## Arrange Program for Sixth Annual Perchville USA Festival--Feb. 19-21

Sixth annual Perchville USA program, scheduled on Tawas Bay February 19-21, was announced this week by Tawas Chamber of Commerce.

The Perchville festival provides organized snowmobile activities, ice fishing on Tawas Bay, skydiving, demolition derby, motorcycle races on the ice, polar bear swim, day and night fireworks, an amateur hour for all ages, helicopter rides and many more events.

The program starts at 6:30 p. m. Friday, February 19, with a fish fry

at Livey's Restaurant. Chuck "Muddy" Waters of Channel Five, Bay City, is again to be crowned Perchville king.

A get-together for women is to be held at Tawas Golf and Country Club starting at 6:30 p. m. A teen dance is scheduled at 8:00 p. m. at the East Tawas Community Building.

Activities Saturday start with a 10:00 a. m. flag raising at the Michigan Waterways Commission Dock, East Tawas, followed by daytime fireworks at 11:00 a. m. Jim Vallerder and his aero circus is to be fea-

tured in a skydiving exhibition at 12 o'clock noon.

Afternoon festivities start with an amateur hour, 12:30 o'clock, in a heated shell on the dock. Sponsored by East Tawas Lions Club, more than \$200 in prizes will be offered to participants. Registration is necessary by February 13. Any and all talent is welcome.

Motorcycle races on the ice sponsored by the chamber of commerce start at 12:30 p. m., followed by skydiving at 2:00 p. m. There will be a scuba diving exhibition under the

ice at 2:30 p. m.

Richard Brooks of East Tawas, 1970 polar bear king, will be featured at 3:00 p. m. A polar bear swimming pond will be cut in the ice near the dock. Skydiving will complete the afternoon's program at 4 o'clock.

A Perchville banquet and queen coronation will be held starting at 6:30 p. m. at the Holland House. Two finalists from the amateur hour will perform for selection of a winner.

Fireworks and a snowmobile safari sponsored by the Iosco Snow-drieters will complete the evening.

Throughout the day, events such as tug of war, ice spudding, hole in one contest, helicopter rides, sleigh rides and children's activities will be featured.

Sunday's program starts at 8:00 a. m. with a pancake breakfast at the community building. Family snowmobile races will be held at 12 o'clock noon with registration at the dock.

Bob Carter, the flying cowboy, will present his aerobatic air show starting at 1:00 p. m. There will be a polar bear swim at 2:00 p. m. and demolition derby at 3:00 p. m.

## Remind Senior Citizens to File for Exemption

State Rep. George A. Prescott, Tawas City, today reminded senior citizens and veterans that now is the time to apply for senior citizens and veterans homestead tax exemptions for 1971. Applications being taken now are for the 1971 tax year and should be returned by March 1.

To qualify for the senior citizen exemption, the applicant must prove age and property ownership and must have an adjusted gross income that does not exceed \$6,000. He also must have occupied the dwelling on which the exemption is sought for six out of 12 months in the last calendar year.

The citizen must be at least 65 years of age as of December 31, 1970, and must prove age by presenting a birth certificate, citizenship papers, baptismal certificate, family Bible, life insurance policy, armed service discharge, voter registration certificate stating age, a United States Census Bureau statement or a social security affidavit. Property ownership can be proven by a land contract, mortgage or property deed.

Those applying for a veteran exemption must prove ownership of property, veteran status and disability.

Veterans may prove ownership by the same method and in addition must prove disability status.

Representative Prescott said that persons desiring further information regarding the tax exemptions should contact their local township or municipal assessor's office with their questions.

Scott A. Zuziak, seven years old, Saginaw, was treated at Tawas Hospital following a collision on a street at Sand Lake. Driver of the other snowmobile was Tamara A. Boracki, 12, Saginaw.

## Iosco Commission Opens New Year

Annual reorganization, appointments and special appropriations comprised much of the activity of the Iosco County Board of Commissioners at its first session of 1971 last Wednesday. Reports from the various departments of the county were accepted and are to be acted upon next month.

Jack Allen of Oscoda resigned from the county department of public works and William Weryley was appointed to fill his vacancy. Allen was immediately appointed to the East Central Michigan Economic Development District, which was opened through Weryley's resignation.

The board confirmed the appointment of Merton Killey to replace Henry Conley on the county department of public works. Both men are members of the Iosco Road Commission.

Harry Samatis, new Oscoda Township clerk, was named to replace the late Alva Meade on the county election scheduling commission. Other members are George Erickson and Walter Nelson.

Bert Fortune of Whittemore and

A. Ray Meade of Wilber Township were named to fill two vacancies on the Iosco-Arenac Regional Library Board.

Henry Gage, civil defense director, addressed the board and requested permission to hold a natural emergency exercise in October. Gage also discussed the possibility of including an emergency operations center in any new building being proposed by the county. He said that federal money was available for constructing such a unit.

A resolution was adopted establishing the following salaries and positions in the sheriff's department: Detective, \$7,700; sergeant, \$7,500; deputies, \$7,200.

The board authorized the sheriff's department to advertise for bids on a new radio.

