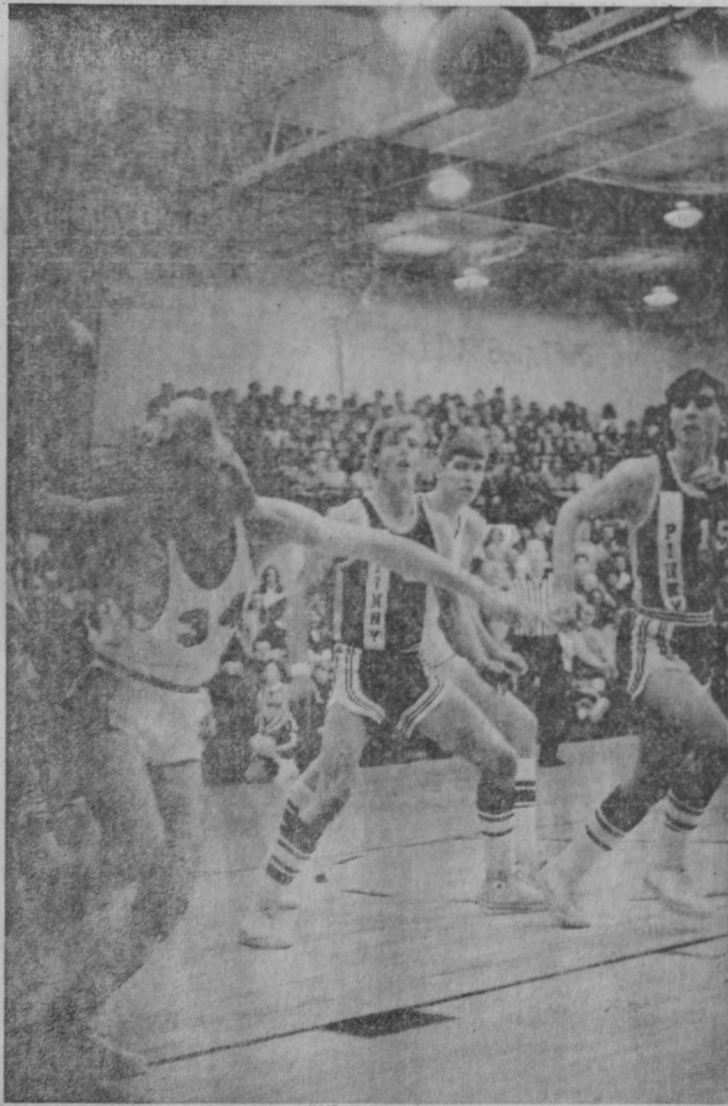

Guain Teusher and Chuck Nichols each collected 10 points for the Cards. John McIntyre led the winners with 14.

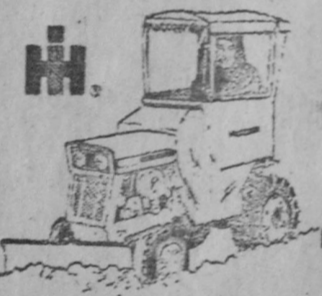

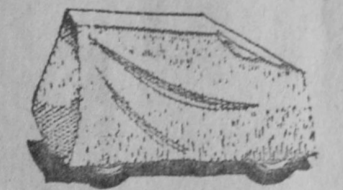

**Answer Questions on VA Benefits**

Question: For several years after the death of my husband, I received widow's pension from the Veterans Administration. When I remarried, the pension stopped. My second husband, who was not a veteran, died recently and I was left without sufficient income to provide for my support. Is it possible to have my pension restored?

Answer: Yes, if you are otherwise qualified for benefits, you may reapply for death pension benefits. A change in the law effective January 1 permits restoration of death pensions to widows who remarry and the marriage is terminated by death or divorce.

Question: I did not complete high school but was accepted as a college student under the GI Bill on the basis of a general equivalency diploma test. I now find that I am having trouble with some subjects and cannot keep up with my class. I have been advised to seek special help. Can VA help me?

