## Fireworks Spectacular

### Iosco Crowded Over Holiday; Few Accidents

Iosco County highways escaped the fatalities which marred the July Fourth holiday week-end in the nation, but one person was seriously injured Sunday afternoon at the M-55-US-23 intersection in Tawas City.

Mrs. Mary Lue Troxell, 28, Pinconning, was given emergency treatment at Tawas Hospital and then transferred to Saginaw for a skull fracture and hip injury received when she fell out of a car driven by her husband, Larry D., 30.

Troxell told East Tawas Police Chief Donald Docking that as he started his car through the intersection, his wife opened the door and fell to the pavement. The accident is still under investigation.

Another accident in the area Sunday afternoon saw a nine-year-old Au Gres youth rushed to Tawas Hospital and then transferred to Mercy Hospital, Bay City, for a fractured skull.

Michigan State Police said that William D. Christian ran into the path of a car driven by Delbert E. Schrader, 48, Au Gres, near the intersection of US-23 and Hammel Beach Road. Witnesses said that the driver could have done nothing to avoid the accident and he was not held.

State police reported that officers had investigated 10 personal injury accidents involving motorcycles on private property since Wednesday.

Police were busy investigating a rash of breakings and enterings. Two burglaries under investigation by state police were on South Sand Lake Road. John Jemine of Warren reported that an outboard motor, radio, motorcycle shield and fishing tackle valued at \$1,000 were stolen from his cabin. A rifle was stolen from the Albert Tob cabin.

Iosco County Sheriff's Department answered numerous complaints over the week-end, two concerning motorcycle operators riding in the nude at Foote Dam and Cooke Dam, as well as the beating of an individual at the Gordon Creek Campground in Huron National Forest, which was again packed by nearly 2,000 young people.

The sheriff's department is investigating the theft of 38 stereo tapes from a car owned by Mark Ruthruff of Hale on Sunday. Ruthruff was playing in a dance band at the

Plainfield Township Hall when the tapes were stolen from his car.

Two other burglaries included the theft of two outboard motors from Hale Hardware. Officers said that a 75-horsepower motor was stolen from a boat on display at the hardware and thieves cut through a chain link fence to steal a 40-horsepower motor from a warehouse.

A cottage owned by Charles Dunn of Detroit, located in Grant Township, was burglarized some time prior to July 3. Entrance was gained by forcing open a window.

The entire county was jammed with vacationers and all parks were filled to overflowing. "No Vacancy" signs were out at most resorts and motels by Friday.

Tawas Chamber of Commerce enjoyed perfect weather conditions for the annual fireworks display held this year at the Tawas City Park. Thousands of spectators jammed both Tawas City and East Tawas to witness an outstanding display. Police said that while traffic was heavy on US-23 and M-55 following the show, no accidents were reported.

One fire call was answered in Tawas Township by the Tawas City Fire Department. A fire spotting plane saw smoke from a burning cabin northeast of McArdle Road, but the fire department could not reach the area because of closed gates on private property.

State, county and city refuse trucks were busy Tuesday morning picking up huge stacks of plastic garbage containers at various parks in the area.

## Right to Vote

### 18-Year-Olds Must Register by July 16

Eighteen-year-olds across the country won the right to vote in all elections June 30 when the Ohio Legislature ratified the 26th amendment to the United States Constitution, thus becoming the 38th state to do so.

One of the first responsibilities of these new voters is to register with city and township clerks in order to participate.

A very important decision in the future of Tawas Area School will be decided August 19. This new group of voters will be unable to voice an opinion unless they register with township or city clerks by 5:00 p. m., Friday, July 16.

A person who had registered in one township or city within Tawas Area School District and moved to another township or city within the school district prior to July 6, should reregister in his place of residence prior to July 16.

Any person who is 18 years of age, is a citizen of the United States and has resided in the district 30 days prior to the August 19 election may become a registered voter.

### Attend 26th Annual Confab of Kiwanis

Dr. John LeClair, Dr. Larry Kelly, John Alexander and Albert H. Buch, all of the Tawas Kiwanis Club, attended the 26th Annual Convention of Kiwanis International in San Francisco, California. Approximately 16,000 people—Kiwanians and their families were on hand for the event. They represented some 270,000 Kiwanians in 5,700 clubs in the United States, Canada, Mexico, Europe, Central and South America, the Caribbean, the Far East and the Southwest Pacific area. This was the third time that San Francisco had hosted the Kiwanis convention.

