Preliminary Study on Sewer-Water

Preliminary needs studies on water storage and distribution systems, as well as secondary sewage treatment and phosphate removal, have now been completed and Tawas City Water Board is making plans for implementing needed expansion and modernization of municipal facilities under its control.

Planning for this long range water and sewer program has been

under way for the past two years and, only last week, the needs study for the city water storage and distribution system was presented by Spicer Engineering of Saginaw. A needs study on secondary sewage treatment and phosphate removal was completed in September 1969.

Representatives of the Saginaw engineering firm are to meet with

the water board this month to discuss this final report and to outline procedures for making application for federal and state assistance on the projects, as well as to discuss local financing.

Both projects are of vital concern to the community, because of increasingly heavy demands on the systems and new governmental regulations.

State and federal pollution control agencies have become increasingly concerned with the rate of deterioration in the water quality of the Great Lakes and tributary streams.

Reginald Bublitz, superintendent of Public Works, said Thursday that the water board was "on top" of but not ahead in its planning to meet urgent needs for this

city to comply with state and federal pollution controls, as well as to insure adequate facilities for the community.

Insofar as pollution control is concerned, the increased rate of deterioration of water control in the Great Lakes is the result of many factors. This includes the expanding contributory population, industrial developments, increased

use of detergents, fertilizers and effluents from waste water treatment facilities which are now considered inadequately treated for the prevention of pollution of surface waters used for public recreation and as a source of water supply.

As a result of this concern, standards have been established which require more complete treatment of waste water. The city has been notified by the Michigan Water Resources Commission that all existing waste discharges will be required to provide facilities for the removal of phosphorus compounds by June 1, 1977. The commission will also require secondary treatment of plant effluents in the near future to reduce suspended solids and oxygen demand of the waste.

Under the plan developed by Spicer Engineering, the existing plant designed to serve a population of 4,250 would remain in service. Chemicals for phosphate removal would be added to the effluent and this would be pumped to an aerated lagoon. The lagoon discharge would be returned to the Tawas River, but not before a 32-day detention time.

Preliminary estimated cost of this project, not including land purchase, is \$175,000. Communities which qualify under the Michigan Water Resources Commission point system for grants for waste treatment may receive 55 percent of the cost of the treatment facility.

The Saginaw firm, which also serves as East Tawas' engineering consultant, studied the feasibility of conveying water from Tawas City to East Tawas' new plant for treatment. Since secondary treatment and phosphate removal is now required, it will be necessary for East Tawas to add these facilities to its plant in the very near future. If the waste of the two cities is combined, the East Tawas plant would have to be expanded to serve an additional 4,250 persons when secondary treatment is added.

Capital improvements at the East Tawas plant, plus the cost of revamping pumping stations and a new force main from Tawas City, has ruled out combined treatment in the East Tawas plant, according to the engineering report.

Estimated cost of the expanded water distribution and storage system presented to the water board last week would be approximately \$180,000.

Since 1957, Tawas City has purchased water from East Tawas' filtration plant. Because of the difference in elevated water tank overflow elevations between the two cities and lack of adequate water main capacity in both distribution systems, it is necessary to pump the water supply to Tawas City.

At the present time, the water system serves 528 residents and 127 commercial users. Because of the inability to obtain more than 275 gallons of water per minute through the East Tawas supply main when the water demand exceeds the supply available, it is necessary to supplement Tawas City's supply with well water.

As a means of correcting this situation, it is proposed to construct a 500,000 gallon ground storage tank and pumping station. The new storage facility would provide more than a day's water supply to Tawas City. In addition to the storage tank and pumping station, the plan would include improvements to the present water supply connection and additions to the water distribution system.

Tawas City presently uses an average of 237,670 gallons of water per day, with the maximum daily use of 356,000 gallons per day during the summer months.

The program calls for future construction of a 12-inch gravity connection to East Tawas in 1979-80 and provide an additional 200,000 gallon elevated storage tank by 1990.

Financing the proposed \$180,000 water system improvement project would be through the sale of revenue bonds. The Farmers Home Administration has both a grant and loan program. Receiving a grant is dependent upon meeting qualifications established by FHA and the availability of government funds.

Graham Bound Over to Circuit Ct.

Bound over to circuit court Tuesday evening on arraignment before District Judge J. Richard Ernst was Walter W. Graham, 32, Troy, who was charged with kidnaping at gunpoint a family of eight on Christmas Eve.

Judge Ernst ordered that the \$25,000 bond, under which Graham had been held since December 25, be continued.

