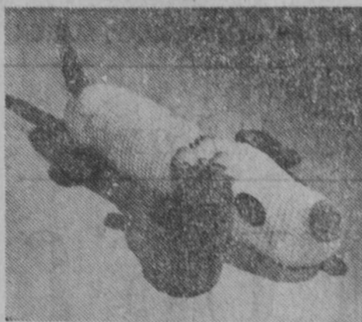

House Broke Faith With People, Charges Prescott

"When the house of representatives passed House Bill 4194 by a 73-27 vote, they broke faith with the people of Michigan," Rep. George A. Prescott charged in his Lansing office last Thursday.

Prescott said that as he watched the green lights go up on the board, it meant abandonment of the "Spencer-Ryan Plan" put into the state aid act last year with much hard work by so many outstate legislators.

"The part of the plan that went up in smoke," Prescott said, "was the removal of the section which froze local property taxes levied for operating schools." Prescott said this "was the lever we had to help us shift school financing from property taxes to income taxes."

"There is no way," Prescott reported, "that we can furnish schools with the financing they need with the present system. All you have to do is look at the latest millage votes for schools."

Prescott said that the people back home are now very aware of the United States Supreme Court de-

cision that all state voters, whether they own property or not, may now vote on all millage requests and bond issues.

"The house action on top of this," Prescott said, "tells me exactly why the taxpayers have no faith in the legislature. We are presently held in the lowest esteem by the voters

than at any time I can remember. They believe us to be robbers and double talkers."

Prescott concluded, "I am inclined to agree with them. Campaign promises were forgotten in the action this week and the lip service will start again to the voters about how hard legislators are trying to

relieve property taxes. The people know the score now and should ask their legislators how they voted and what they now intend."

"For the first time I am putting a 'price tag' on my vote. There will be no 'yes' vote from the 102nd seat for more taxes until property taxes are substantially reduced."

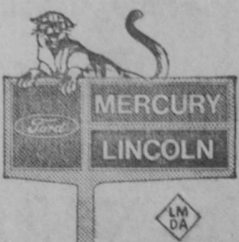
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13,937 Housing Units Counted in Iosco Co.

The 1970 census counted 13,937 housing units in Iosco County, 4,756 of them occupied by owners, 2,751 occupied by tenants and 6,430 vacant. These included vacant units for seasonal use. The proportion occupied by owners in 1970 was 34.1 percent, compared with 39.6 percent in 1960.

This information, along with other statistics concerning Iosco, was received by the Herald in a special report prepared and addressed by computer from the Bureau of the Census, United States Department of Commerce.

Iosco County's official population in the 1970 census was 24,905, up 50.9 percent from the 1960 figure of 16,505. The official population of the

state was 8,875,083, up 13.4 percent from the 1960 population count.

The 1970 census counted 23,936 white persons in Iosco County, 96.1 percent of the total; 738 Negroes and 231 persons of other races. In 1960, 98.9 percent of the population was white.

The census showed 2,216 children under five years, 6,934 in ages five through 17, 13,330 people 18 through 64 and 2,425 who were 65 and older. The population 14 years and over included 12,202 married people, 1,065 who were widowed, 390 divorced and 4,048 never married.

Iosco's 1970 population was classified as 41.8 percent urban and 58.2 percent rural.

There were 7,327 households with 23,577 persons, including 938 one-person households. In addition, 1,328 persons were living in group quarters.