Official business of the convention included the election of a president, president-elect, two vice presidents, a treasurer and six trustees for 1970-71; recognition of the clubs and districts throughout the organization adjudged outstanding in community service and work, and the adoption of amendments to the constitution and the passage of resolutions.

The convention also featured a president's reception and ball; Kiwanis district banquets; entertainment by Phil Ford and Mimi Hines; George Gobel; George Beverly Shea, gospel singer; a ladies entertainment program including a fashion show by I. Maginn and Company, and tours, outings and a dance for the children attending the convention.

Two young Tawas men are among five persons being detained in Cuba while their 75-foot yacht, which went aground on a reef outside Cuba's coast and towed in by a Cuban craft, is undergoing repairs.

Charles Conn, 19, and his brother, Barry, 17, sons of Alice Bingner of Ann Arbor and Kenneth Conn of East Tawas, are crew members aboard the yacht captained by Thomas Caulfield, who with his wife, Mina, owns the boat. Their son, Thomas, was also aboard.

According to a letter from Mrs. Bingner, the Caulfields are from Berkeley, California, and had sailed to Grand Cayman, where they left May 27, going first to Port Royal, Jamaica, from which they set sail during the week of June 7 for Cape Cod, Massachusetts, where they intended to visit Mrs. Caulfield's

## President Signed New Bill City Seeks APW Money for Sewer

Investigation into the possibility of obtaining federal assistance for the city's proposed sewage expansion program is to be made by Tawas City Council.

In a letter read at Tuesday night's holiday-delayed council meeting, Edmunds Engineering Company, Bay City, the city's engineering consultant, reported that President Nixon had signed into law on June 17 an accelerated public works program.

Edmunds recommended that the city immediately contact Cong. Elford A. Cederberg and inform him of the city's plans to make a secondary treatment addition to its sewage disposal plant as well as facilities for phosphate removal.

The council authorized a letter to be sent to Cederberg notifying him of this proposed project.

Preliminary estimates of the

project, not including land purchase, place the cost at \$200,000. Communities which qualify under the Michigan Water Resources Commission point system for grants for waste treatment may receive 55 percent of the cost for such facilities.

A second program considered earlier this year, but tabled in April, included a water storage facility and additions to the city's water distribution system costing about \$180,000.

In other business, Police Chief Elmer Grandt presented his monthly report. He was authorized to prepare specifications for advertising for bids on a 1972 patrol car.

The council approved an appropriation of \$100 to the Tawas Chamber of Commerce for the Michigan Tourist Festival in August.

Supt. of Public Works Reginald Bublitz reported that to date, no word had been received from the city's road contractor for the 1971 street program. Bublitz said he expected that work on streets, as announced two weeks ago, would start around the first week in August.

## Extra Land Donated to Park

Tawas City has received title to a 54 by 70-foot parcel of land donated for park expansion by Carl B. Babcock Jr.

This land, located behind Iosco Abstract Office, was not included in the transaction several years ago which saw the city purchase additional land for park expansion.

Babcock had appeared before the council at its June 21 meeting to announce this donation.

## Seed Analysis Supervisor Plays Important Role in Crop Growing

The laboratory may not be the place for every woman, but it is home to Mrs. Leta Thompson, seed analysis supervisor for the Michigan Crop Improvement Association. Working as a member of the state's official seed certification agency, she and her feminine staff make daily decisions that can mean thousands of dollars to over 450 Michigan certified seed growers.

"The tests we perform," says Mrs. Thompson, "are what ultimately determine whether the crop examined can be sold as certified seed." Only when a crop meets the purity standards, freedom from disease and recommended germination levels established by the Michigan Department of Agriculture, Michigan State University and the Michigan Crop Improvement Association, can it demand the premium price that farmers are willing to pay.

Although crops are seasonal, the job of a seed technologist is pretty much year around. According to Mrs. Thompson, there are peak periods when a bulk of the required testing is done. "From the first of November to early June is when most of our work is done," she said, adding that August 1 to mid-September is another busy period.

