

# Coast Guard Auxiliary Educates Boaters in Safe Procedures

"Rather than enforcing laws, our organization is interested in educating the public in safe boating operation in order that all may comply with state and federal laws."

Speaking was Capt. Fred Hoppmann, a B-32 navigator and radar man from Wurtsmith Air Force Base, who has charge of courtesy boat inspection for Oscoda Coast Guard Auxiliary Flotilla 14-16.

Hoppmann and members of the flotilla were conducting courtesy boat inspections Saturday morning on VanEtan Lake, then moved to the AuSable River mouth in the afternoon.

There are more than 300 small power boats registered by personnel of the air base and eight boats were inspected Saturday morning, which gives some idea of the time involved in this project.

Multiply this figure by hundreds of boats in the area from Standish to Harrisville covered by the flotilla and the amount of work being conducted by this 21-member group is apparent. The organization draws its membership from communities between the two above mentioned communities.

Importance of this work was stressed by Hoppmann, who pointed out that Michigan was second in the nation in the number of boats registered and third in the number of accidents and fatalities involving boats. This state follows California and Texas in accidents, which have year around small boat operations,

whereas Michigan's boating season is six months or less.

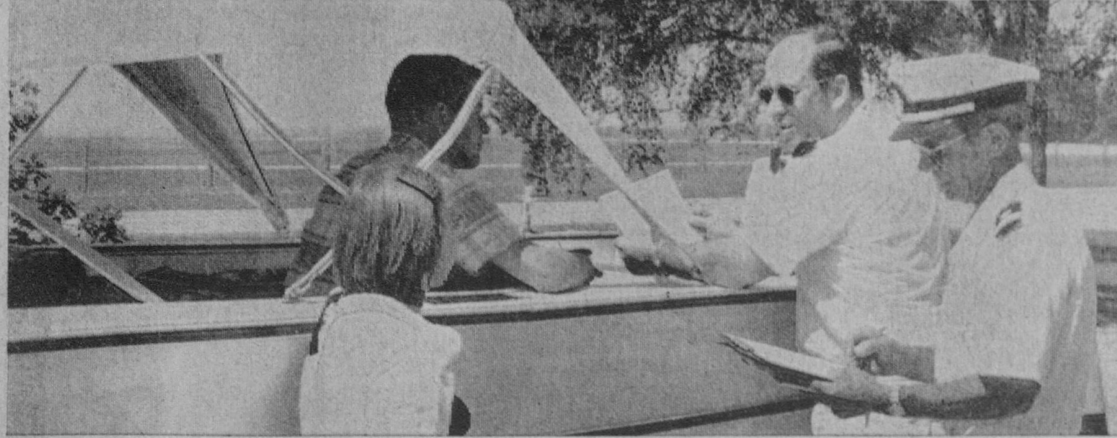
"Our small boat inspectors try to educate the public in the need for safe boat handling during these inspections and the need for safety devices required by federal laws," said Hoppmann. "Forty percent of the fatal accidents result in boats less than 16 feet in length and with a motor of less than 10 horsepower." Flotilla members, during their 25 to 40-minute inspection of each boat, check control devices designed to prevent flashback on cruiser engines, inspect boats to see if proper ventilation is provided in engine compartments, and probably most important, check to see if each boat is equipped with proper life saving devices. In addition, boats are checked for state registration numbers and required federal information.

"People are becoming more conscious about the need for accident prevention and show great interest in