An appropriation of \$1,000 was made to Environetic Research as partial payment on a solid waste disposal study being conducted by that firm. Total cost is \$2,000.

The board authorized payment of \$416.99 to East Central Michigan Economic Development District, of which \$143.12 would be for the law enforcement council.

Payment of \$950 was authorized to the Michigan Association of Counties for dues and \$1,000 to Eastern Michigan Tourist Association.

The board transferred \$2,500 from the general fund to the parks and recreation fund for administrative expenses. This item had been neglected in the annual budget.

Authorization was given to Probate Judge William McCready to attend his annual conference. L. S. Little was named to replace Carlton Merschel on the region seven health planning commission.

## Bus Vandalism Investigated at Hale Area School

Iosco Sheriff's Department is investigating vandalism of a school bus which occurred Thursday at Hale Area School. Officers said that the back seat of a bus was destroyed by fire which is believed to have been caused by a flare being imbedded in the seat cushion. A flare was also used in an attempt to damage one of the school's portable classrooms.

## Carlton Merschel Elected Chairman of Iosco Board

Carlton Merschel of East Tawas was elected chairman of the Iosco County Board of Commissioners at its annual reorganizational meeting held Wednesday.

The new chairman, succeeds Fred B. Lomas of East Tawas, who held that position for two years and now moves to the floor as a regular member. Lomas had served as chairman since redistricting and changeover from the old board of supervisors two years ago.

Two ballots were needed to fill the position with three candidates nominated. The first ballot saw Merschel tied with William Weryley of Hale with three votes each. The third candidate, Clement Stephan, received two votes.

In a runoff between the two top candidates, Merschel received five votes and Weryley received four.

Jack Allen of Oscoda was elect-

ed vice chairman of the board, receiving five votes to Robert Foster's four. Stephan had served two years as vice chairman.

Three new members of the board attended their first meeting. Two members, L. S. Little of Grant Township and George Blust of Whittemore, bring years of experience to county government having served on the old board of supervisors. The third new member, Donald L. LeCureux of AuSable, is a newcomer to county government.

Committee appointments of Merschel saw Weryley being named finance chairman, one of the most important positions on the board. He automatically was assigned as the county's representative on the tax allocation board which distributes the statutory 14 mills to schools and the county. Townships proving a need are entitled to the 15th mill.

Serving with Weryley on this

powerful committee are Lomas and Foster.

Other committees appointed, with chairmen listed first, are as follows:

Health—Little, Stephan, Allen; building—Stephan, Little, LeCureux; conservation—Lomas, Foster, Weryley; claims and accounts—LeCureux, Stephan, Blust; public safety—Foster, Lomas, Weryley; judicial—Blust, Allen, Little; personnel—Allen, Blust, LeCureux.

## Planning Commission to Get Water-Sewer Money

A check for \$11,600 for the county-wide water and sewer survey will be presented to the Iosco County Planning Commission Friday, January 23, 10:30 a. m., by the head of Michigan's FHA, who will accompany Ras Smith of Standish to the meeting at the conference room in the Federal Building, East Tawas.

After the short FHA meeting, George Justus, Environetics Re-

search of Chicago, Illinois, will give the final report on the solid waste disposal study authorized by Iosco County Board of Commissioners.

Wilbur C. Roach, county planning commission chairman, urged that all members be present at this important meeting, plus all township supervisors, commissioners and members of planning groups of Iosco County.

## Louis H. Braddock Dead; 99 Years Old

Louis H. Braddock, 99, retired Tawas City business-civic leader and one of the last surviving veterans of the Spanish-American War, died Monday, January 25, at Saginaw Veterans Hospital.

Funeral services are to be held Thursday, January 28, 2:00 p. m., from E. D. Jacques and Son Funeral Home with the Rev. Sidney J. Rowland officiating. Burial will be in Memory Garden Cemetery, Tawas City.

Louis Hayden Braddock was born September 26, 1871, at Bay City, the son of Niles Arthur Braddock and Sarah Handy Braddock, both children of early Bay County pioneer families.

Mr. Braddock's father was a lumber inspector on the Saginaw River and the family resided in various Northern Michigan lumber manufacturing centers.

Mr. Braddock was working at Chicago, Illinois, at the outbreak of the Spanish-American War. He joined Company C of the Second Illinois Volunteer Infantry on April 26, 1898. The company joined the Seventh United States Army Corps at Jacksonville, Florida, and embarked for Havana, Cuba, as an army of occupation.

He was assigned as a train guard and remained in Cuba until March 1899. He was mustered out of service at Augusta, Georgia, on April 26, 1899.

Returning to Michigan, Mr. Braddock was married to the former Laura Brown of Ithaca on July 26, 1900. Mr. Braddock was working for Morley Brothers Hardware at the time and was hired that year by C. H. Prescott and Sons to manage that firm's hardware in Tawas City.