Graham is charged with pulling

a revolver on Maj. Frederick G. Gibout of Wurtsmith Air Force Base, his wife and six children after the major had stopped to give assistance to Graham, whose car was stalled on Wilber Road.

The family was later released on First Street in Tawas City and they notified the Iosco Sheriff's Department. Graham was captured in the stolen station wagon a short time later.

Tawas City Had Best Building Year in Recent History

The past 12 months was Tawas City's best building year in recent history, according to a year-end report submitted to the city council Monday night by Reginald Bublitz, superintendent of public works.

Total valuation of 95 building applications approved during 1970 was \$905,260, as compared to 88 permits and a valuation of \$162,680 during the preceding year.

Although about \$540,000 of this total was for construction at Tawas Hospital and non-taxable, the remainder is still higher than any previous year since building permits have been recorded.

Included in the permits were 13 for new homes totaling \$210,000, more than tripling the \$65,400 five home permits in 1969. This was even higher than 1968, which happened to be the best building year since 1960, when eight homes were constructed with a valuation of \$154,012.

There were two private garage permits issued with a valuation of \$2,600; 64 home repair permits, \$41,535; eight commercial repairs, \$28,865; two new commercial buildings, \$22,000; six permits in

the "other" category, \$600,260. The latter included Tawas Hospital.

Increases were noted in home repairs (\$8,612), commercial repairs (\$9,165), new commercial (\$16,800).

August was the best month for issuing building permits with 17 applications approved. This was followed by October with 16. Because of the lateness of applications, construction would probably not be completed until next year.

Prior to last year, the city's best building year was in 1956 when 75 permits totaled \$267,835 with no public buildings included. The next best year was in 1959 when 72 permits totaled \$300,735. The Emanuel Lutheran School was included in that total.

Fishermen Urged to Mark Ice Hole in Moving Shanty

An East Tawas woman this week asks fishermen to use good judgment when moving shanties on the ice.

"My husband was ice fishing," states Mrs. George Anderson, "and he stepped into a hole that had been cut for a shanty. The ice shanty had been moved and the hole left unmarked. A coating of snow made the hole impossible to see."

"My husband scrambled out, but the cold bath did his arthritis no good and he is a senior citizen. I know that natives of the Tawas know the rule that all holes should be marked when the shanty is moved. How can this rule be brought to the attention of others?" asks Mrs. Anderson.

It is suggested that the Tawas Chamber of Commerce install signs at the landing near Perchville to warn fishermen to clearly mark holes when a shanty has been moved.

Burglary Under Investigation at Evergreen Resort

Iosco Sheriff's Department is investigating a burglary at Evergreen Resort, five miles north of Hale on M-65, in which \$2,000 was taken from the store and living quarters on January 1.

Officers said that entry was made into the building by breaking a window in a side door. Two of three cash registers in the store were ransacked of all paper money and an undetermined amount of checks. A quantity of cash was also taken from the living quarters.

In 1963, 10 new homes were constructed at a valuation of \$88,350, with all construction permits totaling \$234,680; construction saw a drop in 1964 with eight new homes valued at \$81,000, but total of all permits was \$228,724 with two new churches; construction rebounded with 12 new homes in 1965 at a cost of \$128,400, with all permits totaling \$228,267; 1966 had 14 new homes with a valuation of \$149,742, all permits totaling \$240,641; 1967 saw 12 new homes constructed with a valuation of \$116,100, while all permits totaled \$208,265; 1968 had 21 new homes with a valuation of \$234,500, while all permits totaled \$386,974.

Total of all permits since 1960 is \$3,180,209. Average cost of the 19 homes during 1970 was \$12,700, the same as the preceding year.

Another Big Year for ET Building

Another banner construction year was reported to the East Tawas Council Monday night when Supt. of Public Works Paul Roper submitted his annual resume of building permits issued for the preceding 12 months.

Total valuation of building permits issued during 1970 was \$662,500, as compared to \$523,073 during 1969.

While new home construction showed a decided drop during the past year, 19 in 1970 as compared to 28 the previous year, the American House project in the northeastern sector of the city brought in a building permit with an estimated valuation of \$300,000, or nearly half of the total for all categories.

This one building application is for a lodge and 30 duplex units which will provide private housing for retired persons.

Applications submitted for the 19 new homes have a total valuation of \$230,650, as compared to \$357,000 in this category in the preceding year.

Permits were issued for 11 new garages with a total valuation of \$22,137, as compared to \$7,800 in this category in 1969; 25 residential additions had a total valuation of \$46,600, as compared to \$22,200 in the category in 1969.