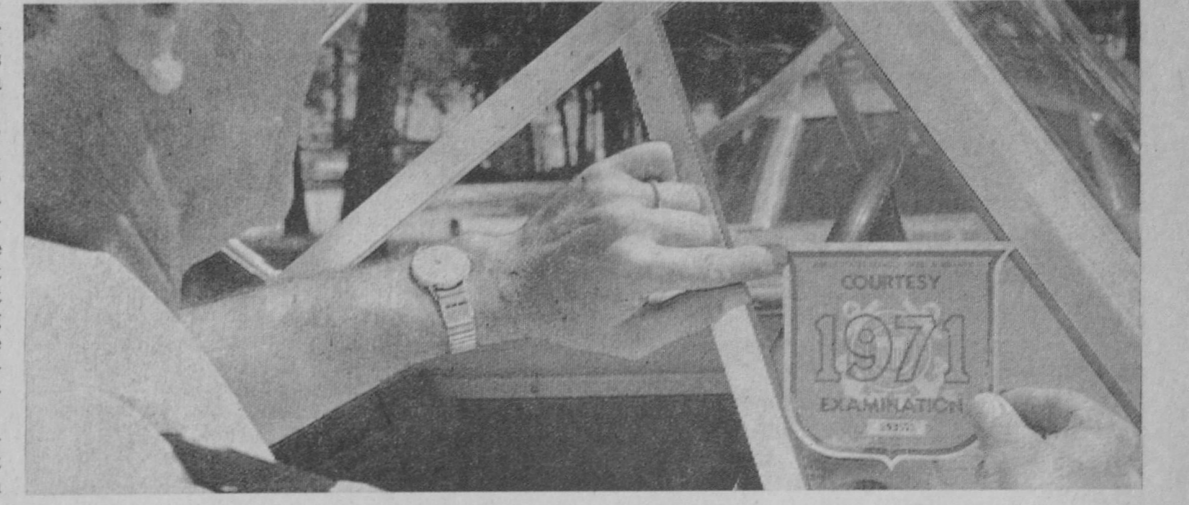
our work," said Hoppmann. "But our word of safety must reach fishermen and hunters in the small boat class, who are actually responsible for most of the fatalities."

Bayard Gum, flotilla commander, said Saturday that another project of this organization was conducting safe boating classes for youngsters.

"We graduated 35 young boat operators in the 12 to 16-year age group two months ago after a five-lesson course," said Gum, who is a member of the Oscoda Area School faculty.

## Body Recovered at Foote Dam Pond

The body of a 23-year-old Flint man, who disappeared Sunday afternoon at the Foote Dam swimming area on the AuSable River near Oscoda, was found Monday morning.

Dead is Edwin Durance, whose body was located by skin divers from the Oscoda-AuSable Fire Department.

Investigating officers from Iosco Sheriff's Department said that Durance had been accompanied to the swimming area by Ronald Green Jr. of Wilber Township.

Green told officers that, as he waded out into the water, Durance had commented that the water was cold and for Green to continue on as he was going to take his time in entering the water.

Later, Green turned around and could not locate Durance. At first, he believed that his companion had

walked away from the area and did not consider the possibility of his drowning until the next morning, when he notified the sheriff's department at 6:45 a. m.

Assuming Durance had gone into nearby Foote Site Village, Green searched the area during the night.

Sheriff's department officers, with assistance from Oscoda Township Police, started a search at 7:30 a. m. Skin divers from the fire department joined the search shortly after 11:00 a. m. and located the body within minutes. Police said the body was found within 10 feet from the point where Durance was last seen by Green.

E. D. Jacques, Iosco County coroner, was called to the scene and ruled that death was caused by drowning.

## Impossible to Operate Without Added Funds

# School to Resubmit Millage Question

Faced with the impossible task of financing school operation on less than half of the funds provided last year, Tawas Area Board of Education is calling for a second millage vote to be held Thursday, August 19.

This will be the last time a proposition could be submitted to voters prior to the start of the next school year and, unless it is successful, the school situation here will be chaotic.

The school's nine-mill allocation from the 15 mills split with the county and township would raise approximately \$423,000, or about one-third of the anticipated 1971-72 budget. With loss of state aid, this would mean that the school could only operate about 10 weeks.

Actual millage to be submitted to voters on August 19 is to be determined at a meeting of the board of education on July 19. It is not expected to be less than the 7 1/2-mill proposal which was defeated by voters at the June 14 election.

The previous proposal asked renewal of 4 1/2 mills which had been approved two years ago and expired this year plus an added three mills to cover the cost of inflation.

A proposal to build an addition to the Tawas City Elementary Unit and to convert this facility into a middle school is not expected to be resubmitted to voters at this election. This proposal, defeated by about 200 votes, would have required an additional tax of 94 cents per thousand dollars of valuation.

Added to its financial problems, the school faces a loss of accreditation by the University of Michigan Bureau of School Services unless recommendations following a recent inspection are met. The school has been approved on a tentative basis for one year, rather than the normal four-year period.

Tawas Area School has been accredited with this bureau since reorganization and schools at both Tawas City and East Tawas had been accredited since the 1930s.

