Examiners Complete Work at Farmers and Merchants Bank

Examination of Farmers and Merchants State Bank by the Michigan Financial Institutions Bureau and the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation was completed last week.

State examiners completed their work Wednesday and FDIC officials completed their study on Friday.

And, following three hectic weeks of working with these examiners along with an earlier stint with FBI agents—coupled with interruptions by reporters seeking to confirm or disprove rumors concerning the bank—Richard Parkinson, vice president and cashier, said Tuesday morning that he was happy that operations of the bank had now returned to normalcy.

amount of the shortage at the bank, uncovered three weeks ago when a customer's check kiting manipulation collapsed and was followed by statewide headlines, would not be officially announced until a later date.

He indicated that the bank's board of directors was calling a special meeting of stockholders in the near future to explain the situation in its entirety. He said that notices of the special meeting were to be mailed later this week.

When the shortage was made public three weeks ago, one daily newspaper estimated the loss at \$400,000, give or take \$100,000. Since then, the bank has been locating and consolidating all assets of the customer, who has cooperated. Included is a

\$400,000 mortgage on property owned by the customer.

"We were optimistic about a full recovery last week and have every reason to be more optimistic this week," commented Parkinson.

And, despite the statewide publicity given to the shortage, the Western Isoco-Eastern Ogemaw community served by Farmers and Merchants State Bank has not faltered in its confidence and support of their home bank. Depositors are safe, according to all information.

At this point in time, the Hale bank and the Michigan Financial Institutions Bureau still have not identified the customer who wrote one check to cover another over and over again until he had several hundred thousand dollars in circulation without cash to cover it. One name has been mentioned in newspaper reports.

Nothing has been stated by the bank or state agencies concerning possible prosecution of the unnamed customer.

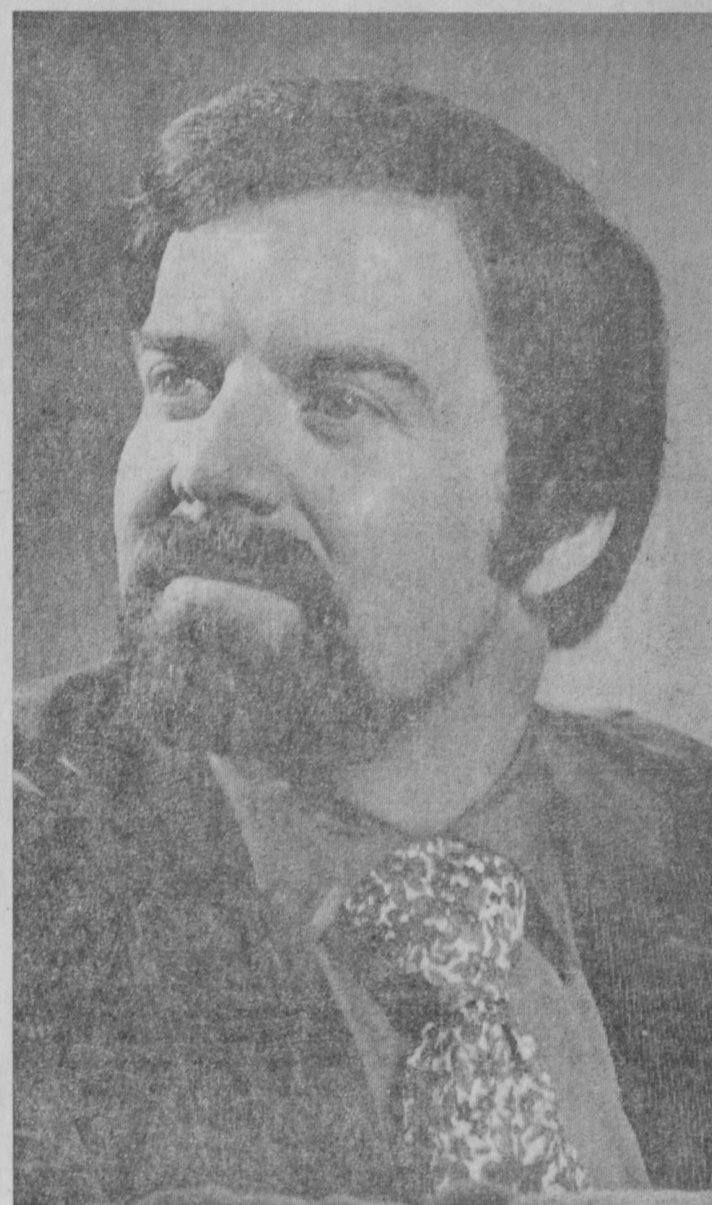
Parkinson said Tuesday morning

that he wished to clarify one statement attributed to himself printed by a Detroit newspaper and later reprinted by other newspapers.