Every kind of crop that is to be certified passes through the MCIA laboratory, located on the campus of Michigan State University. Oats, wheat, navy beans, colored beans, barley, corn and potatoes account for most of the traffic. According to Mrs. Thompson, from 2,600 to 3,000 samples are tested and either certified or turned down each year.

When asked if she experienced any problems in her role as a "woman" expert in a field that seems to be dominated primarily by men, she could not recall any major difficulties. According to Mrs. Thompson, this type of job is often performed by women. She estimated that perhaps 50 percent of all seed analysts are women.

"Training for this type of work," said Mrs. Thompson, "is pretty much on the job—you sort of learn by doing." She carries with her nine years of full time experience, plus two summer stints in the State of Michigan Seed Laboratory.

Advanced training is also available at several major universities. During the last two years, Mrs. Thompson has attended seed technology short courses at Purdue and Iowa State Universities. "These sessions," she said, "enable us to learn about new techniques and developments that can help to improve our efficiency and shorten the waiting period for seed certification."

Currently under study is a process she observed at Purdue University which could help to determine germination levels within a matter of hours. Called the Tetrazolium Method, this new way of testing could make 24-hour test results possible. This compares with the present waiting period of around seven days. This could save growers from hundreds to thousands of dollars by eliminating the need to stall eager buyers for a week or more until a crop is certified. "Fewer customers will be lost because they can not afford to wait," she noted.

As a laboratory supervisor, Mrs. Thompson is responsible for the training of her assistants. "It takes about a year, working with all the types of crops that we handle, to learn the job fully," she said. After two years with MCIA, she has trained one full time and another part time assistant, both former housewives.

Mrs. Thompson was raised on a farm near Ravenna and now resides at Portland with her husband, Marion. Since all four of their children are grown up and away from home, her after work hours are pretty evenly divided between husband and housework.

## 25 Million Persons Visited State's Roadside Facilities

At least 25 million persons—almost three times Michigan's population—visited roadside facilities maintained by the Michigan Department of State Highways last year.

"The almost incredible total is a conservative figure," said Jack Burton, chief forester in charge of design and development of state highway roadside facilities.

Attendance estimates based on actual traffic counts and known rest area use patterns were made for 57 freeway rest areas and 103 roadside parks. An actual count of 875,000 visitors at nine travel information centers, was taken by travel counselors. Not included in the counts were visitors at 30 state highway scenic overlooks, 1,000 roadside picnic table sites and three freeway rest areas opened in 1970.

While not available for overnight camping, highway roadside parks and rest areas are open around the clock seven days a week. Parks and rest areas are furnished with toilets, water, picnic tables and outdoor cooking facilities. "Considering tourism is one of the state's top industries, the 25 million figure is no surprise," Burton said.

