## Computation on Returns Start Soon

# Census Means Work for Treasurer

The official census report for Iosco County was received last week by Edward Nelkie, county treasurer, from the United States Bureau of the Census. Figures in this report are identical to those announced by national news services the first week in February.

The county had a 50.9 percent increase in population since 1960—from 16,505 to 24,905. The largest share of this increase came from Wurtsmith Air Force Base, which had a 1970 population of 6,932. In the previous census, the base population was not counted.

Actual census of Iosco County, deducting military personnel, is 17,973 persons, or an increase of 1,469 over the 1960 census.

As a result of counting base personnel in 1970, Oscoda Township had a whopping 179.8 percent increase in

population—from 4,202 in 1960 to 11,758 in 1970—and will be the greatest beneficiary of state tax returns. Figures indicate that the township had a non-military population increase of 624.

According to law, all apportionments since April 1, 1970, must be made to county and local units of government on the basis of the official 1970 census. Nelkie said that money to be appropriated include state income tax, Michigan sales tax and state intangibles tax.

Total payment of state income tax returns to local units of government have been based on preliminary 1970 census figures for the past two quarters. Because of the fact that 1970 population counts for individual units were not available until last week, payment to units had been made on the 1960 figures and the

balance of more than \$100,000 has been placed in escrow for later distribution.

Nelkie said that computation of returns to townships and cities, including income tax now in escrow and the fourth quarter payment, would require several days of work by the treasurer's office staff. Nelkie believed this work would be delayed, however, as settlement days with the various township and city treasurers started March 2.

Because of the fact that increases or decreases in population will have a direct effect on returns to units, tabulations probably will require several days of work.

Nelkie said Monday he was still not certain about returns to those units showing a decrease in population. Units were paid on the basis of 1960 census figures and those show-

ing decreases in 1970 may owe money to those units showing increases.

Nelkie said that the quarterly income tax payment received last week was \$19,812, which was the lowest ever received by the county. One half of this amount goes to the county general fund and the other half is split between townships and cities on a population basis.

A letter accompanying the check from the state treasurer said that the low amount was due to the recent automotive strike. However, Nelkie was mystified by the fact that the December sales tax return to this county was \$64,026, as compared to \$47,699 in 1969.

In any event, Nelkie believes that it may require at least two quarters to balance out income tax and sales tax payments to the various units,

because of the changing population factor.

Percentage of change and actual census count in the 13 units besides Oscoda Township were as follows:

Alabaster Township, 280, down 28.2 percent; AuSable Township, 1,187, increase of 13.1 percent; Baldwin Township, 773, loss of 12.2 percent; Burleigh Township, 569, loss of 9.8 percent; East Tawas, 2,372, loss of 3.7 percent; Grant Township, 607, increase of 34.9 percent; Plainfield Township, 2,006, increase of 43.6 percent; Reno Township, 294, loss of 7.8 percent; Sherman Township, 422, increase of 4.7 percent; Tawas City, 1,666, loss of 8.0 percent; Tawas Township, 1,433, increase of 29.8 percent; Wilber Township, 359, increase of 13.2 percent. Whittemore had identical population counts of 460 in 1960 and 1970.

## Braves Bomb Owls, 96-66, in Tourney

Tawas Area Braves breezed to their first win in the district basketball tournament last night (Tuesday) at Standish-Sterling Central by downing the Oscoda Owls, 96-66. It was the Braves' highest scoring game of the season.

Tournament action resumes Wednesday night with Standish, winner of Monday night's game with Ogemaw Heights, meeting Gladwin. The Braves meet Pinconning Thursday night. Winners of these two games meet in the finals Saturday night at 8 o'clock.

The Braves jumped off to a 28-13 first quarter lead and were never headed, although a press defense stalled the Tawas attack in the second quarter until adjustments were made by Coach Jim Papanitis.

The Owls outscored Tawas, 22-18, in the second quarter to cut Tawas' margin 46-35 at intermission. The Braves widened the gap in the third quarter with a 24-20 scoring effort and then zoomed far out in front with a 26-11 bulge in the final quarter.