He was employed by the Prescotts, whose store was located in the building presently occupied by Alpena Candy Company, until it was closed in the early 1930s. He then went into business for himself, operating a farm implement dealership and an awning store in a building


## Public Hearing on Bay Perch Set at Pigeon

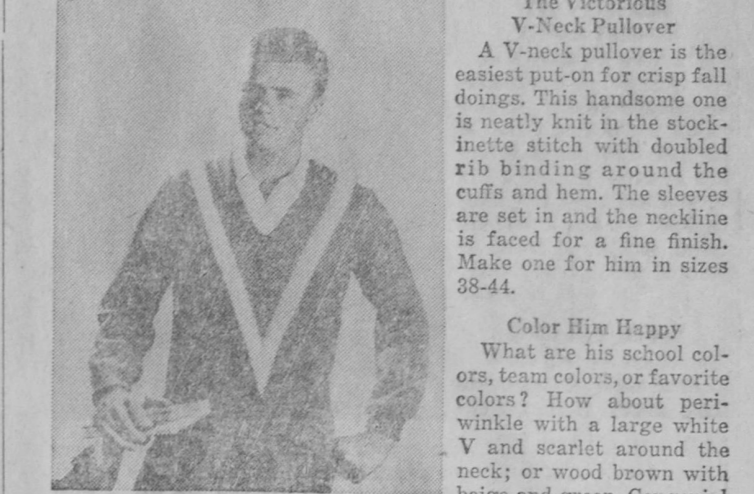

The facility, located on Lake Michigan four miles south of Ludington, is scheduled for completion in 1973.

## TA School Board Awards Contracts for New Buses

Bids of Great Lakes Bus Company for furnishing three Bluebird bodies and Ottawa Equipment Company for three International chassis were accepted Monday night by Tawas Area Board of Education.

Ward Body Company was low bidder on furnishing bodies, but the school district has had no previous experience with this firm and the contract was awarded to Great Lakes. Ottawa Equipment Company was low among four bids received. Total cost of the three units is \$25,258.65.

The above price reflects an increase of about \$500 due to air brakes now being required on school buses.

In other business, Edgar Jenkins, transportation director, said that only one bus in the school's fleet had passed the state police inspection. He said that infractions noted in the inspection were not serious and that corrections were being made.

The board directed that a program involving the community in drug education be turned over to Gene R. Gerber to become part of the community education program.

A second program on drug abuse is to be held Monday, February 1, 8:00 p. m., at the East Tawas Elementary Unit. A member of the medical profession is to be the speaker. The public is invited to attend.

The community education director has been authorized to attend the third national institute on narcotics and dangerous drugs to be held at Chicago, Illinois, February 14-18.

The board of education's architect is to have an analysis of costs of renovation of the Tawas City Unit for use as a middle school at the February 8 meeting.

Because of conflicting schedules, the second meeting of February will be held February 15 instead of one week later.

## Kids Bring Together Kids to Learn Danger of Drug and Narcotic Use and Abuse

Kids are learning to bring to other kids the message on dangers of drug and narcotic use and abuse in a dynamic and progressive program of the State Board of Education.

Teachers, administrators, parents and other citizens are involved in the same program.

"The program of education in drug and narcotic dangers which was begun by the board early last year shows promise of having great impact on kids," said Supt. of Public Instruction Dr. John W. Porter. "And one of the most impressive elements in this whole program is the involvement of youngsters."

"Not only have the kids provided valuable contributions to the development of the educational program, they have shown remarkable aptitude for grasping the need for themselves and other youngsters to be deeply involved in any total effort to combat dangerous experimentation with or use of drugs and narcotics," he said.

"The State Board of Education has been monitoring this program very closely and, while it is recognized that we have only made a beginning, it is hoped that knowledge and good

works will spread like ripples on a pond."

The current department of education program designed to combat drug abuse consists of a combination of state and federally supported activities.

On the state side, a comprehensive teacher resource guide on drug use and abuse has been developed and widely distributed. The guide was developed by Dr. E. J. McClendon, deputy superintendent of the Highland Park Schools, who has since taken a leave from there to act as special assistant to Porter, developing and coordinating the drug education programs.

State funding of \$75,000 has enabled programs by seven local educational agencies in which 757 teachers, 157 students and 91 others will have taken part by the end of the school year.

"In the federally funded program, regional conferences which are just now getting under way are a major part and in these we expect even more involvement of students," McClendon said. "In both state and federally funded programs, we have so far found excellent confirmation for the theory that no training program in this area can be fully effective without direct and meaningful involvement of students."

"Students also serve on the drug advisory council established by the state board," McClendon said.

"Here, too, the student contribution is able to convince them they are to take an active part and not just for window dressing," he said.

The advisory council will develop a set of guidelines on drug and narcotic education for a wide area and many local school districts. Focus on each of the programs is different, but all deal with the basic questions surrounding use and abuse of drugs and narcotics and other harmful substances by youngsters.

An initial effort in the federally funded approach to drug and narcotic education came with the intensive training of 10 educators selected from Michigan schools at the National Drug Education Training Center at the University of Wisconsin. This team is used as resource help in the planning and conducting of regional programs to train leadership teams from the local districts.

The specialist team includes Edward D. Benbow and John C. Hoyer, Detroit Public Schools; Miss Judith C. Byrne, Cherry Hill School District; Miss Kay Cornell, Royal Oak Schools; Ralph W. Hartshorn, Dearborn Public Schools; John Safran, Farmington Public Schools; Kenneth Smith, Redford Union High School; Donald L. Garman and Mrs. Natalie D. Moore, Grand Rapids Schools; Chris Meriam of the governor's office on drug abuse.

