

Friday Deadline for Registration of Young Voters

Clerks of Tawas City and East Tawas reported Monday that new voters between the ages of 18 and 20 were not exactly flocking to their offices to register for two important upcoming elections.

Fred Lomas, city clerk at East Tawas, said that as of Monday, only 19 out of possibly 200 potentially new voters in this age group had registered. In Tawas City, Clerk Walter C. Nelson's records indicate that only nine new voters in this age group had registered.

By virtue of ratification of the 26th amendment to the United States Constitution, 18-year olds across the country won the right to vote in all elections. In Michigan, these new voters, along with others, have until 5:00 p. m., Friday, July 16, to register with township or city clerks.

Important elections are to be held next month at which these new voters will have the opportunity to cast their first ballots. The state primary election is scheduled for Tuesday, August 3, while Tawas Area School will hold a millage election on Thursday, August 19, and Hale Area School will vote on a millage proposition Monday, August 16.

Tawas City's primary election to name candidates for city offices in the November general election should be one of the hottest contested elections in years with three candidates for mayor and contests for three seats on the city council.

Featuring the ballot will be the race for mayor. John B. St. James, incumbent, is being opposed by Mildred M. DeBeau and Eugene Salamony.

Races for alderman seats are as follows:

First Ward—Clark Tanner, incumbent, is being opposed by Robert A. Erickson; Second Ward—Chester Smyczynski and Thomas Knight are

Harvey Rasch Again Named HA President

Hale Board of Education met Monday, July 12, for its annual reorganizational meeting. Teacher contracts for the 1971-72 school year were signed and are to be sent to the teachers within the week.

Gordon Fleming of Flint advised the board on investment of school bond money for construction of the new junior and senior high school. Bonds were purchased by Halsey, Stewart and Company.

Supt. Paul Keene reported that the final details of the purchase of a 35-acre site for the new school have been completed. Bid will be submitted in August and construction is to begin in early September.

Last Ditch Stand for Tawas Area

Millage Proposal Being Resubmitted to Voters

"With a per pupil cost of \$638.18, one of the lowest in the state last year, I think we are doing a pretty good job of controlling the purse strings," stated Robert W. Elliott, president of Tawas Area Board of Education, as steps were taken Monday night to resubmit a two-year, 7½-mill operational tax proposal to district voters on Thursday, August 19.

This will be a last ditch stand for the board of education, the district and its school children—unless the millage proposal is successful, school will be held as long as possible with funds available—possibly eight weeks—and then school doors will be closed.

This 7½-mill package—renewal of an operational tax of 4½ mills which expired last year, plus three additional mills—will do little more than maintain the present operational status of the school district. Reason for this is the five percent and higher inflationary trend on necessary

items and services to operate the school.

Because of this inflation, Tawas Area School District was forced to expend its treasury balance of \$26,000 and dip into future funds by borrowing \$44,000 against delinquent taxes. In other words, half of the extra three mills being requested would replace the \$70,000 being expended over actual receipts.

With a district valuation of \$47,218,465, Tawas Area School District was eighth from the bottom of 527 school districts in the state last year in total taxes levied. The district is also in an enviable position of having excellent school buildings and a low debt retirement tax due to this high valuation.

As the district approaches a second millage election, a number of people have suggested that the school cut "frills" from the program and thus lower millage.

"We don't have any frills in our curriculum—in fact, we lack finances

At a meeting held July 7 at Lansing, attended by two members of the board of education and the superintendent, it was learned that

Tawas Area School is one of 30 in the state facing a critical shortage of funds without a successful millage election in June.

Tawas A. School to Sell Tax Notes July 29

Sale of \$95,000 in tax anticipation notes is to be held July 29, 8:00 p. m., by Tawas Area Board of Education.

The above funds, coupled with state aid money, are necessary to operate the school prior to collection of local taxes.

