Commercial Fish Ban on Saginaw Bay Perch Tabled

Michigan Department of Natural Resources has bowed to pressure from commercial fishing interests and has tabled plans to restrict commercial perch fishing in Saginaw Bay this year.

Not seeing an "acceptable" way to keep the perch situation from going from bad to worse, DNR fishery workers are to continue to collect biological information on perch populations in the bay to reinforce what they already know about those stocks and, hopefully, set the stage for later action to promote the recovery of these depleted fish.

"Our management options to meet Saginaw Bay's perch problem include closing the commercial perch fishery there, banning the use of gill nets, or setting a harvest quota on perch which would allow the fish to rebuild," explains John Scott, in charge of the DNR's Great Lakes section.

"We see all of those options as being closed to us at this time because each of them would force some commercial fishermen out of business and it appears that any such course of action is not publicly acceptable," said Scott.

Locally, the DNR plan to curb commercial fishing in Saginaw Bay was supported by the Tawas City Council and Iosco Sportsmen's Club. It was also supported by the Bay County Board of Commissioners.

With studies indicating that over-

fishing has been the major cause of perch depletion in Saginaw Bay, DNR fisheries men believe that a closure on commercial perch fishing would improve the area's stocks and recreational fishing opportunities in the shortest possible time.

Scott said that such a measure would probably sideline about one-third of the bay's 31 licensed commercial operators.

Looking to another possibility, DNR fisheries officials believe that the bay's perch population would probably rebound in a few years if gill nets were prohibited and trap netting efforts were held to the current level. Again, however, some commercial fishery would be eliminated from the industry.

The third management choice, says Scott, is to establish an effective catch quota on perch, a step which the DNR had planned to take this year. Department fisheries biologists report that such a quota would have to be considerably below 225,000 pounds per year, the estimated annual yield of perch in the bay, to improve stocks over a three to four-year period.

This would represent a sharp reduction from last year's commercial catch in Saginaw Bay, which approximated 500,000 pounds of perch. That being the case, such a quota would likely put operators out of business.

Official Call for TA Bond Vote June 14

Signatures were affixed to legal documents Monday night officially authorizing a \$475,000 bonding issue to be placed before voters of Tawas Area School District at the annual election on June 14.

Tentative approval of submitting this proposal was given two weeks ago by the board of education and Monday night's action followed receipt of legal documents prepared by the school's attorney.

In addition, voters will be requested to approve a 7½-mill operational tax levy for two years. This levy would replace 4½ mills of taxes which expire this year and all three mills to offset inflation, deficit financing during the current year and

make some improvements to the school's curriculum.

The bonding proposal would finance construction of a tri-level addition to the Tawas City Elementary Unit for use as a middle school. Such a move has long been in the planning stage and is designed to relieve overcrowding at the high school. Most importantly, however, is the fact that a middle school would segregate junior and senior high school students from older high school students.

Built in 1957 for 625 students, with later additions the high school building has a capacity of 925 students. Present enrollment in the building is 1,062 students.

In discussions with parents and educators here during recent years, the point which has been emphasized has been that junior high school students of today learn things and grow up fast enough without being influenced by high school students and should be in a different school.

The board of education's plan is to build an 11-room addition for the new middle school which would contain 16,000 square feet. This would include six regular classrooms, plus two rooms for science, a resource center and rooms for arts and crafts.

Present elementary grades located there would be moved to East Tawas, along with utilization of quarters rented from Zion Lutheran School.

Financing this \$475,000 bond issue over a 15-year period would require an annual tax levy of .94 of a mill (.94 cents per \$1,000 of assessed valuation). Slightly more than one mill would be required the first year to raise \$43,000 for principal and interest. This tax rate would be lowered as district valuation increases, similar to financing of the high school. Tax rate adopted 15 years ago for financing the high school, which is to be retired in 1980, started out at 4½ mills the first year and has now dropped to 1.04 mills.

The bond market looks very favorable at present and bonds are expected to be sold at an interest rate of five percent.

After much debate at its last meeting, the board of education decided to submit its proposal of 7½ mills for operation in one package, rather than to have two ballots—one asking replacement of 4½ mills which expired and three mills of new operational tax.

Board of education members are the first to admit that school operational money is always the hardest to "sell" taxpayers but, because of deficit financing caused by inflation, this will be a back-to-the-wall proposition for the district as there are no frills in the budget.