For a comprehensive conference program, also funded with \$119,000 obtained by the board from the federal government, the state was divided into 10 regions.

Conference plans call for the training of a leadership team from each local and intermediate school district in the region. The team will return to its local district to conduct in-service education, provide leadership in curriculum development and provide continuing leadership for

program development and evaluation.

"Each team will consist of teachers and other school district personnel, students and citizens," McClendon said.

"Obviously, any person designated as a drug program coordinator serves on such a team. Larger districts have been encouraged to send larger teams, or several people from each category. Resources for the training conferences include the services of the Department of Education, naturally."

Training of the drug education leadership teams will continue through May. About 2,000 individuals are expected to take part.

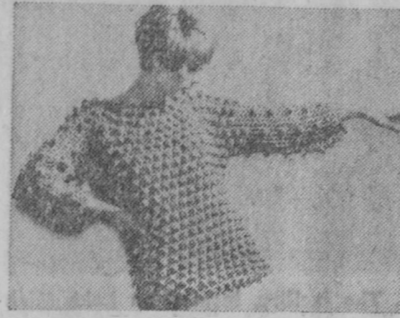

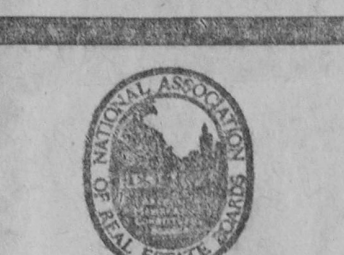

A trophy was presented to Coleman at the 20th annual meeting of the Paul Bunyan Council.

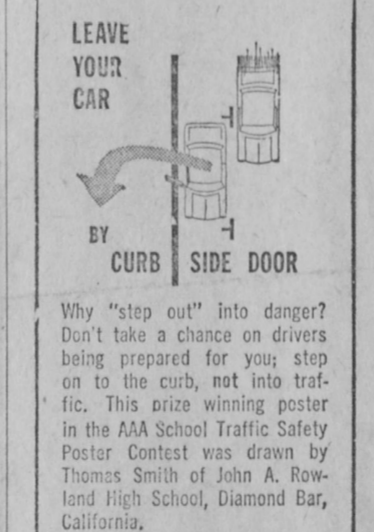

# Health Hints

FROM BLUE SHIELD

With January having been designated as "Alcoholism Information Month," each of us would do well to remember that at least one in every twenty, and probably one in every twelve people over the age of 18 is an alcoholic. The number of alcoholics in America is estimated at about 7,000,000 with many authorities placing the figure closer to 10,000,000. One in every eight Americans is a potential alcoholic.

Alcoholism is not an illness like measles or a cold which can be caught overnight. It is a slowly developing, progressive disease. There is no hard and fast line between casual drinking and alcohol dependency, nor between alcohol dependency and alcoholism.

While it is difficult to define exactly when a person has become an alcohol dependent, there are warning signals with which anyone who drinks should become familiar. These include: the development of a firm and predictable drinking pattern and a distinguishable increase in the amount of alcohol consumed within this pattern.

- In addition, there are a number of other signs to be on the look-out for with the increased consumption of alcohol. These include the individual who:
    - Used to have just one or two drinks to relax at the end of the day and now has three or four;
    - Finds increasing pleasure in drinking at lunch and does it more frequently;
    - Used to drink to be sociable or to celebrate and now drinks to induce sleep or because he is worried or depressed;
    - Notices he is drinking more this year than last;
    - Used to drink at cocktail parties but now drinks before the party as well.
- Alcoholism is, indeed, a serious problem, and everyone who drinks at all will do well to evaluate his consumption of alcohol in order to prevent this disease for which there is no known cure.

# School Seeks Ways to Improve Lunches

Still looking for ways to put its hot lunch program on a self-supporting basis, Tawas Area School is making plans to extend its lunch period, provide a juke box in the cafeteria and offer more home baked goods in order to make the school lunch more attractive to students.

In a report to the board of education Monday night, Mrs. Mildred Parsons, chief cook, said that one of her biggest problems was to feed about 600 persons in less than 45 minutes.

She said that it was necessary to move the youngsters through the serving line at a fast rate; then the youngsters must hurry their meals in order that others may use cafeteria facilities. She said that as a result, the cafeteria is usually a mess at lunch time when youngsters rush to clean their trays.

Because of this rush, silverware is often thrown in the garbage cans. Mrs. Parsons said this was not the fault of the children, but that there just was too little time for them.

Leonard Sarki, chairman of the board of education's hot lunch committee, said that members had visited the cafeteria at Whittemore-Prescott Area High School and possibly could use a couple of ideas.

One would be to split the lunch hour in order to cut down on the rush. He said that youngsters could then have a little more time to relax while eating and perhaps would enjoy having a juke box in the cafeteria. He also suggested that lunches be made more attractive with additional home baked goods.

A few weeks ago, the board of education reduced the daily lunch cost in order to attract more students to the school lunch program. As a result, the program is now averaging 588 lunches a day at the high school and on January 18, 685 lunches were served.