A report from this bureau dated June 2 revealed that significant violations occur in five of the 12 accredited standards.

Among the several different kinds of violations in the curriculum standards were: 1. No vocal music program in later elementary or high school level; 2. No cooperative, distributive or work experience programs; 3. No exploratory or enrichment programs for the seventh and eighth grade students in homemaking, industrial arts, art. The proposed middle school was designed to remedy the latter deficiency.

The report also criticized the overcrowding in classrooms and over-size classes. "Obviously, the class sizes indicate the need for more teachers to adequately staff the existing program," stated the report.

Another deficiency was noted in the library, where the report stated the library reading area should accommodate 76 students rather than 40 students. While the use of an adjacent classroom has much improved the total square footage for library and other functions, it has not really provided appropriate library space. The library should contain a well-balanced collection of at least 5,000 usable volumes as contrasted with the present 4,270 volumes. It was also stated that schools enrolling 750 students should provide one full-time adult clerk and the high school library has none.

"Perhaps, these several factors, in part, account for the relatively low level of schoolwide use of library materials in the teaching-learning classroom activities," stated the report.

Also cited was the fact that the existing ratio of counselors is one to 533, rather than the desirable ratio of one to 300, or the maximum ratio of one to 400.

"Using the state department of education's formula for determining optimum building capacity, the high school's 32 teaching stations have an optimum capacity of 650 students. The official fourth Friday membership was 1,067 students. The 417 stu-

dents represent a 60 percent overload of capacity," stated the report.

In addition to inadequately equipped science facilities, the business education facilities lack some appropriate office machines and the art facility suffers likewise, stated the report.

While the report commended the school for "the maximum utilization of severely limited available resources in the attempt to provide a quality educational opportunity for Tawas Area High School youth," its recommendations stated that the provision of a sufficient number of properly equipped teaching stations is essential.

"The currently discussed expansion of the middle school appears to be a most viable solution, if it produces adequate and appropriately equipped space and results in a strong, instructional program for both the middle school and the high school. The second recommendation is to employ enough staff to reduce class sizes and expand the instructional program as additional space becomes available."

The report also cited the "lack of financial support for an adequate school program." Tawas Area School District estimates the 1970-71 kindergarten through grade 12 per pupil expenditure as \$597, as compared with the state-wide average of \$797. The Tawas Area School general fund levy is 13.5 mills, as compared with the state-wide average levy of 24.17 mills. The Tawas Area

School debt retirement levy is 1.08 mills, as compared with the state-wide average of 3.05 mills. The Tawas Area state equalized valuation per pupil is \$22,012, as compared with the state-wide average of approximately \$17,700.

"The above data when further analyzed indicates that the Tawas Area SEV per pupil ranks in the upper 15 percent of the 531 K-12 districts, yet the total school tax levy of 14.58 mills ranks in the lowest one percent of the 531 K-12 districts—between the 526th and 531st in rank order.

"While the spending of taxpayers' moneys is not the objective, the lack of essential financial support in the Tawas Area School District is further documented in curriculum and other violations," stated the report.

### Howard Durant's Appointment Was Effective Saturday

Howard Durant, acting postmaster at East Tawas since February 1969, assumed his new title as postmaster effective Saturday, June 26.

Durant had served as assistant to Postmaster Richard Price from 1964 until Price's retirement in 1969.

Other changes Saturday in the post office saw John Phillips taking over as rural carrier on Route One, while W. Ray Coleman, former city carrier, became carrier on Route Two.

Phillips, who had been Route Two carrier, replaced Lloyd Bowman, who retired. Phillip Cockburn is the new city carrier replacing Coleman.

Another recent retiree at the post office was Mrs. Lawrence Gardner, clerk.

## Hot Lunch Program Again Shows Loss; May be Dropped

After another losing year with its hot lunch program, Tawas Area Board of Education will decide soon if it will continue this program next term at the high school and its two elementary units.

In order to balance out funds at the close of the year, the board transferred \$7,239 to the lunch program to cover a deficit.

Although the board had operated in the past on the premise that the school lunch was often the only balanced meal which some youngsters receive, Robert Elliott, board president, said the board would have to take a "long, hard look" to determine if the program could continue. More than 150,000 lunches were served last year.