The Braves were deadly at the foul line, completing 23 out of 41 attempts. The Tawas squad swished 34 field goals. Oscoda completed only eight charity tosses.

Craig Wilkins, with 26 points, was scoring leader in Tawas' lineup, which sported four players in double figures. Running a close second was Chuck Petersen with 23, followed by 12 each for Gary Libka and Bob Towns. Foley was top Oscoda scorer with 19 points.

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## Change Dates for Perchville Event in 1972

With near disastrous weather fresh in their memory, board of directors of Tawas Chamber of Commerce last week established next year's dates for the Perchville USA program.

Apparently hoping for a little more cooperation from the weatherman than shown in the past, chamber officials set the dates for February 12, 13 and 14—one week ahead of the dates for this year's program.

Picking a suitable date for a winter program or any outdoor event is a hit or miss affair. The chamber has "struck out" on about four of its past calls.

In other business conducted February 24, plans were started for the citizen of the year banquet which is to be held some time in April. A format change has been suggested this year by Harris Barkman, chamber president.

There would be three categories in the judging—male, female and student. Entries would be judged by an impartial committee from outside the area.

Letters are to be sent to organizations announcing this contest and entry blanks are to appear in newspapers. Qualifications of the nominee must be submitted with the special printed form.

## Power Rate Hike First Since 1943

City Councils of East Tawas and Tawas City Monday night agreed to terminate 30-year-old rate contracts with Consumers Power Company on March 1, 1973. The contract is for providing electrical power to water and sewer pumping stations.

Gordon Huck, Tawas area manager for the power company, said that Consumers Power desired a rate increase for providing such

service. He said that all municipalities in the firm's service area were being contacted to terminate contracts at the same time. This rate does not fall under provisions of the Michigan Public Service Commission.

Huck said that service costs had increased tremendously since 1943. He had no idea what the new rate would be, but believed it would be reasonable.

In other business conducted at the East Tawas Council meeting, approval was given to redecorate offices of the water department, treasurer and clerk.

The council approved paying expenses of Deloise (Dewey) Durant at a one-day appraisal school to be held at Lansing. Durant is city assessor.

The council tabled for further investigation a request from Tawas Area Industrial Development Corporation for an allocation of \$500.

One building permit approved recently was submitted to Timothy A. DeWise, who recently returned from military service, for remodeling the former Leonard Station at the corner of Westover and Newman Streets as a bakery. Estimated cost was \$1,000.

Two cabin burglaries discovered Monday on Shellenbarger Road, Loon Lake, Plainfield Township, are under investigation by Iosco Sheriff's Department. The cabins are owned by T. A. Adams of Southfield and Robert Shaw of Westland.

## Test Graham to Determine Trial Status

Walter W. Graham, 32, who is charged with kidnapping at gunpoint a family of eight on Christmas Eve, was taken to Ypsilanti Forensics Center Monday for mental evaluation to determine if he is able to assist in his own defense.

Graham had been held at Iosco County Jail under \$25,000 bond since December 25, 1970.

He is charged with pulling a revolver on Maj. Frederick G. Gibout of Wurtsmith Air Force Base, his wife and six children after the major had stopped to give assistance to Graham, whose car was stalled on Wilber Road, north of Tawas City.

Graham later released the family on First Street in Tawas City and they notified the Iosco Sheriff's Department. Graham was captured in the stolen station wagon a short time later.

## New Shelter Planned for City Park

Tawas City Park Board is planning construction of a 22 by 24-foot weather shelter in the city park, according to minutes read and approved at Monday night's meeting of the city council.

This structure would consist of a metal roof supported by four posts erected over a concrete pad. Cost of the actual shelter, but not the concrete pad, would be \$890.

The park board stated this structure would be an important addition to existing facilities as it would offer shelter to picnickers during inclement weather. In addition, it would offer future replacement of the old band stand.

Another item in its proposal was erection of a flood light at the tennis-basketball court. This had been requested by private individuals last year and would make the existing facility available for night use. Cost of the light would be \$400.

Following unanimous support of the measure by the council, Ald. Cecil Cabbie recommended that such projects be included in budgets submitted by various departments. The above items were added to the 1970 budget of the park board which has a balance in its fund of about \$1,400.