The school's \$1,306,999 budget is \$78,258 higher than the current year. Based on the current state aid bill and no balance in the treasury, the 7½-mill proposition, if successful, will mean that Tawas Area School will only be able to keep pace with inflation, offer slight curriculum improvements, hire two additional teachers for these improvements to keep pace with expanding school enrollment.

Because of its high valuation, Tawas Area School still has one of the lowest operational taxes in the state and state aid is designed to help those schools which are not in this enviable position.

School Board Petitions Due Friday, May 14

Deadline for filing nominating petitions in the annual school election at Tawas Area School is Friday, May 14, 4:00 p. m.

Terms of two trustees expire this year and both Leonard Sarki and Clare Herriman, incumbents, have filed nominating petitions and have been qualified for the election.

Supt. Reynold Mick announced Monday night that two other persons had obtained nominating petitions from the school office but had not filed them as yet.

Summary Judgment Denied

Judge Continues Injunction on North Park Acres Home

Property owners of North Park Acres Subdivision, Tawas City, won the first round in their court battle to require enforcement of subdivision restrictions.

At a show cause hearing Wednesday, Iosco Circuit Judge Allan C. Miller denied a motion for summary judgment entered by attorneys for James A. Spragg, defendant.

A temporary injunction restraining Spragg from erecting a modular type dwelling in the subdivision, which was signed two weeks ago by Alpena Circuit Judge Philip J. Glennie, was continued by Judge Miller.

This suit was brought by 11 homeowners, who claim that the dwelling which Spragg proposes to construct on lots 50 and 55 is in violation of subdivision restrictions which have been in force since February 1, 1958. Spragg had received a building permit from the City of Tawas City for construction of the dwelling, as the city has no authority to enforce subdivision restrictions.

Spragg proposes to construct a modular type house at a cost of \$19-

500. Although original restrictions adopted in 1958 require a minimum estimated cost or market value of \$14,800, plaintiffs claim that there is a provision that a comparable sum be determined in consideration of increase or decrease in construction cost or market value. They say this construction cost requirement is now at least \$22,000 and claim that Spragg's proposed house has an actual retail price of \$14,900.

The defendant's petition last Wednesday claimed that since Elmer J. Burrell, developer of the subdivision, is deceased, restrictions requiring a minimum cost or market value for new homes is invalid, void and unenforceable.

Judge Miller denied this motion for summary judgment, stating there was a question of fact involved. He did not deny the motion with prejudice, however, which means that Spragg's attorney could renew the petition after evidence is presented at the forthcoming trial.

Attorney for the property owners, Kenneth J. Myles, argued that Burrell's death does not invalidate the

restrictions. His answer to the defendant's petition said that real property restrictions constitute valuable property rights and the owners of property affected by the restrictions can maintain and enforce the restrictions.

"The restrictions provided that they are to continue in force until February 1, 1988, and that it was the intention of property owners at the time of adoption that the death of Mr. Burrell was not to invalidate those restrictions, since by 1988, he would have been 100 years old," said Myles.

All purchasers of lots agree to a declaration to be bound by those restrictions, argued Myles. The fact that Mr. Burrell is deceased does not void the restrictions as to minimum cost requirements," said Myles. He stated that such cost restrictions could be independently determined in accordance with the restrictions without consulting Mr. Burrell or his authorized agent.

No date was set for the trial. Judge Miller indicated that about 60 days would be required for discovery.

white bud vase containing a pink carnation.

Seeks Injunction to Stop Paving

Sand Lake Resident Files \$10,000 Suit

A Grant Township property owner has filed suit against the Iosco Road Commission and the township asking damages of \$10,000 and seeks an injunction restraining the road commission from altering or paving a roadway in the township.

Robert L. Howard, plaintiff, claims that the road commission has performed work on Saginaw Street at Sand Lake which raised the level of the roadway approximately one foot.

The plaintiff claims that this work has materially altered drainage of surface water so as to collect on his property. This surface water diversion, it is claimed, completely saturates the soil and structures have been damaged by standing surface water.

Mr. Howard believes that it is the intention of the road commission to again alter the roadway through paving the surface. His petition claims that adequate drainage is not provided and that his property, along with other property in the area, would be damaged.