Supt. Reynold Mick announced at Monday night's board of education meeting that the district ended the 1970-71 school year with a cash deficit of \$35,000, with \$44,000 still owed to teachers on salaries for last year.

Tawas Area School had a per pupil expenditure of \$606.79 in 1970-71 and its budget calls for an expenditure of \$638.18 under the 1971-72 budget. The only money available at present is \$206.54 per child from the school's share of nine mills allocated from the 15-mill limitation.

Of schools represented at the meeting, Tawas Area had the lowest per pupil cost for either 1970-71 or in new budgets. Per pupil costs of other schools ranged from \$735 at Lake Shore to \$1,200 at East Lansing.

The state requires that schools operate 180 days and that 900 hours of instruction be offered to each student. It was the consensus of districts present to hold school as long as possible with funds available, then to close doors and notify the Michigan Department of Education of the closing.

Band, as it is presented at Tawas Area School, runs about the same cost per pupil as any other subject. No money would be saved if band was eliminated, because of the 900-hour factor required for each student.

"If we wish to save money by cutting classes that are small, including advanced mathematics, advanced shorthand, advanced French and physics, academic standards of the school regress," stated Supt. Reynold Mick.

No savings can be made by deleting portions of the school program. Reduced expenditures can only be gained by increasing class sizes and denying the students individual attention, stated Mick.

"I don't see how we can cut anything from our program—if the schools do not operate, it will be the kids who will suffer—not me," stated Elliott.

Some 700 less votes were recorded in the election last June than turned out at the successful millage election two years ago. An analysis of voters indicates that a large percentage of that 700 were parents with children in school. The board of education is hoping to convince these parents that they should register and vote on August 19.

Seven Acres of Jackpine Burned Sunday in Wilber

Seven acres of jackpine forest land were burned over in Huron National Forest Sunday afternoon south of Gray Creek before being brought under control by fire fighters from the United States Forest Service's Tawas Ranger District.

The district has had two or three other small fires this season and Tawas District Ranger Myron Smith warns all persons using Huron National Forest to exercise extreme caution with campfires.

The hot, dry weather has dried out the low shrubs and grasses so they easily carry fire to the heavier fuels. In the last four weeks, only 1.78 inches of rain has fallen at Silver Creek Station and .93 inches of it fell on June 14.

Thomas Wilson, timber staff assistant for the Tawas Ranger District, said that an eight-man crew brought the fire under control in about an hour and a half. AuSable-Oscoda Township Fire Department was on a standby basis but was not called.

"We knew the forest was dry due to the current drought, but this fire was an eye opener—it rambled fast," said Wilson. Fire fighters remained in the area Monday to prevent a possible reoccurrence.

Cabin Burglaries—Motor Thefts Investigated

Two cabin burglaries and a rash of outboard motor thefts are under investigation by Isosco Sheriff's Department.

Items including a generator, an engine and household articles valued at \$423 were stolen from a cottage in Plainfield Township owned by J. R. Hughes of Tawas City.

A cottage owned by Charles Dunn of Detroit, located at Sand Lake, was ransacked and a quantity of beer and liquor stolen. An outboard motor was stolen from the garage.

Five outboard motors were stolen July 7 from boats at the Round Lake campground. Owners included Leon Webb, Sylvania, Ohio, three-horsepower motor; Gene Kanauss, Toledo, Ohio, five-horsepower; Richard Wells, Linwood, five-horsepower; Allan Muhltner, St. Clair, 5½-horsepower; Walter Knowlton, Saginaw, 2½-horsepower.

All the above cases are still under investigation by sheriff's officers.

High School Rooms Again at Full Capacity

Nearly 100 percent utilization of all classrooms at Tawas Area High School is again in the offering for the 1971-72 school term—the same as last year.

Prin. John Alexander noted at Monday night's board of education meeting that only two classrooms would be vacant during two periods a day.

Alexander said that in addition, 18 eight o'clock classes had been scheduled for the next term. Besides high school classes, several junior high classes are included.