Samples of these quick frozen meals were served to the board of education prior to its meeting Monday night and the general reaction of members was favorable.

In other business, hiring of a person to fill a social studies and assistant coaching position was tabled until a report is received from the board's personnel committee. Two candidates being considered are Richard Look, who has five years of experience and a master degree, and

Robert Eldridge, a beginning teacher.

Tawas Area Braves Booster Club was granted permission to hold teen dances at the East Tawas Elementary Unit during the summer months. The organization is to furnish chaperones.

Leonard Sarki, who was attending his final meeting as a board member after losing in the recent election, was presented with a plaque for 11 years of "faithful service and countless hours donated to Tawas Area School." He had served as chairman for five years and three years as chairman pro tem.

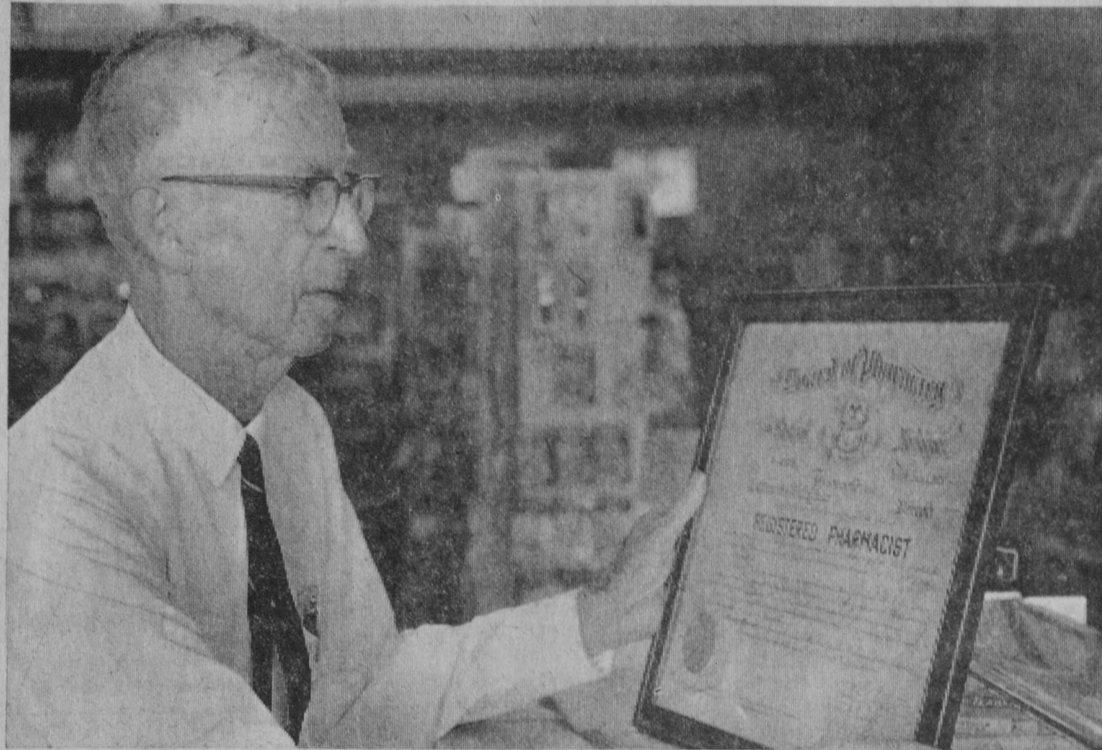

## Veteran Hale Pharmacist Was Surprised Last Night

T. C. "Clem" O'Callaghan, Hale when Hinkley's Bone Liniment was pharmacist who can remember one of the most popular nostrums

for aches and pains in Northeastern Michigan, was honored last night (Tuesday) on his 50th anniversary as a licensed druggist.

More than 100 of his fellow town-people turned out for a surprise public reception in his honor held at the Colonial Inn. The affair was one of the best kept secrets of the year as the idea started at the Hale Coffee Shop, operated by Anabelle Ranger, then spread throughout the community until nearly everyone was in the know—all but Mr. O'Callaghan.

The public reception, preceded by a surprise dinner with a few close friends, also marked the 25th anniversary of O'Callaghan's Hale Pharmacy.

Toastmaster for the evening was the Rev. Fr. Terrance Raymond, pastor of St. Pius X Catholic Church, Hale, of which O'Callaghan is a dedicated member.