"After we reported the shortage to the Michigan Financial Institutions Bureau, inferences were made concerning another bank. I wish to make public the fact that it was through no fault of Peoples State Bank of East Tawas that we ended up with the entire loss. Officials of that bank went out of their way to give us fair warning—something which they were not required to do—and have cooperated with us fully since that time," said Parkinson.

The bank's vice president and cashier said that a full report on status of the shortage and announcement of any new developments would be made following the special meeting of stockholders.

Parkinson, who with several members of the board of directors spent one day at Lansing with officials of the Michigan Financial Institutions Bureau, said he was most pleased with the cooperative attitude shown by that bureau.

Bob Talbert Set as Speaker for April 24 Banquet

Bob Talbert, popular and sometimes controversial Detroit Free Press columnist, will be guest speaker at the Citizens of the Area Banquet to be held Saturday, April 24, at the Holland House, East Tawas.

Sponsored by Tawas Chamber of Commerce, the affair starts with a cocktail hour at 6:30 p. m., followed by dinner at 7:30 p. m.

Selections will be announced that evening of the three citizens—male, female and student—who have made the greatest contribution to the area during the past year.

Talbert's writings have been published in everything from Playboy to Progressive Farmer, "which just about covers or uncovers the field," he states.

He is best known for his seven-day-a-week column on the feature page of the Detroit Free Press and several times a week in other Knight Newspapers, including the Miami Herald, Philadelphia Inquirer, the Charlotte Observer, the Akron Beacon-Journal.

Talbert came to work in Detroit in

August 1968. Born at Spartanburg, South Carolina, on May 28, 1936, he was managing a small neighborhood theatre and going to the University of South Carolina when he had a chance to become a part time sports "cub" reporter.

"I couldn't even type, but took the job at The State newspaper. I've been in this business ever since," comments Talbert.

Talbert's column is a little bit of everything—from every day trivia to once-in-a-lifetime treasuries of the average guy or the superstars. It is people and everything they do, feel, say and laugh about, or sometimes cry over.

"It is a sort of a daily conversation with the readers. My basic thing is to entertain, but occasionally educate or inform and once in a while, to inspire," says Talbert.

He tries to write Bob Talbert's Detroit as the sort of column "I like to read and try to keep it different every day. I hope you never get to where you can predict what is in my column. If you can, then I'm not doing my job," states the columnist.

Aged Oscoda Man Found Dead in Drift Near Cabin

An 83-year-old Oscoda Township man, who had been missing from his home on Pine Acres Road near Five Channels Dam for 13 days, was found dead in a snowdrift Sunday noon about 300 yards from his cabin.

Investigating state police officers said that an autopsy performed at Saginaw revealed that Florian H. VanGuten had died of exposure.

On March 16, neighbors noticed that VanGuten was not at his cabin and reported the fact to police. They said that the man was in ill health due to advancing years and unable to walk any great distance.

Attempts to locate the man, including one search with a state police tracking dog, were interrupted by two recent snowstorms. All footprints were obliterated by the heavy snowfall. Neighbors searching the area found the body.

Police said the man apparently walked down a steep hill behind his cabin. The body was found at the base of the hill near the edge of a swamp.

He had been a resident of Oscoda Township for about 25 years. He is survived by three brothers.

Funeral services are to be conducted Wednesday (today), March 31, 2:00 p. m., from Moffatt Funeral Home, East Tawas, with the Rev. Alfred W. Saulsbury officiating. Burial will be in Glennie Cemetery.

Spearing Perch Illegal in River, Warns Robson

Spearing perch in the Tawas River is illegal and violators will be prosecuted, warns George Robson, conservation officer.

Robson notified the Herald this week that he had received reports that youngsters had been spearing early spawning perch in the Tawas River on Saturday and Sunday.