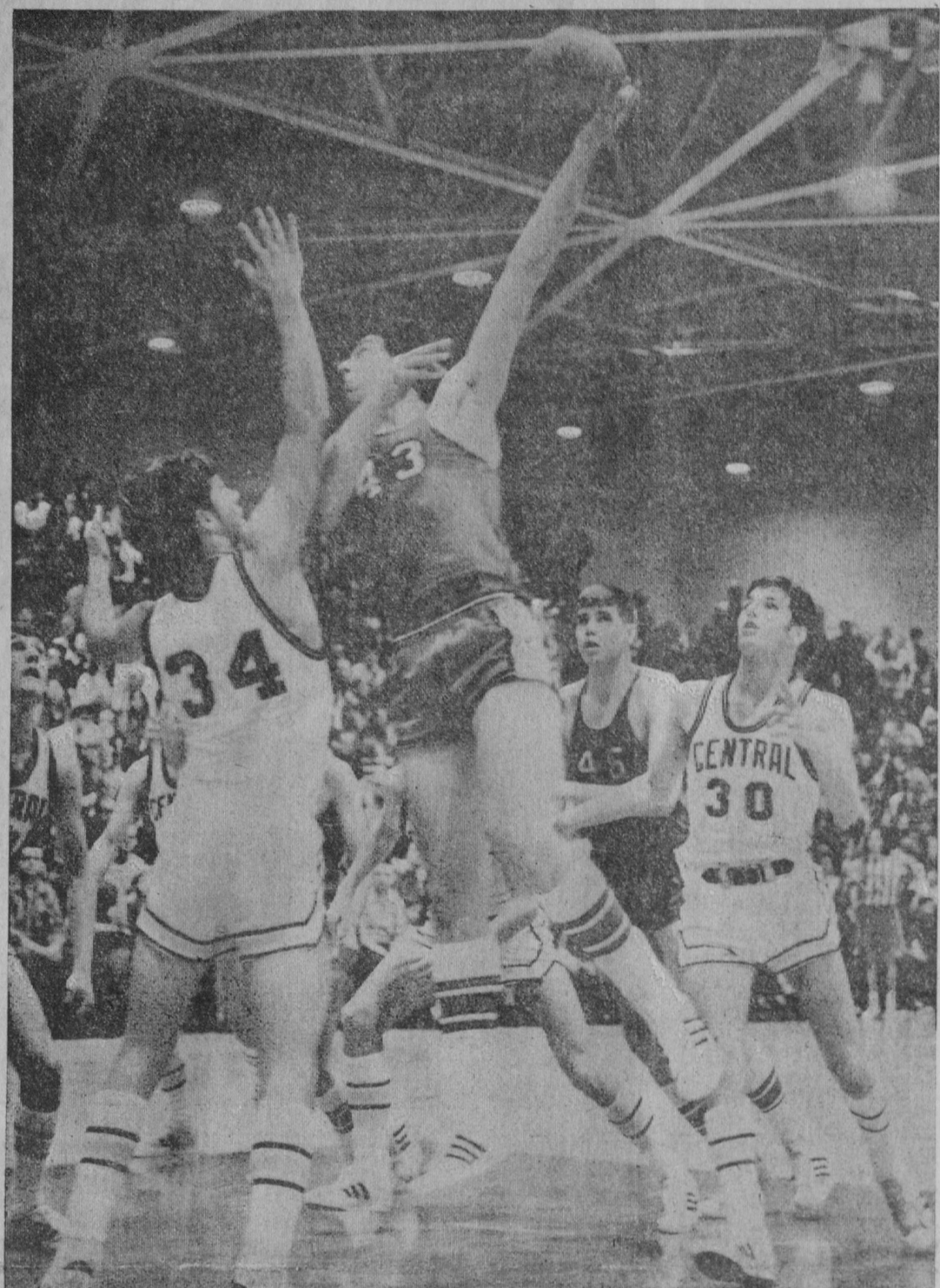

## Braves Downed S-S Panthers in Overtime to Hold NBC Tie

Standish-Stirling's Panthers did not return home Friday night as the vaunted Cinderella team of the NBC but before their championship hopes turned into a pumpkin they had the Tawas Area Braves on the ropes for nearly four quarters before finally bowing out in overtime, 65-57.

As a result of this dramatic overtime win, the Braves remained in a first place tie with Carrollton, which downed the Gladwin Flying Gs.

Friday night's game was a far cry from the season opener at Central, which saw the Braves turn in their best performance of the season in defeating the Panthers, 83-51. Although only losing one league encounter since then, the Braves of Coach Jim Papenfus have never been able to put everything together at one time.

As could be expected, the Panthers used a press defense against the taller Braves and it was a good one. Time after time, the Panthers' defense caused Tawas Area to throw the ball away on a wild pass or a jump ball resulted when the Braves were unable to move down the court in time.

The defense proved to be most costly to Standish-Stirling before the night was over. Close guarding to the extreme had six Panthers sidelined by fouls and three members of the Braves were on the bench via the foul route. Officials called 63 fouls during the night, 35 against the losers and 28 against the Braves and they probably could have called again as many in a rough and tumble battle. Tawas converted 17 charity tosses and missed 19, while the Panthers meshed 21 out of 40.