The honored guest was presented with a new radio as a gift from the community. He is an avid fan of the Detroit Tigers and committee members believed that the new set should be powerful enough to "pull in" those important night games.

Interviewed last week by the Herald, O'Callaghan is the youngest of four Alpena brothers who were registered pharmacists.

"Clem," as he is known by everyone at Hale, said he is the only one of the four brothers now living. "My oldest brother, Frank, was a pharmacist at Alpena and he had the idea to branch out. My brothers, Edward and Joseph, went to school and obtained their licenses. 'Ed' started a store at Rogers City and 'Joe' went into the Alpena store."

"Clem" attended pharmacy school at Sandusky and received his license on July 1, 1921.

When the brothers decided to go their separate ways in business, "Clem" moved to Harrisville and worked for C. V. Fuga. He later established his own store at Harrisville, operated it for about 10 years and then sold out.

"My feet got itchy to get back into the business and I looked around for a new location—I didn't know anyone at Hale, but I decided it would be a good place to start a business," said O'Callaghan.

Among those working on the special committee to honor their boss were Vida Bannister and Genice Wilson, both clerks at the Hale Pharmacy.

O'Callaghan, whose wife, Beulah, died about 15 years ago, has four grown children, Mrs. John McMas- ters of Harrisville, Mrs. George E. Freer of Grand Blanc, ISgt. T. C. "Tom" O'Callaghan of Tacoma, Washington, and TSgt. J. E. O'Callaghan of Spokane, Washington, now in Vietnam.

O'Callaghan's plans for the future are indefinite, but he believes that he will soon retire. "I have worked all my life and I don't have any hobbies, but I will have to think of something to keep me busy," he stated.

Residents of Hale are sincere when they say "he is so good to the people of this town." Last night's reception was one way the community expressed its appreciation.

On Sunday, July 4, a special Mass of Thanksgiving will be held at St. Pius X Church and the pastor will feature O'Callaghan in his sermon.

# Hale Area Board of Education to Resubmit Millage Election

Due to the recent millage failure, Hale Area School District will not have enough money to operate its schools for the 1971-72 school year.

At the present time, the only revenues come from the nine mills allotted to the district by the county allocation boards. This represents \$196,452.

The nine mills turned down June 14—renewal of millage and not additional millage, which some people believe—represents a loss of \$196,452 in local moneys, plus approximately \$100,000 in state finances.

According to school officials, the renewal millage was requested to simply carry on the school program at the present level and meet the payroll.

Unless local and state funds are made available for the 1971-72 school year, several alternatives to be considered by the board of education are as follows:

1. Use the money that is available and send students to a neighboring district on a tuition basis. (The receiving district would not have to ac-

cept these students.)

2. Consolidate with a neighboring school district, but this would seem improbable due to cost and overcrowded conditions.

3. Find other sources of revenue, which, at this time, seems an impossibility.

None of these alternatives seem appropriate and the board of education feels that citizens of the Hale Area School District, being educationally and community minded, will resolve the situation at a second millage election being called for August 16.

## Child and Family Service New Name

The name Michigan Children's Aid Society has been changed to Child and Family Services of Michigan, Incorporated.

The new name was adopted by unanimous vote at the recent annual meeting of members held at the Waldenwoods Conference Center, Hartland.

The name was changed so that the expanded scope of the agency's program would be reflected. In addition to the traditional program of foster care, adoption and unmarried parent services, family counseling is presently offered by 12 of the 18 offices with mergers imminent at some of the other locations.

This is the third name change for the 80-year-old agency which began in 1891 as the American Education Aid Association and became in 1893 the Michigan Children's Home Society. The Michigan Children's Aid Society was adopted in 1921.

Child and Family Services of Michigan, Incorporated, administrative headquarters is located at 35427 Grand River, Farmington. Offices are located in Adrian, Alpena, Ann Arbor, Battle Creek, Flint, Holland, Jackson, Kalamazoo, Lansing, Marquette, Mt. Clemens, Midland, Mt. Pleasant, Pontiac, Port Huron, St.

Joseph and Traverse City. The Northeastern Michigan branch is located at 1044 North US-23, Alpena, and has served this area since 1959. The executive director is Mary E. McLean.