Fifty-six repairs and alterations amounted to \$26,164, as compared to \$30,458 the preceding year. Permits were issued for 12 tool sheds with a valuation of \$1,850, as compared to 14 tool sheds with a valuation of \$2,200 in 1969. Eight fence permits were issued with a valuation of \$1,949, as compared to 22 permits and a valuation of \$5,895 in this category in 1969.

Commercial additions were down considerably from a year ago. There were three permits issued with a total valuation of \$33,150, as compared to eight permits with a valuation of \$97,500 in 1969.

An analysis of construction during the past 10 years shows that seven new homes were constructed in 1960 at a total cost of \$87,500, with all construction, including commercial and additions, totaling \$150,735. The next year, 1961, saw 13 new homes at a valuation of \$113,400, with all permits totaling \$166,340; 1962 saw construction of

Former MSP Commander at East Tawas Retired Jan. 1

State Police Capt. James K. MacDonald, 55, commander of the first district at East Lansing since 1962, is retiring January 1 after completing more than 35 years of service. Lt. Col. Melvin G. Kaufman, director, reported.

During the past year, MacDonald's district command responsibilities were increased with the department's addition of a new post at Owosso and the establishment of a Lansing Capitol Complex Security Guard under supervision of the East Lansing post.

MacDonald joined the state police in 1935, first serving at Mt. Pleasant, East Lansing and East Tawas posts. He next was assigned in 1942 to the wartime special investigation squad, returning to the uniform division two years later as a trooper on transfer to Cheboygan.

When promoted to corporal in 1948, he was assigned to East Tawas. In the summer of 1950, he was temporary post commander at Bad Axe.

After advancement to sergeant in 1951, he served in order as

post commander at South Haven, East Tawas and Flint. In 1958, he was promoted to lieutenant and assistant commander of the first district at East Lansing. Three years later, he was advanced to captain rank and commander of the fourth district at Jackson. He returned to the first district at East Lansing as its commander in 1962.

During his state police career, MacDonald earned four citations for meritorious service for his efforts in manslaughter, theft and assault cases. His police work also earned him honorable mention on 11 other occasions.

MacDonald was born March 29, 1915, at Germfask in Schoolcraft County, Upper Peninsula. He attended school at Germfask and then attended Ferris State College at Big Rapids for two years.

He and his wife, Winifred, who lives in Lansing, have a son, James Jr.

Councils Study Biennial Election Option for Cities

City councils of both Tawas City and East Tawas have delayed action until January 18 to decide if the new biennial, odd-year November elections will be substituted for traditional annual spring elections.

Signed into law by Governor Milliken on December 22, city officials across the state were not aware of the new law until a bulletin from the Michigan Municipal League was received last week.

City councils must act through resolution by January 21 if a city wishes to retain its present election system. Those cities which do not exercise the option to retain the present election system would cancel February primaries and April general elections.

Under the new law, August 3 would automatically become the odd-year primary and November 2, the odd-year general election. An August primary and November general election for city offices would be held every two years thereafter in odd-numbered years. Council terms would be extended from two years to four years.

Mayors, clerks and treasurers would have a two-year term instead of one year.

Under the new law, council terms expiring in April 1971 would automatically be extended to January 1, 1972, with successors elected in November 1971 for four-year terms.

Council terms expiring in April 1972 would be extended to January 1, 1974, with successors named in November 1973 for four-year terms.

If a city initially exercises its option to override the new law and retain its present February primary and April general election, it may change to the new election system in the future by an ordinance adopted not less than seven months preceding the date of a regular city election.

Councils of both Tawas City and

East Tawas decided Monday night to study the matter further before taking any action.

Mayor John St. James of Tawas City said that provisions of the law were not entirely clear and invited the city charter commission and city planning commission to meet with the council in a special meeting next Monday night. City Atty. Kenneth Myles is to explain the new law at that time.

Jerry Cotter, chairman, and Hugo Keiser of the city charter commission attended Monday night's council meeting.

Some advantages of the new law would be that a biennial election would cut election costs in half. The four-year staggered terms would leave citizens with the opportunity to change three seats on a council every two years.

Blocked Roads Did Not Stop Iosco Law Officer

Deep snow and drifted roads proved to be no barrier Monday morning to Undersheriff Leon Putnam, who resides at the end of Partlo Road in Reno Township. All roads leading to M-65 in his area were blocked by snow. Putnam used his snowmobile to travel the four miles to Whittemore, where he was picked up by a sheriff's department patrol car and then transported to work at the jail in Tawas City.