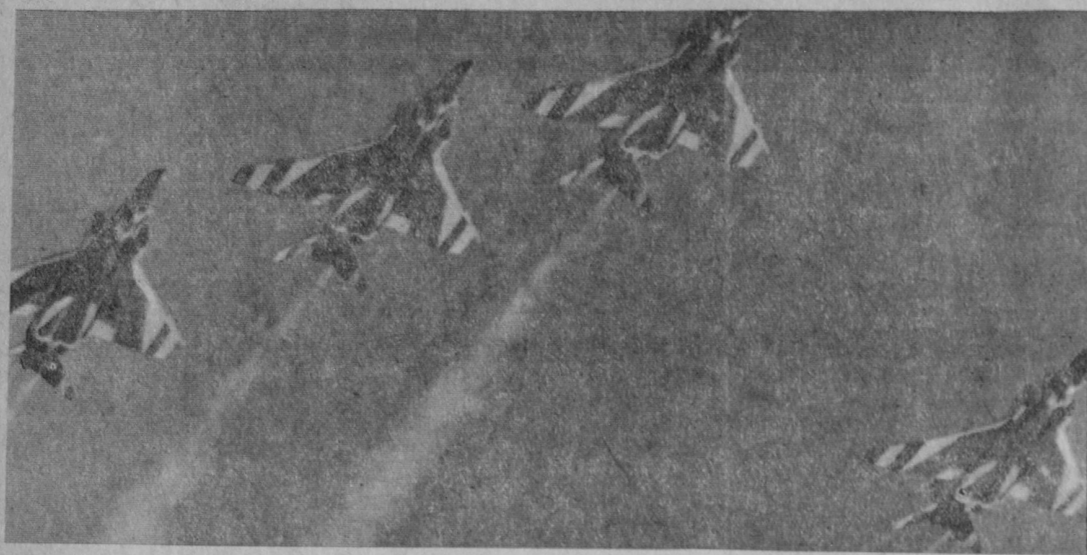

## Guest Editorial—

# 'Please be Brutal to My Son'

One of the most common phrases heard in our society and our city today is "police brutality." Perhaps I don't understand the meaning, but I would like to give you one mother's viewpoint on this subject.

To begin, I should first tell you that I have two teen-age sons, and being a mother, I cannot help but want the very best of everything for them. I am a "typical mother" in that I don't want to see them hurt by anyone. I am not a typical mother, for I see things many mothers never hear of, much less become involved in, because my husband is a minister and we see the very best and the sordid worst.

I would like for you to be brutal with my sons. Is that a surprise?

If you find them speeding a car, please be brutal. I have sat at a hospital holding a grieving mother's hand because of someone's mistake. That was brutal. I have gone with my husband to tell a wife her husband was killed. That was brutal. I have helped nurse a beautiful teen-age girl crippled in a wreck. That was brutal. I have played organ music at funeral services for babies, teen-agers and adults because someone drove too fast. That was brutal.

If you should catch my under-age sons with liquor in their possession, please be brutal.

I have sat all night by my husband's side trying to help piece together two under-age young men's lives, both broken by drinking. That was brutal. I have listened to horrors experienced by another man while he was drunk and heard him recall the many

jails he had served time in for this. That was brutal. I have helped feed hungry children because a drunken father didn't come home. That was brutal. I have tried to console a mother whose daughter was killed after being struck by a drunken driver. That was brutal.

If you should find my sons with drugs in their possession, please be brutal.

I have tried to help rehabilitate a woman just out of prison for shooting her husband while she was drugged. That was brutal. I have seen a handsome young man turn into an old ugly one because of drugs. That was brutal. I have seen a young mother, who was addicted to a drug, scream and rave for lack of a "fix." That was brutal.

If you find my sons committing any kind of immoral act or carrying any pornographic materials, please be brutal. I have listened to the sad cry of a young girl who was pregnant but not married. That was brutal. I have been present when a boy and girl broke the news to their parents that they had to marry. That was brutal. I have tried to comfort a mother whose beautiful daughter was criminally raped. That was brutal. I have seen a promising young man with a brilliant future have to give it up and, too young, assume the responsibilities of a wife and baby. That was brutal.

If you ever see my sons taking something that isn't theirs or willfully destroying property, please be brutal. I have walked into a hushed sacred church that was stripped of everything that could be

sold. That was brutal. I have seen a lovely, expensive home and yard completely torn up by vandals. That was brutal. I have wiped a little boy's tears and helped him hunt for his stolen bicycle. That was brutal.

If you should ever catch my sons doing anything illegal, please be brutal. I have come to realize that your kind of "brutality" cannot in any way compare with the brutality that comes from breaking our laws. My husband and I have tried to teach our sons that their rights end where someone else's begin. We believe they have learned this lesson; but in case they forget, we look to you and others who influence their lives—teachers, coaches, etc.—to see that they remember. And if you must be brutal to remind them, then please, please be brutal!

I do not want my two sons to grow into two grown-up boys. I want them to become men, able to assume their places in this world and make a good contribution to it. I sincerely hope they won't need your help, but if they do, and if you must, then be brutal.

**Editors Note**—This guest editorial, carried in a recent issue of Florida Funeral Director, was written by the wife of a minister, after a member of the minister's congregation, a law enforcement officer, had been accused of police brutality.

This article was carried recently in the Clearwater (Florida) Sun and was submitted by Mrs. H. Read Smith, a winter resident there.