Answer: Yes, if your school certifies that you need tutorial help to avoid failing a course, you may receive up to \$50 a month for nine months to pay a qualified tutor. Application should be made to the VA on Form 21E-1990T.

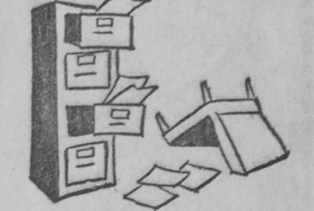
Question: Several years ago, I elected to receive army retirement benefits rather than VA disability compensation. Is it too late to change now?

Answer: No. There is no deadline for changing to compensation from VA in lieu of retired military pay. However, you must undergo a VA medical examination to determine the degree and nature of your disability and the amount of compensation to which you are entitled. You can make arrangements for this examination through the nearest VA office.

Question: I am currently training as an apprentice under the GI Bill. As part of my training, my employer has asked me to take a correspondence course. Will VA pay for the lessons completed through correspondence, in addition to providing the allowance under the apprenticeship program?

Answer: No. You cannot be paid for a correspondence course at the same time you are pursuing training under an apprentice program.

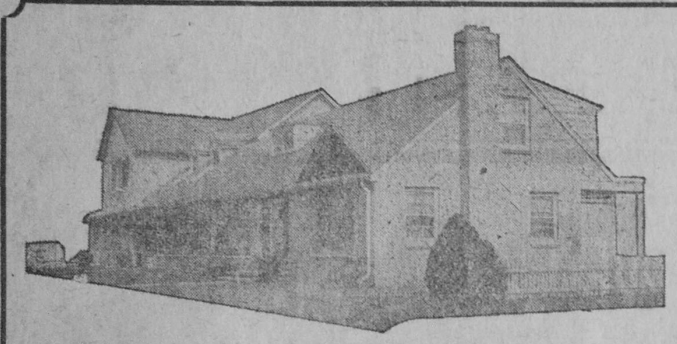

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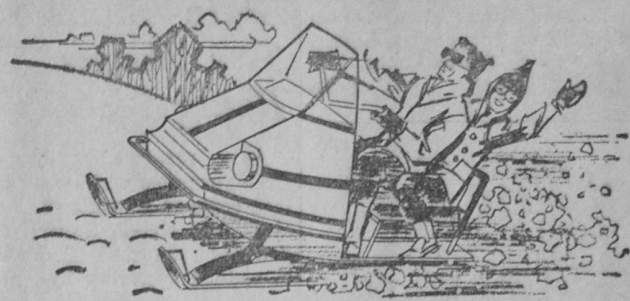

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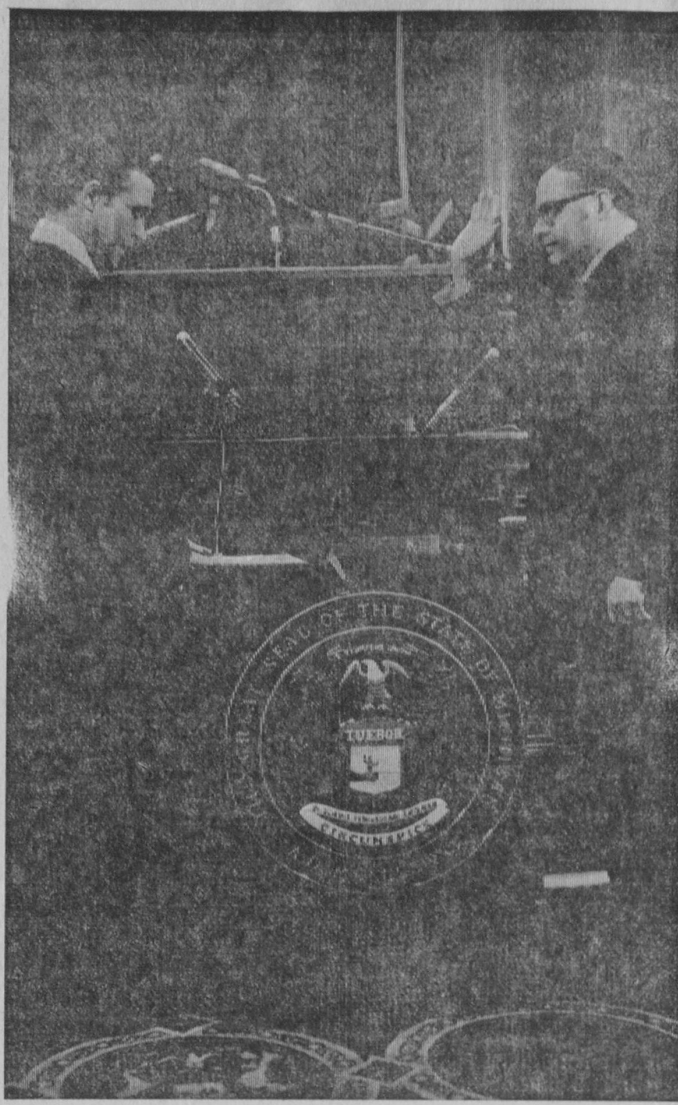