Truck Driver Lost Foot in Accident

A 30-year-old Whittemore truck driver, Jack E. Graham, suffered the loss of his left foot above the ankle in a freak accident Tuesday morning.

Graham, who drives a truck for Graham Oil Company owned by his father, Edward, was delivering gasoline at the John St. James residence on Fifth Avenue in Tawas City.

He engaged the pump preparatory to filling St. James' fuel tank and, due to cold weather or ice, the power takeoff on the truck did not operate. Apparently, Graham kicked the pump with his foot and his boot or clothing was caught by a set screw on the power takeoff shaft. His ankle was immediately twisted around the shaft about three times before the truck engine stalled.

The trapped man's call for help was heard by Mrs. Clarence Oates, who resides across Fifth Avenue from the St. James residence. Chief of Police George Westcott was called to the scene and he im-

mediately notified Tawas Hospital to dispatch an ambulance and a doctor. Other police agencies and wreckers responded to give assistance.

Because the truck was loaded with gasoline and there was danger of fire, an acetylene torch could not be used to cut the shaft and free the victim. The foot was amputated by a physician just above the ankle and Graham was later transferred to Bay City General Hospital.

Graham was conscious and in shock throughout his ordeal. Westcott, who had been a fuel truck driver for 15 years prior to becoming a police chief, said it was a common practice during winter months for drivers to kick a power takeoff which was frozen. "I have done it many times," he stated.

During his high school days, Graham played guard on championship basketball teams of the Whittemore-Prescott Cardinals.

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Missionary Opens Conference at Baptist Church

He is currently a member of the Board of Baptist Mid-Missions, as well as Hiawatha Baptist Mission.

His opportunities of the past have also led him into the educational field. He is presently serving on the Board of the Grand Rapids Baptist Bible College and Seminary in Grand Rapids.

Doctor Matthews is a native of Rochester, New York, and was graduated from Moody Bible Institute in 1932. He pastored churches in Wyoming, New York; Florence, New Jersey; Norwich, New York; Toledo, Ohio; Petoskey, and Grand Rapids. Many radio ministries were conducted during those years.

In 1963, the Grand Rapids Baptist Bible College and Seminary conferred upon him the doctor of divinity degree. During 1966, he served on the staff of Biblical Evangelism. His present ministry takes him into churches, conferences and church-related colleges and seminaries from coast to coast. The accent of the ministry is based on the authority of the Bible as the verbally inspired Word of God and the only sufficient cure for men in the midst of the complex problems of a twentieth century world.

The public is invited to attend.



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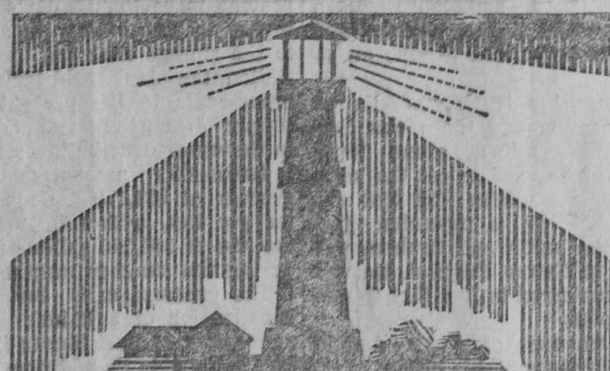

City of Tawas City

Ordinance No. 177 SNOWMOBILE ORDINANCE

An ordinance to regulate snowmobiles in the City of Tawas City. The City of Tawas City, Iosco County ordains:

Section 1. "DEFINITIONS." For the purpose of this ordinance, the following phrases, words and their derivations shall have the meaning given herein. When not inconsistent with the context, words used in the present tense include the future, words in the plural number include the singular number, and the words in singular number include the plural number. The word "shall" is always mandatory and not merely directory.

(a) "OPERATOR" means person who operates or is in actual physical control of the snowmobile.

(b) "OWNER" means any person, other than a leinholder, having property in or title to a snowmobile entitled to the use or possession thereof.

(c) "OPERATE" means to ride in or on and to control the operation of a snowmobile.

(d) "PERSON" means an individual, partnership, corporation, the State and any of its agencies or subdivisions, and any body of persons whether incorporated or not.

(e) "SNOWMOBILE" means any motorized vehicle designed for travel primarily on snow or ice and steered by wheels, skis or runners.

(f) "STREET" means the entire width between the boundary lines of every way publicly maintained when any part thereof is open to the use of the public for purposes of vehicular travel, including the shoulders and nonpaved areas thereof.