A temporary order restraining the road commission from further work on this street was signed by Alpena Circuit Judge Philip J. Glennie, in the absence of Iosco Circuit Judge Allan C. Miller. Date of a show cause hearing has not as yet been set.

Emergency Power Program Adopted

Consumers Power Company has initiated a long range program to maintain service to its electric customers during possible emergency situations with greater strength of reserves and greater reliability.

B. G. Campbell, vice president of marketing, said that throughout this week, company representatives in all 12 electric operating divisions are making personal calls to major electric customers.

"The end result of this plan," said Campbell, "is to provide an additional margin of electrical reserves so that when the demand reaches a high peak, we will be able to maintain essential electric supply to all customers."

The plan is designed to work this way—in the event of severe emergency conditions, requiring the reduction of the use of electricity throughout Consumers Power's system, additional power will be requested from the neighboring utilities, which are now interconnected with Consumers Power.

If those additional supplies are not available in sufficient quantities, the electrical voltage will be reduced throughout the system approximately five percent.

If the combination of these two steps is still insufficient, the company will then reduce its own power requirements.

Finally, if the emergency condition still exists, the company will ask its major industrial and commercial customers to voluntarily reduce electric loads, which would not impair productivity or safety.

In the event that all of the above

precautions fail to conserve a sufficient amount of electrical energy, then a public appeal would be made to all customers to voluntarily reduce their use of electricity and to keep it at a minimum for the duration of the emergency.

The company refers to this plan as its load management program. Basically, it is a plan which has been conceived well in advance in order to be ready at a moment's notice, if, in fact, electrical shortages result from major generating plant breakdowns, devastating storms or other unforeseen problems.

Campbell concluded that Consumers Power Company would have to put this plan into effect. "The last thing we want to do is ask our customers to voluntarily restrict their use of electric power. But, if an emergency situation were to develop, we know we must have this plan ready to implement at a moment's notice."

Chamber of Commerce Opposes Personal Tax

A resolution adopted recently by Tawas Chamber of Commerce called the business personal property tax a "discriminatory tax aimed at the business community" and urged its repeal.

The chamber's resolution said the tax is difficult to enforce and, in many instances, inequitable in its assessment. Complete enforcement of this tax law would require a staff the size of which could conceivably cost more than the revenue produced, stated the resolution.

The chamber's board of directors appealed to the state chamber of commerce, mayors of Tawas City and East Tawas, along with the Iosco Board of Commissioners to support a movement aimed at repeal of this tax.

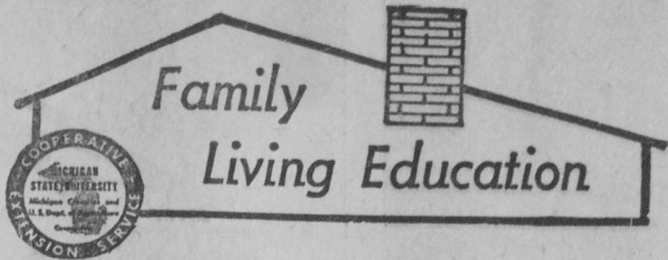

Complain To Get Results

Got a complaint? If you want to get results, be a good complainer. Tell your story directly to the seller or manufacturer, not your best friend or next door neighbor.

Sometimes, in spite of everyone's best efforts, you do receive unsatisfactory service or poor merchandise. In these cases, it is your responsibility to report the situation to the retailer or manufacturer responsible. Most companies give personal attention to consumer complaints and set up costly systems to give a prompt, courteous reply. They can only help, though, if they have enough information to identify and correct mistakes.

The National Association of Manufacturers offers these suggestions. Why not cut the whole list out and tape it to the inside of a cupboard door, where it will be handy if you need it.

After Making A Purchase:

"Make a habit of keeping receipts, hangtags, warranties, care labels and such in one place so they are readily available in case you need to return the merchandise.

"Read and follow instructions carefully as to using, washing, drying or other general care. This may eliminate the need for a return.

"If you find it necessary to return an item or make a complaint, think through the reasons why you are dissatisfied so you can present your case well.

"Assemble receipts, hangtags, and the like in the original package if possible.

Returning A Purchase To A Store:
"Return merchandise to the store where you bought it and to the department where it was purchased.