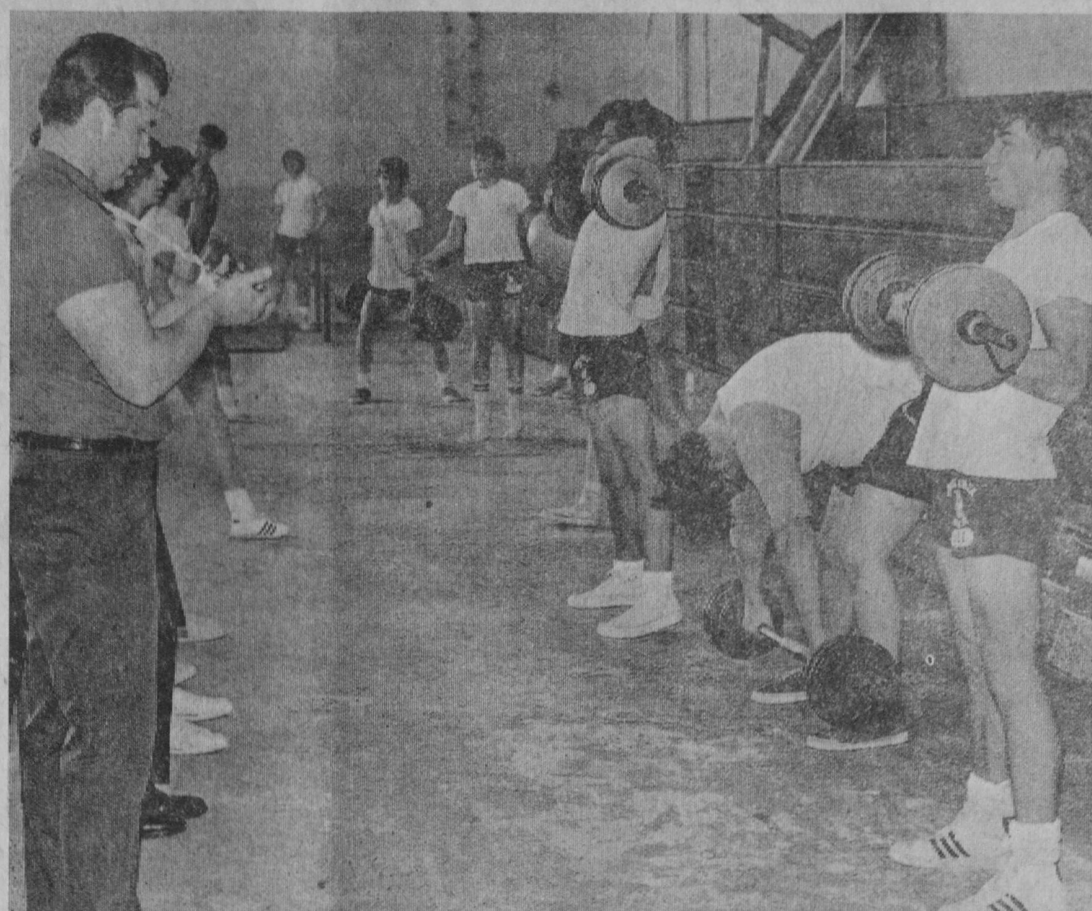
Among year around dwelling units, there were 8,971 single family houses, 1,324 housing units in multiunit buildings and 314 mobile homes or trailers. The percentage of occupied units with more than one person per room was 3.9, compared with 12.2 in 1960. Of all the occupied housing units, 6,944 had piped water, toilet and bath, while 383 lacked some or all plumbing.

The median value of owner occupied houses in Iosco was \$13,300, compared with \$10,100 in 1960. The median rent paid by tenants in 1970 was \$77 per month, compared with \$87 in 1960. Half were over and half below the median figures.

Nursing assistants and LPN's perform a variety of personal and nursing care procedures under the direction of physicians or professional nurses. These duties include observation and reporting of patients' conditions; taking and recording temperatures, pulse, and respiration, and bathing patients.

Guthard said that about 50 boys signed up for the program originally and the field has now been narrowed down to about 35.

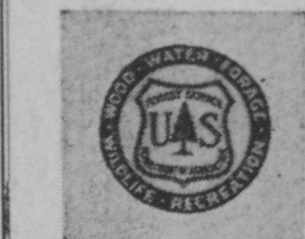

Guthard said that those boys who have remained with the program have shown great progress.