Robson said this law outlawing spearing was as important as any

other conservation law and expressed surprise that some parents apparently had knowledge of the illegal activities of their children.

The conservation officer warned that parents of underage children engaged in illegal spearing would be cited into probate court with their children. Last year, a parent received a district court summons while watching his son engage in the illegal act of spearing perch.

Treaty Right

Allegan County has dropped court charges against a Michigan Indian for hunting deer without a license and plans to recommend to the legislature that the state provide free hunting and fishing licenses to any state resident who can establish his Indian ancestry.

Base Youth Encampment Gets Partial Funding From Law Assistance Agencies

Partial funding from the state has been received by Michigan Youth Services, Incorporated, for a second year of youth encampments at Wurtsmith Air Force Base, according to Steve Paslaski, MYS acting executive director.

A \$75,000 grant from the Michigan Law Enforcement Assistance Agency will be used to develop a more extensive follow-up program for the nearly 300 youths who will be brought to the base over a 24-week period during the summer and fall. Total estimated budget for the 1971 program is \$95,000, Paslaski said.

During their week-long stay, the youths will sleep in the barracks, eat in the dining hall and use the educational and recreational facilities of the base. The encampment will be directed by MYS, a non-profit organization composed of leading civilian citizens from Northeastern Michigan working in cooperation with base officials.

The encampment is not a recruiting program for the air force, Paslaski said. The facilities of the base are used to provide guidance and motivation for the youths to become active members of today's society.

Campers for the program are selected by a committee composed of

high school principals, juvenile authorities, clergymen and other responsible citizens from nearly 30 counties in the Lower Peninsula. MYS sponsors and finances the encampments and the only charge to campers is a nominal insurance fee.

The program got its start last year when groups of 20 boys, aged 14 to 17, were brought to the base each week. Over a nine-week period,

Following individual meetings between supervisors, clerks and treasurers, a general session was held with a question and answer period.

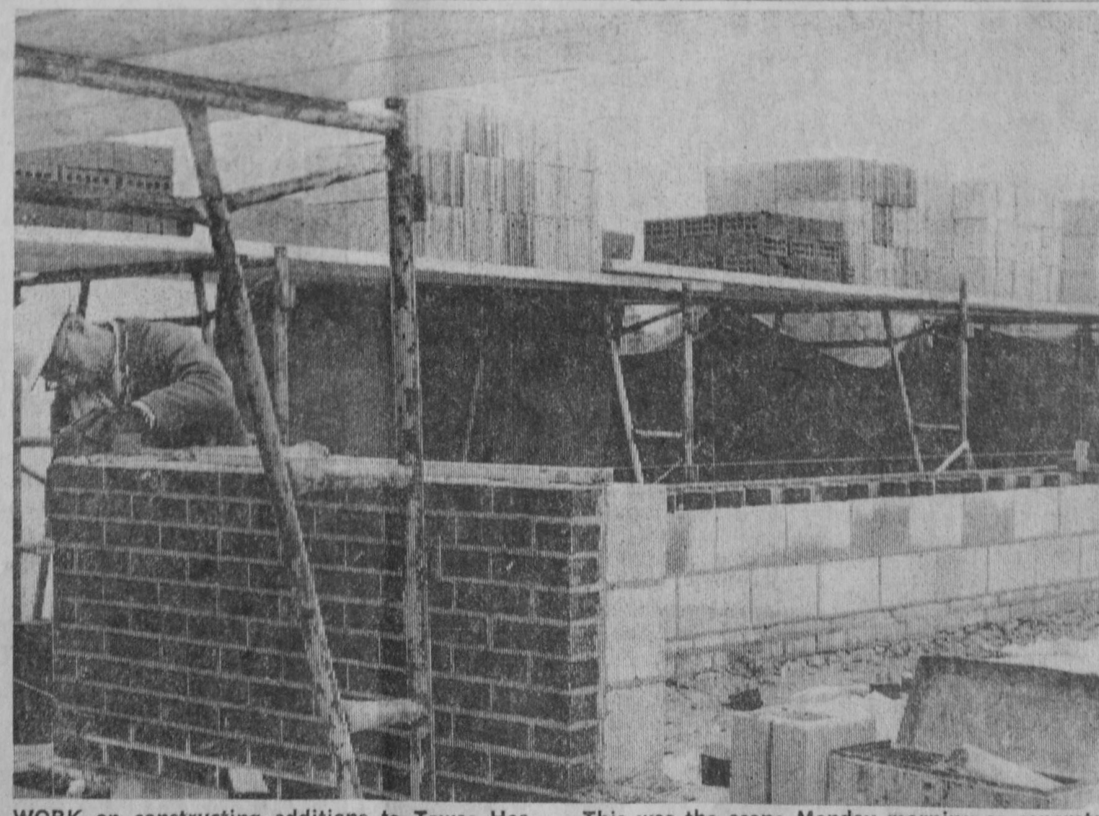
Next quarterly meeting of the association is to be held in June.