Section 2. REGISTRATION. No snowmobile shall be operated within the City of Tawas City, unless registered in accordance with the provisions of act 74 of 1968 of the public acts of the State of Michigan.

(a) Registration numbers must be displayed as required thereof.

(b) The certificate of registration shall accompany the vehicle and be made available for inspection upon demand by any peace officer.

Section 3. OPERATION ON CITY STREETS. No person shall operate a snowmobile on a city street in the City of Tawas City.

(a) At a speed greater than is reasonable and proper having due regard for conditions then existing and in no event in excess of ten (10) miles per hour.

(b) While under the influence of intoxicating liquor or narcotic drug, barbitol or any derivative of barbitol.

Section 6. No snowmobile shall be operated in the City of Tawas City.

(a) Unless it has at least one (1) headlight and one (1) tail light in operation at all times.

(b) Unless it has adequate brakes capable of producing deceleration at fourteen (14) feet per second on level ground at (20) miles per hour.

(c) Unless it is equipped with a muffler in good working condition in constant operation to prevent excessive or unusual noise.

Section 7. ACCIDENTS. The operator of a snowmobile involved in an accident resulting in injuries to or death of any person, or property damage of any property, or some person acting for him, or the owner of the snowmobile having knowledge of the accident, shall immediately by the quickest means of communication, notify the police department of the City, any officer of the Michigan State Police, the Sheriff or any deputy of the Iosco County Sheriff Department.

Section 8. DAMAGE TO PROPERTY OWNERS LIABILITY

(a) Any snowmobile operated within the City of Tawas City shall be presumed to be operated with the consent of the owner.

(b) The owner of a snowmobile may be held jointly and severally liable with the operator thereof for damages arising out of the negligent or improper operation of his snowmobile.

(c) The owner of a snowmobile may be held jointly and severally liable to a property owner for three (3) times the amount of damages to trees, shrubs, landscaping, or personal property occurring on private property and caused by said snowmobile where the snowmobile is operated without the consent of the property owner or his agent.

(d) Any snowmobile operated within the City of Tawas City by either licensed or an unlicensed minor, shall be presumed to be operated with the consent of the owner and said owner shall be held responsible for any violations and or any damage to another's property caused by the operation of the snowmobile while operated by said minor.

Section 9. PENALTIES FOR VIOLATIONS. Any person who violates the provisions of this ordinance is guilty of a misdemeanor.

(a) Shall upon conviction be punished by a fine of not more than \$100.00, or by imprisonment in the county jail, not to exceed ninety (90) days, or by both fine and imprisonment.

(b) May be confiscated and held for a period, not to exceed thirty (30) days.

(c) In the event a snowmobile is confiscated, the owner of the snowmobile must pay the costs of transportation, towing, and storage and prove ownership of the snowmobile before it will be released to him.

(d) On private property without the consent of the property owner or his agent.

(e) Between the hours of 10:00 P. M. and 6:00 A. M.

(f) In any parade or snofari unless specifically authorized by the Chief of police, with adequate safeguards for adequate and appropriate escort.

(g) No snowmobile shall be used to carry more persons than the number for which it was designed and equipped.

(h) No snowmobiles will be allowed to operate on US-23 from the south City limits to the north City limits and on any of the following streets, M-55 from US-23 west to Fifth Avenue.

(i) No snowmobile shall be operated within one block of any hospital.

(j) Without having on his or her person a valid motor vehicle operators license.

(k) On any sidewalk within the City limits.

A. Any person operating a snowmobile in the City of Tawas City shall:

1. Come to a complete stop at all intersections.
2. Travel as close to the right edge of the plowed area of the street as practical.
3. Obey all traffic signals, signs and devices.
4. Yield the right-of-way to all vehicular traffic and pedestrians.
5. Travel in single file when two or more snowmobiles are together.

Section 4. RECKLESS AND CARELESS OPERATION.

(a) Any person who operates a snowmobile upon a City Street or other place open to the general public in a willful or wanton disregard for the safety of persons or property, shall be guilty of reckless operation of a snowmobile.

(b) Any person who operates a snowmobile upon a City Street or other place open to the general public in a careless or negligent manner likely to endanger any person or property, shall be guilty of careless operation of a snowmobile.

Section 5. FAILURE TO STOP UPON POLICE SIGNAL.