## Manpower Service Has New Office

The Rural Area Manpower Service of the Michigan Employment Security Commission has opened a service center at the East Tawas Community Building in the East Tawas City Park; telephone (517) 362-6226.

The program will be staffed by personnel trained especially to assist rural workers and employers. It is designed to offer the following types of services to people in the community: Registration of individuals seeking work; information on jobs and training programs throughout the state and local area; clearing-house for job openings through the public employment service job order system; recruitment, selection and referral of qualified applicants to existing jobs and training openings, and assistance in development of jobs and training opportunities.

The service may also include arrangements for aptitudinal testing, employment counseling, supportive services or analyzing occupational and operational manpower problems. These latter services will depend largely upon the timely availability of technicians.

# Coast Guard Warns Small Craft Owners of Requirements for Commercial Operations

It has come to the attention of the United States Coast Guard that many pleasure boats in the area are operating as commercial small passenger vessels in violation of federal law and regulations. It has been reported that some owners of cabin cruisers are operating oblivious to the fact that the law and regulations exist, but that others are knowingly violating.

The law and regulations were intended to insure the safety of passengers by insuring that the vessel is

safe and properly manned by a qualified person or persons.

Vessels which carry in excess of six passengers for hire must be inspected by the coast guard and must be manned in most cases by one licensed operator and one deckhand. If the vessel passes coast guard inspection, a "certificate of inspection" is issued and must be posted in a conspicuous place. It is pointed out that this differs and goes beyond the scope of the "report of boarding" issued to pleasure vessels. The licensed operator must be licensed by the coast guard and carry his license with him when operating the vessel. The coast guard administers the examination to persons seeking this license.

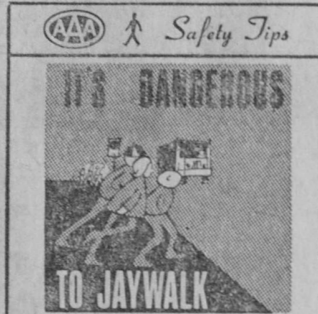
Vessels which carry six passengers or less are not subject to the inspection laws, but they must be manned by a licensed operator.

Owners, or persons in charge of

any vessel subject to these laws and regulations, shall be liable to the United States in a penalty of not more than \$1,000 for each violation for which sum the passenger carrying vessel shall be liable and may be seized and proceeded against by way of libel in any district court of the United States having jurisdiction of the violation. Aside from the penalty, it is emphasized that safety of life on the water is of primary importance. There have been some tragic boating accidents which could have been avoided had the vessel been maintained properly or in the hands of a competent operator. The laws and regulations were designed to prevent unsuspecting passengers from becoming innocent victims of a few operators who disregard safety and caution. Persons who pay for a boat trip aboard a small or large cabin cruiser have a right to examine the certificate of inspection issued by the coast guard and the operator's license. If one or the other is not on board, the passengers should telephone the Coast Guard Marine Inspection Office, Room 424, Federal and Courthouse Building, Detroit, Michigan, 226-7777.