Cabbie was of the opinion that both projects were worthwhile, but believed that the various committees should abide by budgets prepared at the beginning of the year. He cited the fact that many municipalities would be receiving less state funds this year due to the drop in population.

He believed that funds should not be expended because of a balance, but was of the opinion that such projects should be included in an over-all plan.

# Tawas City Attorney Gives Opinion on New Water Line Responsibility

"As a taxpayer, I do not like to pay for someone else's mistakes—it is not good planning," stated City Atty. Kenneth Myles in a discussion Monday night with the Tawas City Council concerning construction of a proposed new water line between Tawas City and the East Tawas filtration plant.

Myles was of the opinion that the engineering firm which had designed the distribution system in 1957 has been in error when an existing six-inch main was utilized to supply water from East Tawas' filtration plant to Tawas City's water main at the city limit.

After adoption of a water purchase agreement between the two cities in 1966, Tawas City immediately ran into trouble when the six-

inch main proved inadequate to supply water. A booster pumping station was built by Tawas City near Schreck Lumber Company but this still did not solve the problem.

Tawas City is now in the process of making plans for expanding its water distribution system and included in the proposal was construction of a 500,000-gallon underwater storage unit, along with future construction of a 12-inch main to connect with East Tawas.

Responsibility for constructing a 12-inch water main in East Tawas from the water filtration plant to the hookup with Tawas City along a new route is now in question.

Recent action of the East Tawas-Tawas City Joint Water Board called for city attorneys of each

community to give an opinion on which community would be responsible for constructing the main through East Tawas.

Myles said he had reviewed the contract between the two cities and advised there was no specific provision for replacement of existing water lines. He said, however, that the contract provided several relevant provisions which may be applied to the question as follows:

1. The preamble to the contract provides that the City of Tawas City desires to purchase a supply of water from the water works system from the City of East Tawas to supply the needs of its residents and users.

2. The first paragraph provides that the City of East Tawas agrees to

sell and deliver filtered water to the City of Tawas City.

3. The third paragraph provides that when East Tawas begins to supply Tawas City with filtered water under this contract, Tawas City will cease operation of its present pumps and the use of water from its wells.

(Tawas City has been unable to discontinue use of wells during peak periods of summer usage because of inadequate supply.)

4. Paragraph four provides that "all water furnished shall be measured by a six-inch compound meter to be installed in a meter pit at the city limits, to both parties on US-23, and each party shall extend its water mains to reach that meter installation."

Myles said that in reviewing the contract provisions, "It is clear that the two cities planned under the contract to provide for the total water needs for Tawas City by purchasing water from East Tawas. The preamble recited that Tawas City would buy water for all its needs.

# Councils Want Revenue Sharing by Washington

A federal revenue sharing proposal now being discussed at Washington, D. C., was endorsed Monday night by city councils of Tawas City and East Tawas.

Circulated by the City of Warren, the resolution stated that federal revenue sharing would help provide needed additional funds which "are absolutely necessary to insure the preservation of local government."

The resolution stated that an endless amount of time was lost in processing applications for federal funds and in distribution of such funds to local governments. The resolution stated that would be eliminated and the public would benefit from elimination of needless delay.

"Local governmental leaders are

in the best position to determine needs of their own communities and to make proper usage of such funds," stated the resolution.

Endorsements of the resolution are to be sent by each city council to this state's representatives in the United States Congress.

## Twister Time

## Funeral Customs and Arrangements to be Topic

Funeral customs and arrangements will be the discussion topic at a meeting sponsored by the Cooperative Extension Service Thursday, March 11, at the Hale Community Building, 7:30 p. m.

A panel composed of W. S. Bennett of Oscoda, funeral director; William McCready of Tawas City, judge of probate; the Rev. Fr. James Suchocki, pastor of St. Joseph Catholic Church, West Branch, and the Rev. James Wilk, pastor of Bethlehem Lutheran Church near Standish, will deal with concerns and questions that people most often express.