Professor Youngs Invited to Introduce Testing to Poland

Prof. Emeritus Stephen P. Youngs, former director of vocational testing and counseling at Lake Superior State College and a former principal of East Tawas High School, has been invited by the University of Warsaw and the Polish Peoples Republic to introduce his vocational testing programs in the schools and universities of Poland.

Mr. Youngs, who left last week for two weeks in Poland, is married to the former Edna Johnson of East Tawas.

Prof. Sofia Kietlinska, director of the Inter-University Institute for research on higher education at the University of Warsaw, selected Youngs' vocational testing development program as a model to be used in Poland to assist students in making the best vocational choices.

Arrangements have been made for preliminary testing of Polish students with English language backgrounds to be the control group, according to Youngs. He said that vo-

national tests will then be translated into Polish and used throughout the secondary schools of Poland.

Youngs' program was selected as the most practical research instrument for use in Poland. The psychology department of the University of Warsaw is offering its facilities in setting up the program.

This is the first time that the University of Warsaw has extended an outside invitation to bring this type of vocational testing program to the people of Poland, which is a great tribute to Youngs, who has a background of over 40 years in vocational testing and has administered the program to more than 26,000 students, including students from Canada, England, Sweden, Austria and Germany.

He is currently the president of the International Vocational Testing Service which operates out of Sault Ste. Marie.

He was principal and basketball coach at East Tawas High School during the 1930s.