The visitors were hot and smelled an upset during the first half and the Braves were as cold as the previous week when they lost to Pinconning. The Panthers jumped off to a 17-9 lead in the first quarter with Davidson leading the way with 10 points. The Braves were baffled by the press defense and Chuck Petersen and Gary Libka, who were hampered early by fouls, had one bucket apiece.

The second quarter was no different and the visitors led by 17 points at one time. Scoring for the Panthers was evenly divided among the

five players with Davidson leading on four points. Petersen topped Tawas Area's scoring with six points.

The second half opened on the same note with the Panthers pulling away. Tawas Area suddenly came to life late in the quarter and closed the gap with a 16-10 scoring effort. Six of those points came on some spectacular shooting by Guard Bob Towns, who flipped in three buckets. The hard working Craig Wilkins contributed two buckets and Rob Hackborn, one of the late game heroes for Tawas, did the same.

The real fireworks were reserved for the fourth quarter when Tawas slowly began to beat the Panther press as the losers began to lose players via the foul route. Both Petersen and Libka of Tawas, however, were sidelined by fouls and substitute guard, Mark Schirmer, left by the same route.

With three minutes, two seconds to go in the game, Wilkins meshed a two-pointer to tie the score, but Schmetzler put Central ahead on his foul shot. Fox dunked a two-pointer to put the Braves ahead again, but Standish-Stirling again tied the game at the free throw line. Hackborn hit for two points and Fox finally found the passing range and hit Wilkins, who put Tawas four points ahead with 51 seconds to go. Tawas took a Panther rebound and Wilkins was called for charging and the Panthers cut the margin to 53-52 on a three-point play. Ron Ulman was fouled with 32 seconds remaining and he meshed both shots. The second was nullified when he stepped on the line. Standish-Stirling's Davidson meshed a two-pointer and the game ended in regulation time at 54-54.

The visitors quickly went out in front, 57-54, in overtime but Fox scored a two-pointer on a tip and was fouled in the process. He meshed one from the charity line to tie the score. With a minute to go, Towns was fouled and he meshed one shot to give Tawas a 58-57 lead. Hackborn was fouled and he put Tawas in front, 59-57.

Tawas continued to move out in front and Fox tipped in another two-pointer, while Ulman meshed two foul shots. Ulman stole the ball just before the final whistle and quickly passed to Hackborn, who dunked a two-pointer.

The final few minutes of the fourth quarter and the entire two-minute overtime has to go down as one of the most exciting periods ever played here. The official timer even got caught in the excitement at one time and the clock did not run for about 15 seconds, but this unfortunate incident had no effect on the final outcome of the game.

Leading scorer for Tawas was Hackborn, who had 15 points on seven buckets and a foul shot, six of those points coming in the final quarter and three in overtime. It was Hackborn who won the game in overtime against Carrollton two weeks ago. Petersen had 12 points and Fox had 10 points, five in overtime.

Davidson topped the losers with 23 points on 10 and three while Bishop had 10 points on two and six.

The Tawas Junior Varsity scored a 50-39 come-from-behind victory over the Little Panthers. The visitors jumped off to a 19-16 first quarter lead and led at intermission, 27-25. Tawas spurred ahead on a 10-3 third quarter score and wrapped it up with a 15-9 fourth quarter margin.

