The state primary election is scheduled for Tuesday, August 3, while Tawas Area School will hold a millage election on Thursday, August 19, and Hale Area School will vote on a millage proposition Monday, August 16.



AN IMPORTANT SERVICE provided by Tawas Area School each summer is the driver education program which is conducted in cooperation with the state. About 140 students are enrolled in four classes being given this summer. Because of the limited number of instructors this year, only students nearing their 16th birthday are able to participate. The students are required to successfully pass 40 hours of classroom instruction and a minimum of six hours behind the wheel.