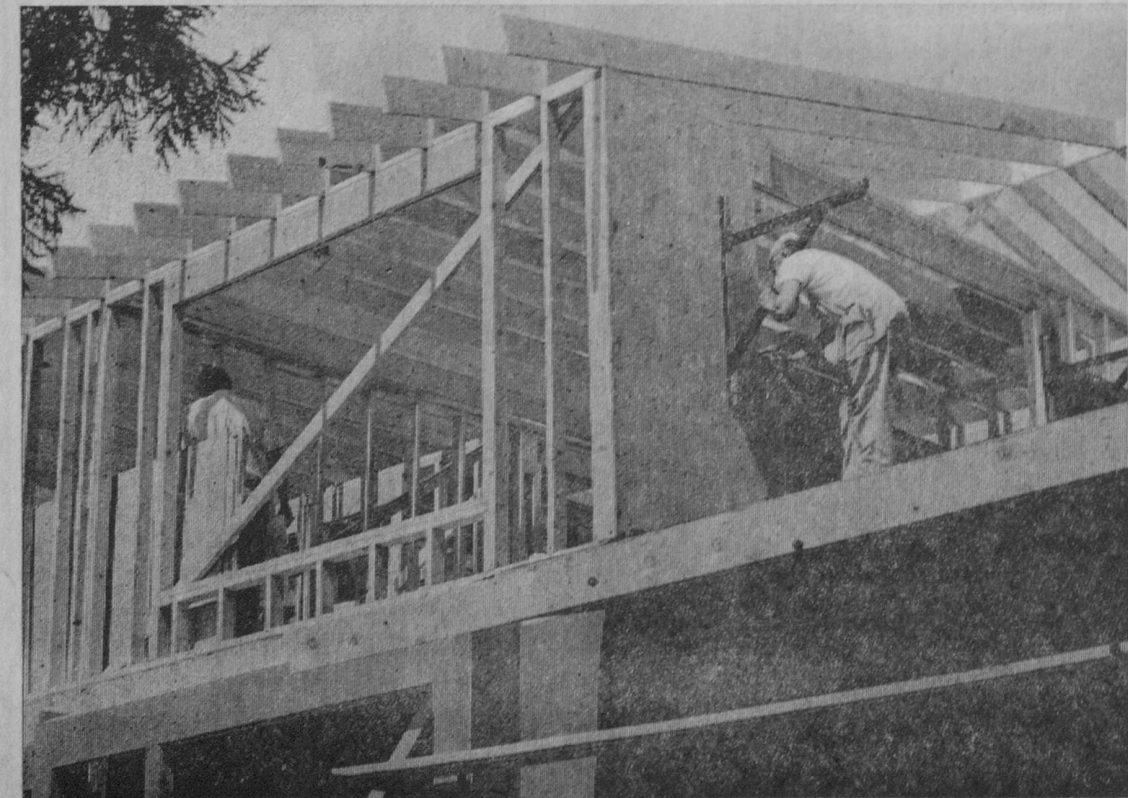
Record Year for Home Building

The 1971 construction season should go down on record as one of the most spectacular in Tawas City's history.

In reviewing building applications at the mid-year point, Reginald Bublitz, superintendent of public works, said Tuesday that new home construction—including finishes on homes started last year—had a total valuation of \$474,500.

A total of 23 new homes have either been finished, started, or permits issued for construction during the past year. The five homes mentioned above as being completed this year were constructed by DeShano Builders in North Park Acres with a total valuation of \$96,000.

As one local real estate agent put it Tuesday, the state health department is cracking down on the construction in the inland lakes area because of the lack of adequate sewer and water facilities. "Tawas City is in a good position because it constructed its major sewer and water facilities at a time when costs were low and subsequent taxes remain low. Taxes for financing new water and sewer facilities in many areas of the state are becoming prohibitive," he stated.