(a) A driver of a snowmobile who is given by hand, voice, emergency light or siren, a visual or audible signal by a police officer, acting in the lawful performance of his duty, directing the driver to bring his snowmobile to a stop, and who willfully fails to obey such direction by increasing his speed, extinguishing his lights, or otherwise attempting to flee or elude the officer shall be punished upon conviction, as provided in section 9 of this ordinance.

The officer giving the signal must identify himself and a vehicle driven at night shall be adequately identified as a police vehicle.

Adopted January 4, 1970, by the city council to become effective 20 days after passage.

Michigan snowmobilers this season will again find facilities to put them on the "right track" at state forests, parks, and game areas shown on this map. Awaiting them at state forests in northern Michigan are 30 permanent trails which wind through about 700 miles of scenic backwoods country. For state park goers, there are 25 other snowmobile trails which will route powersledgers over 130 miles of outdoor splendor. Also in the offering are good-sized "scramble" tracts for snowmobilers at Porcupine Mountains State Park, Brighton Recreation Area, Dodge 4 State Park, Proud Lake Recreation Area, and Waterloo Recreation. When snow cover is deep enough (4 inches or more), snowmobilers may also scoot over 10 scramble sites covering about 20,600 acres in these state game areas: Allegan, Shiawassee River,

Dansville, Gourdneck, Minden City, Murphy Lake, and Rogue River. They will find 50 miles of marked trails at Barry, Shiawassee River, Flat River, Port Huron, and Rogue River state game areas. Powersledgers may gain more information on snowmobile trails at state forests and parks by obtaining free directories for those areas through the Department of Natural Resources' Publications Room in Lansing. They also may request free individual maps of state forest and state park trails through that same office. Those seeking individual maps of scramble areas and snowmobile trails at state game areas should contact the DNR's Wildlife Division in Lansing. Because of limited supplies, the DNR is urging snowmobilers to request maps for only those few particular areas in which they are really interested.

BEETS WITH HORSERADISH

1 can (2½ cups) sliced or diced beets	3 tablespoons lemon juice
1 tablespoon cornstarch	1 tablespoon margarine
¼ cup light brown sugar	1 tablespoon prepared horseradish
½ teaspoon salt	

Drain beets and reserve juice. Combine cornstarch, sugar, salt and lemon juice. Add beet juice and cook until thickened. Add margarine, horseradish and beets. Heat. Makes 4 servings.

WALNUT-MUSHROOM ASPARAGUS

4 small green onions, chopped	¼ cup toasted California walnuts
1 cup sliced fresh mushrooms or 1 (4 oz.) can mushrooms, drained	Salt to taste
3 tablespoons margarine	1½ pounds asparagus spears, cooked
1 tablespoon chopped pimiento	

Sauté onions and mushrooms in margarine until tender. Add pimiento, walnuts and salt to taste. Spoon over cooked asparagus spears that have been well drained.

GOLD FLECKED BEANS

1 can (1 lb.) green beans	2 tablespoons margarine
1 medium-size carrot	1 tablespoon lemon juice
¼ cup finely chopped onion	Salt and pepper to taste

Drain liquid from beans into saucepan; boil rapidly to evaporate to about ¼ cup. Pare and finely shred carrot. Add carrot and onion to liquid; boil about 5 minutes. Add beans, margarine and lemon juice; heat thoroughly. Season to taste with salt and pepper. Makes 4 servings.



ARTICHOKES AU GRATIN

2 pkgs. (9 oz.) quick-frozen artichoke hearts	½ cup flour
¼ cup margarine	½ cup artichoke liquid
Dash of pepper	1½ cups milk
¾ teaspoon salt	1 egg, slightly beaten
1 teaspoon onion salt	½ cup grated Swiss cheese
¼ teaspoon dry mustard	1 tablespoon bread crumbs
	Paprika

Cook artichoke hearts according to package directions. Drain, reserving ½ cup of liquid. Melt margarine in saucepan. Add pepper, salt, onion salt, mustard, and flour; stir until smooth. Gradually add artichoke liquid and milk, stirring constantly until thickened. Remove from heat, add egg and half the grated cheese. Stir until blended. Place cooked artichoke hearts in a single layer in a 9-inch square, shallow casserole. Cover with sauce. Sprinkle remaining cheese, bread crumbs, and paprika over top. Bake at 450 degrees for 15 minutes. Makes 4 to 5 servings.

ELEGANT CARROTS

6 medium-size carrots	½ cup cream
2 tablespoons margarine	1 egg yolk
¾ teaspoon salt	2 teaspoons lemon juice
1 teaspoon brown sugar	½ cup toasted California walnuts
½ cup chicken broth or water	

Pare carrots and cut them into slices or 2-inch sticks. Combine with margarine, salt, sugar and broth or water. Cover tightly and simmer until tender. Mix cream and egg yolk until blended; stir into carrots and the remaining cooking liquid. Heat, then blend in lemon juice and walnuts. Makes 6 servings.