The panel discussion will be preceded by a brief presentation by Miss Lucile Ketchum, home management specialist, Michigan State University.

Some consideration will be given to changing customs and the values involved in the kinds of choices one might make in arrangements.

## DDT Popping Up Again In State Stores

DDT is popping up again in Michigan.

Banished from retail store shelves, it was the object of a recently completed five-month "search and seize" campaign by the Michigan Department of Agriculture. Nearly 60,000 pounds of the forbidden DDT formulations were snared.

Field men of the department's plant industry division are finding new supplies of DDT products on retail counters, and B. Dale Ball, department director, is seriously concerned.

"DDT cannot legally be offered for sale in Michigan, except for very limited purposes related to human health," Ball said, "and we are going to see that the law is enforced."

Under regulations of the Michigan Department of Agriculture, DDT products cannot be shipped into or within the state. This regulation has been enforced since June of 1969.

Appearance of the product now, just in time for the spring growing season, is particularly distressing since it cost the state thousands of dollars to remove supplies during the recent campaign, when about 12,000 retail stores were visited.

Source of the present supply has not been determined, but Ball said it is apparently coming out of warehouses and storage rooms.

Ball warned that any necessary legal action will be taken to remove new DDT supplies and prevent their sale. Because of the difficult job of policing all retail stores in the state, public-spirited citizens who see DDT formulations displayed are invited to report them to the nearest department office, so proper steps can be taken.

"I'm sure these are isolated incidents of violations," Ball said, "but retailers had nearly a year in which to dispose of their DDT inventories. We cannot permit a few offenders to ignore the regulations."

# Colorful State Highway Maps Distributed Free

The 1971 Michigan official highway map is ready for free distribution, the Michigan State Highway Commission has announced.

A limited supply was received this week by The Tawas Herald for free distribution.

Long considered one of the most informative state highway maps in the nation, Michigan's annually updated map for 1971 includes routing for more than 1,400 miles of free-way; all 9,221 miles of state highways and most major county roads.

Enlarged panels on the reverse side separately show the major road systems for Detroit and vicinity, Battle Creek, Bay City, Flint, Grand Rapids, Jackson, Kalamazoo, Lansing, Midland, Muskegon, Port Huron, Saginaw and St. Joseph-Benton Harbor.

This year's map features an artist's portrayal of six major Michigan bridges—the Mackinac, Houghton-Hancock, Blue Water at Port Huron, International at Sault Ste. Marie, Rouge River and Zilwaukee. In addition to the artist's sketch, accompanying panels identify the type of bridge and include statistics and information on its history and location.

One of the two cover panels con-

tains an artist's sketch of the 104-year-old wooden covered bridge over the Thornapple River in the Village of Ada in Kent County; with the other outside panel showing one of the two main towers of the Mackinac Bridge.

A feature included in the 1971 map for the first time is designation of Indian reservations by a colored shading. Other popular features include pictures of the state flag, state bird, state fish and state stone; fare and toll information at bridges; a mileage table providing distances between various cities; listing with phone numbers of state police posts and district offices of the Michigan Department of State Highways, and a listing of state

parks with vital information for each park on the type of recreational accommodations offered.

The state highway commission authorized printing of two million 1971 maps, the same amount as last year, in a continuing effort to meet every increasing demand for the map.

The maps were printed by Michigan Lithographing Company of Grand Rapids on its low bid of \$105,800. That figures out to 5.29 cents a map, up slightly from last year's cost of 4.99 cents a map.

With the next two weeks, free maps will be available at all highway district offices throughout the state, at chambers of commerce in most Michigan cities and from area and regional tourist associations.

# Austin Urges State Election Law Change

Sec. of State Richard H. Austin has urged thorough reform of Michigan's election laws to encourage fuller citizen participation in the electoral process.

"It is hypocritical to complain about limited citizen involvement in the democratic process unless we at the same time act to remove the barriers which so effectively exclude people from the process," Austin told a recent meeting of the Central Michigan Chapter of Sigma Delta Chi, professional journalism fraternity.

Austin said he will propose a legislative program to make registration and voting simpler and open to more people.