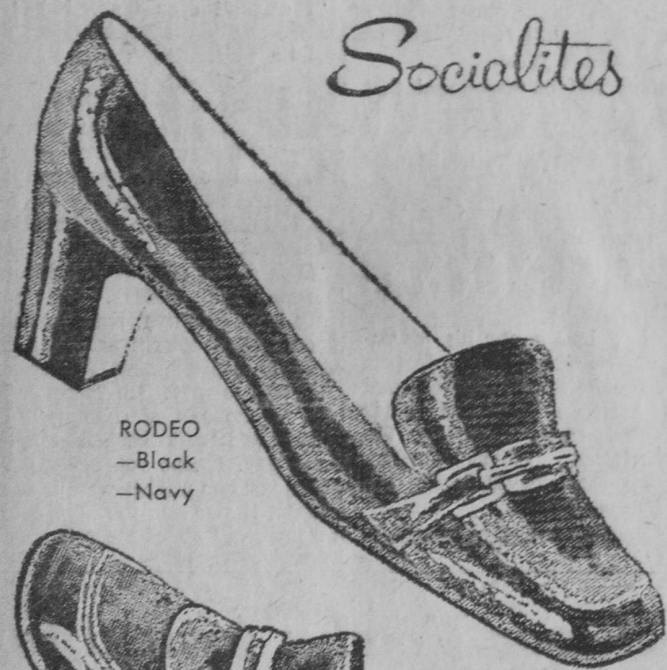

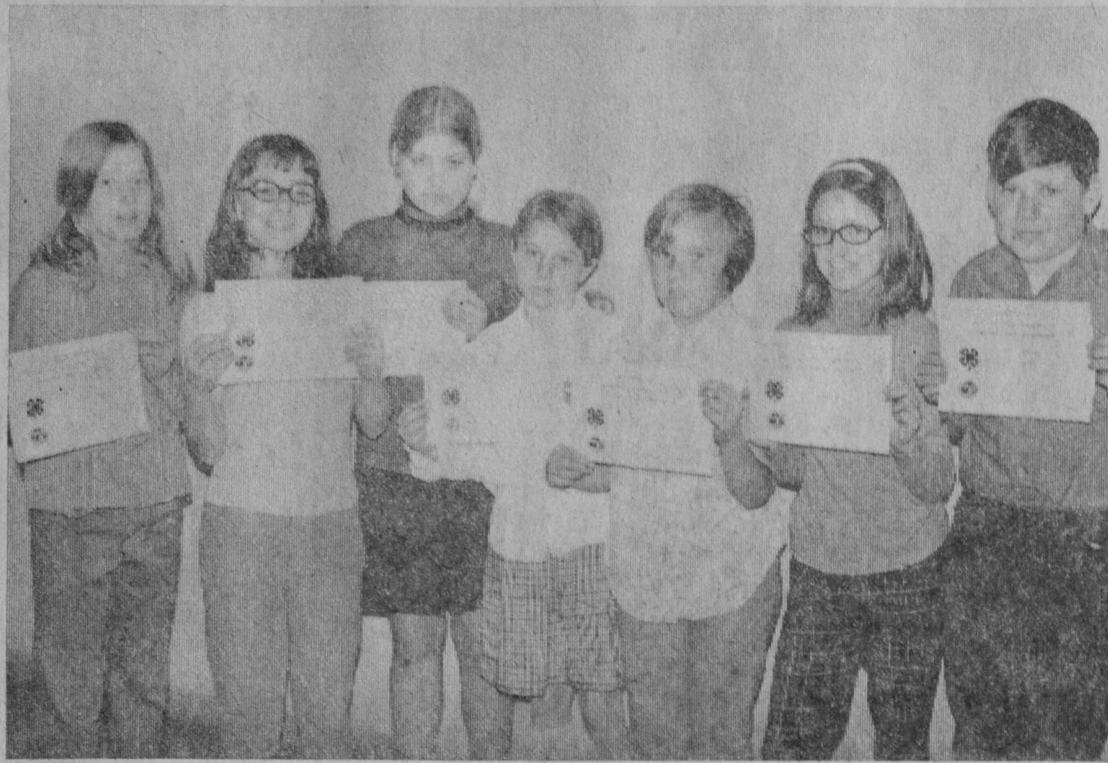

Rep. Prescott Calls State Board to Task on Bus Paint Order

State Rep. George A. Prescott, Tawas City, has blasted an apparent State Board of Education transportation order to paint all school bus wheels black as "another of those silly games the bureaucracy plays which ultimately cost the little guy time and money."

Representative Prescott said he was referring to a report that transportation division of the department of education has ordered all school buses to look alike. Many schools place the school emblem on the wheels, or the name of the school or athletic teams.

"I have contacted some members of the State Board of Education in an attempt to find out if the order did indeed originate with them, and if so, why. Some schools in my area have already begun the very expensive and time-consuming task of painting their bus wheels black, which apparently was the order given."

"We in the government hear that we are losing our image with the people. When government pulls stunts like this, it is no wonder they do. I can sympathize with them in this case," Prescott said.

"Instead of costing the local school districts additional dollars by painting over school emblems and names, we should be encouraging school spirit. I ask, what is more important, uniformity and added cost, or spirit and a feeling of pride over our educational system. The answer is so obvious that it should be very clear to the department of education."

"Education it appears has had public relations. Perhaps in these instances it is understandable why the taxpayer doesn't support the educational system's requests for additional funding."

"The state's share of education is

over one billion dollars. I hope they will search diligently for better ways to spend these funds than painting bus wheels just for the sake of uniformity," Prescott said.

"I urge the people and the media to make their voices heard on this issue in as loud a voice as possible," Prescott concluded.

