treatment of waste water. The city has been notified by the Michigan

Water Resources Commission that all existing waste discharges will be required to provide facilities for the removal of phosphorus compounds by June 1, 1977. The commission will also require secondary treatment of plant effluents in the near future to reduce suspended solids and oxygen demand of the waste.

Under the plan developed by Spicer Engineering, the existing plant designed to serve a population of 4,250 would remain in service. Chemicals for phosphate removal would be added to the effluent and this would be pumped to an aerated lagoon. The lagoon discharge would be returned to the Tawas River, but not before a 32day detention time.

Preliminary estimated cost of this project, not including land purchase, is \$175,000. Communities which qualify under the Michigan Water Resources Commission point system for grants for waste treatment may receive 55 percent of the cost of the treatment facil-

The Saginaw firm, which also serves as East Tawas' engineering consultant, studied the feasibility of conveying waste from Tawas City to East Tawas' new plant for treatment. Since secondary treatment and phosphate removal is now required, it will be necessary for East Tawas to add these facilities to its plant in the very near future. If the waste of the two cities is combined, the East Tawas plant would have to be expanded to serve an additional 4,250 persons when secondary treatment is

Ordinance No. 177 SNOWMOBILE ORDINANCE

City of Tawas City

An ordinance to regulate snowmobiles in the City of Tawas City. The City of Tawas City, Iosco County ordains:

Section 1. "DEFINITIONS." For the purpose of this ordinance, the following phrases, words and their derivations shall have the meaning given herein. When not inconsistent with the context, words used in the present tense include the future, words in the plural number include the singular number, and the words in singular number include the plural number. The word "shall' always mandatory and not merely directory.

Section 2. REGISTRATION. No snowmobile shall be operated within the City of Tawas City, unless registered in accordance with the provisions of act 74 of 1968 of the public acts of the State of Michigan.



- 1 can (2½ cups) sliced or diced beets
- 1 tablespoon cornstarch
- 1/4 cup light brown sugar
- ½ teaspoon salt
- Drain beets and reserve juice. Combine cornstarch, sugar, salt and lemon juice. Add beet juice and cook until thickened. Add margarine, horseradish and beets. Heat. Makes 4 servings.

WALNUT-MUSHROOM ASPARAGUS

- 4 small green onions, chopped 1 cup sliced fresh mushrooms or 1 (4 oz.) can mushrooms, drained
 - 1/4 cup toasted California walnuts Salt to taste 11/2 pounds asparagus spears,
- 3 tablespoons margarine
- 1 tablespoon chopped pimiento

Sauté onions and mushrooms in margarine until tender. Add pimiento, walnuts and salt to taste. Spoon over cooked asparagus spears that have been well drained.

GOLD FLECKED BEANS

- 1 can (1 lb.) green beans 1 medium-size carrot 1/4 cup finely chopped onion
- 2 tablespoons margarine 1 tablespoon lemon juice Salt and pepper to taste

3 tablespoons lemon juice 1 tablespoon margarine

1 tablespoon prepared horse-radish

Drain liquid from beans into saucepan; boil rapidly to evaporate to about 1/4 cup. Pare and finely shred carrot. Add carrot and onion to liquid; boil about 5 minutes. Add beans, margarine and lemon juice; heat thoroughly. Season to taste with salt and pepper. Makes 4 servings.



ARTICHOKES AU GRATIN

- 2 pkgs. (9 oz.) quick-frozen artichoke hearts
- 1/4 cup margarine Dash of pepper 3/4 teaspoon salt
- 1 teaspoon onion salt 1/4 teaspoon dry mustard
- 1/3 cup flour ½ cup artichoke liquid 1½ cups milk
- 1 egg, slightly beaten 1/2 cup grated Swiss cheese 1 tablespoon bread crumbs

Paprika Cook artichoke hearts according to package directions. Drain, reserving 1/2 cup of liquid. Melt margarine in saucepan. Add pepper, salt, onion salt, mustard, and flour; stir until smooth. 




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BAKE BARS, SAVE TIME

By Betty Curren

Time is often at a premium in the lives of today's busy homemakers. Busy cooks find that bar cookies are great time-savers because they enable them to avoid successive baking called for with individual cookies such as the drop or cut-out types. We've included a number of versatile treats, perfect to serve with coffee, for snacks for your family or for that sweet ending to the meal. These bars all keep and travel well which makes them ideal to bake for gifts or bazaars. Many bar-type recipes, such as brownies, may be baked and then frozen for use at a later date. For ease in freezing, bake in foil-lined pans and when cool, slip the whole panful out. Wrap them securely in additional foil before storing in the freezer. It is best to cut them into bars after defrosting rather than before freezing.

SCOTCH PEBBLE BARS

2 cups flour 3/4 teaspoon salt 3/4 cup softened margarine 1 cup rolled oats

1 cup firmly-packed brown

Combine flour and salt; set aside. Combine brown sugar and margarine; beat till creamy. Add flour mixture and rolled oats. Blend till mixture is well combined. Press into greased 15 \times 10 \times 1-inch pan. Bake at 350 degrees for 15 minutes. Meanwhile, prepare topping.