"Voting is a basic right of citizenship and that is the way it must be treated," Austin said. "In the past, both parties have been guilty at times of tampering with voting rights for selfish advantage."

"Now, at a time in our nation's history where we are urging our young and our poor to work within the system, it is more important than ever that we stop the hypocrisy and open up the system to all," the secretary of state said.

For example, Austin said, the residency requirements are unfair and unnecessary. A 30-day rule might be needed to allow registration lists to be prepared for the election, but even this could be eliminated if Michigan would go to a permanent and state-wide registration, he said.

"The reason given for the present system of taking voters off the list if they fail to vote for two years is to preserve the so-called purity of the voter list," Austin said. "Actually, it is aimed at disenfranchising citizens who often prefer to vote only in presidential elections."

"Our present system penalizes the occasional voter by making him go to the trouble of registering again. Through social security numbers and in other ways we keep track of our citizens for the purpose of making them pay taxes and perform other duties of citizenship. Yet for political purposes, we pretend that we cannot keep our voters' lists pure and up-to-date unless the citizen himself re-registers," Austin said.

Austin noted that in the 1972 election there will be at least three separate classes of voters:

—Those 21 and over, residents of

Michigan six months or more, who can vote the entire ballot.

—Those 18 through 20, residents of Michigan six months or more, who will be able to vote only on federal offices.

—All voters, residents of Michigan less than six months but more than 30 days, who can vote only for president and vice president.

Austin said he will suggest several steps which would bring about uniformity and eventually allow every citizen, 18 or over, a Michigan resident more than 30 days, to vote the entire ballot.

Austin said he believed Michigan voters should be given another chance to lower the voting age to 18 for all elections. He noted that the United States Supreme Court's action to allow the 18 year old vote in federal elections came after Michigan voters turned down a state constitutional amendment last November which would have given youth the full franchise.

it would appear, from the contract provisions discussed above, that the parties would follow the same procedure as they did in establishing the water system originally, that being, East Tawas would install an adequate new line to its city limits and Tawas City would then install a new line to connect with the East Tawas line.

"In answer to your question, the answer is that in view of the prior contract and the practices carried out pursuant to that contract, the City of Tawas City would be required to install the new water line to its city limit and the City of East Tawas would be required to install a new line from the filtration plant to its city limit," stated Myles.

Since 1968, when East Tawas' filtration plant financed by a revenue bond issue went into operation, Tawas City's consumption has nearly doubled—from 50 to 90-million gallons of water. Last year, water purchased amounted to a cost of \$21,000.

Attending Monday night's meeting was Gordon Huck, chairman of the joint water board, who said that the engineer had been contacted and is to begin planning for the proposed 12-inch main in East Tawas.

Huck said that an opinion from East Tawas' attorney was due shortly. He said that once this was received a special meeting of the joint water board would be called.

## Weight Watching Important Job of Inspection Men

Nearly everybody is weight conscious these days. But did you know a group of men in the food inspection division of the Michigan Department of Agriculture is dedicated to weight watching?

National Weights and Measures Week, March 1 through March 7, has been proclaimed by Michigan Gov. William G. Milliken to recognize the importance of the state's weights and measures program.