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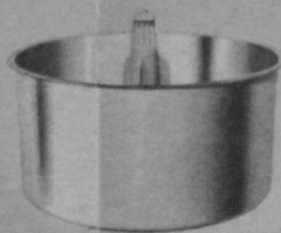
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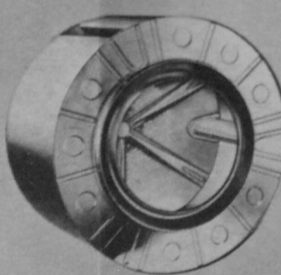
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BAKE BARS, SAVE TIME

Time is often at a premium in the lives of today's busy home-makers. Busy cooks find that bar cookies are great time-savers because they enable them to avoid successive baking called for with individual cookies such as the drop or cut-out types. We've included a number of versatile treats, perfect to serve with coffee, for snacks for your family or for that sweet ending to the meal. These bars all keep and travel well which makes them ideal to bake for gifts or bazaars. Many bar-type recipes, such as brownies, may be baked and then frozen for use at a later date. For ease in freezing, bake in foil-lined pans and when cool, slip the whole panful out. Wrap them securely in additional foil before storing in the freezer. It is best to cut them into bars after defrosting rather than before freezing.

SCOTCH PEBBLE BARS

- 2 cups flour
- 3/4 teaspoon salt
- 1 cup firmly-packed brown sugar
- 3/4 cup softened margarine
- 1 cup rolled oats

Combine flour and salt; set aside. Combine brown sugar and margarine; beat till creamy. Add flour mixture and rolled oats. Blend till mixture is well combined. Press into greased 15 x 10 x 1-inch pan. Bake at 350 degrees for 15 minutes. Meanwhile, prepare topping.

TOPPING:

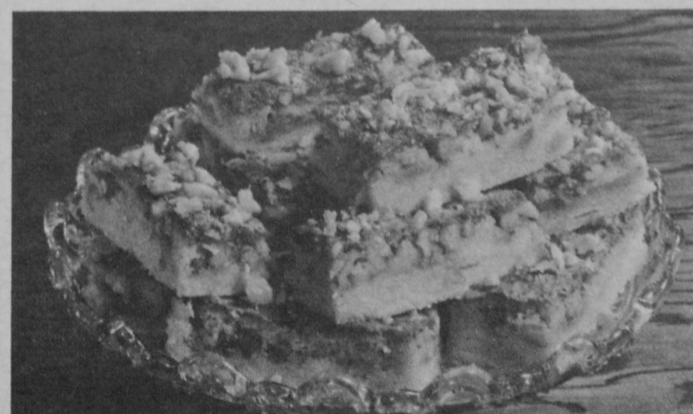
- 1 6-oz. pkg. Butterscotch morsels
- 1/4 cup corn syrup
- 2 tablespoons margarine
- 1 tablespoon water
- 1/4 teaspoon water
- 2 cups chopped California walnuts

Combine all ingredients except walnuts and stir over hot (not boiling) water till butterscotch melts and mixture is smooth. Add walnuts and stir to blend. Spoon over top of baked cookie mixture and spread evenly. Bake at 350 degrees for 15 minutes. Cut into 2 x 1-inch bars while warm. Makes 75 bars.

WALNUT BRICKLE BARS

- 1 1/4 cups sifted flour
- 1 cup granulated sugar
- 1/2 cup margarine
- 2 eggs
- 1/2 cup brown sugar, packed
- 2 tablespoons all-purpose flour
- 1 teaspoon baking powder
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 teaspoon mace or nutmeg
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 1 teaspoon grated orange peel
- 1 cup chopped California walnuts

Combine 1 1/4 cups flour with 1/2 cup sugar and margarine and blend to fine crumbs. Pack into bottom of greased 9-inch square baking pan. Bake at 350 degrees for 12 to 15 minutes, until edges are lightly browned. Beat eggs with remaining 1/2 cup granulated sugar and brown sugar until light. Combine the 2 tablespoons flour with baking powder, salt and spice. Blend into egg-sugar mixture, along with vanilla and orange peel. Stir in 3/4 cup walnuts. Turn into baking pan over hot baked layer, and sprinkle with remaining 1/4 cup walnuts. Bake about 20 minutes longer, until set on top and lightly browned. Cool in pan, and cut into bars.