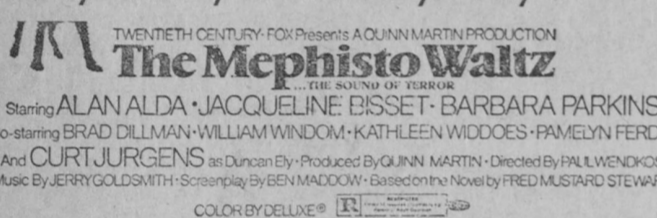

## King Crab Enhances Casserole



Give a special touch to an everyday favorite, macaroni and cheese, by adding the elegant flavor of Alaska King crab. The result is a delicious casserole to serve at a supper or buffet. | 2 cups elbow macaroni  | 1 cup dairy sour cream         |
| 3 tablespoons butter   | 3 tablespoons minced onion     |
| 3 tablespoons flour  | 1 cup grated Swiss cheese      |
| 1 teaspoon salt  | 1 cup grated Cheddar cheese    |
| ½ teaspoon dry mustard   | 3 tablespoons dry bread crumbs |

Drain and slice crab. Melt butter in medium M. M. tin. Stir in flour and mustard. Slowly add milk. Cook, stirring over medium heat until thickened. Remove from heat. Fold in sour cream, onion, Swiss cheese and all but ¼ cup Cheddar cheese. Add crab and macaroni. Place in baking dish. Sprinkle with remaining ¼ cup cheese mixed with crumbs. Bake at 375° for 20 to 30 minutes or until bubbly and golden. Makes 6 servings.

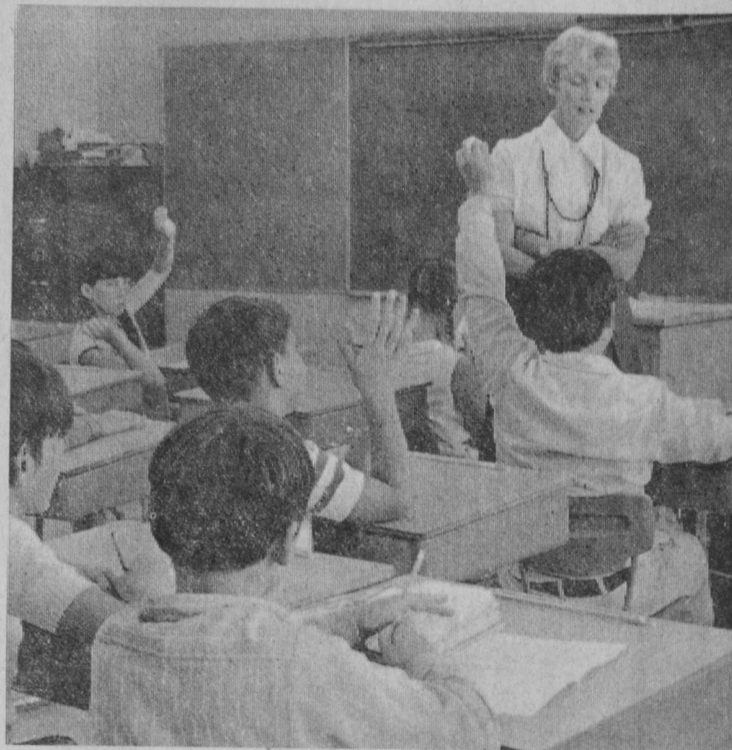

**Six-Week Title I Program Reaches Mid Point at TC Elementary Unit**

Reaching the mid point of its six-week summer education program this week is the Title I project of Tawas Area Schools being conducted at the Tawas City Elementary Unit.

Robert H. Crawford, federal programs director for Tawas Area Schools, said last week that this year's summer project probably would be the last one offered by this district due to a change in purposes and objective of Title I projects at the state and federal levels.

Hereafter, money received under this program is to be utilized in the year around educational program,

which has as its objectives the raising of achievement levels in the basic skills of children. Youngsters taking part this year are in grades one through six, while the new program will be concentrated on grades one through three.

Instruction this summer is being stressed in language arts, especially reading skills, as well as mathematical computation.

"Every project of a school district funded under Title I seeks to improve children's attitudes toward themselves, their schools and their education in general, as well as to meet the primary purpose of raising

their achievement levels," said Crawford.

Involved in this year's \$28,000 project are seven classroom teachers and eight student teachers from Central Michigan University.