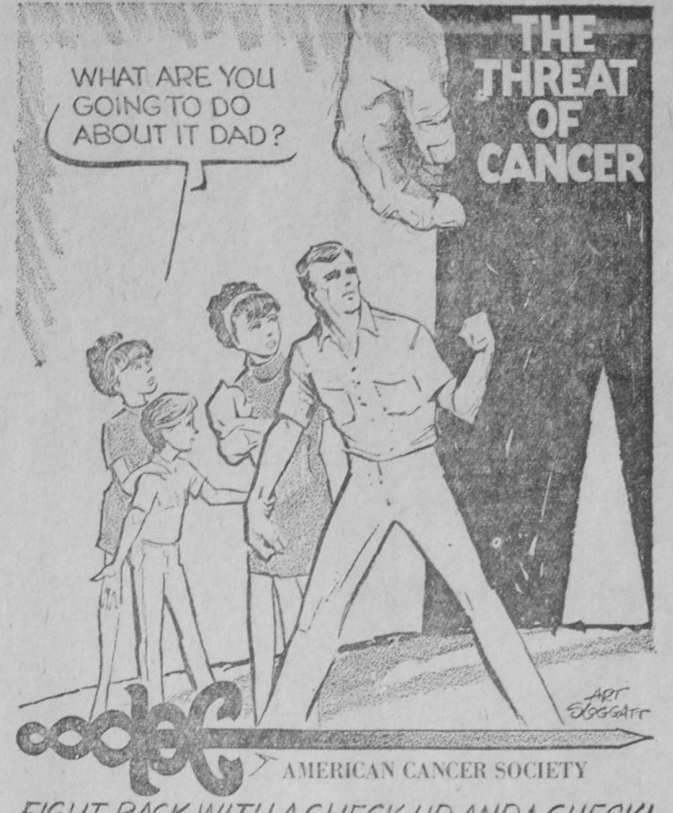
"Our weights and measures officials work with businessmen and consumers to locate inaccurate or fraudulent devices and have them corrected," said B. Dale Ball, director of the Michigan Department of Agriculture.

Under state law, the agriculture director is also the director of weights and measures and the keeper of official standards supplied by the federal government.

Whether you are buying 10 gallons of gasoline or 10 pounds of potatoes, in Michigan you can depend on accurate weights and measures. Department sealers and inspectors check a full range of scales, from the smallest produce scale to the large highway scales used to weigh trucks, Ball said. In addition, they inspect such measuring devices as gasoline pumps and liquid petroleum gas meters.

The job is performed on a state-wide basis by specially trained inspectors from the department's food inspection division. Some cities and counties have their own sealer, but in areas where the local government does not, the job is performed by department inspectors. Ronald Leach, chief of the food inspection division, said.

Programs for civic groups, school assemblies and various organizations are being observed during the week, Leach said. Activities are planned to give the public a better understanding of the work involved and its benefits to consumers.

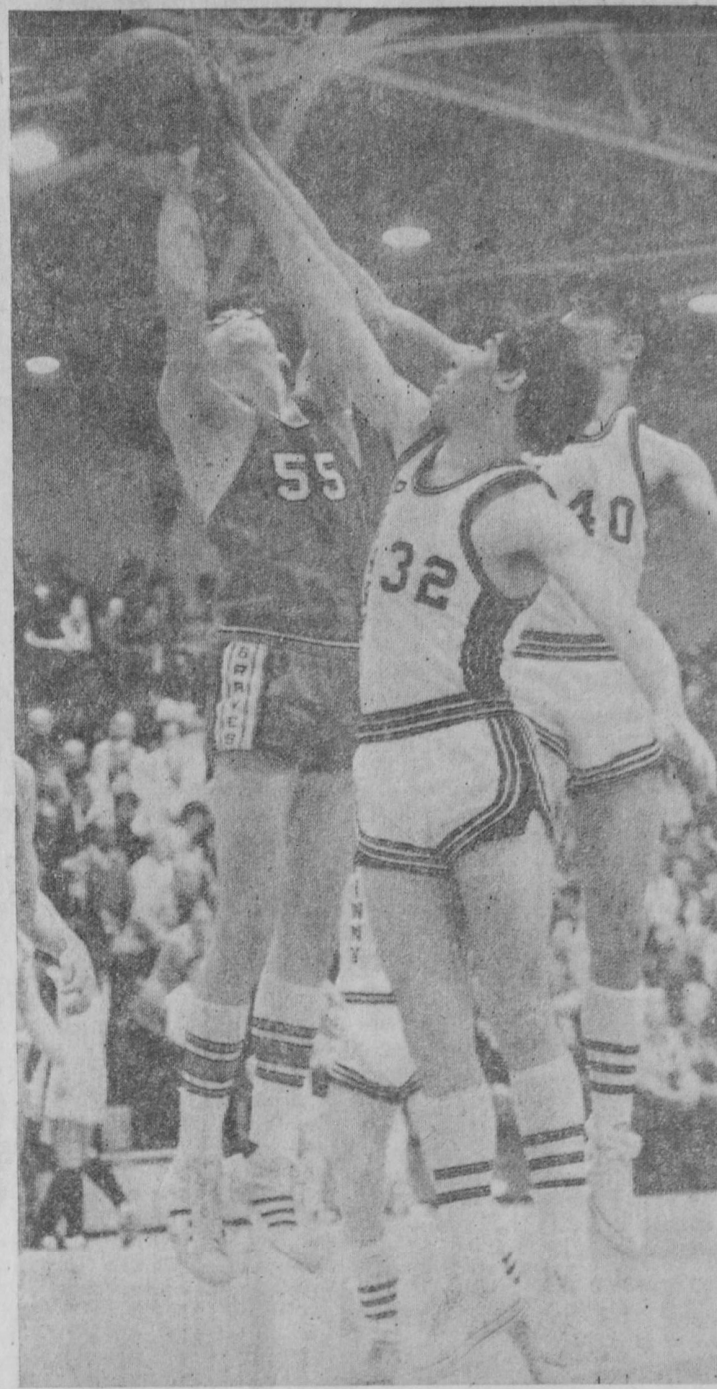
## Mrs. Sophia Caruk, Resort Operator, Died Feb. 23