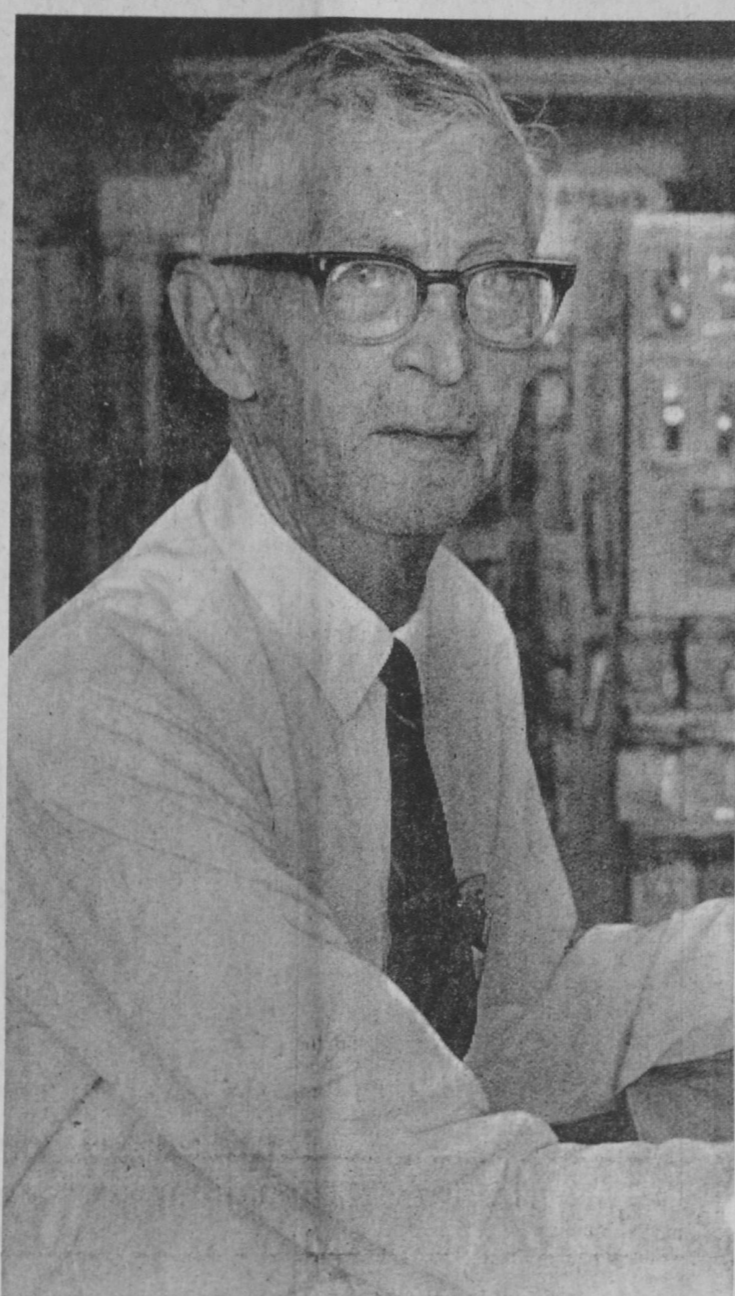

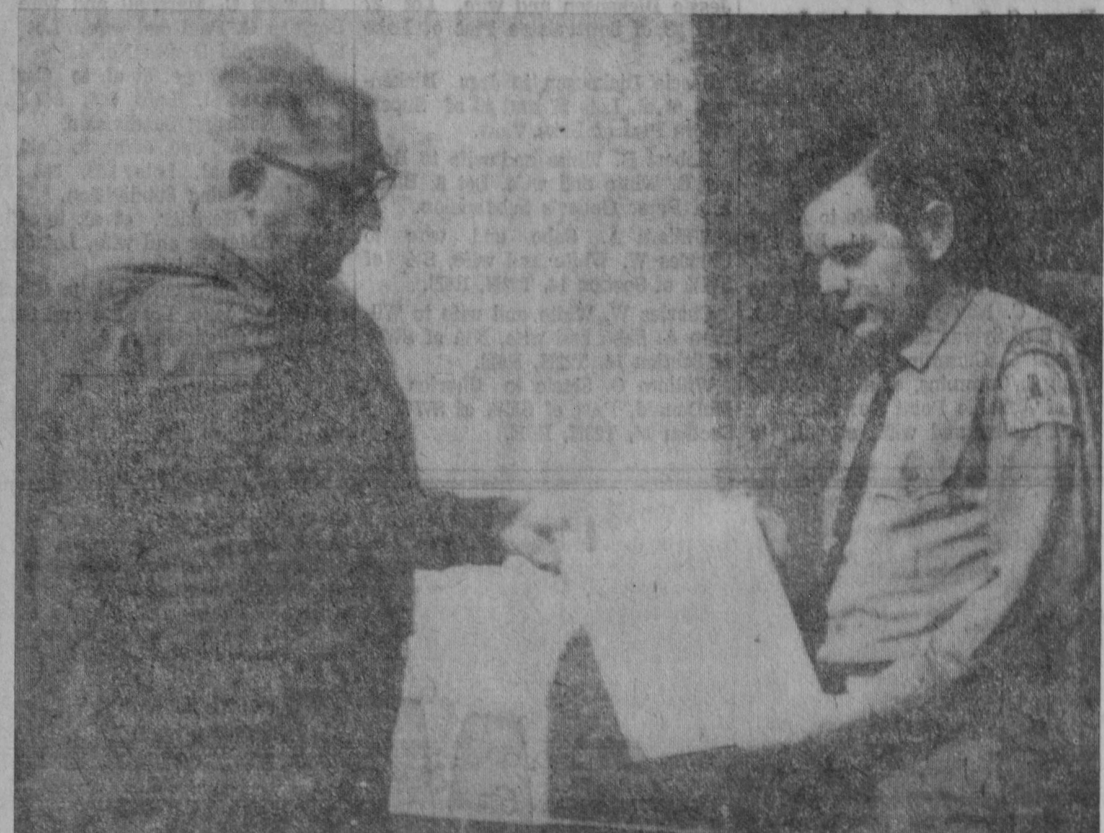

If you are striving for the slim, trim look and your weight control diet looks a little dull, concentrate on vegetables and fruits.

Vegetables come in so many forms, all year around. They offer convenience and contrast. Right now, the quality, quantity and price is right throughout the produce department, or maybe in your own garden.

If calories are your problem, Mrs. Dean points out that a half cup of most vegetables contribute 35 calories or less.

Many vegetables are rich in Vitamin C. If that half cup of vegetable is cole slaw, it will give you about half of the Vitamin C you need for the day. One plain carrot can give you the Vitamin A you need. Vegetables also contribute other vitamins and minerals such as iron and calcium.

If dull meals are your problem, vegetables can offer distinctive color, texture, taste and even aroma. Colors vary from carrot orange and tomato red, through deep purple and bright green. Proper cooking helps them keep their colors.

Textures can be crisp, smooth, hard or even buttery soft.

Besides adding life to a dull meal, color can indicate nutritive value.

"With the wide variety of vegetables available, you should be able to find some to fit every price range, season, family preference and degree of convenience."

Pickled vegetables are colorful, convenient, flavorful and low in calories. When you are in a hurry, you can pop them out of the refrigerator and serve them as an appetizer, a vegetable, a salad, snack or edible garnish. Best of all, they are low in calories and often high in nutrients. Better double the recipe because they are sure to disappear quickly.

**PICKLED FRESH CUCUMBER**  
1 cucumber (seven inches)  
1/3 cup vinegar  
1/3 cup water  
3 tablespoons sugar  
1/4 teaspoon salt  
Dash of white pepper  
1 tablespoon chopped parsley  
Wash cucumber; slice without peeling. Place in glass dish. Mix vinegar, water, sugar, salt and white pepper thoroughly. Pour over cucumber and sprinkle with parsley. Chill in refrigerator two to three hours before serving.