FUDGE CAKE BROWNIES

3 oz. unsweetened chocolate	1 cup flour
½ cup margarine	¼ teaspoon salt
1 can Sweetened Condensed Milk	1 teaspoon vanilla extract
2 eggs	1 cup chopped California walnuts

In the top of double boiler over hot water, blend chocolate and margarine. Remove from heat; stir in sweetened condensed milk. Beat in eggs; one at a time. Combine flour, baking powder and salt. Gradually add to chocolate mixture; stirring well after each addition. Stir in vanilla. Fold in chopped nuts. Spread mixture in a well-greased 13 x 9 x 2-inch pan. Bake at 350 degrees for 25 to 30 minutes. Cool. Cut into squares. Makes 24 brownies.

CHOCOLATE MORSEL SQUARES

2 cups (about 24 crackers) firmly packed fine graham cracker crumbs	½ cup coarsely chopped walnuts
1 cup (6 oz. pkg.) semi-sweet chocolate morsels	1 can sweetened condensed milk

In large bowl, blend dry ingredients together. Stir in sweetened condensed milk. Turn into greased 8 x 8 x 2-inch pan, lined with wax paper or aluminum foil. Bake at 350 degrees for 40 minutes. Remove from pan immediately. Peel off paper. Cool on wire rack. Cut into squares. Makes 16, 2-inch squares.

APRICOT-COCONUT COOKIE BARS

½ cup softened margarine	1 can sweetened condensed milk
¼ cup sugar	1½ cups (3½ oz. can) flaked coconut
1½ cups flour	1 cup finely chopped dried apricots
½ teaspoon baking powder	
¼ teaspoon salt	
2 eggs, well beaten	

In Medium-size bowl, combine margarine, sugar and 1 cup flour. With pastry blender, cut ingredients together until mixture resembles coarse corn meal. Press pastry evenly on bottom and 1 inch up sides of greased 9-inch square baking pan. Bake at 350 degrees for 25 minutes. Remove from oven; set aside.

In a mixing bowl, combine baking powder, salt and remaining flour. Stir in eggs, sweetened condensed milk, coconut and apricots; mix well. Spread mixture evenly over baked pastry. Return to oven. Bake at 350 degrees for 35 minutes longer, or until top is firm. Cool in pan. Makes about 20 bars.



WALNUT RAISIN APPLESASSIES

½ cup margarine	½ teaspoon baking powder
½ cup unsweetened cocoa	½ teaspoon salt
1 cup granulated sugar	¼ teaspoon baking soda
2 eggs, beaten lightly	1 cup chopped California walnuts
¾ cup applesauce	½ cup seedless raisins
1 cup all-purpose flour	

Melt margarine. Add cocoa, and mix well. Stir in sugar, eggs and applesauce. Combine flour with baking powder, salt and soda. Stir into first mixture. Reserve about ¼ cup walnuts for top of bars. Stir remaining walnuts and raisins into batter. Turn into greased 9-inch square pan and sprinkle with reserved walnuts. Bake at 350 degrees for 25 to 30 minutes. Cool in pan. Cut into bars. Makes about 18 bars.

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BROWN SUGAR DROP COOKIES

1 egg	¼ tsp. soda
1 cup brown sugar, firmly packed	¼ tsp. salt
1 tsp. vanilla	1½ cups Diamond Walnuts, chopped medium fine.
½ cup unsifted all-purpose flour	

In small mixer bowl beat egg till it is light and fluffy (about 3 min. at high speed).

Add sugar and vanilla and stir till smooth. Quickly stir in flour, soda and salt. Blend in walnuts chopped medium fine. By teaspoonfuls, drop onto greased and floured cookie sheet 2 inches apart. Bake at 350° F., 7-9 min. Or just till cookies start to brown at edge. Do not overbake. Remove immediately to cooling rack. Makes about 4 dozen 2-inch cookies.

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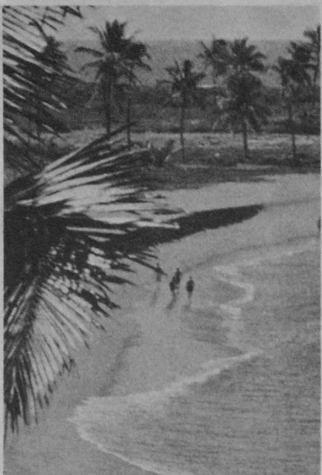
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GRASSROOTS GLEANINGS by Bill Stokes