"Avoid making returns near closing time, or during rush hours, when you may not get to see the person who can do the most for you. If the person has no authority to service your complaint to your satisfaction, ask to see a person higher in authority.

"If you are leaving the item for repair or if a refund will be mailed to you, be sure to obtain a receipt for the item.

Writing A Company Or Returning By Mail:

"Try to find the proper name of the company, the right department, address and zip code. Improperly addressed letters get delayed. (The librarian in your local library will be able to help you.)

"Write a business-like letter. Keep a carbon copy, even if by hand. Write legibly. This will save time in the long run.

"Give brand name, the model number, size, color and any other information that will help identify the product.

"Try to explain exactly what is wrong. If you are returning a prod-

uct, send it in the original package if possible. If the product is small, send the letter with the package and insure it. With certified mail, you can specify a return receipt so you will know it was received. Include your name, address, zip code and telephone number on your correspondence.

*If you should not hear from the company, send a second letter. Most companies try to acknowledge complaint letters within two or three weeks.

Making an intelligent complaint sometimes requires courtesy, courage and patience. It also requires keeping accurate records of purchase dates and prices, use and care instructions and model numbers. It is one way to be a good consumer and contribute toward the goal of better products and better services, as well as getting the best values for your own dollars.

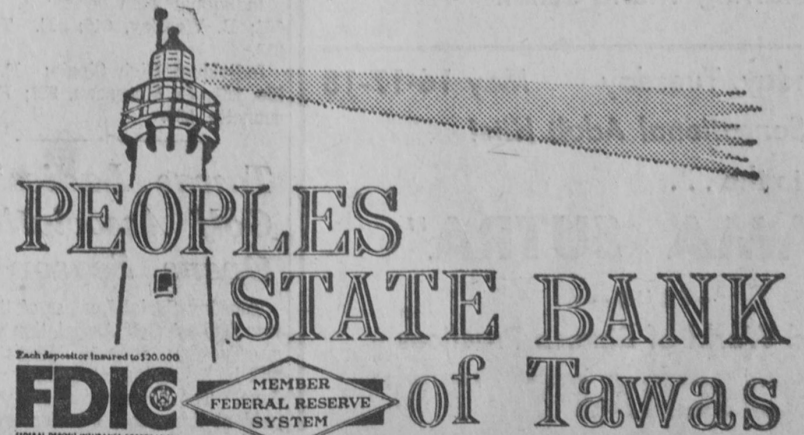

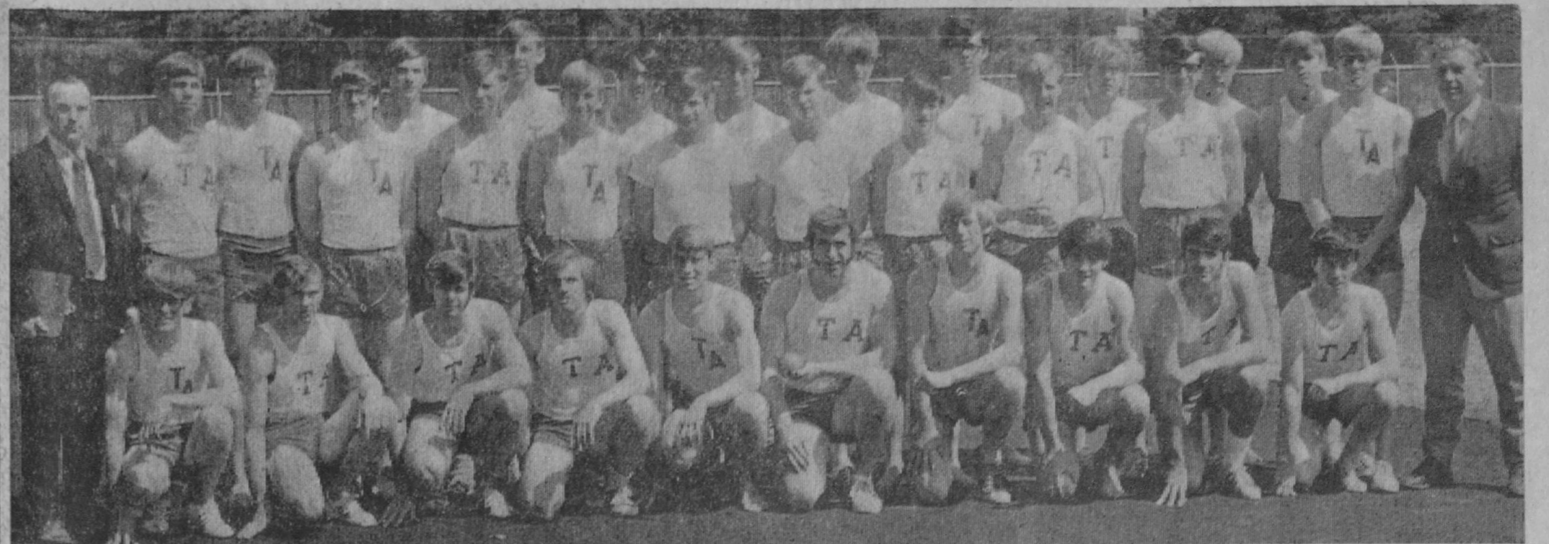
To set the mood for the alumni band, the present senior band will perform a selection from each of the past six years' spring concerts. In addition, the dance band will play some past and current hits.