**PICKLED CARROTS**  
1 pound of fresh carrots, cut into strips  
1 teaspoon salt  
1/4 cup salad oil  
1/4 cup cider vinegar  
1 teaspoon tarragon vinegar (may omit)  
2 tablespoons fresh lemon juice  
2 tablespoons fresh or dehydrated chopped parsley  
1/4 cup chopped scallions, green onions or sweet onions  
1 teaspoon salt  
1/8 teaspoon pepper  
Cook fresh carrots in salted water until just tender. Drain. While carrots are still warm, marinate with the above mixture. Cover and re-

frigerate for two to three hours or overnight. Turn carrots occasionally to make sure they are thoroughly marinated.

## Rural Residents Eligible for Loans

Residents of rural towns in the population range of 5,500 to 10,000 are now eligible to apply for rural housing loans from the Farmers Home Administration, Alfred O. LaPorte, state director, said today. This greatly broadens the eligibility possibility for rural families who do not have decent or adequate housing and need the assistance made possible through the Farmers Home Administration.

Mr. LaPorte announced also that families living in areas of population between 10,000 to 50,000 may be considered for loans to acquire adequate housing in the rural areas of 10,000 population or less.

The 2,400 families in Michigan who obtained adequate, improved housing

through the rural housing assistance program during calendar year 1970 used 33-million dollars. LaPorte says that Michigan has been allotted 25 million dollars for the first two quarters of the 1971 calendar year.

Ros L. Smith, county supervisor, who is head of the local office located at 806 West Cedar Street, Standish, Michigan 49658, reports that he has assisted families during the 1970 calendar year in the amount of \$925,600. The office is busy processing applications submitted by individual families as well as those submitted by realtors, builders and others as a packaged docket.