Spring Load Limits Protect Older Highways

"An ounce of prevention is better than a pound of cure—could not be truer in relation to spring weight restrictions on some of our highways," Paul J. Marek, engineer of maintenance for the Department of State Highways, said in explaining the need for highway load limits.
"First of all, it should be understood," Marek said, "that all state highways built to freeway standards in Michigan for the last 20 years or more do not require special spring weight restrictions—they have only the year around, all season legal load limits."
"However, older highways, built according to older standards, have a subgrade that cannot adequately support heavy loads during the spring thaw."
Heavy loads on such highways rut or break up highway surfaces when spring thaws turn the frozen subgrade into mush. Rutted or broken highway surfaces almost always require complete construction, rather than minor repairs. By imposing spring weight restrictions on those highways known to have subgrades subject to winter freezing, costly reconstruction can be avoided, Marek said.
In late February or early March of each year, highway maintenance crews test bore to determine frost and thaw conditions in every county in Michigan. Test borings continue for many weeks, not only to determine when thaw conditions turn subgrade to mush, but also to determine when mush conditions have cleared and load limitations can be lifted.
Weight restrictions are usually imposed annually in geographical chunks, starting from the state's southern border and progressing to the northern border as thaw conditions progress northerly.
When test borings in a particular region indicate thaw conditions, the highway department imposes weight restrictions for seasonal highways in that area.
Weather and soil conditions are important factors in the design of today's highways, Marek said. Michigan's frost conditions that cause pavement breakups require higher design standards for highways here than those in milder climates.
"Spring weight restrictions are an absolute necessity to protect older highways," Marek said. "We realize that such load limitations might hamper some trucking operations, but in the best interests of the general motoring and taxpaying public, there is no choice but to impose spring weight restrictions."

Smelt Dipping Season May be Late Due to Ice Conditions

Because of continuing cold weather and ice conditions, spring spawning runs of smelt may be erratic this year and probably will be a week later than usual.

As a rule of the thumb, Lake Huron runs of smelt usually hit their stride during the third week of April and continue into early May. The runs usually start with limited activity about the second week in April. Heaviest runs of smelt usually occur when the water reaches a temperature of about 42 degrees, although this is not always the case as extremely cold water near shore tends to keep fish out of the warmer streams emptying into Lake Huron or Saginaw Bay.

Warm rains during early April

could change the picture entirely and trigger the runs at the usual time.

Smelt are not necessarily a fish for fishermen, although some are caught through the ice by hook and line during winter. The most popular method of taking these silvery fish is by net during the spring spawning runs.

Thousands of dippers gather along shorelines of the Great Lakes, choking mouths of streams with dip nets. A great many of those seeking smelt are not fishermen in the true sense of the word—they buy a fishing license only to dip smelt.

The smelt runs of the 1930s, 1940s and early 1950s were fantastic, with the Singing Bridge (Whitney Drain)

near the Iosco-Arenac line and the Tawas River earning the reputation as being hot spots for both smelt dipping and fun spots.

Despite the tapering off of smelt during the late 1950s and early 1960s, fishing and the antics of fishermen at the Singing Bridge have bordered on the fantastic. Parking along US-23 is always at a premium as thousands of dippers crowd the banks of the "Big Ditch." Residents of that area earn extra money by turning vacant areas into parking lots.

Access to many smelt dipping streams is on private property and fishermen should check with landowners first. Local law enforcement agencies handle many trespassing complaints at this time of the year.

Also adding to the work of conservation officers is the fact that the peak runs of smelt usually coincide with the steelhead run. This adds to the list of violators as smelt dip-

pers are not prone to return steelheads to the stream.

Downstayers will soon start telephoning local residents with requests to "let me know when the smelt run starts." At this point, predicting the smelt run is anybody's guess.

Kiwanis - Key Clubs Receive Honor Medals

Kiwanis International and the high school boys' service organization which it sponsors, Key Club International, have both won George Washington Honor Medals from Freedoms Foundation at Valley Forge, Pennsylvania, in the 1970 competition, according to information received here by Dr. Larry S. Kelly, president of the Tawas Kiwanis Club.

The awards, which were announced at Valley Forge on George Washington's birthday, are the highest that organizations can achieve in Freedoms Foundation's "General Americana Category."

Kiwanis' award came for its 1970-71 major emphasis program, "Operation Drug Alert." The purpose of the program is drug-abuse education. The ODA program is directed to the community in general, but ultimately to those in the upper elementary and junior high schools who have not yet been confronted with an option of voluntary drug use.

Key Club's award came for its current citizenship program, "A Pathway to Human Dignity." The young men of Key Club International felt that, in order for Americans to want to stand up for their basic freedoms, they must first emphasize their own personal dignity.

Kiwanis International has received more top awards from Freedoms Foundation than any other organization, according to Doctor Kelly. Key Club International, too, he added, has been often honored by Freedoms Foundation. The local club ran a series of newspaper articles last year dealing with the drug program.