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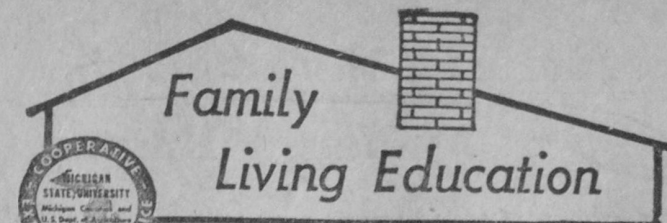
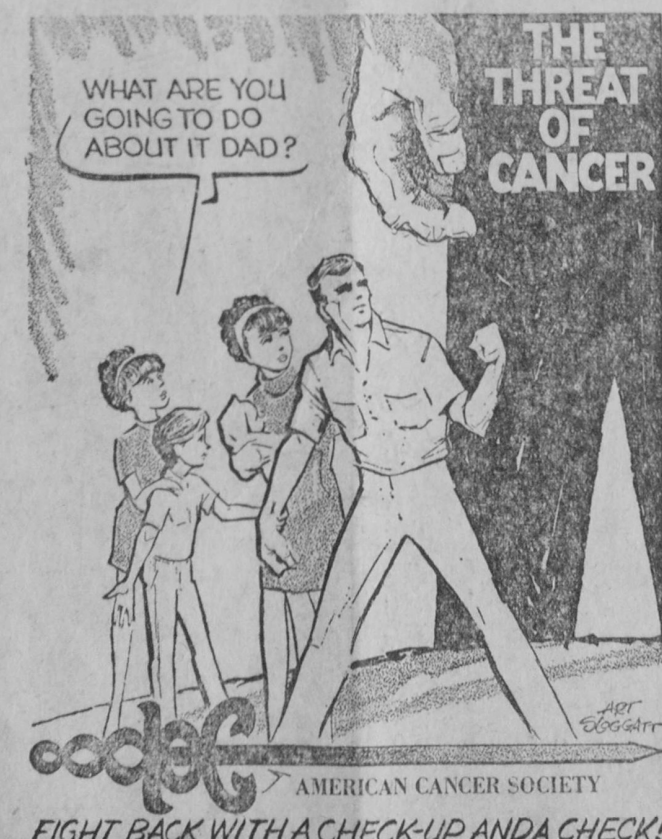

The recreation areas on the Tawas District at which there will be a charge are Round Lake Campground, Rollways Campground and Monument Campground. At Rollways and Monument Campgrounds, individuals must register at the store adjacent to the campground. Persons without Golden Eagle Passports may purchase either a passport or a \$1 daily entrance permit at the store. The charge at Round Lake Campground is \$2 per day due to location of the lake and sand beach. Individuals with Golden Eagle Passports will have to pay only \$1. Here,

insurance, we can help you. No, we are not experts in all these areas. If we cannot answer your questions, we will find someone who can.

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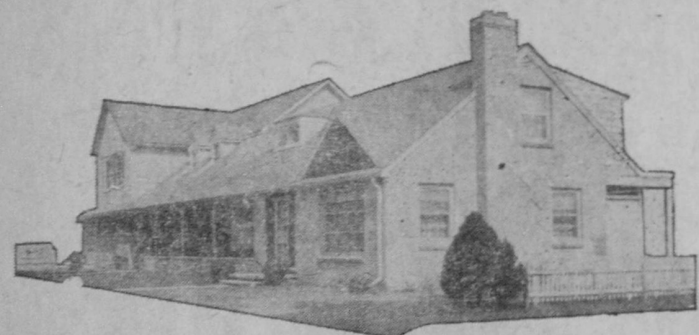


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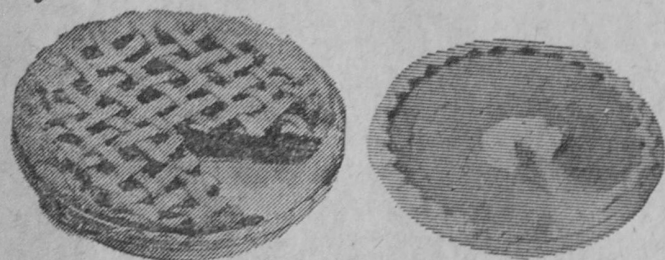
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