Other activities in North Park Acres includes five new homes being constructed by Rodarte Builders, Incorporated, Saginaw, with a total valuation of \$118,000. Other homes being constructed there are by Eckstein Construction Company, \$24,500, and Lyle Felske, \$20,000.

Donald Karcher of Oscoda has constructed five modular-type homes on Third Avenue with a valuation of \$101,000 and has a building application for one new home on Elms Avenue at a cost of \$15,000.

Other homes constructed included two by George Myles on Fourth Street with a total valuation of \$30,000.

Two homes in other parts of the city under construction are by Jerry Cotter on Bay Drive, \$40,000, and Carl Steinhurst, Fifth Avenue, \$13,000.

One reason, apparently, for some of this home construction is the fact that persons moving to the north country are looking for lots in communities with the advantages of city water and sewer facilities, as well as natural gas. Building lots in Tawas City are now becoming scarce.

In addition to home construction, Bublitz reported that 23 permits had been issued for home remodeling, three new garages, eight commercial or industrial additions and two new commercial buildings.

Bublitz was particularly impressed by the home remodeling permits. "I think this is a very healthy indication for any community," he stated.

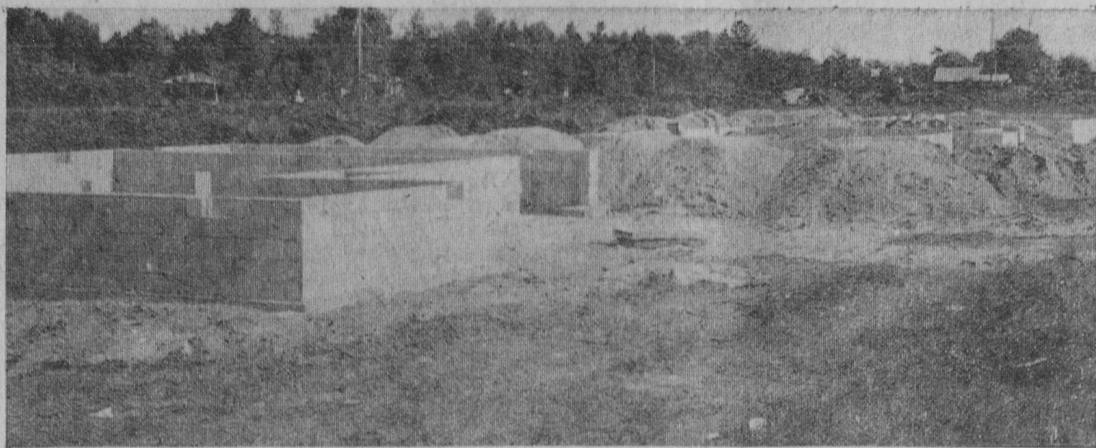

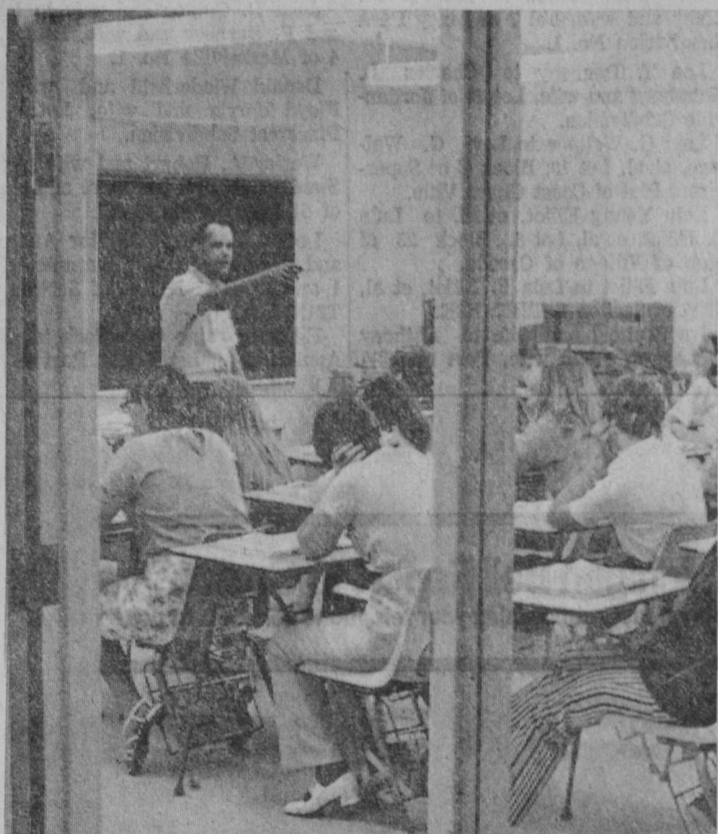

AN IMPORTANT SERVICE provided by Tawas Area School each summer is the driver education program which is conducted in cooperation with the state. About 140 students are enrolled in four classes being given this summer. Because of the limited number of instructors this year, only students nearing their 16th birthday are able to participate. The students are required to successfully pass 40 hours of classroom instruction and a minimum of six hours behind the wheel. Upon completion of the final test, which requires a score of 70 percent or better, the student is issued a certificate enabling him to obtain a permit from the state allowing him to operate an automobile under parental guidance until the age of 16. Students who do not successfully pass the test must wait until their 18th birthday before the state will issue a driver's license. Instructors at Tawas Area School include Robert Ericksen, Ted Guthard and Herman Rollin.

Traffic Accidents Killer of Children

With traffic accidents the leading cause of death among children, District Health Department No. 2 reminds families with young children that special car safety is needed to protect them. Dr. William F. Jackson stated that about 1,000 children under the age of four are killed each year as passengers in automobiles, with many more permanently disabled.