Teachers handling instruction in reading include Mrs. Barbara Cuthbertson and Mrs. R. J. Cooke. Larry Larson and John Shaver have charge of the concentrated course in mathematics, while Mrs. Elizabeth Bielby is handling the science program. Miss Burnetta Miller has charge of the library and John Walton is art instructor.

In addition to this concentrated in-

struction for the 111 children involved, the program offers physical education, health and recreation.

Crawford said that each teacher has charge of instructing an average of 12 children, which gives the opportunity for much individual attention in areas needed by each individual student.

The federal program director said that the children participate in these half-day school sessions with great enthusiasm. "We can hardly get them to leave the school building during the break period—they are so interested in learning that they hate to leave the classrooms," said Crawford.

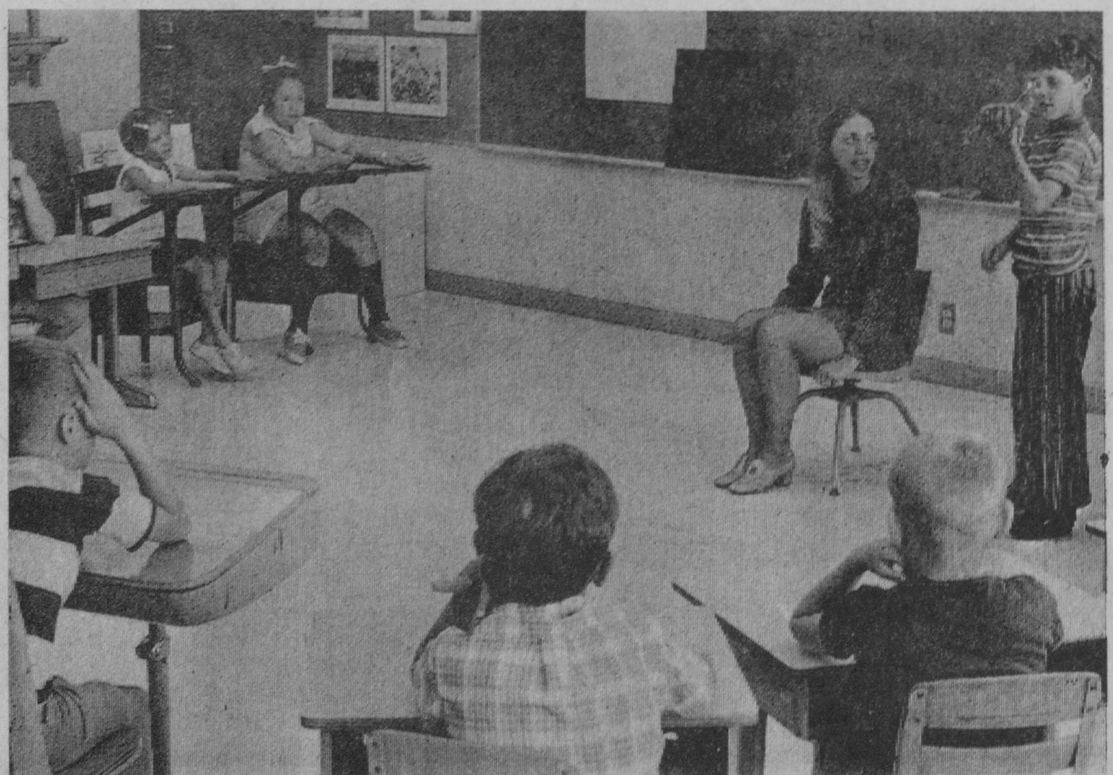
The director said he did not entirely agree with the new state and federal philosophy which will see abandonment of summer programs in favor of year around instruction. He believes that instructional problems of smaller school districts are quite different from schools in metropolitan areas where there are concentrated numbers of educationally disadvantaged children.

"We have been very encouraged with the results of past summer programs conducted by this district and are positive that the 1971 program will be one of the best ever offered here," he stated.

Greater parental involvement is being stressed this year through an advisory committee. Parents are to meet July 14 with Crawford and members of his staff to set a date for an open house to be held at the school during this summer's program.