Saturday, May 15, will be the band's annual tag day.

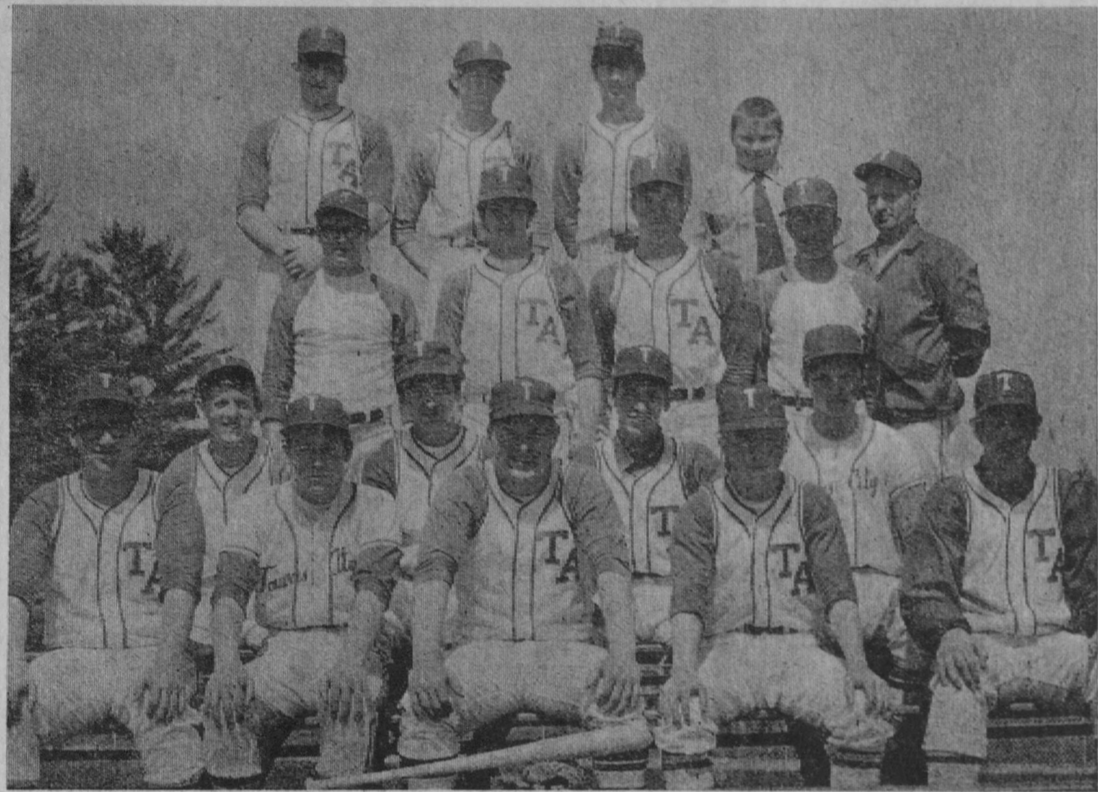
Annual Crop Report Announced for Iosco County

Forest Supervisor Reports:

Moist Weather Delays Forest Fires in Area --- Until Now!

According to John von Barga, forest supervisor, the forest fire season, delayed by unseasonably cool and moist weather, should start to build up during these last weeks of May and reach its peak about the last week of the month.