As a result of a decrease in state revenues and increasing welfare costs as a result of the General Motors strike, Governor Milliken has requested all departments to reduce spending by two percent.

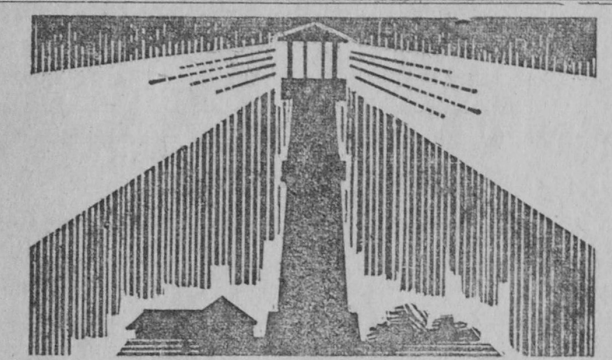

### Phosphates - Enzymes - Pollution

One area of particular concern to homemakers about the environment is that of water pollution from phosphates used in laundry aids. Phosphates are used in three kinds of laundry products—detergents and heavy duty soaps, enzyme pre-soaks and packaged water conditioners. Use of these detergents and water conditioners has greatly reduced the problem of hard water scum in home laundering.

Phosphates, acting as fertilizers, stimulate the growth of algae and other aquatic plants. Excessive plant growth chokes streams and shallow lakes and lowers the oxygen content of the water, causing the death of fish and other animal life. This situation speeds up the natural aging process by which rivers and lakes become dead.

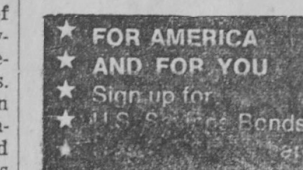
### What can consumers do?

- (1) Support better sewage treatment plants. Municipal sewage treatment plants often have not kept up with rapidly increasing population. Conditions with individual home septic tanks and drain fields may be even worse. This highlights the importance of homeowners and municipal governments checking the effectiveness of sewage treatment facilities. Advanced kinds of treatment can remove phosphates from waste water. To do this, more complicated equipment is required and this takes money. Informed voters need to support local government as it plans and builds better sewage treatment plants.
- (2) Select products that have lower phosphate content. The percentage of phosphates in laundry products varies from 1.4 to 43.7 percent. A list of laundry products and their percent of phosphates is available from your county extension office.
- (3) Install mechanical water softening equipment and use pure soaps. Mild, pure soaps (not detergents) include less than one percent phosphates in their ingredients. If the home water supply is completely soft, these soaps can be used in laundering without the problem of hard water scum. Mechanical (not chemical) water softeners can adequately soften the home water supply.
- (4) Express concerns to detergent manufacturers, legislature and local government.

1970 to January 1971 for different areas of the state. Some progress is already being made under this regulation.

Researchers have developed NTA (sodium-nitro-tri-acetate) as a substitute for phosphates in detergents. This seems to work just as well as phosphates but scientists question whether it may cause another kind of water pollution.

Target dates for 80 percent phosphate removal from waste water have been set for Michigan watersheds under federal regulations. These dates vary from November
