According to law, all apportionments since April 1, 1970, must be made to county and local units of government on the basis of the official 1970 census. Nelkie said that moneys to be appropriated include state income tax, Michigan sales tax and state intangibles tax.

Total payment of state income tax returns to local units of government have been based on preliminary 19-70 census figures for the past two quarters. Because of the fact that 1970 population counts for individual units were not available until last week, payment to units had been made on the 1960 figures and the balance of more than \$100,000 has been placed in escrow for later distribution.

> **New Shelter** Planned for **City Park**

Tawas City Park Board is planning construction of a 22 by 24-foot weather shelter in the city park, according to minutes read and approved at Monday night's meeting of the city council.

This structure would consist of a metal roof supported by four posts erected over a concrete pad. Cost of the actual shelter, but not the concrete pad, would be \$890.

The park board stated this structure would be an important addition to existing facilities as it would offer shelter to picnickers during inclement weather. In addition, it would offer future replacement of the old band stand.