It has been shown, the doctor said, that the inside of the car is safer than outside in a crash, since those who are ejected from cars have only pavement or hard ground on which to impact and risk having a car roll over them. Consequently, seat belts provide a safety factor in at least keeping passengers inside a car.

For children, however, seat belts may not be appropriate. A child's size may make it impossible to adjust belts properly across his hips. He can slide under a belt, causing it to be around his neck or abdomen, giving rise to a dangerous condition in the event of sudden stops.

Mother's lap is also not considered a safe place during a crash, said Doctor Jackson. A child can be crushed between his mother and the inside of the car. Should she be wearing a seat restraint, a child could be torn from her arms during a collision. And, the doctor pointed out, a seat belt should not be used to restrain both mother and child since the weight of an adult pressing against a child from behind could cause extremely serious injuries.

Doctor Jackson recommends that a special car seat be obtained that meets new federal motor vehicle safety standards which came into effect April 1. The doctor pointed out there are still some seats on the market which do not meet the requirements and he urged parents to discuss the purchase with knowledgeable sales people before buying.

Some of the things to look for in a child's car seat include a head restraint to prevent whiplash-type neck injuries, a harness that restrains the child over several parts of the body, such as shoulders and lap, and a means of securely attaching a seat to the car. It was emphasized that because of the various types of seats

and harnesses available, parents must be sure they know how to properly use the types they buy for maximum safety.

Doctor Jackson also listed additional safety tips. He recommends older children sit on a firm cushion and have a standard lap belt positioned across hips so that it does not ride up. He also pointed out that children should not be allowed to travel unrestrained in the cargo area of a station wagon or truck, or have luggage or other items close to where they are riding. He recommends that all doors be locked to help keep them from coming open in the event of a crash, and that windows be lowered no more than absolutely necessary, pointing out that an open tailgate window on a station wagon could admit dangerous carbon monoxide fumes.

Doctor Jackson reminded parents that it takes only seconds to secure their children safely in an automobile, probably less time than it takes to put on snowsuits and boots. And, while no device can guarantee 100 percent protection, children who are safely secured to the car structure stand the best chance of surviving a collision with minimal injury.