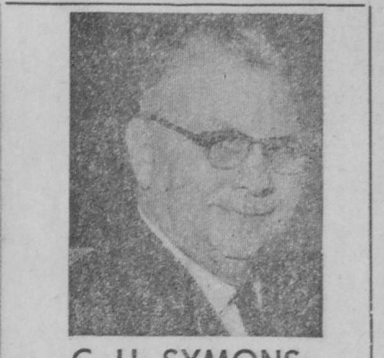
Mr. Kelley was born July 12, 1882, in Port Austin. He was married to the former Rose Kane in Grand Marais in 1914 and since had resided here.



Lake Huron Level Going Higher in 1971, Says Survey

For the coming summer, Great Lakes water levels are expected to be about the same or slightly higher than they were in 1970, except for Lakes Michigan and Huron.

Lake Superior is expected to be about the same as 1970; Lake St. Clair up about 2 1/2 inches; Lake Erie up about 2 1/2 inches; Lake Ontario about the same or down slightly.

Lake Survey, formerly a unit in the army's Corps of Engineers, is now with the Department of Commerce's National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration and operates directly under the National Ocean Survey.

Higher lake levels normally benefit commercial shipping and hydroelectric power production, but are detrimental to shoreline property.

Lake Survey scientists explain that wave energy is expended directly against cliffs or beaches during high water, rather than being dissipated partially or completely on sloping inshore bottoms, as is usually the case during lower water