"Over the last five years, 50 percent of fires suppressed by United States Forest Service forces have been during the spring months of April and May," observed von Barga. "In 1970, out of a total of 180 fires suppressed, 116 occurred during these spring months."

Debris burning is still the forerunner as the principal cause for wild fires. About one-third of all fires are caused by burning debris without regard to the weather. A little rubbish fire can escape with a sudden gust of wind and develop into a serious situation that endangers people, as

well as the environmental resources. In an effort to keep fire losses to a minimum, von Barga reminds landowners, mushroom pickers, fishermen and other outdoor users of some changes in the state forest fire laws. For instance, it is now unlawful to discard any burning materials in forest and grassland areas. This law covers that cigarette tossed out of a moving vehicle as well as the one discarded on foot. All burning material must be "dead out" before it is disposed of.

Another change in the forest fire law requires a debris burner in forested and grassland areas to obtain a burning permit unless his debris burning container is built of masonry or metal and has a metal cover with openings no larger than three-quarters of an inch.

A rural landowner planning to use open fires for any purpose must obtain a burning permit, before the fire is set. The burning permit is free and can be obtained at any of the seven district ranger's offices, or from designated forest fire wardens located throughout the two National Forests.

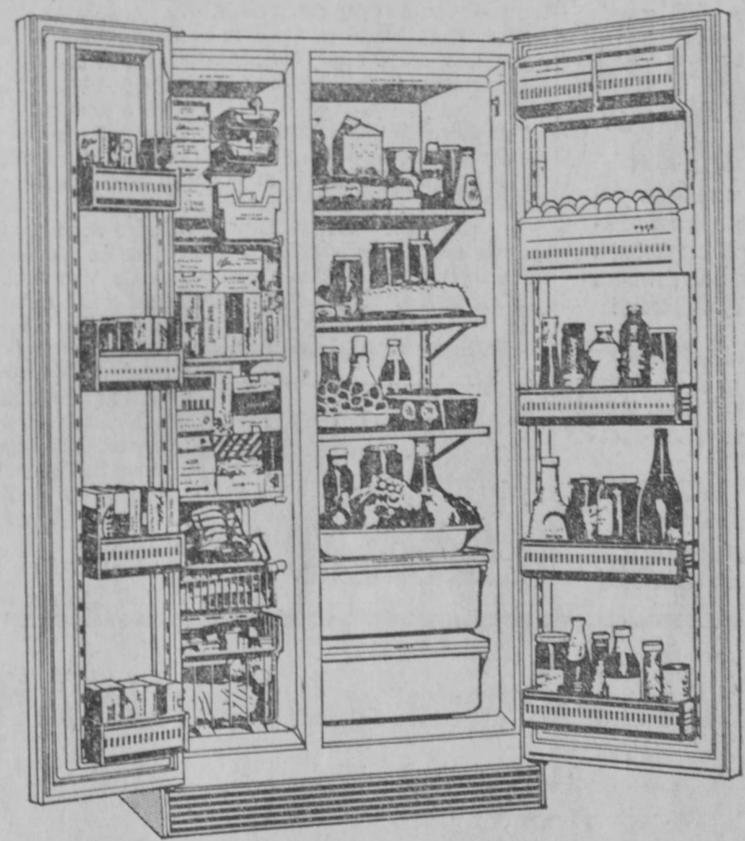
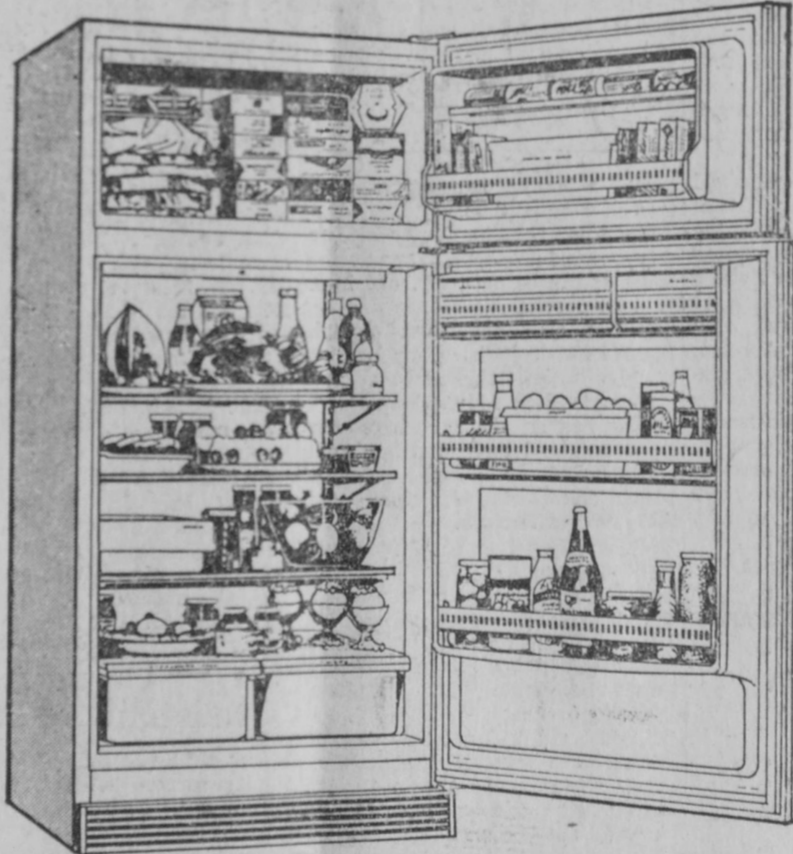