## Eagles Fell Before Visiting Posen

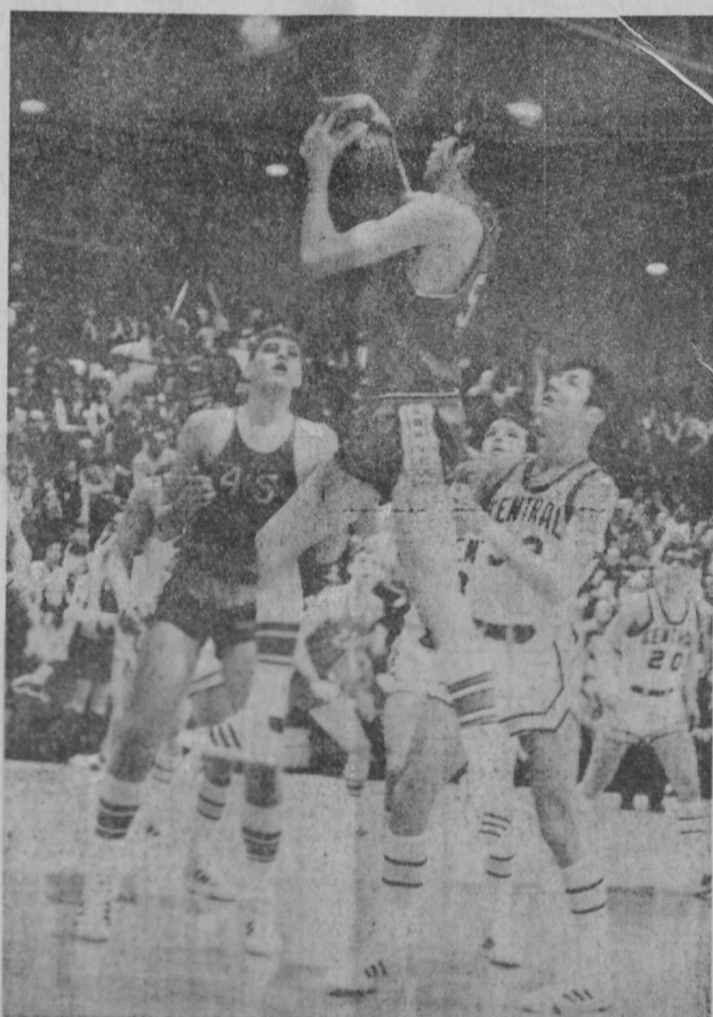

The two teams battled on even terms in the first quarter with Posen holding an 18-17 margin. The visitors upped the lead in the second quarter with a 22-17 effort.

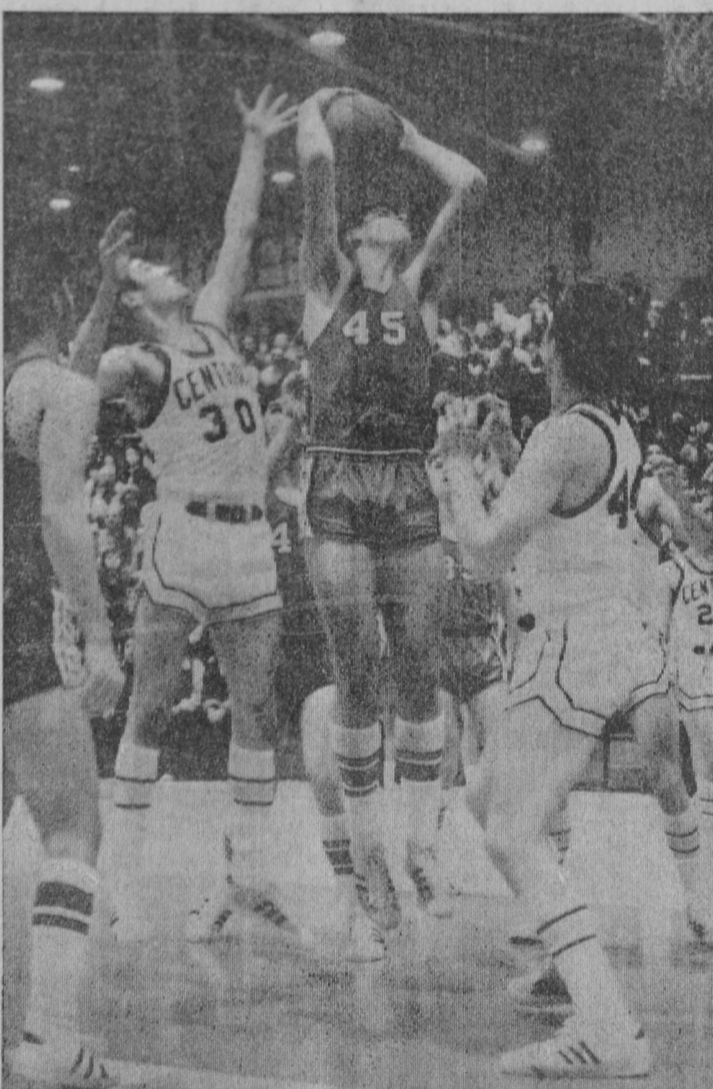
Hale came to life in the third quarter with another 17 points and Posen was held to 12. The final quarter saw the visitors outscoring the Eagles, 14-11.

### Social Security Lists Answers to Questions

**Question:** I retired last month. If I start working part time, how much can I make and still collect full social security payments each month?

**Answer:** You will get full social security benefits for each month you do not earn more than \$140 in wages or do substantial work in self-employment. Or you can get full benefits, regardless of monthly earnings, if your total earnings for the calendar year will not exceed \$1,680.

**Question:** I applied for social security benefits over a year ago but never received a check because I decided to continue working. I expect to retire soon. What should I do to get my retirement payments?

**Answer:** Write or visit your social security office and tell them you expect to retire. Do this at least three months before you retire so you can get your first check soon after you stop working.

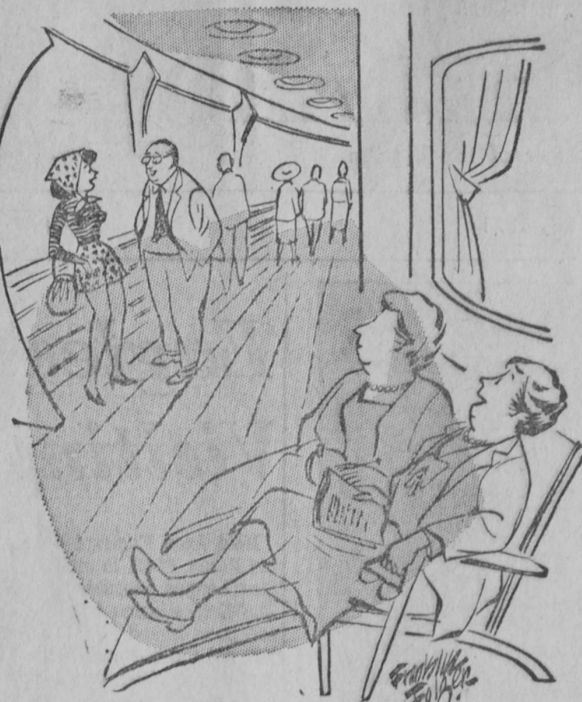
**Question:** I collect social security widow's benefits. I never worked myself. Will my survivors get a lump-sum payment when I pass away?