TOPPING:

1 6-oz. pkg. Butterscotch

1 tablespoon water

1/4 cup corn syrup 2 tablespoons margarine

1/4 teaspoon water 2 cups chopped California walnuts

Combine all ingredients except walnuts and stir over hot (not boiling) water till butterscotch melts and mixture is smooth. Add walnuts and stir to blend. Spoon over top of baked cookie mixture and spread evenly. Bake at 350 degrees for 15 minutes. Cut into 2 × 1-inch bars while warm. Makes 75 bars.

WALNUT BRICKLE BARS

11/4 cups sifted flour 1 cup granuated sugar

1/2 cup margarine


½ cup brown sugar, packed

1/2 teaspoon salt 1/3 teaspoon mace or nutmeg

1 teaspoon vanilla

1 teaspoon grated orange peel 1 cup chopped California

1 teaspoon baking powder Combine 11/4 cups flour with 1/2 cup sugar and margarine and blend to fine crumbs. Pack into bottom of greased 9-inch square baking pan. Bake at 350 degrees for 12 to 15 minutes, until edges are lightly browned. Beat eggs with remaining ½ cup granulated sugar and brown sugar until light. Combine the 2 tablespoons flour with baking powder, salt and spice. Blend into egg-sugar mixture, along with vanilla and orange peel. Stir in ¾ cup walnuts. Turn into baking pan over hot baked layer, and sprinkle with remaining 1/4 cup walnuts. Bake about 20 minutes longer, until set on top and lightly browned. Cool in pan, and cut into bars.



FUDGE CAKE BROWNIES

- 3 oz. unsweetened chocolate ½ cup margarine
- 1 can Sweetened Condensed
- 1/4 teaspoon salt

1 cup flour

1 teaspoon vanilla extract 1 cup chopped California

In the top of double boiler over hot water, blend chocolate and margarine. Remove from heat; stir in sweetened condensed milk. Beat in eggs; one at a time. Combine flour, baking powder and salt. Gradually add to chocolate mixture; stirring well after each addition. Stir in vanilla. Fold in chopped nuts. Spread mixture in a well-greased 13 × 9 × 2-inch pan. Bake at 350 degrees for 25 to 30 minutes. Cool. Cut into squares. Makes 24 brownies.

CHOCOLATE MORSEL SQUARES

- 2 cups (about 24 crackers) firmly packed fine graham cracker crumbs
- 1 cup (6 oz. pkg.) semi-sweet chocolate morsels
- ½ cup coarsely chopped
- 1 can sweetened condensed

In large bowl, blend dry ingredients together. Stir in sweetened condensed milk. Turn into greased 8 \times 8 \times 2-inch pan, lined with wax paper or aluminum foil. Bake at 350 degrees for 40 minutes. Remove from pan immediately. Peel off paper. Cool on wire rack. Cut into squares. Makes 16, 2-inch squares.

APRICOT-COCONUT COOKIE BARS

- 1/2 cup softened margarine 1/4 cup sugar
- 11/3 cups flour
- 1/2 teaspoon baking powder
- 1/4 teaspoon salt 2 eggs, well beaten
- 1 can sweetened condensed
- 11/3 cups (31/2 oz. can) flaked
 - 1 cup finely chopped dried apricots

In Medium-size bowl, combine margarine, sugar and 1 cup flour. With pastry blender, cut ingredients together until mixture resembles coarse corn meal. Press pastry evenly on bottom and 1 inch up sides of greased 9-inch square baking pan. Bake at 350 degrees for 25 minutes. Remove from oven; set aside.

In a mixing bowl, combine baking powder, salt and remaining flour. Stir in eggs, sweetened condensed milk, coconut and apricots; mix well. Spread mixture evenly over baked pastry. Return to oven. Bake at 350 degrees for 35 minutes longer, or until top is firm. Cool in pan. Makes about 20 bars.



WALNUT RAISIN APPLESASSIES

- ½ cup margarine
- 1/3 cup unsweetened cocoa
- 1 cup granulated sugar 2 eggs, beaten lightly
- 3/3 cup applesauce
- 1 cup all-purpose flour
- 1/2 teaspoon baking powder 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 teaspoon baking soda 1 cup chopped California
- 1/2 cup seedless raisins

Melt margarine. Add cocoa, and mix well. Stir in sugar, eggs and applesauce. Combine flour with baking powder, salt and soda. Stir into first mixture. Reserve about 1/4 cup walnuts for top of bars. Stir remaining walnuts and raisins into batter. Turn into greased 9-inch square pan and sprinkle with reserved walnuts. Bake at 350 degrees for 25 to 30 minutes. Cool in pan. Cut into bars. Makes about 18 bars.

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