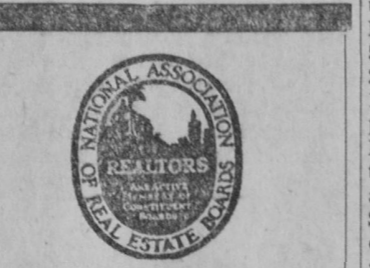

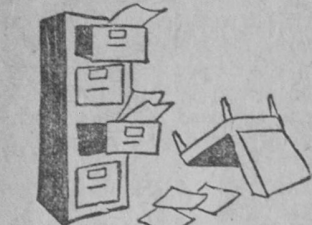

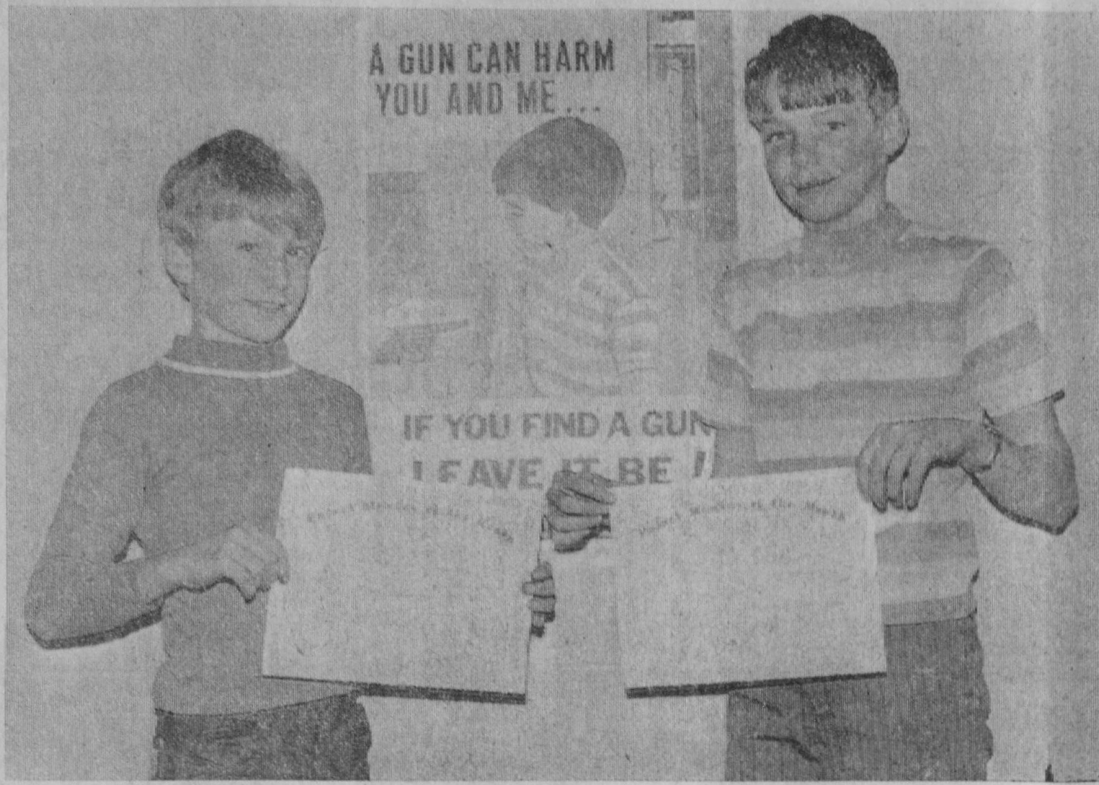

## Lag in License Sales Means Colossal Lines

If business does not perk up at secretary of state license plate offices, last minute plate buyers may find themselves in the most colossal lines in history if they wait to buy plates just before the March 31 deadline.

that more vehicle owners have not purchased plates up to now.

"I expect that our economic situation compounded by the General Motors strike and our inflated economy have caused a slowdown in our normal sales rate," he said.

As of February 22, license plate sales were down 104,000 from the same date in 1970. "This means that we are 200,000 down based on our normal yearly increase of about 100,000," Austin said.

"I hate to keep harping at people to get their plates but I also hate to contemplate the shoving, tugging matches and the raveled nerves if they wait until the last minute to buy their 1971 plates," Austin said. "And no one can possibly predict with certainty the vagaries of Michigan's weather in late March."

The lines will be building up in March and the longer a person waits to obtain his plates, the more

he compounds his problem, said Austin.

Passenger vehicle owners may use either their titles or prepared license plate applications mailed out to most of Michigan's 5 1/2-million vehicle owners.

In addition to either their title or prepared application, they must show proof of liability insurance, money to pay for plates and the \$1 insured fee.

All uninsured drivers must pay \$35 fee into the Motor Vehicle Accident Claims Fund as they have in the past.

"And the uninsured fee is not state insurance as some persons still seem to think," warned Austin. "Persons paying the uninsured fee continue as uninsured drivers and must make total restitution if they are at fault in an accident and a claim is paid because of their negligence."

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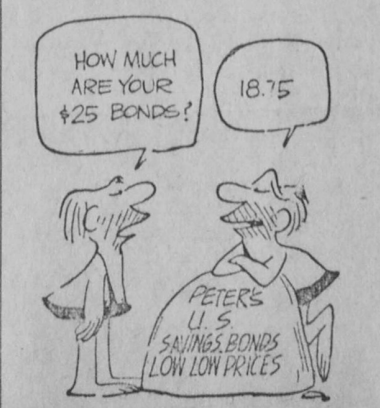
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