**Answer:** No. The lump-sum payment is only made after the worker's death. The worker must have credit for a certain amount of work under social security.

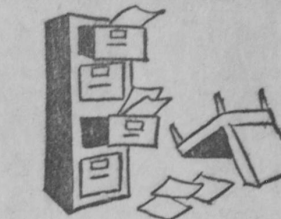

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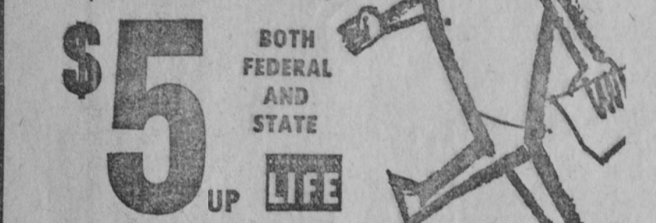

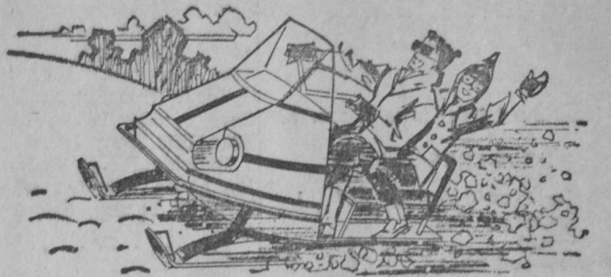

## Aliens Should Report Addresses During January

Thomas N. Pederson of the Detroit Immigration and Naturalization Service has again reminded all aliens to report their addresses during January.

Cards with which to make the reports are available at post offices and offices of the immigration and naturalization service throughout the country. The reports must be submitted to one of those offices.

Parents or guardians submit reports for alien children under 14 years of age.

Mr. Pederson urges all aliens to report before the end of January, as willful failure to do so may lead to serious penalties. He would like to caution all aliens, as well as employers, that the issuance of a social security account card to an alien is not evidence of permission to work in the United States. Only those aliens lawfully admitted to the United States for permanent residence (immigrants) and those aliens temporarily in the United States (nonimmigrants), who have been authorized by the service to take employment, may work in this country.

Her hobbies are music, writing, horse back riding and stamp collecting.

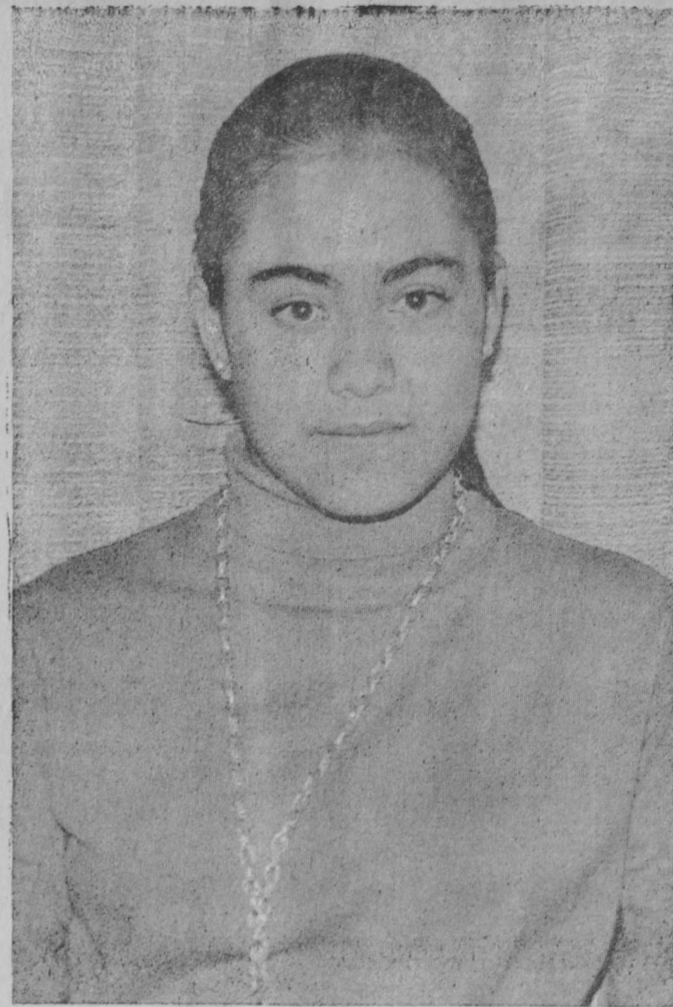
She said that many of her friends at home had participated in the Youth for Understanding program and her parents urged her to apply.