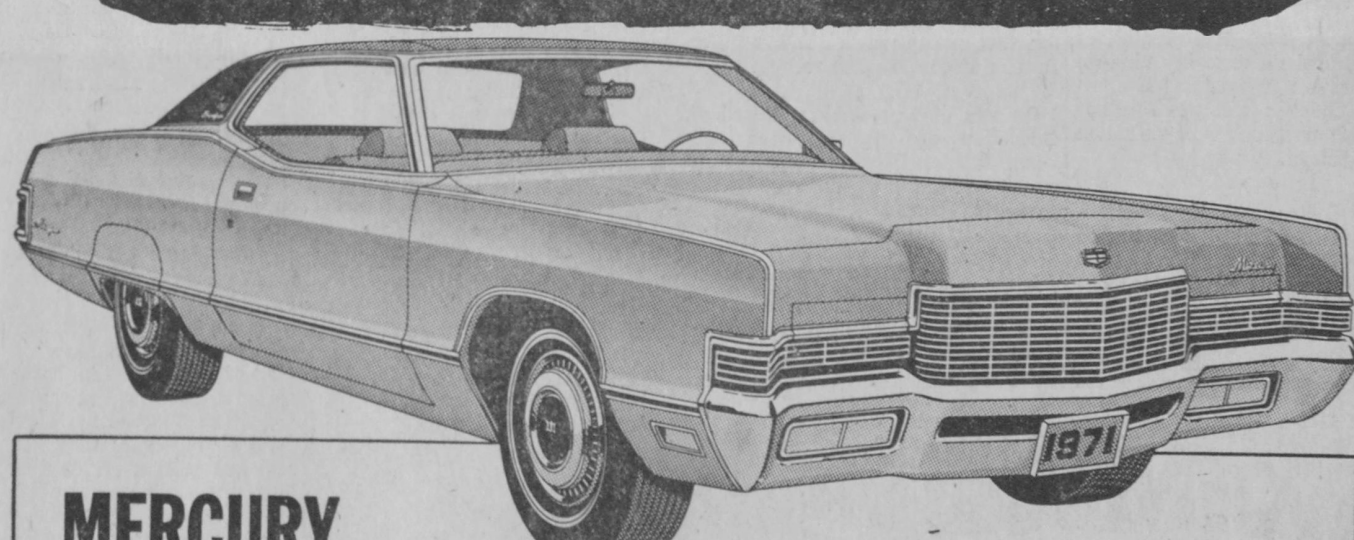

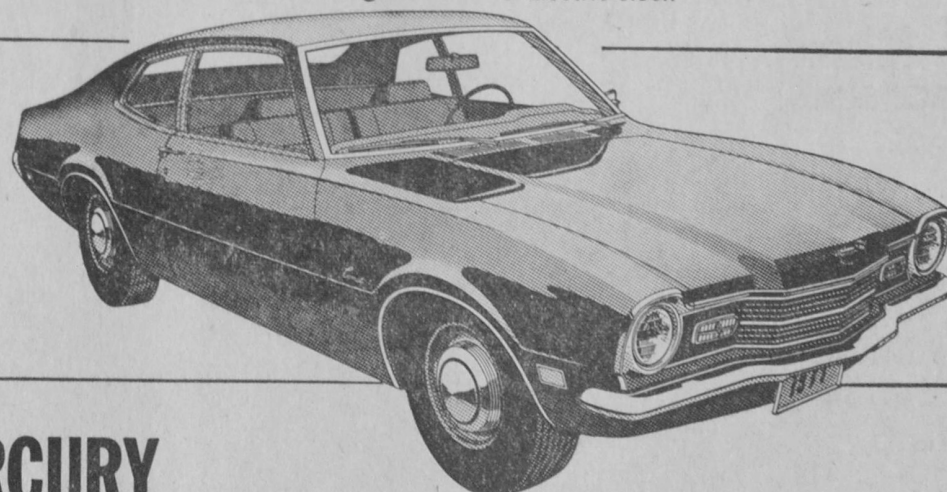

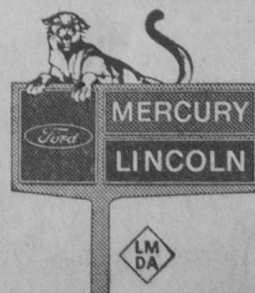

### Answer Questions on Social Security

Question: My 67-year-old husband had surgery for a slipped disc. He will be able to come home, but the doctor says he will need to use a wheelchair. Will Medicare help pay for a wheelchair?

