Meeting Next Monday

TA Middle School Up for Discussion

What the community thinks of the proposed middle school concept, types of construction for proposed new classrooms and methods of financing will be topics at a special community meeting next Monday night called by Tawas Area' Board of Education

To be held at the East Tawas Elementary Unit's multipurpose room, 7:30 p. m., the board hopes to get a good representation from all sections of the school district to assist in making decisions concerning classroom needs of the district. Attending the meeting will be a representative of the board's archi-tectural consulting firm. He will answer questions pertaining to the advisability of constructing portable or permanent classrooms.

"We sincerely hope that there will be a good turnout of parents and other interested citizens," stated Robert W. Elliott, board president. "We would like to learn the feeling of the community before we progress any further on planning."

Faced with an immediate need for additional classrooms in the high school and the desire to separate junior and senior high school students, the board has been discussing a middle school proposal for the past several months.

According to the present plan, the Tawas City Elementary Unit would be taken over by grades six through eight, while elementary grades there would be moved to other buildings. At the second meeting in January the board discussed the possibility of utilizing portable classrooms as an answer to the middle school concept. After meeting with the school's architect in February, however, members were of the opinion that

should be of a permanent nature. Latest recommendation of the architect was that two rooms in the elementary unit presently used for kindergarten be renovated and that four permanent classrooms be constructed, two on the west side of the building and two on the north side. which would form an L-shaped addition.

The additional two classrooms needed would be portables, possibly located in the open square next to the gymnasium in order to make use of existing heating and plumbing facilities, which are major expense

items in any construction. Total cost of the latest proposal would be about \$252,000, including equipment. By utilizing all portable construction, it was estimated that this total would be cut by about \$42,-000

New classrooms on the west side of the building would be for art, shop and homemaking. A resource center and library would be located in the renovated rooms, while the two-classroom addition on the north would be for science.

Midland Co. Jury Awards Judgment

A Midland County Circuit Court jury brought in a verdict March 3 awarding a judgment of \$1,500 to Roger Bauer, prosecuting attorney of Alpena County, in his false arrest suit against Sheriff Ivan O'Farrell of Iosco. The trial was held in Midland County on a change of venue request by the plaintiff.

Bauer had asked \$50,000 damages in his suit.

The verdict was not a unanimous decision of the six-member jury, with the judgment being made on a five-to-one vote, after almost seven hours of deliberation.







Under normal road and weather conditions, at 30 m.p.h., the average braking distance is 45 feet-but at 70 m.p.h. braking distance jumps to 381 feet. So remember, as speed goes up, proportionately increase following distance between your car and the one ahead.