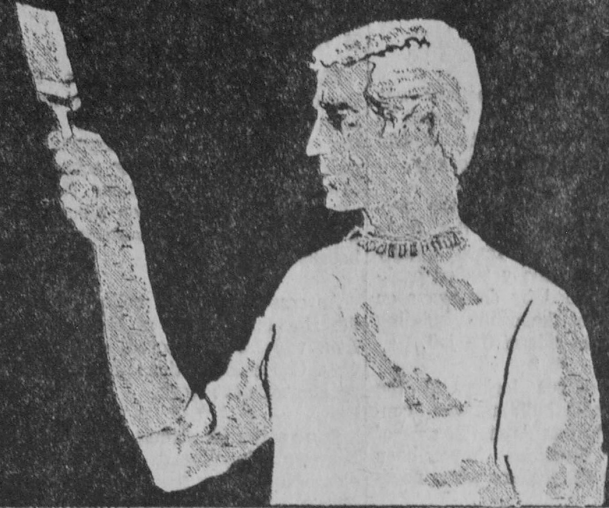

'Jack' Johnson, Retired Mail Carrier, Dead

John H. (Jack) Johnson, 75, retired rural mail carrier at Hale, died Tuesday, May 4, at Tolfree Hospital, West Branch. Funeral services were held Thursday, May 6, at Hale United Methodist Church, with burial in Evergreen Cemetery. Born September 23, 1895, he was the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Nelson Johnson. He graduated from Tawas City High School, where he was an outstanding baseball player. He later played independent baseball at Tawas City and Hale and was noted for his speed on the basepaths. Following military service during World War I, Johnson started a 45-year career with the postal service when he became a substitute rural carrier August 1, 1921, at Hale. He became a regular carrier November 21, 1921, and served his patrons continuously until retirement October 31, 1965. Despite road conditions or bad weather, he never missed a day of delivering mail. Mr. Johnson and the former Sara Thompson were married at the Maple Ridge Presbyterian Church on September 1, 1920. Both were teaching school at Turner in Arenac County at the time of their marriage. They observed their 50th wedding anniversary September 6, 1970. The Johnsons have operated a furniture and appliance business at Hale for a number of years. Mr. Johnson was a past master and a charter member of Hale Lodge No. 518, F&AM; the Bay City Consistory; a charter member of Glen Staley American Legion Post, Hale, and a charter member of Hale Lions Club. Besides his wife, he is survived by one son, Nelson (Bud) Johnson of Oscoda; two daughters, Mrs. William (Lora) Moshier, Grayling, and Mrs. William (Alice) Weresley, Hale; four grandsons; one brother, Charles Johnson of Flint; a sister, Mrs. Ethel Rendall, Zion, Illinois. Two brothers, who were connected with the mail service, passed away during the past nine months. Arthur Johnson was a retired rural mail carrier at Whittemore and Philip Johnson of Hale operated a truck which delivered mail in Iosco and Ogemaw Counties.