Answer: Yes. The medical insurance part of Medicare does help pay for the rental or purchase of such durable medical equipment as a wheelchair when the equipment is prescribed by a doctor. Whether your husband decides to purchase or rent the equipment, Medicare generally makes monthly payments and these payments are 80 percent of the reasonable rental charge.

Question: My mother, who lives in another state, was hospitalized while visiting me. Will Medicare help pay for the ambulance service needed to take her over 100 miles back to her own home?

Answer: No. Your mother's medical insurance can only help pay for ambulance service within the locality normally served by the hospital.

Question: I have been getting monthly social security disability benefits for the past two years. A friend of mine has offered me a part-time job. I am not sure I could do this type of work, but I would like to try it. Would I lose my disability benefits if I take it?

Answer: No. Under the social se-

curity law, disability beneficiaries who work despite severe handicaps can continue to be paid their monthly benefits while they are testing their ability to work. However, if you should start to work, be sure to notify your social security office.

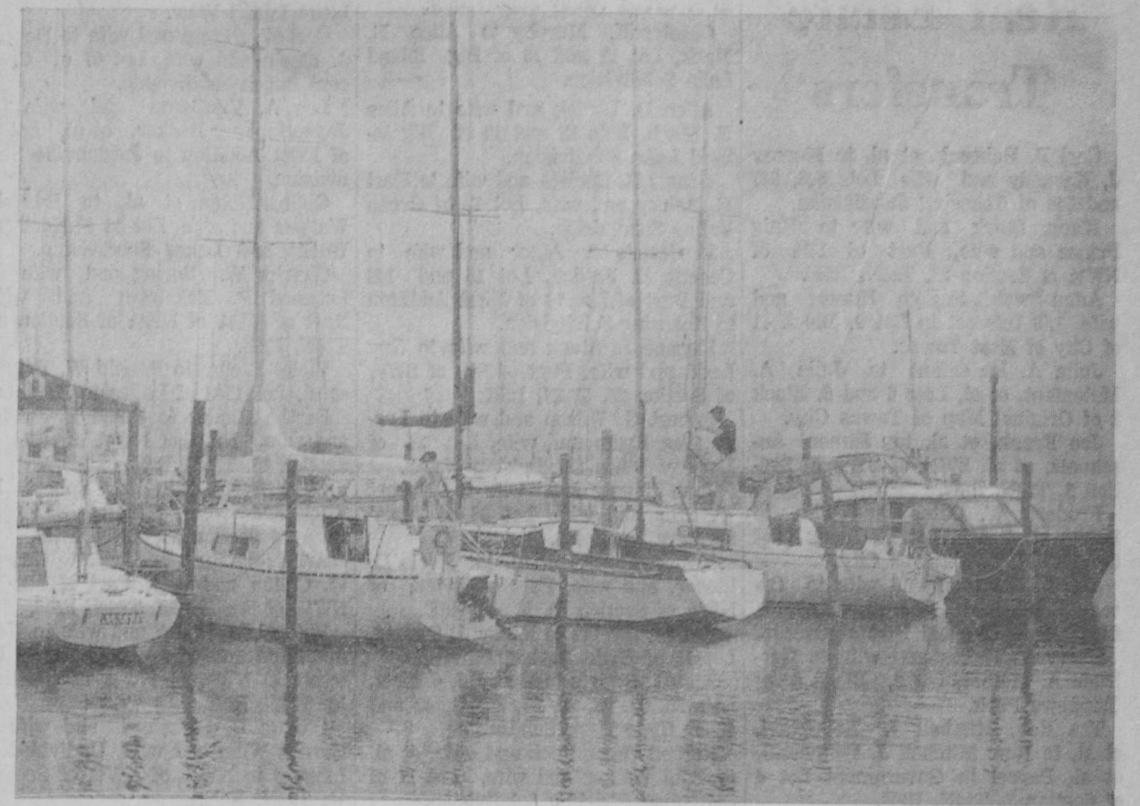
